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1 AMENDMENT TO SENATE BILL 399

2 AMENDMENT NO. _____. Amend Senate Bill 399 by replacing
3 everything after the enacting clause with the following:

4 "Section 5. The Liquor Control Act of 1934 is amended by
5 changing Section 6-15 as follows:

6 (235 ILCS 5/6-15) (from Ch. 43, par. 130)

7 Sec. 6-15. No alcoholic liquors shall be sold or delivered
8 in any building belonging to or under the control of the State
9 or any political subdivision thereof except as provided in this
10 Act. The corporate authorities of any city, village,
11 incorporated town, township, or county may provide by
12 ordinance, however, that alcoholic liquor may be sold or
13 delivered in any specifically designated building belonging to
14 or under the control of the municipality, township, or county,
15 or in any building located on land under the control of the
16 municipality, township, or county; provided that such township

1 or county complies with all applicable local ordinances in any
2 incorporated area of the township or county. Alcoholic liquor
3 may be delivered to and sold under the authority of a special
4 use permit on any property owned by a conservation district
5 organized under the Conservation District Act, provided that
6 (i) the alcoholic liquor is sold only at an event authorized by
7 the governing board of the conservation district, (ii) the
8 issuance of the special use permit is authorized by the local
9 liquor control commissioner of the territory in which the
10 property is located, and (iii) the special use permit
11 authorizes the sale of alcoholic liquor for one day or less.
12 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at any airport
13 belonging to or under the control of a municipality of more
14 than 25,000 inhabitants, or in any building or on any golf
15 course owned by a park district organized under the Park
16 District Code, subject to the approval of the governing board
17 of the district, or in any building or on any golf course owned
18 by a forest preserve district organized under the Downstate
19 Forest Preserve District Act, subject to the approval of the
20 governing board of the district, or on the grounds within 500
21 feet of any building owned by a forest preserve district
22 organized under the Downstate Forest Preserve District Act
23 during times when food is dispensed for consumption within 500
24 feet of the building from which the food is dispensed, subject
25 to the approval of the governing board of the district, or in a
26 building owned by a Local Mass Transit District organized under

1 the Local Mass Transit District Act, subject to the approval of
2 the governing Board of the District, or in Bicentennial Park,
3 or on the premises of the City of Mendota Lake Park located
4 adjacent to Route 51 in Mendota, Illinois, or on the premises
5 of Camden Park in Milan, Illinois, or in the community center
6 owned by the City of Loves Park that is located at 1000 River
7 Park Drive in Loves Park, Illinois, or, in connection with the
8 operation of an established food serving facility during times
9 when food is dispensed for consumption on the premises, and at
10 the following aquarium and museums located in public parks: Art
11 Institute of Chicago, Chicago Academy of Sciences, Chicago
12 Historical Society, Field Museum of Natural History, Museum of
13 Science and Industry, DuSable Museum of African American
14 History, John G. Shedd Aquarium and Adler Planetarium, or at
15 Lakeview Museum of Arts and Sciences in Peoria, or in
16 connection with the operation of the facilities of the Chicago
17 Zoological Society or the Chicago Horticultural Society on land
18 owned by the Forest Preserve District of Cook County, or on any
19 land used for a golf course or for recreational purposes owned
20 by the Forest Preserve District of Cook County, subject to the
21 control of the Forest Preserve District Board of Commissioners
22 and applicable local law, provided that dram shop liability
23 insurance is provided at maximum coverage limits so as to hold
24 the District harmless from all financial loss, damage, and
25 harm, or in any building located on land owned by the Chicago
26 Park District if approved by the Park District Commissioners,

