Dear Members of the Legislature:

First of all, we would like to thank the Illinois State Legislature for passing legislation that creates an elected representative elected school board. We want to take this time to ask you to review our proposed amendments to Public Act 102-0177 and to update you on our advocacy efforts. We respectfully request that you

1. Create a standing Black Student Achievement Committee of the Board of Education to prioritize problems that are unique to Black children and their families. The committee would interface with other Board committees, CPS and local stakeholders to improve academic outcomes for Black children and create an environment for CPS and its schools that is welcoming to parents and community stakeholders. The Board Committee would be chaired and co-chaired by members of the Board of Education, with advisory members who may be selected from the community, Local School Councils, Parent Advisory Councils, the faith community, the business sector, the civic sector, local universities, etc. This structure would not impact the size of the Board of Education or provide an undue expense to implement. We have attached a revised proposal for the Committee and a rationale. Please note that, in essence, the committee remains the same. We have added language that we believe is specific enough to ensure that the process is, in fact, evidence-based, while giving the Chicago Board of Education members leeway to go where the data takes them and prioritize the issues of the day, whatever they may be over the years.

The most important thing is, this work needs to be codified at the state level, so that, regardless of who is in elected office; or who leads CPS, this work continues. Our experience has shown that, if left to their own devices, the CPS CEO may or may not prioritize Black student achievement. For example, Dr. Janice Jackson was working with the Black Community Collaborative and other stakeholders to do the research to form such a committee at the operational level. When Dr. Jackson left, Mr. Pedro Martinez did not see fit to continue this work. Now that Mayor Brandon Johnson is in office, we do see an interest on the part of the Chicago Board of Education to re-visit the issue.

# 2. Adopt our mapping proposal, which was developed taking into account the following criteria:

- a. Each district must be compact, contiguous and substantially equal in population and consistent with the Illinois Voting Rights Act, pursuant to Public Act 102-0177.
- b. Communities of interest will be kept intact to the fullest extent possible
- c. School Board electoral districts will be aligned with other political and educational districts to the fullest extent possible. This will allow community residents and local leaders to coordinate policy advocacy efforts that may require interaction with multiple layers of government.

To this end, our map includes 10 districts, each comprised of 5 contiguous wards. To the extent possible, wards are clustered together by their majority/plurality racial composition. Our map includes 3 majority/plurality Black districts, 3 majority/plurality Latino districts and 3 majority/plurality White districts, and 1 majority-minority districts. Our map is responsive to the requests made by other ethnic groups to keep their communities intact, including the Latino communities on the Northwest and Southwest sides; the Jewish community on the North Side; the Asian communities in China Town and McKinley Park on the South Side, and the Asian communities on the Far North Side. Because ward boundaries were vetted for compliance with the VRA during the most recent redistricting process, we expect the proposed map to pass legal muster. We have attached our final proposal, with the Census data that support the district boundaries for your convenience.

Our mapping proposal includes several other tangible benefits beyond compliance with prevailing laws pertaining to the creation of election districts and voting rights. Our map

- 1. Encourages collaboration between elected representatives in City Council and the Chicago Board of Education
- 2. Increases the potential to align resources from the City of Chicago and Chicago Board of Education in a manner that creates efficiency and laser focus on the children, parents and schools within a given ERSB district
- 3. Creates a situation in which the ERSB districts are automatically set each time the Chicago City Council goes through its own redistricting process. Any political battles surrounding redistricting may be addressed and contained in City Council without spilling over into the Chicago Board of Education. This will allow the School Board to focus less on the political battles of the day, and more on the educational issues.

#### **Our Advocacy**

Although the Legislature adjourned in June, our advocacy continues. We have reached out to a number of elected officials at the State and local levels to share our proposal. To date, our proposal has been very positively received, with encouragement to work with the Chicago Board of Education, which we are doing.

We have met several times with Chicago Board of Education President Jianan Shi, sharing our proposal, and exchanging information regarding priorities and implementation. President Shi has indicated that the Chicago Board of Education will be unveiling a Black Student Achievement

Committee this fall. He is aware that we are working with you to codify the Black Student Achievement Committee. We view the Chicago Board of Education as a partner in this advocacy.

### Proposed Black Student Achievement Committee

#### I. Statement of Need

As a group, Black Chicago Public School students, who comprise nearly a third of the District's enrollment, are suffering from entrenched problems that have only been exacerbated by closing 50 schools in 2013 and shutting down from the COVID-19 pandemic from 2020-2021. They have suffered significant learning loss, trauma, isolation and reduction in social and emotional support, economic loss and health and safety concerns.

