A BILL FOR

1 AN ACT concerning appropriations.

2 **Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented**
3 **in the General Assembly:**

4 ARTICLE 0.5

5 Section 1. It is the intent of the State that all or a
6 portion of the costs of projects funded by appropriations
7 made in this Act from the Capital Development Fund, the
8 School Construction Fund, the Anti-Pollution Fund, the
9 Transportation Bond Series A Fund, the Transportation Bond
10 Series B Fund, the Coal Development Fund, the Transportation
11 Bond Series D Fund, and the Build Illinois Bond Fund will be
12 paid or reimbursed from the proceeds of tax-exempt bonds
13 subsequently issued by the State.

14 ARTICLE 1

15 ARCHITECT OF THE CAPITOL

16 Section 5. The amount of \$3,883, or so much of thereof
17 as may be necessary and remains unexpended on June 30, 2014,
18 from a reappropriation heretofore made for such purpose in
19 Section 5 of Article 25 of Public Act 98-0050, is
20 reappropriated from the Capital Development Fund to the

1 Office of the Architect of the Capitol for plans,
2 specifications, and continuation of work pursuant to the
3 report and recommendations of the architectural, structural,
4 and mechanical surveys of the State Capitol Building. This
5 is for the continuation of the rehabilitation of the Capitol
6 Building.

7 Section 10. The sum of \$548,180, or so much thereof as
8 may be necessary and remains unexpended at the close of
9 business on June 30, 2014, from a reappropriation heretofore
10 made for such purposes in Section 10 of Article 25 of Public
11 Act 98-0050, is reappropriated from the Capital Development
12 Fund to the Office of the Architect of the Capitol for
13 remodeling, planning, relocation, permanent equipment, and
14 other related expenses, including architectural and
15 engineering fees associated with construction, for the
16 remodeling of office space and other support areas under the
17 jurisdiction of the House of Representatives and the Senate.

18 Section 15. The sum of \$34,528,423, or so much thereof
19 as may be necessary and remains unexpended at the close of
20 business on June 30, 2014, from a reappropriation heretofore
21 made for such purpose in Article 25, Section 15 of Public Act
22 98-0050, as amended, is reappropriated from the Capital
23 Development Fund to the Office of the Architect of the

1 Capitol for all costs associated with capital upgrades and
2 improvements.

3 Section 20. The following named amounts, or so much
4 thereof as may be necessary, and remain unexpended at the
5 close of business on June 30, 2014, from reappropriations
6 heretofore made for such purposes in Article 25, Section 20
7 of Public Act 98-0050, as amended, are reappropriated from
8 the Capital Development Fund to the Office of the Architect
9 of the Capitol for the projects hereinafter enumerated:

 5 obligation incurred for any expenditures from appropriations
 6 in this Article until after the purposes and amounts have
 7 been approved in writing by the Governor.

10 SECRETARY OF STATE

11 Section 5. The sum of \$46,385,136, or so much thereof as
 12 may be necessary and remains unexpended at the close of
 13 business on June 30, 2014, from a reappropriation heretofore
 14 made for such purpose in Article 26, Section 5 of Public Act
 15 98-0050, is reappropriated from the Build Illinois Bond Fund
 16 to the Secretary of State for capital grants to public
 17 libraries for permanent improvements.

18 Section 10. No contract shall be entered into or
 19 obligation incurred or any expenditures made from
 20 appropriations in this Article until after the purposes and

1 amounts have been approved in writing by the Governor.

3 ARTICLE 3

4 DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

5 Section 5. The following named amounts, or so much
6 thereof as may be necessary, are appropriated to the
7 Department of Agriculture for repairs, maintenance, and
8 capital improvements including construction, reconstruction,
9 improvement, repair and installation of capital facilities,
10 cost of planning, supplies, materials, equipment, services
11 and all other expenses required to complete the work:

12 Payable from Agricultural Premium Fund:

- 13 For various projects at the Illinois
- 14 State Fairgrounds1,800,000
- 15 For various projects at the DuQuoin
- 16 State Fairgrounds750,000

17 Section 10. The amount of \$2,612,500, or so much thereof
18 as may be necessary, is appropriated from the Partners for
19 Conservation Projects Fund to the Department of Agriculture
20 for the Conservation Practices Cost-Share program.

