Ah... it was offered by Representative Friedrich in Committee, and what it does is, it breaks out the eighty-five thousand dollars that would be used strictly for the



employment of engineers, engineering aids and conservation technicians to work on the general direction of
the Illinois Department of Agriculture for the soil
conservation service of the United States and I move
its adoption."

Speaker Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Lechowicz moves for the adoption of Amendment #2, is there debate?

All those in favor will say 'aye' those opposed will say 'nay', in the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it, the Amendment #2, is adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Committee Amendment #3, amends...."

Speaker Shea: "Mr.... excuse me, Mr. Clerk... Mr. Duff, for what...."

Duff: "Mr. Speaker ah... once again and this is a little different situation, this digest doesn't even show a Committee action in it ah.... I.... we know that the Bill has been held on Second, I don't understand that the digest has a last entry of March 26th, in it. It doesn't a Committee action, Committee vote or anything else. It doesn't show the Bill on Second Reading."

Speaker Shea: "I think that it was just reported back,

May 4, of this week, Sir. If you will check your Calendar on May 4, or May 3, you might find it as a posted Bill. Turn Mr. Lechowicz on."

Lechowicz: "Might I point out that the digest comes out once a week and the digest is dated April 30th."

Speaker Shea: "Mr. Duff, I see you had a discussion with

Mr. Washington, did you express your feeling with regards to the digest?"

Duff: "Ah... Representative Washington got side tracked on the way over, we haven't had the discussion yet, but don't worry about it."

Speaker Shea: "I see Representative Washington talking to



my colleague, Representative Klosak so I'm sure you will be able to see him and work that out. Are there further Amendments?"

Lechowicz: "Two... #3 now."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3, amends House Bill 3389, on page 8, line 7 and so forth."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Committee Amendment #3, increases the grants made to fowl and water conservation districts by two hundred thousand dollars for a new total of six hundred, three thousand, three hundred dollars and I move for its adoption."

Speaker Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment #3, is there debate?

Speaker Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Rayson."

Rayson: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. This is

a Committee Amendment to the ah... appropriations

from the Agriculture Premium Fund for the ordinary

and contingent expenses of the Illinois Racing Board.

This Amendment reduces ah... the level of ah... appropriations for General office by some twenty-three thousand dollars, reduces the ah... expenses of the Laboratory

Programs some twenty-six hundred dollars and reduces the regulation of the racing program by some twenty-four

thousand and seventy-five dollars. Approximately fifty thousand reduction of the original appropriation and I now move for adoption of Committee Amendment #I,

Speaker Shea: "On the question, is there debate? The

Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Huff, do seek recognition, Sir?"

Huff: "Yes, just a point of information, Mr. Speaker. Would

the Sponsor yield to a question?"



Speaker Shea: "He indicates he will, Sir."

Huff: "I see ah... Mr. Rayson, that the Racing Board is funded by the Agriculture Premium Fund, is that correct?"

Rayson: "Yes."

Huff: "Am I correct in also assuming that the Agriculture

Premium Fund gets this.... some of its funds from

the proceeds of the ah... assessments placed on the
ah... on the race track proceeds."

Rayson: "Ah... that is correct, Sir."

Huff: "Thank you."

Speaker Shea: "The Gentleman from Peoria, Mr. Schraeder,
do you seek recognition on this question? Your lights
flashing, Mr. Schraeder... Are there... is there further
debate... the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Rayson moves
for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1. All those
in favor will say 'aye' those opposed will say 'nay',
in the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it and
the Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

the Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments?' Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Stea: "Third Peading. Mr. Craig, are we ready to proceed... Oh, now we've got to wait, there is a quick floor Amendment. Mr. Barnes, what about your Bill?

Friedrich: "All right, it is, I'm sorry."

Speaker Shea: "The Calendar may not be printed very clearly but those Bills on page 2, of the Calendar are just on there for informational purposes, they can be amended on Monday."

Friedrich: "Okay."

Speaker Shea: "On the order of House Bills, Third Reading appears House Bill 3380, the Gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Stubblefield."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 3380, a Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense of the Department of Labor. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Shea: "Turn Mr. Stubblefield on, please."

