SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

Provides that the amendatory Act may be referred to as the Reproductive Liberty and Justice Act. Amends the Department of Public Health Powers and Duties Law. Requires the Department of Public Health to establish reproductive health centers throughout the State to provide comprehensive access to essential reproductive health care services. Amends the Equity and Representation in Health Care Act. Expands the definition of "medical facility" to include a reproductive health center established at a nonprofit community health center. Makes other changes. Amends the Birth Center Licensing Act. Makes changes to the definition of "birth center". Amends the Licensed Certified Professional Midwife Practice Act. Provides that a licensed certified professional midwife may provide out-of-hospital care to a childbearing individual who has had a previous cesarean section, if authorized by the Department of Financial and Professional Regulation. Removes language prohibiting a licensed certified professional midwife from (1) performing an abortion or (2) knowingly accepting responsibility for prenatal or intrapartum care of a client with alcohol abuse or drug addiction. Amends the Abused and Neglected Child Reporting Act. Removes from the definition of "neglected child" any child who is a newborn infant whose blood, urine, or meconium contains any amount of a controlled substance. Makes corresponding changes to the Juvenile Court Act of 1987, the Adoption Act, and the Vital Records Act. Contains provisions concerning CAPTA notifications and prohibited disclosures regarding the results of a toxicology test administered on a newborn or pregnant person. Amends the Substance Use Disorder Act. Contains provisions concerning Plans of Safe Care. Amends the Medical Patient Rights Act. Provides that a patient has the right for a physician and other health care service providers to administer specified medical tests without disclosing the results of the test to a law enforcement agency or to the Department of Children and Family Services. Amends the Illinois Health and Hazardous Substances Registry Act. Makes changes to the definition of "adverse pregnancy outcome". Contains provisions concerning certificates of birth resulting in stillbirth. Makes other changes.

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A BILL FOR

AN ACT concerning health.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

Section 1. This Act may be referred to as the Reproductive
Liberty and Justice Act.

6 Section 3. Purpose. The purposes of this Act are to reduce 7 racial and geographic inequities that currently preclude 8 segments of the Illinois population from autonomously 9 exercising the fundamental rights and liberties provided by the Reproductive Health Act; to provide patients with a secure 10 knowledge that the personal information they disclose to 11 providers of reproductive health care services will remain 12 private and confidential; to correct deficiencies in the 13 14 implementation of Public Act 93-578, such that families who experience stillbirth are treated with dignity and respect by 15 16 this State; and to ensure that the increasing number of patients traveling to Illinois from out-of-state for legal 17 abortion care does not compound inequities in the availability 18 19 of and access to maternity care among childbearing families who reside in Illinois. 20

21 Section 4. The Substance Use Disorder Act is amended by 22 adding Section 35-15 as follows:

2	Sec. 35-15. Plans of Safe Care. The Division of Substance
3	Use Prevention and Recovery, in consultation with the Illinois
4	Perinatal Quality Collaborative or its successor organization,
5	shall develop a standardized Plan of Safe Care form to support
6	discharge planning for mothers and infants affected by
7	prenatal substance exposure. Plans of Safe Care shall not be
8	recorded in the State Central Registry described in Section 7
9	of the Abused and Neglected Child Reporting Act and shall not
10	be discoverable or admissible as evidence in any proceeding
11	pursuant to the Juvenile Court Act of 1987 or the Adoption Act
12	unless the named party waives his or her right to
13	confidentiality in writing.
14	As used in this Section, "Plan of Safe Care" means a
15	written or electronic document designed to ensure the safety
16	and well-being of a newborn who has been identified by his or
17	her healthcare provider as being affected by prenatal
18	substance exposure or withdrawal symptoms, or a fetal alcohol

19 spectrum disorder (FASD), and his or her gestational parent.

20 Section 5. The Department of Public Health Powers and 21 Duties Law of the Civil Administrative Code of Illinois is 22 amended by adding Section 2310-438 as follows:

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(20 ILCS 2310/2310-438 new)

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1	Sec. 2310-438. Reproductive health centers.
2	(a) As used in this Section, "reproductive health care"
3	has the meaning ascribed to that term in Section 1-10 of the
4	Reproductive Health Act.
5	(b) The Department shall establish reproductive health
6	centers throughout the State to provide comprehensive access
7	to essential reproductive health care services. The essential
8	reproductive health care services shall be provided at an
9	affordable price and shall include, but are not limited to,
10	all of the following:
11	(1) Annual women's health examinations, including, but
12	not limited to, Papanicolaou tests and breast
13	examinations.
14	(2) Recovery support services for pregnant and
15	postpartum individuals affected by a substance use
16	disorder, including, but not limited to, the prescription
17	of medications that are approved by the United States Food
18	and Drug Administration and the Center for Substance Abuse
19	Treatment for the treatment of an opioid use disorder in
20	pregnant individuals. As used in this paragraph, "recovery
21	support" has the meaning ascribed to that term in Section
22	1-10 of the Substance Use Disorder Act.
23	(3) Preconception wellness visits.
24	(4) Prenatal care, including, but not limited to,
25	ultrasound examinations.
26	(5) Labor and delivery services led by a physician,

