SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

730 ILCS 150/2

from Ch. 38, par. 222

Amends the Sex Offender Registration Act. Provides for registration under the Act of a person who committed a violation or attempted violation of the unauthorized video recording and live video transmission offense if the court: (1) finds that the offense was sexually motivated as defined in the Sex Offender Management Board Act; and (2) in its discretion requires the person to register under the Act.

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AN ACT concerning criminal law.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The Sex Offender Registration Act is amended by
changing Section 2 as follows:

6 (730 ILCS 150/2) (from Ch. 38, par. 222)

7 Sec. 2. Definitions.

8 (A) As used in this Article, "sex offender" means any 9 person who is:

10 (1) charged pursuant to Illinois law, or any 11 substantially similar federal, Uniform Code of Military 12 Justice, sister state, or foreign country law, with a sex 13 offense set forth in subsection (B) of this Section or the 14 attempt to commit an included sex offense, and:

15 (a) is convicted of such offense or an attempt to16 commit such offense; or

17 (b) is found not guilty by reason of insanity of18 such offense or an attempt to commit such offense; or

19 (c) is found not guilty by reason of insanity 20 pursuant to Section 104-25(c) of the Code of Criminal 21 Procedure of 1963 of such offense or an attempt to 22 commit such offense; or

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(d) is the subject of a finding not resulting in an

1 acquittal at a hearing conducted pursuant to Section 2 104-25(a) of the Code of Criminal Procedure of 1963 for 3 the alleged commission or attempted commission of such 4 offense; or

5 (e) is found not guilty by reason of insanity 6 following a hearing conducted pursuant to a federal, 7 Uniform Code of Military Justice, sister state, or 8 foreign country law substantially similar to Section 9 104-25(c) of the Code of Criminal Procedure of 1963 of 10 such offense or of the attempted commission of such 11 offense; or

(f) is the subject of a finding not resulting in an acquittal at a hearing conducted pursuant to a federal, Uniform Code of Military Justice, sister state, or foreign country law substantially similar to Section 104-25(a) of the Code of Criminal Procedure of 1963 for the alleged violation or attempted commission of such offense; or

20 the Illinois Sexually Dangerous Persons Act, or any
21 substantially similar federal, Uniform Code of Military
22 Justice, sister state, or foreign country law; or

(3) subject to the provisions of Section 2 of the
Interstate Agreements on Sexually Dangerous Persons Act;
or

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(4) found to be a sexually violent person pursuant to

the Sexually Violent Persons Commitment Act or any
 substantially similar federal, Uniform Code of Military
 Justice, sister state, or foreign country law; or

(5) adjudicated a juvenile delinquent as the result of 4 5 committing or attempting to commit an act which, if committed by an adult, would constitute any of the offenses 6 7 specified in item (B), (C), or (C-5) of this Section or a 8 violation of any substantially similar federal, Uniform 9 Code of Military Justice, sister state, or foreign country 10 law, or found guilty under Article V of the Juvenile Court 11 Act of 1987 of committing or attempting to commit an act 12 which, if committed by an adult, would constitute any of the offenses specified in item (B), (C), or (C-5) of this 13 14 Section or a violation of any substantially similar 15 federal, Uniform Code of Military Justice, sister state, or 16 foreign country law.

17 Convictions that result from or are connected with the same 18 act, or result from offenses committed at the same time, shall 19 be counted for the purpose of this Article as one conviction. 20 Any conviction set aside pursuant to law is not a conviction 21 for purposes of this Article.

For purposes of this Section, "convicted" shall have the same meaning as "adjudicated".

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(B) As used in this Article, "sex offense" means:

6 (1.9)Child abduction under paragraph (10)of 7 subsection (b) of Section 10-5 of the Criminal Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code of 2012 committed by luring or 8 9 attempting to lure a child under the age of 16 into a motor 10 vehicle, building, house trailer, or dwelling place 11 without the consent of the parent or lawful custodian of 12 the child for other than a lawful purpose and the offense was committed on or after January 1, 1998, provided the 13 14 offense was sexually motivated as defined in Section 10 of 15 the Sex Offender Management Board Act. If the offense was committed 8 9 before August 22, 2002, it is a sex offense requiring 10 registration only when the person is convicted of any 11 felony after July 1, 2011, and paragraph (2.1) of 12 subsection (c) of Section 3 of this Act applies.

