## 2 Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, 3 represented in the General Assembly:

4 Section 5. The Comprehensive Housing Planning Act is 5 amended by changing Sections 5, 10, 15, 20, and 25 as follows:

7 Sec. 5. Definitions. In this Act:

8 "Authority" means the Illinois Housing Development9 Authority.

"Executive Committee" means the Executive Committee of the 10 State Housing Task Force, which shall consist of 13 members of 11 the State Housing Task Force: the Chair, the Vice-Chair, a 12 representative of the Governor's Office, a representative of 13 14 the Governor's Office of Management and Budget responsible for Bond Cap allocation in the State, the Director of Commerce and 15 16 Economic Opportunity or his or her designee, the Secretary of Human Services or his or her designee, and 7 housing experts 17 from the State Housing Task Force as designated by the 18 19 Governor.

1 Secretaries of Services Human and Transportation; the 2 Directors of the State Departments of Aging, Children and 3 Family Services, Corrections, Commerce and Economic Opportunity, Emergency Management, Financial and Professional 4 5 Regulation, Healthcare and Family Services, Human Rights, Juvenile Justice, Natural Resources, Public 6 Health, and Affairs; the 7 Veterans' Director of the Environmental 8 Protection Agency; a representative of the Governor's Office; 9 and a representative of the Governor's Office of Management and 10 Budget.

11 "State Housing Task Force" or "Task Force" means a task 12 force comprised of the following persons or their designees: 13 the Executive Director of the Authority; a representative of the Governor's Office; a representative of the Lieutenant 14 15 Governor's Office; and the Interagency Committee the 16 Secretaries of Human Services and Transportation; the 17 Directors of the State Departments of Aging, Children and Family Services, Commerce and Economic Opportunity, Financial 18 19 and Professional Regulation, Healthcare and Family Services, 20 Human Rights, Natural Resources, Public Health, and Veterans! 21 Affairs; the Director of the Environmental Protection Agency; 22 and a representative of the Governor's Office of Management and 23 Budget. The Governor may also invite and appoint the following 24 to the Task Force: a representative of the Illinois Institute 25 for Rural Affairs of Western Illinois University; representatives of the U. S. Departments of Housing and Urban 26

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Development (HUD) and Agriculture <u>Rural Development;</u> and up to 1 2 18 housing experts, with proportional representation from 3 urban, suburban, and rural areas throughout the State. The Speaker of the Illinois House of Representatives, the President 4 5 of the Illinois Senate, the Minority Leader of the Illinois 6 House of Representatives, and the Minority Leader of the 7 Illinois Senate may each appoint one representative to the Task 8 Force. The Executive Director of the Authority shall serve as 9 Chair of the Task Force. The Governor shall appoint a housing 10 expert from the non-governmental sector to serve as Vice-Chair. 11 (Source: P.A. 94-965, eff. 6-30-06.)

13 Sec. 10. Purpose. In order to maintain the economic health 14 of its communities, the State must have a comprehensive and 15 unified policy for the allocation of resources for affordable 16 housing and supportive services for historically underserved populations throughout the State. Executive Order 2003-18 17 18 shall be codified into this Act. The purposes of this Act are  $\tau$ issued September 16, 2003, created the Illinois Housing 19 Initiative through December 31, 2008, which led to the adoption 20 21 of the first Annual Comprehensive Housing Plan for the State of 22 Illinois. The General Assembly determines that it now necessary to codify provisions of Executive Order 2003-18 in 23 24 order to accomplish the following:

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(1) address the need to make available quality housing

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at a variety of price points in communities throughout the
 State;

3 (2) overcome the shortage of affordable housing, which
4 threatens the viability of many communities <u>and has</u>
5 <u>significant social costs</u>, <u>such as homelessness</u>,
6 <u>concentration of poverty</u>, <u>and unnecessary</u>
7 <u>institutionalization</u>;

8 (3) meet the need for safe, sanitary, and accessible 9 affordable <u>and community-based</u> housing and supportive 10 services for <u>elderly persons and</u> people with disabilities 11 <u>and other populations with special needs</u>;

12 (4) promote a full range of quality housing choices
13 near job opportunities jobs, transit options, and related
14 other amenities;

15 (5) meet the needs of constituencies that have been 16 historically underserved and segregated due to barriers 17 and trends in the existing housing market or insufficient 18 resources;

19 (6) facilitate the preservation of ownership of
20 existing homes and rental housing in communities;

(7) create new housing opportunities and, where
 appropriate, promote mixed-income communities; and

<u>(7.5) maximize federal funding opportunities for</u>
 affordable housing or the services people need to maintain
 their housing with required State funding, such as, without
 limitation, for federal Continuum of Care networks and HOME

