Speaker Blair: "Report of Standing Committees. Reports of Special Committees, Joint Committees and Commissions. Introduction and First Reading of House Bills. Agreed Resolutions other than Death Resolutions. Consideration of Measures and Committee of the Whole House. All right, we're at that Point where there's not only 107, but there's not 89, so I think it would be futile to go to the next Order of business, which is House Bills, Second Reading and it would be my suggestion that we ah..... just stand at ease until we can get into ah..... a posture of having the votes here, one way or the other. For what purpose does the Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Hill, seek recognition?"

Hill: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to ask how many answered to Roll Call?"

Speaker Blair: "The Clerk will respond."

Clerk Selcke: "107, now."

Hill: "Mr. Speaker....."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Hill."

Hill: "This Session was called for One O'Clock. We're now at ease, and I'm not opposed to that, even though it certainly put my family out, the same as everyone here who has shown up, but it seems to me that we should recess to a time certain and stop fooling around. I'm very disgusted with the whole situation. I'm very frustrated by the whole situation. It seems to me that if we're going to play games, it seems that at least we could give the ordinary Member, like myself, just a little break, and set a time certain when we should come back here and maybe then we will have enough Membership here to function. I'd appreciate if that time would be later than 5:15, because I heard on the radio that the Governor is going to call a meeting of the Leadership of both parties and of the Senate and the House and I feel confident that nothing is going to be accomplished before that time, if anything will be accomplished after that time, and I think this idea of manipulating the ordinary Member has gone just too far. I drove home to see my family yesterday. I spent less than twenty-four hours with them and it's getting too much."

Speaker Blair: "Gentleman from Union, Mr. Choate."



Choate: "Mr. Speaker, I would concur in most of what the Gentleman has said, but I don't know how in the world that we can put a tow truck on some of the Members and insist that they be here. I would ask now, Mr. Speaker, that the House stand in recess for the purpose of a Democratic conference."

Speaker Blair: "All right, I.... there would appear that there are probably sufficient votes here to pass the Senate Bills on Third Reading. I don't think..... if that's the case, at least we could do that when we come back from the Conference, and at least give some of the party Members an opportunity to be here maybe. The only thing I thought was, we want to have a Conference too, and it would probably just give a little more time for more Members to become available to the Conference, if we'd run through these Senate Bills, to get an Agreed Roll Call. I don't think it would take longer than 10 or....."

Choate: "If we have the 89 votes here, and....."

Speaker Blair: "We need 107. Most of them are Appropriation Bills."

Choate: "107, rather and they are not of a controversial nature, I ....."

Speaker Blair: "I don't think any of these Bills that are on Senate Bills that are on Third Reading are controversial, and those of you who are handling them, it probably would be well-advised to get them passed if there are votes here and get the message over to the Senate as quickly as possible, because there are Amendments on them and they'll have to concur. Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Hill."

Hill: "I don't want to be misunderstood. If we have Bills on the Calendar that can be acted on or Resolutions to be acted on, I'm not opposed to that, but what I'm opposed to is sitting here, twiddling our thumbs for hours, after hours, after hours. That's what I'm opposed to and not doing anything. If there are Bills to be acted upon, I'm more than happy to staying here and acting upon them."

Speaker Blair: "Okay. All right, then, let's go and see if the vote situation is okay. On Senate Bills, Third Reading, then,

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appears Senate Bill 4, on which the Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Taylor. Read the ah..... yes."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 4. An Act to transfer certain appropriations to the Department of Labor to the Department of Public Aid. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Taylor."

Taylor: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, Senate Bill 4 is a Bill to transfer \$5,200,000 from the Training and Education Grant to the Department of Labor to the Training and Education of Child Grant line item appropriation of the Department of Public Aid. A recent Amendment to Table IV of the Social Security Act of 1973 mandates that in order to receive 75 percent Federal reimbursement, the money must come through the Department of Public Aid as a single State agency. The Amendment to Senate Bill 4 allows the Department of Public Aid to transfer \$6 million of medical assistance line item to line item of aged, blind and disability. The Amendment will be there in order to implement the Amendment which was adopted by Senate Bill 16. The Amendment to Senate Bill 16 mandated the Department of Public Aid to supplement this Grant of new persons coming onto the Federal Supplement Security Income Program on January 19, 1974. Those persons are under the program as of December 1, 1973 and are guaranteed the supplement through the Federal Legislation. What that means is that if a person truly is on a..... and the Federal government had mandated that he get \$150 a month and the Federal government only paid \$130 a month, then the State itself would be mandated to pay that other \$20 supplement. Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I feel that this Bill is not controversial and I move for the adoption of Senate Bill 4."

Speaker Blair: "Any discussion? All right, the question is, shall Senate Bill 4 pass. All those in favor, will vote 'aye' and the opposed 'no'. The Clerk will take an oral Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Thompson. Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Thompson."

Thompson: "Mr. Speaker, how am I recorded?"

Speaker Blair: "How's the Gentleman recorded?"

Clerk Selcke: "Gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Speaker Blair: "Have all..... Mr. Davis, how's the Gentleman recorded?"

Clerk Selcke: "Gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Bluthardt 'aye'. Have all voted who wished? Mr.

McCormick 'aye'. On this question, there are 116 'ayes', no



'nays' and Senate Bill 4, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. Senate Bill 5. Is Mr. Jaffe here?"

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 5. An Act to amend the School Construction Bond Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Jaffe."

Jaffe: "Mr. Speaker, this merely amends the School Construction Bond Act. When we passed out the School Construction Bond Act, we left out, by mistake, certain language, and that mistake impairs the bonds having full face and credit in the State of Illinois being behind it. I would like to note that all the other bond Acts have the identical clause and there is no controversy over this Bill. It's agreed to on both sides of the aisle, and I would like leave to use the last Roll Call, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Blair: "Discussion. All right, the question is, shall Senate Bill 5 pass? All those in favor, will vote 'aye'. The opposed 'no'. The Gentleman has asked leave to have the last unanimous Roll Call be the vote with respect to Senate Bill 5. Hearing no objections, then the vote on Senate Bill 4, which was 116 'ayes', no 'nays' shall be the vote with respect to Senate Bill 5 and Senate Bill 5 having received a Constitutional Majority or a Constitutional 3/5th's vote is hereby declared passed. Senate Bill 20."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 20. An Act to make an Appropriation to the Board of Governors, State Colleges and Universities. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "That's Mr. Peters. Yes, we still haven't got that corrected. Mr. Peters is handling this Bill."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Senate Bill 20 appropriates \$142,200 to the Board of Governors for the purpose of a cooperative computer center; that appropriation being agreed to by the Board of Higher Education. It also appropriates monies to the Board of Governors for Chicago State University, Governors State University, Northeastern University, Illinois University. Monies in the amount of \$769,000 to correct errors made in the



ah..... the reduction veto. It also includes monies along this same line for Eastern Illinois University and some appropriation for the Board of Regents. I ask the House's favorable consideration and the last unanimous Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "Discussion? All right, the question is shall Senate .....

Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Juckett."

Juckett: "Will the Gentleman yield for a question?"

Peters: "Not really, Bob, but all right."

Juckett: "This money isn't to be used ah..... to ah..... build or purchase the booze lounges at these colleges, is it?"

Peters: "No."

Juckett: "I understood that they are now setting up booze areas in each of these universities."

Peters: "I saw that article in the paper. Basically, all this Amendment does is restore money forgotten by an error."

Speaker Blair: "Gentleman from Christian, Mr. Tipword."

Tipword: "Would the Gentleman yield for a question?"

Peters: "I'll wait for the question."

Tipword: "It's not what you think. I wanted to ask about the President's homes in some of these places. Ah....."

Peters: "This Bill has nothing to do with the President's homes. I'm not going to answer on those questions."

Tipword: "During this time, have they continued to construct those homes, in which the discrepancies in financing was discovered by Representative Juckett's Commission?"

Peters: "Ralleigh, this Bill has nothing to do with that. It is basically to correct the errors that were made in terms of the reduction vetoes and the errors that were made in the Legislation that was passed here in terms of setting down the right figures. It's all agreed to. It has nothing to do with the Presidents homes."

Tipword: "To get back to where we were then, in the correcting of these errors, ah..... the reductions that were made heretofore, were there any of those reductions made in the area of administration?"

Peters: "Are you looking for the total amount that we're talking about?"

Tipsword: "The reductions that were made in the appropriations to these various colleges and universities were any of those reductions by the Governor made in the areas of administration?"

Peters: "Well, the answer to that is 'no'. None of them."

Tipsword: "And in what areas are these appropriations for? What do the appropriations have to do with the.... a cooperative computer center?"

Peters: "Ah.... at the time the budget was submitted, there was a disagreement as to exactly how much money would be required to operate that computer center. The Board of Higher Education, after sitting down and looking at the situation again, agreed that, in fact, an added \$140,000 would be required, which is, incidentally, Ralleigh, about \$95,000 less than what was initially requested."

Tipsword: "Now, is this only the computer center that's in this Bill, or do you know?"

Peters: "We amended the others into it. The Senate, as you recall, from the appropriations committee, the Computer Center is on Senate Bill 20, and what we have attempted to do in order to assure getting the monies through and correcting these errors, we have included as Amendments, which were approved by the House, several other Bills which we hope we can get over to the Senate and have acted on today. Yes, I'm sorry. Go ahead, I'm sorry."

Tipsword: "Yes, I wanted to ask one additional thing."

Peters: "Sure."

Tipsword: "The provisions that are made other than for the computer center, in the items set forth to be covered by this Appropriation, are pretty broad, aren't they?"

Peters: "In terms of the language here, Ralleigh, I suppose you could say they are. Ah.... House Bill 32, as an example, which was put on as Amendment to this Bill, does appropriate some \$769,000 to the Board of Governors for three universities for work, as again if you recall from the Appropriations Committee Hearings, for work which has already been completed or contracted for. And





now there might be some question, if you're looking down the Bill itself as to exactly what part of this \$769,000 goes for the sidewalk, the road or the building or the bathroom they're putting in or whatever it might happen to be."

Tipsword: "All right, some of these things for contract that were entered into that were not heretofore specifically appropriated for?"

Peters: "No. No. No."

Tipsword: "You know they couldn't answer that for me in Appropriations Committee. They said some of them were items that were not specifically appropriated for. Now, then, they want to support and complete them."

Peters: "They have been appropriated for, Ralleigh, that was my understanding the entire time. This Bill adds what that \$142,000 had to do with a question, you know, of the priority situation and had to do with the Board of Governors and ah..... the various agencies people affected, sitting down and determining exactly what they ended up needing on this."

Tipsword: "Are some of these appropriations related to additional construction of sidewalks and shrubbery and landscaping and additional convenience roads and streets?"

Peters: "Part of this does apply to contracts that have already been let, have not been started and contracts which have already been let and work either in the progress of being completed or completed."

Tipsword: "Some of them, then, are things that if they didn't appropriate for, they wouldn't have to go ahead with. Are they not?"

Peters: "Ah..... that's probably true, Ralleigh, except ah..... if you want to get an indication to me of what part of this we're not appropriating for, I can't tell you that."

Tipsword: "I remember the fellow that appeared from the Boards couldn't tell us either, at the Appropriations Committee."

Peters: "No, I can't give you an answer on that other than the Board of Governors, the Governor's Office, and all parties concerned had, in fact, agreed, that this money is needed to complete the work."



Tipsword: "Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "Okay, Mr. Waddell."

Waddell: "Mr. Speaker, would the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Peters: "Yield."

Waddell: "Could you tell me ah..... where this information data center is to be located?"

Peters: "It is located in Elmhurst, at Elmhurst College, Representative Waddell."

Waddell: "At Elmhurst College."

Peters: "Yes."

Waddell: "Could you tell me whether they have done any research as to how much available time there was on the machinery that we have already put in that could be shared."

Peters: "What's happening here, Representative Waddell, is that this installation is now at Elmhurst. They have an agreement with the college there where we are not paying a rent. We are allowing them to use this system that we have in and the estimates in terms of the time used on this are approximately 19 hours per day."

Waddell: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to speak to the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Proceed."

Waddell: "To begin with, I think that all of you should recognize the fact that with the new equipment we have put in the Secretary of State's office, they can more than handle free of charge on a time-share basis all the demands that all the universities have in the data field, so that as far as I'm concerned and being the chairman of the Data Information Systems Commission, I feel that this is totally unnecessary, because we have already spent more than adequate money so that all of the use, other than what we have right now, at the University of Illinois and they have more equipment than they know what to do with. All of this is totally unnecessary and I certainly would advocate a 'no' on this situation."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Will, Mr. Kempiners."

Kempiners: "I move the previous question."



Speaker Blair: "The previous question has been moved. All those in favor, say 'aye'. Opposed 'no'. All right, the previous question has been moved. Now to the Gentleman from Bureau, Mr. Barry. No, Peters, all right. Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Peters."

Peters: "Just in reply, Mr. Speaker, to Representative Waddell, I might indicate that this facility at Elmhurst is now in operation. It's not something new that's being added. It's to maintain the system that we already have and an attempt has been made by the Board of Governors and the Governor's office and the Board of Higher Education to centralize this within the educational system, because of the specific problems they have and the specific type of records they end up needing. Ah..... I just reiterate that there are agreements between all parties concerned here and I ask the favorable consideration of the House and leave for the last Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "All right. The..... Okay. Ah..... the question is, shall Senate Bill 20 pass? All those in favor will vote 'aye' and the opposed 'no'. Gentleman has asked leave for the last unanimous Roll Call. Is there objection? All right, there is objections, so the Clerk will call the Roll."

Speaker Blair: "Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Waddell."

Waddell: "Mr. Speaker, in explaining my vote. Obviously, some here don't agree with the idea that we should be down here trying to put these budgets in shape. Let me tell you this, that when the Data Information Systems went back to the University of Illinois just two years ago and had reviewed the amount of equipment that the University of Illinois had, Doctor Corbelea himself, the President of the University, decided that maybe they better stop this thing and go back and find out what it was all about, and by Doctor Corbelea's own testimony, they decided that they would form a consortium of all the universities and those in higher education, so that they could properly utilize the equipment that they had, and in doing this, saved the State of Illinois and the taxpayers over \$3 million, the first year. The first year. I.... and now we're right back to the place where we're trying to get more equipment put in that is not necessary, that is not being used and utilized correctly and we here at the Capitol have a great bank of material time and when somebody tells you they have their own particular problem and their own way of feeding the computer, that's hogwash, and that's all it is, because as anybody knows, the mechanical computer comes out as its programmed.



So I say to you, if you want to save the People of the State of Illinois some money, I would vote 'no' on this."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Duff 'no'. Mr. Schlickman?"

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker, how am I recorded?"

Peters: "May I ask for a poll of the absentees, Mr. Speaker, and make a statement before that?"

Speaker Blair: "We're at 99, 11. Barry 'aye'. Beatty aye'. He's already on. All right, the Gentleman's asked for a poll of the absentees."

Peters: "If I might just say, Mr. Speaker. This Bill needs 107 votes to pass. I called to the attention of the Ladies and Gentlemen of the House this fact. Much has been made here of the appropriation of \$142,000 for a computer center. We are not asking for anything new here, as I indicated in my comments on the speech. This Bill is \$142,000 to put back into the budget, after the Board of Higher Education, agreed that they had pulled this out by error....."

Speaker Blair: "One moment, now. One moment, Mr. Peters. For what purpose does the Gentleman from Vermilion, Mr. Craig, arise?"

Craig: "He can go ahead."

Speaker Blair: "Okay, Mr. Tipsword, did you want to interrupt? Gentleman from Christian, Mr. Tipsword."

Tipsword: "Mr. Speaker, how many times can the Gentleman speak on the Bill?"



Speaker Blair: "Well, ah..... I'm sorry, I thought he was on explanation of his vote."

Tipsword: "No, Sir."

Speaker Blair: "Oh, Mr. Peters, you had asked for a poll of the absentees?"

Peters: "Yes, Sir."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Peters."

Peters: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I thought because of the importance of this Bill, and because of the fact that it has been agreed basically on both sides of the aisle and by the Governor's office perhaps there was a little bit of confusion initially in the discussion on it, that it would be proper for me to bring these points out."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the Gentleman's Point is well taken.

You're only entitled to have one explanation. Now the Gentleman from Vermilion, Mr. Craig."

Craig: "Mr. Speaker, this is a Bill that..... I have a Bill that is amended here that is for Eastern Illinois University, which was intended in the last Session to be ah..... in the Bill that we passed the last Session. Somehow it got mixed up in the Conference Committees or the Enrolling and Engrossing and this money was left out. This is not adding really any extra money. The University has already obligated themselves for this money, which was intended by this House of Representatives and Senate and Governor's People and I feel like that this, all of this Bill was, and the many Bills that it includes, the Board of Governors and other Amendments. Mr. Bradley has one in here, that's amended to this Bill. These were Bills that I think are very important to the People of the various areas where they're concerned and I certainly would urge on the absentees if they would please give us an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Blair: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, am I recorded on this Roll Call, and if so, how?"

