As you are aware, she was just sworn in to replace John Birkinbine as the 57th District State Representative. His are difficult shoes to fill, but the Bepublicans who voted in the primary last month chose an outstanding public official to do the job in filling Representative Birkinbine's shoes. Representative Parcells has been the Northfield Township Supervisor, responsible for a budget in excess of one million dollars. Before that, she served as township clerk, and she has also served as Vice-Chairman of the Finance Committee of the

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Northwest Municipal Conference. For her service Northfield, she was applauded by at least one newspaper in her district for her management of an efficient, compassionate, operation. The newspaper called her an articulate, personable and qualified to join us in the Illinois House of Representatives. I couldn't agree more. As the Minority Leader, Representative Parcells, it's rare that I'm able to speak for all Members of the House, but I know I can tell you that we are proud and pleased to you join us. We wish you good health, good luck, good fortune as a Member of the Illinois House. Thank you joining us. We're here to help you. Thank you."

Speaker McPike: "Introduction and First Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 3267, Davis, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Bevenue Act. First Reading of the Bill."

Speaker McPike: "We'd like leave of the Body to go to page seven,
House Bills Third Reading. The last Bill under House Bills
Third Reading, House Bill 2669. We have leave to go to
that order? Hearing no objections, Representative Piel.
Do you want the Bill called? Bead the Fill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2669, a Bill for an Act making a supplemental appropriation to the Illinois Legislative Council. Third Beading of the Bill."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Piel."

Piel: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, we started to cover this Bill the other day on Third Reading. We had unanimous leave to go to Third Reading. We realized it hadn't been read the third time. What House Bill 2669 is, it's a supplemental to the Illinois Legislative Council for printing equipment. We had this in the budget for this year, and then we, after talking to the people in the service unit, as far as the printing

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equipment that will be needed for this coming year, we found that by the time the Bill is signed. the bids placed, and the orders come in and the equipment is put on-line it would be approximately nine months. The service unit would like to have this equipment ready for by the time the next Session of the General Assembly starts the first part of January. The only way we could do in that would be to put through a supplemental. This Bill has been agreed by both sides of the aisle in both chambers, and what we're trying to do is get this over to the Senate as fast as possible. It is a supplemental for 266,000, and I would ask for a favorable Roll Call on House Bill Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman has moved for passage of House Bill 2669. Is there any discussion? Speaker McPike: "Any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3, Marzuki, amends House Bill 1632 as amended on page one, line 13."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Marzuki, Amendment #3."

Marzuki: "I wish to withdraw Amendment #3."

Speaker McPike: "Amendment #3 is withdrawn. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Ploor Amendment #4, Marzuki, amends House Bill

1632 as amended on page one, line 13."

Speaker McFike: "Representative Marzuki, Amendment #4."

Marzuki: "This is merely a technical Amendment."

Speaker McPike: "Excuse me, Representative Marzuki. Has the Amendment been distributed? Yes, it has. Proceed."

Marzuki: "This is merely a technical Amendment, and I move for its adoption."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker McPike: "He indicates he will."

Cullerton: "Representative Marzuki, is this similar to Amendment #3?"

Marzuki: "Yes."

Cullerton: "And it just corrected the... the fact that the word 'established' was not underlined?"

Marzuki: "Right."

Cullerton: "Alright. Thank you."

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Speaker McPike: "Further discussion? There being none, the Gentleman moves for the adoption of Amendment #4. All those in favor signify by saying "aye", opposed "no". The "ayes" have it, and the Amendment's adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. House Bill 2366, Representative Panayotovich. Out of the record. House Bill 2441, Representative Mulcahey. Out of the record. House Bill 2515, Representative Cullerton. Out of the record. House Bill 2549, Capparelli. Out of the record. And we will return to page four, House Bills Second Reading Short Debate. Representative Pangle has returned. House Bill 2365. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2365, a Bill for an Act to amend
Sections of an Act in relation to the establishment,
maintenance and operation of county law libraries. Second
Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker McPike: "Third Reading. Representative Klemm, for what reason do you rise? No reason. Okay. Thank you. Page five of the Calendar, House Bills Third Reading Short Debate appears House Bill 876. Representative Levin. Wish to have your Bill called? Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 876, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code. Third Beading of the Bill."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Levin."