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Investment Partnerships Program project sponsors; and 1 2 (8) encourage development of State incentives for communities to create a mix of housing to meet the needs of 3 current and future residents. 4 (Source: P.A. 94-965, eff. 6-30-06.) 5 6 (310 ILCS 110/15) 7 Sec. 15. Annual Comprehensive Housing Plan. 8 (a) During the period from the effective date of this Act through December 31, 2026 June 30, 2016, the State of Illinois 9 10 shall prepare and be guided by an annual comprehensive housing 11 plan ("Annual Comprehensive Housing Plan") that is consistent 12 with the affirmative fair housing provisions of the Illinois Human Rights Act and specifically addresses the following 13 14 underserved populations: 15 (1) households earning below 50% of the area median

(1) households earning below 50% of the area median
 income, with particular emphasis on households earning
 below 30% of the area median income;

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(2) low-income senior citizens;

(3) low-income persons with any form of disability, including, but not limited to, physical disability, developmental disability, <u>intellectual disability</u>, mental illness, co-occurring mental illness and substance abuse disorder, and HIV/AIDS;

24 (4) homeless persons and persons determined to be at
 25 risk of homelessness;

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(5) low-income and moderate-income persons unable to 1 afford housing that has access to near work opportunities 2 3 or transportation options; and (6) low-income persons residing in communities with 4 5 existing affordable housing that is in danger of becoming 6 unaffordable or being lost; -7 (7) low-income people residing in communities with 8 ongoing community revitalization efforts; and 9 (8) other special needs populations, including people 10 with criminal records and veterans experiencing or at risk 11 of homelessness. 12 (b) The Annual Comprehensive Housing Plan shall include, but need not be limited to, the following: 13 (1) The identification of all funding sources for which 14 15 the State has administrative control that are available for 16 housing construction, rehabilitation, preservation, operating or rental subsidies, and supportive services. 17 (2) Goals for the number, affordability for different 18 19 income levels, and types of housing units to be 20 constructed, preserved, or rehabilitated each year for the underserved populations identified in subsection (a) of 21 22 Section 15, based on available housing resources. 23 (3) Funding recommendations for types of programs for housing construction, preservation, rehabilitation, 24 and

25 supportive services, where necessary, related to the 26 underserved populations identified in subsection (a) of SB2271 Engrossed - 7 - LRB099 18546 KTG 42925 b

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Section 15, based on the Annual Comprehensive Housing Plan.

2 (4) Specific actions needed to ensure the coordination 3 of State government resources that can be used to build or preserve affordable housing, provide services to accompany 4 5 the creation of affordable housing, and prevent 6 homelessness.

7 (5) Recommended State actions that promote the 8 construction, preservation, and rehabilitation of 9 affordable housing by private-sector, not-for-profit, and 10 government entities and address those practices that 11 impede such promotion.

12 (6) Specific suggestions for incentives for counties 13 and municipalities to develop and implement local 14 comprehensive housing plans that would encourage a mix of 15 housing to meet the needs of current and future residents.

16 (7)Identification of options that counties, 17 municipalities, and other local jurisdictions, including public housing authorities, can take to construct, 18 19 rehabilitate, or preserve housing in their own communities 20 for the underserved populations identified in Section 10 of this Act. 21

(c) The Interagency <u>Committee</u> Subcommittee, with staff support and coordination assistance from the Authority, shall develop the Annual Comprehensive Housing Plan. The State Housing Task Force shall provide advice and guidance to the Interagency <u>Committee</u> Subcommittee in developing the Plan. The SB2271 Engrossed - 8 - LRB099 18546 KTG 42925 b

Interagency Committee Subcommittee shall deliver the Annual 1 2 Comprehensive Housing Plan to the Governor and the General 3 Assembly by January 15  $\frac{1}{2}$  of each year or the first business day thereafter. The Authority, on behalf of the Interagency 4 5 Committee Subcommittee, shall prepare an Annual Progress 6 <u>Report</u> an interim report by September 30 and a final report by 7 April 1 of the following year to the Governor and the General 8 Assembly on the progress made toward achieving the projected 9 goals, as defined in paragraph (2) of subsection (b), of the 10 Annual Comprehensive Housing Plan during the previous calendar 11 year. These reports shall include estimates of revenues, 12 expenditures, obligations, bond allocations, and fund balances 13 for all programs or funds addressed in the Annual Comprehensive 14 Housing Plan.

15 (d) The Authority shall provide staffing to the Interagency Committee and Subcommittee, the Task Force, and the Executive 16 17 Committee of the Task Force. It shall also provide the staff support needed to help coordinate the implementation of the 18 19 Annual Comprehensive Housing Plan during the course of the 20 year. The Authority shall be eligible for reimbursement of up to \$300,000 per year for such staff support costs from a 21 22 designated funding source, if available, or from the Illinois 23 Affordable Housing Trust Fund.

Involve, to the extent possible, appropriate 11 (4) 12 representatives of the federal government, local 13 municipalities, governments and public housing authorities, local continuum-of-care, for-profit, and 14 15 not-for-profit developers, supportive housing providers, 16 business, labor, lenders, advocates for the underserved 17 populations named in this Act, and fair housing agencies.

(5) Have input into the development of the Annual
 Comprehensive Housing Plan and the Annual <u>Progress</u> Report
 prepared by the Authority before the Authority submits them
 to the Task Force.