Speaker Blair: "How is Representative Shea recorded, Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk Selcke: "The Gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Shea: "That's right."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Clerk, would you record Representative Cornell Davis as voting 'aye'."

Clerk Selcke: "The Gentleman is already recorded as voting 'aye'."

Speaker Blair: "Where were we, Mr. Clerk, on the poll of the Absentees?"

Clerk Selcke: "Yeow. The count is now 100 'ayes', 11 'nays'."

Speaker Blair: "All right, right now, there are 100 'ayes', 11 'nays' and the Gentleman has asked for a poll of the absentees. Mr. Katz is going on as 'aye' right now. Record Representative Katz as 'aye'. There's 101, and will the Clerk please read the names of the..... Oh, here's another one Fred. You want it now? Bob Dunne. R. L. Dunne 'aye'."

Clerk Selcke: "Okay, ready to go?"

Speaker Blair: "Oh, here's a couple more. Deuster 'aye'. Beaupre 'aye'. Tim Simms 'aye'. Catania 'aye'. Representative Dee, for what purpose do you rise?"

Dee: "To explain my vote, Mr. Speaker. Despite the discourtesy treatment, I vote 'aye', that I've received by the Sponsors of this Bill. I vote aye."

Speaker Blair: "Record the Gentleman as voting 'aye'. Ewell 'aye'."

Clerk Selcke: "O'kay, you already voted."

Speaker Blair: "Now, is there anyone else who wishes to ah.... come on this Roll Call. What do we have? Clerk informs me there are 111 votes, Representative. Do you still wish to..... 109. Do you persist in the..... okay, the Gentleman has withdrawn the request for the poll of the absentees. Can I have a count, Mr. Clerk?"

Speaker Blair: "109 'ayes', 11 'nays', none voting 'present'. This Bill having received the Constitutional three-fifths Majority, is hereby declared passed. What should I call next?"

Clerk Selcke: "109 to 11."

Speaker Blair: "Is Representative Grothberg here? He's not here. Senate Bill 22."



Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 22. An Act to make an additional appropriation to the Illinois Legislative Council. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Gentleman from St. Clair, or Madison, Representative Kennedy."

Kennedy: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is Representative Barry's Bill. He's not here and I'm going to handle it for him, with your help. It's an appropriation, reduced from \$30,000 to \$25,000 of the Illinois Legislative Council and it also has an appropriation for the Space Needs Commission on an Amendment, which was given to you by John Brandt. The ah..... total amount for the Council is \$25,120, and the total amount for the Space Needs is \$81,000. I would appreciate your vote on these two measures. Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "Is there any discussion? Gentleman from Cook, Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Will the Sponsor yield for a couple of questions?"

Kennedy: "Yes."

Schlickman: "The Bill, as it was originally introduced, appropriated the amount of \$30,000 to the Legislative Council for its service unit for additional services. What are those additional services to be provided by that appropriation?"

Kennedy: "Well, Gene, I have a copy of it here. Two offset press operations - \$581 a month, which comes to a total of \$6,972, plus the State's contribution to social security and State Retirement, which is \$626.64. One Clerk Messenger of \$438 a month, plus additional social security of \$311.40. Total for the new personnel would be \$10,538.04. Overtime pay for press operators is \$3,950. Total personnel costs would be \$14,488.04. The equipment would be an offset press, Model 360, \$4,700. One offset series model 23 - \$5,430, plus the freight shipping cost of \$120. Incidental equipment, work tables, desks, shelving, \$3,000. Maintenance contracts for equipment, \$500. The total for that would be \$13,750."

Schlickman: "What would the affect of the Amendment. What did the





Amendment do to the Bill?"

Kennedy: "The Amendment, Gene, just a minute now, reduces the total appropriation from \$30,240 to \$25,120."

Schlickman: "That's where we stand now?"

Kennedy: "What did he say? Yes."

Schlickman: "Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Madison, Mr. Kennedy."

Kennedy: "Could I have leave to ask for the unanimous Roll Call?"

Speaker Blair: "Wait until I put the question. The question is, shall ah..... Senate Bill 22 pass? All those in favor, will vote 'aye', and the opposed 'no', and the Gentleman asks leave for the last unanimous Roll Call. Hearing no objections, the last unanimous Roll Call. 116 'ayes', no 'nays' and Senate Bill 22, having received the Constitutional three-fifths vote, is hereby declared passed. 23. Senate Bill 23."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 23. Kennedy. Giorgi, rather. An Act to make an appropriation to the Court of Claims Funds. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Giorgi is handling it for Mr. Rayson. Gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, would it be in order to ask that Senate Bill 23 and 24 be heard together and....."

Speaker Blair: "Is there objection?"

Giorgi: "And would it be in order to inform the House that I'd like to ask for unanimous Roll Call after we've discussed the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Well, you certainly have that opportunity, yes."

Giorgi: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, these....."

Clerk Selcke: "Wait a minute, let me read the Second Bill, Zeke. Senate Bill 24. An Act to make an appropriation in relation to the Crime Victims Compensation Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Go ahead."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, these are the two Bills, during the last Session of the General Assembly, we enacted the principal that we were going to compensate the innocent victims of crime. We also agreed during the last Session, they are now both Public



Acts, that the Court of Claims would be the vehicle used to adjudicate the amount of award to the compensated victim of crime. These two Bills provide the money to the Court of Claims for the original claims and it provides the money for the Attorney General and the Secretary of State's office to administer the claims and I urge the support of the entire House for these Bills."

Speaker Blair: "All right, is there discussion? All right, the question is, shall Senate Bills 23 and 24 pass? Ah..... all those in favor will vote 'aye' and the opposed 'no' and the Clerk will make two Roll Calls. Gentleman has leave for the least unanimous Roll Call. Is there objections? Hearing no objection, then Senate Bills 23 and 24, having received the Constitutional three-fifths votes, 116 'ayes', no 'nays', are each hereby declared passed. 25. Senate Bill 25."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 25. An Act to make an appropriation to the Board of Trustees, Southern Illinois University. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Gentleman from Sangamon, Mr. Jones."

Jones: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Senate Bill 25 provides for the expenses of moving the ISU Medical School Branch here in Springfield, the moving expenses into the new building. This appropriation was inadvertently vetoed out of the Bill and is now being appropriated, with approval of the Governor's office and both sides of the aisles. Came out of the Senate, 48 to 0, and I would appreciate the last unanimous Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "All right, any discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill 25 pass? All those in favor will vote 'aye'. The opposed 'no'. The Gentleman has asked leave to use the last unanimous Roll Call. Is there objection? Hearing none, then on this question, there are 116 'ayes', no 'nays' and Senate Bill 25, having received the Constitutional three-fifths vote, is hereby declared passed. Somebody handling Senate Bill 40 for Mr. Tuerk? Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."



Walsh: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I will attempt to handle Senate Bill 40 for Mr. Tuerk. This is the same as the....."

Clerk Selcke: "Let me read it. Senate Bill 40. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Walsh: "This is the same Bill which passed the House last week and was a result of an error made by the Legislative Reference Bureau, wherein they removed some language on the wrong Sections in a Bill that Representative Tuerk handled, and ah..... it caused school districts throughout the State considerable difficulty because it required that there be a referendum on ah..... light safety improvements that ah..... the State mandated and did not require a referendum, of course, at the time they mandated it. Consequently, school districts throughout the State have made plans and have spent a great deal of money in ah..... attempting to comply with the light safety code and find themselves now in a position where they can't complete the improvement, and so this Bill simply corrects the error that was made and will permit the schools to proceed with these light safety improvements."

Speaker Blair: "Is there discussion? All right, we're at Senate Bills, Third Reading, then. Senate Bill 40. The question is, shall Senate Bill 40 pass? All those in favor, will vote 'aye'. The opposed 'no'. Does the Gentleman have leave for the last unanimous Roll Call? Hearing no objection, then, Senate Bill 40, having received a Constitutional three-fifths votes of 116 'ayes', no 'nays', is hereby declared passed. Ah..... Senate Bills, First Reading. Senate Bill 41. Berman."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 41. Berman. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. First Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Let's hold up there a minute. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Berman."

Berman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would move that Senate Bill 41 be read a first time and be advanced to the Order of Second Reading, Second Legislative Day, without reference to Committee. This is a Bill which transfers to the Department of Public Aid from the Bureau of Employment Security in the Department of Labor



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the duty of reimbursing the Superintendent of Public Instruction for payments made to school districts under the School Code. This is in line with the Bill which we previously passed in the Third Special Session, Senate Bill 4. That was the money that was okayed and this is the authorization. It's been cleared with the Majority Leader, the Chairman of the Appropriations Committee and with our side of the aisle and I would ask for leave to advance it to Second Reading, Second Legislative Day."

Speaker Blair: "Any discussion? All right the Gentleman has asked to move, to suspend the provisions of the appropriate Rule so this Bill, having been read a First time, may be advanced to the Order of Second Reading. Is there..... All those in favor, will vote 'aye' and the opposed 'no'. Is there leave for the last unanimous Roll Call? Hearing no objection, 116 'ayes', no 'nays' and Senate Bill 2 is now on the Order of Second Reading. 41. Senate Bill 41 is now on the Order of Senate Bills, Second Reading. Oh, was that the purport of the Motion. Yes, Senate Bills, Second Reading, which is..... Yeow, there's just two Orders. One is Second Reading, First Legislative Day and the other Second Reading. O'kay? Okay, so it's on Second Reading. We're trying to quickly ascertain the schedule for the rest of the day, about the feelings on some of these Bills, whether or not they're going to be called. For example, on that First Special Session, is Mr. Hyde going to call 20? Mr. Hyde's not going to call 20. You're not calling your number 1 in the Second Special, Mr. Schlickman. All right, we're going to go to House Bills, Third Reading. If you'd listen to what I say now, you'll follow what we are proposing. The Joint Leadership has gone over a number of Bills that are on House Bills, Third Reading, which would appear to be Bills that there would not be objection to. Therefore, we could move them quickly on agreed Roll Call, but in order for me to go out of Order on those, we'll have to suspend the Rules, so the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh, moves that the appropriate Rule be suspended, so that the Chair may go out of Order on House Bills Third Reading and ask leave for the last unanimous

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Roll Call. Is there objection with regard to that? All right, hearing none, then, we.... the Motion prevails, 116 'ayes', no 'nays'. The first Bill then that appears with no objection will be Mr. Craig, #26. Mr. Craig. Your House Bill 26 on Third Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 26. You want me to read it, Mr. Speaker? House Bill 26. An Act to make an appropriation to the Board of Governors, State Colleges and Universities. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Craig."

Craig: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, this is a million, eight hundred thousand dollar for Eastern Illinois University that was left out of the budget in the last Regular Session. This money was left out in Conference Committee or inadvertently in Enrolling and Engrossing and I don't think there is any controversy over this measure and I'd appreciate unanimous support."

Speaker Blair: "Discussion? Gentleman from Christian, Mr. Tipsword."

Tipsword: "Representative Craig, these items, were these the same Bills that were amended into Senate Bill 20?"

Craig: "They were."

Tipsword: "And that Bill has now passed here?"

Craig: "That is right."

Tipsword: "Is this just going to be a duplicate of that Bill?"

Craig: "Well, I'm satisfied both of them won't be signed and they can take whichever one they want to have, but I mean, I don't want anymore slipups like there was in the last Regular Session."

Speaker Blair: "All right, is there further discussion? Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Did I understand the Sponsor of the Bill as saying that the Appropriation in House Bill 26, Third Special is contained in Senate Bill 20 of the Third Special?"

Craig: "Yes."

Schlickman: "I recalled, and the Appropriation in House Bill 26 is close to \$2 million."

Craig: "Yes, but mine was amended in House Bill, or Senate Bill 20 and



it's an Amendment, it's for a million eight hundred thousand plus for Eastern Illinois University. The Board of Governors."

Schlickman: "Well is Senate Bill 20 the one that was described as having appropriations of a hundred and forty two thousand?"

Craig: "That was another, that was part of Senate Bill 20 also."

Schlickman: "What are the personal services and contractual services? Could you describe those?"

Craig: "Well I think some of the personal services are personnel hired at the University and contractual work, this is money that they've already contracted. Because they thought this money was in the Bill, the last regular Session and if this money isn't appropriated they will probably have to shut down around March, sometime in March. Because this money is not new money being added or added for, this money is already been obligated by the university to the thinking that it was going to be given to them in the budget of the last regular Session."

Schlickman: "Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the Gentleman from Vermilion, Mr. Craig to close."

Craig: "I would appreciate your support on this and I'd like to ...is this the appropriate time to ask for a unanimous Roll Call on this House Bill 26. Last unanimous Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the Gentleman from Christian, Mr. Tipsword, raises objection. Mr. Tipsword raises objection. Okay, so the question is, shall House Bill 26 pass? All those in favor will vote 'aye' and the opposed 'no'. The Clerk will take an oral Roll Call. Mr. Washington, for what purpose do you rise?"

Washington: "In the interest of saving time, could we have the same Roll Call we had on Senate Bill 20?"

Speaker Blair: "Oh, well that was...that wasn't unanimous. That's right. They're identical Bills, or...isn't that right?"

Washington: "Practically speaking, yes."

Speaker Blair: "Yeah, I think that's a good suggestion. Is there any objection to using the same Roll Call that we had on Senate



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Bill 20, with respect to Senate Bill 26? All right. Leave has been granted. So...ah...Senate Bill 26 passes by 109 'ayes', 11 'nays'. Having received a constitutional three fifths vote, is hereby declared 'passed'. Mr. Bradley on 30. Mr. Bradley... Is somebody handling Mr. Bradley? Mr. Peters."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 30. An Act to make an appropriation to the Board of Regents. Third Reading of the Bill."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker, the same situation pertains true to Mr. Bradley's Bill as it did to Mr. Craig's and another Bill I have, which we all filed together in Senate Bill 20 and I'd ask Leave of the House for the same Roll Call as on Senate Bill 20."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman asked leave for the same Roll Call? As on Senate....On Senate Bill 20. All right...ah...the question then is, shall Senate Bill 30 pass? All those in favor vote 'aye' and the opposed 'no' and the Gentleman has asked leave to have the same Roll Call that we had on Senate Bill 20 to be the Roll Call on Senate Bill 30. Is there objection? Hearing none then 30...Senate Bill 30 is hereby declared passed, by a vote of 109 'ayes', 11 'nays' and this Bill, having received the Constitutional three fifths...House Bill 30, is hereby declared passed with a Constitutional three fifths vote. 31...Mr. Hanahan here? Somebody handling that Capitol Development...ah... Somebody handling that 31 for Mr. Hanahan? 32, Mr. Peters. Read 32."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 32. An Act to make an appropriation to the Board of Governor's, State Colleges and Universities. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Peters."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The same situation again pertains to...ah...House Bill 32. Ah...it is now part of Senate Bill 20 and I ask Leave of the House for the same vote as on Senate Bill 20."

Speaker Blair: "Any further discussion? All right. The question is, shall Senate Bill 32 pass? All those in favor will vote 'aye', the opposed 'no'. And the Gentleman asks leave for...what?"



The same Roll Call as on what? As was had on Senate Bill 20. Is there objection? Hearing none then Senate Bill 32...House Bill 32...ah...is hereby declared passed. 109 'aye', 11 'nays'. It is hereby declared passed with a Constitutional three-fifths vote. 36."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 36. An Act to amend an Act in relation to State Finance. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Beau....Yeah... The Gentleman from Kankakee, Mr. Beaupre."

Beaupre: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This Bill is a Bill to transfer Federal Revenue Sharing Funds, on a monthly basis to the Common School Fund. I believe that there is no controversy involved in it. There is presently, under the current law, a limitation of the amount that can be transferred on any monthly...for any monthly period of twenty-five million dollars....ah...and...ah...that limitation is removed by this Bill...ah...the transfer takes place...ah...by the...ah... Director of the Bureau of the Budget....ah... A report has to be made to the Comptroller and the State Treasurer with the approval of the Governor. I would ask leave for the same Roll Call on the previous Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Discussion? All right, the question is, shall Senate Bill 36 pass? All those in favor will vote 'aye', the opposed 'no'. And the Gentleman has asked leave for the...he has...for the last unanimous Roll Call. Is there leave? Hearing no objection Senate...House Bill 36 is hereby declared passed with a vote of, 116 'ayes', no 'nays'. It has received the Constitutional three-fifths vote. Now back to 20...ah...31. House Bill 31. Mr. Giorgi is handling for Mr. Hanahan."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 31. An Act to amend Section 1 of an Act providing for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Capitol Development Board. Third Reading of the Bill."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, I'm handling...I'm considered Hanahan's assistant in Labor matters and this has to do with the Capitol Development Bonding Authority...what manager? I'm





campaign manager for that district. But anyway. This Bill consolidates in the single schedule line items for operations and those for the administration of schools Construction Bond Act. What happened was under the Illinois Building Authority...ah...the people worked for the School Construction Bond Act and they worked at the Illinois Building Authority. Now they all work for the Capitol Development Bonding Authority and the Comptrollers Office keeps insisting that they tell who they're working for in as much as they work for both units, it's hard to determine where the money's coming from. So we're putting it all in one single appropriation item and all the money comes from one single item. I move for the adoption of the last unanimous Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "For what purpose does the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Epton arise?"

