SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

35 ILCS 105/3-5
35 ILCS 110/3-5
35 ILCS 115/3-5
35 ILCS 120/2-5

Amends the Use Tax Act, the Service Use Tax Act, the Service Occupation Tax Act, and the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act. Provides that the exemption for coal and aggregate exploration, mining, off-highway hauling, processing, maintenance, and reclamation equipment is exempt from the Acts' automatic sunset provisions. Effective immediately.

1 AN ACT concerning revenue.

2 **Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois,**
3 **represented in the General Assembly:**

4 Section 5. The Use Tax Act is amended by changing Section
5 3-5 as follows:

6 (35 ILCS 105/3-5)

7 Sec. 3-5. Exemptions. Use of the following tangible
8 personal property is exempt from the tax imposed by this Act:

9 (1) Personal property purchased from a corporation,
10 society, association, foundation, institution, or
11 organization, other than a limited liability company, that is
12 organized and operated as a not-for-profit service enterprise
13 for the benefit of persons 65 years of age or older if the
14 personal property was not purchased by the enterprise for the
15 purpose of resale by the enterprise.

16 (2) Personal property purchased by a not-for-profit
17 Illinois county fair association for use in conducting,
18 operating, or promoting the county fair.

19 (3) Personal property purchased by a not-for-profit arts or
20 cultural organization that establishes, by proof required by
21 the Department by rule, that it has received an exemption under
22 Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and that is
23 organized and operated primarily for the presentation or

1 support of arts or cultural programming, activities, or
2 services. These organizations include, but are not limited to,
3 music and dramatic arts organizations such as symphony
4 orchestras and theatrical groups, arts and cultural service
5 organizations, local arts councils, visual arts organizations,
6 and media arts organizations. On and after the effective date
7 of this amendatory Act of the 92nd General Assembly, however,
8 an entity otherwise eligible for this exemption shall not make
9 tax-free purchases unless it has an active identification
10 number issued by the Department.

11 (4) Personal property purchased by a governmental body, by
12 a corporation, society, association, foundation, or
13 institution organized and operated exclusively for charitable,
14 religious, or educational purposes, or by a not-for-profit
15 corporation, society, association, foundation, institution, or
16 organization that has no compensated officers or employees and
17 that is organized and operated primarily for the recreation of
18 persons 55 years of age or older. A limited liability company
19 may qualify for the exemption under this paragraph only if the
20 limited liability company is organized and operated
21 exclusively for educational purposes. On and after July 1,
22 1987, however, no entity otherwise eligible for this exemption
23 shall make tax-free purchases unless it has an active exemption
24 identification number issued by the Department.

25 (5) Until July 1, 2003, a passenger car that is a
26 replacement vehicle to the extent that the purchase price of

1 the car is subject to the Replacement Vehicle Tax.

2 (6) Until July 1, 2003 and beginning again on September 1,
3 2004 through August 30, 2014, graphic arts machinery and
4 equipment, including repair and replacement parts, both new and
5 used, and including that manufactured on special order,
6 certified by the purchaser to be used primarily for graphic
7 arts production, and including machinery and equipment
8 purchased for lease. Equipment includes chemicals or chemicals
9 acting as catalysts but only if the chemicals or chemicals
10 acting as catalysts effect a direct and immediate change upon a
11 graphic arts product.

12 (7) Farm chemicals.

13 (8) Legal tender, currency, medallions, or gold or silver
14 coinage issued by the State of Illinois, the government of the
15 United States of America, or the government of any foreign
16 country, and bullion.

17 (9) Personal property purchased from a teacher-sponsored
18 student organization affiliated with an elementary or
19 secondary school located in Illinois.

20 (10) A motor vehicle that is used for automobile renting,
21 as defined in the Automobile Renting Occupation and Use Tax
22 Act.

23 (11) Farm machinery and equipment, both new and used,
24 including that manufactured on special order, certified by the
25 purchaser to be used primarily for production agriculture or
26 State or federal agricultural programs, including individual

1 replacement parts for the machinery and equipment, including
2 machinery and equipment purchased for lease, and including
3 implements of husbandry defined in Section 1-130 of the
4 Illinois Vehicle Code, farm machinery and agricultural
5 chemical and fertilizer spreaders, and nurse wagons required to
6 be registered under Section 3-809 of the Illinois Vehicle Code,
7 but excluding other motor vehicles required to be registered
8 under the Illinois Vehicle Code. Horticultural polyhouses or
9 hoop houses used for propagating, growing, or overwintering
10 plants shall be considered farm machinery and equipment under
11 this item (11). Agricultural chemical tender tanks and dry
12 boxes shall include units sold separately from a motor vehicle
13 required to be licensed and units sold mounted on a motor
14 vehicle required to be licensed if the selling price of the
15 tender is separately stated.

16 Farm machinery and equipment shall include precision
17 farming equipment that is installed or purchased to be
18 installed on farm machinery and equipment including, but not
19 limited to, tractors, harvesters, sprayers, planters, seeders,
20 or spreaders. Precision farming equipment includes, but is not
21 limited to, soil testing sensors, computers, monitors,
22 software, global positioning and mapping systems, and other
23 such equipment.

24 Farm machinery and equipment also includes computers,
25 sensors, software, and related equipment used primarily in the
26 computer-assisted operation of production agriculture

1 facilities, equipment, and activities such as, but not limited
2 to, the collection, monitoring, and correlation of animal and
3 crop data for the purpose of formulating animal diets and
4 agricultural chemicals. This item (11) is exempt from the
5 provisions of Section 3-90.

6 (12) Until June 30, 2013, fuel and petroleum products sold
7 to or used by an air common carrier, certified by the carrier
8 to be used for consumption, shipment, or storage in the conduct
9 of its business as an air common carrier, for a flight destined
10 for or returning from a location or locations outside the
11 United States without regard to previous or subsequent domestic
12 stopovers.

13 Beginning July 1, 2013, fuel and petroleum products sold to
14 or used by an air carrier, certified by the carrier to be used
15 for consumption, shipment, or storage in the conduct of its
16 business as an air common carrier, for a flight that (i) is
17 engaged in foreign trade or is engaged in trade between the
18 United States and any of its possessions and (ii) transports at
19 least one individual or package for hire from the city of
20 origination to the city of final destination on the same
21 aircraft, without regard to a change in the flight number of
22 that aircraft.

23 (13) Proceeds of mandatory service charges separately
24 stated on customers' bills for the purchase and consumption of
25 food and beverages purchased at retail from a retailer, to the
26 extent that the proceeds of the service charge are in fact

1 turned over as tips or as a substitute for tips to the
2 employees who participate directly in preparing, serving,
3 hosting or cleaning up the food or beverage function with
4 respect to which the service charge is imposed.

5 (14) Until July 1, 2003, oil field exploration, drilling,
6 and production equipment, including (i) rigs and parts of rigs,
7 rotary rigs, cable tool rigs, and workover rigs, (ii) pipe and
8 tubular goods, including casing and drill strings, (iii) pumps
9 and pump-jack units, (iv) storage tanks and flow lines, (v) any
10 individual replacement part for oil field exploration,
11 drilling, and production equipment, and (vi) machinery and
12 equipment purchased for lease; but excluding motor vehicles
13 required to be registered under the Illinois Vehicle Code.

14 (15) Photoprocessing machinery and equipment, including
15 repair and replacement parts, both new and used, including that
16 manufactured on special order, certified by the purchaser to be
17 used primarily for photoprocessing, and including
18 photoprocessing machinery and equipment purchased for lease.

