SENATOR ELLMAN:

Madam President, for an announcement.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Please state your announcement, Senator.

SENATOR ELLMAN:

I'd like to announce, everybody, that I am joined today by two fabulous young women, Jade and Adison Greenman. SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 878, an Act concerning transportation. 2nd Reading of the bill. No committee or Floor amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

3rd Reading. Final action. We will be moving through the Calendar to pick up 3rd Reading's final action. House Bill 0300 Belt. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Belt, present your bill, please.

SENATOR BELT:

Thank you, Madam -- Madam President. House Bill 300 establishes the Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability, as the agency responsible for adjusting the teacher minimum salary to be on par with the annual increases in inflation. The intent of House Bill 300 is really about this, right here, its -- it's -- it looks to adjust the minimum teacher salary to inflation and it assigns a specific agency, which is COGFA, to monitor the CPI on those salaries. That's all the bill does. I'll -- stop and I'll answer any questions if necessary.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 0300 pass. All those in favor say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 53 Yes, 1 No. House Bill having... House Bill 300, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Continuing on page 6. House Bill 1015, Sims -- Sims. House Bill 1109, Gillespie. House Bill 1133, Belt. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 1133, an Act concerning education. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Belt, please present your bill.

SENATOR BELT:

Thank you, again, Madam President -- President. House Bill 1133 is an initiative brought forth by the Southwest Illinois Community College, SWIC. It looks to align community colleges with school boards. It -- it also looks to give, let me pull it up. It also looks to give the secretary if the secretary is a board member, if the secretary is not a board member, then they may receive compensation at a rate determined by the board. It also allows for language that requires the chair and the vice chair to be members of the board, which they're currently not. And it also specifies, which is also in law right now, the first part specifying that if a community college district chooses to abolish its working cash fund upon -- upon the adoption of a resolution, they must direct the transfer to that fund, to the operating funds, at the close of the, then, current fiscal year. That is current law. It also looks to establish new working cash fund over -- over a referendum. It looks to give them the power to do that. Again, it's about flexibility for the community colleges and I'll answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? Senator Bennett.

SENATOR BENNETT:

Thank you, Mr {sic} Mrs. President. Will the sponsor yield, please?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

He say he will.

SENATOR BENNETT:

Thank you. Senator, thank you very much for bringing this bill regarding community colleges. Community colleges, of course, an important part of the education system in the State of Illinois.

Thousands of students, thousands of students go every year. And I appreciate the opportunity to talk about this for just a moment. Can you talk to me for a moment? When you said the current — the current situation has referendum or basically working cash where it's like a savings — a savings plan that goes back and forth in — in the current situation?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Belt.

SENATOR BELT:

Senator Bennett what it -- what this bill does, it, in -- in a sense, it -- it allows or it's asking to allow community colleges to create working cash funds. Right now, they -- they have to go on a referendum to be able to do that. They're really looking to align Community Colleges Codes, align them with the Illinois School Codes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Bennett.

SENATOR BENNETT:

So, the working cash fund is -- is one of the funds for community colleges and K-12, you mentioned. But the working cash fund, is -- is basically a savings fund, where it can go -- the money in there to go from one to another education to maintenance operations All those different accounts, right?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Belt.

SENATOR BELT:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Bennett.

SENATOR BENNETT:

So, what I am curious about here, you talk about the working cash fund. Right now, in current law, if the working cash is zeroed out, the -- the school has to have a voter referendum. So, all the residents around in that district have the opportunity to vote Yes or No. Is that correct?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Belt.

SENATOR BELT:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Bennett.

SENATOR BENNETT:

So, Senator, I -- I thank you for the -- for the information there. What I'm sensing then, is that, what we're - happening here is, right now, voters have the ability, are given the right to vote yes or no if working cash is zeroed out. But, with this bill voters no longer have or will have the ability to vote for that referendum or against it.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Belt.

SENATOR BELT:

Senator -- Senator Bennett. The current law requires for working cash funds to be created, a referendum.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Bennett.

SENATOR BENNETT:

Thank you. Thank you. So, with the new bill that we're talking about, the bill will take away - will remove the ability

for voters in the district to vote for or against the case in which the school wants to reimagine or recreate their working cash. In other words, if they zero it out, if they want to get it going again, right now, they have to have a referendum. But with this bill, if they have to go back and get more funds in the working cash, they no longer have to have a voter referendum and that —what that does for me, that scares them a little bit because the check and balance that was in this — that is in this situation before this bill is no longer in place. The check and balance of voter involvement, voter referendum, voter involvement with the vote for deciding for this community college, whether or not it gets passed or not, is gone. It's no longer there. Is that correct? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Belt.