Epton: "Mr. Speaker, a Point of Order if you please. Ladies and Gentlemen, this House Bill that was considered, is this the Kosinski Bill? I noticed by that...ah...memo up there, we cut reading House Bill 31 of the Kosinski Bill. Mr. Giorgi, can you answer that for me?"

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, I'm only handling House Bill 31, in Third Special Session for my good friend Tom Hanahan, you know (Unintelligible) are not my work."

Epton: "Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Champaign, Mr. Clabaugh."

Clabaugh: "Yes, I'd like to ask a question, Mr. Speaker. Ah...the... has this Bill been approved by the Capitol Development Bond Board?"

Giorgi: "Sir, the Capitol Development Bonding Authority asked for it after this difficulty with the Comptroller's Office."

Clabaugh: "Okay, thank you."

Speaker Blair: "All right, is...the Gentleman from Henry, Mr. McGrew."



McGrew: "Ah...I suppose a Parliamentary Inquiry Mr. Speaker. Could I be recorded 'no' on the last unanimous Roll Call, if we use that?"

Speaker Blair: "All right."

McGrew: "No, on this Bill Fred."

Speaker: "Yes that...that can be arranged. All right. The question is, shall House Bill 31 pass? All those in favor will vote 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The Gentleman asks leave for the last unanimous Roll Call. Is there objection? No objection. Then... The...there....One vote is changed. It's 115 'aye', no... and...and....1 'nay' and House Bill 31, having received the Constitutional three-fifths vote is hereby declared passed. 42. Wait..."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 42. A Bill for an Act to make an appropriation for certain claims against the State of Illinois in conformity with an award made by the Court of Claims. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 42 appropriates four hundred and forty-eight thousand dollars to pay a claim..ah..that was allowed by the Court of Claims. It's by the Cook County Department of Public Aid and it covers Bills that the appropriation has lapsed and it cleans up about the last eight years of Bills prior to the consolidation in January 1, of 1974. If there are no objections, I'd like leave for the last unanimous Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "All right. The question is, shall House Bill 42... ah...pass. All those in favor will vote 'aye' and the opposed 'no' and the Gentleman's asked leave for the last unanimous Roll Call. Is there objection? Hearing none, House Bill 42 is hereby declared passed with a vote of 116 'aye', no 'nay'. It has received the Constitutional three-fifths vote. 43."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 43. A Bill for an Act to make an appropriation to the Court of Claims. Third Reading of the Bill."



Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Sangamon, Mr. Gibbs."

Gibbs: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 43 has amended the appropriation for the Court of Claims, Claims that were allowed by the Court of Claims in the amount of nine hundred and ten thousand, one hundred and sixty-five thousand a hundred and sixty-five dollars and ninty-nine cents. I ask for the last unanimous Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "All right, does the Gentleman...ah...The question is, shall House Bill 43 pass? All those in favor vote 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The Gentleman asks leave for the last uananimous Roll Call. Is there objection? Hearing none, House Bill 43, having received the Constitutional Majority of 116 'aye', no 'nays', is hereby declared passed. All right. All right, we can go to the Order of Concurrences. Third Special Session. House Bill 38. Senate Amendment #1. The concurrence. Mr. Tuerk, are you handling the Senate's Amendment #1? The concurrence on House Bill 38?"

Tuerk: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, the Senate did amend House Bill 38 and the Amendment just underlines some of the language they thought the language should be underlined to keep it...ah...statutorily sound and I would move that we concur in the Senate Amendment #1."

Speaker Blair: "Discussion? The...All right, the, is there discussion? Hearing none then the question is, shall the House concur in Senate Amendment #1 to House Bill 38? Is there...the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Brummet."

Brummet: "Could we just hold this for a second? We haven't had a chance to look at these concurrences? Just take it out of the record for a minute?"

Speaker Blair: "All right, we'll ease a second here. The Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Friedland."

Friedland: "Point of information Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Blair: "All right, yes, state your point."

Friedland: "Mr. Speaker, I have a Point of Information in regard



to yourself, Representative Duff and Representative Geo-Karis. I wish those two Members on the Floor would stand. Mr. Speaker, which one's wearing your jacket?"

Speaker Blair: "I'm glad you brought that to my attention? Mr. Duff, please at this end? Do you have it on?"

Duff: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I'd like you all to know that the Speaker's jacket and Representative Geo-Karis' jacket are Stuart Dress, and that's a little too high class for me."

Speaker Blair: "Just so the Members understand, there's been some question about House Bill 38 and Mr. Berman and Mr. Tuerk are consulting right at the moment, so just stand at ease for just a little bit and we'll try to have the matter resolved. All right, the Chair will recognize the Gentleman from Peoria, Mr. Tuerk, with respect to House Bill 38."

Tuerk: "Well Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. Ah...Mr. Berman and I have consulted along with his staff and we do find this to be in order and I'd move that we concur in Senate Amendment #1 to House Bill 38 in the Third Special Session."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the question is, shall the House concur in Senate...All right, hold that a minute. Ah...The Chair will recognize the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Berman."

Berman: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, just to answer the Sponsor's comments. This is a technical Amendment put in for the proper as prescribed by the Reference Bureau and it's ...ah... it's a good Amendment and I'd urge concurrence."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the question is, shall the House concur with Senate Amendment #1 to House Bill 38? All those in favor will vote 'aye' and those opposed 'nay'. Is there leave to use the last unanimous Roll? Hearing no objections, the last unanimous Roll will be used and that was 117 'aye' and no 'nays' and this Bill, and the House does concur in Senate Amendment #1 to House Bill 38, with the Constitutional Majority. So will the House stand at ease for just a short time? Mr. Tipsword would like to entertain us with a rendition of some kind."

Tipsword: "No, I just wanted to ask you a question, Mr. Speaker.

Ah...On this...this House Bill 38, on which there was a motion.

Was that a unanimous ballot cast on that?"

Speaker Blair: "Yes, it was 116 'ayes' and no...17 'ayes', 117 'ayes' and no 'nays'."

Tipsword: "Was that cast after we had gone to ease..."

Speaker Blair: "I didn't hear you sir?"

Tipsword: "Had the House gone at ease and then come back in and acted on that?"

Speaker Blair: "The House is at ease now."

Tipsword: "Well was it at ease before that too?"

Speaker Blair: "Yes...yes."

Tipsword: "The reason I was asking when the House went at ease I went to the telephone and apparently a unanimous ballot was cast during that time and I would like to be recorded 'no' on this particular motion."

Speaker Blair: "The Clerk can record you..."

Tipsword: "If we could do that.."

Speaker Blair: "The Clerk can record you 'no' on this at your request as long as it does not change the results."

Tipsword: "Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "Record Mr. Tipsword as 'no'. Mr. Hill."

Hill: "Well the Amendment was handed out after the Bill had passed and I'm on that Roll Call too. I wonder if it would be in order if I could raise the question with Representative Tuerk on that piece of Legislation?"

Speaker Blair: "Why don't you go back and talk to him Mr. Hill, as long as we're at ease here, at the moment. It's already declared passed and we can't change it. If you've got a question why, why don't you resolve it with Mr. Tuerk. Mr. Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker, prior to the recess the Speaker of the House asked if I would desire to have House Bill 1 in the Second Special called. I indicated at that time a neutral attitude. At this time I would like to advise the Chair that I



do desire that House Bill 1 of the Second Special be called today. You'll recall that that Bill did pass overwhelmingly previously in the Third and I would like to get it off the Second Special Calendar, hopefully with the same Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "Well your request will be noted Mr. Schlickman."

Schlickman: "That's all I request."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the...the Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. A few preliminary remarks before making a motion. The Joint Republican Leadership, House and Senate would like to get together and talk matters over, prior to a meeting that the Governor has called with the Joint Leadership House, Senate, Republicans and Democrats at 5:00. So, it is our intention to recess now until 7:00 at which time there will be a Republican conference and I understand a Democratic conference. Ah...If...ah...the Minority Leader would like to say something now."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Union, Mr. Choate."

Choate: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, as the Membership on this side of the aisle so well know, I had advised them that we would have a conference during this Session. However, in as much as the Governor has requested the Leadership to meet with him at 5:00, I would think it would be to the benefit of the Membership that we would hold our conference until after that meeting at the same time also so that they could appraised of all matters rather than just a few now and then having a second, having a second conference. So, I would subscribe to what the Majority Leader is suggesting."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh, has moved that the House stand in recess until the hour of 7:00 p.m. this evening. At which time we will be coming back here on the Floor and convening and...ah...the Leaders have indicated that both sides of the aisle will be having conferences commencing after we come back here on the Floor



at 7:00. Now, on that motion, all those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no', the 'ayes' have it and we stand in recess until the hour of 7:00 p.m."

Speaker Blair: "The House will be in Session. The Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, I move that the House stand in recess for a half hour for the purpose of a Republican conference in room M-3."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Union, Mr. Choate."

Choate: "What room can I have?"

Speaker Blair: "M-5."

Choate: "Then I would ask the Democrats to come to M-5 for the same purpose."

Speaker Blair: "All right, we'll be back on the Floor at 7:45."

Speaker Blair: "All right, on the Calendar on the Order, on page 6 on the Order of Motions, there 's been a request for one, and there's one agreed motion that we can go to with respect to Senate Bill 6, on which the Chair recognizes the Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Hoffman. No...Mr. Kosinski? Mr. Kosinski, yes."

Kosinski: "Mr. Chairman, I move to suspend the Rules of 31-b to re...movement of Senate Bill 6 to Second Reading without commitment to Committee. This is an agreed Bill of both sides of the aisle and I ask for the last unanimous Roll Call. This is the Capitol Development Contingency Fund."

Speaker Blair: "Is there further discussion? All right, does the Gentleman have leave to use the last unanimous Roll Call on his motion to take from the table and place on the Calendar on the Order of Second Reading? Hearing no objection then Senate Bill 6, the rule...Objection? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Lechowicz?"

Lechowicz: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, I just want to point out this is an Appropriation Bill calling for six hundred and thirty-three thousand dollars. I don't know if Bud Washburn has seen



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this Bill or not. He's had an opportunity to view it. But it's always been the policy of the Appropriations Committee, I don't care what Bill it is or what Session that we at least have an opportunity to review it. Now if he doesn't have any objections to it, he's had an opportunity to review it, it's fine with me."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Mr. Speaker, this Bill had been amended in the Senate, it's come down. It is now in the the amount of three hundred and twenty-seven, or something, thousand dollars. I've talked with the Appropriations staff on the other side of the aisle, I've already entered an Amendment in the amount of seventy-five thousand dollars to decrease the funds of the lawyers, because the Capitol Development Board has a contingency fund that should be able to cover that. The Republican Appropriations staff has agreed and I think we can proceed with moving the Bill sir."

Speaker Blair: "All right, is there object...no wait a minute, they're discussing it. All right, apparently that matter's being cleared up. So hearing no objections then the Gentleman's motion to take, suspend the Rules so Senate Bill 6 may be taken from the Calendar and placed on the Order of Second Reading, prevails on the basis of the last agreed Roll Call. Introductions."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 49. Shea. Amends the Revenue Act of 1979. First Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Shea. Finally getting right, or on the right side of the aisle. Yeah."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 49, which was just introduced is at the request of the Clerk of Cook County...ah...in the last Session of the Legislature we passed Senate Bill 138 which provided for speedier Catch collection, but because of the language of that Bill there are four or five school districts that won't get their money. I've discussed this with the Leadership on both sides and I'd at this time ask for First Reading, ask to



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move this to Second Reading without reference to a Committee."

Speaker Blair: "All right, is there objections? Hearing none, then the Bill, the appropriate Rule will be suspended and House Bill 49, having been..."

Shea: "I need leave for the last unanimous Roll Call is what you..."

Speaker Blair: "Yeah. The Gentleman's motion is to suspend the Rules so that House Bill 49, having been read a First time, may be advanced to the Order of Second Reading without reference. That Bill's been cleared with the Leadership on both sides. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Duff."

Duff: "Well Mr. 'Question', I am curious about it nevertheless. I'd like to ask what school districts are affected and how."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Shea."

Shea: "I am informed by the Clerk that the language of the Bill is such that they can not pay out the estimated first installment, this is your Senator's Bill, Senator Glass' Bill, in at least four townships in Cook County. In Lion's Township there's some sixteen million dollars involved in the first installment. In Oak Park Township, 1.9, in Riverside, 5.3 and I think it's Ryden Township that there's six or seven million dollars involved."

Duff: "Well I would not object, but I hope we get a full hearing on this relative, because there's some misunderstanding on it."

Shea: "I will have the Clerk from Cook County write each Member because it's at his request and I think that if he wrote each Member and explained what happended and what's involved it would perhaps be better. Listen, he writes in Polish, so you're picking on him?"

Speaker Blair: "Is there. Is the objection removed? All right, then leave has been granted to suspend the Rules and House Bill 49 then will be advanced to the Order of Second Reading. On the basis of the last unanimous Roll Call. For what purpose does the Gentleman from Kankakee, Mr. Beaupre rise?"



Beaupre: "Mr. Speaker, I've had a motion on the Speakers desk for at least five days now in regard to House Bill 49 and it...45, I'm sorry and at this time I would like to move that Rule 31-b be suspended...ah..."

Speaker Blair: "Well let me say this. I haven't gone to...ah...I'm really off that order of business. In the first place I'm on Introductions and First Reading. If you think that that's."

Beaupre: "The last thing that we had was a motion over here."

Speaker Blair: "It was a motion on a House Bill that has just been introduced by Mr. Shea. House Bill 49. I was on the Order of Business of Introductions and First Reading. Now. If you have a Bill that's on those motions that you would like to address, I suggest that it might be appropriate for you to discuss it with the Majority Leader because we're working with an agreed Roll Call and it just might be advisable for you to do that."

Beaupre: "Okay."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Well I object to the Gentleman's motion that this will really bring us into a great controversy, I think, if we move this. Jack how about holding that until next April or May."

Beaupre: "Mr...Mr. Speaker, I'm willing to withdraw the motion, but I would like to point out that there are some of us downstaters who have been down here for five weeks now, working for an R.T.A. for the Metropolitan area of the City of Chicago and we've been very patient and we've gone along with the program and we've done everything possible to see that an R.T.A. comes out in one form or another and all we're asking is to implement a program that...ah...the appropriation would pass back in June and in concept has been passed by this House twice and I'm willing to withdraw the motion but I would like to have an opportunity to make it sometime so that at least this matter would be considered."

Speaker Blair: "Well we certainly are going to give you that opportunity. All we're suggesting to you is that tonight might



not be the best shot for you to try it."

Beaupre: "I'll buy that."

Speaker Blair: "Okay. All right. Have we got an adjournment Resolution on this Session?"

Clerk Selcke: "House Joint Resolution #3. Third Special Session. W.D. Walsh. Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Seventy-eighth General Assembly of the State of Illinois, the Senate concurring herein, that when the House of Representatives adjourns on Sunday, November 18, 1973, they stand adjourned until Tuesday, November 27, 1973 at 12:45 O'Clock P.M. When the Senate adjourns on Sunday, November 18, 1973, they stand adjourned until Tuesday, November 27 and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Blair: "Wait a minute...wait a minute. The Lady from Cook, Mrs. Martin. For what purpose do you rise?"

Martin: "Point of Personal Privilege Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Blair: "All right, state your point."

Martin: "A few weeks ago on October 23, I was to have left for Russia for seven days. I was selected by the United Nations to go to Russia as a Representative. I was asked to stay here because we were coming out with an R.T.A. Bill. The trip was only going to be for seven days. An opportunity of a lifetime passed me by, because I'm sure I'll never get the opportunity to go again. And to think that it is now long past November the 3 and that chance of a lifetime has passed me by, for an R.T.A. that we still do not have. I'm hoping that...ah...maybe you and the Minority Leader will get together and send me on an all expense paid trip to Russia to be back in time for the next R.T.A. Session."

Speaker Blair: "All right, it's obvious that Mr. Choate is going to pick up the entire tab and not have me share it. I understand the reason for that Clyde. The Gentleman from Union, Mr. Choate."

Choate: "Mr....The main reason I stood up is because, after all you're a member of the Majority Party so you've got to pick up the



biggest part of that tab. I'll get the Minority part."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, I move that the Third Special Session stand adjourned until the hour of 12:00 noon on Tuesday, November 27..."

Speaker Blair: "12:45, we're going to...we're going to back up to the General...Mr. Walsh."