1 or on any land used for a golf course or for recreational
2 purposes and owned by the Illinois International Port District
3 if approved by the District's governing board, or at any
4 airport, golf course, faculty center, or facility in which
5 conference and convention type activities take place belonging
6 to or under control of any State university or public community
7 college district, provided that with respect to a facility for
8 conference and convention type activities alcoholic liquors
9 shall be limited to the use of the convention or conference
10 participants or participants in cultural, political or
11 educational activities held in such facilities, and provided
12 further that the faculty or staff of the State university or a
13 public community college district, or members of an
14 organization of students, alumni, faculty or staff of the State
15 university or a public community college district are active
16 participants in the conference or convention, or in Memorial
17 Stadium on the campus of the University of Illinois at
18 Urbana-Champaign during games in which the Chicago Bears
19 professional football team is playing in that stadium during
20 the renovation of Soldier Field, not more than one and a half
21 hours before the start of the game and not after the end of the
22 third quarter of the game, or in the Pavilion Facility on the
23 campus of the University of Illinois at Chicago during games in
24 which the Chicago Storm professional soccer team is playing in
25 that facility, not more than one and a half hours before the
26 start of the game and not after the end of the third quarter of

1 the game, or in the Pavilion Facility on the campus of the
2 University of Illinois at Chicago during games in which the
3 WNBA professional women's basketball team is playing in that
4 facility, not more than one and a half hours before the start
5 of the game and not after the 10-minute mark of the second half
6 of the game, or by a catering establishment which has rented
7 facilities from a board of trustees of a public community
8 college district, or in a restaurant that is operated by a
9 commercial tenant in the North Campus Parking Deck building
10 that (1) is located at 1201 West University Avenue, Urbana,
11 Illinois and (2) is owned by the Board of Trustees of the
12 University of Illinois, or, if approved by the District board,
13 on land owned by the Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater
14 Chicago and leased to others for a term of at least 20 years.
15 Nothing in this Section precludes the sale or delivery of
16 alcoholic liquor in the form of original packaged goods in
17 premises located at 500 S. Racine in Chicago belonging to the
18 University of Illinois and used primarily as a grocery store by
19 a commercial tenant during the term of a lease that predates
20 the University's acquisition of the premises; but the
21 University shall have no power or authority to renew, transfer,
22 or extend the lease with terms allowing the sale of alcoholic
23 liquor; and the sale of alcoholic liquor shall be subject to
24 all local laws and regulations. After the acquisition by
25 Winnebago County of the property located at 404 Elm Street in
26 Rockford, a commercial tenant who sold alcoholic liquor at

1 retail on a portion of the property under a valid license at
2 the time of the acquisition may continue to do so for so long
3 as the tenant and the County may agree under existing or future
4 leases, subject to all local laws and regulations regarding the
5 sale of alcoholic liquor. Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to
6 and sold at Memorial Hall, located at 211 North Main Street,
7 Rockford, under conditions approved by Winnebago County and
8 subject to all local laws and regulations regarding the sale of
9 alcoholic liquor. Each facility shall provide dram shop
10 liability in maximum insurance coverage limits so as to save
11 harmless the State, municipality, State university, airport,
12 golf course, faculty center, facility in which conference and
13 convention type activities take place, park district, Forest
14 Preserve District, public community college district,
15 aquarium, museum, or sanitary district from all financial loss,
16 damage or harm. Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in
17 buildings of golf courses owned by municipalities or Illinois
18 State University in connection with the operation of an
19 established food serving facility during times when food is
20 dispensed for consumption upon the premises. Alcoholic liquors
21 may be delivered to and sold at retail in any building owned by
22 a fire protection district organized under the Fire Protection
23 District Act, provided that such delivery and sale is approved
24 by the board of trustees of the district, and provided further
25 that such delivery and sale is limited to fundraising events
26 and to a maximum of 6 events per year. However, the limitation

1 to fundraising events and to a maximum of 6 events per year
2 does not apply to the delivery, sale, or manufacture of
3 alcoholic liquors at the building located at 59 Main Street in
4 Oswego, Illinois, owned by the Oswego Fire Protection District
5 if the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed as approved by the
6 Oswego Fire Protection District and the property is no longer
7 being utilized for fire protection purposes.

