5	"Section 5. The Liquor Control Act of 1934 is amended by
6	changing Section 6-15 as follows:
7	(235 ILCS 5/6-15) (from Ch. 43, par. 130)
8	Sec. 6-15. No alcoholic liquors shall be sold or delivered
9	in any building belonging to or under the control of the State
10	or any political subdivision thereof except as provided in this
11	Act. The corporate authorities of any city, village,
12	incorporated town, township, or county may provide by
13	ordinance, however, that alcoholic liquor may be sold or
14	delivered in any specifically designated building belonging to
15	or under the control of the municipality, township, or county,
16	or in any building located on land under the control of the

1 municipality, township, or county; provided that such township 2 or county complies with all applicable local ordinances in any incorporated area of the township or county. Alcoholic liquor 3 may be delivered to and sold under the authority of a special 4 5 use permit on any property owned by a conservation district 6 organized under the Conservation District Act, provided that (i) the alcoholic liquor is sold only at an event authorized by 7 the governing board of the conservation district, (ii) the 8 9 issuance of the special use permit is authorized by the local 10 liquor control commissioner of the territory in which the 11 property is located, and (iii) the special use permit authorizes the sale of alcoholic liquor for one day or less. 12 13 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at any airport 14 belonging to or under the control of a municipality of more 15 than 25,000 inhabitants, or in any building or on any golf 16 course owned by a park district organized under the Park District Code, subject to the approval of the governing board 17 of the district, or in any building or on any golf course owned 18 by a forest preserve district organized under the Downstate 19 20 Forest Preserve District Act, subject to the approval of the governing board of the district, or on the grounds within 500 21 22 feet of any building owned by a forest preserve district 23 organized under the Downstate Forest Preserve District Act 24 during times when food is dispensed for consumption within 500 25 feet of the building from which the food is dispensed, subject 26 to the approval of the governing board of the district, or in a

1 building owned by a Local Mass Transit District organized under the Local Mass Transit District Act, subject to the approval of 2 the governing Board of the District, or in Bicentennial Park, 3 or on the premises of the City of Mendota Lake Park located 4 5 adjacent to Route 51 in Mendota, Illinois, or on the premises 6 of Camden Park in Milan, Illinois, or in the community center owned by the City of Loves Park that is located at 1000 River 7 Park Drive in Loves Park, Illinois, or, in connection with the 8 9 operation of an established food serving facility during times 10 when food is dispensed for consumption on the premises, and at 11 the following aquarium and museums located in public parks: Art Institute of Chicago, Chicago Academy of Sciences, Chicago 12 Historical Society, Field Museum of Natural History, Museum of 13 14 Science and Industry, DuSable Museum of African American 15 History, John G. Shedd Aquarium and Adler Planetarium, or at 16 Lakeview Museum of Arts and Sciences in Peoria, or in connection with the operation of the facilities of the Chicago 17 18 Zoological Society or the Chicago Horticultural Society on land owned by the Forest Preserve District of Cook County, or on any 19 20 land used for a golf course or for recreational purposes owned 21 by the Forest Preserve District of Cook County, subject to the 22 control of the Forest Preserve District Board of Commissioners 23 and applicable local law, provided that dram shop liability 24 insurance is provided at maximum coverage limits so as to hold 25 the District harmless from all financial loss, damage, and 26 harm, or in any building located on land owned by the Chicago

1 Park District if approved by the Park District Commissioners, or on any land used for a golf course or for recreational 2 3 purposes and owned by the Illinois International Port District 4 if approved by the District's governing board, or at any 5 airport, golf course, faculty center, or facility in which 6 conference and convention type activities take place belonging to or under control of any State university or public community 7 8 college district, provided that with respect to a facility for 9 conference and convention type activities alcoholic liquors 10 shall be limited to the use of the convention or conference 11 participants or participants in cultural, political or educational activities held in such facilities, and provided 12 13 further that the faculty or staff of the State university or a 14 public community college district, or members of an 15 organization of students, alumni, faculty or staff of the State 16 university or a public community college district are active participants in the conference or convention, or in Memorial 17 Stadium on the campus of the University of Illinois at 18 19 Urbana-Champaign during games in which the Chicago Bears 20 professional football team is playing in that stadium during the renovation of Soldier Field, not more than one and a half 21 22 hours before the start of the game and not after the end of the 23 third quarter of the game, or in the Pavilion Facility on the 24 campus of the University of Illinois at Chicago during games in 25 which the Chicago Storm professional soccer team is playing in 26 that facility, not more than one and a half hours before the