Walsh: "12:45, okay."

Speaker Blair: "Okay, we're coming back, we're coming back in at noon, so just that we're trying to get them back in order so we're going to adjourn the Third to 12:45. All those in favor of the Gentleman's motion say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Third Special Session is adjourned."

Speaker Blair: "All right. Now we're in the Second Special Session. Is there leave to have the Roll Call for the Third Special Session be the Roll Call for the Second Special Session? Hearing no objection leave is being granted and that will be done. No requests to leave...to read House Bills Third or Senate Bills Second. Is there any Introductions? Hearing none, the Gentleman from... Listen you don't have to come out, you not only have to watch your gavels, you have to watch your microphones. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Jim Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker, speaking from the Majority Leader's microphone and understanding Art Telcsers plea for a referendum on the Leadership. I wonder if the appropriate, if we could put a motion in while we're still in Session to affirm the Leadership we've had in this past Session or do whatever's the opposite of that and whether that would be appropriate of how we would do something of that sort. While you're talking with Bill Walsh, we might discuss that among the Membership or have you decided that?"

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Duff. We'd better adjourn quick. Mr. Duff."

Duff: "Well Mr. Speaker, the rules call for House Member to speak from his seat."



Speaker Blair: "Your point is very well taken. All right. Now, we're on the adjournment...yeah. Read the adjournment for the Second Special."

Clerk Selcke: "Ah...House Joint Resolution #4. W. D. Walsh. Second Special Session. Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Seventy-eighth General Assembly of the State of Illinois, the Senate concurring herein, that when the House of Representatives adjourns on Sunday, November 18, 1973, they stand adjourned until Tuesday November 27, 1973, at 12:30 O'Clock P.M. and when the Senate adjourns on Sunday, November 18, 1973 and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, I don't recall that the Clerk read an adjournment Resolution for the Third Special Session. Did you Fred? Okay. I move the adoption of the Adjournment Resolution for the Second Special Session."

Speaker Blair: "Discussion? All those in favor say 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The Second Special Session..."

Walsh: "Now, Mr. Speaker, pursuant to the Adjournment Resolution, I move that the Second Special Session now adjourn."

Speaker Blair: "Oh...Okay, all those in favor of the adjournment of the Second Special Session say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The Second Special Session is adjourned pursuant to the Adjournment Resolution. Fred I...All right. Now we're in the...ah... we're in the Regular Session...ah...is there leave to use the agreed Roll Call, I mean the Attendance Roll Call for the Third Special as the Roll Call for the General election? Hearing no objection it will be used. Now are there Introductions? Messages?"

Clerk Selcke: "A Message from the Senate by Mr. Fernandes. Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives, the Senate has adopted the following preamble and Joint Resolution adoption of which I am instructed to ask concurrence of the House. Senate Joint Resolution 53. Adopted by the Senate, November 16, 1973. Edward E. Fernandes, Secretary. Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives, the Senate has concurred



with the House in the adoption of the following Joint Resolution, to wit: House Joint Resolution 83, concurred in by the Senate, November 16, 1973. Edward E. Fernandes, Secretary."

Speaker Blair: "Introductions and First Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2101. Kosinski et al. Creates the Act requiring Firearms training. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 2102. Jaffe et al. Amends the Public Community College Act. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 2103. Rigney et al. Illinois Brand Act. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 2104. Matijevich et al. Amends an Act providing for tax for Historical Museums. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 2105. Gibbs et al. Vacates Highway Easement. First Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Ah...Wait a minute. For what purpose does the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Maragos arise?"

Maragos: "Mr. Speaker, I want the record and the tapes to be properly showing that we did have an Attendance Roll Call of the Regular Session because I don't think we passed to have leave of the Roll Call of the Third Special Session to be adopted by the Regular Session. I don't think it was so ruled. You said General Election, Mr. Speaker, that's why I want the tapes."

Speaker Blair: "Yeah, well let the tapes show that what I asked for was leave to have the Attendance Roll Call for the Third Special Session be the Roll Call for the Regular Session and there was no objection, leave was granted. While we're on the order of correcting the tapes for putting the information on the tapes, I am advised by the party that runs the tapes that we did not actually move to adjourn the Third, pursuant to the Adjournment Resolution. So, in order to make sure that we got that...No, she just called and said we didn't, so Mr. Walsh moves that we adjourn the Third Special Session."

Walsh: "Well maybe having voted on the prevailing side, I move reconsider the vote by which the Third Special Session was adjourned."



Speaker Blair: "Now what we did was we adopted the Adjournment Resolution and then we just simply failed to move pursuant to the Adjournment Resolution."

Walsh: "I then move, Mr. Speaker, that the Third Special Session adjourn to the hour of 12:45, November 27."

Speaker Blair: "All right, that is pursuant to the Adjournment Resolution. All those in favor say 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Third Special Session was adjourned according to the Adjournment Resolution. Now, you're reading Bills. Okay."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2106. Randolph. Appropriates thirty-four thousand dollars to the American Appraisal Company. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 2107. Molloy et al. General Revision of Credit Union Act. First Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Agreed Resolutions."

Clerk Selcke: "House Resolution 644. Rayson et al. House Resolution 645. Hudson et al. House Resolution 647. Schraeder et al. House Resolution 649. Dave Jones et al. House Resolution 650. Dave Jones et al. House Resolution 651. North et al. House Resolution 652. Palmer et al. House Resolution 653. Rayson. House Resolution 654. Rayson. House Resolution 655. Waddell. House Resolution 657. Geo-Karis et al. House Resolution 658. Schoberlein et al. House Resolution 659. Juckett et al. House Resolution 662. R. L. Dunne et al. House Resolution 663. Kempiners et al."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Juckett: "Mr. Speaker, would it be possible for the Clerk to read...ah...House Resolution 659. It's about one of our colleagues?"

Speaker Blair: "Sure. Proceed to read it."

Clerk Selcke: "House Resolution 659. Juckett et al. Whereas this body has learned that one of our distinguished Members, Richard A. Carter is seriously ill and whereas, Representative Carter is serving his second term in this body and whereas we have missed



his presence amongst us during the several weeks since the convening of this Session on October 15 and whereas his illness is related directly to his urgent need for a donation of a kidney and whereas Representative Carter is a dear and true friend of many Members of this Body. Now therefore, be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the Seventy-eighth General Assembly of the State of Illinois, that we do wish our Member, Representative Dick Carter a speedy and full recovery and an early return to our company and be it further resolved that we do earnestly solicit the attention of the public to his need for a Committee, for a kett.... for a kidney to be donated and be it further resolved that a copy of this preamble and Resolution be distributed to the news media of Illinois."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Juckett."

Juckett: "Mr. Speaker, we all know Dick and we all know what a great job he's done and I think most of us are aware that during the first Session of this General Assembly he attended - practically every day that we were here in spite of the fact that he was undergoing dialysis which lasted anywhere from six to eight hours a day and he had to do this three times a week and so I would invite all of my colleagues...ah...or ask leave of the House that all of the Members of the House be put on the Resolution and that we ask the press to give it wide dissemination and maybe we can get a cure for Dick. Presently he's at home and he's just spent, I think, about the last five or six weeks in St. Josephs Hospital and...ah... he's lost a considerable amount of weight and we've got to get a kidney for him."

Speaker Blair: "Okay, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh then on the...read the Resolutions?"

Walsh: "Now Mr. Speaker, House Resolution 644 commends Terry Ellen Cecil on being named one of the outstanding young men of America. House Resolution 645 congratulates the Village of



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Hinsdale upon the occasion of it's centennial. House Resolution 647 commends both Steven T. Ringle of Peoria and Michael Ticka of Downers Grove on being selected as the two Representatives from the State of Illinois to tour with the All American Band and Mr. Speaker, House Resolution 648 has not been read but is now agreed. Would you read it Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk Selcke: "House Resolution 648. Robert Holloway."

Walsh: "House Resolution 648 congratulates Dick Gregory on the occasion of having December 2, 1973, declared Dick Gregory Day in Chicago, by Chicago Community Leaders. Speaker Blair: "All right, the Agreed Resolutions. All those in favor of the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Agreed Resolutions are adopted. Are there further Resolutions?"

Clerk Selcke: "Death Resolution. House Resolution 656. Capuzi In respect of the memory of Mr. Anthony Navotny."

Speaker Blair: "All right. All those in favor of the adoption of the Death Resolution say 'aye', opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the Resolutions adopted. Now are there further Amendments? Okay."

Clerk Selcke: "House Resolution 646. LaFleur et al. House Resolution 660. Washington et al. House Resolution 661. Ralph Dunn et al."

Speaker Blair: "Speaker's Table? No, Mr. Palmer has a motion."

Palmer: "Yes, I do Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Blair: "Okay."



Palmer: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. On the Speaker's Table is Joint Resolution 82 and in respect to who I'd like to waive the provisions of Rule 31-b, for the purposes of immediate consideration of the adoption of the Resolution. It has been agreed on both sides.

House Joint Resolution 82, it has been agreed to."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Palmer, renews his motion?"

Palmer: "I renew my motion. House Joint Resolution 82."

Speaker Blair: "No, it was on the Speaker's Table and the Clerk didn't have the Speaker's Table here with him. So, we're trying to get a copy of it."

Clerk Selcke: "Joe Ciacco, report to the Clerk's Office, immediately."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Palmer asks leave to have his motion withdrawn because unfortunately we weren't aware...How long is it thought Fred? All right, is there any other...while we're waiting for it, it's on it's way over. Is there any other business, what are we in, the regular Session? All right, is there any other business in the regular Session? Okay, get it."

Clerk Selcke: "Whereas...wait a minute. House Joint Resolution 82. Okay, now go ahead. Whereas the Division of Water Resource Management, has developed plans and has partially completed construction on the relocation of Stoney Creek in the vicinity of Crawford Avenue and 123rd. Street, in the County of Cook. And, whereas, the proposed relocation of Stoney Creek, does require a new culvert to be constructed to carry Stoney Creek, to flow under and across the intersection of Crawford Avenue at 123rd. Street, and whereas, the Department of Highways, of the County of Cook, proposes to widen and improve Crawford Avenue in the vicinity of the required culvert location and whereas, the culvert at Crawford Avenue is urgently needed for a public safety and funds have not been appropriated by the General Assembly to permit



construction of such culvert and whereas, the Department of Highways in the County of Cook..."

Speaker Blair: "Wait a minute, we've got a Point of Order. What's the Point? Pulaski?"

Clerk Selcke: "Proposes to design what? Construct the Stoney Creek culvert as a part of the contract, reconstruct Crawford Avenue between 123rd Street and 95th Street in the County of Cook, provided the State of Illinois will substantially reimburse the Cook County Highway Fund. All right, go ahead. For the cost of construction. Therefore, be it resolved, by the House of Representatives of the Seventy-eighth General Assembly, the Senate concurring herein, that it is the sense of this Body, that the Department of Highways of the County of Cook, should be authorized to move forward with the construction of the Stoney Creek Culvert at Crawford Avenue during the course of making improvements to Crawford Avenue between 123rd and 95th Street in Cook County, as the most efficient method of providing the much needed improvements from both the highway and flood control standpoint. And be it further resolved that this General Assembly does sanction and support the cooperative effort of the Department of Highways, in the County of Cook, and will favorably consider an appropriation to substantially reimburse the investment of the County of Cook in the much needed, in the much needed highway and waterway improvements to degree compatible with the responsibility of the now authorized Stoney Creek, Flood Control Program. And be it further resolved that a suitable copy of this Resolution be forwarded to the Department of Highways in Cook County."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook...or...Kankakee, Mr. Beaupre."

Beaupre: "Mr. Speaker, would the Chair interpret what a filibuster is and Rule on that. Is the Clerk allowed to conduct a filibuster on this..."



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Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Christian, Mr. Tipsword."

Tipsword: "Mr. Speaker, just a comment. I regret very much that Representative Ewell is indisposed today, we're hearing a creek in Culverts Bill. He had quite a long dissertation on it last night. I hope this is all recorded and will be transcribed for him."

Speaker Blair: "All right, Mr. Palmer's asked that the appropriate Rules be suspended... He withdrew the request. No, but the House didn't grant leave, he asked for leave and they didn't grant it."

Palmer: "I did ask for leave and it was not granted."

Speaker Blair: "It was not granted. Now...Mr. Houlihan. Mr. Jim Houlihan."

Houlihan: "I'd like to ask Representative Palmer if he'd be willing to put a hatchet Act on this Resolution?"

Palmer: "Well let me just say this, that it has to do with the Cook County Highway Department and I, those fellas are pretty....They may be in my district."

Speaker Blair: "All right, now the Gentleman has asked to suspend the appropriate Rule so that this H.J.R. 82, has been on the Speaker's Table, may be...ah...read and immediately considered for adoption and...ah...last agreed Roll Call on that. 116 to nothing and the Resolution has in fact been read now, so all those in favor of the adoption of the Resolution say 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Resolution is adopted. That was Crosstown and that was Mayor Daley on the phone to the press. All right, the adjournment Resolution. Messages?"

Clerk Selcke: "Message from the Senate by Mr. Fernandes, Secretary. Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives that the Senate has adopted the following Senate Joint Resolution, the adoption of which I am instructed to ask concurrence of the House of Representatives to wit: Senate Joint Resolution #54. concurring herein, that when the two houses adjourn on Sunday, November 18, 1973, they stand adjourned until Tuesday, November 27, 1973 at 12:00 noon."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "I move the adoption of the Adjournment Resolution."

Speaker Blair: "All right. All those in favor of the Adjournment Resolution say 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the...ah..."

Walsh: "And now I move that the regular Session stand adjourned until the hour of 12:00 noon on November 27, pursuant to the Adjournment Resolution."

Speaker Blair: "All right, all those in favor of the Gentleman's motion say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Resolution is adopted. Now where are we? First Special Session is now in order and...ah...may we have leave to use the, for Attendance Roll Call, the Attendance Roll Call from the Third Special Session? Hearing no objection leave has been granted and will the, now the Messages."

Clerk Selcke: "Message from the Senate by Mr. Fernandes. Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives, the Senate has passed a Bill of the following title, on passage of which I am instructed to ask concurrence of the House. Senate Bill #8. Senate Bill #12. Passed the Senate, First Special Session, November 16, 1973. Edward E. Fernandes, Secretary. Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives, the Senate has passed a Bill of the following title, passage of which I am instructed to ask concurrence of the House. Senate Bill #10. Passed the Senate, First Special Session, November 16, 1973. Edward E. Fernandes, Secretary. Clerk Selcke: "All right, Message from the Senate by Mr. Fernandes, Secretary. Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives, the Senate has adopted the following Senate Joint Resolution, the adoption of which I am instructed to ask concurrence of the House, to wit: Senate Joint Resolution #2. Resolved by the Senate of the Seventy-eighth General Assembly of the State of Illinois, the First Special Session thereof, the House of Representatives concurring herein. That when the two Houses adjourn on Sunday, November 18, 1973 they stand adjourned until Tuesday, November 27, 1973 at 2:15 O'Clock...at 12:15 O'Clock P.M. Adopted by the Senate, November 18, 1973. Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "I move the adoption of the Adjournment Resolution."

Speaker Blair: "Okay, all those in favor of the adoption of the Adjournment Resolution say 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Adjournment Resolution is adopted. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "I move that we adjourn, pursuant to the Adjournment Resolution."

Speaker Blair: "All those in favor of the the Gentleman's motion say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the First Special Session stands adjourned. Now, the Fourth. Okay. The Fourth Special Session is now in order. We have leave to use the Attendance Roll Call from the Third Special as the Attendance Roll Call for the Fourth? No objection, leave is granted. Now, Messages."

Clerk Selcke: "Message from the Senate by Mr. Fernandes, Secretary. Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives the Senate has passed a Bill of the following title, passage of which I am instructed to ask concurrence of the House. Senate Bill #1. Passed by the Senate in the Fourth Special Session November 15, 1973, by a three-fifths vote. Edward E. Fernandes Secretary. A Message from the Senate by Mr. Fernandes, Secretary."



Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives, the Senate has adopted the following Senate Joint Resolution, the adoption of which I am instructed to ask concurrence of the House. Senate Joint Resolution #1. Resolved by the Senate of the Seventy-eighth General Assembly of the State of Illinois, the Fourth Special Session thereof, the House of Representatives concurring herein, that when the two Houses adjourn on Sunday, November 18, 1973, they stand adjourned until Tuesday, November 27, 1973 at 1:00 P.M. Adopted by the Senate, November 18, 1973. Edward E. Fernandes, Secretary."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh moves the adoption of the Adjournment Resolution. All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Adjournment Resolution is adopted. Now, Now we're on House Bills, Third Reading. All we did was adopt the Adjournment Resolution, we didn't adjourn. I do. All right. Introductions and First Readings. Okay. Messages? Mr. Walters here? Mr. Walters? Does he want to move that House Bill 2? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Yes, I think so Mr. Speaker, if there's not an Amendment up there, I think..."