13 (1.13) A violation or attempted violation of Section 14 <u>26-4 of the Criminal Code of 2012 (unauthorized video</u> 15 <u>recording and live video transmission) if the court: (A)</u> 16 <u>finds that the offense was sexually motivated as defined in</u> 17 <u>Section 10 of the Sex Offender Management Board Act; and</u> 18 <u>(B) in its discretion requires the person to register under</u> 19 <u>this Act.</u>

20 (2) A violation of any former law of this State
21 substantially equivalent to any offense listed in
22 subsection (B) of this Section.

(C) A conviction for an offense of federal law, Uniform
Code of Military Justice, or the law of another state or a
foreign country that is substantially equivalent to any offense
listed in subsections (B), (C), (E), and (E-5) of this Section

shall constitute a conviction for the purpose of this Article. 1 2 A finding or adjudication as a sexually dangerous person or a 3 sexually violent person under any federal law, Uniform Code of Military Justice, or the law of another state or foreign 4 5 country that is substantially equivalent to the Sexually Act or the Sexually Violent Persons 6 Dangerous Persons 7 Commitment Act shall constitute an adjudication for the 8 purposes of this Article.

9 (C-5) A person at least 17 years of age at the time of the commission of the offense who is convicted of first degree 10 11 murder under Section 9-1 of the Criminal Code of 1961 or the 12 Criminal Code of 2012, against a person under 18 years of age, 13 shall be required to register for natural life. A conviction for an offense of federal, Uniform Code of Military Justice, 14 15 sister state, or foreign country law that is substantially 16 equivalent to any offense listed in subsection (C-5) of this 17 Section shall constitute a conviction for the purpose of this Article. This subsection (C-5) applies to a person who 18 committed the offense before June 1, 1996 if: (i) the person is 19 20 incarcerated in an Illinois Department of Corrections facility on August 20, 2004 (the effective date of Public Act 93-977), 21 22 or (ii) subparagraph (i) does not apply and the person is 23 convicted of any felony after July 1, 2011, and paragraph (2.1) of subsection (c) of Section 3 of this Act applies. 24

(C-6) A person who is convicted or adjudicated delinquent
 of first degree murder as defined in Section 9-1 of the

Criminal Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code of 2012, against a 1 2 person 18 years of age or over, shall be required to register for his or her natural life. A conviction for an offense of 3 federal, Uniform Code of Military Justice, sister state, or 4 5 foreign country law that is substantially equivalent to any 6 offense listed in subsection (C-6) of this Section shall 7 constitute a conviction for the purpose of this Article. This 8 subsection (C-6) does not apply to those individuals released 9 from incarceration more than 10 years prior to January 1, 2012 10 (the effective date of Public Act 97-154).

11 (D) As used in this Article, "law enforcement agency having 12 jurisdiction" means the Chief of Police in each of the 13 municipalities in which the sex offender expects to reside, 14 work, or attend school (1) upon his or her discharge, parole or 15 release or (2) during the service of his or her sentence of 16 probation or conditional discharge, or the Sheriff of the 17 county, in the event no Police Chief exists or if the offender intends to reside, work, or attend school in an unincorporated 18 area. "Law enforcement agency having jurisdiction" includes 19 20 the location where out-of-state students attend school and where out-of-state employees are employed or are otherwise 21 22 required to register.

(D-1) As used in this Article, "supervising officer" means
 the assigned Illinois Department of Corrections parole agent or
 county probation officer.

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(E) As used in this Article, "sexual predator" means any

1 person who, after July 1, 1999, is:

2 (1) Convicted for an offense of federal, Uniform Code 3 of Military Justice, sister state, or foreign country law that is substantially equivalent to any offense listed in 4 5 subsection (E) or (E-5) of this Section shall constitute a conviction for the purpose of this Article. Convicted of a 6 7 violation or attempted violation of any of the following Sections of the Criminal Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code 8 9 of 2012: 10 10-5.1 (luring of a minor), 11-14.4 that involves keeping a place of juvenile 11 12 prostitution, or 11-17.1 (keeping a place of juvenile 13 prostitution), subdivision (a)(2) or (a)(3) of Section 11-14.4, 14 15 or Section 11-19.1 (juvenile pimping), 16 subdivision (a)(4) of Section 11-14.4, or Section 17 11-19.2 (exploitation of a child), 11-20.1 (child pornography), 18 19 11 - 20.1Bor 11-20.3 (aggravated child 20 pornography), 21 11-1.20 or 12-13 (criminal sexual assault), 22 11-1.30 or 12-14 (aggravated criminal sexual 23 assault), 11-1.40 or 12-14.1 (predatory criminal sexual 24 25 assault of a child), 26 11-1.60 or 12-16 (aggravated criminal sexual