19 (16) Coal and aggregate exploration, mining, off-highway
20 hauling, processing, maintenance, and reclamation equipment,
21 including replacement parts and equipment, and including
22 equipment purchased for lease, but excluding motor vehicles
23 required to be registered under the Illinois Vehicle Code. The
24 changes made to this Section by Public Act 97-767 apply on and
25 after July 1, 2003, but no claim for credit or refund is
26 allowed on or after August 16, 2013 (the effective date of

1 Public Act 98-456) for such taxes paid during the period
2 beginning July 1, 2003 and ending on August 16, 2013 (the
3 effective date of Public Act 98-456). This item (16) is exempt
4 from the provisions of Section 3-90.

5 (17) Until July 1, 2003, distillation machinery and
6 equipment, sold as a unit or kit, assembled or installed by the
7 retailer, certified by the user to be used only for the
8 production of ethyl alcohol that will be used for consumption
9 as motor fuel or as a component of motor fuel for the personal
10 use of the user, and not subject to sale or resale.

11 (18) Manufacturing and assembling machinery and equipment
12 used primarily in the process of manufacturing or assembling
13 tangible personal property for wholesale or retail sale or
14 lease, whether that sale or lease is made directly by the
15 manufacturer or by some other person, whether the materials
16 used in the process are owned by the manufacturer or some other
17 person, or whether that sale or lease is made apart from or as
18 an incident to the seller's engaging in the service occupation
19 of producing machines, tools, dies, jigs, patterns, gauges, or
20 other similar items of no commercial value on special order for
21 a particular purchaser. The exemption provided by this
22 paragraph (18) does not include machinery and equipment used in
23 (i) the generation of electricity for wholesale or retail sale;
24 (ii) the generation or treatment of natural or artificial gas
25 for wholesale or retail sale that is delivered to customers
26 through pipes, pipelines, or mains; or (iii) the treatment of

1 water for wholesale or retail sale that is delivered to
2 customers through pipes, pipelines, or mains. The provisions of
3 Public Act 98-583 are declaratory of existing law as to the
4 meaning and scope of this exemption.

5 (19) Personal property delivered to a purchaser or
6 purchaser's donee inside Illinois when the purchase order for
7 that personal property was received by a florist located
8 outside Illinois who has a florist located inside Illinois
9 deliver the personal property.

10 (20) Semen used for artificial insemination of livestock
11 for direct agricultural production.

12 (21) Horses, or interests in horses, registered with and
13 meeting the requirements of any of the Arabian Horse Club
14 Registry of America, Appaloosa Horse Club, American Quarter
15 Horse Association, United States Trotting Association, or
16 Jockey Club, as appropriate, used for purposes of breeding or
17 racing for prizes. This item (21) is exempt from the provisions
18 of Section 3-90, and the exemption provided for under this item
19 (21) applies for all periods beginning May 30, 1995, but no
20 claim for credit or refund is allowed on or after January 1,
21 2008 for such taxes paid during the period beginning May 30,
22 2000 and ending on January 1, 2008.

23 (22) Computers and communications equipment utilized for
24 any hospital purpose and equipment used in the diagnosis,
25 analysis, or treatment of hospital patients purchased by a
26 lessor who leases the equipment, under a lease of one year or

1 longer executed or in effect at the time the lessor would
2 otherwise be subject to the tax imposed by this Act, to a
3 hospital that has been issued an active tax exemption
4 identification number by the Department under Section 1g of the
5 Retailers' Occupation Tax Act. If the equipment is leased in a
6 manner that does not qualify for this exemption or is used in
7 any other non-exempt manner, the lessor shall be liable for the
8 tax imposed under this Act or the Service Use Tax Act, as the
9 case may be, based on the fair market value of the property at
10 the time the non-qualifying use occurs. No lessor shall collect
11 or attempt to collect an amount (however designated) that
12 purports to reimburse that lessor for the tax imposed by this
13 Act or the Service Use Tax Act, as the case may be, if the tax
14 has not been paid by the lessor. If a lessor improperly
15 collects any such amount from the lessee, the lessee shall have
16 a legal right to claim a refund of that amount from the lessor.
17 If, however, that amount is not refunded to the lessee for any
18 reason, the lessor is liable to pay that amount to the
19 Department.

20 (23) Personal property purchased by a lessor who leases the
21 property, under a lease of one year or longer executed or in
22 effect at the time the lessor would otherwise be subject to the
23 tax imposed by this Act, to a governmental body that has been
24 issued an active sales tax exemption identification number by
25 the Department under Section 1g of the Retailers' Occupation
26 Tax Act. If the property is leased in a manner that does not

1 qualify for this exemption or used in any other non-exempt
2 manner, the lessor shall be liable for the tax imposed under
3 this Act or the Service Use Tax Act, as the case may be, based
4 on the fair market value of the property at the time the
5 non-qualifying use occurs. No lessor shall collect or attempt
6 to collect an amount (however designated) that purports to
7 reimburse that lessor for the tax imposed by this Act or the
8 Service Use Tax Act, as the case may be, if the tax has not been
9 paid by the lessor. If a lessor improperly collects any such
10 amount from the lessee, the lessee shall have a legal right to
11 claim a refund of that amount from the lessor. If, however,
12 that amount is not refunded to the lessee for any reason, the
13 lessor is liable to pay that amount to the Department.

14 (24) Beginning with taxable years ending on or after
15 December 31, 1995 and ending with taxable years ending on or
16 before December 31, 2004, personal property that is donated for
17 disaster relief to be used in a State or federally declared
18 disaster area in Illinois or bordering Illinois by a
19 manufacturer or retailer that is registered in this State to a
20 corporation, society, association, foundation, or institution
21 that has been issued a sales tax exemption identification
22 number by the Department that assists victims of the disaster
23 who reside within the declared disaster area.

24 (25) Beginning with taxable years ending on or after
25 December 31, 1995 and ending with taxable years ending on or
26 before December 31, 2004, personal property that is used in the

1 performance of infrastructure repairs in this State, including
2 but not limited to municipal roads and streets, access roads,
3 bridges, sidewalks, waste disposal systems, water and sewer
4 line extensions, water distribution and purification
5 facilities, storm water drainage and retention facilities, and
6 sewage treatment facilities, resulting from a State or
7 federally declared disaster in Illinois or bordering Illinois
8 when such repairs are initiated on facilities located in the
9 declared disaster area within 6 months after the disaster.

10 (26) Beginning July 1, 1999, game or game birds purchased
11 at a "game breeding and hunting preserve area" as that term is
12 used in the Wildlife Code. This paragraph is exempt from the
13 provisions of Section 3-90.

14 (27) A motor vehicle, as that term is defined in Section
15 1-146 of the Illinois Vehicle Code, that is donated to a
16 corporation, limited liability company, society, association,
17 foundation, or institution that is determined by the Department
18 to be organized and operated exclusively for educational
19 purposes. For purposes of this exemption, "a corporation,
20 limited liability company, society, association, foundation,
21 or institution organized and operated exclusively for
22 educational purposes" means all tax-supported public schools,
23 private schools that offer systematic instruction in useful
24 branches of learning by methods common to public schools and
25 that compare favorably in their scope and intensity with the
26 course of study presented in tax-supported schools, and

1 vocational or technical schools or institutes organized and
2 operated exclusively to provide a course of study of not less
3 than 6 weeks duration and designed to prepare individuals to
4 follow a trade or to pursue a manual, technical, mechanical,
5 industrial, business, or commercial occupation.