Speaker Blair: "It's on Third Reading."

Walsh: "Oh...Well then no."

Speaker Blair: "It's on page 6."

Walsh: "Is Representative Gene Hoffman here?"

Speaker Blair: "No."

Walsh: "We'd better wait then."

Speaker Blair: "All right, Senate Bills, First Reading. Senate Bill 1. Was that picked up Fred? Okay."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bills, First Reading. A Bill for an Act to amend the Election Code. First Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Is that the Consolidation Bill from the Senate? Yeah. Mr. Giorgi."





Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to move Senate Bill to Second Reading without reference to Committee."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the Gentleman's asked leave to suspend the appropriate rule so that Senate Bill 1 may be, having been read a First time may be advanced to the Order of Second Reading without reference to Committee. Is there leave to use the last unanimous Roll Call? Leave's been granted and the vote will be 116 'aye', 0 'nay'. Senate Bills, Second Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 3. A Bill for an Act in relation to State Finance. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Any further from the Floor? Third Reading. What about #6, now did you know that one?"

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill #6. An Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Blair: "Any Amendments from the Floor? Third Reading. Now, on the Speaker's Table appears a motion with respect to House Bill 1. On which the Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Giorgi, who asks that the House Rules be suspended so that House Bill 1, having been read a first time may be taken from the Table and placed on the Calendar on the Order of Second Reading. Is there leave to use the last unanimous Roll Call? Hearing no objection then House Bill 1 will be taken from the table and place on the Order of Second Reading. All right, now, no other business before the Fourth...Mr. Walsh moves that we adjourn pursuant to the Adjournment Resolutions? All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and we're adjourned. Now, for what purpose does the Gentleman from Cook Mr...."

Katz: "Mr. Speaker, having voted on the prevailing side, on the adjournment Resolution for the First Special Session, I would ask that the vote by which that adjournment took place be reconsidered. Because there was one Senate Bill that was not read a First time. A Message from the Senate."



Speaker Blair: "Well, do you want to move then Mr..."

Katz: "Yeah, I will move that...ah...that motion be allowed."

That leave, that the vote be reconsidered by which the First Special Session was adjourned."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman has moved that the vote by which we adjourned the First Special Session...ah...be reconsidered. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Juckett."

Juckett: "Mr. Speaker, a Point of Parliamentary Inquiry. How would we have the basis to do that when we're in another Session? And after we've already adjourned?"

Speaker Blair: "Well, I'm not exactly sure myself. No, I mean right now we've adjourned the Fourth Special and between the Fourth Special and the Fifth Special so we're really technically not in Session now in any of the Sessions. Ah...But Mr. Katz, had indicated earlier that he did want to be recognized on Messages on the First Special but the Messages went through and Mr. Katz didn't catch them and, I mean he wasn't aware or something at the time wasn't general he said, so I said well I'm not exactly sure myself if he can move to reconsider the vote, that we've had other intravening business but if it's not...there might be some technical problem with that. The Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Hill."

Hill: "Mr. Speaker, it looks as though we don't have 89 votes there. I don't think we should get involved in anything technical I think we should go on our merry old way and line this thing up until a week from this coming Tuesday, and I object."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Katz."

Katz: "Yeow, Mr. Speaker, we do not have 89 votes. We have no choice....."

Speaker Blair: "Well, I think....."

Katz: "If we can't get unanimous, yes."

Speaker Blair: "When we come back, it's a Senate Bill?"

Katz: "It is a Senate Bill that passed the Senate and I wanted it read. I was sitting there and I have been asking every day that



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it be read, as the Speaker knows, and as the Minority Leader knows and that is what I asked today that it be read, the message from the Senate. The request was properly made to the Speaker and it was not read. The message wasn't read and that's what....."

Speaker Blair: "No, No, that's not correct. The message was read."

Katz: "What?"

Speaker Blair: "The message was read. I thought what you wanted, ah.... when the message was read, what you wanted to do was to be recognized to get the votes, to suspend the Rules so it could be read a First time."

Katz: "Yes, I did, but....."

Speaker Blair: "But we need to have a Supplemental Calendar printed and have it shown and then, you know, it could be read, then you could move to advance and we'll..... Your question was the message being read, the message has been read, so it will be on the Calendar, First Reading, next Tuesday, the 27th and at that time you can move to have it read a first time and advance it to the order of Second without reference, if you desire to do that."

Katz: "All right, thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Blair: "Your welcome. Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Hill."

Hill: "Mr. Speaker, I'd just like to inquire with that maneuver that took place, were any of the Rules bypassed?"

Speaker Blair: "No, we didn't do anything."

Hill: "Will something like that go to Committee?"

Speaker Blair: "No, no, we really didn't do anything."

Hill: "Then that's okay."

Speaker Blair: "Since the time we adjourned the Fourth Special, we haven't done anything. All right, the Fifth Special Session is now in Order and we have leave to use the last, the attendance Roll Call for the Fifth. Being no objection, it will be. Are there messages?"

Clerk Selcke: "Message from the Senate. Mr. Fernandes, Secretary. Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives the Senate has adopted the following Senate Joint Resolution, the adoption which I am instructed to ask the concurrence of the



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House of Representatives, to wit: Senate Joint Resolution #2, resolved by the Senate of the 78th General Assembly of the State of Illinois, Fifth Special Session thereof, that the House of Representatives, concurring herein, when the two Houses adjourn on Sunday, November 18, 1973, they stand adjourned until Tuesday, November 27, 1973 at 1:15 O'Clock P.M. Adopted by the Senate November 18, 1973, Edward E. Fernandes, Secretary."

Speaker Blair: "Introductions? No. We have House Bills, Third Reading. Mr. Barnes. Mr. Shea's handling. All right. Wait a minute, read House Bill 3. Wait a minute. Mr. William Walsh, for what purpose do you arise?"

Walsh: "That was the adjournment Resolution that you just read, right? I move the adoption of the Adjournment Resolution."

Speaker Blair: "All right, all those in favor of the adoption of the Adjournment Resolution, say 'aye'. Opposed 'no'. The Adjournment Resolution is adopted. Now, we're on House Bills, Third Reading. House Bill 3."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 3. Bill for an Act to Amend the School Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is the same as Senate Bill 1 as appears a little bit further down the Calendar. This Bill reduces from 5 to 3 years the residency requirement for Members of the Chicago Board of Education and removes the age requirement of age 30. I know of no objection to the Bill and I would ask for a favorable Roll Call vote."

Speaker Blair: "Questions on this?"

Shea: "No questions on this, Mr. Speaker, I would ask leave for the last unanimous Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the question is, shall House Bill 3 pass? All those in favor, vote 'aye'. The opposed 'no' and the Gentleman has asked leave for the last unanimous Roll Call. Hearing no objection, the Roll with respect to House Bill 3 will be 116 'ayes', 7 'nays' and House Bill 3, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill

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6. Is somebody handling that? Mr. Brinkmeier?"

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 6."

Speaker Blair: "No, wait a minute. Nobody's handling it. All right, Senate Bill, Third Reading. Read Senate Bill 1."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill #1. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is the same as House Bill 3 that just passed this Chamber. Therefore, I would ask for a favorable vote by the Members and ask to use the last unanimous Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "Is there discussion? All right, the question is, shall Senate Bill 1 pass. All those in favor, vote 'aye'. The opposed 'no'. The Gentleman has asked leave for the last unanimous Roll Call. Is there leave? All right, the vote then will be 116 'ayes', no 'nays' and Senate Bill 1 having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. Senate Bill 2. Is Mr. J. J. Wolf here? Anybody handling that for Mr. Wolf? All right, Senate Bill 3 is being handled by Mrs. Dyer and Mr. Selcke....."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 3. A Bill for an Act to amend the Election Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "The Lady from DuPage, Mrs. Dyer."

Dyer: "Mr. Speaker, I wonder if Senate Bills 3 and 4 could be handled together, as they are the same subject matter."

Speaker Blair: "All right, is there objection? Hearing none, read 4."

Speaker Selcke: "Senate Bill 4. A Bill for an Act to amend the Election Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Dyer: "Thank you, very much, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I'm handling this Bill for Mr. Redmond. This was unanimously adopted in the House. It went over to the Senate. These are the Senate Bills. They simply pertain to a Board of Election Commissioners for DuPage County and permit DuPage County Board to levy the taxes to conduct the elections and conduct the permanent registration. If there are no questions, I would certainly ask leave for the last unanimous Roll Call."



Speaker Blair: "Mr. Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, Senate Bill 4 involves a tax levy and for that reason, I will object to the last unanimous Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "Mrs. Dyer."

Dyer: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to point out that I have cleared this with the Leadership on both sides of the aisle. Everyone does understand, that this Body passed out the identical Bill and sent it over to the Senate. This is just double insurance that it does get passed. I would again ask leave for the last unanimous Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "No, there's still objection. We'll ah.... We'll just, leave not being granted. Take them out of the Record."

Dyer: "Mr. Speaker, I'd just like to take Senate Bill 4 out of the Record and we'll deal with Senate Bill 3. Is there any objection to Senate Bill 3?"

Speaker Blair: "I don't know. Any objection to 3? All right, move...."

Dyer: "I would like to ask leave, then, for the last unanimous Roll Call on Senate Bill 3."

Speaker Blair: "All right, question is, shall Senate Bill 3 pass? All those in favor, vote 'aye'. The opposed 'no'. Is there leave for the last unanimous Roll Call? Okay, 116 'ayes', no 'nays' and this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. Now is there any further business in 5? All right, then, if not, then, Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh, moves that the House stand adjourned pursuant to the adjournment Resolution. All those in favor, say 'aye'. Opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, and the House stands adjourned. Now until Tuesday, November 27th, at the hour of 12:00..... No, I mean..... I understand that, but I'm just saying that that's the last of the Sessions and so we'll be back then at 12:00. Just make this a general announcement, right? That we'll be back in Session, in the House at 12:00 Noon on November 27th. Drive safely and have a good Thanksgiving. To you all, too."

Speaker Blair: "Report of Standing Committees. Reports of Special Committees, Joint Committees and Commissions. Introduction and First Reading of House Bills. Agreed Resolutions other than Death Resolutions. Consideration of Measures and Committee of the Whole House. All right, we're at that Point where there's not only 107, but there's not 89, so I think it would be futile to go to the next Order of business, which is House Bills, Second Reading and it would be my suggestion that we ah..... just stand at ease until we can get into ah..... a posture of having the votes here, one way or the other. For what purpose does the Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Hill, seek recognition?"

Hill: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to ask how many answered to Roll Call?"

Speaker Blair: "The Clerk will respond."

Clerk Selcke: "107, now."

Hill: "Mr. Speaker....."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Hill."

Hill: "This Session was called for One O'Clock. We're now at ease, and I'm not opposed to that, even though it certainly put my family out, the same as everyone here who has shown up, but it seems to me that we should recess to a time certain and stop fooling around. I'm very disgusted with the whole situation. I'm very frustrated by the whole situation. It seems to me that if we're going to play games, it seems that at least we could give the ordinary Member, like myself, just a little break, and set a time certain when we should come back here and maybe then we will have enough Membership here to function. I'd appreciate if that time would be later than 5:15, because I heard on the radio that the Governor is going to call a meeting of the Leadership of both parties and of the Senate and the House and I feel confident that nothing is going to be accomplished before that time, if anything will be accomplished after that time, and I think this idea of manipulating the ordinary Member has gone just too far. I drove home to see my family yesterday. I spent less than twenty-four hours with them and it's getting too much."

Speaker Blair: "Gentleman from Union, Mr. Choate."





Choate: "Mr. Speaker, I would concur in most of what the Gentleman has said, but I don't know how in the world that we can put a tow truck on some of the Members and insist that they be here. I would ask now, Mr. Speaker, that the House stand in recess for the purpose of a Democratic conference."

Speaker Blair: "All right, I.... there would appear that there are probably sufficient votes here to pass the Senate Bills on Third Reading. I don't think..... if that's the case, at least we could do that when we come back from the Conference, and at least give some of the party Members an opportunity to be here maybe. The only thing I thought was, we want to have a Conference too, and it would probably just give a little more time for more Members to become available to the Conference, if we'd run through these Senate Bills, to get an Agreed Roll Call. I don't think it would take longer than 10 or....."

Choate: "If we have the 89 votes here, and....."

Speaker Blair: "We need 107. Most of them are Appropriation Bills."

Choate: "107, rather and they are not of a controversial nature, I....."

Speaker Blair: "I don't think any of these Bills that are on Senate Bills that are on Third Reading are controversial, and those of you who are handling them, it probably would be well-advised to get them passed if there are votes here and get the message over to the Senate as quickly as possible, because there are Amendments on them and they'll have to concur. Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Hill."

Hill: "I don't want to be misunderstood. If we have Bills on the Calendar that can be acted on or Resolutions to be acted on, I'm not opposed to that, but what I'm opposed to is sitting here, twiddling our thumbs for hours, after hours, after hours. That's what I'm opposed to and not doing anything. If there are Bills to be acted upon, I'm more than happy to staying here and acting upon them."

Speaker Blair: "Okay. All right, then, let's go and see if the vote situation is okay. On Senate Bills, Third Reading, then,

appears Senate Bill 4, on which the Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Taylor. Read the ah..... yes."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 4. An Act to transfer certain appropriations to the Department of Labor to the Department of Public Aid. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Taylor."

Taylor: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, Senate Bill 4 is a Bill to transfer \$5,200,000 from the Training and Education Grant to the Department of Labor to the Training and Education of Child Grant line item appropriation of the Department of Public Aid. A recent Amendment to Table IV of the Social Security Act of 1973 mandates that in order to receive 75 percent Federal reimbursement, the money must come through the Department of Public Aid as a single State agency. The Amendment to Senate Bill 4 allows the Department of Public Aid to transfer \$6 million of medical assistance line item to line item of aged, blind and disability. The Amendment will be there in order to implement the Amendment which was adopted by Senate Bill 16. The Amendment to Senate Bill 16 mandated the Department of Public Aid to supplement this Grant of new persons coming onto the Federal Supplement Security Income Program on January 19, 1974. Those persons are under the program as of December 1, 1973 and are guaranteed the supplement through the Federal Legislation. What that means is that if a person truly is on a..... and the Federal government had mandated that he get \$150 a month and the Federal government only paid \$130 a month, then the State itself would be mandated to pay that other \$20 supplement. Therefore, Mr. Speaker, I feel that this Bill is not controversial and I move for the adoption of Senate Bill 4."

Speaker Blair: "Any discussion? All right, the question is, shall Senate Bill 4 pass. All those in favor, will vote 'aye' and the opposed 'no'. The Clerk will take an oral Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Thompson. Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Thompson."

Thompson: "Mr. Speaker, how am I recorded?"

Speaker Blair: "How's the Gentleman recorded?"

Clerk Selcke: "Gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Speaker Blair: "Have all..... Mr. Davis, how's the Gentleman recorded?"

Clerk Selcke: "Gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Bluthardt 'aye'. Have all voted who wished? Mr.

McCormick 'aye'. On this question, there are 116 'ayes', no



'nays' and Senate Bill 4, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. Senate Bill 5. Is Mr. Jaffe here?"

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 5. An Act to amend the School Construction Bond Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Jaffe."

Jaffe: "Mr. Speaker, this merely amends the School Construction Bond Act. When we passed out the School Construction Bond Act, we left out, by mistake, certain language, and that mistake impairs the bonds having full face and credit in the State of Illinois being behind it. I would like to note that all the other bond Acts have the identical clause and there is no controversy over this Bill. It's agreed to on both sides of the aisle, and I would like leave to use the last Roll Call, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Blair: "Discussion. All right, the question is, shall Senate Bill 5 pass? All those in favor, will vote 'aye'. The opposed 'no'. The Gentleman has asked leave to have the last unanimous Roll Call be the vote with respect to Senate Bill 5. Hearing no objections, then the vote on Senate Bill 4, which was 116 'ayes', no 'nays' shall be the vote with respect to Senate Bill 5 and Senate Bill 5 having received a Constitutional Majority or a Constitutional 3/5th's vote is hereby declared passed. Senate Bill 20."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 20. An Act to make an Appropriation to the Board of Governors, State Colleges and Universities. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "That's Mr. Peters. Yes, we still haven't got that corrected. Mr. Peters is handling this Bill."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Senate Bill 20 appropriates \$142,200 to the Board of Governors for the purpose of a cooperative computer center; that appropriation being agreed to by the Board of Higher Education. It also appropriates monies to the Board of Governors for Chicago State University, Governors State University, Northeastern University, Illinois University. Monies in the amount of \$769,000 to correct errors made in the



ah..... the reduction veto. It also includes monies along this same line for Eastern Illinois University and some appropriation for the Board of Regents. I ask the House's favorable consideration and the last unanimous Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "Discussion? All right, the question is shall Senate ....., Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Juckett."

Juckett: "Will the Gentleman yield for a question?"

