Speaker McPike: "The House will come to order. The House will come to order. The Members will be in their seats. The Chaplain for today will be Pastor Alan Redfern, the Pastor from First Baptist Church of Springfield. Pastor Redfern is the guest of Representative Mike Curran. Guests in the balcony may wish to rise and join us in the invocation."

WHEREAS, The First Congress of the United States of America, at its first session begun and held March 4, 1789, sitting in New York, New York, in both houses, by a constitutional majority of two-thirds thereof, adopted the following proposition to amend the Constitution of the United States of America in the following words, to wit:

RESOLVED, by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, two thirds of both Houses concurring, that the following [Article] be proposed to the Legislatures of the several States, ... which [Article], when ratified by three-fourths of the said Legislatures, to be valid to all intents and purposes, as part of the said Constitution, viz.:

[An Article] in addition to, and Amendment of the Constitution of the United States of America, proposed by Congress, and ratified by the Legislatures of the several States, pursuant to the fifth Article of the original Constitution.

Article the second ... No law, varying the compensation for the services of the Senators and Representatives, shall take

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effect, until an election of Representatives shall have intervened; and

WHEREAS, Article V of the Constitution of the United States allows the ratification of the proposed Amendment to the United States Constitution by the General Assembly of the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, Article V of the Constitution of the United States does not dictate a time limit on ratification of an amendment submitted by Congress, and the First Congress specifically did not provide any time constraint for ratification of the above-quoted Amendment; and

WHEREAS, The Supreme Court of the United States in 1939 ruled in the landmark case of Coleman v. Miller that Congress is the final arbiter on the question of whether too much time has elapsed between Congress' submission of a particular amendment and the most recent state legislature's ratification of same if Congress did not specify a deadline on the proposal's consideration; and

WHEREAS, Section 11 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Illinois provides that "(C)hanges in the salary of a member (of the Illinois General Assembly) shall not take effect during the term for which he has been elected."; and

WHEREAS, The General Assembly of the State of Illinois finds that the proposed Amendment is still meaningful and necessary as part of the United States Constitution and that the present political, social and economic conditions are the same as or are even more demanding today than they were when the proposed Amendment was submitted for its adoption; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE EIGHTY-FIFTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that the foregoing proposed amendment to the Constitution

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of the United States is ratified by the General Assembly of the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Secretary of State of Illinois shall transmit certified copies of this resolution to the Archivist of the United States, to the Vice-President of the United States and to the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives with a request that it be printed in full in the Congressional Record.

First Reading of the Constitutional Amendment. House Joint Resolution Constitutional Amendment #24, offered by Representative Keane.

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE EIGHTY-FIFTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least six months after the adoption of this resolution, a proposition to amend Section 3 of Article VIII of the Constitution to read as follows:

ARTICLE VIII

FINANCE

SECTION 3. STATE AUDIT AND AUDITOR GENERAL

(a) The General Assembly shall provide by law for the audit of the obligation, receipt and use of public funds of the State. "Public funds of the State" means all funds administered directly or indirectly by the legislative, executive or judicial branch of the State or by any instrumentality of any branch, whether appropriated or not and whether derived from taxes, fees or any other source. The General Assembly, by a vote of three-fifths of the members elected to each house, shall appoint an Auditor General and may remove him for cause by a similar vote. The Auditor General shall serve for a term of ten years. His compensation shall be established by law and shall not be diminished, but may be increased, to take effect during his term.

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(b) The Auditor General shall conduct the audit of public funds of the State. He shall make additional reports and investigations as directed by the General Assembly. He shall report his findings and recommendations to the General Assembly and to the Governor.

SCHEDULE

This Constitutional Amendment takes effect upon adoption by the electors of this State. First Reading of the Constitutional Amendment."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Younge."

Younge: "Thank... thank you, Mr... "

Speaker McPike: "We're at ease, did you want to make an announcement?"

Younge: "Yes."

Speaker McPike: "Yeah, go ahead."

Younge: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. There are two members of the American Bottoms Drainage Problems District here with us today, and I'd like for the General Assembly to welcome them. They're Mr. Guidy Perry and Mr. Y.Z. Johnson. Let's give them a hand. Thank you."

Clerk O'Brien: "Further Introductions. House Bill 3344, Wojcik, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Public Aid Code. First Reading of the Bill. Speaker Madigan: "The House shall come to order. The House shall come to order. The Members shall be in their chairs. Speaker Madigan in the Chair. On the Calendar there appears four motions. The first motion would be on House

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Bill 960 and the Chair recognizes Mr. McPike."

McPike: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I move to take House Bill 960 from the table, suspend Rule 79(d), 79(e) and place on the Calendar on the Speaker's Table on the Order of Conference Committee Reports."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. McPike, would you explain for what purpose the motion is being offered."

McPike: "Yes, thank you. Yes, this is an appropriations - a vehicle; it's a Conference Committee Report and the sole purpose of the Conference Committee will be to put 3,000,000 dollars in the Conference Committee for CHIPs and hopefully send it to the Governor today. The program goes into effect April 1st. There is no money right now to run the program and so this will fund the program from April 1st until July 1st. So, I so move."

Speaker Madigan: "The Gentleman moves to take this matter from the table. The Chair recognizes Mr. McCracken."

McCracken: "Parliamentary inquiry before I proceed, Mr. Speaker. Does the motion take 71 votes to prevail?"

Speaker Madigan: "Yes, it does."

McCracken: "Mr. Speaker, directing the Chair's attention to Rule 74(a); the Rules require that a motion of this type not be taken up until it appears on the Daily Calendar. And I bring this up - not to forestall a consideration of this issue - but this is just another example of the use of Supplemental Calendars. The purpose, as you know, of the Calendar process is to give everybody, not only the Members of the House or the Senate, but also the public, notice of what's going on. For years now we've moved away from the use of the Daily Calendar and we've resorted to these Supplemental Calendars for apparently no good reason. So, I would move as a point of order that the Chair rule that this motion is out of order."

