### SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

Amends the Professional Boxing Act. Includes a person licensed to treat human ailments without the use of drugs and without operative surgery under the Medical Practice Act of 1987 in the definition of "physician". Contains a nonacceleration clause. Effective June 1, 2008.

# 2 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, 3 represented in the General Assembly:

4 Section 5. The Professional Boxing Act is amended by 5 changing Sections 1 and 12 as follows:

9 Sec. 1. Short title and definitions.

10 (a) This Act may be cited as the Professional Boxing Act.

11 (b) As used in this Act:

1. "Department" means the Department of Professional
 Regulation.

14 2. "Director" means the Director of Professional15 Regulation.

3. "Board" means the State Professional Boxing Boardappointed by the Director.

4. "License" means the license issued for boxing
promoters, contestants, or officials in accordance with
this Act.

6. "Boxing Contests" include professional boxingmatches and exhibitions.

7. (Blank). 1 2 8. (Blank). the authorization 3 9. "Permit" means from the Department to a promoter to conduct professional boxing 4 5 contests. 6 10. "Promoter" means a person who is licensed and who 7 holds a permit to conduct professional boxing contests. 11. Unless the context indicates otherwise, "person" 8 9 includes association, partnership, corporation, an 10 gymnasium, or club. 11 12. (Blank). 12 13. "Ultimate fighting exhibition" has the meaning 13 given by rule adopted by the Department in accordance with Section 7.5. 14 15 14. "Professional boxer" means a person licensed by the 16 Department who competes for a money prize, purse, or other 17 type of compensation in a boxing contest, exhibition, or match held in Illinois. 18 19 15. "Judge" means a person licensed by the Department 20 who is at ringside during a boxing match and who has the 21 responsibility of scoring the performance of the 22 participants in the contest. 23 16. "Referee" means a person licensed by the Department

who has the general supervision of a boxing contest and is present inside of the ring during the contest.

17. "Amateur" means a person who has never received or

competed for any purse or other article of value, either for participating in any boxing contest or for the expenses of training therefor, other than a prize that does not exceed \$50 in value.

18. "Contestant" means an individual who participates
 in a boxing contest.

19. "Second" means a person licensed by the Department
who is present at any boxing contest to provide assistance
or advice to a boxer during the contest.

10 20. "Matchmaker" means a person licensed by the 11 Department who brings together professional boxers or 12 procures matches or contests for professional boxers.

13 21. "Manager" means a person licensed by the Department 14 who is not a promoter and who, under contract, agreement, 15 or other arrangement with any boxer, undertakes to, 16 directly or indirectly, control or administer the boxing 17 affairs of boxers.

18 22. "Timekeeper" means a person licensed by the 19 Department who is the official timer of the length of 20 rounds and the intervals between the rounds.

21 23. "Purse" means the financial guarantee or any other
22 remuneration for which contestants are participating in a
23 boxing contest.

24 24. "Physician" means a person licensed to practice
25 medicine in all its branches under the Medical Practice Act
26 of 1987.

1 21. "Manager" means a person licensed by the Department 2 who is not a promoter and who, under contract, agreement, 3 or other arrangement with any contestant, undertakes to, 4 directly or indirectly, control or administer the affairs 5 of contestants.

6 22. "Timekeeper" means a person licensed by the 7 Department who is the official timer of the length of 8 rounds and the intervals between the rounds.

9 23. "Purse" means the financial guarantee or any other 10 remuneration for which contestants are participating in a 11 contest.

12 24. "Physician" means a person licensed to practice 13 medicine in all its branches <u>or a person licensed to treat</u> 14 <u>human ailments without the use of drugs and without</u> 15 <u>operative surgery</u> under the Medical Practice Act of 1987.

17 limited to, Karate, Kung Fu, Jujitsu, Muay Thai, Tae Kwon
18 Do, and Kick-boxing.

19 26. "Mixed martial arts" means the use of a combination 20 of techniques from different disciplines of the martial 21 arts, including without limitation grappling, kicking, and 22 striking.

2 Sec. 12. Contests. Each boxing contestant shall be examined 3 before entering the ring and immediately after each contest by a physician licensed to practice medicine in all of its 4 5 branches. The physician shall determine, prior to the contest, if each contestant is physically fit to engage in the contest. 6 7 After the contest the physician shall examine the contestant to determine possible injury. If the contestant's 8 physical 9 condition so indicates, the physician shall recommend to the 10 Department immediate medical suspension. The physician may, at 11 any time during the contest, stop the contest to examine a 12 boxer, and terminate the contest when, in the physician's opinion, continuing the contest could result in serious injury 13 14 to the boxer. The physician shall certify to the condition of 15 the contestant in writing, over his signature on blank forms 16 provided by the Department. Such reports shall be submitted to 17 the Department in a timely manner. The physician shall be paid by the promoter a fee fixed by the Department. No boxing 18 contest shall be held unless a physician licensed to practice 19 20 medicine in all of its branches is in attendance.