Peters: "Not really, Bob, but all right."

Juckett: "This money isn't to be used ah..... to ah..... build or purchase the booze lounges at these colleges, is it?"

Peters: "No."

Juckett: "I understood that they are now setting up booze areas in each of these universities."

Peters: "I saw that article in the paper. Basically, all this Amendment does is restore money forgotten by an error."

Speaker Blair: "Gentleman from Christian, Mr. Tipword."

Tipword: "Would the Gentleman yield for a question?"

Peters: "I'll wait for the question."

Tipword: "It's not what you think. I wanted to ask about the President's homes in some of these places. Ah....."

Peters: "This Bill has nothing to do with the President's homes. I'm not going to answer on those questions."

Tipword: "During this time, have they continued to construct those homes, in which the discrepancies in financing was discovered by Representative Juckett's Commission?"

Peters: "Ralleigh, this Bill has nothing to do with that. It is basically to correct the errors that were made in terms of the reduction vetoes and the errors that were made in the Legislation that was passed here in terms of setting down the right figures. It's all agreed to. It has nothing to do with the Presidents homes."

Tipword: "To get back to where we were then, in the correcting of these errors, ah..... the reductions that were made heretofore, were there any of those reductions made in the area of administration?"

Peters: "Are you looking for the total amount that we're talking about?"

Tipsword: "The reductions that were made in the appropriations to these various colleges and universities were any of those reductions by the Governor made in the areas of administration?"

Peters: "Well, the answer to that is 'no'. None of them."

Tipsword: "And in what areas are these appropriations for? What do the appropriations have to do with the.... a cooperative computer center?"

Peters: "Ah..... at the time the budget was submitted, there was a disagreement as to exactly how much money would be required to operate that computer center. The Board of Higher Education, after sitting down and looking at the situation again, agreed that, in fact, an added \$140,000 would be required, which is, incidentally, Ralleigh, about \$95,000 less than what was initially requested."

Tipsword: "Now, is this only the computer center that's in this Bill, or do you know?"

Peters: "We amended the others into it. The Senate, as you recall, from the appropriations committee, the Computer Center is on Senate Bill 20, and what we have attempted to do in order to assure getting the monies through and correcting these errors, we have included as Amendments, which were approved by the House, several other Bills which we hope we can get over to the Senate and have acted on today. Yes, I'm sorry. Go ahead, I'm sorry."

Tipsword: "Yes, I wanted to ask one additional thing."

Peters: "Sure."

Tipsword: "The provisions that are made other than for the computer center, in the items set forth to be covered by this Appropriation, are pretty broad, aren't they?"

Peters: "In terms of the language here, Ralleigh, I suppose you could say they are. Ah..... House Bill 32, as an example, which was put on as Amendment to this Bill, does appropriate some \$769,000 to the Board of Governors for three universities for work, as again if you recall from the Appropriations Committee Hearings, for work which has already been completed or contracted for. And



now there might be some question, if you're looking down the Bill itself as to exactly what part of this \$769,000 goes for the sidewalk, the road or the building or the bathroom they're putting in or whatever it might happen to be."

Tipsword: "All right, some of these things for contract that were entered into that were not heretofore specifically appropriated for?"

Peters: "No. No. No."

Tipsword: "You know they couldn't answer that for me in Appropriations Committee. They said some of them were items that were not specifically appropriated for. Now, then, they want to support and complete them."

Peters: "They have been appropriated for, Ralleigh, that was my understanding the entire time. This Bill adds what that \$142,000 had to do with a question, you know, of the priority situation and had to do with the Board of Governors and ah..... the various agencies people affected, sitting down and determining exactly what they ended up needing on this."

Tipsword: "Are some of these appropriations related to additional construction of sidewalks and shrubbery and landscaping and additional convenience roads and streets?"

Peters: "Part of this does apply to contracts that have already been let, have not been started and contracts which have already been let and work either in the progress of being completed or completed."

Tipsword: "Some of them, then, are things that if they didn't appropriate for, they wouldn't have to go ahead with. Are they not?"

Peters: "Ah..... that's probably true, Ralleigh, except ah..... if you want to get an indication to me of what part of this we're not appropriating for, I can't tell you that."

Tipsword: "I remember the fellow that appeared from the Boards couldn't tell us either, at the Appropriations Committee."

Peters: "No, I can't give you an answer on that other than the Board of Governors, the Governor's Office, and all parties concerned had, in fact, agreed, that this money is needed to complete the work."



Tipsword: "Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "Okay, Mr. Waddell."

Waddell: "Mr. Speaker, would the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Peters: "Yield."

Waddell: "Could you tell me ah..... where this information data center is to be located?"

Peters: "It is located in Elmhurst, at Elmhurst College, Representative Waddell."

Waddell: "At Elmhurst College."

Peters: "Yes."

Waddell: "Could you tell me whether they have done any research as to how much available time there was on the machinery that we have already put in that could be shared."

Peters: "What's happening here, Representative Waddell, is that this installation is now at Elmhurst. They have an agreement with the college there where we are not paying a rent. We are allowing them to use this system that we have in and the estimates in terms of the time used on this are approximately 19 hours per day."

Waddell: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to speak to the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Proceed."

Waddell: "To begin with, I think that all of you should recognize the fact that with the new equipment we have put in the Secretary of State's office, they can more than handle free of charge on a time-share basis all the demands that all the universities have in the data field, so that as far as I'm concerned and being the chairman of the Data Information Systems Commission, I feel that this is totally unnecessary, because we have already spent more than adequate money so that all of the use, other than what we have right now, at the University of Illinois and they have more equipment than they know what to do with. All of this is totally unnecessary and I certainly would advocate a 'no' on this situation."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Will, Mr. Kempiners."

Kempiners: "I move the previous question."



Speaker Blair: "The previous question has been moved. All those in favor, say 'aye'. Opposed 'no'. All right, the previous question has been moved. Now to the Gentleman from Bureau, Mr. Barry. No, Peters, all right. Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Peters."

Peters: "Just in reply, Mr. Speaker, to Representative Waddell, I might indicate that this facility at Elmhurst is now in operation. It's not something new that's being added. It's to maintain the system that we already have and an attempt has been made by the Board of Governors and the Governor's office and the Board of Higher Education to centralize this within the educational system, because of the specific problems they have and the specific type of records they end up needing. Ah..... I just reiterate that there are agreements between all parties concerned here and I ask the favorable consideration of the House and leave for the last Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "All right. The..... Okay. Ah..... the question is, shall Senate Bill 20 pass? All those in favor will vote 'aye' and the opposed 'no'. Gentleman has asked leave for the last unanimous Roll Call. Is there objection? All right, there is objections, so the Clerk will call the Roll."

Speaker Blair: "Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Waddell."

Waddell: "Mr. Speaker, in explaining my vote. Obviously, some here don't agree with the idea that we should be down here trying to put these budgets in shape. Let me tell you this, that when the Data Information Systems went back to the University of Illinois just two years ago and had reviewed the amount of equipment that the University of Illinois had, Doctor Corbelea himself, the President of the University, decided that maybe they better stop this thing and go back and find out what it was all about, and by Doctor Corbelea's own testimony, they decided that they would form a consortium of all the universities and those in higher education, so that they could properly utilize the equipment that they had, and in doing this, saved the State of Illinois and the taxpayers over \$3 million, the first year. The first year. I.... and now we're right back to the place where we're trying to get more equipment put in that is not necessary, that is not being used and utilized correctly and we here at the Capitol have a great bank of material time and when somebody tells you they have their own particular problem and their own way of feeding the computer, that's hogwash, and that's all it is, because as anybody knows, the mechanical computer comes out as its programmed.

So I say to you, if you want to save the People of the State of Illinois some money, I would vote 'no' on this."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Duff 'no'. Mr. Schlickman?"

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker, how am I recorded?"

Speaker Blair: "How is the Gentleman recorded?"

Glerk Selcke: "The Gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Schlickman: "Change that to 'nay'."

Speaker Blair: "Change it from 'aye' to 'no'. The Lady from Cook, Mrs. Macdonald votes 'aye'. Mr. Gibbs. Mrs. Macdonald. Mr. Gibbs votes 'aye'. Mr. Huskey votes 'no'. Mr. Wolf votes 'no'. Jake Wolf. J. J. How's Mr. Mahar recorded?"

Clerk Selcke: "Gentleman is recorded as not voting."

Mahar: "Vote me 'aye'."

Speaker Blair: "Vote him 'aye'. Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the Roll. Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Peters."

Peters: "May I ask for a poll of the absentees, Mr. Speaker, and make a statement before that?"

Speaker Blair: "We're at 99, 11. Barry 'aye'. Beatty aye'. He's already on. All right, the Gentleman's asked for a poll of the absentees."

Peters: "If I might just say, Mr. Speaker. This Bill needs 107 votes to pass. I called to the attention of the Ladies and Gentlemen of the House this fact. Much has been made here of the appropriation of \$142,000 for a computer center. We are not asking for anything new here, as I indicated in my comments on the speech. This Bill is \$142,000 to put back into the budget, after the Board of Higher Education, agreed that they had pulled this out by error....."

Speaker Blair: "One moment, now. One moment, Mr. Peters. For what purpose does the Gentleman from Vermilion, Mr. Craig, arise?"

Craig: "He can go ahead."

Speaker Blair: "Okay, Mr. Tipsword, did you want to interrupt? Gentleman from Christian, Mr. Tipsword."

Tipsword: "Mr. Speaker, how many times can the Gentleman speak on the Bill?"



Speaker Blair: "Well, ah..... I'm sorry, I thought he was on explanation of his vote."

Tipsword: "No, Sir."

Speaker Blair: "Oh, Mr. Peters, you had asked for a poll of the absentees?"

Peters: "Yes, Sir."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Peters."

Peters: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I thought because of the importance of this Bill, and because of the fact that it has been agreed basically on both sides of the aisle and by the Governor's office perhaps there was a little bit of confusion initially in the discussion on it, that it would be proper for me to bring these points out."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the Gentleman's Point is well taken.

You're only entitled to have one explanation. Now the Gentleman from Vermillion, Mr. Craig."

Craig: "Mr. Speaker, this is a Bill that..... I have a Bill that is amended here that is for Eastern Illinois University, which was intended in the last Session to be ah..... in the Bill that we passed the last Session. Somehow it got mixed up in the Conference Committees or the Enrolling and Engrossing and this money was left out. This is not adding really any extra money. The University has already obligated themselves for this money, which was intended by this House of Representatives and Senate and Governor's People and I feel like that this, all of this Bill was, and the many Bills that it includes, the Board of Governors and other Amendments. Mr. Bradley has one in here, that's amended to this Bill. These were Bills that I think are very important to the People of the various areas where they're concerned and I certainly would urge on the absentees if they would please give us an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Blair: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, am I recorded on this Roll Call, and if so, how?"

Speaker Blair: "How is Representative Shea recorded, Mr. Clerk?"



Clerk Selcke: "The Gentleman is recorded as voting 'aye'."

Shea: "That's right."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Clerk, would you record Representative Cornell Davis as voting 'aye'."

Clerk Selcke: "The Gentleman is already recorded as voting 'aye'."

Speaker Blair: "Where were we, Mr. Clerk, on the poll of the Absentees?"

Clerk Selcke: "Yeow. The count is now 100 'ayes', 11 'nays'."

Speaker Blair: "All right, right now, there are 100 'ayes', 11 'nays' and the Gentleman has asked for a poll of the absentees. Mr. Katz is going on as 'aye' right now. Record Representative Katz as 'aye'. There's 101, and will the Clerk please read the names of the..... Oh, here's another one Fred. You want it now? Bob Dunne. R. L. Dunne 'aye'."

Clerk Selcke: "Okay, ready to go?"

Speaker Blair: "Oh, here's a couple more. Deuster 'aye'. Beaupre 'aye'. Tim Simms 'aye'. Catania 'aye'. Representative Dee, for what purpose do you rise?"

Dee: "To explain my vote, Mr. Speaker. Despite the discourtesy treatment, I vote 'aye', that I've received by the Sponsors of this Bill. I vote aye."

Speaker Blair: "Record the Gentleman as voting 'aye'. Ewell 'aye'."

Clerk Selcke: "O'kay, you already voted."

Speaker Blair: "Now, is there anyone else who wishes to ah.... come on this Roll Call. What do we have? Clerk informs me there are 111 votes, Representative. Do you still wish to..... 109. Do you persist in the..... okay, the Gentleman has withdrawn the request for the poll of the absentees. Can I have a count, Mr. Clerk?"

Speaker Blair: "109 'ayes', 11 'nays', none voting 'present'. This Bill having received the Constitutional three-fifths Majority, is hereby declared passed. What should I call next?"

Clerk Selcke: "109 to 11."

Speaker Blair: "Is Representative Grotberg here? He's not here. Senate Bill 22."



Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 22. An Act to make an additional appropriation to the Illinois Legislative Council. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Gentleman from St. Clair, or Madison, Representative Kennedy."

Kennedy: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is Representative Barry's Bill. He's not here and I'm going to handle it for him, with your help. It's an appropriation, reduced from \$30,000 to \$25,000 of the Illinois Legislative Council and it also has an appropriation for the Space Needs Commission on an Amendment, which was given to you by John Brandt. The ah..... total amount for the Council is \$25,120, and the total amount for the Space Needs is \$81,000. I would appreciate your vote on these two measures. Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "Is there any discussion? Gentleman from Cook, Representative Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Will the Sponsor yield for a couple of questions?"

Kennedy: "Yes."

Schlickman: "The Bill, as it was originally introduced, appropriated the amount of \$30,000 to the Legislative Council for its service unit for additional services. What are those additional services to be provided by that appropriation?"

Kennedy: "Well, Gene, I have a copy of it here. Two offset press operations - \$581 a month, which comes to a total of \$6,972, plus the State's contribution to social security and State Retirement, which is \$626.64. One Clerk Messenger of \$438 a month, plus additional social security of \$311.40. Total for the new personnel would be \$10,538.04. Overtime pay for press operators is \$3,950. Total personnel costs would be \$14,488.04. The equipment would be an offset press, Model 360, \$4,700. One offset series model 23 - \$5,430, plus the freight shipping cost of \$120. Incidental equipment, work tables, desks, shelving, \$3,000. Maintenance contracts for equipment, \$500. The total for that would be \$13,750."

Schlickman: "What would the affect of the Amendment. What did the



Amendment do to the Bill?"

Kennedy: "The Amendment, Gene, just a minute now, reduces the total appropriation from \$30,240 to \$25,120."

Schlickman: "That's where we stand now?"

Kennedy: "What did he say? Yes."

Schlickman: "Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Madison, Mr. Kennedy."

Kennedy: "Could I have leave to ask for the unanimous Roll Call?"

Speaker Blair: "Wait until I put the question. The question is, shall ah..... Senate Bill 22 pass? All those in favor, will vote 'aye', and the opposed 'no', and the Gentleman asks leave for the last unanimous Roll Call. Hearing no objections, the last unanimous Roll Call. 116 'ayes', no 'nays' and Senate Bill 22, having received the Constitutional three-fifths vote, is hereby declared passed. 23. Senate Bill 23."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 23. Kennedy. Giorgi, rather. An Act to make an appropriation to the Court of Claims Funds. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Giorgi is handling it for Mr. Rayson. Gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, would it be in order to ask that Senate Bill 23 and 24 be heard together and....."

Speaker Blair: "Is there objection?"

Giorgi: "And would it be in order to inform the House that I'd like to ask for unanimous Roll Call after we've discussed the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Well, you certainly have that opportunity, yes."

Giorgi: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, these....."

Clerk Selcke: "Wait a minute, let me read the Second Bill, Zeke.

Senate Bill 24. - An Act to make an appropriation in relation to the Crime Victims Compensation Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Go ahead."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, these are the two Bills, during the last Session of the General Assembly, we enacted the principal that we were going to compensate the innocent victims of crime. We also agreed during the last Session, they are now both Public





Acts, that the Court of Claims would be the vehicle used to adjudicate the amount of award to the compensated victim of crime. These two Bills provide the money to the Court of Claims for the original claims and it provides the money for the Attorney General and the Secretary of State's office to administer the claims and I urge the support of the entire House for these Bills."

Speaker Blair: "All right, is there discussion? All right, the question is, shall Senate Bills 23 and 24 pass? Ah..... all those in favor will vote 'aye' and the opposed 'no' and the Clerk will make two Roll Calls. Gentleman has leave for the least unanimous Roll Call. Is there objections? Hearing no objection, then Senate Bills 23 and 24, having received the Constitutional three-fifths votes, 116 'ayes', no 'nays', are each hereby declared passed.  
25. Senate Bill 25."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 25. An Act to make an appropriation to the Board of Trustees, Southern Illinois University. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Gentleman from Sangamon, Mr. Jones."