Stubblefield: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is the Bill which would provide the... ordinary and contingent expense for the Department of Labor, has two Amendments and in its amended form ... it calls for ninty-eight million, three hundred and twenty-three thousand, seven hundred dollars. In ah... Committee there was a reduction of twenty-nine thousand, two hundred dollars ah ... twenty-eight thousand, two hundred dollars of that was in General Revenue money ah... as compared to last year, there is a reduction overall... as opposed to last year of about four thousand, eight hundred dollars ah... we cut the General Revenue appropriation as opposed to last year by over two million dollars added ah ... a similar amount in the Federal Funds. And, I would ah... appreciate a favorable Roll Call on this very important Bill."

Speaker Shea: "The Gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Stubblefield moves for the adoption of House Bill 3380, which is the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Department of Labor. Is there debate? The question is, shall



House Bill 3380 pass, all those in favor will vote
'aye' those opposed will vote 'nay'. Vote Shea, 'aye'.

Have all voted who wished? Have all voted who wished?

Cissy Stiehl, 'aye'. Have all voted who wished? Have
all voted who wished? Richmond, 'aye', hit Mr. Richmond's

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 3822, a Bill for an Act making appropriations to certain Governmental Agencies. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Barnes." Barnes: "Thank you, very much Mr. Speaker. House Bill 3822, is the ordinary and contingent expense of certain agencies ah ... the Environment Protection Agency, which we had heard ah ... yesterday on Second leading, there were eight Amendments to that Bill ah... the Agency Institute for Environmental Quality, which we had heard on Second, previously, the Illinois Instit the Illinois Industrial Pollution Control Board for its expenses and the Pollution Control Board. These are combined together they are four sections of this Bill. The Pollution Control Board... the ah... appropriations to this fiscal year of seven hundred and forty-eight thousand for the Illinoi Industrial Pollution Control Finance Authority and it's seventy-two thousand and five hundred twenty, for the Institute of Environmental Quality, eight million, one hundred and ninty-six thousand for the EPA, three



hundred and thirty-seven million, four hundred and

forty-three thousand and one hundred."

Speaker Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Barnes has moved for the passage of House Bill 3822, is there debate? The question is, shall House Bill 3822 pass.

All those in favor will vote 'aye' those opposed will vote 'nay'. Shea, 'aye'. Have all voted who wished? Take the record, Mr. Clerk. On this question there are 149 'ayes', 7 'nays', 4 Members voting 'present' and House Bill 3822, passed. On the order of House Bills, Third Reading appears House Bill 3386, on which the Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Schneider has a motion."

Schneider: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House.

The ah... ordinary and contingent expenses for the

Speaker Shea: "Mr. Schneider moves.... asks leave of the

House that House Bill 3386, be Tabled. Is there objection
hearing none the Bill will be ordered Tabled. Speaker's

Table. On the Speaker's Table appears House Joint Resolution 61, Mr. Kelly. Is Mr. Kelly on the floor?

House Joint Resolution 83, Mr. Polk... On the Speaker's



Table appears House Joint Resolution 85 and on that the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Mahar."

Mahar: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Resolution... Joint Resolution 85... ask the... Election Laws Study Commission to hold at least three public hearings throughout the State to determine the desirable of moving the primary from March. We have had a great deal of discussion on primary dates in the last few years, have Bills introduced... they have been put in Sub-committee, there hasn't been a great deal of discussion there's a lot of cities throughout the State that ah... primary ought to be moved and ought to probably be moved to September. I would like to ask your favorable consideration."

Speaker Shea: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of House Joint Resolution 85, is... on that is there debate? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Mahar moves for the adoption of the Resolution... Mr. Lechowicz, do you have... does your light work..."

Lechowicz: "At times... ah... Mr. Speaker will the Sponsor will just briefy inform the House what this Resolution does."

Speaker Shea: "Mr. Mahar, would you go through it once more now...

Mahar: "Yes, Sir."

Speaker Shea: "Ladies and Gentlemen, we could have some order if the Members would be in their seats. This Resolution talks about moving the primary date and to which date it could or might be moved. I would presume that most of us have a vested interest in that date and may want to listen to the discussion."

Mahar: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. There has been a great deal of discussion on the primary date, this Resolution



asks the Election Laws Study Commission to hold some public hearing during the summer and fall, and come back to the General Assembly next January with a recommendation was to whether the primary ought to be moved from March or retained in March. I think it's a step in the direction of getting some feeling from the citizens throughout the State... as to ah... when we ought to have a primary, there has been a great deal of interest in it.. many Bills have been introduced. I thought this might be the appropriate and proper

method to approach this problem."

Speaker Shea: "Do you have any questions?"

