1 AMENDMENT TO HOUSE BILL 3836

2 AMENDMENT NO. _____. Amend House Bill 3836 by replacing
3 everything after the enacting clause with the following:

4 "Section 1. Short title. This Act may be cited as the
5 Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum Act.

6 Section 5. Definitions. For the purposes of this Act:

7 "Agency" means the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library
8 and Museum.

9 "Board" means the Board of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential
10 Library and Museum.

11 "Executive Director" means the Executive Director of the
12 Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum.

13 "Library" means the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library.

14 "Museum" means the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Museum.

15 Section 10. Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and

1 Museum; establishment; Foundation.

2 (a) The Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum,
3 formerly a constituent unit of the Illinois Historic
4 Preservation Agency, is created as an independent State agency.

5 (b) The Agency shall be under the supervision and direction
6 of the Executive Director of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential
7 Library and Museum.

8 (c) There shall be a Board of the Abraham Lincoln
9 Presidential Library and Museum to advise the Abraham Lincoln
10 Presidential Library and Museum and the Executive Director on
11 programs related to the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library
12 and Museum. The Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum
13 and the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library Foundation shall
14 mutually co-operate to maximize resources available to the
15 Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum and to support,
16 sustain, and provide educational programs and collections at
17 the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum.

18 Section 15. Board; initial members.

19 (a) The Board of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library
20 and Museum shall consist of 11 members to be appointed by the
21 Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate. Each of
22 these members shall have recognized knowledge and ability in
23 matters relating to history, research, cultural institutions,
24 archives, libraries, business, or education. The terms of
25 office of these members shall be 6 years, except that the terms

1 of office of the initial members shall commence from the
2 effective date of this Act and run as provided under subsection
3 (b) of this Section.

4 (b) The appointees that currently serve, as of the
5 effective date of this Act, on the Advisory Board of the
6 Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum previously created
7 under Section 30 of the Historic Preservation Agency Act (now
8 repealed) shall serve as the initial members of the Board
9 created under Section 10 of this Act until they complete the
10 unexpired portions of the terms to which they were appointed
11 under Section 31 of the Historic Preservation Agency Act (now
12 repealed) or until the Governor appoints a successor to replace
13 the initial member. Successors, including a new Chairperson,
14 shall be appointed by the Governor in accordance with
15 subsection (a) of this Section.

16 Section 20. Powers and duties of the Board. The Board shall
17 have the following powers and duties:

18 (a) Establish programs for implementation in support of the
19 mission and goals of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library
20 and Museum.

21 (b) Create and execute such seminars, symposia, or other
22 conferences as may be necessary or advisable to the Abraham
23 Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum.

24 (c) Report annually to the Governor and the General
25 Assembly on the status of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential

1 Library and Museum and its programs.

2 (d) Hire agents and employees necessary to carry out the
3 duties and purposes of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library
4 and Museum.

5 (e) Accept, hold, maintain, and administer, as trustee,
6 property given in trust for educational or historic purposes
7 for the benefit of the people of the State of Illinois and to
8 dispose of any property under the terms of the instrument
9 creating the trust.

10 (f) Accept, hold, maintain, and administer donated
11 property of historical significance such as books, papers,
12 records, and personal property of any kind, including
13 electronic and digital property, pursuant to gifting
14 instruments, agreements, or deeds of gift and to enter into
15 such agreements as may be necessary to carry out the Board's
16 duties and responsibilities under this Section.

17 (g) Lease concessions at the Library and Museum. All
18 leases, for whatever period, shall be made subject to the
19 written approval of the Governor. All concession leases
20 extending for a period in excess of 10 years shall contain
21 provisions for the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and
22 Museum to participate, on a percentage basis, in the revenues
23 generated by any concession operation.

24 (h) Enforce the laws of the State and the rules of the
25 Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum at the Library
26 and Museum.

1 (i) Cooperate with private organizations and agencies of
2 the State of Illinois by providing areas and the use of staff
3 personnel where feasible for the sale of publications on the
4 historic and cultural heritage of the State and craft items
5 made by Illinois craftsmen. These sales shall not conflict with
6 existing concession agreements. The Board is authorized to
7 negotiate and approve agreements with the organizations and
8 agencies for a portion of the monies received from sales to be
9 returned to the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum
10 for the furtherance of interpretive and restoration programs.

11 (j) Establish local bank or savings and loan association
12 accounts, upon the written authorization of the Executive
13 Director, to temporarily hold income received at any of its
14 properties. The local accounts established under this
15 subsection shall be in the name of the Abraham Lincoln
16 Presidential Library and Museum and shall be subject to regular
17 audits. The balance in a local bank or savings and loan
18 association account shall be forwarded to the Abraham Lincoln
19 Presidential Library and Museum for deposit with the State
20 Treasurer on Monday of each week if the amount to be deposited
21 in a fund exceeds \$500.

22 No bank or savings and loan association shall receive
23 public funds as permitted by this Section, unless it has
24 complied with the requirements established under Section 6 of
25 the Public Funds Investment Act.

26 (k) Accept offers of gifts, gratuities, or grants from the

1 federal government, its agencies, or offices, or from any
2 person, firm, or corporation.

3 (l) Subject to the provisions of the Illinois
4 Administrative Procedure Act, make reasonable rules as may be
5 necessary to discharge the duties of the Abraham Lincoln
6 Presidential Library and Museum.

7 (m) Charge and collect admission fees and rental for access
8 to and use of the facilities of the Library and Museum.

9 (n) Operate a restaurant, café, or other food serving
10 facility at the Museum or to lease the operation of such a
11 facility under reasonable terms and conditions; to provide
12 vending services for food, beverages, or other products deemed
13 necessary and proper, consistent with the mission and purposes
14 of the Library and Museum.

15 (o) To engage in marketing activities designed to promote
16 the Library and Museum. In undertaking these activities, the
17 Board may take all necessary steps with respect to products and
18 services, including, but not limited to, retail sales,
19 wholesale sales, direct marketing, mail order sales, telephone
20 sales, advertising and promotion, purchase of product and
21 materials inventory, design, printing and manufacturing of new
22 products, reproductions, and adaptations, copyright and
23 trademark licensing and royalty agreements, and payment of
24 applicable taxes. In addition, the Board shall have the
25 authority to sell advertising in its publications and printed
26 materials.

1 Section 25. Administration of the Abraham Lincoln
2 Presidential Library and Museum. The Board shall appoint an
3 Executive Director of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library
4 and Museum. The Executive Director shall serve at the pleasure
5 of the Board. The Executive Director shall, subject to
6 applicable provisions of law, execute and discharge the powers
7 and duties of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and
8 Museum. The Executive Director shall appoint: (a) a Library
9 Facilities Operations Director; and (b) a Director of the
10 Library. The Executive Director shall appoint those other
11 employees of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and
12 Museum and the Illinois State Historical Library as he or she
13 deems appropriate and shall fix the compensation of the Library
14 Facilities Operations Director, the Director of the Library,
15 and other employees. The Executive Director may establish and
16 collect admission and registration fees, may operate a gift
17 shop, and may publish and sell educational and informational
18 materials.

19 Section 30. Gifts to the Illinois State Historical Library.
20 Those programs, collections, and functions heretofore
21 administered by the Illinois State Historical Library or the
22 Historical Preservation Agency's Historical Library Division
23 shall be administered by the Abraham Lincoln Presidential
24 Library and Museum. All gifts made specifically to the Illinois

1 State Historical Library or the Historical Preservation
2 Agency's Historical Library Division shall remain at all times
3 within the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum.

