- 2 WHEREAS, The members of the Illinois House of
- 3 Representatives are saddened to learn of the death of Dr.
- 4 Carrie Louise Filer Ellis Davis; and

5 WHEREAS, Dr. Davis was born 91 years ago in Marianna, 6 Arkansas to Vera and Squire Filer; she attended Moten 7 Elementary and was a member of St. Luke African Methodist 8 Episcopal Church; she was valedictorian of her high school 9 class at Robert Moten High School and graduated cum laude from 10 Arkansas AM & N (now the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff), 11 where she joined her beloved Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority, 12 Incorporated; while at Arkansas AM & N, she was an accomplished 13 member of the basketball team and was entrusted to work in the 14 President's office; she had the distinguished honor of being 15 the first, and for a time, the only female on the university's winning varsity debate team; she was the winner of the Scipio 16 17 A. Jones Oratorical Contest and won the Outstanding Actress Award; she was crowned both "Miss Omega" of Omega Psi Phi 18 19 Fraternity, Incorporated and "Miss Arkansas State" Campus 20 after attending Arkansas AM & N, she attended 21 Northwestern University and Northeastern University, where she received her Master of Arts; she earned her doctoral degree 22 23 from the University of Sarasota, where she graduated with 24 honors; she later taught other doctoral candidates and was a HR0868

- member of the Board of Trustees of the University of Sarasota; 1
- 2 and

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- 3 WHEREAS, Dr. Davis taught at Robert Moten High School in 4 Marianna, Arkansas for 7 years; she was the first classroom
- 5 teacher to ever deliver the Keynote Address at the State of
- 6 Arkansas Teachers' Meeting at the capitol in Little Rock; and
- 7 WHEREAS, Dr. Davis left Arkansas for Chicago, she became a 8 member of Greater Institutional AME Church for a few years, but 9 the historic Quinn Chapel AME Church was her church home for 10 over 50 years; she was the co-director and a teacher at Crest 11 Modeling/Talent Agency for 4 years and was a certified teacher 12 of Speech, Drama, and English and a high school counselor at Englewood High School; she served as coordinator of Human 13 14 Relations, Instructional Services, and as an Administrator in

Districts 27 and 19 for the Chicago Board of Education; and

16 WHEREAS, Dr. Davis designed and coordinated numerous programs for her school districts, including the Communication 17 18 Festival involving Chicago Public School students 19 competing in oral interpretation, public speaking and drama, 20 the Deb Tea for Talent - a talent competition in the district elementary schools, the Great Debates-skill building/thinking 21 for high school students, Spellarama - a Spelling Bee conducted 22 23 for elementary school students, the Academic Showdown - a

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- 1 knowledge-based contest similar to Jeopardy, and an annual
- 2 essay contest for Chicago elementary and high school students;
- 3 these creations became extremely successful under her tutelage
- 4 and some developed into city-wide activities and contests open
- 5 to all Chicago Public School students; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Davis was also a private drama coach for students and adults wishing to improve their public speaking skills for competition or career enhancement; she was the designer, writer, and teacher of the course for Chicago teachers in speech, drama, music, dance, reading, and classroom management; she as a poet and the author of "Carrie's Vignette" - a newsletter and she co-authored the "Drama Curriculum Guide" for the high schools of Chicago and the Proficiency Skills Course-Language Arts Portion for the Chicago Board of Education; she was the Executive Producer, co-host, and script writer for FOCUS ON YOUTH, a WLNR radio show; the City of Chicago Board of Education awarded her Outstanding Drama Director and Teacher of the Year; after retiring from the Chicago Board of Education, she returned as an educational consultant on the Probation Team for Troubled Schools; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Davis continuously reached out to make this world a better place with her civic activities; she served as Chairman of United Charities Calumet Family Center Advisory Committee, as President of the Roseland Community Hospital

Auxiliary, as Committee Chairperson for Afro-American Family and Community Services Development, as member of the White House Conference for Youth, as member of the Good Citizenship

4 Club, as board member of the Altgeld Urban Program Center, as

5 board member of the Boys and Girls Clubs of America, and was a

delegate for the General Conference of the AME Church and Quinn

7 Chapel; and

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WHEREAS, Dr. Davis was a Legendary Soror and Leader of Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority, Incorporated; she chartered the Alpha Chi Chapter at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff in 1948, served as Basileus of Delta Sigma Chapter in Chicago, was Central Region Campus Coordinator, served as the 11th Central Region Syntaktes from 1974 to 1978, was elected Grand Epistoleus from 1980 to 1984, was a National Board Member, Dean of Pledgees, and Chairperson of the following committees: Miss Black Debutante Tea, Teenage Pageant, National Scholarship, Regional Scholarship and Nominating Committee; her public speaking passion was further realized through the Kaleidoscope of the Arts - a talent search involving Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority's high school Rhoers and college Sigma women competing for trophies in speech, drama, and dance; as Grand Epistoleus, she authored IN TOUCH, a newsletter to all Sorors and WRITE ON, a publication containing Media Hints for Epistolei; her originated the "Mother-Daughter Gallery" which spotlighted daughters who followed their mother's legacy into

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- 1 Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority; she was a founding member of Eta Xi
- 2 Sigma Chapter in Oak Lawn; devotion to Sigma is a family affair
- 3 as her's sister Vivian and all 3 of her daughters are members
- 4 of Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority, Incorporated; and

WHEREAS, On November 18, 1978, Dr. Davis journeyed with others to Chicago to help charter the second chapter of the National Women of Achievement, Incorporated (NWOA); she became the first President of the Chicago Chapter; under her leadership, membership increased from 5 to 35, in a relatively short time; she worked tirelessly to continue the promulgation of progress for growth of the organization; she initiated the NWOA Pageant that focuses on outstanding Achievers, organized the "GEMS", a youth group later named Youth Achievers, and organized the oratorical contest for youth; in 1985, she became the Second National President of NWOA; the numbers of chapters of NWOA more than doubled under her leadership; she enhanced the financial status of the national coffers through contests among chapters, focusing on the outstanding Presidents; her innovations were youth competitions in debates, public speaking, and oral interpretation; young ladies and men won financial rewards for outstanding performances; leadership seminars were devised for officers and members of local chapters and thousands of dollars were given to worthy students as grants and scholarship to provide avenues for further study; numerous achievers and community leaders were given awards

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1 through the Profiles of Prominence Ceremony each year; she

2 designed a replica of NWOA'S gem stone into a beautiful award

for these recipients; additionally, she established the

Achiever Carrie Filer Davis Award to be presented to the

Regional Director who had excelled during the 2 year period

6 leading up to CON WOA, the National Convention; and