Lechowicz: "I object to the Resolution."

Speaker Shea: "The question is, shall the House adopt....
the question is, shall the House adopt House Joint
Resolution 85... does this call for the expenditure of
money, Mr. Mahar?"

Mahar: "Ah... no, Sir. It should be part of the Study

Laws Commission budget."

Speaker Shea: "The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the

House. Only to make a correction on the Calendar, it

says the Executive Committee recommended the House

do adopt, it was the Election Committee ah... I in

fact opposed it like Representative Lechowicz."

Speaker Shea: "The question is, shall the House adopt House.... Mr. Berman."

Berman: "Well, Mr. Chairman, I ah... Mr. Speaker, I have
a question of the Sponsor, if the Election Laws Study
Commission is going to conduct this, why do you need
a Joint Resolution?"

Mahar: "That's a good question."

Berman: "I mean, I think you've got the prerogative to hold hearings on any subjects of the Election Laws



that you want, without a Joint Resolution. If you've got the money in your pocket..."

Mahar: "We're asking them to do it, in this case I don't think they would do it without the request from this Body."

Berman: "Well, if they don't want to do it, I don't think we ought to ask them to do it."

Mahar: "I don't know if they don't want to do it."

Speaker Shea: "Would you like to hold the Resolution until

Monday, when you talk to the people on the Election

Laws Commission?"

Mahar: "Yes, I will hold the Resolution."

Speaker Shea: "At the request of the Sponsor, he's going to hold the Resolution. House Resolution 678, Beatty and Madigan... take that out of the record. House Resolution 703... Mr. Downs... Mr. Downs, do you want to go with 703? Did you say no, Mr. Downs? On the order of House Bills, Second Reading appears House Bill 3372, Mr. Craig."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 3372, a Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense of the State Fair Agency. Second Reading of the Bill, one Committee Amendment. Amends House Bill 3372, on page 1, line 11 and so forth."

Speaker Shea: "The Gentleman from Vermilion, Mr. Craig.

Ah... Mr. Lechowicz, did you handle the Committee

Amendment?:

Craig: "Yes, Mr. Lechowicz has got the Amendment."

Lechowicz: "I have them both, Mr. Speaker..."

Speaker Shea: "What are you going to do..."

Lechowicz: "Yes, Committee Amendment #1, reduced the appropriations by two hundred forty-three thousand, eight
hundred dollars for the State Fair Agency in the following
items. Ah... thirty-three thousand, six hundred in



personel services, retirement of three thousand, nine hundred, social security of eight thousand, nine hundred, contractual services of thirty thousand and one hundred, printing, three thousand, four hundred. Automobile operation, thirty-two hundred. Fair entertainment one hundred and ten thousand, five hundred dollars, State Fair Advisory Board, one thousand dollars, awards and premimum for forty-nine thousand and two hundred dollars. For a total of two hundred and forty-three thousand, eight hundred dollars and I move for its adoption."

- Speaker Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment #1, is there discussion?

 All those in favor will say 'aye' those opposed will say 'nay', in the opinion of the Chair the Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments."
- Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Lechowicz. Amends
 House Bill 3372, as amended on page 1, line 27 and
 so forth."
- Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ah... floor Amendment #2, is being proposed because of the fact that the Director... and also in Committee pointed out to the Membership that, a lot of the awards were already granted. In reference to the entertainment for the State Fair, he also pointed out that the State Fair was in the process of having... for the State Fair for the first time, the live coverage of ah... the Boozo Children's Show... that has... well we may laugh but anyone with children realizes the fact that so many of the youngster throughout this State, watch that program. I think it would be beneficial in two areas, one for the additional interest that it will generate to the State Fair and, two, possibly drawing in people... families from all sections of



this State because you know Channel 9, is cover carried by Cable T.V., for this reason there is appropriation for fifty thousand dollars to cover that section ... of entertainment. All so there is restoring the dollar amount, the forty-nine thousand two hundred dollars for awards and premiums because the Director stated that the money comes out of the Agriculture Premium Fund and in turn their procedure is to have that money on hand so they can get the awards for the following year on a bid procedure. For this reason, Mr. Speaker, I'm offering floor Amendment #2, which restores approximately fifty thousand dollars in General Revenue Fund and ah... forty-nine thousand, two hundred dollars out the Agriculture Fund for a total of ninty-nine thousand, two hundred dollars. The Agency has still been cut and in turn I thought that the man had justified his position on these two matters, and I move for its adoption."