8 Alcoholic liquors may be served or sold in buildings under
9 the control of the Board of Trustees of the University of
10 Illinois for events that the Board may determine are public
11 events and not related student activities. The Board of
12 Trustees shall issue a written policy within 6 months of the
13 effective date of this amendatory Act of the 95th General
14 Assembly concerning the types of events that would be eligible
15 for an exemption. Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue
16 revised, updated, new, or amended policies as it deems
17 necessary and appropriate. In preparing its written policy, the
18 Board of Trustees shall, among other factors it considers
19 relevant and important, give consideration to the following:
20 (i) whether the event is a student activity or student related
21 activity; (ii) whether the physical setting of the event is
22 conducive to control of liquor sales and distribution; (iii)
23 the ability of the event operator to ensure that the sale or
24 serving of alcoholic liquors and the demeanor of the
25 participants are in accordance with State law and University
26 policies; (iv) regarding the anticipated attendees at the

1 event, the relative proportion of individuals under the age of
2 21 to individuals age 21 or older; (v) the ability of the venue
3 operator to prevent the sale or distribution of alcoholic
4 liquors to individuals under the age of 21; (vi) whether the
5 event prohibits participants from removing alcoholic beverages
6 from the venue; and (vii) whether the event prohibits
7 participants from providing their own alcoholic liquors to the
8 venue. In addition, any policy submitted by the Board of
9 Trustees to the Illinois Liquor Control Commission must require
10 that any event at which alcoholic liquors are served or sold in
11 buildings under the control of the Board of Trustees shall
12 require the prior written approval of the Office of the
13 Chancellor for the University campus where the event is
14 located. The Board of Trustees shall submit its policy, and any
15 subsequently revised, updated, new, or amended policies, to the
16 Illinois Liquor Control Commission, and any University event,
17 or location for an event, exempted under such policies shall
18 apply for a license under the applicable Sections of this Act.

19 Alcoholic liquors may be served or sold in buildings under
20 the control of the Board of Trustees of Northern Illinois
21 University for events that the Board may determine are public
22 events and not student-related activities. The Board of
23 Trustees shall issue a written policy within 6 months after
24 June 28, 2011 (the effective date of Public Act 97-45)
25 concerning the types of events that would be eligible for an
26 exemption. Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue revised,

1 updated, new, or amended policies as it deems necessary and
2 appropriate. In preparing its written policy, the Board of
3 Trustees shall, in addition to other factors it considers
4 relevant and important, give consideration to the following:

5 (i) whether the event is a student activity or student-related
6 activity; (ii) whether the physical setting of the event is
7 conducive to control of liquor sales and distribution; (iii)
8 the ability of the event operator to ensure that the sale or
9 serving of alcoholic liquors and the demeanor of the
10 participants are in accordance with State law and University
11 policies; (iv) the anticipated attendees at the event and the
12 relative proportion of individuals under the age of 21 to
13 individuals age 21 or older; (v) the ability of the venue
14 operator to prevent the sale or distribution of alcoholic
15 liquors to individuals under the age of 21; (vi) whether the
16 event prohibits participants from removing alcoholic beverages
17 from the venue; and (vii) whether the event prohibits
18 participants from providing their own alcoholic liquors to the
19 venue.

20 Alcoholic liquors may be served or sold in buildings under
21 the control of the Board of Trustees of Chicago State
22 University for events that the Board may determine are public
23 events and not student-related activities. The Board of
24 Trustees shall issue a written policy within 6 months after
25 August 2, 2013 (the effective date of Public Act 98-132)
26 concerning the types of events that would be eligible for an

1 exemption. Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue revised,
2 updated, new, or amended policies as it deems necessary and
3 appropriate. In preparing its written policy, the Board of
4 Trustees shall, in addition to other factors it considers
5 relevant and important, give consideration to the following:

6 (i) whether the event is a student activity or student-related
7 activity; (ii) whether the physical setting of the event is
8 conducive to control of liquor sales and distribution; (iii)
9 the ability of the event operator to ensure that the sale or
10 serving of alcoholic liquors and the demeanor of the
11 participants are in accordance with State law and University
12 policies; (iv) the anticipated attendees at the event and the
13 relative proportion of individuals under the age of 21 to
14 individuals age 21 or older; (v) the ability of the venue
15 operator to prevent the sale or distribution of alcoholic
16 liquors to individuals under the age of 21; (vi) whether the
17 event prohibits participants from removing alcoholic beverages
18 from the venue; and (vii) whether the event prohibits
19 participants from providing their own alcoholic liquors to the
20 venue.

