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1 AMENDMENT TO HOUSE BILL 4820

2 AMENDMENT NO. _____. Amend House Bill 4820, AS AMENDED, by
3 replacing everything after the enacting clause with the
4 following:

5 "Section 5. The Liquor Control Act of 1934 is amended by
6 changing Section 6-15 as follows:

7 (235 ILCS 5/6-15) (from Ch. 43, par. 130)

8 Sec. 6-15. No alcoholic liquors shall be sold or delivered
9 in any building belonging to or under the control of the State
10 or any political subdivision thereof except as provided in this
11 Act. The corporate authorities of any city, village,
12 incorporated town, township, or county may provide by
13 ordinance, however, that alcoholic liquor may be sold or
14 delivered in any specifically designated building belonging to
15 or under the control of the municipality, township, or county,
16 or in any building located on land under the control of the

1 municipality, township, or county; provided that such township
2 or county complies with all applicable local ordinances in any
3 incorporated area of the township or county. Alcoholic liquor
4 may be delivered to and sold under the authority of a special
5 use permit on any property owned by a conservation district
6 organized under the Conservation District Act, provided that
7 (i) the alcoholic liquor is sold only at an event authorized by
8 the governing board of the conservation district, (ii) the
9 issuance of the special use permit is authorized by the local
10 liquor control commissioner of the territory in which the
11 property is located, and (iii) the special use permit
12 authorizes the sale of alcoholic liquor for one day or less.
13 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at any airport
14 belonging to or under the control of a municipality of more
15 than 25,000 inhabitants, or in any building or on any golf
16 course owned by a park district organized under the Park
17 District Code, subject to the approval of the governing board
18 of the district, or in any building or on any golf course owned
19 by a forest preserve district organized under the Downstate
20 Forest Preserve District Act, subject to the approval of the
21 governing board of the district, or on the grounds within 500
22 feet of any building owned by a forest preserve district
23 organized under the Downstate Forest Preserve District Act
24 during times when food is dispensed for consumption within 500
25 feet of the building from which the food is dispensed, subject
26 to the approval of the governing board of the district, or in a

1 building owned by a Local Mass Transit District organized under
2 the Local Mass Transit District Act, subject to the approval of
3 the governing Board of the District, or in Bicentennial Park,
4 or on the premises of the City of Mendota Lake Park located
5 adjacent to Route 51 in Mendota, Illinois, or on the premises
6 of Camden Park in Milan, Illinois, or in the community center
7 owned by the City of Loves Park that is located at 1000 River
8 Park Drive in Loves Park, Illinois, or, in connection with the
9 operation of an established food serving facility during times
10 when food is dispensed for consumption on the premises, and at
11 the following aquarium and museums located in public parks: Art
12 Institute of Chicago, Chicago Academy of Sciences, Chicago
13 Historical Society, Field Museum of Natural History, Museum of
14 Science and Industry, DuSable Museum of African American
15 History, John G. Shedd Aquarium and Adler Planetarium, or at
16 Lakeview Museum of Arts and Sciences in Peoria, or in
17 connection with the operation of the facilities of the Chicago
18 Zoological Society or the Chicago Horticultural Society on land
19 owned by the Forest Preserve District of Cook County, or on any
20 land used for a golf course or for recreational purposes owned
21 by the Forest Preserve District of Cook County, subject to the
22 control of the Forest Preserve District Board of Commissioners
23 and applicable local law, provided that dram shop liability
24 insurance is provided at maximum coverage limits so as to hold
25 the District harmless from all financial loss, damage, and
26 harm, or in any building located on land owned by the Chicago

1 Park District if approved by the Park District Commissioners,
2 or on any land used for a golf course or for recreational
3 purposes and owned by the Illinois International Port District
4 if approved by the District's governing board, or at any
5 airport, golf course, faculty center, or facility in which
6 conference and convention type activities take place belonging
7 to or under control of any State university or public community
8 college district, provided that with respect to a facility for
9 conference and convention type activities alcoholic liquors
10 shall be limited to the use of the convention or conference
11 participants or participants in cultural, political or
12 educational activities held in such facilities, and provided
13 further that the faculty or staff of the State university or a
14 public community college district, or members of an
15 organization of students, alumni, faculty or staff of the State
16 university or a public community college district are active
17 participants in the conference or convention, or in Memorial
18 Stadium on the campus of the University of Illinois at
19 Urbana-Champaign during games in which the Chicago Bears
20 professional football team is playing in that stadium during
21 the renovation of Soldier Field, not more than one and a half
22 hours before the start of the game and not after the end of the
23 third quarter of the game, or in the Pavilion Facility on the
24 campus of the University of Illinois at Chicago during games in
25 which the Chicago Storm professional soccer team is playing in
26 that facility, not more than one and a half hours before the