4 Section 35. Director of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential
5 Library; historical collections. The Director of the Library
6 may and is hereby required to make all necessary rules,
7 regulations, and bylaws not inconsistent with law to carry into
8 effect the purposes of this Section in accordance with the
9 State Historical Library Act and to procure from time to time
10 as may be possible and practicable, at reasonable cost, all
11 books, pamphlets, manuscripts, monographs, writings, and other
12 material of historical interest and useful to the historian
13 bearing upon the political, physical, religious, or social
14 history of the State of Illinois from the earliest known period
15 of time. The Director of the Library may exchange any books,
16 pamphlets, manuscripts, records, or other material which such
17 library may acquire that are of no historical interest or for
18 any reason are of no value to it, with any other library,
19 school, or historical society. The Director of the Library
20 shall distribute volumes of the series known as the Illinois
21 Historical Collections now in print, and to be printed, to all
22 who may apply for same and who pay to the Library for such
23 volumes an amount fixed by the Director sufficient to cover the
24 expenses of printing and distribution of each volume received
25 by such applicants. However, the Director of the Library shall

1 have authority to furnish not to exceed 25 of each of the
2 volumes of the Illinois Historical Collections, free of charge
3 to each of the authors and editors of the collections or parts
4 thereof; to furnish, as in his or her discretion he or she
5 deems necessary or desirable, a reasonable number of each of
6 the volumes of the Collections without charge to archives,
7 libraries, and similar institutions from which material has
8 been drawn or assistance has been given in the preparation of
9 such Collections, and to the officials thereof; to furnish, as
10 in his or her discretion he or she deems necessary or
11 desirable, a reasonable number of each of the volumes of the
12 Collections without charge to the University of Illinois
13 Library and to instructors and officials of that University,
14 and to public libraries in the State of Illinois. The Director
15 of the Library may also make exchanges of Historical
16 Collections with any other library, school, or historical
17 society, and to distribute volumes of collections for review
18 purposes.

19 Section 40. Separation from Historic Preservation Agency.
20 On the effective date of this Act, all of the powers, duties,
21 assets, liabilities, employees, contracts, property, including
22 any items formerly contained in the Illinois State Historical
23 Library now presently held in the Abraham Lincoln Presidential
24 Library and Museum, records, pending business, and unexpended
25 appropriations of the Historic Preservation Agency related to

1 the administration and enforcement of Sections 17, 30, 31, 32,
2 and 33 of the Historic Preservation Agency Act (now repealed)
3 are transferred to the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and
4 Museum created under this Act.

5 The status and rights of the transferred employees, and the
6 rights of the State of Illinois and its agencies, under the
7 Personnel Code and applicable collective bargaining agreements
8 or under any pension, retirement, or annuity plan are not
9 affected (except as provided in Sections 14-110 and 18-127 of
10 the Illinois Pension Code) by that transfer or by any other
11 provision of this Act.

12 Section 45. The Executive Reorganization Implementation
13 Act is amended by changing Section 3.1 as follows:

14 (15 ILCS 15/3.1) (from Ch. 127, par. 1803.1)

15 Sec. 3.1. "Agency directly responsible to the Governor" or
16 "agency" means any office, officer, division, or part thereof,
17 and any other office, nonelective officer, department,
18 division, bureau, board, or commission in the executive branch
19 of State government, except that it does not apply to any
20 agency whose primary function is service to the General
21 Assembly or the Judicial Branch of State government, or to any
22 agency administered by the Attorney General, Secretary of
23 State, State Comptroller or State Treasurer. In addition the
24 term does not apply to the following agencies created by law

1 with the primary responsibility of exercising regulatory or
2 adjudicatory functions independently of the Governor:

3 (1) the State Board of Elections;

4 (2) the State Board of Education;

5 (3) the Illinois Commerce Commission;

6 (4) the Illinois Workers' Compensation Commission;

7 (5) the Civil Service Commission;

8 (6) the Fair Employment Practices Commission;

9 (7) the Pollution Control Board;

10 (8) the Department of State Police Merit Board;

11 (9) the Illinois Racing Board;

12 (10) the Illinois Power Agency; ~~+~~

13 (11) the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum.

16 by changing Sections 2, 4, 5, 5.1, 6, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16,
17 22, and 34 as follows:

19 Sec. 2. For the purposes of this Act:

20 (a) "Agency" means the Historic Preservation Agency;

12 Sec. 4. The Board shall be responsible for setting and
13 determining policy for the Agency. ~~The Agency shall consist of:~~
14 ~~(1) an Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum and (2)~~
15 ~~a Historic Sites and Preservation Division. Except as otherwise~~
16 ~~provided in this Act, any reference in any other Act to the~~
17 ~~Historic Preservation Agency shall be deemed to be a reference~~
18 ~~to the Historic Sites and Preservation Division and any~~
19 ~~reference to the Director of Historic Preservation shall be~~
20 ~~deemed to be a reference to the Director of Historic Sites and~~

22 The Board shall appoint a chief executive officer of the
23 Agency who shall be known as the Director of the Historic Sites
24 ~~and~~ Preservation Agency. The Director shall serve at the

1 applicable provisions of law, execute the powers and discharge
2 the duties vested in the ~~Historic Sites and Preservation~~
3 ~~Division of the~~ Agency by law and implement the policies set by
4 the Board. The Director shall manage the ~~Historic Sites and~~
5 ~~Preservation Division of the~~ Agency. The Director, with the
6 concurrence of the Board, shall appoint Division Chiefs, if
7 needed, and the Deputy Director of the Historic ~~Sites and~~
8 ~~Preservation Division of the~~ Agency. Subject to concurrence by
9 the Board, the Director shall appoint such other employees of

13 employees. The Board shall appoint the Illinois State
14 Historian, who shall provide historical expertise, support,

16 Agency and to all divisions of the Agency, if any. The State
17 Historian is the State's authority on Abraham Lincoln and the
18 history of Illinois.

15 power, with the consent of the Board, to enter into contracts,
16 acquire and dispose of real and personal property, and enter
17 into leases of real and personal property. The Agency has the
18 power to acquire, for purposes authorized by law, any real
19 property in fee simple subject to a life estate in the seller
20 in not more than 3 acres of the real property acquired, subject
21 to the restrictions that the life estate shall be used for
22 residential purposes only and that it shall be
23 non-transferable.

24 (c) To provide recreational facilities including camp
25 sites, lodges and cabins, trails, picnic areas and related

1 recreational facilities at all sites under the jurisdiction of
2 the Agency.

3 (d) To lay out, construct and maintain all needful roads,
4 parking areas, paths or trails, bridges, camp or lodge sites,
5 picnic areas, lodges and cabins, and any other structures and
6 improvements necessary and appropriate in any State historic
7 site or easement thereto; and to provide water supplies, heat
8 and light, and sanitary facilities for the public and living
9 quarters for the custodians and keepers of State historic
10 sites.

11 (e) To grant licenses and rights-of-way within the areas
12 controlled by the ~~Historic Sites and Preservation Division of~~
13 ~~the~~ Agency for the construction, operation and maintenance
14 upon, under or across the property, of facilities for water,
15 sewage, telephone, telegraph, electric, gas, or other public
16 service, subject to the terms and conditions as may be
17 determined by the Agency.

