## Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

- Section 5. The School Code is amended by adding Section 5 2-3.167 as follows:

- 7 <u>Sec. 2-3.167. Advisory Committee on Workforce Shortages.</u>
- (a) The General Assembly recognizes that this State's 8 9 commitment to enabling all citizens to succeed in a comprehensive career development system will play a vital role 10 in ensuring a continual wealth of prosperity, innovation, and 11 opportunity to our communities. Illinois Career and Technical 12 Education (CTE) programs educate over 300,000 high school 13 14 students annually through programs aimed to increase career development in fields such as agriculture, business marketing 15 and computer sciences, family and consumer sciences, health 16 science technology, and engineering education. In 2014, 95.3% 17 of the students enrolled in CTE graduated from high school; 18 19 77.0% of CTE special needs students graduated from high school. includes students with disabilities, 20 21 economically-disadvantaged students, students-as-parents, 22 students preparing for nontraditional fields, displaced

homemakers, and limited English proficiency students.

The General Assembly also recognizes the importance of providing quality college and career readiness programs for its citizens. It is imperative to focus on allotting resources to core, front-line services that will have an immediate impact on both the student and the community at large. Career and Technical Education programs are dedicated to serving this State's citizens by aligning challenging secondary education curricula with relevant career and technical training that adequately prepares students to succeed in postsecondary education. CTE students routinely continue into postsecondary education. In 2014, more than 65.9% of CTE concentrators enrolled in either 2-year or 4-year institutions, according to National Student Clearinghouse data. In order to properly serve the educational needs of every citizen, the General Assembly intends to rededicate itself to funding Career and Technical Education programs that are both meaningful and essential to the long-term sustainability of this State's workforce.

- (b) The Advisory Committee on Workforce Shortages is established to conduct a review of existing career and technical education programs administered by the State and make recommendations on industry-recognized certification programs designed to mitigate workforce shortages in Illinois. The Advisory Committee shall consist of the following members:
  - (1) One member of the Senate, appointed by the President of the Senate.
    - (2) One member of the Senate, appointed by the Minority

1	Leader of the Senate.
2	(3) One member of the House of Representatives,
3	appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
4	(4) One member of the House of Representatives,
5	appointed by the Minority Leader of the House of
6	Representatives.
7	(5) One representative from the State Board of
8	Education, appointed by the State Superintendent of
9	Education.
10	(6) One representative from the Illinois Community
11	College Board, appointed by the Executive Director of the
12	Illinois Community College Board.
13	(7) One representative from the Department of

17	and vocational training, appointed by the Governor.

24	(f) The Advisory Committee on Workforce Shortages is
25	abolished and this Section is repealed on January 1, 2017.
