WHEREAS, Shaun Livingston was drafted fourth overall by the Los Angeles Clippers in 2004; he played there until the summer of 2008 when he signed with the Miami Heat as a free agent; after his time with the Heat, he played for several other NBA teams; and

WHEREAS, In 2014, Shaun Livingston's skills were acquired by the Golden State Warriors, where he plays as a shooting guard; and

WHEREAS, Shaun Livingston reached the pinnacle of his career in the 2014-2015 NBA season by helping his team achieve victory in the NBA Finals; and

WHEREAS, Shaun Livingston's proud connection to Peoria and Illinois continues; the Illinois High School Sports Association named him one of "100 Legends of the IHSA Boys' Basketball Tournament"; he established the Shaun Livingston Foundation which raised money for tornado victims in the wake of the 2013 Washington and Central Illinois tornadoes; therefore, be it

WHEREAS, The official flag of the State of Mississippi, by Mississippi statute, incorporates a depiction of the "Battle Flag of the Confederacy" into its design; and

WHEREAS, The members of this body suggest that the Mississippi Legislature should adopt an official flag that honors the heritage of all Mississippians, including the over 37% of Mississippians that are African-American; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we call upon the Mississippi Legislature to take statutory action to remove any depiction of the "Battle Flag of the Confederacy" from the design of the flag of the State of Mississippi; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be delivered to Mississippi Governor Phil Bryant, Tate Reeves, President of the Mississippi Senate, and Philip Gunn, Speaker of the Mississippi House of Representatives.

A message from the House by Mr. Mapes, Clerk:

Mr. President - I am directed to inform the Senate that the House of Representatives has adopted the following joint resolution, in the adoption of which I am instructed to ask the concurrence of the Senate, to-wit:

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 79

WHEREAS, Clyde Robertson's (1922-2015) service to his community began in 1941, at the age of 19, as a teacher of seventh and eighth grades at the Creal Springs School; in 1943, he was drafted into the United States Army; and

WHEREAS, After being discharged at the end of World War II, Clyde Robertson returned to Creal Springs; he immediately resumed his community service as the first Commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars in Creal Springs, as well as by teaching night classes to local veterans; and

WHEREAS, Clyde Robertson worked as a rural mail carrier for 36 years; he served on the Creal Springs City Council from 1965 to 1969 and later served on the Creal Springs Park Board for many years, where he excelled in organizing the parade for the annual festival celebrating the founding of the city; he was well-known for the "biggest" parade in the area; and

WHEREAS, Clyde Robertson never missed a Sunday service at his beloved Creal Springs Methodist Church, where throughout the years he served in all positions; if you missed a Sunday service, he did not fail to call you with a cheerful "Hope to see you next Sunday" to let you know you were missed; and

WHEREAS, Clyde Robertson was a great inspiration to everyone, especially since he would not let a spinal cord injury he suffered in January of 1990, which made him spend most of his time in a wheel chair, prevent him from continuing his work in the community; and

WHEREAS, The Clyde Robertson Community Service Award was established in 1996 to be given to anyone who could "fill his shoes" in community service within the City of Creal Springs; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we designate the portion of Illinois Route 166 in Creal Springs that runs from White Street to Walnut Street as the "Clyde Robertson Memorial Highway"; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Illinois Department of Transportation is requested to erect at suitable locations, consistent with State and federal regulations, appropriate plaques or signs giving notice of the name the "Clyde Robertson Memorial Highway"; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to the family of Clyde Robertson, the Mayor of Creal Springs, and the Secretary of the Illinois Department of Transportation.
