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AN ACT concerning education.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois,represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The School Code is amended by changing
Sections 27-9.1 and 27-9.2 as follows:

6 (105 ILCS 5/27-9.1) (from Ch. 122, par. 27-9.1)

7 Sec. 27-9.1. Sex Education.

8 (a) No pupil shall be required to take or participate in any class or course in comprehensive sex education if his 9 parent or guardian submits written objection thereto, and 10 refusal to take or participate in such course or program 11 shall not be reason for suspension or expulsion of such 12 13 pupil. Each class or course in comprehensive sex education offered in any of grades 6 through 12 shall 14 include 15 instruction on the prevention, transmission and spread of 16 AIDS. Nothing in this Section prohibits instruction in sanitation, hygiene or traditional courses in biology. 17

(b) All public elementary, junior high, and senior high school classes that teach sex education and discuss sexual intercourse shall emphasize that abstinence is the expected norm in that abstinence from sexual intercourse is the only protection that is 100% effective against unwanted teenage pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases, and acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS) when transmitted sexually.

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(c) <u>In this subsection (c):</u>

29 <u>"Medically accurate" means verified or supported by</u>

1 recognized as accurate and objective by professional 2 organizations and agencies with expertise in the relevant 3 field, such as the Centers for Disease Control and 4 Prevention. 5 All sex education courses that discuss sexual intercourse б shall satisfy the following criteria: 7 (0.5) Factual information presented in course 8 material and instruction shall be medically accurate and 9 <u>objective.</u> (1) All course material and instruction shall be 10 11 age appropriate. (1.5) Course material and instruction shall stress 12 13 that abstinence is the only contraceptive method that is 100% effective and that all other methods of 14 contraception carry a risk of failure in preventing 15 16 unwanted teenage pregnancy. (1.7) Course material and instruction shall present 17 the latest medically factual information regarding both 18 19 the possible side effects and health benefits of all forms of contraception, including the success and failure 20 rates for the prevention of pregnancy and sexually 21 22 transmitted diseases. 23 (2) Course material and instruction shall teach honor and respect for monogamous heterosexual marriage. 24 25 (3) Course material and instruction shall stress that pupils should abstain from sexual intercourse until 26 they are ready for marriage. 27 (4) Course material and instruction shall include a 28 29 discussion of the possible emotional and psychological 30 consequences of preadolescent and adolescent sexual intercourse outside of marriage and the consequences of 31 unwanted adolescent pregnancy. 32 33 (5) Course material and instruction shall stress 34 that sexually transmitted diseases are serious possible

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hazards of sexual intercourse. Pupils shall be provided
 with statistics based on the latest medical information
 citing the failure and success rates of condoms in
 preventing AIDS and other sexually transmitted diseases.

5 (6) Course material and instruction shall advise 6 pupils of the laws pertaining to their financial 7 responsibility to children born in and out of wedlock.

8 (7) Course material and instruction shall advise 9 pupils that it is unlawful for males or females of any 10 age to engage in sexual conduct or have sexual relations 11 with a minor as specified in of-the--eircumstances--under which--it--is-unlawful-for-males-to-have-sexual-relations 12 13 with-females-under-the-age-of-18-to--whom--they--are--not married--pursuant--to Article 12 of the Criminal Code of 14 15 1961, as now or hereafter amended.

16 (7.5) Course material and instruction shall 17 emphasize that the pupil has the power to control 18 personal behavior. Pupils shall be encouraged to base 19 their actions on reasoning, self-discipline, sense of 20 responsibility, self-control, and ethical considerations, 21 such as respect for oneself and others.

22 (8) Course material and instruction shall teach pupils to not make unwanted physical and verbal sexual 23 24 advances and how to say no to unwanted sexual advances and shall include information about verbal, physical, and 25 visual sexual assault, including without limitation 26 27 nonconsensual sexual advances, nonconsensual physical sexual contact, and rape by an acquaintance, commonly 28 29 referred to as date rape. This course material and instruction shall contain methods of preventing sexual 30 31 assault by an acquaintance, including exercising good judgment and avoiding behavior that impairs good 32 judgment, and Pupils-shall-be-taught-that-it-is-wrong-to 33 take-advantage-of--or--to--exploit--another--person---The 34

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material--and--instruction shall also encourage youth to resist negative peer pressure. This course material and instruction shall inform pupils of the potential legal consequences of sexual assault by an acquaintance. Specifically, pupils shall be advised that it is unlawful to touch an intimate part of another person as specified in the Criminal Code of 1961.

8 (9) Course material and instruction shall teach 9 pupils that it is wrong to take advantage of or to 10 exploit another person.

(10) Course material and instruction shall be free
 of racial, ethnic, and gender biases.

13 (d) An opportunity shall be afforded to parents or 14 guardians to examine the instructional materials to be used 15 in such class or course.

17 (105 ILCS 5/27-9.2) (from Ch. 122, par. 27-9.2)

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Sec. 27-9.2. Family Life.

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<u>(a)</u> If 19 school district provides courses of anv 20 instruction designed to promote wholesome and comprehensive 21 understanding of the emotional, psychological, physiological, hygienic and social responsibility aspects of family life, 22 then such courses of instruction shall include the teaching 23 24 of the alternatives to abortion, appropriate to the various grade levels; and whenever such courses of instruction are 25 in any of grades 6 through 12, then such courses 26 provided shall include instruction on 27 also the prevention, 28 transmission and spread of AIDS. However, no pupil shall be required to take or participate in any family life class or 29 course on AIDS instruction if his parent or guardian submits 30 written objection thereto, and refusal to take or participate 31 in such course or program shall not be reason for suspension 32 or expulsion of such pupil. 33

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1 2 (10) Course material and instruction shall be free of racial, ethnic, and gender biases.