Levin: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 876 is embodied in Amendment #1 which gutted the original Bill. And as amended by Amendment #1, this legislation deals with special education, the due process appeals procedures and simply makes three changes

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which put us into conformity with federal law. This Bill is supported by the State Board of Education. And the changes it makes are: #1, on an appeal to provide that an appeal on a due process must be completed in 30 days; secondly, requires providing a transcript at the time of the appeal within seven days; and takes off the limit on the number of witnesses that can be subpoensed in such an administrative proceeding. All three of these changes are... put our law into conformity with the federal law. I urge your support for this legislation."

- Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman has moved for passage of Bill 576. Is there any discussion? I'm sorry, House Bill 876 Is there any discussion? Being none, the question •Shall House Bill 876 pass?" is. All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the voted? record. On this Bill, there are 107 'ayes', no 'nays', none voting *present*. House Bill 876, having received a Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. Bill 2166, Representative Hicks. Representative Hicks. Out of the record. House Bill 2466, Representative Bowman. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."
- Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2466, a Bill for an Act to add

 Sections to the Illinois Administrative Procedure Act.

 Third Reading of the Bill."
- Speaker McPike: "Bepresentative Bowman. Bepresentative Bowman."

 Bowman: "Excuse me. I'm... I'm at Bepresentative Currie's desk.

 My microphone is not working."
- Speaker McPike: "Very well. Representative Eowman from Representative Currie's desk."
- Bowman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Bouse. House Bill 2466 is recommended to this Assembly by the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules. It believe...

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I believe that it will save much time and aggravation on the part of not only the Joint Committee but also every agency of the state. We have a situation right now where agencies that publish rules with sunset provisions in them must repromulgate the repealer at the ... at the time of the repeal in accordance with the ordinary and customary procedures of the Administrative Procedures Act. In other words, there's no real incentive to put sunset provisions in... into rules, because they just have to go through the process all over again anyway. This particular Bill is an attempt to address that cumbersome situation and to encourage agencies to sunset unnecessary rules. It simply says that an agency can promulgate a sunset provision, then at the time the... the sunset provision is to take effect they just simply announce in the Illinois Register that the provision is to go into effect within 30 days so everyone is reminded that the sunset provision is there. And then they can dispense with all the hearings before the Joint Committee on Administrative Bules. I think it's a... an effort to streamline government. I urge its approval by this House."

- Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman has moved for passage of House
 Bill 2466, and on that, the Gentleman from Lee,
 Representative Olson."
- Olson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I wish to endorse and amplify Bepresentative Bowman's remarks relative to House Bill 2466. A number of items have come through the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules which are administratively in good form, and I would urge a "aye" vote."
- Speaker McPike: "Further discussion? There being none, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 2466 pass?' All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all

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voted? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this Bill, there are 109 'ayes', 2 'nos', none voting 'present'. House Bill 2466, having received a Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 2468, Representative Bowman. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2468, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Public Aid Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Bowman." Bowman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen House Bill 2468. as amended. disposes of the infamous point count system once and for all whether it geriatric facilities, or in pediatric facilities or in D.D. facilities. The Legislature, I think, thought that it had done this a number of years ago. In fact, only the geriatric facilities point count systems were abolished, leaving the point count system in place for pediatric and adult D.D. facilities. The Amendment simply gives the Department of Public Aid until January 1st of '85 to get a new system into place for these... these other types of facilities. I would like to make it clear, as part of legislative record. that we are not recommending by this legislation that the... the same alternative reimbursement formula be applied across the board to geriatric, pediatric and adult D.D. Indeed, they each have their own special needs and considerations. But we are saying that the point count system has no place in any of these facilities and should be abolished once and for all. And I urge the House support this effort. It is recommended by the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman has moved for passage of House Bill 2468, and we are on Short Debate. Does anyone stand

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in opposition to the Bill? The Gentleman from DeWitt, Representative Vinson."

Vinson: "Mr. Speaker, I don't know that I stand in opposition,
but I do want to ask the Sponsor a question about the Bill.

I don't want to have to... Short Debate."

Speaker McPike: "Proceed.