6 (28) Beginning January 1, 2000, personal property,
7 including food, purchased through fundraising events for the
8 benefit of a public or private elementary or secondary school,
9 a group of those schools, or one or more school districts if
10 the events are sponsored by an entity recognized by the school
11 district that consists primarily of volunteers and includes
12 parents and teachers of the school children. This paragraph
13 does not apply to fundraising events (i) for the benefit of
14 private home instruction or (ii) for which the fundraising
15 entity purchases the personal property sold at the events from
16 another individual or entity that sold the property for the
17 purpose of resale by the fundraising entity and that profits
18 from the sale to the fundraising entity. This paragraph is
19 exempt from the provisions of Section 3-90.

20 (29) Beginning January 1, 2000 and through December 31,
21 2001, new or used automatic vending machines that prepare and
22 serve hot food and beverages, including coffee, soup, and other
23 items, and replacement parts for these machines. Beginning
24 January 1, 2002 and through June 30, 2003, machines and parts
25 for machines used in commercial, coin-operated amusement and
26 vending business if a use or occupation tax is paid on the

1 gross receipts derived from the use of the commercial,
2 coin-operated amusement and vending machines. This paragraph
3 is exempt from the provisions of Section 3-90.

4 (30) Beginning January 1, 2001 and through June 30, 2016,
5 food for human consumption that is to be consumed off the
6 premises where it is sold (other than alcoholic beverages, soft
7 drinks, and food that has been prepared for immediate
8 consumption) and prescription and nonprescription medicines,
9 drugs, medical appliances, and insulin, urine testing
10 materials, syringes, and needles used by diabetics, for human
11 use, when purchased for use by a person receiving medical
12 assistance under Article V of the Illinois Public Aid Code who
13 resides in a licensed long-term care facility, as defined in
14 the Nursing Home Care Act, or in a licensed facility as defined
15 in the ID/DD Community Care Act, the MC/DD Act, or the
16 Specialized Mental Health Rehabilitation Act of 2013.

17 (31) Beginning on the effective date of this amendatory Act
18 of the 92nd General Assembly, computers and communications
19 equipment utilized for any hospital purpose and equipment used
20 in the diagnosis, analysis, or treatment of hospital patients
21 purchased by a lessor who leases the equipment, under a lease
22 of one year or longer executed or in effect at the time the
23 lessor would otherwise be subject to the tax imposed by this
24 Act, to a hospital that has been issued an active tax exemption
25 identification number by the Department under Section 1g of the
26 Retailers' Occupation Tax Act. If the equipment is leased in a

1 manner that does not qualify for this exemption or is used in
2 any other nonexempt manner, the lessor shall be liable for the
3 tax imposed under this Act or the Service Use Tax Act, as the
4 case may be, based on the fair market value of the property at
5 the time the nonqualifying use occurs. No lessor shall collect
6 or attempt to collect an amount (however designated) that
7 purports to reimburse that lessor for the tax imposed by this
8 Act or the Service Use Tax Act, as the case may be, if the tax
9 has not been paid by the lessor. If a lessor improperly
10 collects any such amount from the lessee, the lessee shall have
11 a legal right to claim a refund of that amount from the lessor.
12 If, however, that amount is not refunded to the lessee for any
13 reason, the lessor is liable to pay that amount to the
14 Department. This paragraph is exempt from the provisions of
15 Section 3-90.

16 (32) Beginning on the effective date of this amendatory Act
17 of the 92nd General Assembly, personal property purchased by a
18 lessor who leases the property, under a lease of one year or
19 longer executed or in effect at the time the lessor would
20 otherwise be subject to the tax imposed by this Act, to a
21 governmental body that has been issued an active sales tax
22 exemption identification number by the Department under
23 Section 1g of the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act. If the
24 property is leased in a manner that does not qualify for this
25 exemption or used in any other nonexempt manner, the lessor
26 shall be liable for the tax imposed under this Act or the

1 Service Use Tax Act, as the case may be, based on the fair
2 market value of the property at the time the nonqualifying use
3 occurs. No lessor shall collect or attempt to collect an amount
4 (however designated) that purports to reimburse that lessor for
5 the tax imposed by this Act or the Service Use Tax Act, as the
6 case may be, if the tax has not been paid by the lessor. If a
7 lessor improperly collects any such amount from the lessee, the
8 lessee shall have a legal right to claim a refund of that
9 amount from the lessor. If, however, that amount is not
10 refunded to the lessee for any reason, the lessor is liable to
11 pay that amount to the Department. This paragraph is exempt
12 from the provisions of Section 3-90.

13 (33) On and after July 1, 2003 and through June 30, 2004,
14 the use in this State of motor vehicles of the second division
15 with a gross vehicle weight in excess of 8,000 pounds and that
16 are subject to the commercial distribution fee imposed under
17 Section 3-815.1 of the Illinois Vehicle Code. Beginning on July
18 1, 2004 and through June 30, 2005, the use in this State of
19 motor vehicles of the second division: (i) with a gross vehicle
20 weight rating in excess of 8,000 pounds; (ii) that are subject
21 to the commercial distribution fee imposed under Section
22 3-815.1 of the Illinois Vehicle Code; and (iii) that are
23 primarily used for commercial purposes. Through June 30, 2005,
24 this exemption applies to repair and replacement parts added
25 after the initial purchase of such a motor vehicle if that
26 motor vehicle is used in a manner that would qualify for the

1 rolling stock exemption otherwise provided for in this Act. For
2 purposes of this paragraph, the term "used for commercial
3 purposes" means the transportation of persons or property in
4 furtherance of any commercial or industrial enterprise,
5 whether for-hire or not.

6 (34) Beginning January 1, 2008, tangible personal property
7 used in the construction or maintenance of a community water
8 supply, as defined under Section 3.145 of the Environmental
9 Protection Act, that is operated by a not-for-profit
10 corporation that holds a valid water supply permit issued under
11 Title IV of the Environmental Protection Act. This paragraph is
12 exempt from the provisions of Section 3-90.

13 (35) Beginning January 1, 2010, materials, parts,
14 equipment, components, and furnishings incorporated into or
15 upon an aircraft as part of the modification, refurbishment,
16 completion, replacement, repair, or maintenance of the
17 aircraft. This exemption includes consumable supplies used in
18 the modification, refurbishment, completion, replacement,
19 repair, and maintenance of aircraft, but excludes any
20 materials, parts, equipment, components, and consumable
21 supplies used in the modification, replacement, repair, and
22 maintenance of aircraft engines or power plants, whether such
23 engines or power plants are installed or uninstalled upon any
24 such aircraft. "Consumable supplies" include, but are not
25 limited to, adhesive, tape, sandpaper, general purpose
26 lubricants, cleaning solution, latex gloves, and protective

1 films. This exemption applies only to the use of qualifying
2 tangible personal property by persons who modify, refurbish,
3 complete, repair, replace, or maintain aircraft and who (i)
4 hold an Air Agency Certificate and are empowered to operate an
5 approved repair station by the Federal Aviation
6 Administration, (ii) have a Class IV Rating, and (iii) conduct
7 operations in accordance with Part 145 of the Federal Aviation
8 Regulations. The exemption does not include aircraft operated
9 by a commercial air carrier providing scheduled passenger air
10 service pursuant to authority issued under Part 121 or Part 129
11 of the Federal Aviation Regulations. The changes made to this
12 paragraph (35) by Public Act 98-534 are declarative of existing
13 law.

