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AN ACT concerning medical examinations.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois,represented in the General Assembly:

Section 5. The School Code is amended by changing
Section 27-8.1 as follows:

6 (105 ILCS 5/27-8.1) (from Ch. 122, par. 27-8.1)

7 Sec. 27-8.1. Health examinations and immunizations.

8 (1) In compliance with rules and regulations which the Department of Public Health shall promulgate, and except as 9 hereinafter provided, all children in Illinois shall have a 10 health examination as follows: within one year prior to 11 12 entering kindergarten or the first grade of any public, private, or parochial elementary school; upon entering the 13 fifth and ninth grades of any public, private, or parochial 14 15 school; prior to entrance into any public, private, or 16 parochial nursery school; and, irrespective of grade, immediately prior to or upon entrance into any public, 17 18 private, or parochial school or nursery school, each child 19 shall present proof of having been examined in accordance 20 with this Section and the rules and regulations promulgated hereunder. 21

22 A tuberculosis skin test screening shall be included as a required part of each health examination included under this 23 Section if the child resides in an area designated by the 24 Department of Public Health as having a high incidence of 25 Additional health examinations of pupils, 26 tuberculosis. 27 including dental and vision examinations, may be required when deemed necessary by school authorities. Parents are 28 encouraged to have their children undergo dental examinations 29 at the same points in time required for health examinations. 30 (2) The Department of Public Health shall promulgate 31

1 rules and regulations specifying the examinations and 2 procedures that constitute a health examination and may recommend by rule that certain additional examinations be 3 4 performed. The rules and regulations of the Department of 5 Public Health shall specify that a tuberculosis skin test 6 screening shall be included as a required part of each health 7 examination included under this Section if the child resides in an area designated by the Department of Public Health as 8 9 having a high incidence of tuberculosis.

Physicians licensed to practice medicine in all of 10 its 11 branches, advanced practice nurses who have a written 12 collaborative agreement with a collaborating physician which 13 authorizes them to perform health examinations, or physician assistants who have been delegated the performance of health 14 examinations by their supervising physician shall be 15 16 responsible for the performance of the health examinations, than dental examinations and vision and hearing 17 other screening, and shall sign all report forms required by 18 19 subsection (4) of this Section that pertain to those portions the health examination for which the physician is 20 of 21 responsible. If a registered nurse performs any part of a 22 health examination, then a physician licensed to practice 23 medicine in all of its branches must review and sign all required report forms. Licensed dentists shall perform all 24 25 dental examinations and shall sign all report forms required by subsection (4) of this Section that pertain to the dental 26 examinations. Physicians licensed to practice medicine in 27 all its branches, or licensed optometrists, shall perform all 28 29 vision exams required by school authorities and shall sign 30 all report forms required by subsection (4) of this Section 31 that pertain to the vision exam. Vision and hearing 32 screening tests, which shall not be considered examinations as that term is used in this Section, shall be conducted in 33 34 accordance with rules and regulations of the Department of

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Public Health, and by individuals whom the Department of
 Public Health has certified.

(3) Every child shall, at or about the same time as he 3 4 she receives a health examination required by subsection or (1) of this Section, present to the local school proof of 5 6 having received such immunizations against preventable 7 communicable diseases as the Department of Public Health 8 shall require by rules and regulations promulgated pursuant 9 to this Section and the Communicable Disease Prevention Act.

(4) The individuals conducting the health examination 10 11 shall record the fact of having conducted the examination, and such additional information as required, on uniform forms 12 which the Department of Public Health and the State Board of 13 Education shall prescribe for statewide use. The examiner 14 15 shall summarize on the report form any condition that he or 16 she suspects indicates a need for special services. The individuals confirming the administration of 17 required immunizations shall record as indicated on the form that the 18 19 immunizations were administered.

(5) If a child does not submit proof of having had 20 21 either the health examination or the immunization as 22 required, then the child shall be examined or receive the 23 immunization, as the case may be, and present proof by October 15 of the current school year, or by an earlier date 24 25 of the current school year established by a school district. To establish a date before October 15 of the current school 26 year for the health examination or immunization as required, 27 a school district must give notice of the requirements of 28 29 this Section 60 days prior to the earlier established date. 30 If for medical reasons one or more of the required immunizations must be given after October 15 of the current 31 school year, or after an earlier established date of the 32 current school year, then the child shall present, by October 33 34 15, or by the earlier established date, a schedule for the

