SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

105 ILCS 5/2-3.64a-5

Amends the School Code with respect to State goals and assessment. Provides that the provision requiring the State Board of Education to administer no more than 3 assessments, per student, of English language arts and mathematics for students in a secondary education program applies until the expiration of any contracts entered into before the effective date of the amendatory Act between the State Board and the company or companies that operate the PARCC (Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers) tests. Provides that after the expiration of any such contracts, the State Board shall enter into 2 separate contracts to administer 2 college and career ready determination examinations, including, but not limited to, one that is accepted by all of this State's public and private institutions of higher education, for the purpose of student application or admissions consideration. Specifies that each student must be offered the opportunity to choose between the 2 examinations. Sets forth provisions providing that the State Board is required to cover all expenses for each student to take one of the 2 examinations for the purpose of college application or admissions consideration. Provides that no State assessments other than these 2 examinations may be administered to students in a secondary education program after the expiration of any contracts entered into before the effective date of the amendatory Act between the State Board and the company or companies that operate the PARCC tests. Effective July 1, 2016.

A BILL FOR

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AN ACT concerning education.

2 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, 3 represented in the General Assembly:

- 4 Section 1. Legislative intent. It is the intent of the 5 General Assembly to set forth in law that:
- 6 (1) students ought to spend the maximum amount of time 7 learning;
- 8 (2) time spent getting tested or preparing for tests 9 threatens the ability of a school to perform as a place of 10 learning; and
- (3) existing non-PARCC (Partnership for Assessment of 11 Readiness for College and Careers) standardized tests 12 administered in high schools, including without limitation 13 14 standardized tests used to test potential college 15 applicants, provide adequate information to policymakers of the educational efficacy of each individual high school 16 17 and school district and make additional testing redundant 18 and unnecessary.
- Section 5. The School Code is amended by changing Section 20 2-3.64a-5 as follows:

22 Sec. 2-3.64a-5. State goals and assessment.

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(a) For the assessment and accountability purposes of this 1 2 Section, "students" includes those students enrolled in a 3 public or State-operated elementary school, secondary school, or cooperative or joint agreement with a governing body or 4 5 board of control, a charter school operating in compliance with the Charter Schools Law, a school operated by a regional office 6 of education under Section 13A-3 of this Code, or a public 7 8 school administered by a local public agency or the Department 9 of Human Services.

The State Board of Education shall establish the 10 (b) 11 academic standards that are to be applicable to students who 12 are subject to State assessments under this Section. The State Board of Education shall not establish any such standards in 13 final form without first providing opportunities for public 14 15 participation and local input in the development of the final 16 academic standards. Those opportunities shall include a 17 well-publicized period of public comment and opportunities to file written comments. 18

19 (c) Beginning no later than the 2014-2015 school year, the 20 State Board of Education shall annually assess all students 21 enrolled in grades 3 through 8 in English language arts and 22 mathematics.

Beginning no later than the 2017-2018 school year, the State Board of Education shall annually assess all students in science at one grade in grades 3 through 5, at one grade in grades 6 through 8, and at one grade in grades 9 through 12.

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The State Board of Education shall annually assess schools 1 2 that operate a secondary education program, as defined in Section 22-22 of this Code, in English language arts and 3 4 mathematics. The State Board of Education shall administer no 5 more than 3 assessments, per student, of English language arts and mathematics for students in a secondary education program 6 until the expiration of any contracts entered into before the 7 effective date of this amendatory Act of the 99th General 8 9 Assembly between the State Board of Education and the company or companies that operate the PARCC (Partnership for Assessment 10 11 of Readiness for College and Careers) tests, with one. One of 12 these assessments including shall include a college and career ready determination that shall be accepted by this State's 13 public institutions of higher education, as defined in the 14 Board of Higher Education Act, for the purpose of student 15 16 application or admissions consideration. After the expiration 17 of any contracts entered into before the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 99th General Assembly between the State 18 19 Board of Education and the company or companies that operate 20 the PARCC tests, the State Board of Education shall enter into 2 separate contracts to administer 2 college and career ready 21 22 determination examinations, including, but not limited to, one 23 that is accepted by all of this State's public institutions of 24 higher education, as defined under the Board of Higher 25 Education Act, as well as all of this State's post-secondary educational institutions, as defined under the Private College 26

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1	Act, for the purpose of student application or admissions
2	consideration. Each student must be offered the opportunity to
3	choose between the 2 examinations. Subject to appropriation,
4	the State Board of Education is required to cover all expenses
5	for each student to take one of the 2 examinations for the
6	purpose of college application or admissions consideration. If
7	the student chooses to take both examinations, the student or
8	his or her parent or guardian is required to cover expenses for
9	the other examination. No State assessments other than these 2
10	examinations may be administered to students in a secondary
11	education program after the expiration of any contracts entered
12	into before the effective date of this amendatory Act of the
13	99th General Assembly between the State Board of Education and
14	the company or companies that operate the PARCC tests.