2 CENTRAL MANAGEMENT SERVICES

3 Section 5. The sum of \$3,483,998, or so much thereof as
4 may be necessary and remains unexpended at the close of
5 business on June 30, 2014, from a reappropriation heretofore
6 made for such purpose in Article 28, Section 5 of Public Act
7 98-0050, is reappropriated from the Capital Development Fund
8 to the Department of Central Management Services for
9 Information Technology infrastructure expenses including but
10 not limited to related hardware and equipment.

11 Section 10. The amount of \$5,348,472, or so much thereof
12 as may be necessary and remains unexpended at the close of
13 business on June 30, 2014, from a reappropriation heretofore
14 made for such purposes in Section 10 of Article 28 of Public
15 Act 98-0050, is reappropriated from the Capital Development
16 Fund to the Department of Central Management Services for
17 infrastructure improvement, hardware and related costs.

18 Section 15. The sum of \$8,350,114, or so much thereof as
19 may be necessary and remains unexpended at the close of

9 DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE AND ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY

10 Section 5. The sum of \$3,000,000, or so much thereof as
11 may be necessary and remains unexpended at the close of
12 business on June 30, 2014, from a reappropriation heretofore
13 made for such purposes in Section 5 of Article 29 of Public
14 Act 98-0050, as amended, is reappropriated from the Port
15 Development Revolving Loan Fund to the Department of Commerce
16 and Economic Opportunity for grants and loans associated with
17 the Port Development Revolving Loan Program pursuant to 30
18 ILCS 750/9-11.

19 Section 10. The sum of \$17,000,000, or so much thereof
20 as may be necessary and remains unexpended at the close of

1 business on June 30, 2014, from a reappropriation heretofore
2 made for such purposes in Section 10 of Article 29 of Public
3 Act 98-0050, as amended, is reappropriated from the Build
4 Illinois Bond Fund to the Department of Commerce and Economic
5 Opportunity for grants associated with the redevelopment of
6 Brownfield sites.

7 Section 15. The sum of \$44,000,000, or so much thereof
8 as may be necessary and remains unexpended at the close of
9 business on June 30, 2014, from a reappropriation heretofore

11 amended, is reappropriated from the Coal Development Fund to
12 the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity for
13 grants pursuant to 20 ILCS 605/605-332 - Coal Revival
14 Program.

15 Section 17. The sum of \$6,000,000, or so much thereof as
16 may be necessary and remains unexpended at the close of
17 business on June 30, 2014, from an appropriation heretofore
18 made in Article 29, Section 17 of Public Act 98-0050, as
19 amended, is reappropriated from the Coal Development Bond
20 Fund to the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity
21 for a grant to the owner of a generating facility located in
22 Washington County, Illinois, with accredited summer
23 capability of greater than 500 megawatts at such generating

1 facility for the purposes specified in the Illinois Coal and
2 Energy Development Bond Act and Section 8.1 of the Energy
3 Conservation and Coal Development Bond Act.

4 Section 20. The sum of \$1,975,000, or so much thereof as
5 may be necessary and remains unexpended at the close of
6 business on June 30, 2014, from a reappropriation heretofore
7 made in Article 29, Section 20 of Public Act 98-0050, as
8 amended, is reappropriated from the Build Illinois Bond Fund
9 to the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity for
10 grants associated with the Illinois Renewable Fuels
11 Development Act.