18 (f) To authorize the officers, employees and agents of the
19 ~~Historic Sites and Preservation Division of the~~ Agency, for the
20 purposes of investigation and to exercise the rights, powers,
21 and duties vested and that may be vested in it, to enter and
22 cross all lands and waters in this State, doing no damage to
23 private property.

24 (g) To transfer jurisdiction of or exchange any realty
25 under the control of the ~~Historic Sites and Preservation~~
26 ~~Division of the~~ Agency to any other Department of the State

1 Government, or to any agency of the Federal Government, or to
2 acquire or accept Federal lands, when any transfer, exchange,
3 acquisition or acceptance is advantageous to the State and is
4 approved in writing by the Governor.

5 (h) To erect, supervise, and maintain all public monuments
6 and memorials erected by the State, except when the supervision
7 and maintenance of public monuments and memorials is otherwise
8 provided by law.

9 (i) To accept, hold, maintain, and administer, as trustee,
10 property given in trust for educational or historic purposes
11 for the benefit of the People of the State of Illinois and to
12 dispose, with the consent of the Board, of any property under
13 the terms of the instrument creating the trust.

14 (j) To lease concessions on any property under the
15 jurisdiction of the Agency for a period not exceeding 25 years
16 and to lease a concession complex at Lincoln's New Salem State
17 Historic Site for which a cash incentive has been authorized
18 under Section 5.1 of the Historic Preservation Agency Act for a
19 period not to exceed 40 years. All leases, for whatever period,
20 shall be made subject to the written approval of the Governor.
21 All concession leases extending for a period in excess of 10
22 years, will contain provisions for the Agency to participate,
23 on a percentage basis, in the revenues generated by any
24 concession operation.

25 The Agency is authorized to allow for provisions for a
26 reserve account and a leasehold account within Agency

1 concession lease agreements for the purpose of setting aside
2 revenues for the maintenance, rehabilitation, repair,
3 improvement, and replacement of the concession facility,
4 structure, and equipment of the Agency that are part of the
5 leased premises.

6 The lessee shall be required to pay into the reserve
7 account a percentage of gross receipts, as set forth in the
8 lease, to be set aside and expended in a manner acceptable to
9 the Agency by the concession lessee for the purpose of ensuring
10 that an appropriate amount of the lessee's moneys are provided
11 by the lessee to satisfy the lessee's incurred responsibilities
12 for the operation of the concession facility under the terms
13 and conditions of the concession lease.

14 The lessee account shall allow for the amortization of
15 certain authorized expenses that are incurred by the concession
16 lessee but that are not an obligation of the lessee under the
17 terms and conditions of the lease agreement. The Agency may
18 allow a reduction of up to 50% of the monthly rent due for the
19 purpose of enabling the recoupment of the lessee's authorized
20 expenditures during the term of the lease.

21 (k) To sell surplus agricultural products grown on land
22 owned by or under the jurisdiction of the ~~Historic Sites and~~
23 ~~Preservation Division of the~~ Agency, when the products cannot
24 be used by the Agency.

25 (l) To enforce the laws of the State and the rules and
26 regulations of the Agency in or on any lands owned, leased, or

1 managed by the ~~Historic Sites and Preservation Division of the~~
2 Agency.

3 (m) To cooperate with private organizations and agencies of
4 the State of Illinois by providing areas and the use of staff
5 personnel where feasible for the sale of publications on the
6 historic and cultural heritage of the State and craft items
7 made by Illinois craftsmen. These sales shall not conflict with
8 existing concession agreements. The ~~Historic Sites and~~
9 ~~Preservation Division of the~~ Agency is authorized to negotiate
10 with the organizations and agencies for a portion of the monies
11 received from sales to be returned to the ~~Historic Sites and~~
12 ~~Preservation Division of the~~ Agency's Historic Sites Fund for
13 the furtherance of interpretive and restoration programs.

14 (n) To establish local bank or savings and loan association
15 accounts, upon the written authorization of the Director, to
16 temporarily hold income received at any of its properties. The
17 local accounts established under this Section shall be in the
18 name of the Historic Preservation Agency and shall be subject
19 to regular audits. The balance in a local bank or savings and
20 loan association account shall be forwarded to the Agency for
21 deposit with the State Treasurer on Monday of each week if the
22 amount to be deposited in a fund exceeds \$500.

23 No bank or savings and loan association shall receive
24 public funds as permitted by this Section, unless it has
25 complied with the requirements established under Section 6 of
26 the Public Funds Investment Act.

1 (o) To accept, with the consent of the Board, offers of
2 gifts, gratuities, or grants from the federal government, its
3 agencies, or offices, or from any person, firm, or corporation.

4 (p) To make reasonable rules and regulations as may be
5 necessary to discharge the duties of the Agency.

6 (q) With appropriate cultural organizations, to further
7 and advance the goals of the Agency.

8 (r) To make grants for the purposes of planning, survey,
9 rehabilitation, restoration, reconstruction, landscaping, and
10 acquisition of Illinois properties (i) designated individually
11 in the National Register of Historic Places, (ii) designated as
12 a landmark under a county or municipal landmark ordinance, or
13 (iii) located within a National Register of Historic Places
14 historic district or a locally designated historic district
15 when the Director determines that the property is of historic
16 significance whenever an appropriation is made therefor by the
17 General Assembly or whenever gifts or grants are received for
18 that purpose and to promulgate regulations as may be necessary
19 or desirable to carry out the purposes of the grants.

20 Grantees may, as prescribed by rule, be required to provide
21 matching funds for each grant. Grants made under this
22 subsection shall be known as Illinois Heritage Grants.

23 Every owner of a historic property, or the owner's agent,
24 is eligible to apply for a grant under this subsection.

25 (s) To establish and implement a pilot program for charging
26 admission to State historic sites. Fees may be charged for

1 special events, admissions, and parking or any combination;
2 fees may be charged at all sites or selected sites. All fees
3 shall be deposited into the Illinois Historic Sites Fund. The
4 ~~Historic Sites and Preservation Division of the~~ Agency shall
5 have the discretion to set and adjust reasonable fees at the
6 various sites, taking into consideration various factors
7 including but not limited to: cost of services furnished to
8 each visitor, impact of fees on attendance and tourism and the
9 costs expended collecting the fees. The Agency shall keep
10 careful records of the income and expenses resulting from the
11 imposition of fees, shall keep records as to the attendance at
12 each historic site, and shall report to the Governor and
13 General Assembly by January 31 after the close of each year.
14 The report shall include information on costs, expenses,
15 attendance, comments by visitors, and any other information the
16 Agency may believe pertinent, including:

17 (1) Recommendations as to whether fees should be
18 continued at each State historic site.

19 (2) How the fees should be structured and imposed.

20 (3) Estimates of revenues and expenses associated with
21 each site.

22 (t) To provide for overnight tent and trailer campsites and
23 to provide suitable housing facilities for student and juvenile
24 overnight camping groups. The ~~Historic Sites and Preservation~~
25 ~~Division of the~~ Agency shall charge rates similar to those
26 charged by the Department of Conservation for the same or

1 similar facilities and services.

2 (u) To engage in marketing activities designed to promote
3 the sites and programs administered by the Agency. In
4 undertaking these activities, the Agency may take all necessary
5 steps with respect to products and services, including but not
6 limited to retail sales, wholesale sales, direct marketing,
7 mail order sales, telephone sales, advertising and promotion,
8 purchase of product and materials inventory, design, printing
9 and manufacturing of new products, reproductions, and
10 adaptations, copyright and trademark licensing and royalty
11 agreements, and payment of applicable taxes. In addition, the
12 Agency shall have the authority to sell advertising in its
13 publications and printed materials. All income from marketing
14 activities shall be deposited into the Illinois Historic Sites
15 Fund.