21 Alcoholic liquors may be served or sold in buildings under
22 the control of the Board of Trustees of Illinois State
23 University for events that the Board may determine are public
24 events and not student-related activities. The Board of
25 Trustees shall issue a written policy within 6 months after the
26 effective date of this amendatory Act of the 97th General

1 Assembly concerning the types of events that would be eligible
2 for an exemption. Thereafter, the Board of Trustees may issue
3 revised, updated, new, or amended policies as it deems
4 necessary and appropriate. In preparing its written policy, the
5 Board of Trustees shall, in addition to other factors it
6 considers relevant and important, give consideration to the
7 following: (i) whether the event is a student activity or
8 student-related activity; (ii) whether the physical setting of
9 the event is conducive to control of liquor sales and
10 distribution; (iii) the ability of the event operator to ensure
11 that the sale or serving of alcoholic liquors and the demeanor
12 of the participants are in accordance with State law and
13 University policies; (iv) the anticipated attendees at the
14 event and the relative proportion of individuals under the age
15 of 21 to individuals age 21 or older; (v) the ability of the
16 venue operator to prevent the sale or distribution of alcoholic
17 liquors to individuals under the age of 21; (vi) whether the
18 event prohibits participants from removing alcoholic beverages
19 from the venue; and (vii) whether the event prohibits
20 participants from providing their own alcoholic liquors to the
21 venue.

22 Alcoholic liquor may be delivered to and sold at retail in
23 the Dorchester Senior Business Center owned by the Village of
24 Dolton if the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in
25 connection with organized functions for which the planned
26 attendance is 20 or more persons, and if the person or facility

1 selling or dispensing the alcoholic liquor has provided dram
2 shop liability insurance in maximum limits so as to hold
3 harmless the Village of Dolton and the State from all financial
4 loss, damage and harm.

5 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail in
6 any building used as an Illinois State Armory provided:

7 (i) the Adjutant General's written consent to the
8 issuance of a license to sell alcoholic liquor in such
9 building is filed with the Commission;

10 (ii) the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in
11 connection with organized functions held on special
12 occasions;

13 (iii) the organized function is one for which the
14 planned attendance is 25 or more persons; and

15 (iv) the facility selling or dispensing the alcoholic
16 liquors has provided dram shop liability insurance in
17 maximum limits so as to save harmless the facility and the
18 State from all financial loss, damage or harm.

19 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail in
20 the Chicago Civic Center, provided that:

21 (i) the written consent of the Public Building
22 Commission which administers the Chicago Civic Center is
23 filed with the Commission;

24 (ii) the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in
25 connection with organized functions held on special
26 occasions;

1 (iii) the organized function is one for which the
2 planned attendance is 25 or more persons;

3 (iv) the facility selling or dispensing the alcoholic
4 liquors has provided dram shop liability insurance in
5 maximum limits so as to hold harmless the Civic Center, the
6 City of Chicago and the State from all financial loss,
7 damage or harm; and

8 (v) all applicable local ordinances are complied with.

9 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered or sold in any building
10 belonging to or under the control of any city, village or
11 incorporated town where more than 75% of the physical
12 properties of the building is used for commercial or
13 recreational purposes, and the building is located upon a pier
14 extending into or over the waters of a navigable lake or stream
15 or on the shore of a navigable lake or stream. In accordance
16 with a license issued under this Act, alcoholic liquor may be
17 sold, served, or delivered in buildings and facilities under
18 the control of the Department of Natural Resources during
19 events or activities lasting no more than 7 continuous days
20 upon the written approval of the Director of Natural Resources
21 acting as the controlling government authority. The Director of
22 Natural Resources may specify conditions on that approval,
23 including but not limited to requirements for insurance and
24 hours of operation. Notwithstanding any other provision of this
25 Act, alcoholic liquor sold by a United States Army Corps of
26 Engineers or Department of Natural Resources concessionaire