SENATOR BELT:

I -- I -- I wouldn't agree with that assessment, Senator Bennett. Currently, community college -- community colleges have board of trustees who constituents put in office, not much unlike board members in school boards in public school districts. Those board members then or those board of trustees then have the right, as given to them, by the citizens who elected them to govern the day-to-day operations of the community college. The other thing I would say Senator Bennett, is library boards have the right to create work and cash funds. Park districts, right now, have the right to create working cash funds. The Illinois Municipal Code, right now gives cities, municipalities with -- with under 500 inhabitants, 500,000 inhabitants the right to create working cash funds. So, what this legislation is asking to do or requesting to do, is not unique. We have ample examples of entities that create

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Bennett.

SENATOR BENNETT:

Thank you. Senator, I appreciate information regarding what you're saying. A couple of things, if I may. What I'm concerned about is that you talk about the election, the candidates, the -the board of trustees are there to make decisions. As State Representatives, we have 2-year terms, for State Senate Districts or State Senators we have either 2-year terms or 4-year terms. The Community College Board Members, in which I was one for 19 years at Parkland College, we were basically elected every six years. In other words, six years is longer than anybody as either a State Senator or a State Representative will serve as and that does concern me and also, if we go back to the original Illinois Community College Act of 1960 something or other, this idea of a referendum was part of the original language, which was to be part of the check and balance between the schools and the voters that basically paid taxes every year for property tax, etcetera for the schools. And so, these two things together do concern me. I do have another question, if I may? The -- the question...

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Please proceed with your question, Senator Bennett. SENATOR BENNETT:

Thank you, Madam President. One -- one question, if I may, Senator. When the - if this vote does -- does pass and they do remove the voter referendum, is there any limit -- is there any limit by which they can put on this working cash or is any limit that you know of?

Senator Belt.

SENATOR BELT:

Senator, they would have to -- it would mimic the School Code and so that means that they would at least have to equal .05 percent.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Bennett.

SENATOR BENNETT:

Thank you. Senator, I'm not sure of .05 percent means? I know in the K-12 school district, if they have working cash and it's gone, they can only raise it up to the limit that was there before. I mean, it's -- it's in statute in terms of the amount that can have. So, it's a limited amount. Working cash is one of the smallest amounts of -- of money in any of the accounts for K-12, but with every -- everything I've been able to look at and I've talked to a number of board or community colleges no one could give me what the actual dollar amount is. Now, it could be a total amount of the overall assessed value of the community college, which you're talking millions of dollars, millions of dollars for the cost of the assessed value when you talk about the entire district. But, for this, I -- I've not been able to have an answer on what that really means.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Belt.

SENATOR BELT:

I didn't realize. I gave the answer, Madam President, that I have here, today.

SENATOR BENNETT:

To the bill, Ma'am.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

To the bill, sir.

SENATOR BENNETT:

Again, community colleges are an important part of what we have in our education system in Illinois. Community Colleges was part of the Illinois Community College Act that was created back in the 60s, where every piece of ground in the State of Illinois has at least representation of a community college throughout the State of Illinois. When we talk about working cash, it's a very important part. Right now, it's a savings account, savings fund, so to speak, that goes back and forth. But right now, if it zeros out, there is a referendum, by the voters, to approve them bringing money back into that working cash. And as far as I can tell, I'm not aware of any limit that they can ask for in that. So, I'm asking for a No vote on this. I don't think we want to remove the voter right, or the voter ability to vote on this, take to remove a referendum from statute for community college in which it was put in there as part of the very beginning for check and balance. And I would vote that we do not approve this, check and balance is important to maintain, and I do ask for a No vote. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Rezin, what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR REZIN:

To the bill, Madam.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

To the bill.

SENATOR REZIN:

Thank you. Well, I commend my colleague for his bills and

usually we try to work together on a few bills in Education. Unfortunately, this bill gives us pause on this side. We are all supporters and I love my community colleges in -- in our district and around the State, but when we look at the details in this bill, our concern is about transparency and accountability. This bill will allow community colleges or it -- let's just say any taxing body, I mean, but will allow the community college to bond out for working cash to pay bills without voter approval. Now, in -- in theory, they would have to pay that amount back in 12 months. If they didn't, they would have to go back to the voters and say you know what, we need to borrow more money because of all of these different scenarios maybe coming out of the pandemic and our student population is down. But yet, that process is being sidestepped in this bill, because now, in this bill, the community colleges can borrow money for their working cash, spend the money, and then the Board can decide to potentially, because they don't have to pay it back in 12 months, borrow more money to pay bills and potentially raise property taxes in order to pay for it. That's why we are asking for a No vote on this side, because we're concerned about the accountability and the transparency component that is built in to school funding to protect the taxpayers and at least allow the taxpayers a public hearing to know what's going on with their tax dollars. Thank you, Madam President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Any further questions? Senator -- Senator McClure. SENATOR MCCLURE:

Thank you, Madam President. Questions for the sponsor. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

He thinks -- He says yes.

