The General Assembly by law may exempt from taxation only the property of the State, units of local government and school districts; and property used exclusively for agricultural and horticultural societies, and for school, religious, cemetery and charitable purposes; and property of congressionally chartered veterans' organizations improved with structures which are post homes or are used exclusively for meetings or other activities of veterans' organizations.