- a. In 2021, 80% of Black children graduated from high school in 5 years, as compared to 85% of Hispanic children; 91% of White children and 92% of Asian children. (Block Club Chicago, 2021)
- b. African Americans comprised 36% of Chicago Public Schools but accounted for up to 61% of the 19,799 school suspensions in 2021. (Julian Johnson, Esq., 2021) Today, Black children only comprise 29% of the CPS population.(CPS 2023)
- c. African American children accounted for 63% of the 2,244 school referrals to police. Eighty-three percent (83%) of the detainees in the Cook County Juvenile Detention Center are Black. It costs \$4,397 per year to educate a child in CPS (Julian Johnson, Esq., 2021) and \$28,196 per year to detain them in the Cook County Juvenile Detention Center (National Juvenile Justice Network 2011).
- d. Between March 8<sup>th</sup> and March 12, 2021, a daily average of 89% of White students showed up to in-person classes, compared with daily averages of 77% for Latino students and 60% for Black students during that same period. Asian students had a daily in-person attendance average of 83%. (Matt Masterson, WTTW, 2021)
- e. Approximately 88% of school actions (ie, school closings, turnarounds, removing principals, etc.) have occurred at predominantly African American Schools. (CTU, 2013) These actions alone have disrupted student learning and further destabilized Black communities that have endured decades of disinvestment.
- f. A WBEZ investigative report has found that since the pandemic, the need for mental health services has increased, particularly for students from very low income families, many of whom are Black. The state is failing to ensure thousands of children get any follow-up help after mental assessments, let alone the type of intensive behavioral health support many need. Senator Lightford has called for public hearings and the creation of a 15-member task force to better understand the problems and explore the issue, (including operational, programmatic and financial issues surrounding the program). (Sarah Karp, WBEZ, 2023)

These problems persist despite the fact that there are Chicago Board of Education committees to address the needs of all CPS students and their families.

#### II. IAAFER Position Statement

It is the position of IAAFER that the chronic underperformance of Black students is the result of chronically underfunded, separate, and unequal CPS schools in the Black Communities of Chicago.

#### III. Chicago Elected School Board of Education: Black Student Achievement Committee

The Chicago Board of Education Black Student Achievement Committee shall be a standing committee of the Board, with the purpose of providing Black students with maximum opportunity for success in areas where research shows that there has been chronic underperformance during African American students' elementary and secondary education experience in Chicago Public Schools (CPS). The Committee shall develop strategies and recommendations for:

- a) children to excel in their educational performance;
- b) providing children with the character-building tools to succeed;
- c) reducing absenteeism and truancy while increasing graduation rates;
- d) ensuring that children enjoy a fulfilling, memorable and affirming elementary and secondary educational experience;
- e) preparing Black children for post-secondary success in a global economy;
- f) facilitating educational transparency through developing channels of communication that keep the Black community informed on progress towards achieving specific educational quantitative metrics and qualitative goals, as well as barriers to progress;
- g) increasing parent engagement in ways that lead to improved academic and social outcomes for Black CPS students.

The Black Student Achievement Committee shall interface with other CBOE standing and advisory committees and task forces and local stakeholders as necessary to ensure that the interests of Black CPS students and their families are represented in the development of new CPS policies, master plans, programs and initiatives.

The Black Student Achievement Committee shall have two co-chairs who shall be members of the Chicago Board of Education (CBOE). The co-chairs shall be CBOE members and elected by other Members based upon their interest and credentials to lead this Committee. The Black Student Achievement Committee shall be composed of the two (2) co-chairs and up to eleven (11) members to form a committee of seven (13). The co-chairs shall select committee members based upon their expertise in one or more of the areas where research shows that there has been chronic under- performance of African American students. The membership shall be diverse in terms of skills and geography.

Non-CBOE members with the specific expertise needed to complete the assigned deliverables shall also be asked to serve on the Black Student Achievement Committee in an advisory capacity. CBOE shall develop eligibility criteria, and recruit members of the Black Student Achievement Committee from a broad base of CPS stakeholders, including

Local School Councils, Parent Advisory Councils, Community Action Councils; Chicago's civic, business and faith communities and community-based organizations.