14 (36) Tangible personal property purchased by a
15 public-facilities corporation, as described in Section
16 11-65-10 of the Illinois Municipal Code, for purposes of
17 constructing or furnishing a municipal convention hall, but
18 only if the legal title to the municipal convention hall is
19 transferred to the municipality without any further
20 consideration by or on behalf of the municipality at the time
21 of the completion of the municipal convention hall or upon the
22 retirement or redemption of any bonds or other debt instruments
23 issued by the public-facilities corporation in connection with
24 the development of the municipal convention hall. This
25 exemption includes existing public-facilities corporations as
26 provided in Section 11-65-25 of the Illinois Municipal Code.

1 This paragraph is exempt from the provisions of Section 3-90.

2 (37) Beginning January 1, 2017, menstrual pads, tampons,
3 and menstrual cups.

8 Section 10. The Service Use Tax Act is amended by changing
9 Section 3-5 as follows:

10 (35 ILCS 110/3-5)

11 Sec. 3-5. Exemptions. Use of the following tangible
12 personal property is exempt from the tax imposed by this Act:

13 (1) Personal property purchased from a corporation,
14 society, association, foundation, institution, or
15 organization, other than a limited liability company, that is
16 organized and operated as a not-for-profit service enterprise
17 for the benefit of persons 65 years of age or older if the
18 personal property was not purchased by the enterprise for the
19 purpose of resale by the enterprise.

20 (2) Personal property purchased by a non-profit Illinois
21 county fair association for use in conducting, operating, or
22 promoting the county fair.

23 (3) Personal property purchased by a not-for-profit arts or
24 cultural organization that establishes, by proof required by

1 the Department by rule, that it has received an exemption under
2 Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and that is
3 organized and operated primarily for the presentation or
4 support of arts or cultural programming, activities, or
5 services. These organizations include, but are not limited to,
6 music and dramatic arts organizations such as symphony
7 orchestras and theatrical groups, arts and cultural service
8 organizations, local arts councils, visual arts organizations,
9 and media arts organizations. On and after the effective date
10 of this amendatory Act of the 92nd General Assembly, however,

8 Specialized Mental Health Rehabilitation Act of 2013.

9 (14) Semen used for artificial insemination of livestock
10 for direct agricultural production.

11 (15) Horses, or interests in horses, registered with and
12 meeting the requirements of any of the Arabian Horse Club
13 Registry of America, Appaloosa Horse Club, American Quarter
14 Horse Association, United States Trotting Association, or
15 Jockey Club, as appropriate, used for purposes of breeding or
16 racing for prizes. This item (15) is exempt from the provisions
17 of Section 3-55, and the exemption provided for under this item
18 (15) applies for all periods beginning May 30, 1995, but no
19 claim for credit or refund is allowed on or after January 1,
20 2008 (the effective date of Public Act 95-88) for such taxes
21 paid during the period beginning May 30, 2000 and ending on
22 January 1, 2008 (the effective date of Public Act 95-88).

23 (16) Computers and communications equipment utilized for
24 any hospital purpose and equipment used in the diagnosis,
25 analysis, or treatment of hospital patients sold to a lessor
26 who leases the equipment, under a lease of one year or longer

1 executed or in effect at the time of the purchase, to a
2 hospital that has been issued an active tax exemption
3 identification number by the Department under Section 1g of the
4 Retailers' Occupation Tax Act.

5 (17) Personal property sold to a lessor who leases the
6 property, under a lease of one year or longer executed or in
7 effect at the time of the purchase, to a governmental body that
8 has been issued an active tax exemption identification number
9 by the Department under Section 1g of the Retailers' Occupation
10 Tax Act.

11 (18) Beginning with taxable years ending on or after
12 December 31, 1995 and ending with taxable years ending on or
13 before December 31, 2004, personal property that is donated for
14 disaster relief to be used in a State or federally declared
15 disaster area in Illinois or bordering Illinois by a
16 manufacturer or retailer that is registered in this State to a
17 corporation, society, association, foundation, or institution
18 that has been issued a sales tax exemption identification
19 number by the Department that assists victims of the disaster
20 who reside within the declared disaster area.

21 (19) Beginning with taxable years ending on or after
22 December 31, 1995 and ending with taxable years ending on or
23 before December 31, 2004, personal property that is used in the
24 performance of infrastructure repairs in this State, including
25 but not limited to municipal roads and streets, access roads,
26 bridges, sidewalks, waste disposal systems, water and sewer

1 line extensions, water distribution and purification
2 facilities, storm water drainage and retention facilities, and
3 sewage treatment facilities, resulting from a State or
4 federally declared disaster in Illinois or bordering Illinois
5 when such repairs are initiated on facilities located in the
6 declared disaster area within 6 months after the disaster.

7 (20) Beginning July 1, 1999, game or game birds sold at a
8 "game breeding and hunting preserve area" as that term is used
9 in the Wildlife Code. This paragraph is exempt from the
10 provisions of Section 3-55.

11 (21) A motor vehicle, as that term is defined in Section
12 1-146 of the Illinois Vehicle Code, that is donated to a
13 corporation, limited liability company, society, association,
14 foundation, or institution that is determined by the Department
15 to be organized and operated exclusively for educational
16 purposes. For purposes of this exemption, "a corporation,
17 limited liability company, society, association, foundation,
18 or institution organized and operated exclusively for
19 educational purposes" means all tax-supported public schools,
20 private schools that offer systematic instruction in useful
21 branches of learning by methods common to public schools and
22 that compare favorably in their scope and intensity with the
23 course of study presented in tax-supported schools, and
24 vocational or technical schools or institutes organized and
25 operated exclusively to provide a course of study of not less
26 than 6 weeks duration and designed to prepare individuals to

1 follow a trade or to pursue a manual, technical, mechanical,
2 industrial, business, or commercial occupation.

3 (22) Beginning January 1, 2000, personal property,
4 including food, purchased through fundraising events for the
5 benefit of a public or private elementary or secondary school,
6 a group of those schools, or one or more school districts if
7 the events are sponsored by an entity recognized by the school
8 district that consists primarily of volunteers and includes
9 parents and teachers of the school children. This paragraph
10 does not apply to fundraising events (i) for the benefit of
11 private home instruction or (ii) for which the fundraising
12 entity purchases the personal property sold at the events from
13 another individual or entity that sold the property for the
14 purpose of resale by the fundraising entity and that profits
15 from the sale to the fundraising entity. This paragraph is
16 exempt from the provisions of Section 3-55.

17 (23) Beginning January 1, 2000 and through December 31,
18 2001, new or used automatic vending machines that prepare and
19 serve hot food and beverages, including coffee, soup, and other
20 items, and replacement parts for these machines. Beginning
21 January 1, 2002 and through June 30, 2003, machines and parts
22 for machines used in commercial, coin-operated amusement and
23 vending business if a use or occupation tax is paid on the
24 gross receipts derived from the use of the commercial,
25 coin-operated amusement and vending machines. This paragraph
26 is exempt from the provisions of Section 3-55.

1 (24) Beginning on the effective date of this amendatory Act
2 of the 92nd General Assembly, computers and communications
3 equipment utilized for any hospital purpose and equipment used
4 in the diagnosis, analysis, or treatment of hospital patients
5 sold to a lessor who leases the equipment, under a lease of one
6 year or longer executed or in effect at the time of the
7 purchase, to a hospital that has been issued an active tax
8 exemption identification number by the Department under
9 Section 1g of the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act. This paragraph
10 is exempt from the provisions of Section 3-55.