12 Section 30. The sum of \$1,484,678, or so much thereof as
13 may be necessary and remains unexpended at the close of
14 business on June 30, 2014, from a reappropriation heretofore
15 made in Article 29, Section 30 of Public Act 98-0050, as
16 amended, is reappropriated from the Coal Development Fund to
17 the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity for the
18 specific purposes of acquisition, development, construction,
19 reconstruction, improvement, financing, architectural and
20 technical planning and installation of capital facilities
21 consisting of buildings, structures, durable equipment, and
22 land for the purpose of capital development of coal resources
23 within the State.

1 Section 40. The sum of \$15,000,000, or so much thereof
2 as may be necessary and remains unexpended at the close of
3 business on June 30, 2014, from a reappropriation heretofore
4 made in Article 29, Section 40 of Public Act 98-0050, as
5 amended, is reappropriated from the Build Illinois Bond Fund
6 to the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity for a
7 grant for the Illinois Science and Technology Park.

8 Section 45. The sum of \$20,000,000, or so much thereof
9 as may be necessary and remains unexpended at the close of
10 business on June 30, 2014, from a reappropriation heretofore
11 made in Article 29, Section 45 of Public Act 98-0050, as
12 amended, is reappropriated from the Build Illinois Bond Fund
13 to the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity for
14 grants associated with the Illinois Renewable Fuels
15 Development Act.

16 Section 50. The sum of \$5,500,001, or so much thereof as
17 may be necessary and remains unexpended at the close of
18 business on June 30, 2014, from a reappropriation heretofore
19 made in Article 29, Section 50 of Public Act 98-0050, as
20 amended, is reappropriated from the Build Illinois Bond Fund
21 to the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity for
22 grants associated with the redevelopment of brownfield sites.

1 Section 55. The sum of \$16,166,902, or so much thereof
2 as may be necessary and remains unexpended at the close of
3 business on June 30, 2014, from a reappropriation heretofore
4 made for such purpose in Article 29, Section 55 of Public Act
5 98-0050, as amended, is reappropriated from the Coal
6 Development Fund to the Department of Commerce and Economic
7 Opportunity for the specific purpose of acquisition,
8 development, construction, reconstruction, improvement,
9 financing, architectural and technical planning and
10 installation of capital facilities consisting of buildings,
11 structures, durable equipment, and land for the purpose of
12 capital development of coal resources within the State,
13 including but not limited, to a grant for a commercial scale,
14 low emissions project that produces electric power,
15 synthesizes natural gas or chemicals and demonstrates
16 underground storage of at least 1 million metric tons
17 annually of carbon dioxide.

18 Section 60. The sum of \$3,980,704, or so much thereof as
19 may be necessary and remains unexpended at the close of
20 business on June 30, 2014, from a reappropriation heretofore
21 made in Article 29, Section 60 of Public Act 98-0050, as
22 amended, is reappropriated from the Build Illinois Bond Fund
23 to the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity for

1 grants and loans pursuant but not limited to Article 8,
2 Article 9, or Article 10 of the Build Illinois Act.

3 Section 65. The sum of \$3,130,040, or so much thereof as
4 may be necessary and remains unexpended at the close of
5 business on June 30, 2014, from a reappropriation heretofore
6 made for such purpose in Article 29, Section 65 of Public Act
7 98-0050, as amended, is reappropriated from the Build
8 Illinois Bond Fund to the Department of Commerce and Economic
9 Opportunity for grants and loans pursuant but not limited to
10 Article 8 or Article 10 of the Build Illinois Act.

11 Section 70. The sum of \$2,600,251, or so much thereof as
12 may be necessary and remains unexpended at the close of
13 business on June 30, 2014, from a reappropriation heretofore
14 made for such purpose in Article 29, Section 70 of Public Act
15 98-0050, as amended, is reappropriated from the Build
16 Illinois Bond Fund to the Department of Commerce and Economic
17 Opportunity for grants and loans pursuant but not limited to

11 reconstruction, equipment, utilities and vehicles, and all
12 costs associated with economic development programs,
13 community service programs, public health programs, public
14 safety programs, other programs and activities, and for
15 grants to other State agencies for any capital or operating
16 purposes.