18 Sec. 22. Amistad Commission.

19 (a) Purpose. The General Assembly finds and declares that
20 all people should know of and remember the human carnage and
21 dehumanizing atrocities committed during the period of the
22 African slave trade and slavery in America and of the vestiges
23 of slavery in this country; and it is in fact vital to educate
24 our citizens on these events, the legacy of slavery, the sad
25 history of racism in this country, and the principles of human

1 rights and dignity in a civilized society.

2 It is the policy of the State of Illinois that the history
3 of the African slave trade, slavery in America, the depth of
4 their impact in our society, and the triumphs of
5 African-Americans and their significant contributions to the
6 development of this country is the proper concern of all
7 people, particularly students enrolled in the schools of the
8 State of Illinois.

9 It is therefore desirable to create a Commission that, as
10 an organized body and on a continuous basis, will survey,
11 design, encourage, and promote the implementation of education
12 and awareness programs in Illinois that are concerned with the
13 African slave trade, slavery in America, the vestiges of
14 slavery in this country, and the contributions of
15 African-Americans in building our country; to develop
16 workshops, institutes, seminars, and other teacher training
17 activities designed to educate teachers on this subject matter;
18 and that will be responsible for the coordination of events on
19 a regular basis, throughout the State, that provide appropriate
20 memorialization of the events concerning the enslavement of
21 Africans and their descendants in America and their struggle
22 for freedom, liberty, and equality.

23 (b) Amistad Commission. The Amistad Commission is created
24 within the Agency. The Commission is named to honor the group
25 of enslaved Africans transported in 1839 on a vessel named the
26 Amistad who overthrew their captors and created an

1 international incident that was eventually argued before the
2 Supreme Court and that shed a growing light on the evils of the
3 slave trade and galvanized a growing abolitionist movement
4 towards demanding the end of slavery in the United States.

5 (c) Membership. The Commission shall consist of 15 members,
6 including 3 ex officio members: the State Superintendent of
7 Education or his or her designee, the Director of Commerce and
8 Economic Opportunity or his or her designee, and the Director
9 of the ~~Historic Sites and~~ Preservation Agency or his or her
10 designee; and 12 public members. Public members shall be
11 appointed as follows:

12 (i) 2 members appointed by the President of the Senate
13 and one member appointed by the Minority Leader of the
14 Senate;

15 (ii) 2 members appointed by the Speaker of the House of
16 Representatives and one member appointed by the Minority
17 Leader of the House of Representatives; and

18 (iii) 6 members, no more than 4 of whom shall be of the
19 same political party, appointed by the Governor.

20 The public members shall be residents of this State, chosen
21 with due regard to broad geographic representation and ethnic
22 diversity, who have served actively in organizations that
23 educate the public on the history of the African slave trade,
24 the contributions of African-Americans to our society, and
25 civil rights issues.

26 Each public member of the Commission shall serve for a term

1 of 3 years, except that of the initial members so appointed:
2 one member appointed by the President of the Senate, one member
3 appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and 2
4 members appointed by the Governor shall serve for terms of one
5 year; the member appointed by the Minority Leader of the
6 Senate, one member appointed by the Speaker of the House of
7 Representatives, and 2 members appointed by the Governor shall
8 serve for terms of 2 years; and one member appointed by the
9 President of the Senate, the member appointed by the Minority
10 Leader of the House of Representatives, and 2 members appointed
11 by the Governor shall serve for terms of 3 years. Public
12 members shall be eligible for reappointment. They shall serve
13 until their successors are appointed and qualified, and the
14 term of the successor of any incumbent shall be calculated from
15 the expiration of the term of that incumbent. A vacancy
16 occurring other than by expiration of term shall be filled in
17 the same manner as the original appointment, but for the
18 unexpired term only.

19 (d) Election of chairperson; meetings. At its first meeting
20 and annually thereafter, the Commission shall elect from among
21 its members a chairperson and other officers it considers
22 necessary or appropriate. After its first meeting, the
23 Commission shall meet at least quarterly, or more frequently at
24 the call of the chairperson or if requested by 9 or more
25 members.

26 (e) Quorum. A majority of the members of the Commission

1 constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at a
2 meeting of the Commission. A majority of the members present
3 and serving is required for official action of the Commission.

4 (f) Public meeting. All business that the Commission is
5 authorized to perform shall be conducted at a public meeting of
6 the Commission, held in compliance with the Open Meetings Act.

7 (g) Freedom of Information. A writing prepared, owned,
8 used, in the possession of, or retained by the Commission in
9 the performance of an official function is subject to the
10 Freedom of Information Act.

11 (h) Compensation. The members of the Commission shall serve
12 without compensation, but shall be entitled to reimbursement
13 for all necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their
14 official duties as members of the Commission from funds
15 appropriated for that purpose. Reimbursement for travel,
16 meals, and lodging shall be in accordance with the rules of the
17 Governor's Travel Control Board.

18 (i) Duties. The Commission shall have the following
19 responsibilities and duties:

20 (1) To provide, based upon the collective interest of
21 the members and the knowledge and experience of the
22 members, assistance and advice to schools within the State
23 with respect to the implementation of education, awareness
24 programs, textbooks, and educational materials concerned
25 with the African slave trade, slavery in America, the
26 vestiges of slavery in this country, and the contributions

1 of African-Americans to our society.

2 (2) To survey and catalog the extent and breadth of
3 education concerning the African slave trade, slavery in
4 America, the vestiges of slavery in this country, and the
5 contributions of African-Americans to our society
6 presently being incorporated into the curricula and
7 textbooks and taught in the school systems of the State; to
8 inventory those African slave trade, American slavery, or
9 relevant African-American history memorials, exhibits, and
10 resources that should be incorporated into courses of study
11 at educational institutions, schools, and various other
12 locations throughout the State; and to assist the State
13 Board of Education and other State and educational agencies
14 in the development and implementation of African slave
15 trade, American slavery, and African-American history
16 education programs.

17 (3) To act as a liaison with textbook publishers,
18 schools, public, private, and nonprofit resource
19 organizations, and members of the United States Senate and
20 House of Representatives and the Illinois Senate and House
21 of Representatives in order to facilitate the inclusion of
22 the history of African slavery and of African-Americans in
23 this country in the curricula of public and nonpublic
24 schools.

25 (4) To compile a roster of individual volunteers who
26 are willing to share their knowledge and experience in

1 classrooms, seminars, and workshops with students and
2 teachers on the subject of the African slave trade,
3 American slavery, the impact of slavery on our society
4 today, and the contributions of African-Americans to our
5 country.

6 (5) To coordinate events memorializing the African
7 slave trade, American slavery, and the history of
8 African-Americans in this country that reflect the
9 contributions of African-Americans in overcoming the
10 burdens of slavery and its vestiges, and to seek volunteers
11 who are willing and able to participate in commemorative
12 events that will enhance student awareness of the
13 significance of the African slave trade, American slavery,
14 its historical impact, and the struggle for freedom.

15 (6) To prepare reports for the Governor and the General
16 Assembly regarding its findings and recommendations on
17 facilitating the inclusion of the African slave trade,
18 American slavery studies, African-American history, and
19 special programs in the educational system of the State.