The Black Student Achievement Committee shall:

- a) utilize data from CPS, the community and other sources to conduct an evidencebased needs assessment to better understand student needs and establish a baseline for Black student achievement;
- b) build upon the needs assessment to prioritize issues and develop a set of goals, objectives and outcomes designed to bring about academic and social parity between Black children and their peers;
- c) develop a strategic management plan, utilizing the Balanced Score Card approach. This includes assessing CPS' organizational capacity to meet the goals, objectives and outcomes identified by the Committee; understanding how CPS' systems, processes and protocols may best support academic and social outcomes; considering the financial impact of proposed strategies; identifying financial resources to implement the strategic management plan; and assessing the impact of proposed strategies on student academic performance, resilience and ability to successfully transition to a college environment or the workforce;
- d) identify and track a mutually agreed upon set of metrics and key performance indicators that demonstrate positive movement towards achieving the goals and objectives outlined in the strategic management plan
- e) prepare a report card and make quarterly written and oral progress reports to the CBOE and community stakeholders.

CPS shall:

- a) provide technical assistance by senior CPS staff and accomplished educational organizational development professionals;
- b) fund Black Student Achievement Committee activities at a level that will enable the Committee to function effectively;
- c) provide sufficient staff support to successfully develop and implement the strategic management plan.
- d) operationalize the strategies outlined in the strategic management plan

#### Valerie F. Leonard



Valerie F. Leonard convenes Illinois African Americans for Equitable Redistricting (IAAFER). IAAFER is an all-volunteer group formed in 2021 to serve the interests of Illinois' Black voters as the General Assembly drafted new legislative maps.

After reviewing the enabling legislation that created Chicago's first elected representative school board (ERSB), IAAFER developed a comprehensive districting proposal that protects the voting rights of all Chicagoans; facilitates collaboration between local aldermen and elected school board representatives; and encourages elected officials to align City and Board of Education resources to support academic outcomes for CPS students.

IAAFER is also recommending that the legislation creating the ESRB be amended to create a standing Black Student Achievement Committee of the Board of Education to increase accountability at all levels as CPS strives to eliminate the achievement gap and school to prison pipeline for Black CPS students.

In response to the potential of the Ogden-Pulaski TIF to displace local residents, Valerie co-founded the Lawndale Alliance in 2008. The group expanded its focus to include a number of education and community development issues, including equitable community development and implementation of TIF's; the potential for displacement as a result of the Olympics and the negative impacts of school closings and turn arounds. The group also advocated for an elected school board and provided advocacy for the creation of equitable school facilities that support learning opportunities for North Lawndale students. Under Valerie's leadership, the Lawndale Alliance spearheaded a ward wide petition drive and GOTV effort to get an advisory referendum on the ballot for Chicago's Elected Representative School Board. The measure received 87% of the vote in the 24<sup>th</sup> Ward. The Lawndale Alliance also worked with a broad range of stakeholders, including the Lawndale CAC, elected officials and nonprofit organizations to develop an alternative plan to school closures, geared to turn schools that were targeted for closure into centers of activity for students, their families and local community stakeholders.

Valerie co-founded the North Lawndale Coordinating Council (NLCCC) in 2015 and served as a member of the executive committee and chairperson of the transportation committee. She recruited and oriented a multidisciplinary leadership team to facilitate North Lawndale's first comprehensive plan since 1959. She was the lead writer for successful applications to get a technical assistance grant from Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning (CMAP) to develop a comprehensive community plan and funding from LISC to coordinate a Quality of Life Plan. Valerie took the lead in developing much of the group's infrastructure, including facilitating the drafting of its vision and core values statement; developing the rules of engagement and handbook; developing the organization's committee structure and recruiting leaders and members for those committees; developing the website and marketing collateral materials; fundraising and resource development; managing social media accounts and newsletters and developing content for the first North Lawndale Community Planning Conference. She also advocated for restoration of CTA service along the Pink Line, Blue Line and Ogden bus line serving North Lawndale.

Valerie is the Founder of Nonprofit Utopia, LLC, the ideal community for leaders who want to start, manage and scale nonprofits. With a mission of training the next generation of ethical nonprofit leaders, Nonprofit Utopia offers an online community, courses and coaching to help leaders strengthen their leadership skills as they build their organizations. Valerie is also a Maxwell Leadership Team Certified Member, providing leadership assessments, mastermind groups and coaching using methods developed by John Maxwell, an international authority on leadership. To date, Nonprofit Utopia has reached over 40,000 people through its podcast, YouTube videos, online community and courses.