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Speaker Madigan: "Mr. McCracken, the Parliamentarian advises me that your point is not well taken. Mr. McCracken."

McCracken: "I'm so surprised."

Speaker Madigan: "Yes. Right. But I do want to correct one of your statements. There is a good reason, Mr. McCracken. Mr. McPike has moved that this matter be taken from the table, relative to House Bill 960. On that question, those in favor of that motion will signify by voting 'aye', those opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Mr. Bowman to explain his vote."

Bowman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I am one of the nonvoting Members of the CHIP Board and I am voting 'aye' on this. This is the main reason that we came into Session today, because the program is scheduled to go into effect April 1st, and an appropriation is needed in order to implement the starting date. The reason we didn't do this earlier is because we wanted to wait until a CHIP Board was appointed and begin work to determine what would be an adequate sum. The CHIP Board was appointed around Christmas of last year, which is barely three months ago. And in the three short months it's done a herculean task getting this thing up and running. They have... It is the unanimous opinion of the Board that 3,000,000 dollars is required to get the program up and running. So that... that is the basis for this request. I just want to stress that this is the main reason that we are back here today, so if this motion does not carry, we're going to have a real problem."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. McCracken to explain his vote."

McCracken: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like everybody to consider this fact: by virtue of the Supplemental Calendar it appears to me that we're not going to get a decision or discuss the issue of whether or not the effective date of

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the CHIPS program should be extended. We on this side of the aisle believe the responsible thing to do at this time is to extend that; and it's not just because of the money. I think that in the next few months this General Assembly, whether we extend today or not, is going to amend substantially some of the eligibility requirements for this program. If you vote for this 3,000,000 today and you pretend that there is no problem out there facing this program, both substantively and as a matter of appropriations, you're mistaken. We are going to be allowing people to sign up by this vote today - we're going to allow people to sign up April 1st. We're going to change the eligibility between now and the end of June, because we're going to find it's necessary to a proper running of the... of... of... of the Board and program. And we're going to be sued. The State of Illinois is going to be sued by thousands of people, signing up between April 1st and the end of the Session. They're going to be suing because they have a contract right, they claim, to the program as we allowed them to sign up on April 1st. Don't take this move today. Mr. Speaker, I ask you - let this Body consider whether the program effective date should be continued, not only whether to fund in a nominal amount, this 3,000,000 dollars. I'm asking my colleagues and people who agree with me, only for the purpose of getting that vote to the floor, to vote 'no' on this motion. We can stop this motion right now. We can force the Speaker to take a responsible position on this issue. Please vote 'present' or 'no' on this motion."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Preston to explain his vote."

Preston: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I think we're talking all around the issue of this motion. I think this program is so essential to so many people in this state, who may,

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while we're debating this issue - over the next three months - die. They might drop dead because they have illnesses for which they are not covered by insurance, and we're depriving them of funding that will enable them to gain that insurance during this three months while we debate the fine points of: Should we do it now? Should we solve the whole problem later? And explain that to a family of someone who just passed away because they couldn't afford medical assistance. That's what we're talking about here. We have no right. We have an obligation to the people of this state to fund the 3,000,000 dollars and then move forward to fund the rest of it. But at least to start that today so somebody, somebody has a saved life because of what we do here today. So I hope I can see more green votes up there."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr... Mr. Regan to explain his vote."

Regan: "Thank you, Mr. Chairman (sic - Speaker), Members of the House. I also am on the CHIP Board. A Board that's worked very diligently in the last two months, many, many long hours of hard work to get this ready to go in April 1st. It's a needed program, but what we've discovered with the research that we've done is that the fiscal impact that we looked at 18 months ago has drastically changed because the cost of health care is soaring now, where it was flat for a couple of years. The cost of this program is not 3,000,000 dollars, Ladies and Gentlemen, that's just to get people enrolled right now; that's three months. It's 20,000,000 dollars that's going to be needed and maybe more than that later... for the year. What's going to happen is there's 3,700 prudential people out there that have coverage right now. It's very expensive coverage. They're going to leave the prudential non-cancelable plan and come to this plan because it's less expensive. And then this plan may

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self-destruct without changes. They're going to be left without any insurance out there. What we're going to be doing with this, is we're going to be hurting the people who are trying to... to help and I think we've got to postpone it for a while."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Huff to explain his vote."

Huff: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Very briefly, I rise to support this motion. You know, we're so quick and proud to espouse the fact that we're the richest nation of the world. We never stop to qualify that only five percent of the population holds those riches. Here's a chance to put an unequivocal 'aye' for the 95 percent of us who don't have that riches."

Speaker Madigan: "Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk shall take the record. On this question there are 64 'ayes', 11 'nos'. The motion fails. House Bill 981. The Chair recognizes Mr. Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Yes, thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I move to take from the table and suspend Rule 79(d) and 79(e) and place it on the Calendar on the Order of Concurrences, House Bill 981. House Bill 981 will become the... is a vehicle that will become the Bill that deals with the Botanical Garden. The Botanical Garden is located in suburban Cook County. There's a need for 6,000,000 dollars, due to the fact that the... the garden has grown. In 1987 more than 500,000 people visited the garden. The attendance has increased seventy-six percent since 1984. The purpose of the money is to... not to develop gardens in the... and visitors' structures because that has been raised through foundations, individuals and corporations. By the way, the garden is obviously not just used by people from Cook County. It's had visitors from throughout the midwest, throughout the world for that

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matter. The money would be used for a bond issue, which will be used for sight improvements, including a new public toilets, water lines for fire protection, roadway improvements, stabilization of shoreline erosion and increase maintenance facilities. So I would appreciate your support on the motion. Be happy to answer any questions."