1 start of the game and not after the end of the third guarter of 2 the game, or in the Pavilion Facility on the campus of the University of Illinois at Chicago during games in which the 3 4 WNBA professional women's basketball team is playing in that 5 facility, not more than one and a half hours before the start 6 of the game and not after the 10-minute mark of the second half of the game, or by a catering establishment which has rented 7 facilities from a board of trustees of a public community 8 9 college district, or in a restaurant that is operated by a 10 commercial tenant in the North Campus Parking Deck building 11 that (1) is located at 1201 West University Avenue, Urbana, Illinois and (2) is owned by the Board of Trustees of the 12 University of Illinois, or, if approved by the District board, 13 14 on land owned by the Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater 15 Chicago and leased to others for a term of at least 20 years. 16 Nothing in this Section precludes the sale or delivery of alcoholic liquor in the form of original packaged goods in 17 premises located at 500 S. Racine in Chicago belonging to the 18 University of Illinois and used primarily as a grocery store by 19 20 a commercial tenant during the term of a lease that predates 21 the University's acquisition of the premises; but the 22 University shall have no power or authority to renew, transfer, 23 or extend the lease with terms allowing the sale of alcoholic 24 liquor; and the sale of alcoholic liquor shall be subject to 25 all local laws and regulations. After the acquisition by 26 Winnebago County of the property located at 404 Elm Street in

Rockford, a commercial tenant who sold alcoholic liquor at 1 retail on a portion of the property under a valid license at 2 3 the time of the acquisition may continue to do so for so long 4 as the tenant and the County may agree under existing or future 5 leases, subject to all local laws and regulations regarding the 6 sale of alcoholic liquor. Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at Memorial Hall, located at 211 North Main Street, 7 8 Rockford, under conditions approved by Winnebago County and 9 subject to all local laws and regulations regarding the sale of 10 alcoholic liquor. Each facility shall provide dram shop 11 liability in maximum insurance coverage limits so as to save harmless the State, municipality, State university, airport, 12 golf course, faculty center, facility in which conference and 13 14 convention type activities take place, park district, Forest 15 District, public community college district, Preserve 16 aquarium, museum, or sanitary district from all financial loss, damage or harm. Alcoholic liquors 22 may be delivered to and sold at retail in any building owned by 23 a fire protection district organized under the Fire Protection 24 District Act, provided that such delivery and sale is approved 25 by the board of trustees of the district, and provided further 26 that such delivery and sale is limited to fundraising events

1 and to a maximum of 6 events per year. However, the limitation to fundraising events and to a maximum of 6 events per year 2 does not apply to the delivery, sale, or manufacture of 3 4 alcoholic liquors at the building located at 59 Main Street in 5 Oswego, Illinois, owned by the Oswego Fire Protection District 6 if the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed as approved by the Oswego Fire Protection District and the property is no longer 7 8 being utilized for fire protection purposes.

Alcoholic liquors may be served or sold in buildings under 9 10 the control of the Board of Trustees of the University of 11 Illinois for events that the Board may determine are public events and not related student activities. The Board of 12 13 Trustees shall issue a written policy within 6 months of the 14 effective date of this amendatory Act of the 95th General 15 Assembly concerning the types of events that would be eligible 16 for an exemption. In addition, any policy submitted by the Board of 9 10 Trustees to the Illinois Liquor Control Commission must require 11 that any event at which alcoholic liquors are served or sold in buildings under the control of the Board of Trustees shall 12 13 require the prior written approval of the Office of the 14 Chancellor for the University campus where the event is 15 located. The Board of Trustees shall submit its policy, and any 16 subsequently revised, updated, new, or amended policies, to the Illinois Liquor Control Commission, and any University event, 17 or location for an event, exempted under such policies shall 18 apply for a license under the applicable Sections of this Act. 19

Alcoholic liquors may be served or sold in buildings under the control of the Board of Trustees of Northern Illinois University for events that the Board may determine are public events and not student-related activities. 3	Section on or before the effective date of this amendatory Act
4	of the 99th General Assembly, then that Board of Trustees shall
5	issue a written policy within 6 months after the effective date
6	of this amendatory Act of the 99th General Assembly concerning
7	the types of events that would be eligible for an exemption.
8	Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue revised, updated,
9	new, or amended policies as it deems necessary and appropriate.
10	In preparing its written policy, the Board of Trustees shall,
11	in addition to other factors it considers relevant and
12	important, give consideration to the following: (i) whether the
13	event is a student activity or student-related activity; (ii)
14	whether the physical setting of the event is conducive to
15	control of liquor sales and distribution; (iii) the ability of