Valerie has a bachelor's degree in economics from Spelman College and a Master of Management degree in finance and marketing from the Kellogg Graduate School of Management at Northwestern University. She is an adjunct instructor for the University of Illinois at Chicago's Certificate in Nonprofit Management, teaching courses in nonprofit operations, strategic management and program design and evaluation. Valerie co-facilitates full-day grant writing workshops for the University. She is also an adjunct instructor for Roosevelt University, teaching courses in social enterprise.



### Karl A.Brinson, President NAACP - West side branch

Karl A. Brinson was raised on Chicago's west side in the Austin community. At the age of 19, Karl became very involved in politics which led him to become a part of the NAACP. After years of service in the Association, he was convinced to take on more leadership roles.

## Lafayette Ford

Lafayette Ford was born and raised on Chicago's Westside and attended John Marshall HS from 1965 graduating in 1968. Lafayette holds a B.A. degree in Communications from St. Joseph College, Ind. After college he held several positions with the City of Chicago including Department of Human Services, Department of Sewers and Director of South Austin Anti-Crime Program. The last 20 years with the Chicago Public Schools as an

administrator including an Local School Council Specialist, and Director of Youth Outreach program (now known as SAFE PASSAGE) and retiring after 34 years of public service. Most of his career was in positions where he directed programs was in community relations. Lafayette was known as 'the go to person' for issues arisen where there was great controversy between the community and administration. He was both trusted by community and respected by the administration to negotiate difficult situations. Lafayette never had a problem with speaking his mind. When there was a move to possibly close Marshall HS, at a public meeting Lafayette led his CPS supervisor on stage and then was the first person to speak against the action. He then sat across the table from his supervisor for the next three months, representing the Ward Alderman's community contingency, while negotiating the community demands on the 'turn around' of Marshall.

Lafayette also served as Director of Education Programs for Executive Service Corps of Chicago and Executive Director of City Wide Coalition of School Reform. Lafayette has worked as a Consultant, Trainer and Lobbyist on Education Reform. He Served for eight years on several Local School Councils, including elementary and secondary schools and the High School District Council for Chicago Public Schools. He was instrumental in the 1995 Chicago School Reform Act. And served for six years as the Chairman of the Chicago School Board Nomination Commission 1989 - 1995 that made recommendations to the Mayor of the City of Chicago for consideration for the Chicago Board of Education.

Currently Lafayette serves as Vice-Chair of Board of Directors for Black United Fund of Illinois (BUFI), Treasurer of Global Girls, Inc; board member of South Shore Works Preservation and Planning Coalition and served for 25 years as member of Core Group of Real Men Charities Father's Day Celebration and 8 years as President of John Marshal High School Alumni Association.

Lafayette is married to his wife Linda and has two children and now resides in Chicago in the South Shore community.

### **Dwayne Truss**



Dwayne Truss is a life-long resident of the city of Chicago. Mr. Truss was born and raised in West Garfield Park and is a proud graduate of Chicago Public Schools. After graduating from Westinghouse Area Career Vocational High School in 1981, he joined the United States Marine Corps Reserve. After a short tenure with the USMCR, he transferred to the Army National Guard. Mr. Truss was honorably discharged in 1986.

Mr. Truss earned his Bachelor of Science in Accounting from Northeastern Illinois University in 1985.

Mr. Truss met his wife Cata while a student at Northeastern and they were married in 1986. Together they raised five sons: four are college graduates.

Mr. Truss civic career is lengthy. 

He believes that each of us must believe in something larger than ourselves and work tirelessly to better ourselves and our communities.

I am writing this letter to express the Coalition of African American Leaders (COAL)'s support for the Illinois African Americans for Equitable Redistricting (IAAFER) proposal to, **1**) establish Elected Representative School Board (ERSB) districts using Chicago's Ward Boundaries as building blocks, and **2**) establish a standing Black Student Achievement committee of the Chicago Board of Education.

The following are strong points in favor of IAAFER's proposed ERSB map. It:

- Leverages current ward boundaries, thus minimizing the confusion residents/voters might experience with boundaries that are completely new and different;
- Does not split up wards across multiple school districts; keeping wards whole within a school board district provides for Ward residents who already work together on issues from housing and safety to city services, to also work together on education related issues and the election of a school board member; as opposed to school districts which bisect, trisect and quad-sect wards;
- Keeps communities together and reflects concerns taken into consideration after discussions with a number of Chicago stakeholder groups, representing Black, Hispanic, Asian, and White constituencies from South, West, North and central areas of Chicago.
- Allows for easier collaboration and simpler lines of communication between City Council members and Chicago ERSB members; and may increases opportunities to efficiently allocate, coordinate and direct city educational and other resources to children and their families;

- Represents the demographic composition of the city of Chicago; providing equal opportunity for all Chicago voters to elect candidates of their own choosing, regardless of race, where they live, or political ideology/affiliation; there are 3 majority Black districts, 3 majority Hispanic districts, 3 majority White districts, and 1 majority minority district (48% White, 52% Minority);
- **Complies with Voting Rights Acts**, recognizing that the wards were drawn in compliance with Voting Rights Acts; it follows that school districts comprised of complete wards and reflective of Chicago demographics would be in compliance;
- **Minimizes political maneuvering** which often accompany the drawing of new districts with completely new and different boundaries.