Vinson: "This would not mandate the same system for geriatric care patients as for the mentally retarded patients in nursing homes, would it?"

Bowman: "No, Bepresentative Vinson. I tried to make that clear in debate, but I would be happy to underscore it at this time. I want to make clear as part of the legislative record that we are not mandating the same alternative reimbursement system for all types of care facilities - geriatric, pediatric, adult D.D., but we do say by this legislation that the point count system shall not be used in any one of those."

Vinson: "And would you explain the purpose for that?"

Bowman: "Yes, because the Department of Public Aid is now in violation of the law. The law, I think, was quite clear, and I trust you... you agree with me that the law says that shall not have a point count system in this state, period. The law, at the present time, does not distinctions among different types of facilities respect to the point count system, and yet the Department Public Aid took... took it upon itself to draw οf distinctions between different kinds of facilities, abolish the point count system for one type of facility, geriatric, and left it in place for the other types of think that contravenes the legislative facilities. Ι It contravenes the language in the statute, and this Bill is intended to permit the point count system to be abolished. It directs the Department of Fublic Aid to

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- do so, but gives them enough time to put an alternative into place so we don't have chaos as soon as the Bill is signed into law."
- Vinson: "What is your view on the appropriateness of the point count system for the MI population?"
- Bowman: "Representative, I think that the Legislature has spoken before, and I'm endorsing that position that the point count system should be abolished with respect to all long term and intermediate care and skilled care facilities regardless of the type of patient they house."
- Vinson: "Mr. Speaker, I would then rise in support of the Gentleman's Bill. It's a good Bill. I'm somewhat surprised, but it's a very good Bill."
- Speaker McPike: "Further discussion? There being none, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 2468 pass?' All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this Bill, there are 112 'ayes', "nays", none voting 'present'. House Bill 2468, having received a Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. On page five of the Calendar, House Bills Third Reading appears House Bill 569, Representative Braun. Representative Braun on the floor? Out of the record. House Bill 1069, Representative Steczo. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."
- Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1069, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

 Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Steczo."

 Steczo: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would ask leave of the House to return House Bill 1069 back to Second Reading for the purposes of an Amendment please. I'd like it held there because the Amendment has not been distributed yet."
- Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to return House Bill

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1069 to Second Reading. Hearing no objections, leave is granted. House Bill 1069 appear on Second Reading. House Bill 1128, Representative Klemm. Bead the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

- Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1128, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Vehicle Code. Third Reading of the Eill."
- Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Bepresentative Klemm."

Klemm: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 1128 has been amended completely, and now basically what the Bill says is nondedicated subdivisions are now able, request to the county or city municipalities, to their municipal entity, request that the traffic laws of the Illinois Vehicle Code be applicable to their private roads. nondedicated This last summer, a number of subdivisions contacted me and said that, you know, the law in Illinois in a private nondedicated subdivision, even though it may have hundreds of homes there, you don't need driver's license to drive a car. You don't have to stop at stop signs. You don't have to obey really any of the enforcements or any of the statutes that the Illinois Motor Vehicle Code does say. Also, we found out that in park districts, because the roads are not considered also cannot be policed and cannot be enforced under the traffic laws. So during the summer, with the Motor Vehicle Laws Commission, a number of hearings were held, and we came up with the language that is in House Bill 1128. And really what it does, and it is permissive language, it simply says that a subdivision or an area such as that, who requests a written request to a county board or to a municipality if they fall within the municipal limits, can request that an ordinance be adopted that would

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allow the enforcing officers and police departments to fulfill the obligations of the Illinois Vehicle Code. It's permissive language. It must be granted by an ordinance so that the enabling legislative bodies can study the issue to find out that it is a proper request and that the sheriff's department or the city police could then enforce the definitions of the Illinois Vehicle Code. 1 know opposition to the Bill. The park districts and everybody does support it, and I'd be delighted to answer any questions. Otherwise, I would move for adoption of the Bill."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman has moved for passage of House
Bill 1128, and on that, the Gentleman from Cook,
Representative Marzuki."

Marzuki: "Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker McPike: "Indicates he will."

Marzuki: "Is this not already permissible under the Intergovernmental Agreements Section of the Constitution?"