Speaker Madigan: "The Gentleman has moved that this matter be taken from the table. There being no discussion, the question is, 'Shall this motion be adopted?' Those in favor signify by voting 'aye', those opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk shall take the record. On this question there are 61 'ayes', 18 'nos'... Representative Jones. Record Representative Jones as 'aye'. On this question there are 62 'ayes', 18 'nos'. The motion fails. Senate Bill 688, Mr. McPike."

McPike: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I move to... let me defer to Representative Bowman on this. He said he would like to make this motion."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Bowman."

Bowman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I now move to suspend Rule 79(d) and 79(e) and place on the Calendar on the Order of Conference Committee Reports. This particular piece of legislation is the substantive changes in the CHIP law. The CHIP Board has met and considered implementation and discovered some ambiguities and items needing clarification. There are also some cost control items in this legislation. For example: Deleting the 250 dollar deductible plan. But by and large, it leaves the plan in tact and has the unanimous support of the Board. So I move adoption of this motion."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Regan."

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Regan: "Yes, I totally agree with my cohort on the other side of the aisle. The changes that are in this program will help, in the future, get this program underway. I... I'd advise an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Madigan: "Those in favor of the motion will signify by voting 'aye', those opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. McCracken."

McCracken: "Just briefly, to explain my vote, Mr. Speaker. We are not hostile to the CHIP's legislation. But this is only one of a number of changes that are going to come along this spring. And if you want to avoid the morass that we could step into if... if... if we didn't do it otherwise, ask the Speaker to allow us to consider for a vote putting off the effective date of the Bill, putting off the effective date of the Act. This is good legislation. We're not hostile to CHIPS, but we've got to put it off and get it in order before it takes an effective date."

Speaker Madigan: "On this question there are 110 'ayes', no one voting 'no'. The motion is adopted. Senate Bill 897. Mr. White."

White: "Mr... Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I move to suspend the appropriate rule so that Senate Bill 897 can be placed on the Calendar on the Order of Conference Committee Report."

Speaker Madigan: "The Gentleman moves to take this matter from the table. There being no discussion, the question is, 'Shall this motion be adopted?' Those in favor signify by voting 'aye', those opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk shall take the record. On this question there are 99 'ayes', 3 'nos'. The motion is adopted. Is there anything else to come before the Body? We are not prepared to adjourn. Two motions were adopted,

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which will permit us to print a Supplemental Calendar, for Mr. McCracken, to permit the consideration of the actual Conference Reports. So if the Members could stand at ease just for a short time."

This is otherwise... otherwise known as the Mayor's Summit Committee and I invite all interested parties to attend. Wednesday... It starts Wednesday from twelve to four; and Thursday, nine to one. Everyone that's interested is invited. And this will be one of the stellar issues of this Session. Thank you very much."

Clerk O'Brien: "Further Introductions. House Bill 3374, offered by Representative Leverenz, a Bill for an Act to add Sections of the Consumer Fraud and Deceptive Business Practice Act. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 3375, Hartke, a Bill for an Act to amend the Wildlife Code. First Reading of the Bill. Speaker Madigan: "The House will come to order. Members will be in their chairs. On the Calendar there appears Senate Bill 897. The Chair recognizes Mr. McNamara. Is Mr. McNamara

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in the chamber? Mr. McNamara."

McNamara: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. The Conference Committee on Senate Bill 897 rectifies a situation in a district which encompasses ten towns in our area of which that district was taken over by one particular town; then the population of that school was dispersed to suit the racial situation that that's... that particular town wanted. This is not a Bill that is racially motivated since both blacks and whites outside of that town all agree that it is time for the school district for ten towns to be separated in seven special districts that... comprise of the board of equal population. That ensures that no one town can ever again take over a complete school board in that district. This happens in school district 218 and the main reason for it obviously is, is because it is one of the largest school districts within the State of Illinois. This is a very important measure. We are merely trying to get the referendum on the ballot in November to split it into seven like population areas to amend a Bill, to... to do it at this November election and to elect the school board at the following election which will be a year from now, which would be 1989 at the regular school board election for the new district members. I'll be happy to entertain any questions on this motion."

Speaker Madigan: "Is there any discussion? Representative Barnes."

Barnes: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This is a very important matter that also comes over into the 38th Legislative District, and we have been working very seriously and hard on this, and all of our constituents are hoping that you will help us solve this problem today."

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Speaker Madigan: "Mr. McNamara on the Report."

McNamara: "Thank you very much. I think it's pretty well self-explanatory and I just urge your 'aye' votes in helping out both of these districts and a very serious problem. Thank you."

Bowman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the
House. The items embodied in this Conference Committee
Report are for the most part technical cleanup matters that
have been requested by the Board of the Comprehensive
Health Insurance Plan, of which I'm a nonvoting member.
I'm joined in this by Representative Regan, who's also a
nonvoting member. As the Board met to implement the law,
they discovered some ambiguities and some omissions that
needed clarification and made these recommendations to us.
There are some cost control features in it; however the...
the basic underlined program is left in tact. I sight
probably the most prominent cost control feature is the

Speaker Madigan: "How would you like to be recorded?"

Speaker Madigan: "'Present'. Representative Younger, 'aye'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question there are 90 'ayes', no one voting 'no'. The House does adopt the First Conference Committee Report on Senate Bill 688, and the Bill, having received the required Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. Mr. Clerk, what do you have? Agreed Resolution."

Daniels: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gent..."

Speaker McPike: "...Representative, excuse me. Representative Mautino, could you pay attention to these remarks, please."