Jones: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Senate Bill 25 provides for the expenses of moving the ISU Medical School Branch here in Springfield, the moving expenses into the new building. This appropriation was inadvertently vetoed out of the Bill and is now being appropriated, with approval of the Governor's office and both sides of the aisles. Came out of the Senate, 48 to 0, and I would appreciate the last unanimous Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "All right, any discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill 25 pass? All those in favor will vote 'aye'. The opposed 'no'. The Gentleman has asked leave to use the last unanimous Roll Call. Is there objection? Hearing none, then on this question, there are 116 'ayes', no 'nays' and Senate Bill 25, having received the Constitutional three-fifths vote, is hereby declared passed. Somebody handling Senate Bill 40 for Mr. Tuerk? Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."



Walsh: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I will attempt to handle Senate Bill 40 for Mr. Tuerk. This is the same as the....."

Clerk Selcke: "Let me read it. Senate Bill 40. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Walsh: "This is the same Bill which passed the House last week and was a result of an error made by the Legislative Reference Bureau, wherein they removed some language on the wrong Sections in a Bill that Representative Tuerk handled, and ah..... it caused school districts throughout the State considerable difficulty because it required that there be a referendum on ah..... light safety improvements that ah..... the State mandated and did not require a referendum, of course, at the time they mandated it. Consequently, school districts throughout the State have made plans and have spent a great deal of money in ah..... attempting to comply with the light safety code and find themselves now in a position where they can't complete the improvement, and so this Bill simply corrects the error that was made and will permit the schools to proceed with these light safety improvements."

Speaker Blair: "Is there discussion? All right, we're at Senate Bills, Third Reading, then. Senate Bill 40. The question is, shall Senate Bill 40 pass? All those in favor, will vote 'aye'. The opposed 'no'. Does the Gentleman have leave for the last unanimous Roll Call? Hearing no objection, then, Senate Bill 40, having received a Constitutional three-fifths votes of 116 'ayes', no 'nays', is hereby declared passed. Ah..... Senate Bills, First Reading. Senate Bill 41. Berman."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 41. Berman. A Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. First Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Let's hold up there a minute. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Berman."

Berman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would move that Senate Bill 41 be read a first time and be advanced to the Order of Second Reading, Second Legislative Day, without reference to Committee. This is a Bill which transfers to the Department of Public Aid from the Bureau of Employment Security in the Department of Labor



the duty of reimbursing the Superintendent of Public Instruction for payments made to school districts under the School Code. This is in line with the Bill which we previously passed in the Third Special Session, Senate Bill 4. That was the money that was okayed, and this is the authorization. It's been cleared with the Majority Leader, the Chairman of the Appropriations Committee and with our side of the aisle and I would ask for leave to advance it to Second Reading, Second Legislative Day."

Speaker Blair: "Any discussion? All right the Gentleman has asked to move, to suspend the provisions of the appropriate Rule so this Bill, having been read a First time, may be advanced to the Order of Second Reading. Is there..... All those in favor, will vote 'aye' and the opposed 'no'. Is there leave for the last unanimous Roll Call? Hearing no objection, 116 'ayes', no 'nays' and Senate Bill 2 is now on the Order of Second Reading. 41. Senate Bill 41 is now on the Order of Senate Bills, Second Reading. Oh, was that the purport of the Motion. Yes, Senate Bills, Second Reading, which is..... Yeow, there's just two Orders. One is Second Reading, First Legislative Day and the other Second Reading. O'kay? Okay, so it's on Second Reading. We're trying to quickly ascertain the schedule for the rest of the day, about the feelings on some of these Bills, whether or not they're going to be called. For example, on that First Special Session, is Mr. Hyde going to call 20? Mr. Hyde's not going to call 20. You're not calling your number 1 in the Second Special, Mr. Schlickman. All right, we're going to go to House Bills, Third Reading. If you'd listen to what I say now, you'll follow what we are proposing. The Joint Leadership has gone over a number of Bills that are on House Bills, Third Reading, which would appear to be Bills that there would not be objection to. Therefore, we could move them quickly on agreed Roll Call, but in order for me to go out of Order on those, we'll have to suspend the Rules, so the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh, moves that the appropriate Rule be suspended, so that the Chair may go out of Order on House Bills Third Reading and ask leave for the last unanimous

Roll Call. Is there objection with regard to that? All right, hearing none, then, we.... the Motion prevails, 116 'ayes', no 'nays'. The first Bill then that appears with no objection will be Mr. Craig, #26. Mr. Craig. Your House Bill 26 on Third Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 26. You want me to read it, Mr. Speaker? House Bill 26. An Act to make an appropriation to the Board of Governors, State Colleges and Universities. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Craig."

Craig: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, this is a million, eight hundred thousand dollar for Eastern Illinois University that was left out of the budget in the last Regular Session. This money was left out in Conference Committee or inadvertently in Enrolling and Engrossing and I don't think there is any controversy over this measure and I'd appreciate unanimous support."

Speaker Blair: "Discussion? Gentleman from Christian, Mr. Tipsword."

Tipsword: "Representative Craig, these items, were these the same Bills that were amended into Senate Bill 20?"

Craig: "They were."

Tipsword: "And that Bill has now passed here?"

Craig: "That is right."

Tipsword: "Is this just going to be a duplicate of that Bill?"

Craig: "Well, I'm satisfied both of them won't be signed and they can take whichever one they want to have, but I mean, I don't want anymore slipups like there was in the last Regular Session."

Speaker Blair: "All right, is there further discussion? Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Did I understand the Sponsor of the Bill as saying that the Appropriation in House Bill 26, Third Special is contained in Senate Bill 20 of the Third Special?"

Craig: "Yes."

Schlickman: "I recalled, and the Appropriation in House Bill 26 is close to \$2 million."

Craig: "Yes, but mine was amended in House Bill, or Senate Bill 20 and



it's an Amendment, it's for a million eight hundred thousand plus for Eastern Illinois University. The Board of Governors."

Schlickman: "Well is Senate Bill 20 the one that was described as having appropriations of a hundred and forty two thousand?"

Craig: "That was another, that was part of Senate Bill 20 also."

Schlickman: "What are the personal services and contractual services? Could you describe those?"

Craig: "Well I think some of the personal services are personnel hired at the University and contractual work, this is money that they've already contracted. Because they thought this money was in the Bill, the last regular Session and if this money isn't appropriated they will probably have to shut down around March, sometime in March. Because this money is not new money being added or added for, this money is already been obligated by the university to the thinking that it was going to be given to them in the budget of the last regular Session."

Schlickman: "Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the Gentleman from Vermilion, Mr. Craig to close."

Craig: "I would appreciate your support on this and I'd like to ...is this the appropriate time to ask for a unanimous Roll Call on this House Bill 26. Last unanimous Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the Gentleman from Christian, Mr. Tipword, raises objection.—Mr. Tipword raises objection. Okay, so the question is, shall House Bill 26 pass? All those in favor will vote 'aye' and the opposed 'no'. The Clerk will take an oral Roll Call. Mr. Washington, for what purpose do you rise?"

Washington: "In the interest of saving time, could we have the same Roll Call we had on Senate Bill 20?"

Speaker Blair: "Oh, well that was...that wasn't unanimous. That's right. They're identical Bills, or...isn't that right?"

Washington: "Practically speaking, yes."

Speaker Blair: "Yeah, I think that's a good suggestion. Is there any objection to using the same Roll Call that we had on Senate



Bill 20, with respect to Senate Bill 26? All right. Leave has been granted. So...ah...Senate Bill 26 passes by 109 'ayes', 11 'nays'. Having received a constitutional three fifths vote, is hereby declared 'passed'. Mr. Bradley on 30. Mr. Bradley... Is somebody handling Mr. Bradley? Mr. Peters."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 30. An Act to make an appropriation to the Board of Regents. Third Reading of the Bill."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker, the same situation pertains true to Mr. Bradley's Bill as it did to Mr. Craig's and another Bill I have, which we all filed together in Senate Bill 20 and I'd ask Leave of the House for the same Roll Call as on Senate Bill 20."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman asked leave for the same Roll Call? As on Senate....On Senate Bill 20. All right...ah...the question then is, shall Senate Bill 30 pass? All those in favor vote 'aye' and the opposed 'no' and the Gentleman has asked leave to have the same Roll Call that we had on Senate Bill 20 to be the Roll Call on Senate Bill 30. Is there objection? Hearing none then 30...Senate Bill 30 is hereby declared passed, by a vote of 109 'ayes', 11 'nays' and this Bill, having received the Constitutional three fifths...House Bill 30, is hereby declared passed with a Constitutional three fifths vote. 31...Mr. Hanahan here? Somebody handling that Capitol Development...ah... Somebody handling that 31 for Mr. Hanahan? 32, Mr. Peters. Read 32."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 32. An Act to make an appropriation to the Board of Governor's, State Colleges and Universities. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Peters."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The same situation again pertains to...ah...House Bill 32. Ah...it is now part of Senate Bill 20 and I ask Leave of the House for the same vote as on Senate Bill 20."

Speaker Blair: "Any further discussion? All right. The question is, shall Senate Bill 32 pass? All those in favor will vote 'aye', the opposed 'no'. And the Gentleman asks leave for...what?"



The same Roll Call as on what? As was had on Senate Bill 20. Is there objection? Hearing none then Senate Bill 32...House Bill 32...ah...is hereby declared passed. 109 'aye', 11 'nays'. It is hereby declared passed with a Constitutional three-fifths vote. 36."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 36. An Act to amend an Act in relation to State Finance. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Beau....Yeah... The Gentleman from Kankakee, Mr. Beaupre."

Beaupre: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This Bill is a Bill to transfer Federal Revenue Sharing Funds, on a monthly basis to the Common School Fund. I believe that there is no controversy involved in it. There is presently, under the current law, a limitation of the amount that can be transferred on any monthly...for any monthly period of twenty-five million dollars....ah...and...ah...that limitation is removed by this Bill...ah...the transfer takes place...ah...by the...ah... Director of the Bureau of the Budget....ah... A report has to be made to the Comptroller and the State Treasurer with the approval of the Governor. I would ask leave for the same Roll Call on the previous Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Discussion? All right, the question is, shall Senate Bill 36 pass? All those in favor will vote 'aye', the opposed 'no'. And the Gentleman has asked leave for the...he has...for the last unanimous Roll Call. Is there leave? Hearing no objection Senate...House Bill 36 is hereby declared passed with a vote of, 116 'ayes', no 'nays'. It has received the Constitutional three-fifths vote. Now back to 20...ah...31. House Bill 31. Mr. Giorgi is handling for Mr. Hanahan."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 31. An Act to amend Section 1 of an Act providing for the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Capitol Development Board. Third Reading of the Bill."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, I'm handling...I'm considered Hanahan's assistant in Labor matters and this has to do with the Capitol Development Bonding Authority...what manager? I'm



campaign manager for that district. But anyway. This Bill consolidates in the single schedule line items for operations and those for the administration of schools Construction Bond Act. What happened was under the Illinois Building Authority...ah...the people worked for the School Construction Bond Act and they worked at the Illinois Building Authority. Now they all work for the Capitol Development Bonding Authority and the Comptrollers Office keeps insisting that they tell who they're working for in as much as they work for both units, it's hard to determine where the money's coming from. So we're putting it all in one single appropriation item and all the money comes from one single item. I move for the adoption of the last unanimous Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "For what purpose does the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Epton arise?"

Epton: "Mr. Speaker, a Point of Order if you please. Ladies and Gentlemen, this House Bill that was considered, is this the Kosinski Bill? I noticed by that...ah...memo up there, we cut reading House Bill 31 of the Kosinski Bill. Mr. Giorgi, can you answer that for me?"

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, I'm only handling House Bill 31, in Third Special Session for my good friend Tom Hanahan, you know (Unintelligible) are not my work."

Epton: "Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Champaign, Mr. Clabaugh."

Clabaugh: "Yes, I'd like to ask a question, Mr. Speaker. Ah...the... has this Bill been approved by the Capitol Development Bond Board?"

Giorgi: "Sir, the Capitol Development Bonding Authority asked for it after this difficulty with the Comptroller's Office."

Clabaugh: "Okay, thank you."

Speaker Blair: "All right, is...the Gentleman from Henry, Mr. McGrew."





McGrew: "Ah...I suppose a Parliamentary Inquiry Mr. Speaker. Could I be recorded 'no' on the last unanimous Roll Call, if we use that?"

Speaker Blair: "All right."

McGrew: "No, on this Bill Fred."

Speaker: "Yes that...that can be arranged. All right. The question is, shall House Bill 31 pass? All those in favor will vote 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The Gentleman asks leave for the last unanimous Roll Call. Is there objection? No objection. Then... The...there....One vote is changed. It's 115 'aye', no... and...and....1 'nay' and House Bill 31, having received the Constitutional three-fifths vote is hereby declared passed. 42. Wait..."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 42. A Bill for an Act to make an appropriation for certain claims against the State of Illinois in conformity with an award made by the Court of Claims. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 42 appropriates four hundred and forty-eight thousand dollars to pay a claim..ah..that was allowed by the Court of Claims. It's by the Cook County Department of Public Aid and it covers Bills that the appropriation has lapsed and it cleans up about the last eight years of Bills prior to the consolidation in January 1, of 1974. If there are no objections, I'd like leave for the last unanimous Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "All right. The question is, shall House Bill 42;.. ah...pass. All those in favor will vote 'aye and the opposed 'no' and the Gentleman's asked leave for the last unanimous Roll Call. Is there objection? Hearing none, House Bill 42 is hereby declared passed with a vote of 116 'aye', no 'nay'. It has received the Constitutional three-fifths vote. 43."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 43. A Bill for an Act to make an appropriation to the Court of Claims. Third Reading of the Bill."



Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Sangamon, Mr. Gibbs."

Gibbs: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 43 has amended the appropriation for the Court of Claims, Claims that were allowed by the Court of Claims in the amount of nine hundred and ten thousand, one hundred and sixty-five thousand a hundred and sixty-five dollars and ninety-nine cents. I ask for the last unanimous Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "All right, does the Gentleman...ah...The question is, shall House Bill 43 pass? All those in favor vote 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The Gentleman asks leave for the last unanimous Roll Call. Is there objection? Hearing none, House Bill 43, having received the Constitutional Majority of 116 'aye', no 'nays', is hereby declared passed. All right. All right, we can go to the Order of Concurrences. Third Special Session. House Bill 38. Senate Amendment #1. The concurrence. Mr. Tuerk, are you handling the Senate's Amendment #1? The concurrence on House Bill 38?"

Tuerk: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, the Senate did amend House Bill 38 and the Amendment just underlines some of the language they thought the language should be underlined to keep it...ah...statutorily sound and I would move that we concur in the Senate Amendment #1."

Speaker Blair: "Discussion? The...All right, the, is there discussion? Hearing none then the question is, shall the House concur in Senate Amendment #1 to House Bill 38? Is there...the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Brummet."

Brummet: "Could we just hold this for a second? We haven't had a chance to look at these concurrences? Just take it out of the record for a minute?"

Speaker Blair: "All right, we'll ease a second here. The Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Friedland."

Friedland: "Point of information Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Blair: "All right, yes, state your point."

Friedland: "Mr. Speaker, I have a Point of Information in regard

to yourself, Representative Duff and Representative Geo-Karis. I wish those two Members on the Floor would stand. Mr. Speaker, which one's wearing your jacket?"

Speaker Blair: "I'm glad you brought that to my attention? Mr. Duff, please at this end? Do you have it on?"

Duff: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I'd like you all to know that the Speaker's jacket and Representative Geo-Karis' jacket are Stuart Dress, and that's a little too high class for me."

Speaker Blair: "Just so the Members understand, there's been some question about House Bill 38 and Mr. Berman and Mr. Tuerk are consulting right at the moment, so just stand at ease for just a little bit and we'll try to have the matter resolved. All right, the Chair will recognize the Gentleman from Peoria, Mr. Tuerk, with respect to House Bill 38."

Tuerk: "Well Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. Ah...Mr. Berman and I have consulted along with his staff and we do find this to be in order and I'd move that we concur in Senate Amendment #1 to House Bill 38 in the Third Special Session."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the question is, shall the House concur in Senate...All right, hold that a minute. Ah...The Chair will recognize the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Berman."

Berman: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, just to answer the Sponsor's comments. This is a technical Amendment put in for the proper as prescribed by the Reference Bureau and it's ...ah... it's a good Amendment and I'd urge concurrence."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the question is, shall the House concur with Senate Amendment #1 to House Bill 38? All those in favor will vote 'aye' and those opposed 'nay'. Is there leave to use the last unanimous Roll? Hearing no objections, the last unanimous Roll will be used and that was 117 'aye' and no 'nays' and this Bill, and the House does concur in Senate Amendment #1 to House Bill 38, with the Constitutional Majority. So will the House stand at ease for just a short time? Mr. Tipword would like to entertain us with a rendition of some kind."

Tipsword: "No, I just wanted to ask you a question, Mr. Speaker.

Ah...On this...this House Bill 38, on which there was a motion.