1 start of the game and not after the end of the third quarter of
2 the game, or in the Pavilion Facility on the campus of the
3 University of Illinois at Chicago during games in which the
4 WNBA professional women's basketball team is playing in that
5 facility, not more than one and a half hours before the start
6 of the game and not after the 10-minute mark of the second half
7 of the game, or by a catering establishment which has rented
8 facilities from a board of trustees of a public community
9 college district, or in a restaurant that is operated by a
10 commercial tenant in the North Campus Parking Deck building
11 that (1) is located at 1201 West University Avenue, Urbana,
12 Illinois and (2) is owned by the Board of Trustees of the
13 University of Illinois, or, if approved by the District board,
14 on land owned by the Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater
15 Chicago and leased to others for a term of at least 20 years.
16 Nothing in this Section precludes the sale or delivery of
17 alcoholic liquor in the form of original packaged goods in
18 premises located at 500 S. Racine in Chicago belonging to the
19 University of Illinois and used primarily as a grocery store by
20 a commercial tenant during the term of a lease that predates
21 the University's acquisition of the premises; but the
22 University shall have no power or authority to renew, transfer,
23 or extend the lease with terms allowing the sale of alcoholic
24 liquor; and the sale of alcoholic liquor shall be subject to
25 all local laws and regulations. After the acquisition by
26 Winnebago County of the property located at 404 Elm Street in

1 Rockford, a commercial tenant who sold alcoholic liquor at
2 retail on a portion of the property under a valid license at
3 the time of the acquisition may continue to do so for so long
4 as the tenant and the County may agree under existing or future
5 leases, subject to all local laws and regulations regarding the
6 sale of alcoholic liquor. Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to
7 and sold at Memorial Hall, located at 211 North Main Street,
8 Rockford, under conditions approved by Winnebago County and
9 subject to all local laws and regulations regarding the sale of
10 alcoholic liquor. Each facility shall provide dram shop
11 liability in maximum insurance coverage limits so as to save
12 harmless the State, municipality, State university, airport,
13 golf course, faculty center, facility in which conference and
14 convention type activities take place, park district, Forest
15 Preserve District, public community college district,
16 aquarium, museum, or sanitary district from all financial loss,
17 damage or harm. Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in
18 buildings of golf courses owned by municipalities or Illinois
19 State University in connection with the operation of an
20 established food serving facility during times when food is
21 dispensed for consumption upon the premises. Alcoholic liquors
22 may be delivered to and sold at retail in any building owned by
23 a fire protection district organized under the Fire Protection
24 District Act, provided that such delivery and sale is approved
25 by the board of trustees of the district, and provided further
26 that such delivery and sale is limited to fundraising events

1 and to a maximum of 6 events per year. However, the limitation
2 to fundraising events and to a maximum of 6 events per year
3 does not apply to the delivery, sale, or manufacture of
4 alcoholic liquors at the building located at 59 Main Street in
5 Oswego, Illinois, owned by the Oswego Fire Protection District
6 if the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed as approved by the
7 Oswego Fire Protection District and the property is no longer
8 being utilized for fire protection purposes.

9 Alcoholic liquors may be served or sold in buildings under
10 the control of the Board of Trustees of the University of
11 Illinois for events that the Board may determine are public
12 events and not related student activities. The Board of
13 Trustees shall issue a written policy within 6 months of the
14 effective date of this amendatory Act of the 95th General
15 Assembly concerning the types of events that would be eligible
16 for an exemption. Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue
17 revised, updated, new, or amended policies as it deems
18 necessary and appropriate. In preparing its written policy, the
19 Board of Trustees shall, among other factors it considers
20 relevant and important, give consideration to the following:
21 (i) whether the event is a student activity or student related
22 activity; (ii) whether the physical setting of the event is
23 conducive to control of liquor sales and distribution; (iii)
24 the ability of the event operator to ensure that the sale or
25 serving of alcoholic liquors and the demeanor of the
26 participants are in accordance with State law and University

