February 24, 1983

Speaker Madigan: "The House shall come to order. The Members shall be in their chairs. All unauthorized personnel shall be removed from the floor. The House shall come to order. The Members shall be in their chairs. We shall be led in prayer today by Father Donald Meehling of the St. Patrick's Church in Decatur, Illinois. Father Meehling is a guest of Representative John Dunn. Would the guests in the gallery please rise for the invocation? Father Meehling."

Father Meehling: "Before we pray together with you and for you, we'd like to advise you that our 200 plus grade school children at St. Partick's School, along with 100 or so adults who attended our weekly daily Lenten mass today, have already prayed for you at an earlier hour this morning. Let us pray together. O God, Author and Master of the universe, before whom we must all appear after our short stay here on earth to render an account of our stewardship, hear our prayers and grant your blessing upon all of the thoughts, words and actions of this deliberative and legislative Assembly. May justice and charity guide its every action that these same virtues may abound in our land. And may the righteous pursuits of all the citizens of our great State of Illinois gain Your blessing. May leaders everywhere learn that their role is essentially one...one of service wherein they do not lord it over others, but rather by their guidance and supremely by their living example, educe from their constituency the very best that they have within themselves. And, let us be mindful always that he who governs least, governs best. Deliver us from untold bureaucracy and teach us the simplicity that is characteristic of God himself - he who is simple and unencumbered. Teach us reverence, gratitude and fear of the Lord. And finally we pray, grant us gentle peace and

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perseverance even in the days of our test. Keep us forever mindful that our greatest duty is to render you homage, adoration and praise now and forever. Amen. Thank you."

Speaker Madigan: "We shall be led in the Pledge of Allegiance by Representative Ropp."

Ropp et al: "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

Speaker Madigan: "Roll Call for Attendance. Have all voted who wish to be recorded for purposes of the Attendance Roll Call? The Clerk shall take the record. The Roll Call indicates that there are 108 Members present. There is a quorum present. Committee Reports."

Slape: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I'd like to take this opportunity to introduce some nursing students from McKendree College at Lebanon, Illinois who are visiting Springfield today. They are seated right up here on the Democratic side. Welcome to Springfield."

Speaker Madigan: "For the purpose of excused absences. On the Democratic side, Mr. Greiman."

Greiman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Would the record show that Representatives Vittek, Keane, Nash and Henry are absent by reason of illness or other personal matters?"

Speaker Madigan: "The record shall indicate that those Representatives are excused. Mr. Daniels, are there any excused absences on the Republican side? Mr. Daniels, are there any excused absences? Mr. Vinson, are there any excused absences? The Chair recognizes Mr. Vinson."

Vinson: "Mr. Klemm, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Madigan: "Let the record show that Mr. Klemm has been excused. Mr. Clerk, would you read the Adjournment Resolution?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Message from the Senate by Mr. Wright, Secretary. "Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives the Senate has adopted the following Senate Joint Resolution, the adoption of which I am instructed to

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ask concurrence of the House of Representatives to wit: Senate Joint Resolution #5, resolved by the Senate of the 83rd General Assembly of the State of Illinois, the House of Representatives concurring herein, that when the two Houses adjourn on Thursday, February 24, 1983, they stand adjourned until Tuesday, March 1, 1983 at 12 o'clock noon."

Speaker Madigan: "The Chair recognizes Mr. McPike. The Chair recognizes Mr. McPike on the Adjournment Resolution."

McPike: "Thank you, Mr...thank you, Mr. Speaker. I move for the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 5."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. McPike moves for the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution #5, which is the Adjournment Resolution. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed by saying 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Motion carries. The Resolution is adopted. Mr. Clerk, are there any further Resolutions? For what purpose does Mr. Christensen seek recognition?"

Christensen: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to have leave of the House to have House Bill 350 posted for the Committee on Aging so it could be heard next week."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Christensen, have you spoken with the Minority Spokesman on the Committee?"

Christensen: "No, I just got the information now, but I will."

Speaker Madigan: "Would you speak with the Minority Spokesman and seek recognition again?"