1 who was operating on June 1, 1991 for on-premises consumption
2 only is not subject to the provisions of Articles IV and IX.
3 Beer and wine may be sold on the premises of the Joliet Park
4 District Stadium owned by the Joliet Park District when written
5 consent to the issuance of a license to sell beer and wine in
6 such premises is filed with the local liquor commissioner by
7 the Joliet Park District. Beer and wine may be sold in
8 buildings on the grounds of State veterans' homes when written
9 consent to the issuance of a license to sell beer and wine in
10 such buildings is filed with the Commission by the Department
11 of Veterans' Affairs, and the facility shall provide dram shop
12 liability in maximum insurance coverage limits so as to save
13 the facility harmless from all financial loss, damage or harm.
14 Such liquors may be delivered to and sold at any property owned
15 or held under lease by a Metropolitan Pier and Exposition
16 Authority or Metropolitan Exposition and Auditorium Authority.

17 Beer and wine may be sold and dispensed at professional
18 sporting events and at professional concerts and other
19 entertainment events conducted on premises owned by the Forest
20 Preserve District of Kane County, subject to the control of the
21 District Commissioners and applicable local law, provided that
22 dram shop liability insurance is provided at maximum coverage
23 limits so as to hold the District harmless from all financial
24 loss, damage and harm.

25 Nothing in this Section shall preclude the sale or delivery
26 of beer and wine at a State or county fair or the sale or

1 delivery of beer or wine at a city fair in any otherwise lawful
2 manner.

3 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in buildings in
4 State parks under the control of the Department of Natural
5 Resources, provided:

6 a. the State park has overnight lodging facilities with
7 some restaurant facilities or, not having overnight
8 lodging facilities, has restaurant facilities which serve
9 complete luncheon and dinner or supper meals,

10 b. (blank), and

11 c. the alcoholic liquors are sold by the State park
12 lodge or restaurant concessionaire only during the hours
13 from 11 o'clock a.m. until 12 o'clock midnight.
14 Notwithstanding any other provision of this Act, alcoholic
15 liquor sold by the State park or restaurant concessionaire
16 is not subject to the provisions of Articles IV and IX.

17 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in buildings on
18 properties under the control of the Historic Sites and
19 Preservation Division of the Historic Preservation Agency or
20 the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum provided:

21 a. the property has overnight lodging facilities with
22 some restaurant facilities or, not having overnight
23 lodging facilities, has restaurant facilities which serve
24 complete luncheon and dinner or supper meals,

25 b. consent to the issuance of a license to sell
26 alcoholic liquors in the buildings has been filed with the

1 commission by the Historic Sites and Preservation Division
2 of the Historic Preservation Agency or the Abraham Lincoln
3 Presidential Library and Museum, and

4 c. the alcoholic liquors are sold by the lodge or
5 restaurant concessionaire only during the hours from 11
6 o'clock a.m. until 12 o'clock midnight.

7 The sale of alcoholic liquors pursuant to this Section does
8 not authorize the establishment and operation of facilities
9 commonly called taverns, saloons, bars, cocktail lounges, and
10 the like except as a part of lodge and restaurant facilities in
11 State parks or golf courses owned by Forest Preserve Districts
12 with a population of less than 3,000,000 or municipalities or
13 park districts.

14 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in the Springfield
15 Administration Building of the Department of Transportation
16 and the Illinois State Armory in Springfield; provided, that
17 the controlling government authority may consent to such sales
18 only if

19 a. the request is from a not-for-profit organization;

20 b. such sales would not impede normal operations of the
21 departments involved;

22 c. the not-for-profit organization provides dram shop
23 liability in maximum insurance coverage limits and agrees
24 to defend, save harmless and indemnify the State of
25 Illinois from all financial loss, damage or harm;

26 d. no such sale shall be made during normal working

1 hours of the State of Illinois; and

2 e. the consent is in writing.

3 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail in buildings in
4 recreational areas of river conservancy districts under the
5 control of, or leased from, the river conservancy districts.
6 Such sales are subject to reasonable local regulations as
7 provided in Article IV; however, no such regulations may
8 prohibit or substantially impair the sale of alcoholic liquors
9 on Sundays or Holidays.

10 Alcoholic liquors may be provided in long term care
11 facilities owned or operated by a county under Division 5-21 or
12 5-22 of the Counties Code, when approved by the facility
13 operator and not in conflict with the regulations of the
14 Illinois Department of Public Health, to residents of the
15 facility who have had their consumption of the alcoholic
16 liquors provided approved in writing by a physician licensed to
17 practice medicine in all its branches.