Klemm: "No, it wouldn't... it wouldn't follow under that because the statutes are quite clear in saying that it would have to be defined as a highway, a street or highway. Now there is already an existing law allowing subdivisions, of the definition that we have, used to go to, say, a county board and ask for police protection. But the police, if they were to issue a citation, it's thrown cut of court because the statutes don't say that they can do what they're doing. So this clarifies what we're trying to do in which is partially existing law but not totally."

Speaker McPike: "Further discussion? There being none, Representative Klemm to close."

Klemm: "Just to ask for your support on House Hill 1128. A great deal of work has gone into it. A number of subdivisions and areas do depend on our support and help on this, and it

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is supported by almost... in fact, everybody that I know of, so I do ask for your support. Thank you."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman has moved for passage of House Bill 1128-All those in favor signify by say... by voting 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. On this Bill. there are 113 'ayes', no 'nays', none 'present'. House Bil1 1128, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 1448, Representative Terzich. Out of the record. House Bill 13... House Bill 1587, Representative Ronan. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk. No. I'm sorry. House Bill 1757, Representative Giglio. Out of House Bill 1839, Representative Doyle. the record. Out of the record. House Bill 1855, Representative Steczo. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1855, a Bill for an Act to amend Clerk Sections of the Revenue Act. Third Reading of the Bill." Speaker McFike: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Steczo." Speaker, Members of the House. Steczo: "Thank you. Mr. Bill 1855 is a Bill that... that seeks to address a problem and to clarify a present law relative to park districts. It's a very simple Bill. It's probably been one of the more misunderstood around here. In fact, this Bill vetoed by the Governor, or a provision such as this was vetoed by the Governor last fall because he considered language surplus which it was not. Although simple in nature, the Bill attends to address a problem with relation to park districts as it was prior to 1975 when Illinois law said that park districts could lease property and ... administer different kinds of concessions, et cetera and profit on those items. The law after 1975 was changed such a way to... to make a prohibition against community

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college districts and school districts, but it also threw park districts in along with them. What House Bill 1855 intends to do is to place the law as it was prior to 1975 to allow park districts to run concession stands and profit off those without having to have their property assessed by local boards of assessment. I understand the reason for this Bill is that this question has come up in some areas downstate, and it's just a means by which to clarify the... the situation as it is now."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman has moved for the passage of House
Bill 1855. And on that, the Gentleman from Cook,
Representative Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Yes, will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker McPike: "He indicates he will."

Cullerton: "Representative Steczo, are these park district lands now being taxed?"

Steczo: "Representative Cullerton, they are not. No."

Cullerton: "So there would be no loss in revenue to the local taxing authority."

Steczo: "No, there wouldn't be. The guestion for the... the reason House Bill 1855 has been introduced is that since the other Amendments to the law after 1975, it's worded in such a way where a guestion has arisen in some cases, so we're just trying to clarify the original intent."

Cullerton: "Thank you."

Speaker McPike: "Further discussion? Being none, the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Steczo, to close."

Steczo: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Just in closing, I will say that, as I had mentioned previously, this is simply a measure to clarify the law as it was originally intended by this General Assembly, and I would appreciate any affirmative votes."

Ιt title from Administrative Secretary to Administrative Assistant for the current position which is now called Administrative Secretary for a11 the circuit... Chief Judges of each circuit. Right now each Chief Judge has an Administrative Secretary. This name to Administrative Assistant. It also increases the amount of the salary that they could be paid 18,000 to 24,000 dollars per year and increases the per diem allowed from 50 dollars to 65 dollars. The last time that there was an increase in the salary was 1980. I would happy to answer any questions and ask for your support of the Bill."
- Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman has moved for the passage of House Bill 2374, and on that, the Gentleman from Champaign.

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Representative Johnson."

- Johnson: "I'm not going to give a long diatribe against this, but

 I think people should be aware that myself and four or five
 other minority Members of the Judiciary Committee oppose
 this Bill for two reasons. One, it has a fiscal impact,
 and everybody knows what the arguments are on fiscal impact
 this year, and two, it does authorize a court personnel pay
 increase. As I understand, it's permissive, but it still
 authorizes that level. And it's state money, and those
 people who are concerned about those issues ought to vote
 'no'."
- Speaker McPike: "Further discussion? There being none,
 Representative Cullerton to close."
- Cullerton: "Mr. Speaker, I think Representative Johnson accurately summed up the Bill, and I would indicate that we received testimony in Judiciary Committee by Roy Gully.

