2	AMENDMENT NO Amend House Bill 1187 by replacing
3	everything after the enacting clause with the following:
4 5	"Section 5. The Illinois Emergency Management Agency Act is amended by changing Section 5 as follows:
6	(20 ILCS 3305/5) (from Ch. 127, par. 1055)
7	Sec. 5. Illinois Emergency Management Agency.
8	(a) There is created within the executive branch of the
9	State Government an Illinois Emergency Management Agency and a
10	Director of the Illinois Emergency Management Agency, herein
11	called the "Director" who shall be the head thereof. The
12	Director shall be appointed by the Governor, with the advice
13	and consent of the Senate, and shall serve for a term of 2
14	years beginning on the third Monday in January of the
15	odd-numbered year, and until a successor is appointed and has
16	qualified; except that the term of the first Director

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1 appointed under this Act shall expire on the third Monday in January, 1989. The Director shall not hold any other 2 3 remunerative public office. For terms beginning after January 18, 2019 (the effective date of Public Act 100-1179) and 4 5 before January 16, 2023, the annual salary of the Director 6 as provided in Section 5-300 of the Civil shall be Administrative Code of Illinois. Notwithstanding any other 7 8 provision of law, for terms beginning on or after January 16, 9 2023, the Director shall receive an annual salary of \$180,000 10 or as set by the Governor, whichever is higher. On July 1, 11 2023, and on each July 1 thereafter, the Director shall receive an increase in salary based on a cost of living 12 13 adjustment as authorized by Senate Joint Resolution 192 of the 14 86th General Assembly.

15 For terms beginning on or after January 16, 2023, the 16 Assistant Director of the Illinois Emergency Management Agency shall receive an annual salary of \$156,600 or as set by the 17 Governor, whichever is higher. On July 1, 2023, and on each 18 July 1 thereafter, the Assistant Director shall receive an 19 20 increase in salary based on a cost of living adjustment as 21 authorized by Senate Joint Resolution 192 of the 86th General 22 Assembly.

(b) The Illinois Emergency Management Agency shall obtain,
 under the provisions of the Personnel Code, technical,
 clerical, stenographic and other administrative personnel, and
 may make expenditures within the appropriation therefor as may

be necessary to carry out the purpose of this Act. The agency created by this Act is intended to be a successor to the agency created under the Illinois Emergency Services and Disaster Agency Act of 1975 and the personnel, equipment, records, and appropriations of that agency are transferred to the successor agency as of June 30, 1988 (the effective date of this Act).

(c) The Director, subject to the direction and control of 7 8 the Governor, shall be the executive head of the Illinois 9 Emergency Management Agency and the State Emergency Response 10 Commission and shall be responsible under the direction of the 11 Governor, for carrying out the program for emergency management of this State. The Director shall also maintain 12 13 liaison cooperate with the emergency and management 14 organizations of this State and other states and of the 15 federal government.

16 (d) The Illinois Emergency Management Agency shall take an integral part in the development and revision of political 17 18 subdivision emergency operations plans prepared under paragraph (f) of Section 10. To this end it shall employ or 19 20 otherwise secure the services of professional and technical 21 personnel capable of providing expert assistance to the 22 emergency services and disaster agencies. These personnel 23 shall consult with emergency services and disaster agencies on 24 a regular basis and shall make field examinations of the 25 areas, circumstances, and conditions that particular political 26 subdivision emergency operations plans are intended to apply.

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1 (e) The Illinois Emergency Management Agency and political encouraged to 2 subdivisions shall be form an emergencv 3 management advisory committee composed of private and public 4 personnel representing the emergency management phases of 5 mitigation, preparedness, response, and recovery. The Local 6 Emergency Planning Committee, as created under the Illinois Emergency Planning and Community Right to Know Act, shall 7 8 serve as an advisory committee to the emergency services and 9 disaster agency or agencies serving within the boundaries of 10 that Local Emergency Planning Committee planning district for: 11 (1) the development of emergency operations plan provisions for hazardous chemical emergencies; and 12 13 (2) the assessment of emergency response capabilities 14 related to hazardous chemical emergencies. 15 (f) The Illinois Emergency Management Agency shall: 16 Coordinate the overall emergency management (1)17 program of the State. 18 (2) Cooperate with local governments, the federal government, and any public or private agency or entity in 19 20 achieving any purpose of this Act and in implementing 21 emergency management programs for mitigation. 22 preparedness, response, and recovery. 23 (2.5) Develop a comprehensive emergency preparedness 24 and response plan for any nuclear accident in accordance 25 with Section 65 of the Nuclear Safety Law of 2004 and in 26 development of the Illinois Nuclear Safety Preparedness

program in accordance with Section 8 of the Illinois
 Nuclear Safety Preparedness Act.

