SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

Amends the Illinois Certified Shorthand Reporters Act of 1984. Provides that the practice of shorthand reporting includes the making of a verbatim record by the use of closed microphone voice dictation silencer and pen shorthand writing. Removes the requirement that certified shorthand reporters serving the Certified Shorthand Reporters Board must have actively engaged in the practice of shorthand reporting in this State for 10 years. Changes provisions concerning qualifications and applications. Provides that the Department of Financial and Professional Regulation may certify an applicant who is a certified verbatim reporter or registered professional reporter of another jurisdiction as a certified shorthand reporter. Makes provisions of the Act gender neutral. Makes other changes. Effective July 1, 2022.

20 administer all oaths of office and all other oaths authorized

17 Sec. 2105-115. Certified shorthand reporter or certified
18 voice writer reporter; transcript. The Department, at its
19 expense, shall provide a certified shorthand reporter or
20 certified voice writer reporter to take down the testimony and
21 preserve a record of all proceedings at the hearing of any case
22 in which a license may be revoked, suspended, placed on
23 probationary status, reprimanded, fined, or subjected to other
24 disciplinary action with reference to the license when a

1 disciplinary action is authorized in any licensing Act
2 administered by the Department. The notice, complaint, and all
3 other documents in the nature of pleadings and written motions
4 filed in the proceedings, the transcript of testimony, the
5 report of the board, and the orders of the Department shall be
6 the record of the proceedings. The Department shall furnish
7 the record to any person interested in the hearing upon
8 payment therefor of \$1 per page. The Department may contract
9 for court reporting services, and, in the event it does so, the
10 Department shall provide the name and contact information for
11 the certified shorthand reporter or certified voice writer
12 reporter who transcribed the testimony at a hearing to any
13 person interested, who may obtain a copy of the transcript of
14 any proceedings at a hearing upon payment of the fee specified
15 by the certified shorthand reporter or certified voice writer
16 reporter. This charge is in addition to any fee charged by the
17 Department for certifying the record.

22 Sec. 3.40. EMS System Participation Suspensions and Due
23 Process.

24 (a) An EMS Medical Director may suspend from participation

1 within the System any EMS personnel, EMS Lead Instructor (LI),
2 individual, individual provider or other participant
3 considered not to be meeting the requirements of the Program
4 Plan of that approved EMS System.

5 (b) Prior to suspending any individual or entity, an EMS
6 Medical Director shall provide an opportunity for a hearing
7 before the local System review board in accordance with
8 subsection (f) and the rules promulgated by the Department.

9 (1) If the local System review board affirms or
10 modifies the EMS Medical Director's suspension order, the
11 individual or entity shall have the opportunity for a
12 review of the local board's decision by the State EMS
13 Disciplinary Review Board, pursuant to Section 3.45 of
14 this Act.

15 (2) If the local System review board reverses or
16 modifies the EMS Medical Director's order, the EMS Medical
17 Director shall have the opportunity for a review of the
18 local board's decision by the State EMS Disciplinary
19 Review Board, pursuant to Section 3.45 of this Act.

20 (3) The suspension shall commence only upon the
21 occurrence of one of the following:

22 (A) the individual or entity has waived the
23 opportunity for a hearing before the local System
24 review board; or

25 (B) the order has been affirmed or modified by the
26 local system review board and the individual or entity

1 has waived the opportunity for review by the State
2 Board; or

3 (C) the order has been affirmed or modified by the
4 local system review board, and the local board's
5 decision has been affirmed or modified by the State
6 Board.

7 (c) An EMS Medical Director may immediately suspend an
8 EMR, EMD, EMT, EMT-I, A-EMT, Paramedic, ECRN, PHRN, LI, PHPA,
9 PHAPRN, or other individual or entity if he or she finds that
10 the continuation in practice by the individual or entity would
11 constitute an imminent danger to the public. The suspended
12 individual or entity shall be issued an immediate verbal
13 notification followed by a written suspension order by the EMS
14 Medical Director which states the length, terms and basis for
15 the suspension.

