HB1123 Engrossed

1 AN ACT concerning education.

## 2 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, 3 represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The School Code is amended by changing Section
10-17a as follows:

6 (105 ILCS 5/10-17a) (from Ch. 122, par. 10-17a)

7 Sec. 10-17a. State, school district, and school report 8 cards.

9 (1) By October 31, 2013 and October 31 of each subsequent school year, the State Board of Education, through the State 10 Superintendent of Education, shall prepare a State report 11 card, school district report cards, and school report cards, 12 and shall by the most economical means provide to each school 13 14 district in this State, including special charter districts and districts subject to the provisions of Article 34, the 15 16 report cards for the school district and each of its schools. Because of the impacts of the COVID-19 public health emergency 17 during school year 2020-2021, the State Board of Education 18 19 shall have until December 31, 2021 to prepare and provide the 20 report cards that would otherwise be due by October 31, 2021. 21 During a school year in which the Governor has declared a 22 disaster due to a public health emergency pursuant to Section 7 of the Illinois Emergency Management Agency Act, the report 23

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cards for the school districts and each of its schools shall be
 prepared by December 31.

3 (2) In addition to any information required by federal 4 law, the State Superintendent shall determine the indicators 5 and presentation of the school report card, which must 6 include, at a minimum, the most current data collected and 7 maintained by the State Board of Education related to the 8 following:

9 (A) school characteristics and student demographics, 10 including average class size, average teaching experience, 11 student racial/ethnic breakdown, and the percentage of 12 students classified as low-income; the percentage of students classified as English learners, the number of 13 14 students who graduate from a bilingual or English learner 15 program, and the number of students who graduate from, 16 transfer from, or otherwise leave bilingual programs; the 17 percentage of students who have individualized education plans or 504 plans that provide for special education 18 19 services; the number and percentage of all students who 20 have been assessed for placement in a gifted education or advanced academic program and, of those students: (i) the 21 22 racial and ethnic breakdown, (ii) the percentage who are 23 low-income, and (iii) the number classified as and 24 percentage of students who received direct instruction 25 from a teacher who holds a gifted education endorsement 26 and, of those students, the percentage who are classified HB1123 Engrossed - 3 - LRB103 05314 RJT 50332 b

as low-income; the percentage of students scoring at the 1 2 "exceeds expectations" level on the assessments required under Section 2-3.64a-5 of this Code; the percentage of 3 students who annually transferred in or out of the school 4 5 district; average daily attendance; the per-pupil 6 operating expenditure of the school district; and the 7 per-pupil State average operating expenditure for the 8 district type (elementary, high school, or unit);

9 curriculum information, including, (B) where 10 applicable, Advanced Placement, International 11 Baccalaureate or equivalent courses, dual enrollment 12 courses, foreign language classes, computer science courses, school personnel resources (including Career 13 14 Technical Education teachers), before and after school programs, extracurricular activities, subjects in which 15 16 elective classes are offered, health and wellness 17 initiatives (including the average number of days of Physical Education per week per student), approved 18 19 of study, awards received, community programs 20 partnerships, and special programs such as programming for 21 the gifted and talented, students with disabilities, and 22 work-study students;

(C) student outcomes, including, where applicable, the percentage of students deemed proficient on assessments of State standards, the percentage of students in the eighth grade who pass Algebra, the percentage of students who HB1123 Engrossed - 4 - LRB103 05314 RJT 50332 b

participated in workplace learning experiences, 1 the 2 percentage of students enrolled in post-secondary 3 institutions (including colleges, universities, community colleges, trade/vocational schools, and training programs 4 5 leading to career certification within 2 semesters of high 6 school graduation), the percentage of students graduating 7 from high school who are college and career ready, and the 8 percentage of graduates enrolled in community colleges, 9 colleges, and universities who are in one or more courses 10 that the community college, college, or university 11 identifies as a developmental course, and the percentage 12 of students with disabilities under the federal 13 Individuals with Disabilities Education Act and Article 14 14 of this Code who have fulfilled the minimum State 15 graduation requirements set forth in Section 27-22 of this 16 Code and have been issued a regular high school diploma;

