Instruction shall be the Chief Educational Officer of the state. having general supervise... supervisory responsibility in relation to public elementary secondary schools and shall, except as provided by law. establish goals, determine policies, provide for planning evaluating education programs and recommend financing. The Superintendent shall have such other duties and powers provided by law. Transition. If this Amendment is adopted (sic - approved) by the electors at the general election of 1988, a Superintendent of Public Instruction shall be elected at the general election in 1990 for a term of four years and shall take office on the second Monday of

January after his election at which time the State Board of Education shall cease to exist. Thereafter a Superintendent of Public Instruction shall be elected in 1994 and every fourth year thereafter for a term of four years. First Reading of the Constitutional Amendment.