Thank you, Senator Belt, and I apologize because it's kind of loud in the Chamber right now and maybe I didn't get the -- the answer to this. But I think Senator Bennett asked you if there was a limit to the amount that can be put into the working cash fund. What -- what is the limit?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Belt.

SENATOR BELT:

Senator McClure, this legislation looks to align the -- the college board system, community college board system with that of the Illinois School Code. And so, whatever it is, in the Illinois School Code, would be that -- of - for that. That's all it's looking to do, to perfectly align the community college system with that of the Illinois School Code.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Any further questions?

SENATOR MCCLURE:

Yes. But there was in the back and forth, there was a discussion about 0.05 percent, and that was the limit. I'm just trying to get clarification as to what the limit is. And if it's 0.05 percent, 0.05 percent of what?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Belt.

SENATOR BELT:

It says, if -- if - the working cash -- amounts transferred to -- amounts transferred and to be reimbursed in the working cash fund at least equal to 0.05 percent of the then current value -- of the then current value. We don't know what that is, but it's

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Go ahead. Please proceed, Senator Belt.

SENATOR BELT:

And that's from the Illinois School Code.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator McClure, any further questions?

SENATOR MCCLURE:

I'll speak to the bill. Thank you, Madam President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Thank you. To the bill.

SENATOR MCCLURE:

Thank -- Thank you very much. So, the School Code is not applicable to this and so, I do appreciate the clarification, but that's not applicable to this piece of legislation. Here we have voters being taken out of the equation and there are no limits on this -- this fund. Why would we want to take away the power of our voters to -- to determine what is best for their community colleges? This does not make any sense. I don't know why we're taking away this power and causing, all of us, to potentially have to pay more in property taxes and without public notice. So, in my view, this is a bad piece of legislation. I appreciate Senator Belt answering my questions. I urge a No vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Sally Turner.

SENATOR SALLY TURNER:

Thank you, Madam President. Question to the sponsor.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

He seeks your answer.

Thank you, Senator Belt. And, I also, appreciate my community colleges, which I have four in my district, but something I just as a former County Clerk, I'm thinking about the education fund. So, what's the maximum rate on the education fund for a community college?

Senator Belt.

SENATOR BELT:

Senator, I have no idea.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Turner.

SENATOR SALLY TURNER:

Well, the reason I say that is, I believe that this would be a way that a community college could ask for additional funds under the working cash and apply that to the bills that are coming from the Education Fund, and therefore, exceeding what their maximum rate for the Education Fund and that's not what the State of Illinois designed them to do. To the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

To the bill.

SENATOR SALLY TURNER:

So, I agree with Senator Bennett and what he was saying earlier. I -- I just don't think that this is what it's designed to do, and also Property Tax Limitation law is something that many of those counties had voted in and their intention was to always make sure that a referendum was done in order to express their will. So, thank you, Madam.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Thank you. Thank you, Madam President. Again, the overall purpose of this bill is to align the board of trustees working cash fund with what is currently, the School Code. The Illinois Community College Trustee Association's top concern, was in -- the introduced language in the House, regarding none board members filling in the secretary position. Those concerns were addressed, in the House, in relative to -- HFA No. 1. As I said before, we have entities, we have State entities, right now that exist -that create their own working -- that -- that have the ability to create their working cash fund; State library boards, park districts, Illinois - the -- the Municipal Code spells it out. We also have board of trustees, who, the citizens put in place, to help govern the community college boards. Beyond that, nothing stops the citizens from attending the board meetings, to ask those pivotal questions. This really is about -- as -- as I said -stated before, aligning to the School Code. This is about allowing the flexibility, allowing greater efficiency when it comes to -cash on hand and projects that need attention right away. I don't -- this is not about circumventing or -- or referendums or anything like that. It's about giving those colleges the flexibility that we already give public school districts. And for that, I would -would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

The question is, shall House Bill 1133 pass. All those in favor say, Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Shall all vote to wish? sic} (Have all voted who wish?) Take the record. On that question, there

But this is just to provide that transitional support to prevent homelessness and I know that is a top priority for all of us here. And so, yes.

There's so much support for this from the IEA, The Latino Policy Forum, Stand for Children, Advance Illinois, Start Early, Illinois Head Start Association, Illinois Action for Children, Illinois Association for the Education of Young Children, The Illinois PTA Carol Robertson Center for Learning, Teach Plus, and the Council for a Strong America. Everyone understands the importance of starting our kids young through early childhood supports and preschool and ensuring that they are ready for a fullday of kindergarten. So, this bill will allow the option of fullday kindergarten to begin with the '27-'28 school year. We put enough time in there for school districts to prepare. We've also provided school districts with certain barriers and difficulties that may happen for an extension of two additional years, if needed to allow for more implementation. A Full-Day Kindergarten Task Force is created to collect data regarding the current status of full-day kindergarten in Illinois and advise on the issuance of waivers for full-day kindergarten and make any recommendation that informs the planning and implementation of the requirement to the State Board of Education. I know that State Representative Canty really worked hard on this being her first bill, and I'd be happy to answer questions of Members.

