Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The Food Handling Regulation Enforcement Act is
amended by changing Section 3.3 as follows:

7 Sec. 3.3. Farmers' markets.

8 (a) The General Assembly finds as follows:

9 (1) Farmers' markets, as defined in subsection (b) of 10 this Section, provide not only a valuable marketplace for 11 farmers and food artisans to sell their products directly 12 to consumers, but also a place for consumers to access 13 fresh fruits, vegetables, and other agricultural products.

14 (2) Farmers' markets serve as a stimulator for local 15 economies and for thousands of new businesses every year, 16 allowing farmers to sell directly to consumers and capture 17 the full retail value of their products. They have become important community institutions and have figured in the 18 19 revitalization of downtown districts and rural communities. 20

(3) Since 1999, the number of farmers' markets has
tripled and new ones are being established every year.
There is a lack of consistent regulation from one county

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to the next, resulting in confusion and discrepancies between counties regarding how products may be sold. There continue to be inconsistencies, confusion, and lack of awareness by consumers, farmers, markets, and local health authorities of required guidelines affecting farmers' markets from county to county.

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9 (6) Recognizing that farmers' markets serve as small 10 business incubators and that farmers' profit margins 11 frequently are narrow, even in direct-to-consumer retail, 12 protecting farmers from costs of regulation that are 13 disproportionate to their profits will help ensure the 14 continued viability of these local farms and small 15 businesses.

16 (b) For the purposes of this Section:

17 "Department" means the Department of Public Health.

18 "Director" means the Director of Public Health.

19 <u>"Farmer" means an individual who is a resident of Illinois</u>
20 and owns or leases land in Illinois that is used as a farm, as
21 that term is defined in Section 1-60 of the Property Tax Code,
22 or that individual's employee.

"Farmers' market" means a common facility or area where the primary purpose is for farmers to gather to sell a variety of fresh fruits and vegetables and other locally produced farm and food products directly to consumers. SB3838 Enrolled - 3 - LRB102 24488 CPF 33722 b

"Licensed or permitted processing facility" means a facility that has been inspected, approved, and permitted or licensed by the Department of Agriculture, the Department of Public Health, or a local health department.

5 <u>"Local health department" means a State-certified health</u>
 6 <u>department of a unit of local government.</u>

7 <u>"Main ingredient" means an agricultural product that is</u>
8 <u>the defining or distinctive ingredient in a product, though</u>
9 <u>not necessarily by predominance of weight.</u>

11 (d) This Section does not intend and shall not be 12 construed to limit the power of counties, municipalities, and other local government units to regulate farmers' markets for 13 the protection of the public health, safety, morals, and 14 15 welfare, including, but not limited to, licensing requirements 16 and time, place, and manner restrictions, except as specified 17 in this Act. This Section provides for a statewide scheme for the orderly and consistent regulation interpretation of 18 the 19 Department's administrative rules pertaining to the safety of food and food products sold at farmers' markets. 20

8 the Illinois Administrative Procedure Act) for foods found
9 at farmers' markets.

10 (2) <u>Local health departments may conduct enforcement</u> 11 <u>actions under and pursuant to this Section.</u> The rules and 12 regulations described in this Section shall be 13 consistently enforced by local health authorities 14 throughout the State.

Notwithstanding any other provision of law 15 (2.5)16 except as provided in this Section, local public health 17 departments and all other units of local government are prohibited from creating sanitation guidelines, rules, or 18 regulations for farmers' markets that are more stringent 19 20 than those farmers' market sanitation regulations contained in this Section. the administrative rules 21 22 adopted by the Department for the purposes of implementing 23 this Section and Sections 3.4, 3.5, and 4 of this Act. Except as provided for in Sections 3.4 and 4 of this Act, 24 25 this Section does not intend and shall not be construed to 26 limit the power of local health departments and other

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1the intent to create, set, or amend a fee. Before2the public meeting, all farmers' market operators3in the local health department's jurisdiction and4all existing Farmers' Market Permit holders that5are permitted in the local health department's6jurisdiction shall be notified using the best7efforts of the local health department.