11 (25) Beginning on the effective date of this amendatory Act
12 of the 92nd General Assembly, personal property sold to a
13 lessor who leases the property, under a lease of one year or
14 longer executed or in effect at the time of the purchase, to a
15 governmental body that has been issued an active tax exemption
16 identification number by the Department under Section 1g of the
17 Retailers' Occupation Tax Act. This paragraph is exempt from
18 the provisions of Section 3-55.

19 (26) Beginning on January 1, 2002 and through June 30,
20 2016, tangible personal property purchased from an Illinois
21 retailer by a taxpayer engaged in centralized purchasing
22 activities in Illinois who will, upon receipt of the property
23 in Illinois, temporarily store the property in Illinois (i) for
24 the purpose of subsequently transporting it outside this State
25 for use or consumption thereafter solely outside this State or
26 (ii) for the purpose of being processed, fabricated, or

1 manufactured into, attached to, or incorporated into other
2 tangible personal property to be transported outside this State
3 and thereafter used or consumed solely outside this State. The
4 Director of Revenue shall, pursuant to rules adopted in
5 accordance with the Illinois Administrative Procedure Act,
6 issue a permit to any taxpayer in good standing with the
7 Department who is eligible for the exemption under this
8 paragraph (26). The permit issued under this paragraph (26)
9 shall authorize the holder, to the extent and in the manner
10 specified in the rules adopted under this Act, to purchase
11 tangible personal property from a retailer exempt from the
12 taxes imposed by this Act. Taxpayers shall maintain all
13 necessary books and records to substantiate the use and
14 consumption of all such tangible personal property outside of
15 the State of Illinois.

16 (27) Beginning January 1, 2008, tangible personal property
17 used in the construction or maintenance of a community water
18 supply, as defined under Section 3.145 of the Environmental
19 Protection Act, that is operated by a not-for-profit
20 corporation that holds a valid water supply permit issued under
21 Title IV of the Environmental Protection Act. This paragraph is
22 exempt from the provisions of Section 3-55.

23 (28) Tangible personal property sold to a
24 public-facilities corporation, as described in Section
25 11-65-10 of the Illinois Municipal Code, for purposes of
26 constructing or furnishing a municipal convention hall, but

1 only if the legal title to the municipal convention hall is
2 transferred to the municipality without any further
3 consideration by or on behalf of the municipality at the time
4 of the completion of the municipal convention hall or upon the
5 retirement or redemption of any bonds or other debt instruments
6 issued by the public-facilities corporation in connection with
7 the development of the municipal convention hall. This
8 exemption includes existing public-facilities corporations as
9 provided in Section 11-65-25 of the Illinois Municipal Code.
10 This paragraph is exempt from the provisions of Section 3-55.

11 (29) Beginning January 1, 2010, materials, parts,
12 equipment, components, and furnishings incorporated into or
13 upon an aircraft as part of the modification, refurbishment,
14 completion, replacement, repair, or maintenance of the
15 aircraft. This exemption includes consumable supplies used in
16 the modification, refurbishment, completion, replacement,
17 repair, and maintenance of aircraft, but excludes any
18 materials, parts, equipment, components, and consumable
19 supplies used in the modification, replacement, repair, and
20 maintenance of aircraft engines or power plants, whether such
21 engines or power plants are installed or uninstalled upon any
22 such aircraft. "Consumable supplies" include, but are not
23 limited to, adhesive, tape, sandpaper, general purpose
24 lubricants, cleaning solution, latex gloves, and protective
25 films. This exemption applies only to the transfer of
26 qualifying tangible personal property incident to the

1 modification, refurbishment, completion, replacement, repair,
2 or maintenance of an aircraft by persons who (i) hold an Air
3 Agency Certificate and are empowered to operate an approved
4 repair station by the Federal Aviation Administration, (ii)
5 have a Class IV Rating, and (iii) conduct operations in
6 accordance with Part 145 of the Federal Aviation Regulations.
7 The exemption does not include aircraft operated by a
8 commercial air carrier providing scheduled passenger air
9 service pursuant to authority issued under Part 121 or Part 129
10 of the Federal Aviation Regulations. The changes made to this
11 paragraph (29) by Public Act 98-534 are declarative of existing
12 law.

13 (30) Beginning January 1, 2017, menstrual pads, tampons,
14 and menstrual cups.

15 (Source: P.A. 98-104, eff. 7-22-13; 98-422, eff. 8-16-13;

18 Section 20. The Retailers' Occupation Tax Act is amended by
19 changing Section 2-5 as follows:

20 (35 ILCS 120/2-5)

21 Sec. 2-5. Exemptions. Gross receipts from proceeds from the
22 sale of the following tangible personal property are exempt
23 from the tax imposed by this Act:

24 (1) Farm chemicals.

1 (2) Farm machinery and equipment, both new and used,
2 including that manufactured on special order, certified by the
3 purchaser to be used primarily for production agriculture or
4 State or federal agricultural programs, including individual
5 replacement parts for the machinery and equipment, including
6 machinery and equipment purchased for lease, and including
7 implements of husbandry defined in Section 1-130 of the
8 Illinois Vehicle Code, farm machinery and agricultural
9 chemical and fertilizer spreaders, and nurse wagons required to
10 be registered under Section 3-809 of the Illinois Vehicle Code,
11 but excluding other motor vehicles required to be registered
12 under the Illinois Vehicle Code. Horticultural polyhouses or
13 hoop houses used for propagating, growing, or overwintering
14 plants shall be considered farm machinery and equipment under
15 this item (2). Agricultural chemical tender tanks and dry boxes
16 shall include units sold separately from a motor vehicle
17 required to be licensed and units sold mounted on a motor
18 vehicle required to be licensed, if the selling price of the
19 tender is separately stated.

20 Farm machinery and equipment shall include precision
21 farming equipment that is installed or purchased to be
22 installed on farm machinery and equipment including, but not
23 limited to, tractors, harvesters, sprayers, planters, seeders,
24 or spreaders. Precision farming equipment includes, but is not
25 limited to, soil testing sensors, computers, monitors,
26 software, global positioning and mapping systems, and other

1 such equipment.

2 Farm machinery and equipment also includes computers,
3 sensors, software, and related equipment used primarily in the
4 computer-assisted operation of production agriculture
5 facilities, equipment, and activities such as, but not limited
6 to, the collection, monitoring, and correlation of animal and
7 crop data for the purpose of formulating animal diets and
8 agricultural chemicals. This item (2) is exempt from the
9 provisions of Section 2-70.

10 (3) Until July 1, 2003, distillation machinery and
11 equipment, sold as a unit or kit, assembled or installed by the
12 retailer, certified by the user to be used only for the
13 production of ethyl alcohol that will be used for consumption
14 as motor fuel or as a component of motor fuel for the personal
15 use of the user, and not subject to sale or resale.

16 (4) Until July 1, 2003 and beginning again September 1,
17 2004 through August 30, 2014, graphic arts machinery and
18 equipment, including repair and replacement parts, both new and
19 used, and including that manufactured on special order or
20 purchased for lease, certified by the purchaser to be used
21 primarily for graphic arts production. Equipment includes
22 chemicals or chemicals acting as catalysts but only if the
23 chemicals or chemicals acting as catalysts effect a direct and
24 immediate change upon a graphic arts product.

25 (5) A motor vehicle that is used for automobile renting, as
26 defined in the Automobile Renting Occupation and Use Tax Act.

1 This paragraph is exempt from the provisions of Section 2-70.

2 (6) Personal property sold by a teacher-sponsored student
3 organization affiliated with an elementary or secondary school
4 located in Illinois.