1 policies; (iv) regarding the anticipated attendees at the
2 event, the relative proportion of individuals under the age of
3 21 to individuals age 21 or older; (v) the ability of the venue
4 operator to prevent the sale or distribution of alcoholic
5 liquors to individuals under the age of 21; (vi) whether the
6 event prohibits participants from removing alcoholic beverages
7 from the venue; and (vii) whether the event prohibits
8 participants from providing their own alcoholic liquors to the
9 venue. In addition, any policy submitted by the Board of
10 Trustees to the Illinois Liquor Control Commission must require
11 that any event at which alcoholic liquors are served or sold in
12 buildings under the control of the Board of Trustees shall
13 require the prior written approval of the Office of the
14 Chancellor for the University campus where the event is
15 located. The Board of Trustees shall submit its policy, and any
16 subsequently revised, updated, new, or amended policies, to the
17 Illinois Liquor Control Commission, and any University event,
18 or location for an event, exempted under such policies shall
19 apply for a license under the applicable Sections of this Act.

20 Alcoholic liquors may be served or sold in buildings under
21 the control of the Board of Trustees of Northern Illinois
22 University for events that the Board may determine are public
23 events and not student-related activities. The Board of
24 Trustees shall issue a written policy within 6 months after
25 June 28, 2011 (the effective date of Public Act 97-45)
26 concerning the types of events that would be eligible for an

1 exemption. Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue revised,
2 updated, new, or amended policies as it deems necessary and
3 appropriate. In preparing its written policy, the Board of
4 Trustees shall, in addition to other factors it considers
5 relevant and important, give consideration to the following:

6 (i) whether the event is a student activity or student-related
7 activity; (ii) whether the physical setting of the event is
8 conducive to control of liquor sales and distribution; (iii)
9 the ability of the event operator to ensure that the sale or
10 serving of alcoholic liquors and the demeanor of the
11 participants are in accordance with State law and University
12 policies; (iv) the anticipated attendees at the event and the
13 relative proportion of individuals under the age of 21 to
14 individuals age 21 or older; (v) the ability of the venue
15 operator to prevent the sale or distribution of alcoholic
16 liquors to individuals under the age of 21; (vi) whether the
17 event prohibits participants from removing alcoholic beverages
18 from the venue; and (vii) whether the event prohibits
19 participants from providing their own alcoholic liquors to the
20 venue.

21 Alcoholic liquors may be served or sold in buildings under
22 the control of the Board of Trustees of Chicago State
23 University for events that the Board may determine are public
24 events and not student-related activities. The Board of
25 Trustees shall issue a written policy within 6 months after
26 August 2, 2013 (the effective date of Public Act 98-132)

1 concerning the types of events that would be eligible for an
2 exemption. Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue revised,
3 updated, new, or amended policies as it deems necessary and
4 appropriate. In preparing its written policy, the Board of
5 Trustees shall, in addition to other factors it considers
6 relevant and important, give consideration to the following:
7 (i) whether the event is a student activity or student-related
8 activity; (ii) whether the physical setting of the event is
9 conducive to control of liquor sales and distribution; (iii)
10 the ability of the event operator to ensure that the sale or
11 serving of alcoholic liquors and the demeanor of the
12 participants are in accordance with State law and University
13 policies; (iv) the anticipated attendees at the event and the
14 relative proportion of individuals under the age of 21 to
15 individuals age 21 or older; (v) the ability of the venue
16 operator to prevent the sale or distribution of alcoholic
17 liquors to individuals under the age of 21; (vi) whether the
18 event prohibits participants from removing alcoholic beverages
19 from the venue; and (vii) whether the event prohibits
20 participants from providing their own alcoholic liquors to the
21 venue.

22 Alcoholic liquors may be served or sold in buildings under
23 the control of the Board of Trustees of Illinois State
24 University for events that the Board may determine are public
25 events and not student-related activities. The Board of
26 Trustees shall issue a written policy within 6 months after the

1 effective date of this amendatory Act of the 97th General
2 Assembly concerning the types of events that would be eligible
3 for an exemption. Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue
4 revised, updated, new, or amended policies as it deems
5 necessary and appropriate. In preparing its written policy, the
6 Board of Trustees shall, in addition to other factors it
7 considers relevant and important, give consideration to the
8 following: (i) whether the event is a student activity or
9 student-related activity; (ii) whether the physical setting of
10 the event is conducive to control of liquor sales and
11 distribution; (iii) the ability of the event operator to ensure
12 that the sale or serving of alcoholic liquors and the demeanor
13 of the participants are in accordance with State law and
14 University policies; (iv) the anticipated attendees at the
15 event and the relative proportion of individuals under the age
16 of 21 to individuals age 21 or older; (v) the ability of the
17 venue operator to prevent the sale or distribution of alcoholic
18 liquors to individuals under the age of 21; (vi) whether the
19 event prohibits participants from removing alcoholic beverages
20 from the venue; and (vii) whether the event prohibits
21 participants from providing their own alcoholic liquors to the
22 venue.