8 (ii) Provide public notice and solicit written 9 comments from the public regarding the intent to 10 create, set, or amend a fee. Before the comment 11 period, all farmers' market operators in the 12 jurisdiction and all existing Farmers' Market Permit holders that are permitted in the local 13 14 health department's jurisdiction shall be notified using the best efforts of the local health 15 16 department.

17(B) A local health department shall consider all18public comments received in creating, setting, or19amending a fee.

20(C) A local health department has final discretion21to create, set, or amend a fee, subject to the fee22limits under subparagraph (A) of paragraph (2.20).

(D) A local health department shall amend a fee no
 more than once per year.
 (E) All comments received under this paragraph

3 <u>(F) A local health department is not required to</u>
4 <u>create a new process to solicit public input regarding</u>
5 <u>the creation, setting, or amending of fees if it</u>
6 <u>already has a process in place that meets the minimum</u>
7 <u>requirements set forth in this paragraph.</u>

8 (2.30) A home rule unit may not requlate Farmers' 9 Market Permits in a manner inconsistent with the 10 regulation by the State of Farmers' Market Permits under 11 this subsection. This paragraph is a limitation under 12 subsection (i) of Section 6 of Article VII of the Illinois 13 Constitution on the concurrent exercise by home rule units 14 of powers and functions exercised by the State.

15 (3) In the case of alleged noncompliance with the 16 provisions described in this Section, local health 17 departments shall issue written notices to vendors and market managers of any noncompliance issues. Citations may 18 19 be issued to farmers who do not have or display their 20 Farmers' Market Permits. Repeat violations may result in fines or Farmers' Market Permit suspension by a local 21 22 health department.

(4) (Blank). Produce and food products coming within
the scope of the provisions of this Section shall include,
but not be limited to, raw agricultural products,
including fresh fruits and vegetables; popcorn, grains,

seeds, beans, and nuts that are whole, unprocessed, 1 2 unpackaged, and unsprouted; fresh herb sprigs and dried herbs in bunches; baked goods sold at farmers' markets; 3 cut fruits and vegetables; milk and cheese products; 4 5 cream; syrups; wild and cultivated mushrooms; apple cider 6 and other fruit and vegetable juices; herb vinegar; 7 garlic in oil; flavored oils; pickles, relishes, salsas, 8 and other canned or jarred items; shell eqqs; meat and 9 poultry; fish; ready to eat foods; commercially produced 10 prepackaged food products; and any additional items 11 specified in the administrative rules adopted by the 12 Department to implement Section 3.3 of this Act.

(n) Local health department regulatory guidelines may be applied to foods not often found at farmers' markets, all other food products not regulated by the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Public Health, as well as live animals to be sold at farmers' markets.

(p) The Department of Public Health and the Department of Agriculture shall adopt administrative rules necessary to implement, interpret, and make specific the provisions of this Section, including, but not limited to, rules concerning labels, sanitation, and food product safety according to the realms of their jurisdiction.

(q) The Department shall create a food sampling trainingand license program as specified in Section 3.4 of this Act.

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1 (r) In addition to any rules adopted pursuant to 2 subsection (p) of this Section, the following provisions shall 3 be applied uniformly throughout the State, including to home rule units, except as otherwise provided in this Act: 4

5 (1) Farmers market vendors shall provide effective 6 means to maintain potentially hazardous food, as defined 7 in Section 4 of this Act, at 41 degrees Fahrenheit or 8 below. As an alternative to mechanical refrigeration, an 9 effectively insulated, hard-sided, cleanable container 10 with sufficient ice or other cooling means that is 11 intended for the storage of potentially hazardous food 12 shall be used. Local health departments shall not limit vendors' choice of refrigeration or cooling equipment and 13 14 shall not charge a fee for use of such equipment. Local 15 health departments shall not be precluded from requiring 16 an effective alternative form of cooling if a vendor is 17 unable to maintain food at the appropriate temperature.

(2) Handwashing stations may be shared by farmers' 18 19 market vendors if handwashing stations are accessible to vendors. 20