6 Alcoholic liquors may be served or sold in buildings under the control of the Board of Trustees of a community college 7 district for events that the Board of Trustees of that 8 9 community college district may determine are public events and 10 not student-related activities. The Board of Trustees shall 11 issue a written policy within 6 months after the effective date 12 of this amendatory Act of the 99th General Assembly concerning 13 the types of events that would be eligible for an exemption. 14 Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue revised, updated, 15 new, or amended policies as it deems necessary and appropriate. In preparing its written policy, the Board of Trustees shall, 16 in addition to other factors it considers relevant and 17 important, give consideration to the following: (i) whether the 18 19 event is a student activity or student-related activity; (ii) 20 whether the physical setting of the event is conducive to 21 control of liquor sales and distribution; (iii) the ability of 22 the event operator to ensure that the sale or serving of alcoholic liquors and the demeanor of the participants are in 23 24 accordance with State law and community college district policies; (iv) the anticipated attendees at the event and the 25 26 relative proportion of individuals under the age of 21 to

1 individuals age 21 or older; (v) the ability of the venue operator to prevent the sale or distribution of alcoholic 2 liquors to individuals under the age of 21; (vi) whether the 3 4 event prohibits participants from removing alcoholic beverages 5 from the venue; and (vii) whether the event prohibits 6 participants from providing their own alcoholic liquors to the venue. This paragraph does not apply to any community college 7 district authorized to sell or serve alcoholic liquor under any 8 9 other provision of this Section.

10 Alcoholic liquor may be delivered to and sold at retail in 11 the Dorchester Senior Business Center owned by the Village of Dolton if the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in 12 13 connection with organized functions for which the planned attendance is 20 or more persons, and if the person or facility 14 15 selling or dispensing the alcoholic liquor has provided dram 16 shop liability insurance in maximum limits so as to hold harmless the Village of Dolton and the State from all financial 17 18 loss, damage and harm.

Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail in any building used as an Illinois State Armory provided:

(i) the Adjutant General's written consent to the issuance of a license to sell alcoholic liquor in such building is filed with the Commission;

24 (ii) the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in 25 connection with organized functions held on special 26 occasions;

1 (iii) the organized function is one for which the planned attendance is 25 or more persons; and 2 (iv) the facility selling or dispensing the alcoholic 3 4 liquors has provided dram shop liability insurance in 5 maximum limits so as to save harmless the facility and the State from all financial loss, damage or harm. 6 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail in 7 the Chicago Civic Center, provided that: 8 9 (i) the written consent of the Public Building 10 Commission which administers the Chicago Civic Center is filed with the Commission: 11 (ii) the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in 12 13 connection with organized functions held on special 14 occasions; 15 (iii) the organized function is one for which the 16 planned attendance is 25 or more persons; (iv) the facility selling or dispensing the alcoholic 17 liquors has provided dram shop liability insurance in 18

19 maximum limits so as to hold harmless the Civic Center, the 20 City of Chicago and the State from all financial loss, 21 damage or harm; and

(v) all applicable local ordinances are complied with.
Alcoholic liquors may be delivered or sold in any building
belonging to or under the control of any city, village or
incorporated town where more than 75% of the physical
properties of the building is used for commercial or

1 recreational purposes, and the building is located upon a pier extending into or over the waters of a navigable lake or stream 2 3 or on the shore of a navigable lake or stream. In accordance 4 with a license issued under this Act, alcoholic liquor may be 5 sold, served, or delivered in buildings and facilities under the control of the Department of Natural Resources during 6 events or activities lasting no more than 7 continuous days 7 8 upon the written approval of the Director of Natural Resources 9 acting as the controlling government authority. The Director of 10 Natural Resources may specify conditions on that approval, 11 including but not limited to requirements for insurance and hours of operation. Notwithstanding any other provision of this 12 13 Act, alcoholic liquor sold by a United States Army Corps of 14 Engineers or Department of Natural Resources concessionaire 15 who was operating on June 1, 1991 for on-premises consumption 16 only is not subject to the provisions of Articles IV and IX. Beer and wine may be sold on the premises of the Joliet Park 17 18 District Stadium owned by the Joliet Park District when written consent to the issuance of a license to sell beer and wine in 19 20 such premises is filed with the local liquor commissioner by the Joliet Park District. Beer and wine may be sold in 21 22 buildings on the grounds of State veterans' homes when written 23 consent to the issuance of a license to sell beer and wine in 24 such buildings is filed with the Commission by the Department 25 of Veterans' Affairs, and the facility shall provide dram shop 26 liability in maximum insurance coverage limits so as to save