No contest shall be allowed to begin unless at least one physician and 2 trained paramedics or 2 nurses who are trained to administer emergency medical care are present.

No contest shall be more than 12 rounds in length. The rounds shall not be more than 3 minutes each with a one minute interval between them, and no boxer shall be allowed to participate in more than 12 rounds within 72 consecutive hours. At each boxing contest there shall be a referee in attendance who shall direct and control the contest. The referee, before each contest, shall learn the name of the contestant's chief second and shall hold the chief second responsible for the conduct of his assistant during the progress of the contest.

7 There shall be 2 judges in attendance who shall render a 8 decision at the end of each contest. The decision of the 9 judges, taken together with the decision of the referee, is 10 final; or, 3 judges shall score the contest with the referee 11 not scoring. The method of scoring shall be set forth in rules.

12 Judges, referees, or timekeepers for contests shall be 13 Department. assigned by the The Department or its 14 representative shall have discretion to declare a price, 15 remuneration, or purse or any part of it belonging to the 16 contestant withheld if in the judgment of the Department or its 17 representative the contestant is not honestly competing. The Department shall have the authority to prevent a contest or 18 19 exhibition from being held and shall have the authority to stop 20 a fight for noncompliance with any part of this Act or rules or 21 when, in the judgment of the Department, or its representative, 22 continuation of the event would endanger the health, safety, 23 and welfare of the contestants or spectators. The Department's authority to stop a fight contest or exhibition on the basis 24 that the fight would endanger the health, safety, and welfare 25 26 of the contestants or spectators shall extend to any fight

1 contest or exhibition, regardless of whether that fight contest 2 or exhibition is exempted from the prohibition in Section 6 of 3 this Act.

Sec. 12. Contests. Each contestant shall be examined before 7 entering the ring and immediately after each contest by a 8 9 physician licensed to practice medicine in all of its branches. 10 The physician shall determine, prior to the contest, if each 11 contestant is physically fit to engage in the contest. After 12 the contest the physician shall examine the contestant to determine possible injury. If the contestant's physical 13 14 condition so indicates, the physician shall recommend to the 15 Department immediate medical suspension. The physician may, at 16 any time during the contest, stop the contest to examine a contestant, and terminate the contest when, in the physician's 17 18 opinion, continuing the contest could result in serious injury 19 to the contestant. The physician shall certify to the condition of the contestant in writing, over his signature on forms 20 21 provided by the Department. Such reports shall be submitted to 22 the Department in a timely manner. The physician shall be paid by the promoter a fee fixed by the Department. No contest shall 23 24 be held unless a physician licensed to practice medicine in all of its branches is in attendance. 25

No contest shall be allowed to begin unless at least one physician and 2 trained paramedics or 2 nurses who are trained to administer emergency medical care and at least one ambulance dedicated solely for the care of contestants are present.

5 No boxing contest shall be more than 12 rounds in length. The rounds shall not be more than 3 minutes each with a one 6 7 minute interval between them, and no boxing contestant boxer 8 shall be allowed to participate in more than 12 rounds within 9 72 consecutive hours. The number and length for all other 10 contests shall be established by rule. At each contest there 11 shall be a referee in attendance who shall direct and control 12 the contest. The referee, before each contest, shall learn the 13 name of the contestant's chief second and shall hold the chief second responsible for the conduct of his assistant during the 14 15 progress of the contest.

16 There shall be 2 judges in attendance at all boxing 17 contests who shall render a decision at the end of each contest. The decision of the judges, taken together with the 18 decision of the referee, is final; or, 3 judges shall score the 19 20 contest with the referee not scoring. The method of scoring shall be set forth in rules. The number of judges required and 21 22 the manner of scoring for all other contests shall be set by 23 rule.

Judges, referees, or timekeepers for contests shall be assigned by the Department. The Department or its representative shall have discretion to declare a price,

remuneration, or purse or any part of it belonging to the 1 2 contestant withheld if in the judgment of the Department or its 3 representative the contestant is not honestly competing. The Department shall have the authority to prevent a contest from 4 5 being held and shall have the authority to stop a contest for 6 noncompliance with any part of this Act or rules or when, in judgment of the Department, or its representative, 7 the 8 continuation of the event would endanger the health, safety, 9 and welfare of the contestants or spectators. The Department's 10 authority to stop a contest on the basis that the contest would 11 endanger the health, safety, and welfare of the contestants or 12 spectators shall extend to any contest, regardless of whether 13 that contest is exempted from the prohibition in Section 6 of 14 this Act.

Section 95. No acceleration or delay. Where this Act makes changes in a statute that is represented in this Act by text that is not yet or no longer in effect (for example, a Section represented by multiple versions), the use of that text does not accelerate or delay the taking effect of (i) the changes made by this Act or (ii) provisions derived from any other Public Act.