17 (D) student progress, including, where applicable, the 18 percentage of students in the ninth grade who have earned 19 5 credits or more without failing more than one core 20 class, a measure of students entering kindergarten ready 21 to learn, a measure of growth, and the percentage of 22 students who enter high school on track for college and 23 career readiness;

(E) the school environment, including, where
 applicable, high school dropout rate by grade level, the
 percentage of students with less than 10 absences in a

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1 school year, the percentage of teachers with less than 10 2 absences in а school year for reasons other than 3 professional development, leaves taken pursuant to the federal Family Medical Leave Act of 1993, long-term 4 5 disability, or parental leaves, the 3-year average of the 6 percentage of teachers returning to the school from the 7 previous year, the number of different principals at the school in the last 6 years, the number of teachers who hold 8 9 a gifted education endorsement, the process and criteria 10 used by the district to determine whether a student is 11 eligible for participation in a gifted education program 12 advanced academic program and the manner in which or parents and quardians are made aware of the process and 13 14 criteria, the number of teachers who are National Board 15 Certified Teachers, disaggregated by race and ethnicity, 2 16 or more indicators from any school climate survey selected 17 or approved by the State and administered pursuant to Section 2-3.153 of this Code, with the same or similar 18 19 indicators included on school report cards for all surveys 20 selected or approved by the State pursuant to Section 21 2-3.153 of this Code, the combined percentage of teachers 22 rated as proficient or excellent in their most recent 23 evaluation, and, beginning with the 2022-2023 school year, data on the number of incidents of violence that occurred 24 25 on school grounds or during school-related activities and 26 that resulted in an out-of-school suspension, expulsion,

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or removal to an alternative setting, as reported pursuant
 to Section 2-3.162;

3 (F) a school district's and its individual schools' 4 balanced accountability measure, in accordance with 5 Section 2-3.25a of this Code;

6 (G) the total and per pupil normal cost amount the 7 State contributed to the Teachers' Retirement System of 8 the State of Illinois in the prior fiscal year for the 9 school's employees, which shall be reported to the State 10 Board of Education by the Teachers' Retirement System of 11 the State of Illinois;

12 (H) for a school district organized under Article 34 13 of this Code only, State contributions to the Public 14 School Teachers' Pension and Retirement Fund of Chicago 15 and State contributions for health care for employees of 16 that school district;

(I) a school district's Final Percent of Adequacy, as
defined in paragraph (4) of subsection (f) of Section
18-8.15 of this Code;

(J) a school district's Local Capacity Target, as
defined in paragraph (2) of subsection (c) of Section
18-8.15 of this Code, displayed as a percentage amount;

(K) a school district's Real Receipts, as defined in
paragraph (1) of subsection (d) of Section 18-8.15 of this
Code, divided by a school district's Adequacy Target, as
defined in paragraph (1) of subsection (b) of Section

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18-8.15 of this Code, displayed as a percentage amount;

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(L) a school district's administrative costs;

3 (M) whether or not the school has participated in the Illinois Youth Survey. In this paragraph (M), "Illinois 4 Youth Survey" means a self-report survey, administered in 5 settings every 2 years, designed to 6 school gather 7 information about health and social indicators, including 8 substance abuse patterns and the attitudes of students in 9 grades 8, 10, and 12; and

10 (N) whether the school offered its students career and11 technical education opportunities.

12 The school report card shall also provide information that allows for comparing the current outcome, progress, 13 and 14 environment data to the State average, to the school data from 15 the past 5 years, and to the outcomes, progress, and 16 environment of similar schools based on the type of school and 17 enrollment of low-income students, special education students, and English learners. 18

As used in this subsection (2):

20 "Administrative costs" means costs associated with 21 executive, administrative, or managerial functions within the 22 school district that involve planning, organizing, managing, 23 or directing the school district.