1	certified nurse midwife, or licensed certified
2	professional midwife.
3	(6) Postpartum care and support.
4	(7) Examinations and prescriptions for contraceptives.
5	(8) Abortion care and post-abortion care, including,
6	but not limited to, induced terminations and management of
7	spontaneous fetal death.
8	(9) Examinations, care, and prescriptions for sexually
9	transmitted infections.
10	(10) Assessment for and prescription of pre-exposure
11	prophylaxis (PrEP).
12	(11) Perinatal doulas and community health workers who
13	specialize in reproductive health care issues.
14	(c) A reproductive health center established under this
15	Section shall not refuse access to essential reproductive
16	health care services described under subsection (b) to a
17	patient seeking access to any of those services on the basis of
18	his or her immigration status, state or territory of
19	residence, insurance status, or of any other characteristic
20	protected under the Illinois Human Rights Act.
21	(d) A reproductive health center established under this
22	Section must obtain a certificate of need from the Health
23	Facilities and Services Review Board under the Health
24	Facilities Planning Act to operate an obstetric bed unit with
25	a bed capacity of no more than 8 beds.
26	(e) A reproductive health center shall link and integrate

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1 <u>labor and delivery services with at least one hospital with a</u> 2 minimum Level 3 perinatal designation.

3 (f) A reproductive health center shall be eligible to
4 receive funding through the Department of Human Services for
5 programming described in subsection (h) and (i) of Section
6 35-5 of the Substance Use Disorder Act.

Section 10. The Equity and Representation in Health Care
Act is amended by changing Section 10 as follows:

9 (110 ILCS 932/10)

10 (This Section may contain text from a Public Act with a 11 delayed effective date)

12 Sec. 10. Definitions. <u>As used in this Act:</u>

"Accredited school" means a college or university in which a degree in allopathic medicine, osteopathic medicine, dentistry, physical therapy, or an equivalent credential for a health program is earned and for which the Council for Higher Education Accreditation or its affiliates has determined that the school meets specific standards for its programs, faculty, and curriculum.

20 "Advanced practice registered nurse" or "APRN" means an 21 advanced practice registered nurse as defined under Section 22 50-10 of the Nurse Practice Act.

23 "Allopathic medicine" means the use of pharmacological24 agents or physical interventions to treat or suppress symptoms

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1 or processes of diseases or conditions.

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2 "Applicant" means a health care professional or medical
3 facility who applies for loan repayment assistance or
4 scholarship funds under this Act.

5 "Approved graduate training" means training in medicine, 6 dentistry, or any other health profession that leads to 7 eligibility for board certification, provides evidence of 8 completion, and is approved by the appropriate health care 9 professional's body.

10 "Behavioral health provider" means a provider of a 11 commonly recognized discipline in the behavioral health 12 industry, including, but not limited to, licensed clinical 13 social workers, behavioral health therapists, certified 14 marriage and family counselors, licensed social workers, and 15 addiction counselors.

16 "Breach of service obligation" means failure for any 17 reason to begin or complete a contractual service commitment.

18 "Commercial loan" means a loan made by a bank, credit 19 union, savings and loan association, insurance company, 20 school, or other financial institution.

"Community health center" means a migrant health center, community health center, health care program for the homeless or for residents of public housing supported under Section 330 of the federal Public Health Service Act, or FQHC, including an FQHC Look-Alike, as designated by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, that operates at least one 1 federally designated primary health care delivery site in 2 Illinois.

3 "Default" means failure to meet a legal obligation or 4 condition of a loan.

"Department" means the Department of Public Health.

6 "Dental assistant" means a person who serves as a member 7 of a dental care team, working directly with a dentist to 8 perform duties that include, but are not limited to, assisting 9 with dental procedures, preparing patients for procedures, 10 preparing examinations, and sterilizing equipment.

11 "Dentist" means a person licensed to practice dentistry 12 under the Illinois Dental Practice Act.

"Director" means the Director of Public Health.

14 "Equity and Representation in Health Care Workforce 15 Repayment Program" or "Repayment Program" means the Equity and 16 Representation in Health Care Workforce Repayment Program 17 created under subsection (a) of Section 15.

18 "Equity and Representation in Health Care Workforce 19 Scholarship Program" or "Scholarship Program" means the Equity 20 and Representation in Health Care Workforce Scholarship 21 Program created under subsection (b) of Section 15.

22 "Federally Qualified Health Center" or "FQHC" means a 23 health center funded under Section 330 of the federal Public 24 Health Service Act.

25 "Federally Qualified Health Center Look-Alike" or "FQHC26 Look-Alike" means a health center that meets the requirements

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1 for receiving a grant under Section 330 of the federal Public 2 Health Service Act but does not receive funding under that 3 authority.

Government loan" means a loan made by a federal, State,
county, or city agency authorized to make the loan.

6 "Health care professional" means a physician, physician 7 assistant, advanced practice registered nurse, nurse, <u>licensed</u> 8 <u>certified professional midwife</u>, chiropractic physician, 9 podiatrist, physical therapist, physical therapist assistant, 10 occupational therapist, speech therapist, behavioral health 11 provider, psychiatrist, psychologist, pharmacist, dentist, 12 medical assistant, dental assistant, or dental hygienist.

"Health professional shortage area" or "HPSA" means a designation from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services that indicates the shortage of primary medical care or dental or mental health providers. The designation may be geographic, such as a county or service area; demographic, such as low-income population; or institutional, such as a comprehensive health center, FQHC, or other public facility.

20 "Lender" means the commercial or government entity that 21 makes a qualifying loan.

22 "Licensed certified professional midwife" means a person 23 who meets the requirements under Section 45 of the Licensed 24 Certified Professional Midwife Practice Act and holds an 25 active license to practice as a certified professional midwife 26 in Illinois.