18 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and dispensed in
19 State housing assigned to employees of the Department of
20 Corrections. No person shall furnish or allow to be furnished
21 any alcoholic liquors to any prisoner confined in any jail,
22 reformatory, prison or house of correction except upon a
23 physician's prescription for medicinal purposes.

24 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail or dispensed at the
25 Willard Ice Building in Springfield, at the State Library in
26 Springfield, and at Illinois State Museum facilities by (1) an

1 agency of the State, whether legislative, judicial or
2 executive, provided that such agency first obtains written
3 permission to sell or dispense alcoholic liquors from the
4 controlling government authority, or by (2) a not-for-profit
5 organization, provided that such organization:

6 a. Obtains written consent from the controlling
7 government authority;

8 b. Sells or dispenses the alcoholic liquors in a manner
9 that does not impair normal operations of State offices
10 located in the building;

11 c. Sells or dispenses alcoholic liquors only in
12 connection with an official activity in the building;

13 d. Provides, or its catering service provides, dram
14 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in
15 which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless and
16 indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss,
17 damage or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of
18 alcoholic liquors.

19 Nothing in this Act shall prevent a not-for-profit
20 organization or agency of the State from employing the services
21 of a catering establishment for the selling or dispensing of
22 alcoholic liquors at authorized functions.

23 The controlling government authority for the Willard Ice
24 Building in Springfield shall be the Director of the Department
25 of Revenue. The controlling government authority for Illinois
26 State Museum facilities shall be the Director of the Illinois

1 State Museum. The controlling government authority for the
2 State Library in Springfield shall be the Secretary of State.

3 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail or
4 dispensed at any facility, property or building under the
5 jurisdiction of the Historic Sites and Preservation Division of
6 the Historic Preservation Agency or the Abraham Lincoln
7 Presidential Library and Museum where the delivery, sale or
8 dispensing is by (1) an agency of the State, whether
9 legislative, judicial or executive, provided that such agency
10 first obtains written permission to sell or dispense alcoholic
11 liquors from a controlling government authority, or by (2) an
12 individual or organization provided that such individual or
13 organization:

14 a. Obtains written consent from the controlling
15 government authority;

16 b. Sells or dispenses the alcoholic liquors in a manner
17 that does not impair normal workings of State offices or
18 operations located at the facility, property or building;

19 c. Sells or dispenses alcoholic liquors only in
20 connection with an official activity of the individual or
21 organization in the facility, property or building;

22 d. Provides, or its catering service provides, dram
23 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in
24 which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless and
25 indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss,
26 damage or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of

1 alcoholic liquors.

2 The controlling government authority for the Historic
3 Sites and Preservation Division of the Historic Preservation
4 Agency shall be the Director of the Historic Sites and
5 Preservation, and the controlling government authority for the
6 Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum shall be the
7 Director of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and
8 Museum.

9 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail or
10 dispensed for consumption at the Michael Bilandic Building at
11 160 North LaSalle Street, Chicago IL 60601, after the normal
12 business hours of any day care or child care facility located
13 in the building, by (1) a commercial tenant or subtenant
14 conducting business on the premises under a lease made pursuant
15 to Section 405-315 of the Department of Central Management
16 Services Law (20 ILCS 405/405-315), provided that such tenant
17 or subtenant who accepts delivery of, sells, or dispenses
18 alcoholic liquors shall procure and maintain dram shop
19 liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in which the
20 carrier agrees to defend, indemnify, and save harmless the
21 State of Illinois from all financial loss, damage, or harm
22 arising out of the delivery, sale, or dispensing of alcoholic
23 liquors, or by (2) an agency of the State, whether legislative,
24 judicial, or executive, provided that such agency first obtains
25 written permission to accept delivery of and sell or dispense
26 alcoholic liquors from the Director of Central Management

1 Services, or by (3) a not-for-profit organization, provided
2 that such organization:

3 a. obtains written consent from the Department of
4 Central Management Services;

5 b. accepts delivery of and sells or dispenses the
6 alcoholic liquors in a manner that does not impair normal
7 operations of State offices located in the building;

8 c. accepts delivery of and sells or dispenses alcoholic
9 liquors only in connection with an official activity in the
10 building; and

11 d. provides, or its catering service provides, dram
12 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in
13 which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless, and
14 indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss,
15 damage, or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of
16 alcoholic liquors.

