

103RD GENERAL ASSEMBLY State of Illinois 2023 and 2024 SB3768

SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

105 ILCS 5/14-11.02

from Ch. 122, par. 14-11.02

Amends the Children with Disabilities Article of the School Code. Provides that the State Board of Education shall maintain and operate, or contract for (instead of being empowered to establish, maintain, and operate or contract for) the operation of a permanent statewide residential education facility (instead of statewide service center), known as the Philip J. Rock Center and School. Provides that the State Board of Education shall include a line item in its budget to pay the costs of operating and maintaining the Philip J. Rock Center and School. Limits the specified services provided by the Philip J. Rock Center and School to eligible deaf-blind persons of all ages to being subject to appropriated funding for those specified services. Makes changes concerning provided services. Provides that for the purposes of employment, the Philip J. Rock Center and School shall be considered its own employer. Provides that the State Board of Education shall appoint a Chief Administrator of the Philip J. Rock Center and School who shall be employed by the Philip J. Rock Center and School. Specifies the duties of the Chief Administrator. Sets forth provisions concerning a student with an individualized education program at the Philip J. Rock Center and School. Makes changes concerning the Advisory Board for the Philip J. Rock Center and School. Makes other changes.

1 AN ACT concerning education.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

- 4 Section 5. The School Code is amended by changing Section
- 5 14-11.02 as follows:
- 6 (105 ILCS 5/14-11.02) (from Ch. 122, par. 14-11.02)
- 7 Sec. 14-11.02. The Phillip J. Rock Center and School for
- 8 the Deaf-Blind. Notwithstanding any other Sections of this
- 9 Article, the State Board of Education shall develop and
- 10 operate or contract for the operation of a service center for
- 11 persons who are deaf-blind.
- 12 <u>(a)</u> For the purpose of this Section, persons with
- deaf-blindness are persons who have both auditory and visual
- 14 impairments, the combination of which causes such severe
- 15 communication and other developmental, educational, vocational
- 16 and rehabilitation problems that such persons cannot be
- 17 properly accommodated in special education or vocational
- 18 rehabilitation programs solely for persons with both hearing
- 19 and visual disabilities.
- 20 <u>(b)</u> To be eligible for deaf-blind services <u>under this</u>
- 21 <u>Section</u>, a person must have (i) a visual impairment and an
- 22 auditory impairment, or (ii) a condition in which there is a
- 23 progressive loss of hearing or vision or both that results in

concomitant vision and hearing impairments and that adversely affects educational performance as determined by the multidisciplinary conference. For purposes of this paragraph and Section:

- <u>(1)</u> (A) A visual impairment <u>shall have the same</u> meaning as in the federal Individuals With Disabilities Education Act and its implementing regulations is defined to mean one or more of the following: (i) corrected visual acuity poorer than 20/70 in the better eye; (ii) restricted visual field of 20 degrees or less in the better eye; (iii) cortical blindness; (iv) does not appear to respond to visual stimulation, which adversely affects educational performance as determined by the multidisciplinary conference.
- <u>meaning as in the federal Individuals With Disabilities</u>

 <u>Education Act and its implementing regulations</u> is defined to mean one or more of the following: (i) a sensorineural or ongoing or chronic conductive hearing loss with aided sensitivity of 30dB HL or poorer; (ii) functional auditory behavior that is significantly discrepant from the person's present cognitive and/or developmental levels, which adversely affects educational performance as determined by the multidisciplinary conference.
- (c) Notwithstanding any other Sections of this Article,

 the The State Board of Education shall is empowered to

establish, maintain and operate, or contract for the operation of a permanent statewide residential education facility state-wide service center known as the Philip J. Rock Center and School. The School serves eligible children between the ages of 3 and 22. Subject to appropriations, the Philip J. Rock Center and School may provide additional services to 21; the Center serves eligible deaf-blind persons of all ages. The Philip J. Rock Center and School shall be located in the Chicago metropolitan area near public transportation. The State Board of Education shall include a line item in its budget to pay the costs of operating and maintaining the Philip J. Rock Center and School. If the Center is appropriated funding to serve eligible deaf-blind persons of all ages, services Services provided by the Center shall include, but are not limited to:

- (1) <u>identifying</u> <u>Identifying</u> and <u>providing</u> case management of <u>individuals</u> with combined vision and hearing <u>loss</u> <u>persons</u> who are auditorily and visually impaired;
- (2) <u>providing</u> <u>Providing</u> families with appropriate <u>information and dissemination</u> <u>counseling</u>;
- (3) <u>providing information to Referring</u> persons who are deaf-blind to appropriate agencies for medical and diagnostic services;
- (4) <u>referring</u> <u>Referring</u> persons who are deaf-blind to appropriate agencies for educational, <u>rehabilitation</u>, and <u>support</u> <u>training</u> and <u>care</u> services;

