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- Speaker Wojcik: "The House will come to order. The members will be in their chairs. Representative Wojcik in the Chair. - Speaker Wojcik: "Roll Call for Attendance. Representative Currie is recognized to report any excused absences of the Democratic side of the aisle Representative."
- Currie: "Thank you, Speaker. Let the record show that Representatives Shirley Jones, Martinez and Stroger are all excused today."
- Speaker Wojcik: "With leave of the House the Journal will so indicate. Representative Cross is recognized to report any excused absences on the Republican side of the aisle.

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- Representative Cross."
- Cross: "Thank you, Madam Speaker. I ask that the Journal show that Representative Deuchler be excused."
- Speaker Wojcik: "With leave of the House the Journal will so indicate. Mr. Clerk, take the record. There are 114 Members answering the roll call and a quorum is present.

 Are there any announcements? Representative Biggins, for what purpose to you rise?"
- Biggins: "Thank you, thank you Madam Speaker. I rise on a point of parliamentary procedure."
- Speaker Wojcik: "State your procedure."
- Biggins "The rules state that when addressing the Speaker, the title should be either Madam Speaker or Mr. Speaker, and not just Speaker. My esteemed colleague on the other side of the aisle, and I have noticed a few others on the other side of the aisle, very fine Legislators all, have mistakenly spoken to the Chair as Speaker, instead of Mr. Speaker, or in your case, Madam Speaker. I just bring this issue to of notice to the Chair."
- Speaker Wojcik: "Representative, your point is well taken. For what purpose does the Gentleman from Kankakee rise?

 Representative Novak."
- Novak: "Yes, Madam...Madam Speaker, I understand, is this your first time in the Chair?"
- Speaker Wojcik: "That is correct."
- Novak: "Let me tell you something. You look marvelous this morning."
- Speaker Wojcik: "Thank you Representative. For what purpose does the Lady from Cook rise? Representative Currie."
- Currie: "Thank you, Speaker. Although my name was not mentioned by a previous speaker, I think that it was my conduct that was at issue. The reason that I tend to treat people in

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the Chair in a gender neutral way really started with what happened in the United States Supreme Court when, with the addition of a female justice, the adjective Madam or Mr. was dropped from the vocabulary. And I think there is a lot to be said for getting rid of gender specific terms. One of the reasons, of course, I voted against the Rules that were adopted by this chamber is that, I think the rules went several steps backward by demanding gender specific addresses to whoever might be the occupant of the Chair. So, my behavior was a reflection of what we were allowed to do in the last Session and I considered it a step forward for equality for justice, just as the Supreme Court had done some six years ago."

- Speaker Wojcik. "Thank you Representative. For what purpose does the Gentleman from DuPage rise. Representative Biggins."
- Biggins: "Thank you...Thank you Madam Speaker. With all due respect to my colleague on the other side of the aisle and her beliefs, I have a question of the Chair. May I ask the Chair a question."