Speaker Shea: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Com... er ah... floor Amendment #2, on the question the Assistant Minority Leader, Mr. Walsh, you are an expert with children do you have any comment? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Totten, the Minority Spokesman... on Appropriations I."

Totten: "Well, thank you, Mr. Speaker. I ah... just can't believe the Chairman of the Appropriation I, Committee on his explanation of why we need Amendment #2, ah... after ah... the matter in which we debated Amendment #1, which provided for some of these cuts, I thought his logic on the cuts was ah... quite preceptive and very responsible ah... and to ah... see Amendment #2, as we've seen it here today ah... leaves me with some serious questions. First of all, ah... let me point out in the awards and premiums section, we are already



appropriating an increase of 30% over the prior fiscal year ah... for this section and if that money is not used on the ah... premium it does go back into the General Revenue Fund. In the area of ah... entertainment what the Committee did in Amendment #1, was to cut it back to the prior year level ah... the ah... State Fair Agency has ah... prepared for us a list of the Fair entertainment for this year and whether their request is for Boozo or Niel Sedekaor Johhny Russell or ah... any of the other ah... some forty-five different pieces of entertainment, everyone of those contracts has a clause in it that say, if the money is not provided by the General Assembly then the contract is cancelable... it is able to be canceled, and this General Assembly when it's looking at ah... the total General Revenue Funds, I think we'll find in a serious expense or a questionable expense item when you see the list of the entertainers that we have for this year's State Fair, I think it's just not needed at this time, that Amendment #1, was wise and Amendment #2, is town foolish."

Speaker Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Lechowicz, do you have some comment or reply?"

Lechowicz: "Ah... an hour or two, I guess. Thank you, Mr.

Speaker. In reply and I thought I would try to justify
when I presented the Amendment. Unfortunately, the
State Fair has already awarded the dollar amount that
they had last year, they came in with a substantial
increase for entertainment, it is true that we viewed
the entertainment as it was presented to the Committee.
In turn, as I said before... this one children's program
and I think it's probably one of the best, not only in
this State but in the Country, could be quite beneficial
in reversing... in reversing the deficiency associated



with this State Fair, now if you want to have so much additional free publicity for this State Fair, then I would strongly recommend you go with the entertainment as it is provided in Amendment #2. I couldn't calulate the total dollar cost it would take to publicize the State Fair in that line alone on a day to day basic, I think it's... yes Representative Totten, I agreed with you as far as the other entertainment that was being proposed but, in turn I'm stating to you now... that the entertainment as it was proposed it can act for some of them but this one, I'm afraid I have to disagree with, I think it should be included and I would appreciateyour support. In reference to the area of awards and premiums I would defer to Representative Craig and to the rest of the people from downstate Illinois, and I would hope that he could justify as the Director did to me in reference to the increase because of the serious competition of other State Fairs in trying to maintain the level of competition for the Agriculture in this State and yes, Ladies and Gentleman Agriculture is still the number one product in the State of Illinois."

Speaker Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Lechowicz moves for the adoption of Amendment #2, all those in favor will say 'aye' those opposed will say 'nay', in the opinion of the Chair... we need a Roll Call. All those in favor will vote 'aye', those opposed will vote 'no'.

Vote Shea, 'aye', please. Have all voted who wished?

Have all voted who wished? Take the record, Mr. Clerk.

On this question there are 84 'ayes', 54 'nays', 4

Members voting 'present' and the Gentlemen's motion to...

on Amendment #2, is adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Shea: "Third Reading. On the order of motion...



on the order of motions appears Senate Bill 193 and on that the Gentleman from Franklin, Mr. Hart." Hart: "Ah ... thank you, very much ah ... Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. A little background, Senate 193, is a Bill that excepts sporting events from the noise pollution regulations of the Pollution Control Board. This Bill was heard in the ah ... Committee several months ago and after a very extensive and interesting hearing ah... was held in Committee on a six to six vote. Subsequently ah... I filed a motion to ah... discharge the Committee and it never was called and the motion was Tabled under an obscure rule that I didn't know anything about, until the other day. Ah ... so, I have filed this motion to take this Bill from the Table and put it on the order of Second Reading, First Legislative Day which motion I am advised requires a 107 affirmative votes. Now, what the situation is currently, with reference to ah ... sporting events and noise pollution in the State of Illinois is... that as of the present time every race track in the State of Illinois is in violation of the Illinois Pollution Control Board Rule and subject to be shut down ah... by a court order. What this Bill would do, if passed, would exempt those sporting events from the Rules ah.... of the Illinois Pollution Control Board. If we don't do something and ah ... ah ... even the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency has requested some relief from the Pollution Control Board but has not received it. There were a couple of extentions of time granted but, those extentions of time ran out on February 10, 1976 and ah... there ah... may not be anymore ah ... racing ... automobile racing in Illinois, if we don't do something about it ah... which is the purpose of this Bill. I'm advised that