23 Alcoholic liquors may be served or sold in buildings under
24 the control of the Board of Trustees of a public university for
25 events that the Board of Trustees of that public university may
26 determine are public events and not student-related

1 activities. If the Board of Trustees of a public university has
2 not issued a written policy pursuant to an exemption under this
3 Section on or before the effective date of this amendatory Act
4 of the 99th General Assembly, then that Board of Trustees shall
5 issue a written policy within 6 months after the effective date
6 of this amendatory Act of the 99th General Assembly concerning
7 the types of events that would be eligible for an exemption.
8 Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue revised, updated,
9 new, or amended policies as it deems necessary and appropriate.
10 In preparing its written policy, the Board of Trustees shall,
11 in addition to other factors it considers relevant and
12 important, give consideration to the following: (i) whether the
13 event is a student activity or student-related activity; (ii)
14 whether the physical setting of the event is conducive to
15 control of liquor sales and distribution; (iii) the ability of
16 the event operator to ensure that the sale or serving of
17 alcoholic liquors and the demeanor of the participants are in
18 accordance with State law and University policies; (iv) the
19 anticipated attendees at the event and the relative proportion
20 of individuals under the age of 21 to individuals age 21 or
21 older; (v) the ability of the venue operator to prevent the
22 sale or distribution of alcoholic liquors to individuals under
23 the age of 21; (vi) whether the event prohibits participants
24 from removing alcoholic beverages from the venue; and (vii)
25 whether the event prohibits participants from providing their
26 own alcoholic liquors to the venue. As used in this paragraph,

1 "public university" means the University of Illinois, Illinois
2 State University, Chicago State University, Governors State
3 University, Southern Illinois University, Northern Illinois
4 University, Eastern Illinois University, Western Illinois
5 University, and Northeastern Illinois University.

6 Alcoholic liquors may be served or sold in buildings under
7 the control of the Board of Trustees of a community college
8 district for events that the Board of Trustees of that
9 community college district may determine are public events and
10 not student-related activities. The Board of Trustees shall
11 issue a written policy within 6 months after the effective date
12 of this amendatory Act of the 99th General Assembly concerning
13 the types of events that would be eligible for an exemption.
14 Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue revised, updated,
15 new, or amended policies as it deems necessary and appropriate.
16 In preparing its written policy, the Board of Trustees shall,
17 in addition to other factors it considers relevant and
18 important, give consideration to the following: (i) whether the
19 event is a student activity or student-related activity; (ii)
20 whether the physical setting of the event is conducive to
21 control of liquor sales and distribution; (iii) the ability of
22 the event operator to ensure that the sale or serving of
23 alcoholic liquors and the demeanor of the participants are in
24 accordance with State law and community college district
25 policies; (iv) the anticipated attendees at the event and the
26 relative proportion of individuals under the age of 21 to

1 individuals age 21 or older; (v) the ability of the venue
2 operator to prevent the sale or distribution of alcoholic
3 liquors to individuals under the age of 21; (vi) whether the
4 event prohibits participants from removing alcoholic beverages
5 from the venue; and (vii) whether the event prohibits
6 participants from providing their own alcoholic liquors to the
7 venue. This paragraph does not apply to any community college
8 district authorized to sell or serve alcoholic liquor under any
9 other provision of this Section.

10 Alcoholic liquor may be delivered to and sold at retail in
11 the Dorchester Senior Business Center owned by the Village of
12 Dolton if the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in
13 connection with organized functions for which the planned
14 attendance is 20 or more persons, and if the person or facility
15 selling or dispensing the alcoholic liquor has provided dram
16 shop liability insurance in maximum limits so as to hold
17 harmless the Village of Dolton and the State from all financial
18 loss, damage and harm.