16 (1) Within 24 hours following the commencement of the
17 suspension, the EMS Medical Director shall deliver to the
18 Department, by messenger, telefax, or other
19 Department-approved electronic communication, a copy of
20 the suspension order and copies of any written materials
21 which relate to the EMS Medical Director's decision to
22 suspend the individual or entity. All medical and
23 patient-specific information, including Department
24 findings with respect to the quality of care rendered,
25 shall be strictly confidential pursuant to the Medical
26 Studies Act (Part 21 of Article VIII of the Code of Civil

1 Procedure).

2 (2) Within 24 hours following the commencement of the
3 suspension, the suspended individual or entity may deliver
4 to the Department, by messenger, telefax, or other
5 Department-approved electronic communication, a written
6 response to the suspension order and copies of any written
7 materials which the individual or entity feels are
8 appropriate. All medical and patient-specific information,
9 including Department findings with respect to the quality
10 of care rendered, shall be strictly confidential pursuant
11 to the Medical Studies Act.

12 (3) Within 24 hours following receipt of the EMS
13 Medical Director's suspension order or the individual or
14 entity's written response, whichever is later, the
15 Director or the Director's designee shall determine
16 whether the suspension should be stayed pending an
17 opportunity for a hearing or review in accordance with
18 this Act, or whether the suspension should continue during
19 the course of that hearing or review. The Director or the
20 Director's designee shall issue this determination to the
21 EMS Medical Director, who shall immediately notify the
22 suspended individual or entity. The suspension shall
23 remain in effect during this period of review by the
24 Director or the Director's designee.

25 (d) Upon issuance of a suspension order for reasons
26 directly related to medical care, the EMS Medical Director

1 shall also provide the individual or entity with the
2 opportunity for a hearing before the local System review
3 board, in accordance with subsection (f) and the rules
4 promulgated by the Department.

5 (1) If the local System review board affirms or
6 modifies the EMS Medical Director's suspension order, the
7 individual or entity shall have the opportunity for a
8 review of the local board's decision by the State EMS
9 Disciplinary Review Board, pursuant to Section 3.45 of
10 this Act.

11 (2) If the local System review board reverses or
12 modifies the EMS Medical Director's suspension order, the
13 EMS Medical Director shall have the opportunity for a
14 review of the local board's decision by the State EMS
15 Disciplinary Review Board, pursuant to Section 3.45 of
16 this Act.

17 (3) The suspended individual or entity may elect to
18 bypass the local System review board and seek direct
19 review of the EMS Medical Director's suspension order by
20 the State EMS Disciplinary Review Board.

21 (e) The Resource Hospital shall designate a local System
22 review board in accordance with the rules of the Department,
23 for the purpose of providing a hearing to any individual or
24 entity participating within the System who is suspended from
25 participation by the EMS Medical Director. The EMS Medical
26 Director shall arrange for a certified shorthand reporter or

1 certified voice writer reporter to make a stenographic record
2 of that hearing and thereafter prepare a transcript of the
3 proceedings. The transcript, all documents or materials
4 received as evidence during the hearing and the local System
5 review board's written decision shall be retained in the
6 custody of the EMS system. The System shall implement a
7 decision of the local System review board unless that decision
8 has been appealed to the State Emergency Medical Services
9 Disciplinary Review Board in accordance with this Act and the
10 rules of the Department.

11 (f) The Resource Hospital shall implement a decision of
12 the State Emergency Medical Services Disciplinary Review Board
13 which has been rendered in accordance with this Act and the
14 rules of the Department.

24 revocation of a license, the imposition of a monetary penalty,

1 or the referral of a case for criminal prosecution. The record
2 of any such proceeding shall consist of the notice of hearing,
3 complaint, all other documents in the nature of pleadings and
4 written motions filed in the proceedings, the transcript of
5 testimony and the report and orders of the Comptroller. Copies
6 of the transcript of such record may be purchased from the
7 certified shorthand reporter or certified voice writer
8 reporter who prepared the record.