5 (7) Until July 1, 2003, proceeds of that portion of the
6 selling price of a passenger car the sale of which is subject
7 to the Replacement Vehicle Tax.

8 (8) Personal property sold to an Illinois county fair
9 association for use in conducting, operating, or promoting the
10 county fair.

11 (9) Personal property sold to a not-for-profit arts or
12 cultural organization that establishes, by proof required by
13 the Department by rule, that it has received an exemption under
14 Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and that is
15 organized and operated primarily for the presentation or
16 support of arts or cultural programming, activities, or
17 services. These organizations include, but are not limited to,
18 music and dramatic arts organizations such as symphony
19 orchestras and theatrical groups, arts and cultural service
20 organizations, local arts councils, visual arts organizations,
21 and media arts organizations. On and after the effective date
22 of this amendatory Act of the 92nd General Assembly, however,
23 an entity otherwise eligible for this exemption shall not make
24 tax-free purchases unless it has an active identification
25 number issued by the Department.

26 (10) Personal property sold by a corporation, society,

1 association, foundation, institution, or organization, other
2 than a limited liability company, that is organized and
3 operated as a not-for-profit service enterprise for the benefit
4 of persons 65 years of age or older if the personal property
5 was not purchased by the enterprise for the purpose of resale
6 by the enterprise.

7 (11) Personal property sold to a governmental body, to a
8 corporation, society, association, foundation, or institution
9 organized and operated exclusively for charitable, religious,
10 or educational purposes, or to a not-for-profit corporation,
11 society, association, foundation, institution, or organization
12 that has no compensated officers or employees and that is
13 organized and operated primarily for the recreation of persons
14 55 years of age or older. A limited liability company may
15 qualify for the exemption under this paragraph only if the
16 limited liability company is organized and operated
17 exclusively for educational purposes. On and after July 1,
18 1987, however, no entity otherwise eligible for this exemption
19 shall make tax-free purchases unless it has an active
20 identification number issued by the Department.

21 (12) Tangible personal property sold to interstate
22 carriers for hire for use as rolling stock moving in interstate
23 commerce or to lessors under leases of one year or longer
24 executed or in effect at the time of purchase by interstate
25 carriers for hire for use as rolling stock moving in interstate
26 commerce and equipment operated by a telecommunications

1 provider, licensed as a common carrier by the Federal
2 Communications Commission, which is permanently installed in
3 or affixed to aircraft moving in interstate commerce.

4 (12-5) On and after July 1, 2003 and through June 30, 2004,
5 motor vehicles of the second division with a gross vehicle
6 weight in excess of 8,000 pounds that are subject to the
7 commercial distribution fee imposed under Section 3-815.1 of
8 the Illinois Vehicle Code. Beginning on July 1, 2004 and
9 through June 30, 2005, the use in this State of motor vehicles
10 of the second division: (i) with a gross vehicle weight rating
11 in excess of 8,000 pounds; (ii) that are subject to the
12 commercial distribution fee imposed under Section 3-815.1 of
13 the Illinois Vehicle Code; and (iii) that are primarily used
14 for commercial purposes. Through June 30, 2005, this exemption
15 applies to repair and replacement parts added after the initial
16 purchase of such a motor vehicle if that motor vehicle is used
17 in a manner that would qualify for the rolling stock exemption
18 otherwise provided for in this Act. For purposes of this
19 paragraph, "used for commercial purposes" means the
20 transportation of persons or property in furtherance of any
21 commercial or industrial enterprise whether for-hire or not.

22 (13) Proceeds from sales to owners, lessors, or shippers of
23 tangible personal property that is utilized by interstate
24 carriers for hire for use as rolling stock moving in interstate
25 commerce and equipment operated by a telecommunications
26 provider, licensed as a common carrier by the Federal

1 Communications Commission, which is permanently installed in
2 or affixed to aircraft moving in interstate commerce.

3 (14) Machinery and equipment that will be used by the
4 purchaser, or a lessee of the purchaser, primarily in the
5 process of manufacturing or assembling tangible personal
6 property for wholesale or retail sale or lease, whether the
7 sale or lease is made directly by the manufacturer or by some
8 other person, whether the materials used in the process are
9 owned by the manufacturer or some other person, or whether the
10 sale or lease is made apart from or as an incident to the
11 seller's engaging in the service occupation of producing
12 machines, tools, dies, jigs, patterns, gauges, or other similar
13 items of no commercial value on special order for a particular
14 purchaser. The exemption provided by this paragraph (14) does
15 not include machinery and equipment used in (i) the generation
16 of electricity for wholesale or retail sale; (ii) the
17 generation or treatment of natural or artificial gas for
18 wholesale or retail sale that is delivered to customers through
19 pipes, pipelines, or mains; or (iii) the treatment of water for
20 wholesale or retail sale that is delivered to customers through
21 pipes, pipelines, or mains. The provisions of Public Act 98-583
22 are declaratory of existing law as to the meaning and scope of
23 this exemption.

24 (15) Proceeds of mandatory service charges separately
25 stated on customers' bills for purchase and consumption of food
26 and beverages, to the extent that the proceeds of the service

1 charge are in fact turned over as tips or as a substitute for
2 tips to the employees who participate directly in preparing,
3 serving, hosting or cleaning up the food or beverage function
4 with respect to which the service charge is imposed.

5 (16) Petroleum products sold to a purchaser if the seller
6 is prohibited by federal law from charging tax to the
7 purchaser.

8 (17) Tangible personal property sold to a common carrier by
9 rail or motor that receives the physical possession of the
10 property in Illinois and that transports the property, or
11 shares with another common carrier in the transportation of the
12 property, out of Illinois on a standard uniform bill of lading
13 showing the seller of the property as the shipper or consignor
14 of the property to a destination outside Illinois, for use
15 outside Illinois.

16 (18) Legal tender, currency, medallions, or gold or silver
17 coinage issued by the State of Illinois, the government of the
18 United States of America, or the government of any foreign
19 country, and bullion.

20 (19) Until July 1 2003, oil field exploration, drilling,
21 and production equipment, including (i) rigs and parts of rigs,
22 rotary rigs, cable tool rigs, and workover rigs, (ii) pipe and
23 tubular goods, including casing and drill strings, (iii) pumps
24 and pump-jack units, (iv) storage tanks and flow lines, (v) any
25 individual replacement part for oil field exploration,
26 drilling, and production equipment, and (vi) machinery and

1 equipment purchased for lease; but excluding motor vehicles
2 required to be registered under the Illinois Vehicle Code.

3 (20) Photoprocessing machinery and equipment, including
4 repair and replacement parts, both new and used, including that
5 manufactured on special order, certified by the purchaser to be
6 used primarily for photoprocessing, and including
7 photoprocessing machinery and equipment purchased for lease.

8 (21) Coal and aggregate exploration, mining, off-highway
9 hauling, processing, maintenance, and reclamation equipment,
10 including replacement parts and equipment, and including
11 equipment purchased for lease, but excluding motor vehicles
12 required to be registered under the Illinois Vehicle Code. The
13 changes made to this Section by Public Act 97-767 apply on and
14 after July 1, 2003, but no claim for credit or refund is
15 allowed on or after August 16, 2013 (the effective date of
16 Public Act 98-456) for such taxes paid during the period
17 beginning July 1, 2003 and ending on August 16, 2013 (the
18 effective date of Public Act 98-456). This item (21) is exempt
19 from the provisions of Section 2-70.