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3 (2.6) Coordinate with the Department of Public Health
4 with respect to planning for and responding to public
5 health emergencies.

6 (3) Prepare, for issuance by the Governor, executive 7 orders, proclamations, and regulations as necessary or 8 appropriate in coping with disasters.

9 (4) Promulgate rules and requirements for political 10 subdivision emergency operations plans that are not 11 inconsistent with and are at least as stringent as 12 applicable federal laws and regulations.

13 (5) Review and approve, in accordance with Illinois 14 Emergency Management Agency rules, emergency operations 15 plans for those political subdivisions required to have an 16 emergency services and disaster agency pursuant to this 17 Act.

18 (5.5) Promulgate rules and requirements for the
19 political subdivision emergency management exercises,
20 including, but not limited to, exercises of the emergency
21 operations plans.

(5.10) Review, evaluate, and approve, in accordance
with Illinois Emergency Management Agency rules, political
subdivision emergency management exercises for those
political subdivisions required to have an emergency
services and disaster agency pursuant to this Act.

(6) Determine requirements of the State and its
 political subdivisions for food, clothing, and other
 necessities in event of a disaster.

4 (7) Establish a register of persons with types of
5 emergency management training and skills in mitigation,
6 preparedness, response, and recovery.

7 (8) Establish a register of government and private
8 response resources available for use in a disaster.

9 (9) Expand the Earthquake Awareness Program and its 10 efforts to distribute earthquake preparedness materials to schools, political subdivisions, community groups, civic 11 organizations, and the media. Emphasis will be placed on 12 13 those areas of the State most at risk from an earthquake. 14 Maintain the list of all school districts, hospitals, 15 airports, power plants, including nuclear power plants, 16 lakes, dams, emergency response facilities of all types, and all other major public or private structures which are 17 at the greatest risk of damage from earthquakes under 18 19 circumstances where the damage would cause subsequent harm 20 to the surrounding communities and residents.

(10) Disseminate all information, completely and without delay, on water levels for rivers and streams and any other data pertaining to potential flooding supplied by the Division of Water Resources within the Department of Natural Resources to all political subdivisions to the maximum extent possible. 1 (11) Develop agreements, if feasible, with medical supply and equipment firms to supply resources as are 2 3 necessary to respond to an earthquake or any other 4 disaster as defined in this Act. These resources will be 5 made available upon notifying the vendor of the disaster. Payment for the resources will be in accordance with 6 Section 7 of this Act. The Illinois Department of Public 7 8 Health shall determine which resources will be required 9 and requested.

(11.5) In coordination with the Illinois State Police,
 develop and implement a community outreach program to
 promote awareness among the State's parents and children
 of child abduction prevention and response.

14 (12) Out of funds appropriated for these purposes, 15 award capital and non-capital grants to Illinois hospitals 16 or health care facilities located outside of a city with a population in excess of 1,000,000 to be used for purposes 17 18 that include, but are not limited to, preparing to respond 19 to mass casualties and disasters, maintaining and 20 improving patient safety and quality of care, and 21 protecting the confidentiality of patient information. No 22 single grant for a capital expenditure shall exceed 23 \$300,000. No single grant for a non-capital expenditure 24 shall exceed \$100,000. In awarding such grants, preference 25 shall be given to hospitals that serve a significant 26 number of Medicaid recipients, but do not qualify for

1 disproportionate share hospital adjustment payments under the Illinois Public Aid Code. To receive such a grant, a 2 3 hospital or health care facility must provide funding of 4 at least 50% of the cost of the project for which the grant 5 is being requested. In awarding such grants the Illinois Agency shall 6 Emergencv Management consider the recommendations of the Illinois Hospital Association. 7

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8 (13) Do all other things necessary, incidental or 9 appropriate for the implementation of this Act.

10 (q) The Illinois Emergency Management Agency is authorized 11 to make grants to various higher education institutions, public K-12 school districts, area vocational centers as 12 13 designated by the State Board of Education, inter-district 14 special education cooperatives, regional safe schools, and 15 nonpublic K-12 schools for safety and security improvements. 16 For the purpose of this subsection (q), "higher education institution" means a public university, a public community 17 college, or an independent, not-for-profit or for-profit 18 higher education institution located in this State. Grants 19 20 made under this subsection (g) shall be paid out of moneys 21 appropriated for that purpose from the Build Illinois Bond 22 Fund. The Illinois Emergency Management Agency shall adopt 23 rules to implement this subsection (g). These rules may 24 specify: (i) the manner of applying for grants; (ii) project 25 eligibility requirements; (iii) restrictions on the use of 26 grant moneys; (iv) the manner in which the various higher

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education institutions must account for the use of grant moneys; and (v) any other provision that the Illinois Emergency Management Agency determines to be necessary or useful for the administration of this subsection (g).