6 expense a certified shorthand reporter or certified voice
7 writer reporter to take down the testimony and preserve a
8 record of all proceedings at the hearing of any case involving
9 denial or refusal to issue or renew a license or certificate,
10 or the suspension or revocation or other discipline of a
11 license or certificate. Copies of the transcript of such
12 record may be purchased from the certified shorthand reporter
13 or certified voice writer reporter who prepared the record.

3 ~~practice~~ of shorthand reporting and voice writer reporting as
4 a profession; to promote efficiency in court and general
5 reporting; and to extend to the public the protection afforded

14 under this Act shall, in addition to any other penalty
15 provided by law, pay a civil penalty to the Department in an
16 amount not to exceed \$10,000 for each offense as determined by
17 the Department and the assessment of costs as provided under
18 Section 23.3 of this Act. The civil penalty shall be assessed
19 by the Department after a hearing is held in accordance with
20 the provisions set forth in this Act regarding the provision
21 of a hearing for the discipline of a licensee.

22 (b) The Department has the authority and power to
23 investigate any and all unlicensed activity.

24 (c) The civil penalty shall be paid within 60 days after
25 the effective date of the order imposing the civil penalty.

1 The order shall constitute a judgment and may be filed and
2 execution had thereon in the same manner as any judgment from
3 any court of record.

5 deposited into the General Professions Dedicated Fund.

9 recorded by the Department in the applicant's or licensee's
10 application file or license file as maintained by the
11 Department's licensure maintenance unit. It is the duty of the
12 applicant or licensee to inform the Department of any change
13 of address and those changes must be made either through the
14 Department's Internet website or by contacting the Department.

15 (8) "Practice of voice writer reporting" means reporting,
16 by the use of a system of repeating words of the speaker into a
17 closed microphone voice dictation silencer that is capable of
18 digital translation into text, of grand jury proceedings,
19 court proceedings, court-related proceedings, pretrial
20 examinations, depositions, motions, and related proceedings of
21 like character, or proceedings of an administrative agency
22 when the final decision of the agency with reference thereto
23 is likely to be subject to judicial review under the
24 provisions of the Administrative Review Law.

25 (9) "Voice writer notes" means the original record by
26 voice dictation taken by a voice writer reporter of a

1 proceeding while in attendance at such proceeding for the
2 purpose of reporting the same.

3 (10) "Voice writer reporter" means a person who is
4 technically qualified and certified under this Act to practice
5 voice writer reporting.

11 certified shorthand reporter has been issued under this Act
12 shall be designated as a Certified Shorthand Reporter and not
13 otherwise, and any such certified shorthand reporter may, in
14 connection with his or her practice of shorthand reporting,
15 use the abbreviation "C.S.R." or the title "Court Reporter".

16 (b) Every person to whom a valid existing certificate as a
17 certified voice writer reporter has been issued under this Act
18 shall be designated as a certified voice writer reporter and
19 not otherwise, and any such certified voice writer reporter
20 may, in connection with his or her practice of voice writer
21 reporting use the abbreviation "C.V.W.R." or "Court Reporter".

22 (c) No person other than the holder of a valid existing
23 certificate under this Act shall use the applicable titles or
24 designations authorized under this Section. A person may hold
25 valid certificates both as a certified shorthand reporter and

1 as a certified voice writer reporter under this Act and may use
2 the titles authorized by this Section in connection with his

4 an advisory capacity to the Secretary. At least 5 ~~Six~~ members
5 must be certified shorthand reporters, in good standing, and
6 actively engaged in the practice of shorthand reporting in
7 this State for at least 10 ~~ten~~ years who have not been subject
8 to disciplinary action during the 10 years immediately prior
9 to the date of appointment to the Board. One member may be a
10 certified voice writer reporter who either is actively engaged
11 in the practice of voice writer reporting and is in good
12 standing in this State or is actively engaged in the practice
13 of voice writer reporting and in good standing in another
14 jurisdiction and has applied for certification in this State,
15 and has not been subject to disciplinary action during the 10
16 years immediately prior to the date of appointment to the
17 Board. One, ~~and one~~ member must be a member of the public who
18 is not certified under this Act, or a similar Act of another
19 jurisdiction. Members of the Board shall have no liability in
20 any action based upon any disciplinary proceeding or other
21 activity performed in good faith as members of the Board.

