AMENDMENT TO HOUSE BILL 3449

AMENDMENT NO. \_\_\_\_\_. Amend House Bill 3449 by replacing everything after the enacting clause with the following:

"Section 1. Short title. This Act may be cited as the Geolocation Privacy Protection Act.

Section 5. Definitions. As used in this Act:

"Geolocation information" means information that: (i) is not the contents of a communication; (ii) is generated by or derived from, in whole or in part, the operation of a mobile device, including, but not limited to, a smart phone, tablet, or laptop computer; and (iii) is sufficient to determine or infer the precise location of that device. "Geolocation

"Location-based application" means a software application that is downloaded or installed onto a mobile device and collects, uses, or stores geolocation information.

information" does not include Internet protocol addresses.

- "Private entity" means any individual, partnership,
  corporation, limited liability company, association, or other
  group, however organized. "Private entity" does not include any
  qovernmental agency.
- Section 10. Collection, use, storage, and disclosure of geolocation information from location-based applications.
  - (a) A private entity may not collect, use, store, or disclose geolocation information from a location-based application on a person's device unless the private entity first receives the person's affirmative express consent after providing clear, prominent, and accurate notice that:
  - (1) informs the person that his or her geolocation information will be collected, used, or disclosed;
    - (2) informs the person in writing of the specific purposes for which his or her geolocation information will be collected, used, or disclosed; and
    - (3) provides the person a hyperlink or comparably easily accessible means to access the information specified in this subsection.
  - (b) A private entity may collect, use, store, or disclose geolocation information from a location-based application on a person's device without receiving affirmative express consent if the collection, storage, or disclosure is:
- 24 (1) to allow a parent or legal guardian to locate an unemancipated minor child;

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- 1 (2) to allow a court-appointed quardian to locate a 2 legally incapacitated person;
- (3) for the provision of fire, medical, public safety, 3 4 or other emergency services; or
- 5 (4) for the limited purpose of providing storage, security, or authentication services. 6
  - (c) A private entity need not obtain a person's affirmative express consent after the person's initial consent as described in subsection (a) has been obtained unless the terms previously agreed to under items (1), (2), and (3) of subsection (a) are materially changed.
- (d) This Section applies to location-based applications 12 13 created or modified after the effective date of this Act.
- 14 Section 15. Violation.
  - (a) A violation of this Act constitutes a violation of the Consumer Fraud and Deceptive Business Practices Act. Only a State's Attorney or the Attorney General may enforce a violation of this Act as an unlawful practice under the Consumer Fraud and Deceptive Business Practices Act, including when an agreement is void and unenforceable pursuant to Section 20 of this Act.
    - (b) A private entity, other than an individual, that is in violation of this Act shall have 15 days after being notified of a violation to rectify that violation before the Attorney General or appropriate State's Attorney's Office may seek an

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- enforcement action against that private entity. 1
- Section 20. Waivers; contracts. 2
- 3 (a) Any waiver of the provisions of this Act is void and 4 unenforceable.
- (b) Any agreement created or modified after the effective 5 6 date of this Act that does not comply with this Act is void and 7 unenforceable. Only a State's Attorney or the Attorney General 8 may enforce provisions of contracts as void under this Act.
  - Section 25. Applicability. This Act does not apply to: (i) a health care provider or other covered entity subject to the Federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 and the rules promulgated thereunder; (ii) a financial institution or an affiliate of a financial institution that is subject to Title V of the Federal Gramm-Leach-Bliley Act of 1999 and the rules promulgated thereunder; (iii) Internet, wireless, or telecommunications service providers; (iv) video service providers under Article XXI of the Public Utilities Act; (v) a person licensed as a private detective pursuant to the Private Detective, Private Alarm, Private Security, Fingerprint Vendor, and Locksmith Act of 2004; (vi) an individual or firm licensed under the Illinois Professional Land Surveyor Act of 1989 or the Professional Engineering Practice Act of 1989; (vii) a public utility, as defined in Section 3-105 of the Public Utilities Act, an alternative
