SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

105 ILCS 5/10-20.73 new 105 ILCS 5/10-22.39 105 ILCS 5/34-18.67 new

Amends the School Code. Provides that a school district may maintain an on-site trauma kit at each school of the district for bleeding emergencies. Defines "trauma kit". Provides that products purchased for the on-site trauma kit shall be, wherever possible, products that are manufactured in the United States. Requires a school board to conduct in-service training for all school district employees on the methods to respond to trauma at least once every 2 years. Provides that a school board may satisfy the trauma response training requirements by using the training, including online training, available from the American College of Surgeons or any other similar organization. Provides that in all matters relating to trauma response training, school district employees are immune from civil liability in the use of a trauma kit unless the action constitutes willful or wanton misconduct. Effective immediately.

9	(a) In this Section, "trauma kit" means a first aid

15	(3) One hemostatic bleeding control dressing endorsed

- 14 (a) To conduct in-service training programs for teachers.
- 15 (b) In addition to other topics at in-service training 16 programs, at least once every 2 years, licensed school and administrators who work with pupils 17 personnel kindergarten through grade 12 shall be trained to identify the 18 warning signs of mental illness and suicidal behavior in youth 19 20 and shall be taught appropriate intervention and referral 21 techniques. A school district may utilize the Illinois Mental 22 Health First Aid training program, established under the Illinois Mental Health First Aid Training Act and administered 23 24 by certified instructors trained by a national association recognized as an authority in behavioral health, to provide 25

- 1 the training and meet the requirements under this subsection.
- 2 If licensed school personnel or an administrator obtains
- 3 mental health first aid training outside of an in-service
- 4 training program, he or she may present a certificate of
- 5 successful completion of the training to the school district
- 6 to satisfy the requirements of this subsection.
- 7 (c) School guidance counselors, nurses, teachers and other
- 8 school personnel who work with pupils may be trained to have a
- 9 basic knowledge of matters relating to acquired
- immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS), including the nature of the
- disease, its causes and effects, the means of detecting it and
- 12 preventing its transmission, and the availability of
- appropriate sources of counseling and referral, and any other
- 14 information that may be appropriate considering the age and
- 15 grade level of such pupils. The School Board shall supervise
- 16 such training. The State Board of Education and the Department
- of Public Health shall jointly develop standards for such
- 18 training.
- 19 (d) In this subsection (d):
- "Domestic violence" means abuse by a family or household
- 21 member, as "abuse" and "family or household members" are
- 22 defined in Section 103 of the Illinois Domestic Violence Act
- 23 of 1986.
- "Sexual violence" means sexual assault, abuse, or stalking
- of an adult or minor child proscribed in the Criminal Code of
- 26 1961 or the Criminal Code of 2012 in Sections 11-1.20,

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- 1 11-1.30, 11-1.40, 11-1.50, 11-1.60, 12-7.3, 12-7.4, 12-7.5,
- 2 12-12, 12-13, 12-14, 12-14.1, 12-15, and 12-16, including
- 3 sexual violence committed by perpetrators who are strangers to
- 4 the victim and sexual violence committed by perpetrators who
- 5 are known or related by blood or marriage to the victim.
- 6 At least once every 2 years, an in-service training 7 program for school personnel who work with pupils, including, but not limited to, school and school district administrators, 8 9 teachers, school guidance counselors, school social workers, 10 school counselors, school psychologists, and school nurses, 11 must be conducted by persons with expertise in domestic and 12 sexual violence and the needs of expectant and parenting youth 13 and shall include training concerning (i) communicating with and listening to youth victims of domestic or sexual violence 14 and expectant and parenting youth, (ii) connecting vouth 15 victims of domestic or sexual violence and expectant and 16 17 parenting youth to appropriate in-school services and other agencies, programs, and services as needed, and 18 (iii) implementing the school district's policies, procedures, and 19 20 protocols with regard to such youth, including confidentiality. At a minimum, school personnel must be 21 22 trained to understand, provide information and referrals, and 23 address issues pertaining to youth who are parents, expectant parents, or victims of domestic or sexual violence. 24
 - (e) At least every 2 years, an in-service training program for school personnel who work with pupils must be conducted by

- 1 persons with expertise in anaphylactic reactions and
- 2 management.
- 3 (f) At least once every 2 years, a school board shall
- 4 conduct in-service training on educator ethics,
- 5 teacher-student conduct, and school employee-student conduct
- for all personnel.
- 7 (q) At least once every 2 years, a school board shall
- 8 conduct in-service training for all school district employees
- 9 on the methods to respond to trauma. The training must include
- 10 instruction on how to respond to an incident involving
- life-threatening bleeding and, if applicable, how to use a
- 12 school's trauma kit. A school board may satisfy the training