20 (7) To develop, in consultation with the State Board of
21 Education, curriculum guidelines that will be made
22 available to every school board for the teaching of
23 information on the African slave trade, slavery in America,
24 the vestiges of slavery in this country, and the
25 contributions of African-Americans to our country.

26 (8) To solicit, receive, and accept appropriations,

1 gifts, and donations for Commission operations and
2 programs authorized under this Section.

3 (j) Commission requests for assistance. The Commission is
4 authorized to call upon any department, office, division, or
5 agency of the State, or of any county, municipality, or school
6 district of the State, to supply such data, program reports,
7 and other information, appropriate school personnel, and
8 assistance as it deems necessary to discharge its
9 responsibilities under this Act. These departments, offices,
10 divisions, and agencies shall, to the extent possible and not
11 inconsistent with any other law of this State, cooperate with
12 the Commission and shall furnish it with such information,
13 appropriate school personnel, and assistance as may be
14 necessary or helpful to accomplish the purposes of this Act.

15 (k) State Board of Education assistance. The State Board of
16 Education shall:

17 (1) Assist the Amistad Commission in marketing and
18 distributing to educators, administrators, and school
19 districts in the State educational information and other
20 materials on the African slave trade, slavery in America,
21 the vestiges of slavery in this country, and the
22 contributions of African-Americans to our society.

23 (2) Conduct at least one teacher workshop annually on
24 the African slave trade, slavery in America, the vestiges
25 of slavery in this country, and the contributions of
26 African-Americans to our society.

1 (3) Assist the Amistad Commission in monitoring the
2 inclusion of slavery materials and curricula in the State's
3 educational system.

4 (4) Consult with the Amistad Commission to determine
5 ways it may survey, catalog, and extend slave trade and
6 American slavery education presently being taught in the
7 State's educational system.

8 The State Board of Education may, subject to the
9 availability of appropriations, hire additional staff and
10 consultants to carry out the duties and responsibilities
11 provided within this subsection (k).

12 (1) Report. The Commission shall report its activities and
13 findings, as required under subsection (i), to the Governor and
14 General Assembly on or before June 30, 2006, and biannually
15 thereafter.

18 Sec. 34. Internal Auditor. There is created the Office of
19 the Internal Auditor of the Historic Preservation Agency. The
20 Internal Auditor shall be appointed by the Board, shall serve
21 at the pleasure of the Board, and shall report to the Board.
22 The Internal Auditor shall audit and maintain the financial
23 books, records, papers, and transactions of the ~~Lincoln~~
24 ~~Presidential Library and the Historic Sites and Preservation~~
25 ~~Division of the Historic Preservation Agency.~~ The Internal

1 Auditor shall prepare an annual report for each fiscal year of
2 the operations of the Historic Preservation Agency, which shall

12 Sec. 5.1. The State Historian shall establish and supervise
13 a program within the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library
14 designed to preserve as historical records selected past
15 editions of newspapers of this State. Such editions shall be
16 microphotographed. The negatives of such microphotographs
17 shall be stored in a place provided by the Abraham Lincoln
18 Presidential Library.

19 The State Historian shall determine on the basis of
20 historical value the various newspaper edition files which
21 shall be microphotographed and shall arrange a schedule for
22 such microphotographing. The State Historian shall supervise
23 the making of arrangements for acquiring access to past edition
24 files with the editors or publishers of the various newspapers.

1 The method of microphotography to be employed in this
2 program shall conform to the standards established pursuant to
3 Section 17 of "The State Records Act", approved July 6, 1957.

4 Upon payment to the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library of
5 the required fee, any person or organization shall be supplied
6 with any prints requested to be made from the negatives of the
7 microphotographs. The fee required shall be determined by the
8 State Historian and shall be equal in amount to the cost
9 incurred by the Lincoln Presidential Library in supplying the
10 requested prints.

12 Section 60. The Liquor Control Act of 1934 is amended by
13 changing Section 6-15 as follows:

14 (235 ILCS 5/6-15) (from Ch. 43, par. 130)

15 Sec. 6-15. No alcoholic liquors shall be sold or delivered
16 in any building belonging to or under the control of the State
17 or any political subdivision thereof except as provided in this
18 Act. The corporate authorities of any city, village,
19 incorporated town, township, or county may provide by
20 ordinance, however, that alcoholic liquor may be sold or
21 delivered in any specifically designated building belonging to
22 or under the control of the municipality, township, or county,
23 or in any building located on land under the control of the
24 municipality, township, or county; provided that such township

1 or county complies with all applicable local ordinances in any
2 incorporated area of the township or county. Alcoholic liquor
3 may be delivered to and sold under the authority of a special
4 use permit on any property owned by a conservation district
5 organized under the Conservation District Act, provided that
6 (i) the alcoholic liquor is sold only at an event authorized by
7 the governing board of the conservation district, (ii) the
8 issuance of the special use permit is authorized by the local
9 liquor control commissioner of the territory in which the
10 property is located, and (iii) the special use permit
11 authorizes the sale of alcoholic liquor for one day or less.
12 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at any airport
13 belonging to or under the control of a municipality of more
14 than 25,000 inhabitants, or in any building or on any golf
15 course owned by a park district organized under the Park
16 District Code, subject to the approval of the governing board
17 of the district, or in any building or on any golf course owned
18 by a forest preserve district organized under the Downstate
19 Forest Preserve District Act, subject to the approval of the
20 governing board of the district, or on the grounds within 500
21 feet of any building owned by a forest preserve district
22 organized under the Downstate Forest Preserve District Act
23 during times when food is dispensed for consumption within 500
24 feet of the building from which the food is dispensed, subject
25 to the approval of the governing board of the district, or in a
26 building owned by a Local Mass Transit District organized under

1 the Local Mass Transit District Act, subject to the approval of
2 the governing Board of the District, or in Bicentennial Park,
3 or on the premises of the City of Mendota Lake Park located
4 adjacent to Route 51 in Mendota, Illinois, or on the premises
5 of Camden Park in Milan, Illinois, or in the community center
6 owned by the City of Loves Park that is located at 1000 River
7 Park Drive in Loves Park, Illinois, or, in connection with the
8 operation of an established food serving facility during times
9 when food is dispensed for consumption on the premises, and at
10 the following aquarium and museums located in public parks: Art
11 Institute of Chicago, Chicago Academy of Sciences, Chicago
12 Historical Society, Field Museum of Natural History, Museum of
13 Science and Industry, DuSable Museum of African American
14 History, John G. Shedd Aquarium and Adler Planetarium, or at
15 Lakeview Museum of Arts and Sciences in Peoria, or in
16 connection with the operation of the facilities of the Chicago
17 Zoological Society or the Chicago Horticultural Society on land
18 owned by the Forest Preserve District of Cook County, or on any
19 land used for a golf course or for recreational purposes owned
20 by the Forest Preserve District of Cook County, subject to the
21 control of the Forest Preserve District Board of Commissioners
22 and applicable local law, provided that dram shop liability
23 insurance is provided at maximum coverage limits so as to hold
24 the District harmless from all financial loss, damage, and
25 harm, or in any building located on land owned by the Chicago
26 Park District if approved by the Park District Commissioners,