1 "Loan repayment award" or "award" means the amount of 2 funding awarded to a recipient based upon his or her 3 reasonable educational expenses, up to a maximum established 4 by the program.

5 "Loan repayment agreement" or "agreement" means the 6 written instrument defining a legal relationship entered into 7 between the Department and a recipient.

8 "Medical assistant" means a person who serves as a member 9 of a medical care team working directly with other providers 10 to perform duties that include, but are not limited to, 11 gathering patient information, taking vital signs, preparing 12 patients for examinations, and assisting physicians during 13 examinations.

14 "Medical facility" means a facility in which the delivery 15 of health services is provided. A medical facility must be a 16 nonprofit or public facility located in Illinois and includes 17 the following:

18

(1) A Federally Qualified Health Center.

19

(2) An FQHC Look-Alike.

20 (3) A hospital system operated by a county with more
21 than 3,000,000 residents.

22 <u>(4) A reproductive health center established at a</u> 23 <u>nonprofit community health center under Section 2310-438</u> 24 <u>of the Department of Public Health Powers and Duties Law</u> 25 <u>of the Civil Administrative Code of Illinois, if approved</u> 26 <u>by the Department.</u> 1 "Medically underserved area" or "MUA" means an area 2 designated by the U.S. Department of Health and Human 3 Services' Health Resources and Services Administration as 4 having too few primary care providers, high infant mortality, 5 high poverty, or a high elderly population.

6 "Nurse" means a person who is licensed as a licensed 7 practical nurse or as a registered nurse under the Nurse 8 Practice Act.

9 "Osteopathic medicine" means medical practice based upon 10 the theory that diseases are due to loss of structural 11 integrity, which can be restored by manipulation of the parts 12 and supplemented by therapeutic measures.

13 "Physical therapist" means an individual licensed as a14 physical therapist under the Illinois Physical Therapy Act.

15 "Physical therapist assistant" means an individual 16 licensed as a physical therapist assistant under the Illinois 17 Physical Therapy Act.

18 "Physician" means a person licensed to practice medicine 19 in all of its branches under the Medical Practice Act of 1987.

20 "Physician assistant" means an individual licensed under21 the Physician Assistant Practice Act of 1987.

22 "Primary care" means health care that encompasses 23 prevention services, basic diagnostic and treatment services, 24 and support services, including laboratory, radiology, 25 transportation, and pharmacy services.

26 "Psychiatrist" means a physician licensed to practice

1 medicine in Illinois under the Medical Practice Act of 1987
2 who has successfully completed an accredited residency program
3 in psychiatry.

⁴ "Qualifying loan" means a government loan or commercial ⁵ loan used for tuition and reasonable educational and living ⁶ expenses related to undergraduate or graduate education that ⁷ was obtained by the recipient prior to his or her application ⁸ for loan repayment and that is contemporaneous with the ⁹ education received.

10 "Reasonable educational expenses" means costs for 11 education, exclusive of tuition. These costs include, but are 12 not limited to, fees, books, supplies, clinical travel, educational equipment, materials, board certification, or 13 14 licensing examinations. "Reasonable educational expenses" do 15 not exceed the estimated standard budget for expenses for the 16 degree program and for the years of enrollment.

17 "Reasonable living expenses" means room and board, 18 transportation, and commuting costs associated with the 19 applicant's attendance and participation in <u>an</u> educational and 20 workforce training program. "Reasonable living expenses" do 21 not exceed the estimated standard budget for the recipient's 22 degree program and for the years of enrollment.

23 "Recognized training entity" means an entity approved by 24 the Department to provide training and education for medical 25 assistants and dental assistants.

26 "Recipient" means a health care professional or medical

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1 facility that may use loan repayment funds.

2	"Rural" has the same meaning that is used by the federal
3	Health Resources and Services Administration to determine
4	eligibility for Rural Health Grants.

5 "State" means the State of Illinois.

Section 15. The Hospital Licensing Act is amended by
changing Section 11.4 and by adding Section 11.9 as follows:

9 (210 ILCS 85/11.4)

10 Sec. 11.4. Disposition of fetus. A hospital having custody of a fetus following a spontaneous fetal demise occurring 11 during or after a gestation period of less than 20 completed 12 13 weeks must notify the mother of her right to arrange for the 14 burial or cremation of the fetus. Notification may also 15 include other options such as, but not limited to, a ceremony, a certificate, or common burial or cremation of fetal tissue. 16 If, within 24 hours after being notified under this Section, 17 18 the mother elects in writing to arrange for the burial or 19 cremation of the fetus, the disposition of the fetus shall be 20 subject to the same laws and rules that apply in the case of a 21 fetal death that occurs in this State after a gestation period 22 of 20 completed weeks or more. The Department of Public Health 23 shall develop forms to be used for notifications and elections 24 under this Section and hospitals shall provide the forms to

(210 ILCS 85/11.9 new)

4 Sec. 11.9. Certificate of birth resulting in stillbirth; 5 notification. This Section may be referred to as Liam's Law. 6 A hospital having custody of a fetus following a 7 spontaneous fetal death occurring during or after a gestation 8 period of at least 20 completed weeks must notify the gestational parent of the parent's right to receive a 9 10 certificate of birth resulting in stillbirth as described in 11 Section 20.5 of the Vital Records Act. The Department of 12 Public Health shall develop a form to be used for notification 13 under this Section and hospitals shall provide the form to the gestational parent. This form shall be known as a "Liam's Law 14 15 notice." The Department of Public Health shall consult with 16 the 2 Illinois-based Fetal Infant Mortality Review Project Community Action Teams, or their successor organizations, to 17 18 ensure that any language included in the standardized "Liam's Law notice" is culturally sensitive to the needs of bereaved 19 families. The "Liam's Law notice" shall be available in both 20 21 English and Spanish.