Daniels: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, we're trying to locate somebody with red hair so we can talk about her. Is she in the chamber? Anyone know anyone with red hair?"

Speaker McPike: "Well, there's someone standing back by Representative Mautino."

Daniels: "I wonder... we identify her? Well, I think she's the subject of a House Resolution, Mr. Speaker, that talked about her distinguished service in the Executive Branch of State Government and her decision to embark on a new phase in her career. The financial institutions in Illinois that are members of the Illinois Banking Association will now enjoy the benefits of her talent and experience. And, of course, I talk of none other than our own Pam McDonough, who is a... Sparse applause, I mean, you... you have no idea, Pam, how long we had to work just to get that applause, but we'll... we'll try to increase it as we go along. The Resolution tells, of course, about your service at State Government, including a decade of distinguished service to the people of the State of Illinois. Key positions including the Departments of Administrative Services, the Capital Development Board, the Department of

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Transportation, Public Aid and the Governor's Legislative Office and, of course, as one of his Chief Legislative Operators here in the State Capitol and a friend of all of ours on both sides of the aisle. Pam of course, took major lead roles in the issues affecting reform of state welfare system, stiffer child support laws, Build Illinois, gas tax increases and the list goes on and on and on as to her service - not only on behalf of the Governor - but also on behalf of the Legislative Branch. We, of course, have been extremely pleased to have the benefit - not only of her hard work, her brightness and intelligence - but also of her friendship, her humorous manner and at times being able to just shift right through an issue to get to the bottom line of the critical Resolution that need to be done. Now, Jim McPike and I talked just a few moments ago, and we said we'd like to tell something humorous about Pam. I mean, we'd like to talk about such things as empty sacks of air to go when she would bring our lunches and pretend that it was lunches, but it was really empty sacks of air to go and... and food raids that she would conduct in our various offices. But, I don't know, Mr. Speaker, I... I think we decided that some of the stories that we could tell, we didn't want to tell or couldn't tell on the Illinois House floor, was that correct?"

Speaker McPike: "All of the stories."

Daniels: "But let me just say that I would encourage each one of you, as you look throughout your memory of people that have served this government in this state and people that have worked so hard for Illinois and its citizens, I dare you almost to find somebody that could be paralleled with Pam McDonough. Because she has an uncanny ability to get the job done and at the same time to make you feel comfortable and that you're doing the right thing. I know that when

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Pam came to my office to tell me that she was going to join the Bankers Association, of course, I knew right then and there, we'd probably all become friends of the IBA at that point, start sponsoring all this crazy legislation that they want to pass. But on the other hand I knew, too, that we in the Legislative Branch were losing truly an effective and an outstanding person that supported each and every one of us in our own right. She has as many friends on the Democrat side of the aisle as she has on the Republican side of the aisle..."

Speaker McPike: "More."

Daniels: "She has more friends on the Democrat side of the aisle... That's what you think, Teddy. But, I could tell you this, Pam, on behalf of all of us, we've enjoyed your participation here. We wish you just every bit of success and good luck in your new chosen field. And we hope that what this will mean now is that you'll be able to share even more time with us than you did before. So, with that good luck. Congratulations."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Currie."

Currie: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. I, too, speaking for people on this side of the aisle, agree that she does... does spend more time with us than she does with the people on the other side of the chamber - not because there are more of us, perhaps because we're harder to persuade of the brilliance and the wondrousness of the Governor's program. But I would say Pam McDonough has given a lot of class to the Governor's program and to this House floor. Her sense of style and her sense of leadership are not unparalleled by, I think, any among us and certainly by any others among the Governor's staff. I'm sure her family will be happy to see a bit more of her. She won't have to be with us through all the long hours,

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only through the bankers' hours that we put in during the coming Session. Pam, you've been a great and good friend to Democrats as well as Republicans. You've certainly been a major asset of the Thompson Administration. I'm sure we will all miss you, but we'll welcome your work with us for the bankers."

Speaker Matijevich: "On the order of... on the order of Pam McDonough, the Majority Leader from Madison County, Jim McPike."

McPike: "Well, thank you, Mr. Speaker. It would be tough to say goodbye to Pam, and fortunately she's not leaving, so it's not very difficult to get up and compliment her. I doubt if... if she spends more time with any Legislator in the last five years than she has with me. I don't know of any staff person for the Governor that works as hard as Pam. She is... she comes to my office, many times eight o'clock in the morning, and goes over all the legislation for the week. I know she works Sunday nights preparing... going through every Bill and... and many times she's come in to... for us to go over three or four hundred Bills, and I know she's stayed up late Sunday night just to do it. During the week she's there at eight o'clock in the morning or if I want to talk to her at 7:30 at night before we leave for the evening, she's willing to come by and spend another half hour, forty-five minutes, and sometimes when I finish eating dinner with the Speaker, she's in the... in the bar at Baur's for some more friendly talk. I tell ya, Pam, you're... you're a great... a great lady. You've been... the hardest working staff person that I've seen up here working for the Governor. And I think everyone this... on this side of the aisle - and hopefully, most of the General Assembly - calls you a... a good friend. You certainly have been to me. And we'll miss you. Thanks."

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Speaker Matijevich: "Thank you. And the... I think the Resolution was adopted earlier. It was a close vote, Pam. Representative Regan, for what purpose do you seek attention?"

Regan: "Mr. Speaker, I was called to the Senate at the time that the Conference Committee Report on Senate Bill 688 came through. I'd like to be reported as an 'aye' vote there, please."

Speaker Matijevich: "That will be noted in the Journal. Speaker Madigan in the Chair."

Speaker Madigan: "Agreed Resolution."

Clerk Leone: "House Resolution 1207, offered by Representative Keane."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Speaker, I move the adoption. This is agreed."