1 or on any land used for a golf course or for recreational
2 purposes and owned by the Illinois International Port District
3 if approved by the District's governing board, or at any
4 airport, golf course, faculty center, or facility in which
5 conference and convention type activities take place belonging
6 to or under control of any State university or public community
7 college district, provided that with respect to a facility for
8 conference and convention type activities alcoholic liquors
9 shall be limited to the use of the convention or conference
10 participants or participants in cultural, political or
11 educational activities held in such facilities, and provided
12 further that the faculty or staff of the State university or a
13 public community college district, or members of an
14 organization of students, alumni, faculty or staff of the State
15 university or a public community college district are active
16 participants in the conference or convention, or in Memorial
17 Stadium on the campus of the University of Illinois at
18 Urbana-Champaign during games in which the Chicago Bears
19 professional football team is playing in that stadium during
20 the renovation of Soldier Field, not more than one and a half
21 hours before the start of the game and not after the end of the
22 third quarter of the game, or in the Pavilion Facility on the
23 campus of the University of Illinois at Chicago during games in
24 which the Chicago Storm professional soccer team is playing in
25 that facility, not more than one and a half hours before the
26 start of the game and not after the end of the third quarter of

1 the game, or in the Pavilion Facility on the campus of the
2 University of Illinois at Chicago during games in which the
3 WNBA professional women's basketball team is playing in that
4 facility, not more than one and a half hours before the start
5 of the game and not after the 10-minute mark of the second half
6 of the game, or by a catering establishment which has rented
7 facilities from a board of trustees of a public community
8 college district, or in a restaurant that is operated by a
9 commercial tenant in the North Campus Parking Deck building
10 that (1) is located at 1201 West University Avenue, Urbana,
11 Illinois and (2) is owned by the Board of Trustees of the
12 University of Illinois, or, if approved by the District board,
13 on land owned by the Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater
14 Chicago and leased to others for a term of at least 20 years.
15 Nothing in this Section precludes the sale or delivery of
16 alcoholic liquor in the form of original packaged goods in
17 premises located at 500 S. Racine in Chicago belonging to the
18 University of Illinois and used primarily as a grocery store by
19 a commercial tenant during the term of a lease that predates
20 the University's acquisition of the premises; but the
21 University shall have no power or authority to renew, transfer,
22 or extend the lease with terms allowing the sale of alcoholic
23 liquor; and the sale of alcoholic liquor shall be subject to
24 all local laws and regulations. After the acquisition by
25 Winnebago County of the property located at 404 Elm Street in
26 Rockford, a commercial tenant who sold alcoholic liquor at

1 retail on a portion of the property under a valid license at
2 the time of the acquisition may continue to do so for so long
3 as the tenant and the County may agree under existing or future
4 leases, subject to all local laws and regulations regarding the
5 sale of alcoholic liquor. Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to
6 and sold at Memorial Hall, located at 211 North Main Street,
7 Rockford, under conditions approved by Winnebago County and
8 subject to all local laws and regulations regarding the sale of
9 alcoholic liquor. Each facility shall provide dram shop
10 liability in maximum insurance coverage limits so as to save
11 harmless the State, municipality, State university, airport,
12 golf course, faculty center, facility in which conference and
13 convention type activities take place, park district, Forest
14 Preserve District, public community college district,
15 aquarium, museum, or sanitary district from all financial loss,
16 damage or harm. Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in
17 buildings of golf courses owned by municipalities or Illinois
18 State University in connection with the operation of an
19 established food serving facility during times when food is
20 dispensed for consumption upon the premises. Alcoholic liquors
21 may be delivered to and sold at retail in any building owned by
22 a fire protection district organized under the Fire Protection
23 District Act, provided that such delivery and sale is approved
24 by the board of trustees of the district, and provided further
25 that such delivery and sale is limited to fundraising events
26 and to a maximum of 6 events per year. However, the limitation

1 to fundraising events and to a maximum of 6 events per year
2 does not apply to the delivery, sale, or manufacture of
3 alcoholic liquors at the building located at 59 Main Street in
4 Oswego, Illinois, owned by the Oswego Fire Protection District
5 if the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed as approved by the
6 Oswego Fire Protection District and the property is no longer
7 being utilized for fire protection purposes.

8 Alcoholic liquors may be served or sold in buildings under
9 the control of the Board of Trustees of the University of
10 Illinois for events that the Board may determine are public
11 events and not related student activities. The Board of
12 Trustees shall issue a written policy within 6 months of the
13 effective date of this amendatory Act of the 95th General
14 Assembly concerning the types of events that would be eligible
15 for an exemption. Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue
16 revised, updated, new, or amended policies as it deems
17 necessary and appropriate. In preparing its written policy, the
18 Board of Trustees shall, among other factors it considers
19 relevant and important, give consideration to the following:
20 (i) whether the event is a student activity or student related
21 activity; (ii) whether the physical setting of the event is
22 conducive to control of liquor sales and distribution; (iii)
23 the ability of the event operator to ensure that the sale or
24 serving of alcoholic liquors and the demeanor of the
25 participants are in accordance with State law and University
26 policies; (iv) regarding the anticipated attendees at the

1 event, the relative proportion of individuals under the age of
2 21 to individuals age 21 or older; (v) the ability of the venue
3 operator to prevent the sale or distribution of alcoholic
4 liquors to individuals under the age of 21; (vi) whether the
5 event prohibits participants from removing alcoholic beverages
6 from the venue; and (vii) whether the event prohibits
7 participants from providing their own alcoholic liquors to the
8 venue. In addition, any policy submitted by the Board of
9 Trustees to the Illinois Liquor Control Commission must require
10 that any event at which alcoholic liquors are served or sold in
11 buildings under the control of the Board of Trustees shall
12 require the prior written approval of the Office of the
13 Chancellor for the University campus where the event is
14 located. The Board of Trustees shall submit its policy, and any
15 subsequently revised, updated, new, or amended policies, to the
16 Illinois Liquor Control Commission, and any University event,
17 or location for an event, exempted under such policies shall
18 apply for a license under the applicable Sections of this Act.

19 Alcoholic liquors may be served or sold in buildings under
20 the control of the Board of Trustees of Northern Illinois
21 University for events that the Board may determine are public
22 events and not student-related activities. The Board of
23 Trustees shall issue a written policy within 6 months after
24 June 28, 2011 (the effective date of Public Act 97-45)
25 concerning the types of events that would be eligible for an
26 exemption. Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue revised,

1 updated, new, or amended policies as it deems necessary and
2 appropriate. In preparing its written policy, the Board of
3 Trustees shall, in addition to other factors it considers
4 relevant and important, give consideration to the following:

5 (i) whether the event is a student activity or student-related
6 activity; (ii) whether the physical setting of the event is
7 conducive to control of liquor sales and distribution; (iii)
8 the ability of the event operator to ensure that the sale or
9 serving of alcoholic liquors and the demeanor of the
10 participants are in accordance with State law and University
11 policies; (iv) the anticipated attendees at the event and the
12 relative proportion of individuals under the age of 21 to
13 individuals age 21 or older; (v) the ability of the venue
14 operator to prevent the sale or distribution of alcoholic
15 liquors to individuals under the age of 21; (vi) whether the
16 event prohibits participants from removing alcoholic beverages
17 from the venue; and (vii) whether the event prohibits

20 Alcoholic liquors may be served or sold in buildings under
21 the control of the Board of Trustees of Chicago State
22 University for events that the Board may determine are public
23 events and not student-related activities. The Board of
24 Trustees shall issue a written policy within 6 months after
25 August 2, 2013 (the effective date of Public Act 98-132) ~~this~~
26 ~~amendatory Act of the 98th General Assembly~~ concerning the

1 types of events that would be eligible for an exemption.
2 Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue revised, updated,
3 new, or amended policies as it deems necessary and appropriate.
4 In preparing its written policy, the Board of Trustees shall,
5 in addition to other factors it considers relevant and
6 important, give consideration to the following: (i) whether the
7 event is a student activity or student-related activity; (ii)

26 effective date of this amendatory Act of the 97th General

1 Assembly concerning the types of events that would be eligible
2 for an exemption. Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue
3 revised, updated, new, or amended policies as it deems
4 necessary and appropriate. In preparing its written policy, the
5 Board of Trustees shall, in addition to other factors it
6 considers relevant and important, give consideration to the
7 following: (i) whether the event is a student activity or
8 student-related activity; (ii) whether the physical setting of
9 the event is conducive to control of liquor sales and

26 attendance is 20 or more persons, and if the person or facility

1 selling or dispensing the alcoholic liquor has provided dram
2 shop liability insurance in maximum limits so as to hold
3 harmless the Village of Dolton and the State from all financial
4 loss, damage and harm.