24 "Advanced academic program" means a course of study to 25 which students are assigned based on advanced cognitive 26 ability or advanced academic achievement compared to local age HB1123 Engrossed - 8 - LRB103 05314 RJT 50332 b

1 peers and in which the curriculum is substantially 2 differentiated from the general curriculum to provide 3 appropriate challenge and pace.

4 "Computer science" means the study of computers and 5 algorithms, including their principles, their hardware and 6 software designs, their implementation, and their impact on 7 society. "Computer science" does not include the study of 8 everyday uses of computers and computer applications, such as 9 keyboarding or accessing the Internet.

10 "Gifted education" means educational services, including 11 differentiated curricula and instructional methods, designed 12 to meet the needs of gifted children as defined in Article 14A 13 of this Code.

For the purposes of paragraph (A) of this subsection (2), 14 15 "average daily attendance" means the average of the actual 16 number of attendance days during the previous school year for 17 any enrolled student who is subject to compulsory attendance by Section 26-1 of this Code at each school and charter school. 18 19 (2.5) For any school report card prepared after July 1, 20 2025, for all high school graduation completion rates that are 21 reported on the school report card as required under this 22 Section or by any other State or federal law, the State 23 Superintendent of Education shall also report the percentage 24 of students who did not meet the requirements of high school graduation completion for any reason and, of those students, 25 the percentage that are classified as students who fulfill the 26

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1 requirements of Section 14-16 of this Code.

2 <u>The State Superintendent shall ensure that for the</u> 3 <u>2023-2024 school year there is a specific code for districts</u> 4 <u>to report students who fulfill the requirements of Section</u> 5 <u>14-16 of this Code to ensure accurate reporting under this</u> 6 Section.

7 <u>All reporting requirements under this subsection (2.5)</u> 8 <u>shall be included on the school report card where high school</u> 9 <u>graduation completion rates are reported, along with a brief</u> 10 <u>explanation of how fulfilling the requirements of Section</u> 11 <u>14-16 of this Code is different from receiving a regular high</u> 12 <u>school diploma.</u>

13 (3) At the discretion of the State Superintendent, the school district report card shall include a subset of the 14 15 information identified in paragraphs (A) through (E) of 16 subsection (2) of this Section, as well as information 17 relating to the operating expense per pupil and other finances of the school district, and the State report card shall 18 include a subset of the information identified in paragraphs 19 20 (A) through (E) and paragraph (N) of subsection (2) of this Section. The school district report card shall include the 21 average daily attendance, as that term is defined in 22 23 subsection (2) of this Section, of students who have individualized education programs and students who have 504 24 25 plans that provide for special education services within the school district. 26

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1 (4) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this 2 Section, in consultation with key education stakeholders, the 3 State Superintendent shall at any time have the discretion to 4 amend or update any and all metrics on the school, district, or 5 State report card.

(5) Annually, no more than 30 calendar days after receipt 6 of the school district and school report cards from the State 7 Superintendent of Education, each school district, including 8 9 special charter districts and districts subject to the 10 provisions of Article 34, shall present such report cards at a 11 regular school board meeting subject to applicable notice 12 requirements, post the report cards on the school district's 13 Internet web site, if the district maintains an Internet web 14 site, make the report cards available to a newspaper of 15 general circulation serving the district, and, upon request, 16 send the report cards home to a parent (unless the district 17 does not maintain an Internet web site, in which case the report card shall be sent home to parents without request). If 18 19 the district posts the report card on its Internet web site, 20 the district shall send a written notice home to parents stating (i) that the report card is available on the web site, 21 22 (ii) the address of the web site, (iii) that a printed copy of 23 the report card will be sent to parents upon request, and (iv) the telephone number that parents may call to request a 24 25 printed copy of the report card.

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(6) Nothing contained in Public Act 98-648 repeals,

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supersedes, invalidates, or nullifies final decisions in
 lawsuits pending on July 1, 2014 (the effective date of Public
 Act 98-648) in Illinois courts involving the interpretation of
 Public Act 97-8.
