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1 AN ACT concerning education.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

Section 1. Short title. This Act may be cited as the
Relieve College Costs Pilot Program Act.

6 Section 5. Findings. The General Assembly makes all of the7 following findings:

8 (1) A college degree involving a substantive and 9 rigorous curriculum that is designed to challenge the 10 mind, enhance knowledge and skills, provide a core, 11 canonical knowledge base, expose students to great 12 literature and writing, and prepare a student for success 13 as a future citizen can be a valuable asset to residents of 14 this State.

(2) Public community colleges and universities offer 15 16 multiple existing courses of study pertaining to fundamental topics that have historically served as the 17 foundation for degrees in the humanities, including art, 18 19 philosophy, logic and rhetoric, history, literature, world religions, world languages, and studies of civilizations 20 from antiquity, that, in turn, have served as the basis 21 22 for intellectual thought and development for generations. These may be classified as high impact courses. 23

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(3) In view of COVID-19, many institutions of higher
 learning have cultivated courses that can be delivered
 through online instruction.

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(4) Many State residents will experience disruptions or economic hardships when seeking a college degree.

(5) It is in the interests of State residents to identify affordable pathways to secure a college degree.

8 (6) It is in the interests of State residents to have 9 an accredited 4-year college degree pathway based on 10 high-impact courses that costs less than \$20,000 for the 11 entirety of the degree pathway.

12 (7) It is also in the interests of State residents to employ, if possible, a degree pathway based on educational 13 14 resources that reside in the public domain or which have 15 been released under an intellectual property license that 16 allows for free use, reuse, modification, and sharing with 17 others, including full courses, course materials, modules, textbooks, streaming videos, tests, software, and any 18 19 other tools, materials, or techniques used to support access to knowledge. Many foundational materials 20 and 21 original sources used in high impact courses are 22 particularly likely to fall into these categories.

23 Section 10. Creation of a 4-year degree pathway. A pilot 24 program is created for a 4-year degree pathway, which shall 25 comply with the standards of the Higher Learning Commission, HB2928 Engrossed - 3 - LRB102 14505 CMG 19858 b

based on texts that served as the core foundational basis for western civilization and the Enlightenment. The degree pathway may not exceed \$20,000 for the full degree program. This pathway may be referred to as the Fundamental Issues and Texts Humanities Degree.

6 Section 15. Relieve College Costs Pilot Program.

7 (a) Subject to appropriation, beginning with the 2021-2022 academic year or, if funds are not appropriated for the 8 9 program that academic year, beginning with the academic year 10 in which funds are appropriated for the program, the State 11 Board of Education, Illinois Community College Board, and 12 Board of Higher Education shall coordinate with each other to 13 assign a qualified individual to serve as a program director to develop the curriculum for the 4-year degree pathway 14 15 created in Section 10.

16 If a source of outside funding for the program director is 17 secured to support the development of the program, the State 18 Board of Education, Illinois Community College Board, and 19 Board of Higher Education shall facilitate the approval of the 20 Fundamental Issues and Texts Humanities Degree curriculum 21 pathway for the public institutions agreeing to participate in 22 the pilot program.

(b) Under the program, one public high school, one public community college, and one public university in this State shall be chosen to develop a competency-based baccalaureate HB2928 Engrossed - 4 - LRB102 14505 CMG 19858 b

1 degree program for the Fundamental Issues and Texts Humanities
2 Degree. The goals of the program must include all of the
3 following:

4 (1) To prepare students who complete the program with 5 the requisite skills relating to critical thinking, 6 problem solving, rational inquiry, and oral and written 7 communication needed for employment or further graduate 8 study.

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(2) To use open educational resources if available.

10 (3) To use online course options if available to 11 reduce costs.

12 (4) To identify pathway courses that can be used to 13 promote dual credit course enrollment in the participating 14 high school.

15 (5) To have a \$20,000 maximum tuition rate for the16 entirety of the degree pathway.

17 (c) The curriculum of the pilot program must include course instruction on the canonical texts that served as the 18 foundations for western civilization and the Enlightenment in 19 20 areas that shall include, but are not limited to, philosophy, 21 literature, history, religion, government and politics, art, 22 and architecture. The program must allow for 2 courses of 23 instruction on global areas outside of western civilization in 24 areas that include, but are not limited to, philosophy, literature, history, religion, government and politics, art, 25 26 and architecture.

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1 (d) The program director shall prioritize for the pilot 2 program community colleges and public universities that have 3 existing articulation agreements. The program director shall 4 attempt to craft a degree pathway that can be satisfied by 5 existing core courses that are commonly offered at multiple 6 institutions of higher education in this State.

