- Section 5. The Illinois Optometric Practice Act of 1987 is amended by adding Section 31 as follows:

- 7 <u>Sec. 31. Administration of vaccines.</u>
- 8 (a) A licensed optometrist may independently administer
 9 the COVID-19 vaccine upon the completion of appropriate

(b) The optometrist shall administer the COVID-19 vaccine

and must not delegate the administration to an assistant or

any other person. Vaccination of a patient by an optometrist

shall be documented in the patient's record and shall include:

- 19 <u>(3) the name, dose, manufacturer, lot number, and</u>