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if this Bill doesn't pass... we will drive all of the ah... motor car racing out of Illinois because there is no way that any of them can qualify under the decibel rules that are in existence now ah... to have ah ... racing. Ah ... the economic loss will be incalculable. I'm advised that it would ah ... probably we'd lose a hundred and twenty million dollars into the economy of Illinois each year and about seventeen thousand jobs are at state. Ah... so, I would urge ah... the Membership of this Body to support my motion to discharge this Bill ah... to take it off the Table and put it on the order of Second Reading, First Legislative Day so that we can then, address ourselves to a major problem which exist in the State of Illinois right today. I'm also advised that presently one track has already been closed down by the Attorney General's Office and that one is the Santa Fe Speedway and ah ... all that has to be done if for somebody to complain about the tracks that exist now ... and the Attorney General Office will go into court and get an injunction and shut down the track."

Speaker Shea: "Is there debate? The Lady from Lake, Miss Reed would like to talk. Turn Miss Reed on."

Reed: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House.

It appears to this freshman that the strength of this
Legislative Body rests within the Committee system. I
I find it difficult to understand that the Body would
approve discharge to action, particularly on a nonemergency measure, Senate Bill 193 had two fair hearings before Committee and a tie vote was the outcome.
I suggest the Sponsor reconsider and refile his legislation for next Session. An emergency does not exist
the Pollution Control Board is in the process of arriving
at the policy in regards to noise pollution they have



been meeting consistently with sports' event fans,
particularly motor racing fans and a policy will be
the outcome. I ask for a 'no' vote on this discharge
motion."

Speaker Shea: "The Gentleman from Stephenson, Mr. Rigney."

Rigney: "Ah... will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Shea: "He indicates he will, Sir."

Rigney: "Well, Mr. Hart can you tell me... does this

legislation say that the Pollution Control Board may

not have any regulation what so every over the noise

of ah... motorcycle racing events?"

Hart: "It would excempt them from the Pollution Control

Board regulations that now exist and leave it where

I think it belongs, to local ordinance."

Speaker Shea: "Mr. Rigney, would you wait one minute, please.

Mr. Madison, on a point of order."

Madison: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, as I understand this, the discussion is on the motion to take from the Speaker's Table...."

Speaker Shea: "Yes, Sir. That's it."

Madison: "And, what I hear is a discussion on the merits

of the Bill and I think it's out of order. Thank

you, Sir."

Speaker Shea: "Mr. Rigney, do you have any more questions?

The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Collins, your light I
assume doesn't work but, I saw that you were seeking
recognition."

Collins: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker ah... it's just an inquiry, is this motion debatable?"

Speaker Shea: "We've usually let somebody open and close...

I think at this point we ought to go back to the maker

of the motion and let him close, if he gets the requi
site number of votes... we will go.... it's the intendion of the Chair, as Mr. Washburn reminds me, that



we have one or two more matters of business but we'll try to be out of here by 5:25, so that Members can catch trains which Mr. Telcser told me, will leave promply at 5:46, so the Gentleman from Franklin, Mr. Hart, turn Mr.... the Minority Leader on, It Mr. Deuster's phone."

Washburn: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, just a clarification. You're not just excusing the Republicans so the Democrats can continue on here alone are you?"

Speaker Shea: "Would you like us to do that? It would make Hel..... of a difference. Mr. Hart to close."

Hart: "Well, ah... in response to the question of the emergency, I believe it is an emergency when every race... motor race track in the State of Illinois is in violation of the law and being subject to being shut down at a cost of seventeen thousand jobs to the people of the State of Illinois and the loss of a hundred and twenty million dollars in... in income, so I think that is an emergency which we need to address ourselves too, today and that's the nurpose of my motion and I would ask for a favorable vote, it takes 107 votes to pass this motion."