 Judge Roy Gully supported the Bill, and I would ask for your support on the Bill."
- Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman has moved for the passage of House Bill 2374. The question is, 'Shall House Bill 2374 pass?' All those in favor signify by voting "aye", opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this Bill, there are 72 "ayes", 'nos', 3 voting 'present'. House Bill 2374, having received a Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. The Chair is prepared to adjourn. Rules Committee p. a. meets at 1 Are there any announcements? Representative Matijevich."
- Matijevich: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. There's one Bill in Rules

 Committee that we need leave to suspend the two day posting

 notice so that it may be heard today. That's House Bill

 3188. Inadvertently, it was kept off that two day posting,

 even though the exemption form was filed. I've discussed

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this with both sides of the aisle. I ask leave and the use of the Attendance Boll Call that Bouse Bill 3188... the posting be suspended."

- Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, I don't have an objection, but I think
 Representative Greiman spoke to Bepresentative Vinson about
 the same service for House Bill 2732, and I thought he
 might include it in the same Motion."
- Speaker McPike: "Representative Vinson."
- Vinson: "Mr. Speaker, that will be my next Motion. 2732 has to be waived for a different Committee, and that's why I separated the Motions."
- Speaker McPike: "Are there any objections to waiving the posting requirements on House Bill 2681? Bearing no objections, the Motion carries. House Bill 2681 is posted for Bules.

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- Representative Vinson."
- Vinson: "Mr. Speaker, I would move that the appropriate rule be suspended so that House Eill 2732, sponsored by Mr. Greiman, can be heard in the Executive Committee this week."
- McPike: "The Gentleman has Speaker moved to suspend appropriate rule so that House Bill 2732 can be heard in Executive. there any objections? Hearing none, the Are Motion carries. House Bill... The appropriate rules are waived, and House Bill 2732 is posted for Executive. announcements? The Gentleman from Lake. Representative Fierce."
- Pierce: nMr. Speaker, the House Bevenue Committee does not post Bills unless the Sponsors request it. So anv ... Sponsor that has a Bill that's been assigned to the Revenue Committee by the Rules Committee or is already in the Revenue Committee should request my secretary or Ron Levin of our staff that the Bill be posted for next week because next week is the last week. If the Members are not interested enough to have their Bills posted, we're not going to post it and bring witnesses here for a Bill that's not going to be heard. So to repeat again, if you your Bill heard in Bevenue Committee next week, the last week, please request of me or Ron Levin of our staff the Eill be posted."
- Speaker McFike: "The Gentleman from Winnebago, Representative Mulcahey."
- Mulcahey: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Just to remind the Members of the Education Committee that the location has been changed for tomorrow morning's 8:00 meeting, and we will meet on the House floor at 8 a.m."
- Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from Cook, Bepresentative Terzich."

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- Terzich: "Thank you very much. You are a great Speaker,
 Representative McPike. The Executive Committee will meet
 at 8:00 tomorrow morning, and I would suggest all of the
 Sponsors, due to the substantial number of Bills that are
 assigned to the Executive Committee, that you have your
 Bills heard tomorrow, as you may not be able to have them
 heard next week and to get them out of Committee. So the
 Executive Committee will be meeting tomorrow morning at 8
 a.m. in Room 114."
- Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman from DeWitt, Representative Vinson."
- Vinson: "Mr. Speaker, I would move that the appropriate rule be suspended so that House Bill 3105 can be considered in the Bules Committee this afternoon."
- Speaker McPike: "You cleared that with our side of the aisle?"
- Vinson: "No, I haven't. As a matter of fact, a conference to consider that is just about to ensue, and I just wonder...

 I wanted to make a Motion so that we wouldn't get adjourned before that can be considered by the appropriate people."
- Speaker McPike: "Well, if you could ... "
- Vinson: "Shall I hold the Motion for a couple of minutes?"
- Speaker McPike: "Yes, if you could just clear that, then
 I'll...we'll get right back to you."
