SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 28

WHEREAS, President George Bush has proposed \$322 million for Department of Energy Fuel Cell and Hydrogen Programs in the United States; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois pledges to be a leader in renewable energy production, efficiency, and conservation as well as in creating, promoting, and commercializing new technologies and industries; and

WHEREAS, Hydrogen-powered vehicles and infrastructure can lead to energy independence, lower global warming pollution, improve fuel economy, reduce health harms associated with motor vehicle related air pollution, and provide economic and employment opportunities throughout the State; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that the State of Illinois is committed to achieving a clean energy and transportation future based on the commercialization of hydrogen and fuel cell technologies.