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1 administration of the immunizations and a statement of the 2 medical reasons causing the delay, both the schedule and the statement being issued by the physician, <u>advanced practice</u> 3 4 nurse, physician assistant, registered nurse, or local health department that will be responsible for administration of the 5 remaining required immunizations. If a child does not comply 6 7 by October 15, or by the earlier established date of the 8 current school year, with the requirements of this 9 subsection, then the local school authority shall exclude that child from school until such time as the child presents 10 11 proof of having had the health examination as required and 12 presents proof of having received those required are medically possible to receive 13 immunizations which immediately. During a child's exclusion from school for 14 noncompliance with this subsection, the child's parents or 15 16 legal guardian shall be considered in violation of Section 26-1 and subject to any penalty imposed by Section 26-10. 17

Every school shall report to the State Board of 18 (6) 19 Education by November 15, in the manner which that agency shall require, the number of children who have received the 20 necessary immunizations and the health examination 21 as required, indicating, of those who have not received the 22 23 immunizations and examination as required, the number of exempt from health examination and 24 children who are 25 immunization requirements on religious or medical grounds as provided in subsection (8). This reported information shall 26 be provided to the Department of Public Health by the State 27 Board of Education. 28

(7) Upon determining that the number of pupils who are required to be in compliance with subsection (5) of this Section is below 90% of the number of pupils enrolled in the school district, 10% of each State aid payment made pursuant to Section 18-8 to the school district for such year shall be withheld by the regional superintendent until the number of

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students in compliance with subsection (5) is the applicable
 specified percentage or higher.

(8) Parents or legal guardians who object to health 3 4 examinations or any part thereof, or to immunizations, on 5 religious grounds shall not be required to submit their 6 children or wards to the examinations or immunizations to 7 which they so object if such parents or legal guardians 8 present to the appropriate local school authority a signed 9 statement of objection, detailing the grounds for the objection. If the physical condition of the child is such 10 11 that any one or more of the immunizing agents should not be administered, the examining physician, advanced practice 12 nurse, or physician assistant responsible for the performance 13 of the health examination shall endorse that fact upon the 14 health examination form. Exempting a child from the health 15 16 examination does not exempt the child from participation in the program of physical education training provided in 17 18 Sections 27-5 through 27-7 of this Code.

19 (9) For the purposes of this Section, "nursery schools" 20 means those nursery schools operated by elementary school 21 systems or secondary level school units or institutions of 22 higher learning.

Sec. 6-106.1. School bus driver permit.

(a) The Secretary of State shall issue a school bus
driver permit to those applicants who have met all the
requirements of the application and screening process under
this Section to insure the welfare and safety of children who
are transported on school buses throughout the State of

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1 Illinois. Applicants shall obtain the proper application 2 required by the Secretary of State from their prospective or current employer and submit the completed application to the 3 4 prospective or current employer along with the necessary 5 fingerprint submission as required by the Department of State 6 Police to conduct fingerprint based criminal background 7 checks on current and future information available in the 8 state system and current information available through the 9 Federal Bureau of Investigation's system. Applicants who have completed the fingerprinting requirements shall not be 10 11 subjected to the fingerprinting process when applying for subsequent permits or submitting proof 12 of successful completion of the annual refresher course. Individuals who 13 on the effective date of this Act possess a valid school bus 14 15 driver permit that has been previously issued by the 16 appropriate Regional School Superintendent are not subject to the fingerprinting provisions of this Section as long as 17 the permit remains valid and does not lapse. The applicant shall 18 19 be required to pay all related application and fingerprinting fees as established by rule including, but not limited to, 20 21 the amounts established by the Department of State Police and 22 the Federal Bureau of Investigation to process fingerprint 23 based criminal background investigations. All fees paid for fingerprint processing services under this Section shall be 24 25 deposited into the State Police Services Fund for the cost 26 incurred in processing the fingerprint based criminal background investigations. All 27 other fees paid under this Section shall be deposited into the Road Fund for the purpose 28 29 defraying the costs of the Secretary of State in of 30 administering this Section. All applicants must:

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1. be 21 years of age or older;

32 2. possess a valid and properly classified driver's33 license issued by the Secretary of State;

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3. possess a valid driver's license, which has not

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been revoked, suspended, or canceled for 3 years immediately prior to the date of application, or have not had his or her commercial motor vehicle driving privileges disqualified within the 3 years immediately prior to the date of application;