22 Section 20. The Birth Center Licensing Act is amended by 23 changing Section 5 as follows:

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(210 ILCS 170/5) 1 2 (Text of Section before amendment by P.A. 102-964) Sec. 5. Definitions. In this Act: 3 "Birth center" means a designated site, other than a 4 5 hospital: 6 (1) in which births are planned to occur following a 7 normal, uncomplicated, and low-risk pregnancy; (2) that is not the pregnant person's usual place of 8 9 residence: (3) that is exclusively dedicated to serving the 10 11 reproductive health care childbirth-related needs of 12 pregnant persons and their newborns, and has no more than 13 10 beds; (4) that offers prenatal care and community education 14 15 services and coordinates these services with other health 16 care services available in the community; and 17 (5) that does not provide general anesthesia; and or 18 surgery. (6) that does not provide surgery except as allowed by 19 20 the Department by rule. "Certified nurse midwife" means an advanced practice 21 registered nurse licensed in Illinois under the Nurse Practice 22 23 Act with full practice authority or who is delegated such 24 authority as part of a written collaborative agreement with a 25 physician who is associated with the birthing center or who 26 has privileges at a nearby birthing hospital.

"Department" means the Illinois Department of Public

3 "Hospital" does not include places where pregnant females 4 are received, cared for, or treated during delivery if it is in 5 a licensed birth center, nor include any facility required to 6 be licensed as a birth center.

7 "Physician" means a physician licensed to practice8 medicine in all its branches in Illinois.

9 <u>"Reproductive health care" has the meaning ascribed to</u>
 10 <u>that term in Section 1-10 of the Reproductive Health Act.</u>

18 "Licensed certified professional midwife" means a person 19 who has successfully met the requirements under Section 45 of 20 the Licensed Certified Professional Midwife Practice Act and 21 holds an active license to practice as a licensed certified 22 professional midwife in Illinois.

23 "Physician" means a physician licensed to practice24 medicine in all its branches in Illinois.

25 <u>"Reproductive health care" has the meaning ascribed to</u>
 26 <u>that term Section 1-10 of the Reproductive Health Act.</u>

13	(3) use vacuum extractors or forceps;
14	(4) prescribe medications;
15	(5) provide out-of-hospital <u>intrapartum</u> care to a

18	(6) perform abortions or surgical procedures,
19	including, but not limited to, cesarean sections and
20	circumcisions, except for an emergency episiotomy;

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Section 30. The Abused and Neglected Child Reporting Act
 is amended by changing Sections 3, 5, and 7.3 and by adding
 Section 3.5 as follows:

(325 ILCS 5/3) (from Ch. 23, par. 2053)

5 Sec. 3. As used in this Act unless the context otherwise 6 requires:

7 "Adult resident" means any person between 18 and 22 years 8 of age who resides in any facility licensed by the Department 9 under the Child Care Act of 1969. For purposes of this Act, the 10 criteria set forth in the definitions of "abused child" and 11 "neglected child" shall be used in determining whether an 12 adult resident is abused or neglected.

13 "Agency" means a child care facility licensed under 14 Section 2.05 or Section 2.06 of the Child Care Act of 1969 and 15 includes a transitional living program that accepts children 16 and adult residents for placement who are in the guardianship 17 of the Department.

"Blatant disregard" means an incident where the real, 18 significant, and imminent risk of harm would be so obvious to a 19 reasonable parent or caretaker that it is unlikely that a 20 21 reasonable parent or caretaker would have exposed the child to 22 danger without exercising precautionary measures to the 23 protect the child from harm. With respect to a person working 24 at an agency in his or her professional capacity with a child 25 or adult resident, "blatant disregard" includes a failure by

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the person to perform job responsibilities intended to protect 1 2 the child's or adult resident's health, physical well-being, 3 or welfare, and, when viewed in light of the surrounding circumstances, evidence exists that would cause a reasonable 4 5 person to believe that the child was neglected. With respect to an agency, "blatant disregard" includes a failure to 6 7 implement practices that ensure the health, physical 8 well-being, or welfare of the children and adult residents 9 residing in the facility.

10 <u>"CAPTA notification" refers to notification to the</u> 11 <u>Department of an infant who has been born and identified as</u> 12 <u>affected by prenatal substance exposure or a fetal alcohol</u> 13 <u>spectrum disorder as required under the federal Child Abuse</u> 14 <u>Prevention and Treatment Act.</u>

15 "Child" means any person under the age of 18 years, unless 16 legally emancipated by reason of marriage or entry into a 17 branch of the United States armed services.

18 "Department" means Department of Children and Family 19 Services.

20 "Local law enforcement agency" means the police of a city, 21 town, village or other incorporated area or the sheriff of an 22 unincorporated area or any sworn officer of the Illinois State 23 Police.