22 Members shall serve 4 year terms and until their
23 successors are appointed and qualified. No member shall be
24 reappointed to the Board for a term that would cause his or her
25 continuous service on the Board to be longer than 2 full
26 consecutive terms. Appointments to fill vacancies shall be

1 made in the same manner as original appointments, for the
2 unexpired portion of the vacated term.

3 In making appointments to the Board, the Secretary shall
4 give consideration to recommendations by national and State
5 organizations of the shorthand reporter and voice writer
6 reporter professions ~~profession~~.

7 Four members of the Board shall constitute a quorum. A
8 quorum is required for all Board decisions.

13 (b) The Secretary, any member of the Committee designated
14 by the Secretary, a certified shorthand reporter or certified
15 voice writer reporter, or any hearing officer appointed may
16 administer oaths at any hearing which the Department conducts.
17 Notwithstanding any statute or Department rule to the
18 contrary, all requests for testimony, production of documents,
19 or records shall be in accordance with this Act.

2 Sec. 15-15. Investigation; notice; hearing.

3 (a) Upon the motion of the Department or the Board or upon
4 a complaint in writing of a person setting forth facts that, if
5 proven, would constitute grounds for suspension, revocation,
6 or other disciplinary action against a licensee or applicant
7 for licensure, the Department shall investigate the actions of
8 the licensee or applicant. If, upon investigation, the
9 Department believes that there may be cause for suspension,
10 revocation, or other disciplinary action, the Department shall
11 use the services of a State certified general real estate
12 appraiser, a State certified residential real estate
13 appraiser, or the Real Estate Coordinator to assist in
14 determining whether grounds for disciplinary action exist
15 prior to commencing formal disciplinary proceedings.

16 (b) Formal disciplinary proceedings shall commence upon
17 the issuance of a written complaint describing the charges
18 that are the basis of the disciplinary action and delivery of
19 the detailed complaint to the address of record of the
20 licensee or applicant. The Department shall notify the
21 licensee or applicant to file a verified written answer within
22 20 days after the service of the notice and complaint. The
23 notification shall inform the licensee or applicant of his or
24 her right to be heard in person or by legal counsel; that the
25 hearing will be afforded not sooner than 30 days after service
26 of the complaint; that failure to file an answer will result in

1 a default being entered against the licensee or applicant;
2 that the license may be suspended, revoked, or placed on
3 probationary status; and that other disciplinary action may be
4 taken pursuant to this Act, including limiting the scope,
5 nature, or extent of the licensee's practice. If the licensee
6 or applicant fails to file an answer after service of notice,
7 his or her license may, at the discretion of the Department, be
8 suspended, revoked, or placed on probationary status and the
9 Department may take whatever disciplinary action it deems
10 proper, including limiting the scope, nature, or extent of the
11 person's practice, without a hearing.

12 (c) At the time and place fixed in the notice, the Board
13 shall conduct hearing of the charges, providing both the
14 accused person and the complainant ample opportunity to
15 present in person or by counsel such statements, testimony,
16 evidence, and argument as may be pertinent to the charges or to
17 a defense thereto.

