The Board of 17 of Western Illinois University shall Trustees not University's admissions process 18 discriminate in the 19 against an applicant for admission because of the 20 applicant's enrollment in a charter school established under Article 27A of the School Code. Western Illinois 21 22 University may also admit (i) applicants who did not have 23 an opportunity to complete the minimum college preparatory 24 curriculum in high school, and (ii) educationally 25 disadvantaged applicants who are admitted to the formal 26 organized special assistance programs that are tailored to

the needs of such students, providing that in either case,
 the institution incorporates in the applicant's
 baccalaureate curriculum courses or other academic
 activities that compensate for course deficiencies; and

5 (3) except that up to 3 of 15 units of coursework 6 required by paragraph (1) of this subsection may be 7 distributed by deducting no more than one unit each from 8 the categories of social studies, mathematics, sciences 9 and electives and completing those 3 units in any of the 5 10 categories of coursework described in paragraph (1).

(b) When allocating funds, local boards of education shall recognize their obligation to their students to offer the coursework required by subsection (a).

14 (c) A student who has graduated from high school and has 15 scored within the University's accepted range on the ACT or SAT 16 shall not be required to take a high school equivalency test as 17 a prerequisite to admission.

(d) The Board shall establish an admissions process in 18 19 which honorably discharged veterans are permitted to submit an 20 application for admission to the University as a freshman 21 student enrolling in the spring semester if the veteran was on 22 active duty during the fall semester. The University may 23 request that the Department of Veterans' Affairs confirm the 24 status of an applicant as an honorably discharged veteran who 25 was on active duty during the fall semester.