6 4. successfully pass a written test, administered 7 by the Secretary of State, on school bus operation, 8 school bus safety, and special traffic laws relating to 9 school buses and submit to a review of the applicant's 10 driving habits by the Secretary of State at the time the 11 written test is given;

12 5. demonstrate ability to exercise reasonable care
13 in the operation of school buses in accordance with rules
14 promulgated by the Secretary of State;

15 6. demonstrate physical fitness to operate school 16 buses by submitting the results of a medical examination, including tests for drug use for each applicant not 17 subject such testing pursuant to federal law, 18 to conducted by a licensed physician, an advanced practice 19 20 nurse who has a written collaborative agreement with a 21 collaborating physician which authorizes him or her to 22 perform medical examinations, or a physician assistant 23 who has been delegated the performance of medical examinations by his or her supervising physician within 24 90 days of the date of application according to standards 25 promulgated by the Secretary of State; 26

27 7. affirm under penalties of perjury that he or she
28 has not made a false statement or knowingly concealed a
29 material fact in any application for permit;

8. have completed an initial classroom course,
including first aid procedures, in school bus driver
safety as promulgated by the Secretary of State; and
after satisfactory completion of said initial course an
annual refresher course; such courses and the agency or

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organization conducting such courses shall be approved by the Secretary of State; failure to complete the annual refresher course, shall result in cancellation of the permit until such course is completed;

9. not have been convicted of 2 or more serious
traffic offenses, as defined by rule, within one year
prior to the date of application that may endanger the
life or safety of any of the driver's passengers within
the duration of the permit period;

10 10. not have been convicted of reckless driving, 11 driving while intoxicated, or reckless homicide resulting 12 from the operation of a motor vehicle within 3 years of 13 the date of application;

11. not have been convicted of committing or 14 15 attempting to commit any one or more of the following 16 offenses: (i) those offenses defined in Sections 9-1, 9-1.2, 9-2, 9-2.1, 9-3, 9-3.2, 9-3.3, 10-1, 10-2, 10-3.1, 17 10-4, 10-5, 10-6, 10-7, 11-6, 11-9, 11-9.1, 11-14, 11-15, 18 11-15.1, 11-16, 11-17, 11-18, 11-19, 11-19.1, 11-19.2, 19 11-20, 11-20.1, 11-21, 11-22, 12-3.1, 12-4.1, 12-4.2, 20 12-4.3, 12-4.4, 12-4.5, 12-6, 12-6.2, 12-7.1, 12-7.3, 21 22 12-7.4, 12-11, 12-13, 12-14, 12-14.1, 12-15, 12-16, 23 12-16.2, 12-21.5, 12-21.6, 12-33, 18-1, 18-2, 18-3, 18-4, 18-5, 20-1, 20-1.1, 20-2, 24-1, 24-1.1, 24-1.2, 24-3.3, 24 25 31A-1, 31A-1.1, and 33A-2, and in subsection (a) and subsection (b), clause (1), of Section 12-4 of the 26 Criminal Code of 1961; (ii) those offenses defined in the 27 Cannabis Control Act except those offenses defined in 28 subsections (a) and (b) of Section 4, and subsection (a) 29 30 of Section 5 of the Cannabis Control Act; (iii) those offenses defined in the Illinois Controlled Substances 31 Act; (iv) any offense committed or attempted in any other 32 state or against the laws of the United States, which if 33 committed or attempted in this State would be punishable 34

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as one or more of the foregoing offenses; (v) the offenses defined in Section 4.1 and 5.1 of the Wrongs to Children Act and (vi) those offenses defined in Section 6-16 of the Liquor Control Act of 1934;

12. not have been repeatedly involved as a driver 5 in motor vehicle collisions or been repeatedly convicted 6 7 offenses against laws and ordinances regulating the of 8 movement of traffic, to a degree which indicates lack of 9 ability to exercise ordinary and reasonable care in the safe operation of a motor vehicle or disrespect for the 10 11 traffic laws and the safety of other persons upon the 12 highway;

13 13. not have, through the unlawful operation of a
14 motor vehicle, caused an accident resulting in the death
15 of any person; and

16 14. not have, within the last 5 years, been 17 adjudged to be afflicted with or suffering from any 18 mental disability or disease.

(b) A school bus driver permit shall be valid for a
period specified by the Secretary of State as set forth by
rule. It shall be renewable upon compliance with subsection
(a) of this Section.

(c) A school bus driver permit shall contain the
holder's driver's license number, name, address, zip code,
social security number and date of birth, a brief description
of the holder and a space for signature. The Secretary of
State may require a suitable photograph of the holder.