18 (d) The Board shall present to the Secretary a written
19 report of its findings and recommendations. A copy of the
20 report shall be served upon the licensee or applicant, either
21 personally or by certified mail. Within 20 days after the
22 service, the licensee or applicant may present the Secretary
23 with a motion in writing for either a rehearing, a proposed
24 finding of fact, a conclusion of law, or an alternative
25 sanction, and shall specify the particular grounds for the
26 request. If the accused orders a transcript of the record as

1 provided in this Act, the time elapsing thereafter and before
2 the transcript is ready for delivery to the accused shall not
3 be counted as part of the 20 days. If the Secretary is not
4 satisfied that substantial justice has been done, the
5 Secretary may order a rehearing by the Board or other special
6 committee appointed by the Secretary, may remand the matter to
7 the Board for its reconsideration of the matter based on the
8 pleadings and evidence presented to the Board, or may enter a
9 final order in contravention of the Board's recommendation.
10 Notwithstanding a licensee's or applicant's failure to file a
11 motion for rehearing, the Secretary shall have the right to
12 take any of the actions specified in this subsection (d). Upon
13 the suspension or revocation of a license, the licensee shall
14 be required to surrender his or her license to the Department,
15 and upon failure or refusal to do so, the Department shall have
16 the right to seize the license.

17 (e) The Department has the power to issue subpoenas and
18 subpoenas duces tecum to bring before it any person in this
19 State, to take testimony, or to require production of any
20 records relevant to an inquiry or hearing by the Board in the
21 same manner as prescribed by law in judicial proceedings in
22 the courts of this State. In a case of refusal of a witness to
23 attend, testify, or to produce books or papers concerning a
24 matter upon which he or she might be lawfully examined, the
25 circuit court of the county where the hearing is held, upon

2 (f) Any license that is suspended indefinitely or revoked
3 may not be restored for a minimum period of 2 years, or as
4 otherwise ordered by the Secretary.

6 concerning the conduct of hearings and the recommendations for
7 discipline, the Department has the authority to negotiate
8 disciplinary and non-disciplinary settlement agreements
9 concerning any license issued under this Act. All such
10 agreements shall be recorded as Consent Orders or Consent to
11 Administrative Supervision Orders.

12 (h) The Secretary shall have the authority to appoint an
13 attorney duly licensed to practice law in the State of
14 Illinois to serve as the hearing officer in any action to

4 Sec. 7-9. Except as provided in this Section, any order or
5 action of a local liquor control commissioner levying a fine
6 or refusing to levy a fine on a licensee, granting or refusing
7 to grant a license, revoking or suspending or refusing to
8 revoke or suspend a license or refusing for more than 30 days
9 to grant a hearing upon a complaint to revoke or suspend a
10 license may, within 20 days after notice of such order or
11 action, be appealed by any resident of the political
12 subdivision under the jurisdiction of the local liquor control
13 commissioner or any person interested, to the State
14 Commission.

15 In any case where a licensee appeals to the State
16 Commission from an order or action of the local liquor control
17 commission having the effect of suspending or revoking a
18 license, denying a renewal application, or refusing to grant a
19 license, the licensee shall resume the operation of the
20 licensed business pending the decision of the State Commission
21 and the expiration of the time allowed for an application for
22 rehearing. If an application for rehearing is filed, the
23 licensee shall continue the operation of the licensed business
24 until the denial of the application or, if the rehearing is

1 granted, until the decision on rehearing.

2 In any case in which a licensee appeals to the State
3 Commission a suspension or revocation by a local liquor
4 control commissioner that is the second or subsequent such
5 suspension or revocation placed on that licensee within the
6 preceding 12 month period, the licensee shall consider the
7 suspension or revocation to be in effect until a reversal of
8 the local liquor control commissioner's action has been issued
9 by the State Commission and shall cease all activity otherwise
10 authorized by the license. The State Commission shall
11 expedite, to the greatest extent possible, its consideration
12 of any appeal that is an appeal of a second or subsequent
13 suspension or revocation within the past 12 month period.

14 The appeal shall be limited to a review of the official
15 record of the proceedings of such local liquor control
16 commissioner if the county board, city council or board of
17 trustees, as the case may be, has adopted a resolution
18 requiring that such review be on the record. If such
19 resolution is adopted, a certified official record of the
20 proceedings taken and prepared by a certified court reporter,
21 ~~or~~ certified shorthand reporter, or certified voice writer
22 reporter shall be filed by the local liquor control

24 appeal, if the appellant licensee pays for the cost of the
25 transcript. The State Commission shall review the propriety of

8 shall be the evidence found in the certified official record
9 of the proceedings of the local liquor control commissioner.
10 No new or additional evidence shall be admitted or considered.
11 The State Commission shall render a decision affirming,
12 reversing or modifying the order or action reviewed within 30
13 days after the appeal was heard.