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(3) declared as a sexually dangerous person pursuant to the Sexually Dangerous Persons Act or any substantially similar federal, Uniform Code of Military Justice, sister 7 state, or foreign country law;

8 (4) found to be a sexually violent person pursuant to 9 Sexually Violent Persons Commitment Act or any the 10 substantially similar federal, Uniform Code of Military 11 Justice, sister state, or foreign country law;

12 (5) convicted of a second or subsequent offense which requires registration pursuant to this Act. For purposes of 13 14 this paragraph (5), "convicted" shall include a conviction 15 under any substantially similar Illinois, federal, Uniform 16 Code of Military Justice, sister state, or foreign country 17 law;

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(6) (blank); or

(7) if the person was convicted of an offense set forth 19 in this subsection (E) on or before July 1, 1999, the 20 21 person is a sexual predator for whom registration is 22 required only when the person is convicted of a felony 23 offense after July 1, 2011, and paragraph (2.1) of subsection (c) of Section 3 of this Act applies. 24

25 (E-5) As used in this Article, "sexual predator" also means 26 a person convicted of a violation or attempted violation of any of the following Sections of the Criminal Code of 1961 or the
 Criminal Code of 2012:

3 (1) Section 9-1 (first degree murder, when the victim 4 was a person under 18 years of age and the defendant was at 5 least 17 years of age at the time of the commission of the 6 offense, provided the offense was sexually motivated as 7 defined in Section 10 of the Sex Offender Management Board 8 Act);

9 (2) Section 11-9.5 (sexual misconduct with a person
10 with a disability);

11 (3) when the victim is a person under 18 years of age, 12 the defendant is not a parent of the victim, the offense was sexually motivated as defined in Section 10 of the Sex 13 14 Offender Management Board Act, and the offense was 15 committed on or after January 1, 1996: (A) Section 10-1 16 (kidnapping), (B) Section 10-2 (aggravated kidnapping), (C) Section 10-3 (unlawful restraint), and (D) Section 17 18 10-3.1 (aggravated unlawful restraint); and

19 (4) Section 10-5(b)(10) (child abduction committed by 20 luring or attempting to lure a child under the age of 16 21 into a motor vehicle, building, house trailer, or dwelling 22 place without the consent of the parent or lawful custodian 23 of the child for other than a lawful purpose and the 24 offense was committed on or after January 1, 1998, provided 25 the offense was sexually motivated as defined in Section 10 26 of the Sex Offender Management Board Act).

1 (E-10) As used in this Article, "sexual predator" also 2 means a person required to register in another State due to a 3 conviction, adjudication or other action of any court 4 triggering an obligation to register as a sex offender, sexual 5 predator, or substantially similar status under the laws of 6 that State.

7 (F) As used in this Article, "out-of-state student" means 8 any sex offender, as defined in this Section, or sexual 9 predator who is enrolled in Illinois, on a full-time or 10 part-time basis, in any public or private educational 11 institution, including, but not limited to, any secondary 12 school, trade or professional institution, or institution of 13 higher learning.

(G) As used in this Article, "out-of-state employee" means 14 15 any sex offender, as defined in this Section, or sexual 16 predator who works in Illinois, regardless of whether the 17 individual receives payment for services performed, for a period of time of 10 or more days or for an aggregate period of 18 19 time of 30 or more days during any calendar year. Persons who 20 operate motor vehicles in the State accrue one day of employment time for any portion of a day spent in Illinois. 21

(H) As used in this Article, "school" means any public or private educational institution, including, but not limited to, any elementary or secondary school, trade or professional institution, or institution of higher education.

26 (I) As used in this Article, "fixed residence" means any

1 and all places that a sex offender resides for an aggregate
2 period of time of 5 or more days in a calendar year.

3 (J) As used in this Article, "Internet protocol address" 4 means the string of numbers by which a location on the Internet 5 is identified by routers or other computers connected to the 6 Internet.