17 Nothing in this Act shall prevent a not-for-profit
18 organization or agency of the State from employing the services
19 of a catering establishment for the selling or dispensing of
20 alcoholic liquors at functions authorized by the Director of
21 Central Management Services.

22 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail or dispensed at the
23 James R. Thompson Center in Chicago, subject to the provisions
24 of Section 7.4 of the State Property Control Act, and 222 South
25 College Street in Springfield, Illinois by (1) a commercial
26 tenant or subtenant conducting business on the premises under a

1 lease or sublease made pursuant to Section 405-315 of the
2 Department of Central Management Services Law (20 ILCS
3 405/405-315), provided that such tenant or subtenant who sells
4 or dispenses alcoholic liquors shall procure and maintain dram
5 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in
6 which the carrier agrees to defend, indemnify and save harmless
7 the State of Illinois from all financial loss, damage or harm
8 arising out of the sale or dispensing of alcoholic liquors, or
9 by (2) an agency of the State, whether legislative, judicial or
10 executive, provided that such agency first obtains written
11 permission to sell or dispense alcoholic liquors from the
12 Director of Central Management Services, or by (3) a
13 not-for-profit organization, provided that such organization:

14 a. Obtains written consent from the Department of
15 Central Management Services;

16 b. Sells or dispenses the alcoholic liquors in a manner
17 that does not impair normal operations of State offices
18 located in the building;

19 c. Sells or dispenses alcoholic liquors only in
20 connection with an official activity in the building;

21 d. Provides, or its catering service provides, dram
22 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in
23 which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless and
24 indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss,
25 damage or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of
26 alcoholic liquors.

1 Nothing in this Act shall prevent a not-for-profit
2 organization or agency of the State from employing the services
3 of a catering establishment for the selling or dispensing of
4 alcoholic liquors at functions authorized by the Director of
5 Central Management Services.

6 Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered at any facility
7 owned by the Illinois Sports Facilities Authority provided that
8 dram shop liability insurance has been made available in a
9 form, with such coverage and in such amounts as the Authority
10 reasonably determines is necessary.

11 Alcoholic liquors may be sold at retail or dispensed at the
12 Rockford State Office Building by (1) an agency of the State,
13 whether legislative, judicial or executive, provided that such
14 agency first obtains written permission to sell or dispense
15 alcoholic liquors from the Department of Central Management
16 Services, or by (2) a not-for-profit organization, provided
17 that such organization:

18 a. Obtains written consent from the Department of
19 Central Management Services;

20 b. Sells or dispenses the alcoholic liquors in a manner
21 that does not impair normal operations of State offices
22 located in the building;

23 c. Sells or dispenses alcoholic liquors only in
24 connection with an official activity in the building;

25 d. Provides, or its catering service provides, dram
26 shop liability insurance in maximum coverage limits and in

1 which the carrier agrees to defend, save harmless and
2 indemnify the State of Illinois from all financial loss,
3 damage or harm arising out of the selling or dispensing of
4 alcoholic liquors.

5 Nothing in this Act shall prevent a not-for-profit
6 organization or agency of the State from employing the services
7 of a catering establishment for the selling or dispensing of
8 alcoholic liquors at functions authorized by the Department of
9 Central Management Services.

10 Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered in a building
11 that is owned by McLean County, situated on land owned by the
12 county in the City of Bloomington, and used by the McLean
13 County Historical Society if the sale or delivery is approved
14 by an ordinance adopted by the county board, and the
15 municipality in which the building is located may not prohibit
16 that sale or delivery, notwithstanding any other provision of
17 this Section. The regulation of the sale and delivery of
18 alcoholic liquor in a building that is owned by McLean County,
19 situated on land owned by the county, and used by the McLean
20 County Historical Society as provided in this paragraph is an
21 exclusive power and function of the State and is a denial and
22 limitation under Article VII, Section 6, subsection (h) of the
23 Illinois Constitution of the power of a home rule municipality
24 to regulate that sale and delivery.