Speaker Madigan: "Those in favor say 'aye', those opposed say 'no'. Mr. Clerk, anything further?"

Clerk Leone: "A Death Resolution."

Speaker Madigan: "Ladies and Gentlemen, we shall... we are prepared to adjourn and we shall adjourn upon the adoption of a Death Resolution for a former Member. So would all Members please be in their chairs and would staff retire to the rear of the chamber. Mr. Clerk, read the Resolution."

Clerk Leone: "House Resolution 1143, offered by Representatives Churchill - Matijevich - Virginia Frederick - Peterson and Klemm."

WHEREAS, The House learned with sorrow of the death of John Conolly, a fifth generation member of a Lake County pioneer family, a state lawmaker for a dozen years and a chief architect of the Regional Transportation Authority mass transit system; and

WHEREAS, Elected to the Illinois House of Representatives in 1962, at the age of 27, Mr. Conolly was elected to five straight

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terms in the House and one term in the Illinois Senate as a Republican from the 31st District; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Conolly was chairman of the Senate Transportation Committee, and, in the House, he was chairman of the Public Utilities Committee; he was also a member of the Illinois Legislative Council, the research arm of the General Assembly, and its chairman from 1967 to 1971; and

WHEREAS, In 1971, Mr. Conolly was elected president of the National Legislative Conference, and, in 1972, he was appointed by President Richard Nixon to the Committee on State and Local Government Cooperation, an advisory panel to the President's Cost of Living Council; and

WHEREAS, John Conolly's great-great-grandfather, David Ballentine, served as mayor of the village of Little Fort and, later, of Waukegan, where Mr. Conolly was born on June 4, 1935; John grew up in Gurnee, attended Lake Forest Academy, and graduated from Michigan State University; and

WHEREAS, A lifelong Republican, he served as a page to the Illinois delegation during the national Republican conventions in 1952, 1956, and 1960; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Conolly's stand on the RTA cost him the 1974 election, and, following that, he was appointed to the Illinois Transportation Study Commission; and

WHEREAS, A stockbroker and founder of Conolly and Company, the county's oldest investment firm, he worked as a registered lobbyist in recent years; and

WHEREAS, John Conolly leaves to cherish his memory: his children, John, Jr., and Suzanne, both of Lake Forest; his brother, Robert, of Jacksonville, Florida; his sister, Ellen

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Whitmore, of Libertyville; and a host of other relatives and friends; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE EIGHTY-FIFTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we express our deep sorrow at the death of John Conolly; that we offer our sincere condolences to his family; and that we join with his many friends in honoring his memory; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this preamble and resolution be presented to the family of John Conolly with our deepest sympathy. And as a further token of our deep sorrow, the House will now stand adjourned."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Churchill."

Churchill: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. John Conolly was a Legislator many years before I came down here, but when I first came down here, it was John Conolly who first came to me to talk to me about what the Legislature meant to him. Generally, I found John to be a very nice guy. He was always jovial, he had a smile for everyone. But there was a serious side to him; a side that many people never saw, but it was a side of concern for the people of Lake County and for the people of the State of Illinois. John was a hard working Legislator when he was here. He was here at a young age, his career was over here at a young age. But in the time that he was here, he proved that he had foresight. He proved that he had the guts to do what was right even if it was not politically expedient. Perhaps it was the RTA, for which he is known as the chief architect, which was the cause of his political demise. But it was his ability to see what was necessary for the metropolitan area for the State of Illinois in transportation that allowed him to go on and to work on that project and to finally get its passage. John

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was a great guy. We're going to miss him a lot in Lake County. He worked awfully hard for the Republican Party. And I know the Legislature... Legislators who served with him, will miss him for the time that they did spend here with him. At this point I would move for the Death Resolution and ask that all Members be joined as Sponsors."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, from both this side of the aisle and myself as a colleague of John Conolly who ran with John when we had a multimember districts, I would like to add my words of condolence. John was an easy person to run with. He understood his constituency and I understood my constituency and that made it very easy. He and I rode together often to Springfield, so I got to understand and know and appreciate John Conolly. He came to the Legislature at a young age and loved the legislative process. The fact that he came here at a young age made it very difficult losing an election. Every time I talked to John afterward, you could just tell on his face how much he loved this process. And he left a mark - not only on the Legislature - but on the quality of life. The fact that he lost because of the Regional Transportation Authority, now as we look back on it, that was a necessary authority and it has made the transportation system better in Illinois and certainly in the six county region... regional area. So I offer my condolences and may God's blessings rest with John eternally."

Speaker Madigan: "You've all heard the motion. Those in favor signify by saying 'aye', those opposed say 'no'. The Resolution is adopted and the House does stand adjourned to... What's our next date? April 12th. We stand adjourned until April 12, providing some perfunctory time

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this afternoon for the Introduction of Bills. Thank you very much."

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE EIGHTY-FIFTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least six months after the adoption of this resolution, a proposition to repeal Sections 8 and 12 of and to amend Sections 10, 11, 13, 14, 15 and 16 of and to add Sections 12.1, 12.2, 12.3 and 12.4 to Article VI of the 1970 Illinois Constitution, the amended and added Sections to read as follows:

ARTICLE VI

SECTION 10. TERMS OF OFFICE

The initial term for each Judge appointed to office under

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Section 12.1 shall be until the first Monday in December following the third general election after his or her appointment. Thereafter, if retained in office pursuant to the provisions of Section 12.3 the term of office for all Judges shall be 10 years. Terms of office of Supreme, Appellate and Circuit Judges previously elected shall expire at the end of the term for which they were elected.

