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AN ACT concerning vehicles.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois,represented in the General Assembly:

4 Section 5. The Illinois Vehicle Code is amended by 5 changing Sections 11-1201 and 11-1201.1 as follows:

6 (625 ILCS 5/11-1201) (from Ch. 95 1/2, par. 11-1201)
7 Sec. 11-1201. Obedience to signal indicating approach of
8 train.

(a) Whenever any person driving a vehicle approaches a 9 railroad grade crossing such person must exercise due care 10 and caution as the existence of a railroad track across a 11 highway is a warning of danger, and under any of the 12 13 circumstances stated in this Section, the driver shall stop within 50 feet but not less than 15 feet from the nearest 14 rail of the railroad and shall not proceed until he can do so 15 safely. The foregoing requirements shall apply when: 16

A clearly visible electric or mechanical signal
 device gives warning of the immediate approach of a
 railroad train;

20 2. A crossing gate is lowered or a human flagman 21 gives or continues to give a signal of the approach or 22 passage of a railroad train;

3. A railroad train approaching a highway crossing
emits a warning signal and such railroad train, by reason
of its speed or nearness to such crossing, is an
immediate hazard;

4. An approaching railroad train is plainly visibleand is in hazardous proximity to such crossing.

29 5. A railroad train is approaching so closely that30 an immediate hazard is created.

31 (b) No person shall drive any vehicle through, around or

1 under any crossing gate or barrier at a railroad crossing 2 while such gate or barrier is closed or is being opened or 3 closed.

The Department, and local authorities with the 4 (C) approval of the Department, are hereby authorized 5 to designate particularly dangerous highway grade crossings of 6 7 railroads and to erect stop signs thereat. When such stop signs are erected the driver of any vehicle shall stop within 8 50 feet but not less than 15 feet from the nearest rail of 9 such railroad and shall proceed only upon exercising due 10 11 care.

railroad grade crossing provided with 12 (d) At any 13 railroad crossbuck signs, without automatic, electric, or mechanical signal devices, crossing gates, or a human flagman 14 15 giving a signal of the approach or passage of a train, the 16 driver of a vehicle shall in obedience to the railroad crossbuck sign, yield the right-of-way and slow down to a 17 speed reasonable for the existing conditions and shall stop, 18 if required for safety, at a clearly marked stopped line, or 19 if no stop line, within 50 feet but not less than 15 feet 20 21 from the nearest rail of the railroad and shall not proceed 22 until he or she can do so safely. If a driver is involved in 23 a collision at a railroad crossing or interferes with the movement of a train after driving past the railroad crossbuck 24 25 sign, the collision or interference is prima facie evidence of the driver's failure to yield right-of-way. 26

(e) <u>It is unlawful to violate</u> A-vielatien-ef any part of
this Section. A first conviction of a person for a violation
of any part of this Section shall result in a mandatory fine
of \$250; all subsequent convictions of that person for any
violation of any part of this Section shall each result in a
mandatory fine of \$500 er-50-heurs-ef-community-service.

Sec. 11-1201.1. Automated Railroad Crossing Enforcement
System.

For the purposes of this Section, an automated 9 (a) 10 railroad grade crossing enforcement system is a system operated by a law enforcement agency that records a driver's 11 response to automatic, electrical or mechanical 12 signal devices and crossing gates. The system shall be designed to 13 14 obtain a clear photograph or other recorded image of the 15 vehicle, vehicle operator and the vehicle registration plate of a vehicle in violation of Section 11-1201. The photograph 16 17 or other recorded image shall also display the time, date and 18 location of the violation.

Commencing on January 1, 1996, the Illinois Commerce 19 (b) 20 Commission and the Commuter Rail Board of the Regional 21 Transportation Authority shall, in cooperation with local law 22 enforcement agencies, establish a <u>5</u> two year pilot program within a county with a population of between 750,000 and 23 automated railroad grade crossing 24 1,000,000 using an enforcement system. The Commission shall determine the 3 25 railroad grade crossings within that county that pose the 26 27 greatest threat to human life based upon the number of 28 accidents and fatalities at the crossings during the past 5 29 years and with approval of the local law enforcement agency equip the crossings with an automated railroad grade crossing 30 31 enforcement system.

32 (c) For each violation of Section 11-1201 recorded by an
 33 automatic railroad grade crossing system, the local law

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1 enforcement agency having jurisdiction shall issue a written 2 Uniform Traffic Citation of the violation to the registered owner of the vehicle <u>as the alleged violator.</u> 3 The Uniform 4 Traffic Citation shall be delivered to the registered owner 5 of the vehicle, by mail, within 30 days of the violation. 6 The Uniform Traffic Citation shall include the name and address of vehicle owner, the vehicle registration number, 7 the offense charged, the time, date, and location of the 8 9 violation, the first available court date and that the basis of the citation is the photograph or other recorded image 10 from the automated railroad grade crossing enforcement 11 12 system.