5 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail in
6 any building used as an Illinois State Armory provided:

7 (i) the Adjutant General's written consent to the
8 issuance of a license to sell alcoholic liquor in such
9 building is filed with the Commission;

10 (ii) the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in
11 connection with organized functions held on special
12 occasions;

13 (iii) the organized function is one for which the
14 planned attendance is 25 or more persons; and

15 (iv) the facility selling or dispensing the alcoholic
16 liquors has provided dram shop liability insurance in
17 maximum limits so as to save harmless the facility and the
18 State from all financial loss, damage or harm.

19 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail in
20 the Chicago Civic Center, provided that:

21 (i) the written consent of the Public Building
22 Commission which administers the Chicago Civic Center is
23 filed with the Commission;

24 (ii) the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in
25 connection with organized functions held on special
26 occasions;

1 (iii) the organized function is one for which the
2 planned attendance is 25 or more persons;

3 (iv) the facility selling or dispensing the alcoholic
4 liquors has provided dram shop liability insurance in
5 maximum limits so as to hold harmless the Civic Center, the
6 City of Chicago and the State from all financial loss,
7 damage or harm; and

8 (v) all applicable local ordinances are complied with.

9 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered or sold in any building
10 belonging to or under the control of any city, village or
11 incorporated town where more than 75% of the physical
12 properties of the building is used for commercial or
13 recreational purposes, and the building is located upon a pier
14 extending into or over the waters of a navigable lake or stream
15 or on the shore of a navigable lake or stream. In accordance
16 with a license issued under this Act, alcoholic liquor may be
17 sold, served, or delivered in buildings and facilities under
18 the control of the Department of Natural Resources during
19 events or activities lasting no more than 7 continuous days
20 upon the written approval of the Director of Natural Resources
21 acting as the controlling government authority. The Director of
22 Natural Resources may specify conditions on that approval,
23 including but not limited to requirements for insurance and
24 hours of operation. Notwithstanding any other provision of this
25 Act, alcoholic liquor sold by a United States Army Corps of
26 Engineers or Department of Natural Resources concessionaire

1 who was operating on June 1, 1991 for on-premises consumption
2 only is not subject to the provisions of Articles IV and IX.
3 Beer and wine may be sold on the premises of the Joliet Park
4 District Stadium owned by the Joliet Park District when written
5 consent to the issuance of a license to sell beer and wine in
6 such premises is filed with the local liquor commissioner by
7 the Joliet Park District. Beer and wine may be sold in
8 buildings on the grounds of State veterans' homes when written
9 consent to the issuance of a license to sell beer and wine in
10 such buildings is filed with the Commission by the Department
11 of Veterans' Affairs, and the facility shall provide dram shop
12 liability in maximum insurance coverage limits so as to save
13 the facility harmless from all financial loss, damage or harm.
14 Such liquors may be delivered to and sold at any property owned
15 or held under lease by a Metropolitan Pier and Exposition
16 Authority or Metropolitan Exposition and Auditorium Authority.

17 Beer and wine may be sold and dispensed at professional
18 sporting events and at professional concerts and other
19 entertainment events conducted on premises owned by the Forest
20 Preserve District of Kane County, subject to the control of the
21 District Commissioners and applicable local law, provided that
22 dram shop liability insurance is provided at maximum coverage
23 limits so as to hold the District harmless from all financial
24 loss, damage and harm.

25 Nothing in this Section shall preclude the sale or delivery
26 of beer and wine at a State or county fair or the sale or

1 delivery of beer or wine at a city fair in any otherwise lawful
2 manner.

3 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in buildings in
4 State parks under the control of the Department of Natural
5 Resources, provided:

6 a. the State park has overnight lodging facilities with
7 some restaurant facilities or, not having overnight
8 lodging facilities, has restaurant facilities which serve
9 complete luncheon and dinner or supper meals,

10 b. consent to the issuance of a license to sell
11 alcoholic liquors in the buildings has been filed with the
12 commission by the Department of Natural Resources, and

13 c. the alcoholic liquors are sold by the State park
14 lodge or restaurant concessionaire only during the hours
15 from 11 o'clock a.m. until 12 o'clock midnight.
16 Notwithstanding any other provision of this Act, alcoholic
17 liquor sold by the State park or restaurant concessionaire
18 is not subject to the provisions of Articles IV and IX.

19 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in buildings on
20 properties under the control of the ~~Historic Sites and~~
21 ~~Preservation Division of the~~ Historic Preservation Agency or
22 the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum provided:

23 a. the property has overnight lodging facilities with
24 some restaurant facilities or, not having overnight
25 lodging facilities, has restaurant facilities which serve
26 complete luncheon and dinner or supper meals,

1 b. consent to the issuance of a license to sell
2 alcoholic liquors in the buildings has been filed with the
3 commission by the ~~Historic Sites and Preservation Division~~
4 ~~of the~~ Historic Preservation Agency or the Abraham Lincoln
5 Presidential Library and Museum, and

6 c. the alcoholic liquors are sold by the lodge or
7 restaurant concessionaire only during the hours from 11
8 o'clock a.m. until 12 o'clock midnight.

9 The sale of alcoholic liquors pursuant to this Section does
10 not authorize the establishment and operation of facilities
11 commonly called taverns, saloons, bars, cocktail lounges, and
12 the like except as a part of lodge and restaurant facilities in
13 State parks or golf courses owned by Forest Preserve Districts
14 with a population of less than 3,000,000 or municipalities or
15 park districts.

16 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in the Springfield
17 Administration Building of the Department of Transportation
18 and the Illinois State Armory in Springfield; provided, that
19 the controlling government authority may consent to such sales
20 only if

21 a. the request is from a not-for-profit organization;

22 b. such sales would not impede normal operations of the
23 departments involved;

24 c. the not-for-profit organization provides dram shop
25 liability in maximum insurance coverage limits and agrees
26 to defend, save harmless and indemnify the State of

1 Illinois from all financial loss, damage or harm;

2 d. no such sale shall be made during normal working
3 hours of the State of Illinois; and

4 e. the consent is in writing.

5 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in buildings in
6 recreational areas of river conservancy districts under the
7 control of, or leased from, the river conservancy districts.
8 Such sales are subject to reasonable local regulations as
9 provided in Article IV; however, no such regulations may
10 prohibit or substantially impair the sale of alcoholic liquors
11 on Sundays or Holidays.