Christensen: "I certainly will. I will."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Clerk, do we have any further Resolutions? Agreed Resolutions. Mr. Giorgi."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Resolution 61 by Representative Oblinger."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, Oblinger's House Resolution 61 notes a retirement of a person that's worked 50 years for the Department of Mental Health. I move for the adoption of the Resolution."



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Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Giorgi moves for the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed by saying 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Motion carries. The Resolutions are adopted. Mr. Clerk, are there any further Resolutions? The Chair is prepared to adjourn. Is there any further business to come before the House? If there is no further business to come before the House, we shall adjourn upon the adoption of a Death Resolution of a former Member. Before we move to the Adjournment Resolution, Representative Christensen is recognized for the purpose of suspending the posting requirements. Mr. Christensen."

Christensen: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. I spoke to the Minority Spokesman. She has no objections to having House Bill 350 posted."

Speaker Madigan: "The Gentleman moves to suspend the posting requirements to permit the hearing of House Bill 350 in the Committee on Aging next week. Is there leave? Leave is granted. The posting requirements are suspended, and the Bill will be heard in Committee next week. Mr. Christensen, would you reduce that Motion to writing? You can come forward and see the Clerk, and he will assist you in that regard. If there is no further business to come before the House, we shall adjourn upon the adoption of a Death Resolution for a former Member. Would all Members please rise? We are prepared to adjourn on the adoption of a Death Resolution for a former Member. All Members please rise. Mr. Clerk, read the Resolution."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Resolution 62, by Representative Panayotovich - et al. Whereas the Honorable Henry M. Lenard, former State Representative from the Riverdale neighborhood and a former chief bailiff for the City of Chicago, passed away on January 23, 1983 at the age of 79;

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and whereas, Mr. Lenard was first elected to the Illinois House of Representatives from the far south side district in 1952 and served his constituents and the state with great distinction for 20 years until his retirement in 1972; and whereas, during his term of office, Mr. Lenard was a strong supporter of job problems for his district and thought to enact legislation requiring a federal permit to dump materials into Lake Michigan; and whereas, Mr. Lenard was capable and honest in his tenacious work as a Member of the House contributed greatly to the accomplishments of the Legislative Body; and whereas, Mr. Lenard became a municipal court bailiff in 1936 and was named bailiff in 1964 and held that position until he retired in 1972; and whereas, Mr. Lenard was a Silver Skate ice skating champion of Chicago and began a professional boxing career in 1919 and fought until 1932; and whereas, he participated in 142 fights. He won 132, and was never knocked out and was often called the 'uncrowned bantamweight champion of the world'; and whereas, Mr. Lenard was the boxing coach for the St. Michael's Boys Club and the U. S. Steel Boxing Club of the Catholic Youth Organization. Therefore, be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the 83rd General Assembly of the State of Illinois, that we mark with sorrow the death of former Representative Henry M. Lenard, that the loss of this fine man will be sorely missed by his community and that we convey our deepest sympathy to his loving wife, Peggy; his two sons, Henry and Raymond; his daughter, Dorothy Nelson; and a brother, a sister, seven grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. And be it further resolved that a suitable copy of this Preamble and Resolution be presented to his widow, Peggy Lenard, and as a further token of our respect, the House now stands adjourned."

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Speaker Madigan: "The Chair recognizes Representative Panayotovich."

Panayotovich: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Henry Lenard, Legislator, professional boxer, coach, advisor, leader, husband, grandfather and friend; these are many of the hats that Henry Lenard wore well, both back at home in our district and here in Springfield. I remember back in 1969, as President of the Student Body at SIU, Mr. Lenard invited me here to speak to this Body. He said, 'Here is a future Member of this Body'. He was the first man to call me when I won my election back home. He consistently urged many of us young people to get involved in the political process. In my home district, as well as in the State of Illinois, Henry Lenard will be sorely but lovingly missed. In closing, I remember one of his quotes that he used to say when he spoke in public. 'I love politics, but I like boxing better, because at least in the ring, I knew who was hitting me.' Thank you."

Speaker Madigan: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of the Adjournment Resolution. He also requests leave that all Members of the House be added as Cosponsors of this Resolution. Is there leave?
