SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 1613

WHEREAS, All citizens of Illinois should be made aware of the ever-present dangers posed by potentially poisonous household substances; and

WHEREAS, Children too often have access to over-the-counter and prescription medications and potentially toxic household products; and

WHEREAS, Over the past 50 years, the nation has been observing National Poison Prevention Week to help prevent accidental poisonings and to provide tips for promoting community involvement in poison prevention; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Poison Center has been providing timely poison prevention and treatment services to the people of Illinois for over 60 years and is the oldest and one of the largest poison centers in the nation; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Poison Center is a mainstay in the emergency medical care system of the State of Illinois and is recognized nationally for its contributions to poison treatment and prevention; and

WHEREAS, Forty-five percent of the more than 80,000 poisonings reported last year to the Illinois Poison Center involved children under the age of 5 and could have been prevented; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Poison Center manages approximately 90% of cases from the general public at home, saving the State of Illinois over \$60 million in reduced health care and lost productivity costs; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we designate March of 2016 as Poison Prevention Month in the State of Illinois and urge all Illinoisans to educate themselves about the potentially harmful substances in their homes and take steps to create healthy and safe home, play, and work environments; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the Illinois Poison Center.

PRESENTATION OF RESOLUTION

Senator Haine offered the following Senate Joint Resolution, which was ordered printed and referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 28 CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

SC0028

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to add Section 9.5 to Article IX of the Illinois Constitution as follows:

ARTICLE IX REVENUE

SECTION 9.5. HIGHWAY REVENUE

- (a) No revenue derived from the taxes, fees, or bond proceeds relating to: registration, title, operation of a vehicle; a public highway, road, street, or bridge; a mass transit system, intercity passenger rail system, port, airport, or any other transportation infrastructure or operation; and fuel used for propelling vehicles, shall be expended except for the costs of administering laws, statutory refunds, and adjustments related to vehicles and transportation, payment of highway obligations and other statutory highway purposes, matching federal aid highway funds, expense and protection of grade separations at public highways and railroad crossings, costs of construction, maintenance, repair, and betterment of public highways, roads, streets, bridges, mass transit, intercity passenger rail, ports, airports, and other forms of transportation, and any other transportation purpose as authorized by law. The costs of administering laws related to vehicles and transportation shall be limited to direct program expenses of the Secretary of State, the Department of State Police, and the Department of Transportation, or their successor agencies, relating to the enforcement of traffic laws or the safety of public highways, roads, streets, bridges, mass transit, intercity passenger rail, ports, or airports.
- (b) The revenue described in subsection (a) of this Section shall not be diverted by transfer, offset, or otherwise, for any purpose other than those described in that subsection.
- (c) Any mode of transportation not described in subsection (a) of this Section that is first proposed for State funding after this Section takes effect shall have a dedicated source of funding.
 - (d) Revenue derived from federal funds may be spent for any purpose authorized by federal law.

SCHEDULE

This Constitutional Amendment takes effect upon being declared adopted in accordance with Section 7 of the Illinois Constitutional Amendment Act.
