415 ILCS 120/23 new

Amends the Alternate Fuels Act. Provides that, beginning July 1, 2007 and through June 30, 2012, the Secretary of State must notify each owner of a licensed motor vehicle that many motor vehicles are capable of using E85 blended fuel. Sets forth requirements for this notice. Effective immediately.

2 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, 3 represented in the General Assembly:

Section 10. The Alternate Fuels Act is amended by adding
Section 23 as follows:

6 (415 ILCS 120/23 new)

7 <u>Sec. 23. Flexible fuel vehicle notification.</u>

8 <u>(a) Beginning July 1, 2007 and through June 30, 2012, the</u> 9 <u>Secretary of State must notify each owner of a licensed motor</u> 10 <u>vehicle that many motor vehicles are capable of using E85</u> 11 <u>blended fuel. This notice must be included with the motor</u> 12 <u>vehicle sticker renewal form mailed to the owner by the Office</u> 13 <u>of the Secretary of State.</u>

(b) The notice under this Section must be in the form of a
 separate paper. The notice must include an image of the
 American flag and must include the following text:

17Are you aware that many motor vehicles are capable of18using E85 blended fuel? Using E85 blended fuel helps our19economy, helps protect our environment, and helps reduce20our dependence on foreign oil. In order to find out which21vehicles can use E85 fuel, please contact the manufacturer22of your motor vehicle or the Office of the Secretary of23State. In order to find out where E85 fuel is available,

please contact the Office of the Secretary of State, or
 examine an Illinois highway map published by the Illinois