25 Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered in any building
26 situated on land held in trust for any school district

1 organized under Article 34 of the School Code, if the building
2 is not used for school purposes and if the sale or delivery is
3 approved by the board of education.

4 ~~Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail in
5 any building owned by the Six Mile Regional Library District,
6 provided that the delivery and sale is approved by the board of
7 trustees of the Six Mile Regional Library District and the
8 delivery and sale is limited to a maximum of 6 library district
9 events per year. The Six Mile Regional Library District shall
10 provide dram shop liability in maximum insurance coverage
11 limits so as to save harmless the library district from all
12 financial loss, damage, or harm.~~

13 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at retail in
14 any building owned by a public library district, provided that
15 the delivery and sale is approved by the board of trustees of
16 that public library district and is limited to library
17 fundraising events or programs of a cultural or educational
18 nature. Before the board of trustees of a public library
19 district may approve the delivery and sale of alcoholic
20 liquors, the board of trustees of the public library district
21 must have a written policy that has been approved by the board
22 of trustees of the public library district governing when and
23 under what circumstances alcoholic liquors may be delivered to
24 and sold at retail on property owned by that public library
25 district. The written policy must (i) provide that no alcoholic
26 liquor may be sold, distributed, or consumed in any area of the

1 library accessible to the general public during the event or
2 program, (ii) prohibit the removal of alcoholic liquor from the
3 venue during the event, and (iii) require that steps be taken
4 to prevent the sale or distribution of alcoholic liquor to
5 persons under the age of 21. Any public library district that
6 has alcoholic liquor delivered to or sold at retail on property
7 owned by the public library district shall provide dram shop
8 liability insurance in maximum insurance coverage limits so as
9 to save harmless the public library districts from all
10 financial loss, damage, or harm.

11 Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered in buildings
12 owned by the Community Building Complex Committee of Boone
13 County, Illinois if the person or facility selling or
14 dispensing the alcoholic liquor has provided dram shop
15 liability insurance with coverage and in amounts that the
16 Committee reasonably determines are necessary.

17 Alcoholic liquors may be sold or delivered in the building
18 located at 1200 Centerville Avenue in Belleville, Illinois and
19 occupied by either the Belleville Area Special Education
20 District or the Belleville Area Special Services Cooperative.

21 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at the Louis
22 Joliet Renaissance Center, City Center Campus, located at 214
23 N. Ottawa Street, Joliet, and the Food Services/Culinary Arts
24 Department facilities, Main Campus, located at 1215 Houbolt
25 Road, Joliet, owned by or under the control of Joliet Junior
26 College, Illinois Community College District No. 525.

1 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at Triton
2 College, Illinois Community College District No. 504.

3 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at the
4 College of DuPage, Illinois Community College District No. 502.

5 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold on any
6 property owned, operated, or controlled by Lewis and Clark
7 Community College, Illinois Community College District No.
8 536.

9 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at the
10 building located at 446 East Hickory Avenue in Apple River,
11 Illinois, owned by the Apple River Fire Protection District,
12 and occupied by the Apple River Community Association if the
13 alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in connection with
14 organized functions approved by the Apple River Community
15 Association for which the planned attendance is 20 or more
16 persons and if the person or facility selling or dispensing the
17 alcoholic liquor has provided dram shop liability insurance in
18 maximum limits so as to hold harmless the Apple River Fire
19 Protection District, the Village of Apple River, and the Apple
20 River Community Association from all financial loss, damage,
21 and harm.

22 Alcoholic liquors may be delivered to and sold at the Sikia
23 Restaurant, Kennedy King College Campus, located at 740 West
24 63rd Street, Chicago, and at the Food Services in the Great
25 Hall/Washburne Culinary Institute Department facility, Kennedy
26 King College Campus, located at 740 West 63rd Street, Chicago,

1 owned by or under the control of City Colleges of Chicago,
2 Illinois Community College District No. 508.