19 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail in
20 any building used as an Illinois State Armory provided:

21 (i) the Adjutant General's written consent to the
22 issuance of a license to sell alcoholic liquor in such
23 building is filed with the Commission;

24 (ii) the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in
25 connection with organized functions held on special
26 occasions;

1 (iii) the organized function is one for which the
2 planned attendance is 25 or more persons; and

3 (iv) the facility selling or dispensing the alcoholic
4 liquors has provided dram shop liability insurance in
5 maximum limits so as to save harmless the facility and the
6 State from all financial loss, damage or harm.

7 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail in
8 the Chicago Civic Center, provided that:

9 (i) the written consent of the Public Building
10 Commission which administers the Chicago Civic Center is
11 filed with the Commission;

12 (ii) the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in
13 connection with organized functions held on special
14 occasions;

15 (iii) the organized function is one for which the
16 planned attendance is 25 or more persons;

17 (iv) the facility selling or dispensing the alcoholic
18 liquors has provided dram shop liability insurance in
19 maximum limits so as to hold harmless the Civic Center, the
20 City of Chicago and the State from all financial loss,
21 damage or harm; and

22 (v) all applicable local ordinances are complied with.

23 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered or sold in any building
24 belonging to or under the control of any city, village or
25 incorporated town where more than 75% of the physical
26 properties of the building is used for commercial or

1 recreational purposes, and the building is located upon a pier
2 extending into or over the waters of a navigable lake or stream
3 or on the shore of a navigable lake or stream. In accordance
4 with a license issued under this Act, alcoholic liquor may be
5 sold, served, or delivered in buildings and facilities under
6 the control of the Department of Natural Resources during
7 events or activities lasting no more than 7 continuous days
8 upon the written approval of the Director of Natural Resources
9 acting as the controlling government authority. The Director of
10 Natural Resources may specify conditions on that approval,
11 including but not limited to requirements for insurance and
12 hours of operation. Notwithstanding any other provision of this
13 Act, alcoholic liquor sold by a United States Army Corps of
14 Engineers or Department of Natural Resources concessionaire
15 who was operating on June 1, 1991 for on-premises consumption
16 only is not subject to the provisions of Articles IV and IX.
17 Beer and wine may be sold on the premises of the Joliet Park
18 District Stadium owned by the Joliet Park District when written
19 consent to the issuance of a license to sell beer and wine in
20 such premises is filed with the local liquor commissioner by
21 the Joliet Park District. Beer and wine may be sold in
22 buildings on the grounds of State veterans' homes when written
23 consent to the issuance of a license to sell beer and wine in
24 such buildings is filed with the Commission by the Department
25 of Veterans' Affairs, and the facility shall provide dram shop
26 liability in maximum insurance coverage limits so as to save

1 the facility harmless from all financial loss, damage or harm.
2 Such liquors may be delivered to and sold at any property owned
3 or held under lease by a Metropolitan Pier and Exposition
4 Authority or Metropolitan Exposition and Auditorium Authority.

5 Beer and wine may be sold and dispensed at professional
6 sporting events and at professional concerts and other
7 entertainment events conducted on premises owned by the Forest
8 Preserve District of Kane County, subject to the control of the
9 District Commissioners and applicable local law, provided that
10 dram shop liability insurance is provided at maximum coverage
11 limits so as to hold the District harmless from all financial
12 loss, damage and harm.

13 Nothing in this Section shall preclude the sale or delivery
14 of beer and wine at a State or county fair or the sale or
15 delivery of beer or wine at a city fair in any otherwise lawful
16 manner.

17 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in buildings in
18 State parks under the control of the Department of Natural
19 Resources, provided:

20 a. the State park has overnight lodging facilities with
21 some restaurant facilities or, not having overnight
22 lodging facilities, has restaurant facilities which serve
23 complete luncheon and dinner or supper meals,

24 b. (blank), and

25 c. the alcoholic liquors are sold by the State park
26 lodge or restaurant concessionaire only during the hours

1 from 11 o'clock a.m. until 12 o'clock midnight.

2 Notwithstanding any other provision of this Act, alcoholic
3 liquor sold by the State park or restaurant concessionaire
4 is not subject to the provisions of Articles IV and IX.