~~The terms of office of Supreme and Appellate Court Judges shall be ten years; of Circuit Judges, six years; and of Associate Judges, four years.~~

SECTION 11. ELIGIBILITY FOR OFFICE

No person shall be eligible to be a Judge ~~or Associate Judge~~ unless he or she is a United States citizen, a licensed attorney-at-law of this State, and a resident of the unit which selects him or her. No change in the boundaries of a unit shall affect the tenure in office of a Judge ~~or Associate Judge~~ incumbent at the time of such change.

SECTION 12.1. SELECTION OF JUDGES

(a) Supreme, Appellate and Circuit Judges shall be appointed by the Governor from nominees submitted by Judicial Nominating Commissions, except when appointed by the Supreme Court in accordance with subsection (e) of this Section.

(b) The office of a Judge shall be vacant upon his or her death, resignation, retirement, removal or upon conclusion of a term without retention in office, or whenever an increase in the number of Judges is authorized.

(c) As soon as a vacancy occurs in the office of Judge or will occur within 6 months by a day certain, the Administrative Director of the Illinois Courts shall promptly notify the Chair of the appropriate Judicial Nominating Commission, who shall immediately convene the Commission.

(d) Within 42 days after the receipt of such notice of a

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vacancy, the Commission shall submit to the Governor and make public a list of 3 nominees in alphabetical order, who by their character, background, temperament, professional aptitude, experience and commitment to equal justice under law are deemed by the Commission to be best qualified to fill the vacancy. All such persons shall have the right to be considered for selection by a Judicial Nominating Commission free from discrimination on the basis of race, color, creed, national ancestry or sex. No member of a Judicial Nominating Commission may be appointed to State judicial office while serving on the commission or for a period of 3 years thereafter. The Commission may not include on a list a nominee who is on another list then pending before the Governor or the Supreme Court pursuant to subsection (e) of this Section to fill a vacancy in the same judicial office. The function of a list shall terminate upon the making of the required appointment therefrom.

(e) Not fewer than 28 nor more than 56 days after the receipt of a list, the Governor shall appoint therefrom a person to fill the vacancy. If no appointment is made by the Governor within 56 days, the Commission shall immediately submit the list to the Supreme Court, which shall make the appointment from the list within 28 days from its receipt.

(f) A person appointed to fill a vacancy pursuant to this Section shall serve an initial term equal to the term specified in Section 10.

(g) The office of associate Judge is abolished and all Associate Judges in office as of the effective date of this Amendment shall assume the office of Circuit Judge. Retention procedures for such Judges shall be pursuant to the provisions of Section 12.3. The terms of all such Judges, except for those in the Cook County Circuit, shall conclude on the first Monday in December following the next general election. The terms of such Judges in the Cook County Circuit shall conclude pursuant to the

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following provisions:

The Administrative Director of the Illinois Courts shall forthwith divide such Judges into 3 groups, by lot, equal in number as near as may be, with terms to expire as follows:

Group 1 on the first Monday in December after the next general election following adoption of this Amendment.

Group 2 on the first Monday in December after the second general election following adoption of this Amendment.

Group 3 on the first Monday in December after the third general election following adoption of this Amendment.

SECTION 12.2. JUDICIAL NOMINATING COMMISSIONS

(a) In each Judicial District, a Judicial Nominating Commission shall be created and empowered to nominate Judges for the Supreme and Appellate Courts for that District, and in each Judicial Circuit, a separate Judicial Nominating Commission shall be created and empowered to nominate Circuit Judges for that Circuit.

(b) (1) In each District and Circuit containing more than three million people, Judicial Nominating Commissions shall consist of fifteen members: eight non-lawyers and seven lawyers. Two of the non-lawyer members and four lawyer members who shall be residents of the District or Circuit shall be appointed from the District or Circuit at large. Two non-lawyers and one lawyer shall be appointed from each of three subdistricts within the District or Circuit and they shall be residents of the subdistrict from which they are appointed. Such subdistricts shall be determined on the basis of population by the legislature in like manner to that provided for legislative redistricting in Article IV, Section 3.

(2) In each district and circuit containing 3 million or fewer people, Judicial Nominating Commissions shall consist of 11 members: 6 non-lawyers and 5 lawyers. All non-lawyer and lawyer members shall be residents of the district or circuit in which

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they serve.

(c) Half of the non-lawyer members of each Judicial Nominating Commission shall be appointed by the Attorney General and the other half by the State official or officer first in the order indicated who was elected to office and is not affiliated with the same political party as the Attorney General: the Secretary of State, the Comptroller, the Treasurer, the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Minority Leader of the Senate.

(d) The lawyer members of each Judicial Nominating Commission shall be selected by the Supreme Court pursuant to Rule. Not more than a simple majority of the lawyers appointed shall be primary electors of the same political party.

(e) Upon appointment of the initial non-lawyer members of each Judicial Nominating Commission, the Attorney General shall divide the appointees by lot into 3 groups equal in number as near as may be with one of his or her appointees in each group, and shall by lot designate the groups to serve initial terms of 2, 4, and 6 years, respectively. The initial lawyer members of each Judicial Nominating Commission shall also be divided by lot into 3 groups equal in number as near as may be, and the groups shall by lot be designated to serve initial terms of 2, 4, and 6 years, respectively, all in such manner as provided by Supreme Court Rule. Thereafter, the terms of all Commission members shall be 6 years.

(f) A vacancy in the non-lawyer membership of a Judicial Nominating Commission shall be filled for an unexpired term or for a full term, as the case may be, by the Attorney General if qualified by being affiliated with the same political party as the official or officer who had appointed the person whose vacancy is to be filled, otherwise by the official or officer who is so qualified and first in the order indicated in subsection (c) of this Section. A vacancy in the lawyer membership of a Judicial

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Nominating Commission shall be filled for an unexpired term or for a full term, as the case may be, by the Supreme Court pursuant to Rule.