24 "Abused child" means a child whose parent or immediate 25 family member, or any person responsible for the child's 26 welfare, or any individual residing in the same home as the

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1 child, or a paramour of the child's parent:

(a) inflicts, causes to be inflicted, or allows to be
inflicted upon such child physical injury, by other than

(c) commits or allows to be committed any sex offense against such child, as such sex offenses are defined in the Criminal Code of 2012 or in the Wrongs to Children Act, and extending those definitions of sex offenses to include children under 18 years of age;

17 (d) commits or allows to be committed an act or acts of18 torture upon such child;

(e) inflicts excessive corporal punishment or, in the case of a person working for an agency who is prohibited from using corporal punishment, inflicts corporal punishment upon a child or adult resident with whom the person is working in his or her professional capacity;

(f) commits or allows to be committed the offense of female genital mutilation, as defined in Section 12-34 of the Criminal Code of 2012, against the child;

(g) causes to be sold, transferred, distributed, or 1 given to such child under 18 years of age, a controlled 2 substance as defined in Section 102 of the Illinois 3 Controlled Substances Act in violation of Article IV of 4 5 the Illinois Controlled Substances Act or in violation of the Methamphetamine Control and Community Protection Act, 6 7 except for controlled substances that are prescribed in accordance with Article III of the Illinois Controlled 8 9 Substances Act and are dispensed to such child in a manner 10 that substantially complies with the prescription;

(h) commits or allows to be committed the offense of involuntary servitude, involuntary sexual servitude of a minor, or trafficking in persons as defined in Section 14 10-9 of the Criminal Code of 2012 against the child; or

(i) commits the offense of grooming, as defined in
Section 11-25 of the Criminal Code of 2012, against the
child.

A child shall not be considered abused for the sole reason that the child has been relinquished in accordance with the Abandoned Newborn Infant Protection Act.

"Neglected child" means any child who is not receiving the proper or necessary nourishment or medically indicated treatment including food or care not provided solely on the basis of the present or anticipated mental or physical impairment as determined by a physician acting alone or in consultation with other physicians or otherwise is not

1 receiving the proper or necessary support or medical or other 2 remedial care recognized under State law as necessary for a 3 child's well-being, or other care necessary for his or her well-being, including adequate food, clothing and shelter; or 4 5 who is subjected to an environment which is injurious insofar as (i) the child's environment creates a likelihood of harm to 6 7 the child's health, physical well-being, or welfare and (ii) 8 the likely harm to the child is the result of a blatant 9 disregard of parent, caretaker, person responsible for the 10 child's welfare, or agency responsibilities; or who is 11 abandoned by his or her parents or other person responsible 12 for the child's welfare without a proper plan of care; or who has been provided with interim crisis intervention services 13 under Section 3-5 of the Juvenile Court Act of 1987 and whose 14 15 parent, quardian, or custodian refuses to permit the child to 16 return home and no other living arrangement agreeable to the 17 parent, guardian, or custodian can be made, and the parent, guardian, or custodian has not made any other appropriate 18 19 living arrangement for the child; or who is a newborn infant 20 whose blood, urine, or meconium contains any amount of a 21 controlled substance as defined in subsection (f) of Section 22 102 of the Illinois Controlled Substances Act or a metabolite 23 thereof, with the exception of a controlled substance or 24 metabolite thereof whose presence in the newborn infant is the 25 result of medical treatment administered to the mother or the 26 newborn infant. A child shall not be considered neglected for

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the sole reason that the child's parent or other person 1 2 responsible for his or her welfare has left the child in the 3 care of an adult relative for any period of time. A child shall not be considered neglected for the sole reason that the child 4 has been relinquished in accordance with the Abandoned Newborn 5 6 Infant Protection Act. A child shall not be considered neglected or abused for the sole reason that such child's 7 8 parent or other person responsible for his or her welfare 9 depends upon spiritual means through prayer alone for the 10 treatment or cure of disease or remedial care as provided 11 under Section 4 of this Act. A child shall not be considered 12 neglected or abused solely because the child is not attending 13 school in accordance with the requirements of Article 26 of 14 The School Code, as amended.

15 "Child Protective Service Unit" means certain specialized 16 State employees of the Department assigned by the Director to 17 perform the duties and responsibilities as provided under 18 Section 7.2 of this Act.

19 "Near fatality" means an act that, as certified by a 20 physician, places the child in serious or critical condition, 21 including acts of great bodily harm inflicted upon children 22 under 13 years of age, and as otherwise defined by Department 23 rule.

"Great bodily harm" includes bodily injury which creates a high probability of death, or which causes serious permanent disfigurement, or which causes a permanent or protracted loss

or impairment of the function of any bodily member or organ, or
 other serious bodily harm.

"Person responsible for the child's welfare" means the 3 child's parent; quardian; foster parent; relative careqiver; 4 5 any person responsible for the child's welfare in a public or institution; 6 private residential agency or any person 7 responsible for the child's welfare within a public or private 8 profit or not for profit child care facility; or any other 9 person responsible for the child's welfare at the time of the 10 alleged abuse or neglect, including any person who commits or allows to be committed, against the child, the offense of 11 12 involuntary servitude, involuntary sexual servitude of a minor, or trafficking in persons for forced labor or services, 13 as provided in Section 10-9 of the Criminal Code of 2012, 14 including, but not limited to, the custodian of the minor, or 15 16 any person who came to know the child through an official 17 capacity or position of trust, including, but not limited to, health care professionals, educational personnel, recreational 18 supervisors, members of the clergy, and volunteers or support 19 20 personnel in any setting where children may be subject to 21 abuse or neglect.