On this question there are 117 'aye' votes, 21 'nay' votes and the Gentleman's motion prevails. On the order of announcement the Gentleman from McLean, Mr. Bradley."

Bradley: "Well, thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and



Gentlemen of the House. I would like to change the Sponsorship of House Bill 3816, which is the Department of Transportation Bill from Representative Lechowicz, is now the Chief Sponsor to... to ah... Representative Tipsword and they are both aware of this change and I would like the Clerk to make that ah... change as quickly as possible. Thank you, Sir."

Speaker Shea: "The Gentleman asks leave of the House to make the appropriate change, is there objection, hearing none... Representative Tipsword will now be listed as the Chief Sponsor of DOT Appropriation Bill. On the order... on the Adjournment Resolution, read the Adjournment Resolution will you, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Joint Resolution 73, Resolved by
the Senate of the 79th General Assembly of the State
of Illinois, the House of Representatives concurring herein,
that when the Senate adjourns on Friday, May 7, 1976,
it stand adjourned until Tuesday, May 11, 1976, at
12:00 o'clock noon and when the House of Representatives
adjourns on Friday, May 7, 1976, it stands adjourned
until Monday, May 16, 1976, at 2:00 o'clock P.M."

Speaker Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, relative to the Adjournment Resolution there will be a Perfunctory Session tomorrow, at which time Bills which appear on the Calendar on the order of Second Reading, First Legislative Day, will be moved to the order of Second Reading, Second Legislative Day in order to provide that those Bills will be at the amendatory stage on Monday, when we return, and I move for the adoption of the Adjournment Resolution."

Speaker Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Madigan moves for the adoption of the Adjournment Resolution. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'nay', in the opinion of the Chair the Resolution is adopted. Now, we've got



just a few House cleaning chores to take care of...
the Bills will be introduced tomorrow, Mr. Downs has
a motion... Mr. Downs, are you going to handle that
motion or is Miss Chapman going to handle it?"

Chapman: "It has been referred to Committee, what I have...."

Speaker Shea: "You want to call that today? All right,

now Mr. Taylor has a motion."

Taylor: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I ask
leave of the House to suspend the Appropriate Rule
in order that we may hear House Bill 3482, as a
proposed Committee Bill. It now appears on the Calendar
shows as a Bill to be heard and not as a Committee

Speaker Shea: "Mr. Walsh, seems to be a stickler for asking



those kind of questions. The Gentleman from Peoria,
Mr. Schraeder."

Schraeder: "Mr. Speaker, there is a motion on ah... the

Calendar under House Bill 3844, I wonder if you could

call that... motion."

Schraeder: "Ah... Mr. Speaker, there is a motion on the desk to suspend the rule 31 (b), to place this on Second Reading without reference to Committee. It's a Committee Bill, its been heard in the Elections... it's a very needed Bill and time is running out, we have to have some special primaries there are fourteen in the State and I would ask the motion ah... be allowed and passed with the necessary votes."

Speaker Shea: "The Gentleman from Peoria, Mr. Schraeder, asks leave for unanimous consent to move House Bill 3844, to the order of Second Reading, Second Legislative Day, is there objections. Hearing none, the motion carries and the attendance Roll Call will be used."

Schraeder: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Barnes."

Barnes: "Thank you, very much, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker,

Members of the House. I would like to ask leave to

suspend the appropriate rule to have House Bill 3377, which is the Department of Mental Health, heard in

Appropriations II, on Tuesday of next week."

Speaker Shea: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Barnes, the
Assistant... or the Vice Chairman of the Committee
on Appropriation #II, ask unanimous consent for the
posting and hearing of House Bill 3377, on Tuesday...

Barnes: "May 11."

Speaker Shea: "May 9, in....



Barnes: "May 11."

Speaker Shea: "In Appropriations II, is there objections, hearing none, unanimous consent is granted, the rule is waived and the attendance Roll Call will be journalized on that motion."

Barnes: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, I would require... request ah... leave to suspend the proper rule so that the Sub-committee, on the no help appropriation can meet and ah... heard on Monday, May 10, at 1 P.M., in Room H-1. The Sub-committee on House Bill 3377."

Judicial District. House Resolution 796, is a memorial
Resolution ah...in behalf of the Honorable Thomas

Donovan, a distinguish Jurist in the Clerk at Court of



Cook County for many years and I would ask for the adoption of both Resolutions, at this time."