Uniform Traffic Citation 13 (d) The issued to the registered owner of the vehicle violator shall be accompanied 14 15 by a written notice, the contents of which is set forth in 16 subsection (d-1) of this Section, explaining document-which explains-the-violator's-rights-and-obligations--and how the 17 registered owner of the vehicle violator can elect to proceed 18 19 by either paying the fine or challenging the issuance of the Uniform Traffic Citation. 20

21 (d-1) <u>The written notice explaining the alleged</u>
22 <u>violator's rights and obligations must include the following</u>
23 <u>text:</u>

24 <u>"You have been served with the accompanying Uniform</u>
25 <u>Traffic Citation and cited with having violated Section</u>
26 <u>11-1201 of the Illinois Vehicle Code. You are subject to a</u>
27 <u>civil penalty. You can elect to proceed by:</u>

28 <u>1. Paying the fine; or</u>

29 <u>2. Challenging the issuance of the Uniform Traffic</u>
 30 <u>Citation in court.</u>

31 Your failure to proceed by performing one of these 32 options may result in refusal or suspension of the motor 33 vehicle registration."

34 <u>(e) Evidence.</u>

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1 (i) A certificate alleging that a violation of 2 11-1201 occurred, sworn to or affirmed by a duly 3 authorized agency, based on inspection of recorded images 4 produced by an automated railroad crossing enforcement 5 system are evidence of the facts contained in the 6 certificate and are admissible in any proceeding alleging 7 a violation under this Section.

8 (ii) Photographs or recorded images made by an 9 automatic railroad grade crossing enforcement system are 10 confidential and shall be made available only to the 11 alleged violator and governmental and law enforcement agencies for purposes of adjudicating a violation of 12 Section 11-1201 of the Illinois Vehicle Code. However, 13 any photograph or other recorded image evidencing a 14 15 violation of Section 11-1201 shall be admissible in any 16 proceeding resulting from the issuance of the Uniform Traffic Citation when there is reasonable and sufficient 17 proof of the accuracy of the camera or electronic 18 instrument recording the image. There is a rebuttable 19 20 presumption that the photograph or recorded image is 21 accurate if the camera or electronic recording instrument 22 was in good working order before and after the alleged offense on the day of the alleged offense. Photographs-or 23 24 recorded--images--made--by--an--automatic--railroad-grade crossing-enforcement-system-shall--be--confidential,--and 25 shall---be---made---available---only--to--the--defendant, 26 27 governmental--and--law--enforcement--agencies---for---the 28 purposes--of--adjudicating-a-violation-of-Section-11-1201 29 of-the-Illinois-Vehiele-Code.

30 (iii) Adjudication of liability shall be based on a
 31 preponderance of evidence.

32 (f) Rail crossings equipped with an automatic railroad 33 grade crossing enforcement system shall be posted with a sign 34 visible to approaching traffic stating that the railroad

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grade crossing is being monitored, that citations will be
 issued, and the amount of the fine for violation.

(q) The cost of the installation and maintenance of each 3 4 automatic railroad grade crossing enforcement system shall be paid from the Grade Crossing Protection Fund if the rail line 5 6 not owned by Commuter Rail Board of the Regional is 7 Transportation Authority. If the rail line is owned by the Commuter Rail Board of the Regional Transportation Authority, 8 9 the costs of the installation and maintenance shall be paid from the Regional Transportation Authority's portion of the 10 11 Public Transportation Fund.

12 (h) The Illinois Commerce Commission shall issue a 13 report to the General Assembly at the conclusion of the <u>5</u> two 14 year pilot program on the effectiveness of the automatic 15 railroad grade crossing enforcement system.

16 (i) If any part or parts of this Section are held by a 17 court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional, the 18 unconstitutionality shall not affect the validity of the 19 remaining parts of this Section. The General Assembly hereby 20 declares that it would have passed the remaining parts of 21 this Section if it had known that the other part or parts of 22 this Section would be declared unconstitutional.

<u>(j) Penalty.</u>

23

24 (i) A civil penalty of \$250 shall be imposed for a
25 first violation of this Section, and a civil penalty of
26 \$500 shall be imposed for a second or subsequent
27 violation.

(ii) The Secretary of State may suspend the
registration of the motor vehicle for up to 6 months for
a first offense and for any second or subsequent offense,
the Secretary of State must suspend the registration of
the motor vehicle for at least 6 months.