The employer shall be responsible for conducting a 28 (d) 29 pre-employment interview with prospective school bus driver 30 candidates, distributing school bus driver applications and 31 medical forms to be completed by the applicant, and 32 submitting the applicant's fingerprint cards to the Department of State Police that are required for the criminal 33 34 background investigations. The employer shall certify in

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1 writing to the Secretary of State that all pre-employment 2 conditions have been successfully completed including the successful completion of an Illinois specific 3 criminal 4 background investigation through the Department of State 5 Police and the submission of necessary fingerprints to the 6 Federal Bureau of Investigation for criminal history 7 information available through Federal the Bureau of 8 Investigation system. The applicant shall present the 9 certification to the Secretary of State at the time of submitting the school bus driver permit application. 10

11 (e) Permits shall initially be provisional upon 12 receiving certification from the employer that all pre-employment conditions have been successfully completed, 13 and upon successful completion all 14 of training and 15 examination requirements for the classification of the 16 vehicle to be operated, the Secretary of State shall provisionally issue a School Bus Driver Permit. 17 The permit shall remain in a provisional status pending the completion 18 19 of the Federal Bureau of Investigation's criminal background investigation based upon fingerprinting specimens submitted 20 21 to the Federal Bureau of Investigation by the Department of 22 State Police. The Federal Bureau of Investigation shall 23 report the findings directly to the Secretary of State. The Secretary of State shall remove the bus driver permit from 24 25 provisional status upon the applicant's successful completion of the Federal Bureau of Investigation's criminal background 26 27 investigation.

A school bus driver permit holder shall notify 28 (f) the employer and the Secretary of State if he or she is convicted 29 30 in another state of an offense that would make him or her ineligible for a permit under subsection (a) of this Section. 31 32 The written notification shall be made within 5 days of the entry of the conviction. Failure of the permit holder to 33 provide the notification is punishable as a petty offense for 34

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a first violation and a Class B misdemeanor for a second or
 subsequent violation.

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(g) Cancellation; suspension; notice and procedure.

4 (1) The Secretary of State shall cancel a school 5 bus driver permit of an applicant whose criminal 6 background investigation discloses that he or she is not 7 in compliance with the provisions of subsection (a) of 8 this Section.

9 (2) The Secretary of State shall cancel a school 10 bus driver permit when he or she receives notice that the 11 permit holder fails to comply with any provision of this 12 Section or any rule promulgated for the administration of 13 this Section.

14 (3) The Secretary of State shall cancel a school
15 bus driver permit if the permit holder's restricted
16 commercial or commercial driving privileges are withdrawn
17 or otherwise invalidated.

18 (4) The Secretary of State may not issue a school 19 bus driver permit for a period of 3 years to an applicant 20 who fails to obtain a negative result on a drug test as 21 required in item 6 of subsection (a) of this Section or 22 under federal law.

(5) The Secretary of State shall forthwith suspend
a school bus driver permit for a period of 3 years upon
receiving notice that the holder has failed to obtain a
negative result on a drug test as required in item 6 of
subsection (a) of this Section or under federal law.

The Secretary of shall 28 State notify the State 29 Superintendent of Education and the permit holder's 30 prospective or current employer that the applicant has (1) has failed a criminal background investigation or (2) is no 31 32 longer eligible for a school bus driver permit; and of the 33 related cancellation of the applicant's provisional school 34 bus driver permit. The cancellation shall remain in effect

1 pending the outcome of a hearing pursuant to Section 2-118 2 of this Code. The scope of the hearing shall be limited to the issuance criteria contained in subsection (a) of this 3 4 Section. A petition requesting a hearing shall be submitted to the Secretary of State and shall contain the reason the 5 6 individual feels he or she is entitled to a school bus driver 7 permit. The permit holder's employer shall notify in writing 8 to the Secretary of State that the employer has certified the 9 removal of the offending school bus driver from service prior to the start of that school bus driver's next workshift. 10 An 11 employing school board that fails to remove the offending school bus driver from service is subject to the penalties 12 defined in Section 3-14.23 of the School Code. A school bus 13 contractor who violates a provision of this Section is 14 subject to the penalties defined in Section 6-106.11. 15

All valid school bus driver permits issued under this Section prior to January 1, 1995, shall remain effective until their expiration date unless otherwise invalidated. (Source: P.A. 90-191, eff. 1-1-98; 91-500, eff. 8-13-99.)
