My question, and by the way, if we don't meet that requirement, we stand, apparently, a fairly good chance of actually losing some federal funding that would otherwise be coming to Illinois. So my question to the Chair is, I understand that each of us is limited to only three Bills. Would a Bill like that be exempt from that requirement, because it would fall under the category, truly fall under the category of an emergency, so that someone who was willing to carry that Bill, it would not

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count toward their three?"