5 Illinois Emergency Management Agency (q-5) The is 6 authorized to make grants to not-for-profit organizations which are exempt from federal income taxation under section 7 8 501(c)(3) of the Federal Internal Revenue Code for eligible 9 security improvements that assist the organization in 10 preventing, preparing for, or responding to threats, attacks, 11 or acts of terrorism. To be eligible for a grant under the program, the Agency must determine that the organization is at 12 13 a high risk of being subject to threats, attacks, or acts of 14 terrorism based on the organization's profile, ideology, 15 mission, or beliefs. Eligible security improvements shall 16 include all eligible preparedness activities under the federal Nonprofit Security Grant Program, including, but not limited 17 to, physical security upgrades, security training exercises, 18 19 preparedness training exercises, contracting with security 20 personnel, and any other security upgrades deemed eligible by the Director. Eligible security improvements shall not 21 22 duplicate, in part or in whole, a project included under any awarded federal grant or in a pending federal application. The 23 24 Director shall establish procedures and forms by which 25 applicants may apply for a grant and procedures for distributing grants to recipients. Any security improvements 26

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1 awarded shall remain at the physical property listed in the grant application, unless authorized by Agency rule or 2 approved by the Agency in writing. The procedures shall 3 4 require each applicant to do the following: 5 identify and substantiate prior or current (1) threats, or attacks, or acts of terrorism by a terrorist 6 organization, network, or cell against the not-for-profit 7 8 organization; 9 (2) indicate the symbolic or strategic value of one or 10 more sites that renders the site a possible target of a threat, attack, or act of terrorism; 11 (3) discuss potential consequences to the organization 12 13 if the site is damaged, destroyed, or disrupted by a 14 threat, attack, or act of terrorism terrorist act; 15 (4) describe how the grant will be used to integrate 16 organizational preparedness with broader State and local preparedness efforts, as described by the Agency in each 17 18 Notice of Opportunity for Funding; 19 (5) submit (i) a vulnerability assessment conducted by 20 experienced security, law enforcement, or military 21 personnel, or conducted using an Agency-approved or 22 federal Nonprofit Security Grant Program self-assessment 23 tool, and (ii) a description of how the grant award will be 24 used to address the vulnerabilities identified in the 25 assessment; and

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(6) submit any other relevant information as may be

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required by the Director.

The Agency is authorized to use funds appropriated for the 2 3 grant program described in this subsection (g-5) to administer 4 the program. Any Agency Notice of Opportunity for Funding, 5 proposed or final rulemaking, guidance, training opportunity, 6 or other resource related to the grant program must be published on the Agency's publicly available website, and any 7 announcements related to funding shall be shared with all 8 9 State legislative offices, the Governor's office, emergency 10 services and disaster agencies mandated or required pursuant to subsections (b) through (d) of Section 10, and any other 11 State agencies as determined by the Agency. Subject to 12 13 appropriation, the grant application period shall be open for 14 no less than 45 calendar days during the first application 15 cycle each fiscal year, unless the Agency determines that a 16 shorter period is necessary to avoid conflicts with the annual federal Nonprofit Security Grant Program funding cycle. 17 Additional application cycles may be conducted during the same 18 fiscal year, subject to availability of funds. Upon request, 19 20 Agency staff shall provide reasonable assistance to any applicant in completing a grant application or meeting a 21 22 post-award requirement.

(h) Except as provided in Section 17.5 of this Act, any moneys received by the Agency from donations or sponsorships unrelated to a disaster shall be deposited in the Emergency Planning and Training Fund and used by the Agency, subject to 10300HB1187ham001 -12- LRB103 05291 LNS 57999 a

appropriation, to effectuate planning and training activities. Any moneys received by the Agency from donations during a disaster and intended for disaster response or recovery shall be deposited into the Disaster Response and Recovery Fund and used for disaster response and recovery pursuant to the Disaster Relief Act.

7 (i) The Illinois Emergency Management Agency may by rule for attendance 8 assess and collect reasonable fees at 9 Agency-sponsored conferences to enable the Agency to carry out 10 the requirements of this Act. Any moneys received under this 11 subsection shall be deposited in the Emergency Planning and Training Fund Agency, 12 and used by the subject to 13 appropriation, for planning and training activities.

(j) The Illinois Emergency Management Agency is authorized to make grants to other State agencies, public universities, units of local government, and statewide mutual aid organizations to enhance statewide emergency preparedness and response.