(g) The Chair of each Judicial Nominating Commission shall be selected by majority vote of all the members of the Commission. The term of a Chair shall be 3 years unless his or her remaining term as a member of the Commission expires sooner.

(h) Any person who holds any office under the United States or this State or any political subdivision or municipal corporation or municipality or unit of local government of this State and receives compensation for services rendered in such office, or who holds any office or official position in a political party, shall be ineligible to serve on a Judicial Nominating Commission. Compensation for service in the State militia or the armed services of the United States for such period of time as may be determined by Supreme Court Rule shall not be considered a disqualification. No member of a Judicial Nominating Commission may be appointed to judicial office while serving on the Commission or for a period of 3 years thereafter.

(i) A member having served a full term of 6 years on a Judicial Nominating Commission may not serve on a Judicial Nominating Commission during the next 3 years. No person may serve on more than one Judicial Nominating or Review Commission at the same time, and except for initial members of Judicial Nominating Commissions appointed for two-year terms, no member may be reappointed to successive terms.

(j) The Commissions may conduct such investigations, meetings and hearings, all of which may be confidential, and employ such staff members as may be necessary to perform their duties. Members of the Commissions shall not receive any compensation for their services but shall be entitled to reimbursement for necessary expenses. The General Assembly shall appropriate funds to the Supreme Court for such reimbursement and for all other

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administrative expenses of the Commissions.

(k) Nominations shall be submitted to the Governor only upon concurrence of not less than 3/5 of all members of the Commission.

(l) All members of each Judicial Nominating Commission shall be subject to ethics and economic disclosure requirements as provided by law.

SECTION 12.3. RETENTION PROCEDURES

(a) Not more than twelve nor less than ten months before the general election next preceding the expiration of the term of office of a Supreme, Appellate or Circuit Judge, he or she may file in the office of the Administrative Director of the Illinois Courts a declaration of candidacy for retention in that office. Any Judge who holds office pursuant to appointment by the Supreme Court to fill a vacancy prior to the effective date of this Amendment shall not be eligible for retention in the office to which he or she was appointed. Such Judge shall be eligible for selection pursuant to Section 12.1. Six months before the general election next preceding the expiration of the term of office of such Judge, the Administrative Director of the Illinois Courts shall notify the Chair of the appropriate Judicial Review Commission of the Judge's candidacy. The Chair shall then promptly convene the Commission.

(b) If by concurrence of not less than 3/5 of its members the Commission finds the candidate to be qualified to serve another term, the candidate shall be retained in office for a full term commencing on the first Monday in December following the election. The standard for determining qualifications to serve another term shall be the same used to determine whether a person shall be recommended to fill a vacancy pursuant to subsection (d) of Section 12.1. Not less than 84 days before the election, the Commission shall prepare and submit to each candidate its finding as to whether that candidate is qualified or not qualified to serve another term. Not less than 77 days before the election,

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the Commission shall submit to the Administrative Director of the Illinois Courts a list stating by name: (i) which candidates it has found qualified to serve another term; (ii) which candidates it has found not qualified; and (iii) which candidates have withdrawn their candidacy by written notification to the Commission.

(c) A Judge found not qualified for retention by a Judicial Review Commission shall have the right to stand for retention by the electorate at the general election. Such Judge shall file in the office of the Secretary of State, not less than 65 days before the election, a declaration of candidacy for retention by the electorate. Not less than 63 days before the election, the Secretary of State shall certify the Judge's candidacy to the proper election officials. At the election, the name of each such Judge who has timely filed a declaration of candidacy for retention by the electorate shall be submitted to the electors, separately and without party designation, on the sole question of retention in office for another term. Retention elections shall be conducted at general elections in the appropriate Judicial Districts and Circuits. The affirmative vote of 3/5 of the electors voting on the question of retention shall retain a Judge in that office for a full term commencing on the first Monday in December following the election.

(d) A Judge eligible to file a declaration of candidacy for retention who fails to do so within the times herein specified, or having filed, withdraws his or her candidacy or fails of retention, shall vacate the office on the first Monday in December following the election, whether or not a successor shall yet have qualified. If an incumbent Judge, eligible to do so, does not timely file a declaration of candidacy for retention, the selection of a successor, if any, shall proceed immediately in the manner provided in Section 12.1 so that the successor may take office as soon as a vacancy occurs.

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(e) An authorized reduction in the number of Judges shall be without prejudice to the right of Judges in office at the time to seek retention in accordance with the provisions of this Section. The reduction shall become effective when a vacancy occurs in the affected unit.

SECTION 12.4. JUDICIAL REVIEW COMMISSIONS

(a) In each Judicial District, a Judicial Review Commission shall be created and empowered to determine qualifications for retention of Supreme and Appellate Judges, and in each Judicial Circuit, a Judicial Review Commission shall be created and empowered to determine qualifications for retention of Circuit Judges.

(b) The members of a Judicial Review Commission shall be appointed as provided by subsections (b), (c) and (d) of Section 12.2 with respect to members of a Judicial Nominating Commission.

(c) The terms of all members of a Judicial Review Commission shall begin 6 months before the general election in each year in which a general election is held, and shall expire on the first Monday in November of the same year. Appointments to a Judicial Review Commission may not be made earlier than 45 days before the term is to commence.

(d) A vacancy in the membership of a Judicial Review Commission shall be promptly filled as provided in subsection (f) of Section 12.2 with respect to vacancies on a Judicial Nominating Commission.

(e) The Chair of each Judicial Review Commission shall be elected by majority vote of all the members of the Commission. The term of a Chair shall be 6 months.