"Temporary protective custody" means custody within a hospital or other medical facility or a place previously designated for such custody by the Department, subject to review by the Court, including a licensed foster home, group home, or other institution; but such place shall not be a jail

or other place for the detention of criminal or juvenile
 offenders.

3 "An unfounded report" means any report made under this Act 4 for which it is determined after an investigation that no 5 credible evidence of abuse or neglect exists.

6 "An indicated report" means a report made under this Act 7 if an investigation determines that credible evidence of the 8 alleged abuse or neglect exists.

9 "An undetermined report" means any report made under this 10 Act in which it was not possible to initiate or complete an 11 investigation on the basis of information provided to the 12 Department.

"Subject of report" means any child reported to the central register of child abuse and neglect established under Section 7.7 of this Act as an alleged victim of child abuse or neglect and the parent or guardian of the alleged victim or other person responsible for the alleged victim's welfare who is named in the report or added to the report as an alleged perpetrator of child abuse or neglect.

20 "Perpetrator" means a person who, as a result of 21 investigation, has been determined by the Department to have 22 caused child abuse or neglect.

23 "Member of the clergy" means a clergyman or practitioner 24 of any religious denomination accredited by the religious body 25 to which he or she belongs.

(h) "Hazardous substances" means a hazardous substance asdefined in the Environmental Protection Act.

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1 (i) "Hazardous substances incident" includes but is not 2 limited to a spill, fire, or accident involving hazardous 3 substances, illegal disposal, transportation, or use of 4 hazardous substances, and complaints or permit violations 5 involving hazardous substances.

6 (j) "Company profile" includes but is not limited to the 7 name of any company operating in the State of Illinois which 8 uses, disposes of or transports hazardous generates, 9 substances, identification of the types of permits issued in 10 such company's name relating to transactions involving 11 hazardous substances, inventory of hazardous substances 12 handled by such company, and the manner in which such 13 hazardous substances are used, disposed of, or transported by 14 the company.

15 (k) "Hazardous nuclear material" means (1) any source or 16 special nuclear material intended for use or used as an energy 17 source in a production or utilization facility as defined in Sec. 11.v. or 11.cc. of the federal Atomic Energy Act of 1954 18 19 as amended; (2) any fuel which has been discharged from such a 20 facility following irradiation, the constituent elements of 21 which have not been separated by reprocessing; or (3) any 22 by-product material resulting from operation of such a 23 facility.

(1) "Adverse pregnancy outcome" includes, but is not
limited to, birth defects, <u>spontaneous fetal death after 20</u>
<u>weeks of completed gestation</u> fetal loss, infant mortality, low

birth weight, <u>neonatal abstinence syndrome, newborn affected</u> <u>by prenatal substance exposure, fetal alcohol spectrum</u> <u>disorders, selected life-threatening conditions, and other</u> developmental disabilities as defined by the Department.

5 <u>"Neonatal abstinence syndrome" refers to the collection of</u> 6 <u>signs and symptoms that occur when a newborn prenatally</u> 7 <u>exposed to prescribed, diverted, or illicit opiates</u> 8 <u>experiences opioid withdrawal. This syndrome is primarily</u> 9 <u>characterized by irritability, tremors, feeding problems,</u> 10 vomiting, diarrhea, sweating, and in some cases, seizures.

Infant born and identified as being affected by substance infant born and identified as being affected by substance abuse or withdrawal symptoms resulting from prenatal exposure to controlled substances or a fetal alcohol spectrum disorder. The healthcare provider involved in the delivery or care of the newborn determines whether the infant is affected by prenatal substance exposure or withdrawal symptoms.

(m) "News medium" means any newspaper or other periodical 18 issued at regular intervals, whether in print or electronic 19 20 format, and having a general circulation; a news service, whether in print or electronic format; a radio station, a 21 22 television station; a television network; a community antenna 23 television service; and any person or corporation engaged in the making of news reels or other motion picture news for 24 25 public showing.

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(n) "Researcher" means an individual who is affiliated

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with or supported by universities, academic centers, research
 institutions, hospitals, and governmental entities who conduct
 scientific research or investigation on human diseases.

fetus is first removed from the conveyance shall be

considered the place of delivery and a fetal death
 certificate shall be filed in the registration district in
 which the place is located.

The personal data shall be obtained from the 7 best qualified person or source available. The name, 8 relationship, and address of the informant shall be 9 entered on the certificate. B. "Related child" means a child subject to adoption where 6 7 either or both of the adopting parents stands in any of the 8 following relationships to the child by blood, marriage, 9 civil union: adoption, or parent, grand-parent, 10 great-grandparent, brother, sister, step-parent, 11 step-grandparent, step-brother, step-sister, uncle, aunt, 12 great-uncle, great-aunt, first cousin, or second cousin. A 13 person is related to the child as a first cousin or second 14 cousin if they are both related to the same ancestor as either grandchild or great-grandchild. A child whose parent has 15 16 executed a consent to adoption, a surrender, or a waiver 17 pursuant to Section 10 of this Act or whose parent has signed a denial of paternity pursuant to Section 12 of the Vital 18 Records Act or Section 12a of this Act, or whose parent has had 19 20 his or her parental rights terminated, is not a related child to that person, unless (1) the consent is determined to be void 21 22 or is void pursuant to subsection O of Section 10 of this Act; 23 or (2) the parent of the child executed a consent to adoption 24 by a specified person or persons pursuant to subsection A-1 of 25 Section 10 of this Act and a court of competent jurisdiction 26 finds that such consent is void; or (3) the order terminating 1 the parental rights of the parent is vacated by a court of 2 competent jurisdiction.