5 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in buildings on
6 properties under the control of the Historic Sites and
7 Preservation Division of the Historic Preservation Agency or
8 the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum provided:

9 a. the property has overnight lodging facilities with
10 some restaurant facilities or, not having overnight
11 lodging facilities, has restaurant facilities which serve
12 complete luncheon and dinner or supper meals,

13 b. consent to the issuance of a license to sell
14 alcoholic liquors in the buildings has been filed with the
15 commission by the Historic Sites and Preservation Division
16 of the Historic Preservation Agency or the Abraham Lincoln
17 Presidential Library and Museum, and

18 c. the alcoholic liquors are sold by the lodge or
19 restaurant concessionaire only during the hours from 11
20 o'clock a.m. until 12 o'clock midnight.

21 The sale of alcoholic liquors pursuant to this Section does
22 not authorize the establishment and operation of facilities
23 commonly called taverns, saloons, bars, cocktail lounges, and
24 the like except as a part of lodge and restaurant facilities in
25 State parks or golf courses owned by Forest Preserve Districts
26 with a population of less than 3,000,000 or municipalities or

1 park districts.

2 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in the Springfield
3 Administration Building of the Department of Transportation
4 and the Illinois State Armory in Springfield; provided, that
5 the controlling government authority may consent to such sales
6 only if

7 a. the request is from a not-for-profit organization;

8 b. such sales would not impede normal operations of the
9 departments involved;

10 c. the not-for-profit organization provides dram shop
11 liability in maximum insurance coverage limits and agrees
12 to defend, save harmless and indemnify the State of
13 Illinois from all financial loss, damage or harm;

14 d. no such sale shall be made during normal working
15 hours of the State of Illinois; and

16 e. the consent is in writing.

17 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in buildings in
18 recreational areas of river conservancy districts under the
19 control of, or leased from, the river conservancy districts.
20 Such sales are subject to reasonable local regulations as
21 provided in Article IV; however, no such regulations may
22 prohibit or substantially impair the sale of alcoholic liquors
23 on Sundays or Holidays.

24 Alcoholic liquors may be provided in long term care
25 facilities owned or operated by a county under Division 5-21 or
26 5-22 of the Counties Code, when approved by the facility

1 operator and not in conflict with the regulations of the
2 Illinois Department of Public Health, to residents of the
3 facility who have had their consumption of the alcoholic
4 liquors provided approved in writing by a physician licensed to
5 practice medicine in all its branches.

6 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and dispensed in
7 State housing assigned to employees of the Department of
8 Corrections. No person shall furnish or allow to be furnished
9 any alcoholic liquors to any prisoner confined in any jail,
10 reformatory, prison or house of correction except upon a
11 physician's prescription for medicinal purposes.

12 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail or dispensed at the
13 Willard Ice Building in Springfield, at the State Library in
14 Springfield, and at Illinois State Museum facilities by (1) an
15 agency of the State, whether legislative, judicial or
16 executive, provided that such agency first obtains written
17 permission to sell or dispense alcoholic liquors from the
18 controlling government authority, or by (2) a not-for-profit
19 organization, provided that such organization:

20 a. Obtains written consent from the controlling
21 government authority;

22 b. Sells or dispenses the alcoholic liquors in a manner
23 that does not impair normal operations of State offices
24 located in the building;

25 c. Sells or dispenses alcoholic liquors only in
26 connection with an official activity in the building;

1 d. Provides, or its catering service provides, dram
2 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in
3 which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless and
4 indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss,
5 damage or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of
6 alcoholic liquors.

7 Nothing in this Act shall prevent a not-for-profit
8 organization or agency of the State from employing the services
9 of a catering establishment for the selling or dispensing of
10 alcoholic liquors at authorized functions.

11 The controlling government authority for the Willard Ice
12 Building in Springfield shall be the Director of the Department
13 of Revenue. The controlling government authority for Illinois
14 State Museum facilities shall be the Director of the Illinois
15 State Museum. The controlling government authority for the
16 State Library in Springfield shall be the Secretary of State.

