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AN ACT concerning a youth service scholarship program.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois,represented in the General Assembly:

4 Section 1. Short title. This Act may be cited as the5 Youth Service Scholarship Act.

6 Section 5. Intent. It is the intent of the General 7 Assembly to establish the Youth Service Scholarship Program 8 to accomplish all of the following goals:

9 (1) Provide this State's youth with opportunities to do 10 all of the following:

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(A) Give back to their communities through service.

(B) Enhance their access to a college education.

13 (C) Develop, in "real life" situations, the skills
14 and understanding critical to their development as
15 students, workers, and community members.

16 (D) Develop a lifelong ethic of service and a
 17 richer understanding of citizenship in a democratic
 18 society.

(2) Deter juvenile delinquency by providing this State's
 youth with after school and intersession alternatives that
 promote public service.

22 (3) Form a partnership between schools and community 23 organizations dedicated to building responsibility and 24 broadening higher education opportunities for this State's 25 youth.

26 (4) Mobilize youth, an often neglected resource, in 27 service that meets the critical needs of their communities 28 by, for example, tutoring preschool children in reading, 29 assisting licensed providers' care for infants and toddlers, 30 helping with after school recreational programs and 31 nutritional programs for elementary school pupils, helping the frail and elderly to live independently, contributing to neighborhood cleanup and housing rehabilitation projects, and assisting their peers to become involved in community service.

5 Section 10. Definitions. In this Act:

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6 "Commission" means the Illinois Commission on Community7 Service.

"Program" means the Youth Service Scholarship Program.

9 Section 15. Establishment of Program; availability to10 consortia.

There is hereby established the Youth 11 (a) Service Scholarship Program, a pilot program, to be administered by 12 The Program shall be in effect for fiscal 13 the Commission. 14 years 2002 through 2006, and the Program shall be made available to consortia that are comprised of one or 15 more 16 school districts that operate schools with grades 9 through 17 12 and at least 3 community-based organizations. The consortia shall be selected for participation in the program 18 19 on a competitive basis by the Commission.

20 (b) A pupil may be selected by a consortium to earn а 21 scholarship while the pupil is enrolled in any of grades 9 through 12 in a public school located in this State that is 22 23 involved in the consortium. The pupil must be a citizen or permanent resident of the United States and must submit 2 24 letters of recommendation to the consortium, each from a 25 responsible adult, such as a person from academia or church 26 27 or a coach or community organization director. The pupil may 28 redeem the scholarship if the pupil enrolls in a private or public postsecondary or vocational institution located in 29 30 this State by December 1 of the year the pupil graduates from 31 high school or receives high school equivalency а 32 certificate. A pupil may defer redeeming the scholarship for

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1 2 years. A pupil wishing to defer his or her scholarship 2 shall notify the Commission, in writing, by December 1 of the year the pupil graduates from high school or receives a 3 4 high school equivalency certificate. A pupil may also defer 5 redeeming the scholarship for longer than 2 years if the 6 pupil enters service in AmeriCorps, another national service 7 program, or a branch of the United States Armed Services, in 8 which case the scholarship shall be redeemed upon completion 9 of the service. The Commission may grant a request to delay redemption of a scholarship beyond 2 years for other reasons 10 11 on a case by case basis.

12 (c) In the event that the Commission ceases to exist,
13 the Program shall be administered by the Illinois Student
14 Assistance Commission.

15 Section 20. Award of scholarships. Upon completion of 120 hours of volunteer community service, as defined by the 16 17 Commission pursuant to Section 35 of this Act, performed 18 between September 1 of one year and August 31 of the next year, a pupil shall earn a scholarship in the amount of 19 20 \$1,000. The maximum amount of a scholarship is \$4,000, 21 provided a pupil performs the required amount of community 22 service during each of grades 9 through 12. A scholarship shall only be used for tuition, fees, books, supplies, and 23 24 living expenses. If possible, an equal number of scholarships shall be awarded to pupils enrolled in each of grades 9 25 through 12. 26

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Section 25. Service sites.

(a) The community service described in Section 20 of
this Act shall only be performed at service sites that are
approved by the consortium, based on guidelines developed by
the Commission, pursuant to Sections 30 and 35 of this Act.
(b) A service site may not provide any salary or stipend

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to the pupils performing community service in conjunction
 with the Program.

3 (c) Any public or private not for profit organization, 4 including a school, located in this State is eligible to 5 participate as a service site if the service to be provided 6 by pupils seeking to earn scholarships meets the definition 7 of community service developed by the Commission pursuant to 8 Section 35 of this Act.

9 (d) The consortia shall give priority to service sites 10 that meet the needs of low-income youth or focus on reducing 11 juvenile delinquency, or both.

12 (e) The Commission shall ensure that consortia and 13 participating service sites comply with all applicable State 14 and federal child welfare laws.

15 Section 30. Selection of pupils and consortia; 16 application.

17 (a) The Commission shall develop guidelines to be used 18 by the consortia to select pupils to participate in the 19 Program. These guidelines shall give selection priority to 20 pupils who will participate in academically meaningful 21 community service.

22 The Commission shall develop guidelines (b) for selecting consortia for participation in the Program. 23 The 24 Commission shall give priority to consortia with a participating school district that serves a high percentage 25 of students qualifying for a free lunch under the federal 26 Child Nutrition Act of 1966. 27

(c) The Commission shall attempt to include an equal distribution of consortia serving urban, rural, and suburban communities.

(d) The Commission shall develop an application form and
 instructions for completion of the form to be used by
 consortia when applying for participation in the program.

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1 The Commission shall notify all eligible school districts 2 about the Program and shall include a copy of the application 3 form and instructions with the notice.

4 Section 35. Community service defined. The Commission, 5 in consultation with the State Board of Education, shall 6 define eligible community service based on the definitions of 7 community service used in the federal work-study program and 8 the National and Community Service Act of 1990, as amended by 9 the National and Community Service Trust Act of 1993.

Section 40. Administrative costs. Administrative costs 10 11 under this Act shall not exceed actual costs up to a maximum 10% in fiscal year 2001 and 6% thereafter. The Commission 12 of 13 shall reimburse a participating school district within a 14 consortium for administrative costs incurred in administering the Program, in an amount that does not exceed 5% of the 15 amount of each scholarship administered by that school 16 17 district.

18 Section 45. Study. By July 1, 2005, the Commission 19 shall submit to the General Assembly a study of the efficacy 20 of the Program. The study shall include, but is not limited 21 to, all of the following:

(1) The demand for scholarships by grade level.
(2) The demand for pupil participants by service
sites.
(3) General background data on participating pupils
and consortia.

27 (4) Types of service performed by participating28 pupils.

29 (5) An itemization of costs for administering the30 Program.

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Section 50. Appropriation of funds. This Act shall be
 implemented only to the extent that funds for that purpose
 are appropriated.

4 Section 990. Repealer. This Act is repealed on January5 1, 2007.

6 Section 999. Effective date. This Act takes effect upon7 becoming law.

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