the facility harmless from all financial loss, damage or harm.
Such liquors may be delivered to and sold at any property owned
or held under lease by a Metropolitan Pier and Exposition
Authority or Metropolitan Exposition and Auditorium Authority.

5 Beer and wine may be sold and dispensed at professional sporting events and at professional concerts and other 6 entertainment events conducted on premises owned by the Forest 7 Preserve District of Kane County, subject to the control of the 8 9 District Commissioners and applicable local law, provided that 10 dram shop liability insurance is provided at maximum coverage 11 limits so as to hold the District harmless from all financial 12 loss, damage and harm.

Nothing in this Section shall preclude the sale or delivery of beer and wine at a State or county fair or the sale or delivery of beer or wine at a city fair in any otherwise lawful manner.

Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in buildings in State parks under the control of the Department of Natural Resources, provided:

a. the State park has overnight lodging facilities with
some restaurant facilities or, not having overnight
lodging facilities, has restaurant facilities which serve
complete luncheon and dinner or supper meals,

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b. (blank), and

c. the alcoholic liquors are sold by the State park
 lodge or restaurant concessionaire only during the hours

1 from 11 o'clock a.m. until 12 o'clock midnight. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Act, alcoholic liquor sold by the State park or restaurant concessionaire is not subject to the provisions of Articles IV and IX.

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5 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in buildings on properties under the control of the Historic Sites and 6 Preservation Division of the Historic Preservation Agency or 7 8 the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum provided:

9 a. the property has overnight lodging facilities with 10 some restaurant facilities or, not having overnight 11 lodging facilities, has restaurant facilities which serve complete luncheon and dinner or supper meals, 12

13 b. consent to the issuance of a license to sell 14 alcoholic liquors in the buildings has been filed with the 15 commission by the Historic Sites and Preservation Division 16 of the Historic Preservation Agency or the Abraham Lincoln 17 Presidential Library and Museum, and

18 c. the alcoholic liquors are sold by the lodge or 19 restaurant concessionaire only during the hours from 11 20 o'clock a.m. until 12 o'clock midnight.

21 The sale of alcoholic liquors pursuant to this Section does 22 not authorize the establishment and operation of facilities 23 commonly called taverns, saloons, bars, cocktail lounges, and 24 the like except as a part of lodge and restaurant facilities in 25 State parks or golf courses owned by Forest Preserve Districts 26 with a population of less than 3,000,000 or municipalities or

Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in the Springfield Administration Building of the Department of Transportation and the Illinois State Armory in Springfield; provided, that the controlling government authority may consent to such sales only if

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a. the request is from a not-for-profit organization;

b. such sales would not impede normal operations of thedepartments involved;

10 c. the not-for-profit organization provides dram shop 11 liability in maximum insurance coverage limits and agrees 12 to defend, save harmless and indemnify the State of 13 Illinois from all financial loss, damage or harm;

14 d. no such sale shall be made during normal working15 hours of the State of Illinois; and

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e. the consent is in writing.

Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in buildings in recreational areas of river conservancy districts under the control of, or leased from, the river conservancy districts. Such sales are subject to reasonable local regulations as provided in Article IV; however, no such regulations may prohibit or substantially impair the sale of alcoholic liquors on Sundays or Holidays.

Alcoholic liquors may be provided in long term care facilities owned or operated by a county under Division 5-21 or 5-22 of the Counties Code, when approved by the facility 09900HB4820ham002 -20- LRB099 17842 RPS 47295 a

operator and not in conflict with the regulations of the Illinois Department of Public Health, to residents of the facility who have had their consumption of the alcoholic liquors provided approved in writing by a physician licensed to practice medicine in all its branches.

6 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and dispensed in 7 State housing assigned to employees of the Department of 8 Corrections. No person shall furnish or allow to be furnished 9 any alcoholic liquors to any prisoner confined in any jail, 10 reformatory, prison or house of correction except upon a 11 physician's prescription for medicinal purposes.