12 Alcoholic liquors may be provided in long term care
13 facilities owned or operated by a county under Division 5-21 or
14 5-22 of the Counties Code, when approved by the facility
15 operator and not in conflict with the regulations of the
16 Illinois Department of Public Health, to residents of the
17 facility who have had their consumption of the alcoholic
18 liquors provided approved in writing by a physician licensed to
19 practice medicine in all its branches.

20 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and dispensed in
21 State housing assigned to employees of the Department of
22 Corrections. No person shall furnish or allow to be furnished
23 any alcoholic liquors to any prisoner confined in any jail,
24 reformatory, prison or house of correction except upon a
25 physician's prescription for medicinal purposes.

26 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail or dispensed at the

1 Willard Ice Building in Springfield, at the State Library in
2 Springfield, and at Illinois State Museum facilities by (1) an
3 agency of the State, whether legislative, judicial or
4 executive, provided that such agency first obtains written
5 permission to sell or dispense alcoholic liquors from the
6 controlling government authority, or by (2) a not-for-profit
7 organization, provided that such organization:

8 a. Obtains written consent from the controlling
9 government authority;

10 b. Sells or dispenses the alcoholic liquors in a manner
11 that does not impair normal operations of State offices
12 located in the building;

13 c. Sells or dispenses alcoholic liquors only in
14 connection with an official activity in the building;

15 d. Provides, or its catering service provides, dram
16 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in
17 which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless and
18 indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss,

21 Nothing in this Act shall prevent a not-for-profit

26 Building in Springfield shall be the Director of the Department

1 of Revenue. The controlling government authority for Illinois
2 State Museum facilities shall be the Director of the Illinois
3 State Museum. The controlling government authority for the
4 State Library in Springfield shall be the Secretary of State.

5 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail or
6 dispensed at any facility, property or building under the
7 jurisdiction of the ~~Historic Sites and Preservation Division of~~
8 ~~the~~ Historic Preservation Agency or the Abraham Lincoln
9 Presidential Library and Museum where the delivery, sale or
10 dispensing is by (1) an agency of the State, whether
11 legislative, judicial or executive, provided that such agency
12 first obtains written permission to sell or dispense alcoholic
13 liquors from a controlling government authority, or by (2) an
14 individual or organization provided that such individual or
15 organization:

16 a. Obtains written consent from the controlling
17 government authority;

18 b. Sells or dispenses the alcoholic liquors in a manner
19 that does not impair normal workings of State offices or
20 operations located at the facility, property or building;

21 c. Sells or dispenses alcoholic liquors only in
22 connection with an official activity of the individual or
23 organization in the facility, property or building;

24 d. Provides, or its catering service provides, dram
25 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in
26 which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless and

1 indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss,
2 damage or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of
3 alcoholic liquors.

4 The controlling government authority for the ~~Historic~~
5 ~~Sites and Preservation Division of the~~ Historic Preservation
6 Agency shall be the Director of the Historic ~~Sites and~~
7 Preservation Agency, and the controlling government authority
8 for the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum shall
9 be the Executive Director of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential
10 Library and Museum.

11 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail or
12 dispensed for consumption at the Michael Bilandic Building at
13 160 North LaSalle Street, Chicago IL 60601, after the normal
14 business hours of any day care or child care facility located
15 in the building, by (1) a commercial tenant or subtenant
16 conducting business on the premises under a lease made pursuant
17 to Section 405-315 of the Department of Central Management
18 Services Law (20 ILCS 405/405-315), provided that such tenant
19 or subtenant who accepts delivery of, sells, or dispenses
20 alcoholic liquors shall procure and maintain dram shop
21 liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in which the
22 carrier agrees to defend, indemnify, and save harmless the
23 State of Illinois from all financial loss, damage, or harm
24 arising out of the delivery, sale, or dispensing of alcoholic
25 liquors, or by (2) an agency of the State, whether legislative,
26 judicial, or executive, provided that such agency first obtains

1 written permission to accept delivery of and sell or dispense
2 alcoholic liquors from the Director of Central Management
3 Services, or by (3) a not-for-profit organization, provided
4 that such organization:

5 a. obtains written consent from the Department of
6 Central Management Services;

7 b. accepts delivery of and sells or dispenses the
8 alcoholic liquors in a manner that does not impair normal
9 operations of State offices located in the building;

10 c. accepts delivery of and sells or dispenses alcoholic
11 liquors only in connection with an official activity in the
12 building; and

13 d. provides, or its catering service provides, dram
14 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in
15 which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless, and
16 indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss,
17 damage, or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of
18 alcoholic liquors.

19 Nothing in this Act shall prevent a not-for-profit
20 organization or agency of the State from employing the services
21 of a catering establishment for the selling or dispensing of
22 alcoholic liquors at functions authorized by the Director of
23 Central Management Services.

24 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail or dispensed at the
25 James R. Thompson Center in Chicago, subject to the provisions
26 of Section 7.4 of the State Property Control Act, and 222 South

1 College Street in Springfield, Illinois by (1) a commercial
2 tenant or subtenant conducting business on the premises under a
3 lease or sublease made pursuant to Section 405-315 of the
4 Department of Central Management Services Law (20 ILCS
5 405/405-315), provided that such tenant or subtenant who sells
6 or dispenses alcoholic liquors shall procure and maintain dram
7 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in
8 which the carrier agrees to defend, indemnify and save harmless
9 the State of Illinois from all financial loss, damage or harm
10 arising out of the sale or dispensing of alcoholic liquors, or
11 by (2) an agency of the State, whether legislative, judicial or
12 executive, provided that such agency first obtains written
13 permission to sell or dispense alcoholic liquors from the
14 Director of Central Management Services, or by (3) a
15 not-for-profit organization, provided that such organization:

16 a. Obtains written consent from the Department of
17 Central Management Services;

18 b. Sells or dispenses the alcoholic liquors in a manner

13 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail or dispensed at the
14 Rockford State Office Building by (1) an agency of the State,
15 whether legislative, judicial or executive, provided that such
16 agency first obtains written permission to sell or dispense
17 alcoholic liquors from the Department of Central Management
18 Services, or by (2) a not-for-profit organization, provided
19 that such organization:

20 a. Obtains written consent from the Department of
21 Central Management Services;

22 b. Sells or dispenses the alcoholic liquors in a manner

17 municipality in which the building is located may not prohibit
18 that sale or delivery, notwithstanding any other provision of
19 this Section. The regulation of the sale and delivery of
20 alcoholic liquor in a building that is owned by McLean County,
21 situated on land owned by the county, and used by the McLean
22 County Historical Society as provided in this paragraph is an
23 exclusive power and function of the State and is a denial and
24 limitation under Article VII, Section 6, subsection (h) of the
25 Illinois Constitution of the power of a home rule municipality
26 to regulate that sale and delivery.

1 Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered in any building
2 situated on land held in trust for any school district
3 organized under Article 34 of the School Code, if the building
4 is not used for school purposes and if the sale or delivery is

7 persons and if the person or facility selling or dispensing the
8 alcoholic liquor has provided dram shop liability insurance in
9 maximum limits so as to hold harmless the Apple River Fire
10 Protection District, the Village of Apple River, and the Apple
11 River Community Association from all financial loss, damage,
12 and harm.

14 Restaurant, Kennedy King College Campus, located at 740 West

17 King College Campus, located at 740 West 63rd Street, Chicago,
18 owned by or under the control of City Colleges of Chicago,
19 Illinois Community College District No. 508.