14 In the event such appeal is from an order of a local liquor
15 control commissioner of a city, village or incorporated town
16 of 500,000 or more inhabitants, granting or refusing to grant
17 a license or refusing for more than 30 days to grant a hearing
18 upon a complaint to revoke or suspend a license, the matter of
19 the propriety of such order or action shall be tried de novo by
20 the license appeal commission as expeditiously as
21 circumstances permit.

22 In the event such appeal is from an order or action of a
23 local liquor control commissioner of a city, village or
24 incorporated town of 500,000 or more inhabitants, imposing a
25 fine or refusing to impose a fine on a licensee, revoking or
26 suspending or refusing to revoke or suspend a license, the

1 license appeal commission shall determine the appeal by a
2 review of the official record of the proceedings of such local
3 liquor control commissioner. A certified record of the
4 proceedings shall be promptly filed with the license appeal
5 commission by such local liquor control commissioner after
6 notice of the filing of such appeal if the appellant licensee
7 pays for the cost of the transcript and promptly delivers the
8 transcript to the local liquor control commission or its
9 attorney. The review by the license appeal commission shall be
10 limited to the questions:

11 (a) whether the local liquor control commissioner has
12 proceeded in the manner provided by law;

13 (b) whether the order is supported by the findings;

14 (c) whether the findings are supported by substantial
15 evidence in the light of the whole record.

16 No new or additional evidence in support of or in opposition to
17 such order or action under appeal shall be received other than
18 that contained in such record of the proceedings. Within 30
19 days after such appeal was heard, the license appeal
20 commission shall render its decision in accordance with the
21 provisions of Section 7-5.

22 In cities, villages and incorporated towns having a
23 population of 500,000 or more inhabitants, appeals from any
24 order or action shall lie to the license appeal commission of
25 such city, village or incorporated town. All of the provisions
26 of this Section and Section 7-10 relative to proceedings upon

1 appeals before the State Commission and relative to appeals
2 from the decisions of the State Commission shall apply also to
3 proceedings upon appeals before any license appeal commission

10 which written motion shall specify the particular grounds

13 and hearing that restoration is not in the public interest.

15 disabilities issued to the applicant, which certificate

18 person or by counsel such statements, testimony, evidence and
19 argument as may be pertinent to the charges or to any defense
20 thereto. The Comptroller may reasonably continue such hearing
21 from time to time.

22 The Comptroller may subpoena any person or persons in this
23 State and take testimony orally, by deposition or by exhibit,
24 in the same manner and with the same fees and mileage as
25 prescribed in judicial proceedings in civil cases.

26 Any authorized agent of the Comptroller may administer

1 oaths to witnesses at any hearing which the Comptroller is
2 authorized to conduct.

3 The Comptroller, at his expense, shall provide a certified
4 shorthand reporter or certified voice writer reporter to take
5 down the testimony and preserve a record of all proceedings at
6 the hearing of any case involving the refusal to issue a

9 criminal prosecution. The record of any such proceeding shall
10 consist of the notice of hearing, complaint, all other

25 Sangamon County. The provisions of the "Administrative Review

1 Law", approved August 19, 1981, all amendments and
2 modifications thereto, and any rules adopted under it govern
3 all proceedings for the judicial review of final
4 administrative decisions of the Comptroller. The term
5 "administrative decision" is defined as in the "Administrative
6 Review Law".

7 The Comptroller is not required to certify the record of
8 the proceeding unless the plaintiff in the review proceedings
9 has purchased a copy of the transcript from the certified
10 shorthand reporter or certified voice writer reporter who
11 prepared the record or from the Comptroller. Exhibits shall be
12 certified without cost.
