WHEREAS, The Eternal Indian, also known as the Black Hawk

Statue, stands high on a bluff within Lowden State Park,

overlooking the Rock River and the city of Oregon, Illinois;

and

WHEREAS, The Eternal Indian is listed on the National
Register of Historic Places and attracts visitors from across
the nation, greatly contributing to the economy of the
surrounding area; and

WHEREAS, The statue was created by Elmwood, Illinois native and internationally-renowned sculptor Lorado Taft, who came to the area to found the Eagle's Nest Art Colony, a group of artists from the Chicago Art Institute and the University of Chicago, to escape the city's summer heat; and

15 WHEREAS, Lorado Taft sought to adequately pay tribute to 16 the various Native American tribes who lived on the wooded 17 bluffs, most notably the Sauk, Fox, Sioux, and Mohawk tribes; 18 and

WHEREAS, Lorado Taft was particularly inspired by the life of Sauk leader Black Hawk, who was born in the village of Saukenuk, near what is now Rock Island, Illinois, and went on

- 1 to lead the Sauk and Fox tribes; and
- WHEREAS, Lorado Taft began constructing the statue in 1909, 2
- 3 and the statue was dedicated on July 1, 1911; and
- 4 WHEREAS, The statue stands just under 50 feet tall and is
- 5 hollow, reinforced with iron and covered by an outer layer of
- 6 cement and pink granite, which is as thick as three feet in
- 7 some spots; and
- 8 WHEREAS, Eternal Indian is estimated to weigh around
- 9 536,770 pounds and is thought to be the second largest concrete
- monolithic statue in the world; and 10
- 11 WHEREAS, After 107 years in the varying Illinois weather,
- 12 the statue has exhibited numerous signs of wear, such as deep
- cracks and pockmarks, that threaten not just the aesthetic 13
- appeal, but also the structural integrity of the statue; and 14
- 15 WHEREAS, In 2009, the General Assembly of the State of
- Illinois appropriated \$350,000 to the Lowden State Park for the 16
- 17 renovation of the statue; however, these funds were never
- received; and 18
- 19 WHEREAS, Seeing the lack of state funding, private citizens
- 20 stepped up and formed the Friends of the Black Hawk Statue

- 1 Committee, which has worked tirelessly to raise funds and
- 2 awareness of the statue; their efforts were enhanced on
- 3 November 5, 2009, when the statue was added to the U.S.
- 4 National Register of Historic Places; and
- 5 WHEREAS, We applaud the efforts of the Friends of the Black
- 6 Hawk Statue Committee, but much of the several hundred thousand
- 7 dollars that have been raised are being used for upkeep instead
- 8 of restoration; and
- 9 WHEREAS, The statue is not only a point of pride for the
- 10 people of northwest Illinois, it is a national historical
- 11 landmark and a tribute to the lives of the Native Americans who
- 12 inhabited Illinois well before the state was established;
- 13 therefore, be it
- 14 RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE
- 15 HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we
- 16 urge the Illinois Department of Natural Resources to explore
- 17 ways to finance the renovation of the Eternal Indian statue at
- 18 Lowden State Park in order to preserve a treasured Illinois
- 19 monument for generations to come; and be it further
- 20 RESOLVED, That we applaud and admire the efforts of private
- 21 citizens and the Friends of the Black Hawk Statue Committee in
- these difficult financial times; and be it further

- 1 RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be
- 2 presented to the Chairperson of the Friends of the Black Hawk
- 3 Statue Committee, the Illinois Department of Natural
- 4 Resources, and the Mayor of Oregon, Illinois.
