- Currie: "Thank you, Speaker. Please let the record show that Representatives Collins and McKeon are excused today."

- May: "A point of personal privilege for an announcement. As you may or may not be aware, April 2005 was commemorated as Car Care Month by House Resolution 107. So, we have another great tip here. In keeping with the spirit of that

Because there is no simple way to determine if your vehicle does or does not have a mercury switch, you should call your car's manufacturer, give them the make and model of your car and ask if mercury switches were original equipment or not. And if so, check on the cost of an afder... after-market replacement. Or at the very least remove those switches before you release your car to a junk yard or recycler. This and other simple and inexpensive preventative tips will greatly extend the life and safety of you, your car, and the world we live in. Thank you."

will carry you a long way, too. The Gentleman from DuPage,

Representative Daniels, for what reason do you rise?"

Daniels: "Point of personal privilege."

Daniels: "Wonder if I could have the attention of the House for just a short moment?"

Speaker Turner: "Proceed."

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Daniels: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, today I introduced House Resolution 368. This deals with the media reports that reveal that Illinois nursing homes, long-term care facilities, community integrated living arrangements, and supportive living centers are housing 161 criminal, sexually-violent parolees that are be placed in our homes with the most vulnerable citizens of this state. Not only in nursing homes, but eight-bed CILAs have been requested to house sexually-violent criminals. Speaker, I've introduced House Resolution 368 to ask for this Assembly to investigate immediately the happenings that are causing this to occur. Placements by Public Aid, Department of Human Services, and the Illinois Department of Corrections and Public Health. Why we are allowing this to occur in our most vulnerable citizens and placing them in harm's way. We are gonna ask that next week this be presented to the House in consideration. And I bring it to everyone's attention to encourage all Members of the House that wish to join in the presentation of House Resolution 368 to join me in this presentation. Thank you very much for your attention."