Was that a unanimous ballot cast on that?"

Speaker Blair: "Yes, it was 116 'ayes' and no...17 'ayes', 117 'ayes' and no 'nays'."

Tipsword: "Was that cast after we had gone to ease..."

Speaker Blair: "I didn't hear you sir?"

Tipsword: "Had the House gone at ease and then come back in and acted on that?"

Speaker Blair: "The House is at ease now."

Tipsword: "Well was it at ease before that too?"

Speaker Blair: "Yes...yes."

Tipsword: "The reason I was asking when the House went at ease I went to the telephone and apparently a unanimous ballot was cast during that time and I would like to be recorded 'no' on this particular motion."

Speaker Blair: "The Clerk can record you..."

Tipsword: "If we could do that.."

Speaker Blair: "The Clerk can record you 'no' on this at your request as long as it does not change the results."

Tipsword: "Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "Record Mr. Tipsword as 'no'. Mr. Hill."

Hill: "Well the Amendment was handed out after the Bill had passed and I'm on that Roll Call too. I wonder if it would be in order if I could raise the question with Representative Tuerk on that piece of Legislation?"

Speaker Blair: "Why don't you go back and talk to him Mr. Hill, as long as we're at ease here, at the moment. It's already declared passed and we can't change it. If you've got a question why, why don't you resolve it with Mr. Tuerk. Mr. Schlickman."

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker, prior to the recess the Speaker of the House asked if I would desire to have House Bill 1 in the Second Special called. I indicated at that time a neutral attitude. At this time I would like to advise the Chair that I



do desire that House Bill 1 of the Second Special be called today. You'll recall that that Bill did pass overwhelmingly previously in the Third and I would like to get it off the Second Special Calendar, hopefully with the same Roll Call."

Speaker Blair: "Well your request will be noted Mr. Schlickman."

Schlickman: "That's all I request."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the...the Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. A few preliminary remarks before making a motion. The Joint Republican Leadership, House and Senate would like to get together and talk matters over, prior to a meeting that the Governor has called with the Joint Leadership House, Senate, Republicans and Democrats at 5:00. So, it is our intention to recess now until 7:00 at which time there will be a Republican conference and I understand a Democratic conference. Ah...If...ah...the Minority Leader would like to say something now."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Union, Mr. Choate."

Choate: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, as the Membership on this side of the aisle so well know, I had advised them that we would have a conference during this Session. However, in as much as the Governor has requested the Leadership to meet with him at 5:00, I would think it would be to the benefit of the Membership that we would hold our conference until after that meeting at the same time also so that they could appraised of all matters rather than just a few now and then having a second, having a second conference. So, I would subscribe to what the Majority Leader is suggesting."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh, has moved that the House stand in recess until the hour of 7:00 p.m. this evening. At which time we will be coming back here on the Floor and convening and...ah...the Leaders have indicated that both sides of the aisle will be having conferences commencing after we come back here on the Floor



at 7:00. Now, on that motion, all those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no', the 'ayes' have it and we stand in recess until the hour of 7:00 p.m."

Speaker Blair: "The House will be in Session. The Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, I move that the House stand in recess for a half hour for the purpose of a Republican conference in room M-3."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Union, Mr. Choate."

Choate: "What room can I have?"

Speaker Blair: "M-5."

Choate: "Then I would ask the Democrats to come to M-5 for the same purpose."

Speaker Blair: "All right, we'll be back on the Floor at 7:45."

Speaker Blair: "All right, on the Calendar on the Order, on page 6 on the Order of Motions, there 's been a request for one, and there's one agreed motion that we can go to with respect to Senate Bill 6, on which the Chair recognizes the Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Hoffman. No...Mr. Kosinski? Mr. Kosinski, yes."

Kosinski: "Mr. Chairman, I move to suspend the Rules of 31-b to re....movement of Senate Bill 6 to Second Reading without commitment to Committee. This is an agreed Bill of both sides of the aisle and I ask for the last unanimous Roll Call. This is the Capitol Development Contingency Fund."

Speaker Blair: "Is there further discussion? All right, does the Gentleman have leave to use the last unanimous Roll Call on his motion to take from the table and place on the Calendar on the Order of Second Reading? Hearing no objection then Senate Bill 6, the rule...Objection? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Lechowicz?"

Lechowicz: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, I just want to point out this is an Appropriation Bill calling for six hundred and thirty-three thousand dollars. I don't know if Bud Washburn has seen



this Bill or not. He's had an opportunity to view it. But it's always been the policy of the Appropriations Committee, I don't care what Bill it is or what Session that we at least have an opportunity to review it. Now if he doesn't have any objections to it, he's had an opportunity to review it, it's fine with me."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Mr. Speaker, this Bill had been amended in the Senate, it's come down. It is now in the the amount of three hundred and twenty-seven, or something, thousand dollars. I've talked with the Appropriations staff on the other side of the aisle, I've already entered an Amendment in the amount of seventy-five thousand dollars to decrease the funds of the lawyers, because the Capitol Development Board has a contingency fund that should be able to cover that. The Republican Appropriations staff has agreed and I think we can proceed with moving the Bill sir."

Speaker Blair: "All right, is there object...no wait a minute, they're discussing it. All right, apparently that matter's being cleared up. So hearing no objections then the Gentleman's motion to take, suspend the Rules so Senate Bill 6 may be taken from the Calendar and placed on the Order of Second Reading, prevails on the basis of the last agreed Roll Call. Introductions."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 49. Shea. Amends the Revenue Act of 1979. First Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Shea. Finally getting right, or on the right side of the aisle. Yeah."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 49, which was just introduced is at the request of the Clerk of Cook County...ah...in the last Session of the Legislature we passed Senate Bill 138 which provided for speedier Catch collection, but because of the language of that Bill there are four or five school districts that won't get their money. I've discussed this with the Leadership on both sides and I'd at this time ask for First Reading, ask to



move this to Second Reading without reference to a Committee."

Speaker Blair: "All right, is there objections? Hearing none, then the Bill, the appropriate Rule will be suspended and House Bill 49, having been..."

Shea: "I need leave for the last unanimous Roll Call is what you..."

Speaker Blair: "Yeah. The Gentleman's motion is to suspend the Rules so that House Bill 49, having been read a First time, may be advanced to the Order of Second Reading without reference. That Bill's been cleared with the Leadership on both sides: The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Duff."

Duff: "Well Mr. 'Question', I am curious about it nevertheless.

I'd like to ask what school districts are affected and how."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Shea."

Shea: "I am informed by the Clerk that the language of the Bill is such that they can not pay out the estimated first installment, this is your Senator's Bill, Senator Glass' Bill, in at least four townships in Cook County. In Lion's Township there's some sixteen million dollars involved in the first installment. In Oak Park Township, 1.9, in Riverside, 5.3 and I think it's Ryden Township that there's six or seven million dollars involved."

Duff: "Well I would not object, but I hope we get a full hearing on this relative, because there's some misunderstanding on it."

Shea: "I will have the Clerk from Cook County write each Member because it's at his request and I think that if he wrote each Member and explained what happened and what's involved it would perhaps be better. Listen, he writes in Polish, so you're picking on him?"

Speaker Blair: "Is there. Is the objection removed? All right, then leave has been granted to suspend the Rules and House Bill 49 then will be advanced to the Order of Second Reading. On the basis of the last unanimous Roll Call. For what purpose does the Gentleman from Kankakee, Mr. Beaupre rise?"





Beaupre: "Mr. Speaker, I've had a motion on the Speakers desk for at least five days now in regard to House Bill 49 and it...45, I'm sorry and at this time I would like to move that Rule 31-b be suspended...ah..."

Speaker Blair: "Well let me say this. I haven't gone to...ah...I'm really off that order of business. In the first place I'm on Introductions and First Reading. If you think that that's."

Beaupre: "The last thing that we had was a motion over here."

Speaker Blair: "It was a motion on a House Bill that has just been introduced by Mr. Shea. House Bill 49. I was on the Order of Business of Introductions and First Reading. Now. If you have a Bill that's on those motions that you would like to address, I suggest that it might be appropriate for you to discuss it with the Majority Leader because we're working with an agreed Roll Call and it just might be advisable for you to do that."

Beaupre: "Okay."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Well I object to the Gentleman's motion that this will really bring us into a great controversy, I think, if we move this. Jack how about holding that until next April or May."

Beaupre: "Mr...Mr. Speaker, I'm willing to withdraw the motion, but I would like to point out that there are some of us downstaters who have been down here for five weeks now, working for an R.T.A. for the Metropolitan area of the City of Chicago and we've been very patient and we've gone along with the program and we've done everything possible to see that an R.T.A. comes out in one form or another and all we're asking is to implement a program that...ah...the appropriation would pass back in June and in concept has been passed by this House twice and I'm willing to withdraw the motion but I would like to have an opportunity to make it sometime so that at least this matter would be considered."

Speaker Blair: "Well we certainly are going to give you that opportunity. All we're suggesting to you is that tonight might



not be the best shot for you to try it."

Beaupre: "I'll buy that."

Speaker Blair: "Okay. All right. Have we got an adjournment Resolution on this Session?"

Clerk Selcke: "House Joint Resolution #3. Third Special Session. W.D. Walsh. Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Seventy-eighth General Assembly of the State of Illinois, the Senate concurring herein, that when the House of Representatives adjourns on Sunday, November 18, 1973, they stand adjourned until Tuesday, November 27, 1973 at 12:45 O'Clock P.M. When the Senate adjourns on Sunday, November 18, 1973, they stand adjourned until Tuesday, November 27 and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Blair: "Wait a minute...wait a minute. The Lady from Cook, Mrs. Martin. For what purpose do you rise?"

Martin: "Point of Personal Privilege Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Blair: "All right, state your point."

Martin: "A few weeks ago on October 23, I was to have left for Russia for seven days. I was selected by the United Nations to go to Russia as a Representative. I was asked to stay here because we were coming out with an R.T.A. Bill. The trip was only going to be for seven days. An opportunity of a lifetime passed me by, because I'm sure I'll never get the opportunity to go again. And to think that it is now long past November the 3 and that chance of a lifetime has passed me by, for an R.T.A. that we still do not have, I'm hoping that...ah...maybe you and the Minority Leader will get together and send me on an all expense paid trip to Russia to be back in time for the next R.T.A. Session."

Speaker Blair: "All right, it's obvious that Mr. Choate is going to pick up the entire tab and not have me share it. I understand the reason for that Clyde. The Gentleman from Union, Mr. Choate."

Choate: "Mr....The main reason I stood up is because, after all you're a member of the Majority Party so you've got to pick up the



biggest part of that tab. I'll get the Minority part."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, I move that the Third Special Session stand adjourned until the hour of 12:00 noon on Tuesday, November 27..."

Speaker Blair: "12:45, we're going to...we're going to back up to the General...Mr. Walsh."

Walsh: "12:45, okay."

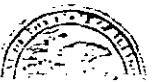
Speaker Blair: "Okay, we're coming back, we're coming back in at noon, so just that we're trying to get them back in order so we're going to adjourn the Third to 12:45. All those in favor of the Gentleman's motion say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Third Special Session is adjourned."

Speaker Blair: "All right. Now we're in the Second Special Session. Is there leave to have the Roll Call for the Third Special Session be the Roll Call for the Second Special Session? Hearing no objection leave is being granted and that will be done. No requests to leave...to read House Bills Third or Senate Bills Second. Is there any Introductions? Hearing none, the Gentleman from... Listen you don't have to come out, you not only have to watch your gavels, you have to watch your microphones. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Jim Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker, speaking from the Majority Leader's microphone and understanding Art Telcsers plea for a referendum on the Leadership. I wonder if the appropriate, if we could put a motion in while we're still in Session to affirm the Leadership we've had in this past Session or do whatever's the opposite of that and whether that would be appropriate of how we would do something of that sort. While you're talking with Bill Walsh, we might discuss that among the Membership or have you decided that?"

Speaker Blair: "Mr. Duff. We'd better adjourn quick. Mr. Duff."

Duff: "Well Mr. Speaker, the rules call for House Member to speak from his seat."



Speaker Blair: "Your point is very well taken. All right. Now, we're on the adjournment...yeah. Read the adjournment for the Second Special."

Clerk Selcke: "Ah...House Joint Resolution #4. W. D. Walsh. Second Special Session. Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Seventy-eighth General Assembly of the State of Illinois, the Senate concurring herein, that when the House of Representatives adjourns on Sunday, November 18, 1973, they stand adjourned until Tuesday November 27, 1973, at 12:30 O'Clock P.M. and when the Senate adjourns on Sunday, November 18, 1973 and so forth."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, I don't recall that the Clerk read an adjournment Resolution for the Third Special Session. Did you Fred? Okay. I move the adoption of the Adjournment Resolution for the Second Special Session."

Speaker Blair: "Discussion? All those in favor say 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The Second Special Session..."

Walsh: "Now, Mr. Speaker, pursuant to the Adjournment Resolution, I move that the Second Special Session now adjourn."

Speaker Blair: "Oh...Okay, all those in favor of the adjournment of the Second Special Session say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The Second Special Session is adjourned pursuant to the Adjournment Resolution. Fred I...All right. Now we're in the...ah... we're in the Regular Session...ah...is there leave to use the agreed Roll Call, I mean the Attendance Roll Call for the Third Special as the Roll Call for the General election? Hearing no objection it will be used. Now are there Introductions? Messages?"

Clerk Selcke: "A Message from the Senate by Mr. Fernandes. Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives, the Senate has adopted the following preamble and Joint Resolution adoption of which I am instructed to ask concurrence of the House. Senate Joint Resolution 53. Adopted by the Senate, November 16, 1973. Edward E. Fernandes, Secretary. Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives, the Senate has concurred



with the House in the adoption of the following Joint Resolution, to wit: House Joint Resolution 83, concurred in by the Senate, November 16, 1973. Edward E. Fernandes, Secretary."

Speaker Blair: "Introductions and First Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2101. Kosinski et al. Creates the Act requiring Firearms training. First Reading of the Bill.

House Bill 2102. Jaffe et al. Amends the Public Community College Act. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 2103.

Rigney et al. Illinois Brand Act. First Reading of the Bill.

House Bill 2104. Matijevich et al. Amends an Act providing for tax for Historical Museums. First Reading of the Bill.

House Bill 2105. Gibbs et al. Vacates Highway Easement. First Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Ah...Wait a minute. For what purpose does the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Maragos arise?"

Maragos: "Mr. Speaker, I want the record and the tapes to be properly showing that we did have an Attendance Roll Call of the Regular Session because I don't think we passed to have leave of the Roll Call of the Third Special Session to be adopted by the Regular Session. I don't think it was so ruled. You said General Election, Mr. Speaker, that's why I want the tapes."

Speaker Blair: "Yeah, well let the tapes show that what I asked for was leave to have the Attendance Roll Call for the Third Special Session be the Roll Call for the Regular Session and there was no objection, leave was granted. While we're on the order of correcting the tapes for putting the information on the tapes, I am advised by the party that runs the tapes that we did not actually move to adjourn the Third, pursuant to the Adjournment Resolution. So, in order to make sure that we got that...No, she just called and said we didn't, so Mr. Walsh moves that we adjourn the Third Special Session."

Walsh: "Well maybe having voted on the prevailing side, I move reconsider the vote by which the Third Special Session was adjourned."

Speaker Blair: "Now what we did was we adopted the Adjournment Resolution and then we just simply failed to move pursuant to the Adjournment Resolution."

Walsh: "I then move, Mr. Speaker, that the Third Special Session adjourn to the hour of 12:45, November 27."

Speaker Blair: "All right, that is pursuant to the Adjournment Resolution. All those in favor say 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Third Special Session was adjourned according to the Adjournment Resolution. Now, you're reading Bills. Okay."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2106. Randolph. Appropriates thirty-four thousand dollars to the American Appraisal Company. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 2107. Molloy et al. General Revision of Credit Union Act. First Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "Agreed Resolutions."

Clerk Selcke: "House Resolution 644. Rayson et al. House Resolution 645. Hudson et al. House Resolution 647. Schraeder et al. House Resolution 649. Dave Jones et al. House Resolution 650. Dave Jones et al. House Resolution 651. North et al. House Resolution 652. Palmer et al. House Resolution 653. Rayson. House Resolution 654. Rayson. House Resolution 655. Waddell. House Resolution 657. Geo-Karis et al. House Resolution 658. Schoberlein et al. House Resolution 659. Juckett et al. House Resolution 662. R. L. Dunne et al. House Resolution 663. Kempiners et al."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Juckett: "Mr. Speaker, would it be possible for the Clerk to read...ah...House Resolution 659. It's about one of our colleagues?"

Speaker Blair: "Sure. Proceed to read it."

Clerk Selcke: "House Resolution 659. Juckett et al. Whereas this body has learned that one of our distinguished Members, Richard A. Carter is seriously ill and whereas, Representative Carter is serving his second term in this body and whereas we have missed