20 (22) Until June 30, 2013, fuel and petroleum products sold
21 to or used by an air carrier, certified by the carrier to be
22 used for consumption, shipment, or storage in the conduct of
23 its business as an air common carrier, for a flight destined
24 for or returning from a location or locations outside the
25 United States without regard to previous or subsequent domestic
26 stopovers.

1 Beginning July 1, 2013, fuel and petroleum products sold to
2 or used by an air carrier, certified by the carrier to be used
3 for consumption, shipment, or storage in the conduct of its
4 business as an air common carrier, for a flight that (i) is
5 engaged in foreign trade or is engaged in trade between the
6 United States and any of its possessions and (ii) transports at
7 least one individual or package for hire from the city of
8 origination to the city of final destination on the same
9 aircraft, without regard to a change in the flight number of
10 that aircraft.

11 (23) A transaction in which the purchase order is received
12 by a florist who is located outside Illinois, but who has a
13 florist located in Illinois deliver the property to the
14 purchaser or the purchaser's donee in Illinois.

15 (24) Fuel consumed or used in the operation of ships,
16 barges, or vessels that are used primarily in or for the
17 transportation of property or the conveyance of persons for
18 hire on rivers bordering on this State if the fuel is delivered
19 by the seller to the purchaser's barge, ship, or vessel while
20 it is afloat upon that bordering river.

21 (25) Except as provided in item (25-5) of this Section, a
22 motor vehicle sold in this State to a nonresident even though
23 the motor vehicle is delivered to the nonresident in this
24 State, if the motor vehicle is not to be titled in this State,
25 and if a drive-away permit is issued to the motor vehicle as
26 provided in Section 3-603 of the Illinois Vehicle Code or if

1 the nonresident purchaser has vehicle registration plates to
2 transfer to the motor vehicle upon returning to his or her home
3 state. The issuance of the drive-away permit or having the
4 out-of-state registration plates to be transferred is prima
5 facie evidence that the motor vehicle will not be titled in
6 this State.

7 (25-5) The exemption under item (25) does not apply if the
8 state in which the motor vehicle will be titled does not allow
9 a reciprocal exemption for a motor vehicle sold and delivered
10 in that state to an Illinois resident but titled in Illinois.
11 The tax collected under this Act on the sale of a motor vehicle
12 in this State to a resident of another state that does not
13 allow a reciprocal exemption shall be imposed at a rate equal
14 to the state's rate of tax on taxable property in the state in
15 which the purchaser is a resident, except that the tax shall
16 not exceed the tax that would otherwise be imposed under this
17 Act. At the time of the sale, the purchaser shall execute a
18 statement, signed under penalty of perjury, of his or her
19 intent to title the vehicle in the state in which the purchaser
20 is a resident within 30 days after the sale and of the fact of
21 the payment to the State of Illinois of tax in an amount
22 equivalent to the state's rate of tax on taxable property in
23 his or her state of residence and shall submit the statement to
24 the appropriate tax collection agency in his or her state of
25 residence. In addition, the retailer must retain a signed copy
26 of the statement in his or her records. Nothing in this item

1 shall be construed to require the removal of the vehicle from
2 this state following the filing of an intent to title the
3 vehicle in the purchaser's state of residence if the purchaser
4 titles the vehicle in his or her state of residence within 30
5 days after the date of sale. The tax collected under this Act
6 in accordance with this item (25-5) shall be proportionately
7 distributed as if the tax were collected at the 6.25% general
8 rate imposed under this Act.

9 (25-7) Beginning on July 1, 2007, no tax is imposed under
10 this Act on the sale of an aircraft, as defined in Section 3 of
11 the Illinois Aeronautics Act, if all of the following
12 conditions are met:

13 (1) the aircraft leaves this State within 15 days after
14 the later of either the issuance of the final billing for
15 the sale of the aircraft, or the authorized approval for
16 return to service, completion of the maintenance record
17 entry, and completion of the test flight and ground test
18 for inspection, as required by 14 C.F.R. 91.407;

19 (2) the aircraft is not based or registered in this
20 State after the sale of the aircraft; and

21 (3) the seller retains in his or her books and records
22 and provides to the Department a signed and dated
23 certification from the purchaser, on a form prescribed by
24 the Department, certifying that the requirements of this
25 item (25-7) are met. The certificate must also include the
26 name and address of the purchaser, the address of the

1 location where the aircraft is to be titled or registered,
2 the address of the primary physical location of the
3 aircraft, and other information that the Department may
4 reasonably require.

5 For purposes of this item (25-7):

6 "Based in this State" means hangared, stored, or otherwise
7 used, excluding post-sale customizations as defined in this
8 Section, for 10 or more days in each 12-month period
9 immediately following the date of the sale of the aircraft.

10 "Registered in this State" means an aircraft registered
11 with the Department of Transportation, Aeronautics Division,
12 or titled or registered with the Federal Aviation
13 Administration to an address located in this State.

14 This paragraph (25-7) is exempt from the provisions of
15 Section 2-70.

16 (26) Semen used for artificial insemination of livestock
17 for direct agricultural production.

18 (27) Horses, or interests in horses, registered with and
19 meeting the requirements of any of the Arabian Horse Club
20 Registry of America, Appaloosa Horse Club, American Quarter
21 Horse Association, United States Trotting Association, or
22 Jockey Club, as appropriate, used for purposes of breeding or
23 racing for prizes. This item (27) is exempt from the provisions
24 of Section 2-70, and the exemption provided for under this item
25 (27) applies for all periods beginning May 30, 1995, but no
26 claim for credit or refund is allowed on or after January 1,

1 2008 (the effective date of Public Act 95-88) for such taxes
2 paid during the period beginning May 30, 2000 and ending on
3 January 1, 2008 (the effective date of Public Act 95-88).

4 (28) Computers and communications equipment utilized for
5 any hospital purpose and equipment used in the diagnosis,
6 analysis, or treatment of hospital patients sold to a lessor
7 who leases the equipment, under a lease of one year or longer
8 executed or in effect at the time of the purchase, to a
9 hospital that has been issued an active tax exemption
10 identification number by the Department under Section 1g of
11 this Act.

12 (29) Personal property sold to a lessor who leases the
13 property, under a lease of one year or longer executed or in
14 effect at the time of the purchase, to a governmental body that
15 has been issued an active tax exemption identification number
16 by the Department under Section 1g of this Act.

17 (30) Beginning with taxable years ending on or after
18 December 31, 1995 and ending with taxable years ending on or
19 before December 31, 2004, personal property that is donated for
20 disaster relief to be used in a State or federally declared
21 disaster area in Illinois or bordering Illinois by a
22 manufacturer or retailer that is registered in this State to a
23 corporation, society, association, foundation, or institution
24 that has been issued a sales tax exemption identification
25 number by the Department that assists victims of the disaster
26 who reside within the declared disaster area.

1 (31) Beginning with taxable years ending on or after
2 December 31, 1995 and ending with taxable years ending on or
3 before December 31, 2004, personal property that is used in the
4 performance of infrastructure repairs in this State, including
5 but not limited to municipal roads and streets, access roads,
6 bridges, sidewalks, waste disposal systems, water and sewer
7 line extensions, water distribution and purification
8 facilities, storm water drainage and retention facilities, and
9 sewage treatment facilities, resulting from a State or
10 federally declared disaster in Illinois or bordering Illinois
11 when such repairs are initiated on facilities located in the
12 declared disaster area within 6 months after the disaster.

13 (32) Beginning July 1, 1999, game or game birds sold at a
14 "game breeding and hunting preserve area" as that term is used
15 in the Wildlife Code. This paragraph is exempt from the
16 provisions of Section 2-70.