15 Students who are not assessed for college and career ready 16 determinations may not receive a regular high school diploma 17 unless the student is exempted from taking State assessments 18 under subsection (d) of this Section because (i) the student's individualized educational program developed under Article 14 19 20 of this Code identifies the State assessment as inappropriate for the student, (ii) the student is enrolled in a program of 21 22 adult and continuing education, as defined in the Adult 23 Education Act, (iii) the school district is not required to assess the individual student for purposes of accountability 24 25 under federal No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 requirements, 26 (iv) the student has been determined to be an English learner

and has been enrolled in schools in the United States for less than 12 months, or (v) the student is otherwise identified by the State Board of Education, through rules, as being exempt from the assessment.

5 The State Board of Education shall not assess students 6 under this Section in subjects not required by this Section.

7 Districts shall inform their students of the timelines and 8 procedures applicable to their participation in every yearly 9 administration of the State assessments. The State Board of 10 Education shall establish periods of time in each school year 11 during which State assessments shall occur to meet the 12 objectives of this Section.

13 (d) Every individualized educational program as described 14 in Article 14 shall identify if the State assessment or 15 components thereof are appropriate for the student. The State 16 Board of Education shall develop rules governing the 17 administration of an alternate assessment that may be available to students for whom participation in this State's regular 18 19 assessments is not appropriate, even with accommodations as 20 allowed under this Section.

Students receiving special education services whose individualized educational programs identify them as eligible for the alternative State assessments nevertheless shall have the option of taking this State's regular assessment that includes a college and career ready determination, which shall be administered in accordance with the eligible accommodations

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appropriate for meeting these students' respective needs.

2 All students determined to be English learners shall 3 participate in the State assessments, excepting those students who have been enrolled in schools in the United States for less 4 5 than 12 months. Such students mav be exempted from 6 participation in one annual administration of the English 7 language arts assessment. Any student determined to be an 8 learner shall receive appropriate English assessment 9 accommodations, including language supports, which shall be 10 established by rule. Approved assessment accommodations must 11 be provided until the student's English language skills develop 12 to the extent that the student is no longer considered to be an 13 English learner, as demonstrated through a State-identified 14 English language proficiency assessment.

15 (e) The results or scores of each assessment taken under 16 this Section shall be made available to the parents of each 17 student.

In each school year, the scores attained by a student on 18 the State assessment that includes a college and career ready 19 20 determination must be placed in the student's permanent record and must be entered on the student's transcript pursuant to 21 22 rules that the State Board of Education shall adopt for that 23 purpose in accordance with Section 3 of the Illinois School 24 Student Records Act. In each school year, the scores attained 25 by a student on the State assessments administered in grades 3 26 through 8 must be placed in the student's temporary record.

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1 (f) All schools shall administer an academic assessment of 2 English language proficiency in oral language (listening and 3 speaking) and reading and writing skills to all children 4 determined to be English learners.

5 (q) All schools in this State that are part of the sample drawn by the National Center for Education Statistics, in 6 7 collaboration with their school districts and the State Board 8 Education, shall administer the biennial of academic 9 assessments under the National Assessment of Educational 10 Progress carried out under Section 411(b)(2) of the federal 11 National Education Statistics Act of 1994 (20 U.S.C. 9010) if 12 the U.S. Secretary of Education pays the costs of administering 13 the assessments.

(h) Subject to available funds to this State for the purpose of student assessment, the State Board of Education shall provide additional assessments and assessment resources that may be used by school districts for local assessment purposes. The State Board of Education shall annually distribute a listing of these additional resources.

20 (i) For the purposes of this subsection (i), "academically 21 based assessments" means assessments consisting of questions 22 and answers that are measurable and quantifiable to measure the 23 knowledge, skills, and ability of students in the subject 24 matters covered by the assessments. All assessments 25 administered pursuant to this Section must be academically 26 based assessments. The scoring of academically based

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1 assessments shall be reliable, valid, and fair and shall meet 2 the guidelines for assessment development and use prescribed by 3 the American Psychological Association, the National Council 4 on Measurement in Education, and the American Educational 5 Research Association.

6 The State Board of Education shall review the use of all 7 assessment item types in order to ensure that they are valid 8 and reliable indicators of student performance aligned to the 9 learning standards being assessed and that the development, 10 administration, and scoring of these item types are justifiable 11 in terms of cost.

12 (j) The State Superintendent of Education shall appoint a 13 committee of no more than 21 members, consisting of parents, 14 teachers, school administrators, school board members, 15 assessment experts, regional superintendents of schools, and 16 citizens, to review the State assessments administered by the 17 State Board of Education. The Committee shall select one of its members as its chairperson. The Committee shall meet on an 18 19 ongoing basis to review the content and design of the 20 assessments (including whether the requirements of subsection (i) of this Section have been met), the time and money expended 21 22 at the local and State levels to prepare for and administer the 23 assessments, the collective results of the assessments as 24 measured against the stated purpose of assessing student 25 performance, and other issues involving the assessments 26 identified by the Committee. The Committee shall make periodic