(f) Judicial Review Commissions shall be governed by the provisions of subsections (h), (i), (j) and (l) of Section 12.2 with respect to Judicial Nominating Commissions, as well as by this Section.

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SECTION 13. PROHIBITED ACTIVITIES

(a) The Supreme Court shall adopt rules of conduct for Judges ~~and Associate Judges.~~

(b) Judges ~~and Associate Judges~~ shall devote full time to judicial duties. They shall not practice law, hold a position of profit, hold office under the United States or this State or unit of local government or school district or in a political party. Service in the State militia or armed forces of the United States for periods of time permitted by rule of the Supreme Court shall not disqualify a person from serving as a Judge ~~or Associate Judge.~~

SECTION 14. JUDICIAL SALARIES AND EXPENSES - FEE OFFICERS
ELIMINATED

Judges shall receive salaries provided by law which shall not be diminished to take effect during their terms of office. All salaries and such expenses as may be provided by law shall be paid by the State, except that Appellate and Circuit ~~and Associate~~ Judges shall receive such additional compensation from counties within their district or circuit as may be provided by law. There shall be no fee officers in the judicial system.

SECTION 15. RETIREMENT - DISCIPLINE

(a) The General Assembly may provide by law for the retirement of Judges ~~and Associate Judges~~ at a prescribed age. Any retired Judge ~~or Associate Judge~~, with his or her consent, may be assigned by the Supreme Court to judicial service for which he or she shall receive the applicable compensation in lieu of retirement benefits. ~~A retired Associate Judge may be assigned only as an Associate Judge.~~

(b) A Judicial Inquiry Board is created. The Supreme Court shall select two Circuit Judges as members and the Governor shall appoint four persons who are not lawyers and three lawyers as

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members of the Board. No more than two of the lawyers and two of the non-lawyers appointed by the Governor shall be members of the same political party. The terms of Board members shall be four years. A vacancy on the Board shall be filled for a full term in the manner the original appointment was made. No member may serve on the Board more than eight years.

(c) The Board shall be convened permanently, with authority to conduct investigations, receive or initiate complaints concerning a Judge ~~or Associate Judge~~, and file complaints with the Courts Commission. The Board shall not file a complaint unless five members believe that a reasonable basis exists (1) to charge the Judge ~~or Associate Judge~~ with willful misconduct in office, persistent failure to perform his or her duties, or other conduct that is prejudicial to the administration of justice or that brings the judicial office into disrepute, or (2) to charge that the Judge ~~or Associate Judge~~ is physically or mentally unable to perform his or her duties. All proceedings of the Board shall be confidential except the filing of a complaint with the Courts Commission. The Board shall prosecute the complaint.

(d) The Board shall adopt rules governing its procedures. It shall have subpoena power and authority to appoint and direct its staff. Members of the Board who are not Judges shall receive per diem compensation and necessary expenses; members who are Judges shall receive necessary expenses only. The General Assembly by law shall appropriate funds for the operation of the Board.

(e) A Courts Commission is created consisting of one Supreme Court Judge selected by that Court, who shall be its chair ~~chairman~~, two Appellate Court Judges selected by that Court, and two Circuit Judges selected by the Supreme Court. The Commission shall be convened permanently to hear complaints filed by the Judicial Inquiry Board. The Commission shall have authority after notice and public hearing, (1) to remove from office, suspend without pay, censure or reprimand a Judge ~~or Associate Judge~~ for

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willful misconduct in office, persistent failure to perform his or her duties, or other conduct that is prejudicial to the administration of justice or that brings the judicial office into disrepute, or (2) to suspend, with or without pay, or retire a Judge ~~or Associate Judge~~ who is physically or mentally unable to perform his or her duties.

(f) The concurrence of three members of the Commission shall be necessary for a decision. The decision of the Commission shall be final.

(g) The Commission shall adopt rules governing its procedures and shall have power to issue subpoenas. The General Assembly shall provide by law for the expenses of the Commission.

SECTION 16. ADMINISTRATION

General administrative and supervisory authority over all courts is vested in the Supreme Court and shall be exercised by the Chief Justice in accordance with its rules. The Supreme Court shall appoint an administrative director and staff, who shall serve at its pleasure, to assist the Chief Justice in his or her duties. The Supreme Court may assign a Judge temporarily to any court ~~and an Associate Judge to serve temporarily as an Associate Judge on any Circuit Court~~. The Supreme Court shall provide by rule for expeditious and inexpensive appeals.

SCHEDULE

If approved by the electors, this Amendment shall take effect the next day following proclamation of the result of the vote, except that, to provide time for thoughtful compliance, Judicial Nominating Commissions shall be empanelled by the following April 1st and the Administrative Director of the Illinois Courts shall not certify any judicial vacancies until the following July 1st. A vacancy occurring in any judicial office may be filled, until the following July 1st, as provided in Section 12(c), Article VI, of the Constitution adopted in 1970 effective July 1, 1971, but

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only for a term ending upon the selection of a Judge to fill the vacancy pursuant to Section 12.1. First Reading of this Constitutional Amendment."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Joint Resolution Constitutional Amendment #26 offered by Representative Preston and Giglio.

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE EIGHTY-FIFTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least six months after the adoption of this resolution, a proposition to amend Section 11 of Article VI of the Constitution to read as follows:

ARTICLE VI

SECTION 11. ELIGIBILITY FOR OFFICE

No person shall be eligible to be a Judge or Associate Judge unless he is a United States citizen, a licensed attorney-at-law of this State, and has been admitted to the practice of law in this State or another jurisdiction for at least 10 years prior to his tenure as a Judge or Associate Judge, and is a resident of the unit which selects him. No change in the boundaries of a unit shall affect the tenure in office of a Judge or Associate Judge incumbent at the time of such change.