17 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail or
18 dispensed at any facility, property or building under the
19 jurisdiction of the Historic Sites and Preservation Division of
20 the Historic Preservation Agency or the Abraham Lincoln
21 Presidential Library and Museum where the delivery, sale or
22 dispensing is by (1) an agency of the State, whether
23 legislative, judicial or executive, provided that such agency
24 first obtains written permission to sell or dispense alcoholic
25 liquors from a controlling government authority, or by (2) an
26 individual or organization provided that such individual or

1 organization:

2 a. Obtains written consent from the controlling
3 government authority;

4 b. Sells or dispenses the alcoholic liquors in a manner
5 that does not impair normal workings of State offices or
6 operations located at the facility, property or building;

7 c. Sells or dispenses alcoholic liquors only in
8 connection with an official activity of the individual or
9 organization in the facility, property or building;

10 d. Provides, or its catering service provides, dram
11 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in
12 which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless and
13 indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss,
14 damage or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of
15 alcoholic liquors.

16 The controlling government authority for the Historic
17 Sites and Preservation Division of the Historic Preservation
18 Agency shall be the Director of the Historic Sites and
19 Preservation, and the controlling government authority for the
20 Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum shall be the
21 Director of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and
22 Museum.

23 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail or
24 dispensed for consumption at the Michael Bilandic Building at
25 160 North LaSalle Street, Chicago IL 60601, after the normal
26 business hours of any day care or child care facility located

1 in the building, by (1) a commercial tenant or subtenant
2 conducting business on the premises under a lease made pursuant
3 to Section 405-315 of the Department of Central Management
4 Services Law (20 ILCS 405/405-315), provided that such tenant
5 or subtenant who accepts delivery of, sells, or dispenses
6 alcoholic liquors shall procure and maintain dram shop
7 liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in which the
8 carrier agrees to defend, indemnify, and save harmless the
9 State of Illinois from all financial loss, damage, or harm
10 arising out of the delivery, sale, or dispensing of alcoholic
11 liquors, or by (2) an agency of the State, whether legislative,
12 judicial, or executive, provided that such agency first obtains
13 written permission to accept delivery of and sell or dispense
14 alcoholic liquors from the Director of Central Management
15 Services, or by (3) a not-for-profit organization, provided
16 that such organization:

17 a. obtains written consent from the Department of
18 Central Management Services;

19 b. accepts delivery of and sells or dispenses the
20 alcoholic liquors in a manner that does not impair normal
21 operations of State offices located in the building;

22 c. accepts delivery of and sells or dispenses alcoholic
23 liquors only in connection with an official activity in the
24 building; and

25 d. provides, or its catering service provides, dram
26 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in

1 which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless, and
2 indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss,
3 damage, or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of
4 alcoholic liquors.

5 Nothing in this Act shall prevent a not-for-profit
6 organization or agency of the State from employing the services
7 of a catering establishment for the selling or dispensing of
8 alcoholic liquors at functions authorized by the Director of
9 Central Management Services.

10 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail or dispensed at the
11 James R. Thompson Center in Chicago, subject to the provisions
12 of Section 7.4 of the State Property Control Act, and 222 South
13 College Street in Springfield, Illinois by (1) a commercial
14 tenant or subtenant conducting business on the premises under a
15 lease or sublease made pursuant to Section 405-315 of the
16 Department of Central Management Services Law (20 ILCS
17 405/405-315), provided that such tenant or subtenant who sells
18 or dispenses alcoholic liquors shall procure and maintain dram
19 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in
20 which the carrier agrees to defend, indemnify and save harmless
21 the State of Illinois from all financial loss, damage or harm
22 arising out of the sale or dispensing of alcoholic liquors, or
23 by (2) an agency of the State, whether legislative, judicial or
24 executive, provided that such agency first obtains written
25 permission to sell or dispense alcoholic liquors from the
26 Director of Central Management Services, or by (3) a

1 not-for-profit organization, provided that such organization:

2 a. Obtains written consent from the Department of
3 Central Management Services;

4 b. Sells or dispenses the alcoholic liquors in a manner
5 that does not impair normal operations of State offices
6 located in the building;

7 c. Sells or dispenses alcoholic liquors only in
8 connection with an official activity in the building;

9 d. Provides, or its catering service provides, dram
10 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in
11 which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless and
12 indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss,
13 damage or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of
14 alcoholic liquors.

15 Nothing in this Act shall prevent a not-for-profit
16 organization or agency of the State from employing the services
17 of a catering establishment for the selling or dispensing of
18 alcoholic liquors at functions authorized by the Director of
19 Central Management Services.

20 Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered at any facility
21 owned by the Illinois Sports Facilities Authority provided that
22 dram shop liability insurance has been made available in a
23 form, with such coverage and in such amounts as the Authority
24 reasonably determines is necessary.