3 C. "Agency" for the purpose of this Act means a public 4 child welfare agency or a licensed child welfare agency.

5 D. "Unfit person" means any person whom the court shall 6 find to be unfit to have a child, without regard to the 7 likelihood that the child will be placed for adoption. The 8 grounds of unfitness are any one or more of the following, 9 except that a person shall not be considered an unfit person 10 for the sole reason that the person has relinquished a child in 11 accordance with the Abandoned Newborn Infant Protection Act:

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(a) Abandonment of the child.

5 (1) Two or more findings of physical abuse have 6 been entered regarding any children under Section 2-21 7 of the Juvenile Court Act of 1987, the most recent of 8 which was determined by the juvenile court hearing the 9 matter to be supported by clear and convincing 10 evidence; or

11 (2) The parent has been convicted or found not 12 guilty by reason of insanity and the conviction or 13 finding resulted from the death of any child by 14 physical abuse; or

15 (3) There is a finding of physical child abuse
16 resulting from the death of any child under Section
17 2-21 of the Juvenile Court Act of 1987.

18 No conviction or finding of delinquency pursuant to 19 Article V of the Juvenile Court Act of 1987 shall be 20 considered a criminal conviction for the purpose of 21 applying any presumption under this item (f).

(g) Failure to protect the child from conditionswithin his environment injurious to the child's welfare.

(h) Other neglect of, or misconduct toward the child;
provided that in making a finding of unfitness the court
hearing the adoption proceeding shall not be bound by any

1 previous finding, order judgment affecting or or 2 determining the rights of the parents toward the child 3 sought to be adopted in any other proceeding except such proceedings terminating parental rights as shall be had 4 5 under either this Act, the Juvenile Court Act or the Juvenile Court Act of 1987. 6

7 (i) Depravity. 12-14.1 of the Criminal Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code 1 of 2012; (6) heinous battery of any child in violation of 2 3 the Criminal Code of 1961; (7) aggravated battery of any child in violation of the Criminal Code of 1961 or the 4 5 Criminal Code of 2012; (8) any violation of Section 11-1.20 or Section 12-13 of the Criminal Code of 1961 or 6 7 the Criminal Code of 2012; (9) any violation of subsection (a) of Section 11-1.50 or Section 12-16 of the Criminal 8 9 Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code of 2012; (10) any 10 violation of Section 11-9.1 of the Criminal Code of 1961 11 or the Criminal Code of 2012; (11) any violation of 12 Section 11-9.1A of the Criminal Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code of 2012; or (12) an offense in any other 13 14 state the elements of which are similar and bear a 15 substantial relationship to any of the enumerated offenses 16 in this subsection (i).

There is a rebuttable presumption that a parent is depraved if the parent has been criminally convicted of at least 3 felonies under the laws of this State or any other state, or under federal law, or the criminal laws of any United States territory; and at least one of these convictions took place within 5 years of the filing of the petition or motion seeking termination of parental rights.

There is a rebuttable presumption that a parent is depraved if that parent has been criminally convicted of either first or second degree murder of any person as defined in the Criminal Code of 1961 or the Criminal Code
 of 2012 within 10 years of the filing date of the petition
 or motion to terminate parental rights.

No conviction or finding of delinquency pursuant to Article 5 of the Juvenile Court Act of 1987 shall be considered a criminal conviction for the purpose of applying any presumption under this item (i).

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(j) Open and notorious adultery or fornication.

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(j-1) (Blank).

10 (k) Habitual drunkenness or addiction to drugs, other 11 than those prescribed by a physician, for at least one 12 year immediately prior to the commencement of the 13 unfitness proceeding.

If a service plan has been 16 established as required under Section 8.2 of the Abused Neglected Child Reporting Act to correct 17 and the conditions that were the basis for the removal of the 18 19 child from the parent and if those services were 20 available, then, for purposes of this Act, "failure to 21 make reasonable progress toward the return of the child to 22 the parent" includes the parent's failure to substantially 23 fulfill his or her obligations under the service plan and 24 correct the conditions that brought the child into care 25 during any 9-month period following the adjudication under Section 2-3 or 2-4 of the Juvenile Court Act of 1987. 26

1 Notwithstanding any other provision, when a petition or 2 motion seeks to terminate parental rights on the basis of 3 item (ii) of this subsection (m), the petitioner shall file with the court and serve on the parties a pleading 4 5 that specifies the 9-month period or periods relied on. 6 The pleading shall be filed and served on the parties no 7 later than 3 weeks before the date set by the court for closure of discovery, and the allegations in the pleading 8 9 shall be treated as incorporated into the petition or 10 motion. Failure of a respondent to file a written denial 11 of the allegations in the pleading shall not be treated as 12 an admission that the allegations are true.

(n) Evidence of intent to forgo his or her parental 14 15 rights, whether or not the child is a ward of the court, 16 (1) as manifested by his or her failure for a period of 12 17 months: (i) to visit the child, (ii) to communicate with the child or agency, although able to do so and not 18 19 prevented from doing so by an agency or by court order, or 20 (iii) to maintain contact with or plan for the future of 21 the child, although physically able to do so, or (2) as 22 manifested by the father's failure, where he and the 23 mother of the child were unmarried to each other at the 24 time of the child's birth, (i) to commence legal 25 proceedings to establish his paternity under the Illinois 26 Parentage Act of 1984, the Illinois Parentage Act of 2015,

I. "Habitual residence" has the meaning ascribed to it in the federal Intercountry Adoption Act of 2000 and regulations promulgated thereunder.