3 <u>(c)</u> The State Superintendent of Education shall prepare 4 and make available to local school districts courses of 5 instruction designed to satisfy the requirements of this 6 Section.

7 The State Superintendent of Education shall develop a procedure for evaluating and measuring the effectiveness of 8 9 the family life courses of instruction in each local school district, including the setting of reasonable goals for 10 11 reduced sexual activity, sexually transmitted diseases and premarital pregnancy. The goals shall be set by the beginning 12 of the 1991-92 school year. The State Superintendent shall 13 distribute a copy of the procedure to each local school 14 district. Each local school district may develop additional 15 16 procedures or methods for measuring the effectiveness of the family life courses of instruction within the district. 17 18 Before the beginning of the 1993-94 school year, the State 19 Superintendent shall collect and evaluate all relevant data to determine whether the goals are being achieved. 20 (Source: P.A. 86-941.) 21

22 Section 10. The Critical Health Problems and 23 Comprehensive Health Education Act is amended by changing 24 Sections 2 and 3 as follows:

26 Sec. 2. Definitions. <u>In this Act</u>, the following terms 27 shall have the following meanings respectively prescribed for 28 them, except as the context otherwise requires:

(a) "Comprehensive Health Education Program": a
systematic and extensive educational program designed to
provide a variety of learning experiences based upon
scientific knowledge of the human organism as it functions

1 within its environment which will favorably influence the 2 knowledge, attitudes, values and practices of Illinois school 3 youth; and which will aid them in making wise personal 4 decisions in matters of health.

5 <u>"Factual information" includes without limitation</u> 6 <u>medical, psychiatric, psychological, empirical, and</u> 7 <u>statistical statements.</u>

8 <u>"Medically accurate" means verified or supported by</u> 9 <u>research conducted in compliance with scientific methods,</u> 10 <u>published in peer-review journals, where appropriate, and</u> 11 <u>recognized as accurate and objective by professional</u> 12 <u>organizations and agencies with expertise in the relevant</u> 13 <u>field, such as the Centers for Disease Control and</u> 14 <u>Prevention.</u>

17 Sec. 3. Comprehensive Health Education Program.

(a) The program established under this Act 18 shall but not be limited to, the following major 19 include, 20 educational areas as a basis for curricula in all elementary 21 and secondary schools in this State: human ecology and 22 health, human growth and development, the emotional, hygienic physiological, 23 psychological, and social responsibilities of family life, including sexual abstinence 24 25 until marriage, prevention and control of disease, including instruction in grades 6 through 12 on the prevention, 26 transmission and spread of AIDS, public and environmental 27 health, consumer health, safety education and 28 disaster 29 survival, mental health and illness, personal health habits, alcohol, drug use, and abuse including the medical and legal 30 31 ramifications of alcohol, drug, and tobacco use, abuse during 32 pregnancy, sexual abstinence until marriage, tobacco, nutrition, and dental health. 33

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1	(b) All comprehensive health education programs
2	established under this Act shall satisfy the following
3	<u>criteria:</u>
4	(1) Factual information presented in course

(c) Notwithstanding the above educational areas, the 27 following areas may also be included as a basis for curricula 28 29 in all elementary and secondary schools in this State: basic first aid (including, but not limited to, cardiopulmonary 30 resuscitation and the Heimlich maneuver), early prevention 31 and detection of cancer, heart disease, diabetes, stroke, and 32 the prevention of child abuse, neglect, and suicide. The 33 school board of each public elementary and secondary school 34

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1 in the State is encouraged to have in its employ, or on its 2 volunteer staff, at least one person who is certified, by the American Red Cross or by another qualified certifying agency, 3 4 as qualified to administer first aid and cardiopulmonary In addition, each school board is authorized 5 resuscitation. to allocate appropriate portions of its institute 6 or 7 inservice days to conduct training programs for teachers and 8 other school personnel who have expressed an interest in 9 becoming qualified to administer emergency first aid or cardiopulmonary resuscitation. School boards are urged to 10 11 encourage their teachers and other school personnel who coach 12 school athletic programs and other extracurricular school 13 activities to acquire, develop, and maintain the knowledge and skills necessary to properly administer first aid and 14 15 cardiopulmonary resuscitation in accordance with standards 16 and requirements established by the American Red Cross or another qualified certifying agency. 17

18 (d) No pupil shall be required to take or participate in 19 any class or course on AIDS or family life instruction if his 20 parent or guardian submits written objection thereto, and 21 refusal to take or participate in the course or program shall 22 not be reason for suspension or expulsion of the pupil.

23 (e) Curricula developed under programs established in accordance with this Act in the major educational area of 24 25 alcohol and drug use and abuse shall include classroom instruction in grades 5 through 12. The instruction, which 26 shall include matters relating to both the physical and legal 27 effects and ramifications of drug and substance abuse, shall 28 29 be integrated into existing curricula; and the State Board of 30 Education shall develop and make available to all elementary and secondary schools in this State instructional materials 31 and guidelines which will assist the schools in incorporating 32 the instruction into their existing curricula. In addition, 33 school districts may offer, as part of existing curricula 34

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during the school day or as part of an after school program, support services and instruction for pupils or pupils whose parent, parents, or guardians are chemically dependent.