(d) For the purposes of employment, the Philip J. Rock
Center and School shall be considered its own employer. The
State Board of Education shall appoint a Chief Administrator
of the Philip J. Rock Center and School who shall be employed
by the Philip J. Rock Center and School and shall manage the
daily operations of the residential educational facility. The
Chief Administrator shall have the authority on behalf of the
Philip J. Rock Center and School to:
(1) hire, evaluate, discipline, and terminate staff of
the Philip J. Rock Center and School;
(2) determine wages, benefits, and other conditions of
employment for all Philip J. Rock Center and School
<pre>employees;</pre>
(3) bargain with the exclusive bargaining
representative of the Philip J. Rock Center and School
<pre>employees;</pre>
(4) develop a budget to be submitted to the State
Board of Education for review and approval;
(5) contract for any professional, legal, and
educational services necessary for the operation of the
residential educational facility;
(6) make all decisions regarding the daily operations
of the residential educational facility; and
(7) perform any other duties as set forth in the

(e) If the State Board of Education contracts for the fiscal administration of the Philip J. Rock Center and School, then the contract shall be with a local school district, special education cooperative, or regional office of education that can serve as the fiscal agent for the Philip J. Rock Center and School. To the extent possible, the fiscal agent shall be in close geographic proximity to the Philip J. Rock Center and School.

(f) In accordance with a student's individualized education program, the Philip J. Rock Center and School shall make every attempt to provide a free appropriate public education pursuant to the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act of 2001 to a student placed in its residential educational facility either in its own program or within a local school district program that are appropriate to the child and contracted for by the Philip J. Rock Center and School. Through the individualized education program process with the student's resident school district, a student who resides at the Philip J. Rock Center and School may be placed in an alternate educational program by the student's individualized education program team. Educational placement and services shall be provided free of charge to the student's resident school district unless there is tuition associated with the educational placement and services. In the event the Philip J. Rock Center and School must pay tuition or for a

(g) The Advisory Board for Services for Persons who are Deaf-Blind shall provide advice to the State Superintendent of Education, the Governor, and the General Assembly on all matters pertaining to policy concerning persons who are deaf-blind, including the implementation of legislation enacted on their behalf.

The Regarding the maintenance, operation and education functions of the Philip J. Rock Center and School, the Advisory Board shall also make recommendations pertaining to but not limited to the following matters:

- (1) <u>existing</u> <u>Existing</u> and proposed programs of all State agencies that provide services for persons who are deaf-blind;
- (2) the The State program and financial plan for deaf-blind services and the system of priorities to be developed by the State Board of Education;
- (3) <u>standards</u> Standards for services in facilities serving persons who are deaf-blind;
- (4) <u>standards</u> Standards and rates for State payments for any services purchased for persons who are deaf-blind;
- (5) <u>services</u> and research activities in the field of deaf-blindness, including evaluation of services; and

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(6) <u>planning</u> for <u>personnel or preparation</u> personnel/preparation, both preservice and inservice.

The Advisory Board shall consist of 3 persons appointed by the Governor; 2 persons appointed by the State Superintendent of Education; 4 persons appointed by the Secretary of Human Services; and 2 persons appointed by the Director of Children and Family Services. The 3 appointments of the Governor shall consist of a senior citizen 60 years of age or older, consumer who is deaf blind, and a parent of a person who is deaf blind; provided that if any gubernatorial appointee serving on the Advisory Board on the effective date of this amendatory Act of 1991 is not either a senior citizen 60 years of age or older or a consumer who is deaf-blind or a parent of a person who is deaf-blind, then whenever that appointee's term of office expires or a vacancy in that appointee's office sooner occurs, the Governor shall make the appointment to fill that office or vacancy in a manner that will result, at the earliest possible time, in the Governor's appointments to Advisory Board being comprised of one senior citizen 60 years of age or older, one consumer who is deaf-blind, and one parent of a person who is deaf-blind. One person designated by each agency other than the Department of Human Services may be an employee of that agency. Two persons appointed by the Secretary of Human Services may be employees of the Department Services. The appointments of each appointing authority other than the Governor shall include at least one

- parent of an individual who is deaf-blind or a person who is deaf-blind.
- 3 Vacancies in terms shall be filled by the original
- 4 appointing authority. After the original terms, all terms
- 5 shall be for 3 years.
- 6 Except for those members of the Advisory Board who are
- 7 compensated for State service on a full time basis, members
- 8 shall be reimbursed for all actual expenses incurred in the
- 9 performance of their duties. Each member who is not
- 10 compensated for State service on a full time basis shall be
- 11 compensated at a rate of \$50 per day which he spends on
- 12 Advisory Board duties. The Advisory Board shall meet at least
- 2 4 times per year and not more than 12 times per year.
- 14 The State Board of Education Advisory Board shall provide
- 15 support to the Advisory Board for its own organization.
- 16 Six members of the Advisory Board shall constitute a
- 17 quorum. The affirmative vote of a majority of all members of
- 18 the Advisory Board shall be necessary for any action taken by
- 19 the Advisory Board.