7 Section 20. Open educational resources adoption8 incentives.

9 (a) The State Board of Education, Illinois Community 10 College Board, and Board of Higher Education shall create a 11 panel comprised of all of the following members, who shall 12 serve without compensation:

13 Eight persons from institutions of higher (1)14 education located in this State appointed by the Executive 15 Director of the Board of Higher Education, including at 16 from а least 2 representatives university, one representative from a community college in Cook County, 17 18 representative from a community college with a one 19 district boundary that includes some portion of DuPage, 20 Kane, Lake, McHenry, or Will County, one representative 21 from a community college in downstate Illinois, and one 22 representative from a nonpublic university that has 23 participated in articulation agreements with a community 24 college.

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(2) Two persons each from a high school located in

this State that offers dual credit programs, preferably
 from geographically diverse regions, appointed by the
 State Superintendent Education.

4 (3) A person from the State Board of Education 5 appointed by the State Board of Education, a person from 6 the Illinois Community College Board appointed by the 7 Illinois Community College Board, and a person from the 8 Board of Higher Education appointed by the Board of Higher 9 Education.

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(4) Two members appointed by the Governor.

11 (5) One member of the House of Representative 12 appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, one member of the House of Representatives appointed by 13 14 the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives, one 15 member of the Senate appointed by the President of the 16 Senate, and one member of the Senate appointed by the 17 Minority Leader of the Senate.

Appointments under paragraphs (1) and (2) of this subsection (a) shall include at least 4 faculty members, a library professional, an instructional design expert, and 2 academic administrators.

The Board of Higher Education shall provide administrative and other support to the panel.

The Executive Director of the Board of Higher Education shall convene the first meeting of the panel no later than September 1, 2021. HB2928 Engrossed - 7 - LRB102 14505 CMG 19858 b

1 The panel shall seek to identify initiatives to support 2 the use of foundational materials and original sources that 3 reside in the public domain or open educational resource 4 materials in support of the degree program set forth in 5 Section 10 and to make recommendations to the General Assembly 6 no later than December 31, 2022. The panel is dissolved on 7 January 31, 2023.

8 (b) Each campus of a public university or public community 9 college district shall, upon request of its board of trustees, 10 do both of the following:

(1) Clearly highlight, by means that may include a symbol or logo in a conspicuous place on the online campus course schedule, the courses that exclusively use digital course materials that are free of charge to students or low-cost digital or print options for students.

16 (2) Ensure that the materials comply with the federal
17 Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 and the federal
18 Copyright Act of 1976.

19 (c) Subject to appropriation or third-party funding, the Illinois Community College 20 Board shall establish and 21 administer а grant program to encourage faculty at 22 institutions of higher education to adopt, modify, redesign, 23 or develop courses that use only open educational resources in support of the degree program set forth in Section 10. 24

25 Any individual who receives a grant under this subsection 26 (c) shall ensure that any open educational resources used in a HB2928 Engrossed - 8 - LRB102 14505 CMG 19858 b

1 course is provided to a student enrolled in the course at no
2 cost other than the cost of printing.

A faculty member who receives a grant under this subsection (c) must submit to the Illinois Community College Board for each of the 4 semesters immediately following the implementation of the course a report that includes:

7 (1) the number of students who have completed the 8 course;

9 (2) an estimate of the amount of money saved by a 10 student due to the use of open educational resources in 11 the course;

12 (3) the number of faculty members, if any, who adopted13 the course curriculum; and

14 (4) any other information required as a condition of15 the grant.

16 Section 25. Reporting.

(a) After the first cohort of students complete the pilot program under Section 10, the State Board of Education, Illinois Community College Board, and Board of Higher Education must submit a report to the Governor and General Assembly detailing the impact of the pilot program on all of the following:

(1) Reducing the costs of attending an institution ofhigher learning and overall student loan debt.

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(2) Elevating the importance of coursework in the

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1 classical liberal arts.

2 (3) Creating a model curriculum that can be replicated
3 through partnerships between other institutions of higher
4 learning and school districts across this State.

5 (b) This Act is inoperative on and after the State Board of 6 Education, Illinois Community College Board, and Board of 7 Higher Education submit the report required under subsection 8 (a).

9 Section 90. Rules. The Illinois Community College Board, 10 in consultation with the State Board of Education and the 11 Board of Higher Education, must adopt rules to implement this 12 Act.

Section 99. Effective date. This Act takes effect upon becoming law.