J. "Immediate relatives" means the biological parents, the parents of the biological parents and siblings of the biological parents.

K. "Intercountry adoption" is a process by which a child from a country other than the United States is adopted by persons who are habitual residents of the United States, or the child is a habitual resident of the United States who is adopted by persons who are habitual residents of a country other than the United States.

M. "Interstate Compact on the Placement of Children" is a law enacted by all states and certain territories for the purpose of establishing uniform procedures for handling the interstate placement of children in foster homes, adoptive homes, or other child care facilities.

16 N. (Blank).

0. "Preadoption requirements" means any conditions or standards established by the laws or administrative rules of this State that must be met by a prospective adoptive parent prior to the placement of a child in an adoptive home.

P. "Abused child" means a child whose parent or immediate family member, or any person responsible for the child's welfare, or any individual residing in the same home as the child, or a paramour of the child's parent:

(a) inflicts, causes to be inflicted, or allows to be
 inflicted upon the child physical injury, by other than

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accidental means, that causes death, disfigurement, impairment of physical or emotional health, or loss or impairment of any bodily function;

4 (b) creates a substantial risk of physical injury to 5 the child by other than accidental means which would be 6 likely to cause death, disfigurement, impairment of 7 physical or emotional health, or loss or impairment of any 8 bodily function;

9 (c) commits or allows to be committed any sex offense 10 against the child, as sex offenses are defined in the 11 Criminal Code of 2012 and extending those definitions of 12 sex offenses to include children under 18 years of age;

"Neglected child" means any child whose parent or other 17 person responsible for the child's welfare withholds or denies nourishment or medically indicated treatment including food or 18 19 care denied solely on the basis of the present or anticipated 20 mental or physical impairment as determined by a physician acting alone or in consultation with other physicians or 21 22 otherwise does not provide the proper or necessary support, 23 education as required by law, or medical or other remedial care recognized under State law as necessary for a child's 24 25 well-being, or other care necessary for his or her well-being, including adequate food, clothing and shelter; or who is 26

1 abandoned by his or her parents or other person responsible 2 for the child's welfare.

A child shall not be considered neglected or abused for 3 the sole reason that the child's parent or other person 4 5 responsible for his or her welfare depends upon spiritual 6 means through prayer alone for the treatment or cure of disease or remedial care as provided under Section 4 of the 7 8 Abused and Neglected Child Reporting Act. A child shall not be 9 considered neglected or abused for the sole reason that the 10 child's parent or other person responsible for the child's 11 welfare failed to vaccinate, delayed vaccination, or refused 12 vaccination for the child due to a waiver on religious or medical grounds as permitted by law. 13

R. "Putative father" means a man who may be a child's 14 15 father, but who (1) is not married to the child's mother on or 16 before the date that the child was or is to be born and (2) has 17 not established paternity of the child in a court proceeding before the filing of a petition for the adoption of the child. 18 19 The term includes a male who is less than 18 years of age. "Putative father" does not mean a man who is the child's father 20 as a result of criminal sexual abuse or assault as defined 21 22 under Article 11 of the Criminal Code of 2012.

23 S. "Standby adoption" means an adoption in which a parent 24 consents to custody and termination of parental rights to 25 become effective upon the occurrence of a future event, which 26 is either the death of the parent or the request of the parent

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1 for the entry of a final judgment of adoption.

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3 T-5. "Biological parent", "birth parent", or "natural 4 parent" of a child are interchangeable terms that mean a 5 person who is biologically or genetically related to that 6 child as a parent.

7 U. "Interstate adoption" means the placement of a minor 8 child with a prospective adoptive parent for the purpose of 9 pursuing an adoption for that child that is subject to the 10 provisions of the Interstate Compact on the Placement of 11 Children.

13 W. (Blank).

14 X. "Legal father" of a child means a man who is recognized 15 as or presumed to be that child's father:

(1) because of his marriage to or civil union with the
child's parent at the time of the child's birth or within
300 days prior to that child's birth, unless he signed a
denial of paternity pursuant to Section 12 of the Vital
Records Act or a waiver pursuant to Section 10 of this Act;
or

(2) because his paternity of the child has been
established pursuant to the Illinois Parentage Act, the
Illinois Parentage Act of 1984, or the Gestational
Surrogacy Act; or

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(3) because he is listed as the child's father or

"Secondary placement" means a placement, including but 13 not limited to the placement of a youth in care as defined in 14 15 Section 4d of the Children and Family Services Act, that 16 occurs after а placement disruption or an adoption 17 dissolution. "Secondary placement" does not mean secondary placements arising due to the death of the adoptive parent of 18 19 the child.

20 CC. "Adoption dissolution" means a circumstance where the 21 child is removed from an adoptive placement after the adoption 22 is finalized.

DD. "Unregulated placement" means the secondary placement of a child that occurs without the oversight of the courts, the Department, or a licensed child welfare agency.

26 EE. "Post-placement and post-adoption support services"

1 means support services for placed or adopted children and 2 families that include, but are not limited to, mental health 3 treatment, including counseling and other support services for 4 emotional, behavioral, or developmental needs, and treatment 5 for substance abuse.

FF. "Youth in care" has the meaning provided in Section 4dof the Children and Family Services Act.