17 (33) A motor vehicle, as that term is defined in Section
18 1-146 of the Illinois Vehicle Code, that is donated to a
19 corporation, limited liability company, society, association,
20 foundation, or institution that is determined by the Department
21 to be organized and operated exclusively for educational
22 purposes. For purposes of this exemption, "a corporation,
23 limited liability company, society, association, foundation,
24 or institution organized and operated exclusively for
25 educational purposes" means all tax-supported public schools,
26 private schools that offer systematic instruction in useful

1 branches of learning by methods common to public schools and
2 that compare favorably in their scope and intensity with the
3 course of study presented in tax-supported schools, and
4 vocational or technical schools or institutes organized and
5 operated exclusively to provide a course of study of not less
6 than 6 weeks duration and designed to prepare individuals to
7 follow a trade or to pursue a manual, technical, mechanical,
8 industrial, business, or commercial occupation.

9 (34) Beginning January 1, 2000, personal property,
10 including food, purchased through fundraising events for the
11 benefit of a public or private elementary or secondary school,
12 a group of those schools, or one or more school districts if
13 the events are sponsored by an entity recognized by the school
14 district that consists primarily of volunteers and includes
15 parents and teachers of the school children. This paragraph
16 does not apply to fundraising events (i) for the benefit of
17 private home instruction or (ii) for which the fundraising
18 entity purchases the personal property sold at the events from
19 another individual or entity that sold the property for the
20 purpose of resale by the fundraising entity and that profits
21 from the sale to the fundraising entity. This paragraph is
22 exempt from the provisions of Section 2-70.

23 (35) Beginning January 1, 2000 and through December 31,
24 2001, new or used automatic vending machines that prepare and
25 serve hot food and beverages, including coffee, soup, and other
26 items, and replacement parts for these machines. Beginning

1 January 1, 2002 and through June 30, 2003, machines and parts
2 for machines used in commercial, coin-operated amusement and
3 vending business if a use or occupation tax is paid on the
4 gross receipts derived from the use of the commercial,
5 coin-operated amusement and vending machines. This paragraph
6 is exempt from the provisions of Section 2-70.

7 (35-5) Beginning August 23, 2001 and through June 30, 2016,
8 food for human consumption that is to be consumed off the
9 premises where it is sold (other than alcoholic beverages, soft
10 drinks, and food that has been prepared for immediate
11 consumption) and prescription and nonprescription medicines,
12 drugs, medical appliances, and insulin, urine testing
13 materials, syringes, and needles used by diabetics, for human
14 use, when purchased for use by a person receiving medical
15 assistance under Article V of the Illinois Public Aid Code who
16 resides in a licensed long-term care facility, as defined in
17 the Nursing Home Care Act, or a licensed facility as defined in
18 the ID/DD Community Care Act, the MC/DD Act, or the Specialized
19 Mental Health Rehabilitation Act of 2013.

20 (36) Beginning August 2, 2001, computers and
21 communications equipment utilized for any hospital purpose and
22 equipment used in the diagnosis, analysis, or treatment of
23 hospital patients sold to a lessor who leases the equipment,
24 under a lease of one year or longer executed or in effect at
25 the time of the purchase, to a hospital that has been issued an
26 active tax exemption identification number by the Department

1 under Section 1g of this Act. This paragraph is exempt from the
2 provisions of Section 2-70.

3 (37) Beginning August 2, 2001, personal property sold to a
4 lessor who leases the property, under a lease of one year or
5 longer executed or in effect at the time of the purchase, to a
6 governmental body that has been issued an active tax exemption
7 identification number by the Department under Section 1g of
8 this Act. This paragraph is exempt from the provisions of
9 Section 2-70.

10 (38) Beginning on January 1, 2002 and through June 30,
11 2016, tangible personal property purchased from an Illinois
12 retailer by a taxpayer engaged in centralized purchasing
13 activities in Illinois who will, upon receipt of the property
14 in Illinois, temporarily store the property in Illinois (i) for
15 the purpose of subsequently transporting it outside this State
16 for use or consumption thereafter solely outside this State or
17 (ii) for the purpose of being processed, fabricated, or
18 manufactured into, attached to, or incorporated into other
19 tangible personal property to be transported outside this State
20 and thereafter used or consumed solely outside this State. The
21 Director of Revenue shall, pursuant to rules adopted in
22 accordance with the Illinois Administrative Procedure Act,
23 issue a permit to any taxpayer in good standing with the
24 Department who is eligible for the exemption under this
25 paragraph (38). The permit issued under this paragraph (38)
26 shall authorize the holder, to the extent and in the manner

1 specified in the rules adopted under this Act, to purchase
2 tangible personal property from a retailer exempt from the
3 taxes imposed by this Act. Taxpayers shall maintain all
4 necessary books and records to substantiate the use and
5 consumption of all such tangible personal property outside of
6 the State of Illinois.

7 (39) Beginning January 1, 2008, tangible personal property
8 used in the construction or maintenance of a community water
9 supply, as defined under Section 3.145 of the Environmental
10 Protection Act, that is operated by a not-for-profit
11 corporation that holds a valid water supply permit issued under
12 Title IV of the Environmental Protection Act. This paragraph is
13 exempt from the provisions of Section 2-70.

14 (40) Beginning January 1, 2010, materials, parts,
15 equipment, components, and furnishings incorporated into or
16 upon an aircraft as part of the modification, refurbishment,
17 completion, replacement, repair, or maintenance of the
18 aircraft. This exemption includes consumable supplies used in
19 the modification, refurbishment, completion, replacement,
20 repair, and maintenance of aircraft, but excludes any
21 materials, parts, equipment, components, and consumable
22 supplies used in the modification, replacement, repair, and
23 maintenance of aircraft engines or power plants, whether such
24 engines or power plants are installed or uninstalled upon any
25 such aircraft. "Consumable supplies" include, but are not
26 limited to, adhesive, tape, sandpaper, general purpose

1 lubricants, cleaning solution, latex gloves, and protective
2 films. This exemption applies only to the sale of qualifying
3 tangible personal property to persons who modify, refurbish,
4 complete, replace, or maintain an aircraft and who (i) hold an
5 Air Agency Certificate and are empowered to operate an approved
6 repair station by the Federal Aviation Administration, (ii)
7 have a Class IV Rating, and (iii) conduct operations in
8 accordance with Part 145 of the Federal Aviation Regulations.
9 The exemption does not include aircraft operated by a
10 commercial air carrier providing scheduled passenger air
11 service pursuant to authority issued under Part 121 or Part 129
12 of the Federal Aviation Regulations. The changes made to this
13 paragraph (40) by Public Act 98-534 are declarative of existing
14 law.

15 (41) Tangible personal property sold to a
16 public-facilities corporation, as described in Section
17 11-65-10 of the Illinois Municipal Code, for purposes of
18 constructing or furnishing a municipal convention hall, but
19 only if the legal title to the municipal convention hall is
20 transferred to the municipality without any further
21 consideration by or on behalf of the municipality at the time
22 of the completion of the municipal convention hall or upon the
23 retirement or redemption of any bonds or other debt instruments
24 issued by the public-facilities corporation in connection with
25 the development of the municipal convention hall. This
26 exemption includes existing public-facilities corporations as

1 provided in Section 11-65-25 of the Illinois Municipal Code.

2 This paragraph is exempt from the provisions of Section 2-70.

3 (42) Beginning January 1, 2017, menstrual pads, tampons,
4 and menstrual cups.