While IAAFER's proposal includes an ERSB map which equitably reflects the demographic population of Chicago, importantly, the proposal also seeks to create a standing committee of the Board of Education charged with developing evidence-based strategies and processes to close the achievement gap for CPS' Black students. The proposed Black Student Achievement committee, which will be comprised of individuals with deep educational expertise and experiences, would provide the focus required to develop recommendations to both close the educational achievement gap for Black students, and to sustain gains going forward. Recognizing the educational deficit Black children are burdened with, improving the education of CPS' Black students must be a priority. This Black Student Achievement Committee represents and actualizes that priority.

It is COAL's understanding that IAAFER has discussed its proposed Black Student Achievement committee with the President of the Chicago Board of Education (CBOE) who shared that CBOE is planning to establish a committee focused on the needs of Black CPS students and their families, however, to ensure that this critical work is a priority beyond any change in Chicago administrations, it is imperative that the Black Student Achievement committee is codified into state law, specifically into the legislation that established Chicago's transition to an elected representative school board.

# COAL's overarching mission is to doits part towards improving the quality of life for the Black community. Closing the educational gap for our children is a core component of this endeavor.

I am writing this letter to express the National Black Agenda Consortium - Chicago (NBAC)'s support for the Illinois African Americans for Equitable Redistricting (IAAFER) proposal to, **1**) establish Elected Representative School Board (ERSB) districts using Chicago's Ward Boundaries as building blocks, and **2**) establish a standing Black Student Achievement committee of the Chicago Board of Education.

The following are strong points in favor of IAAFER's proposed ERSB map. It:

- Leverages current ward boundaries, thus minimizing the confusion residents/voters might experience with boundaries that are completely new and different;
- Does not split up wards across multiple school districts; keeping wards whole within a school board district provides for Ward residents who already work together on issues from housing and safety to city services, to also work together on education related issues and the election of a school board member; as opposed to school districts which bisect, trisect and quad-sect wards;
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- Allows for easier collaboration and simpler lines of communication between City Council members and Chicago ERSB members; and may increases opportunities to efficiently allocate, coordinate and direct city educational and other resources to children and their families;

- Represents the demographic composition of the city of Chicago; providing equal opportunity for all Chicago voters to elect candidates of their own choosing, regardless of race, where they live, or political ideology/affiliation; there are 3 majority Black districts, 3 majority Hispanic districts, 3 majority White districts, and 1 majority minority district (48% White, 52% Minority);
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- **Minimizes political maneuvering** which often accompany the drawing of new districts with completely new and different boundaries.

While IAAFER's proposal includes an ERSB map which equitably reflects the demographic population of Chicago, importantly, the proposal also seeks to create a standing committee of the Board of Education charged with developing evidence-based strategies and processes to close the achievement gap for CPS' Black students. The proposed Black Student Achievement committee, which will be comprised of individuals with deep educational expertise and experiences, would provide the focus required to develop recommendations to both close the educational achievement gap for Black students, and to sustain gains going forward. Recognizing the educational deficit Black children are burdened with, improving the education of CPS' Black students must be a priority. This Black Student Achievement Committee represents and actualizes that priority.

It is NBAC's understanding that IAAFER has discussed its proposed Black Student Achievement committee with the President of the Chicago Board of Education (CBOE) who shared that CBOE is planning to establish a committee focused on the needs of Black CPS students and their families, however, to ensure that this critical work is a priority beyond any change in Chicago administrations, it is imperative that the Black Student Achievement committee is codified into state law, specifically into the legislation that established Chicago's transition to an elected representative school board.

NBAC's overarching mission is to continuously maintain and disseminate a National Black Agenda which presents strategies and actions to address, redress and resolve our most pressing issues for high priority areas impacting every aspect of Black lives. Education is one of our highest priority issue areas and strategies to close the educational gap for Black children are an important component of the National Black Agenda.