25 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail or dispensed at the
26 Rockford State Office Building by (1) an agency of the State,

1 whether legislative, judicial or executive, provided that such
2 agency first obtains written permission to sell or dispense
3 alcoholic liquors from the Department of Central Management
4 Services, or by (2) a not-for-profit organization, provided
5 that such organization:

6 a. Obtains written consent from the Department of
7 Central Management Services;

8 b. Sells or dispenses the alcoholic liquors in a manner
9 that does not impair normal operations of State offices
10 located in the building;

11 c. Sells or dispenses alcoholic liquors only in
12 connection with an official activity in the building;

13 d. Provides, or its catering service provides, dram
14 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in
15 which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless and
16 indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss,
17 damage or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of
18 alcoholic liquors.

19 Nothing in this Act shall prevent a not-for-profit
20 organization or agency of the State from employing the services
21 of a catering establishment for the selling or dispensing of
22 alcoholic liquors at functions authorized by the Department of
23 Central Management Services.

24 Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered in a building
25 that is owned by McLean County, situated on land owned by the
26 county in the City of Bloomington, and used by the McLean

1 County Historical Society if the sale or delivery is approved
2 by an ordinance adopted by the county board, and the
3 municipality in which the building is located may not prohibit
4 that sale or delivery, notwithstanding any other provision of
5 this Section. The regulation of the sale and delivery of
6 alcoholic liquor in a building that is owned by McLean County,
7 situated on land owned by the county, and used by the McLean
8 County Historical Society as provided in this paragraph is an
9 exclusive power and function of the State and is a denial and
10 limitation under Article VII, Section 6, subsection (h) of the
11 Illinois Constitution of the power of a home rule municipality
12 to regulate that sale and delivery.

13 Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered in any building
14 situated on land held in trust for any school district
15 organized under Article 34 of the School Code, if the building
16 is not used for school purposes and if the sale or delivery is
17 approved by the board of education.

18 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail in
19 any building owned by the Six Mile Regional Library District,
20 provided that the delivery and sale is approved by the board of
21 trustees of the Six Mile Regional Library District and the
22 delivery and sale is limited to a maximum of 6 library district
23 events per year. The Six Mile Regional Library District shall
24 provide dram shop liability in maximum insurance coverage
25 limits so as to save harmless the library district from all
26 financial loss, damage, or harm.

1 Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered in buildings
2 owned by the Community Building Complex Committee of Boone
3 County, Illinois if the person or facility selling or
4 dispensing the alcoholic liquor has provided dram shop
5 liability insurance with coverage and in amounts that the
6 Committee reasonably determines are necessary.

7 Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered in the building
8 located at 1200 Centerville Avenue in Belleville, Illinois and
9 occupied by either the Belleville Area Special Education
10 District or the Belleville Area Special Services Cooperative.

11 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at the Louis
12 Joliet Renaissance Center, City Center Campus, located at 214
13 N. Ottawa Street, Joliet, and the Food Services/Culinary Arts
14 Department facilities, Main Campus, located at 1215 Houbolt
15 Road, Joliet, owned by or under the control of Joliet Junior
16 College, Illinois Community College District No. 525.

17 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at Triton
18 College, Illinois Community College District No. 504.

19 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at the
20 College of DuPage, Illinois Community College District No. 502.

21 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold on any
22 property owned, operated, or controlled by Lewis and Clark
23 Community College, Illinois Community College District No.
24 536.

25 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at the
26 building located at 446 East Hickory Avenue in Apple River,

1 Illinois, owned by the Apple River Fire Protection District,
2 and occupied by the Apple River Community Association if the
3 alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in connection with
4 organized functions approved by the Apple River Community
5 Association for which the planned attendance is 20 or more
6 persons and if the person or facility selling or dispensing the
7 alcoholic liquor has provided dram shop liability insurance in
8 maximum limits so as to hold harmless the Apple River Fire
9 Protection District, the Village of Apple River, and the Apple
10 River Community Association from all financial loss, damage,
11 and harm.

12 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at the Sikia
13 Restaurant, Kennedy King College Campus, located at 740 West
14 63rd Street, Chicago, and at the Food Services in the Great
15 Hall/Washburne Culinary Institute Department facility, Kennedy
16 King College Campus, located at 740 West 63rd Street, Chicago,
17 owned by or under the control of City Colleges of Chicago,
18 Illinois Community College District No. 508.