House Bill 3428, as amended, requires all school districts, public schools, charter schools and nonpublic schools to maintain a supply of an opioid antagonist. This medication is used to reverse an opioid overdose in a secure location. We worked with the pharmacists on this to make sure that they were neutral. What we did was make certain that schools, if they can make a reasonable effort to obtain the medicine, then they are within the requirements. We -- We are losing a number of our children to opioid overdoses. We just had our -- our fentanyl awareness last week. We've had a number of overdoses in schools as well. The fentanyl crisis is claiming a growing number of our kids in urban, suburban, and rural schools. These drug deaths of aged 10 to 14 have more than tripled from 2019 to 2020. Kids go from breathing to not breathing in seconds. What this does is this will save a life. Naloxone saves lives in an instant. They're very simple to use. Comes in a little package, requires almost no training. All you do is you peel it open, you put it in somebody's nose and you spray it. It is a simple, easy way to instantly save a life and we should have this in every single school in our State. Many other states are doing this as well, and it's something that has happened because of the more vigorous and dangerous drugs that

people are ingesting these days. So, since that indication that the data shows that between 2010 and 2019, we had 500 U.S. teenagers die from overdoses. We've gone from that to in 2021, 1140 more teens have died. The National Association of School Nurses is so alarmed by that trend that they advise every school nationwide to develop this policy.

Thank you, Madam President. The social work profession is one founded upon and guided by ethical principles and standards which help guide our practice and fundamentally protect the people that we serve. I say our and we, because as many of you know, I

was a school social worker for 15 years prior to running for office. The ASWB released data showing that the clinical exam was biased against people of color, older adults, and people with disabilities. Specifically, this data shows that first time pass rates for the LCSW in Illinois include: white individuals pass at 82.5 percent, Asian individuals pass at 70 percent, Hispanic individuals pass at 59.6 percent, and black individuals pass at 42.4 percent. As a sponsor, I have heard from countless social work graduates and professionals in the field, who are fully competent, having completed a master's degree and intense clinical supervision hours, but have been barred from filling our mental health needs in Illinois, because of a test that's failing them. As a way to address these disparities, House Bill 2365, keeps the current path of licensing which is obtaining a graduation -- a master's from an accredited social work school, 3000 hours of supervision from an LCSW, and passing the ASWB exam. This bill opens a second path, this alternate path is the same which is receiving your master's degree, 3000 hours of supervision from an LCSW, having taken the test and failed it, in the last 5 years or moving forward after this bill goes into effect. Taking the test and failing it, and an additional 3000 hours of supervision from an LCSW or any other appropriate disciplines as defined in rules. For current LCSW, this legislation changes nothing but for the next generation of social workers looking to join the workforce, this alternate path creates an opportunity for Illinois to bring in social workers from all backgrounds to reflect the diverse communities they are trying to serve. We have worked diligently to hear the concerns of opposition and with this proposal, ASWB is now neutral on this legislation. While we recognize and hear the

fear of the unknown, we are confident in this bill and also want to raise the very real harm in our State by not acting as our constituents deserve a -- a diverse social work workforce to address the critical mental health crisis. This bill is only one step towards that, but one in which we can't afford to wait. I would be happy to answer any questions.

SENATOR MCCLURE:

Thank you. Questions for the sponsor.

Minnesota, Rhode Island, Puerto Rico have taken steps to address the bias test, similar to what we are trying to accomplish here.

But for like Minnesota, it's not everyone gets to not take the test. It's just for specific -- a small list of -- of possibilities. Is that correct?

That is correct. The ASWB test is only available in English.

This is for folks who are Spanish speakers.

I'll speak to the bill. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

To the bill.

SENATOR MCCLURE:

And that makes sense. So, this is a -- this is a test -that 50 states are using, 50 states, liberal states, Republican states, you know, purple states. Everyone else is using this and this is going to make this test no longer a requirement at a time when we've got a lot of issues with DCFS, with -- with social workers and social workers are really, really important. And I know we do have a shortage right now at DCFS and other places, but we want to make sure that the people filling those positions are qualified to be in those positions, so we don't have to read any more headlines like we've been reading recently about some of the kids in our State, what's been happening and unfortunately, right now, as the Senator said, people have to go through 3000 hours where they're working and then they take a test. This eliminates the need to take the test and says that they have to work another 3000 hours with supervision. But we've got no way to independently verify whether or not they're being properly supervised. Whether that 3000 hours is being done in the right way. The only way, right

now nationwide for this independent verification, is this test. And with the issues that we're facing right now, we need to ensure that our social workers, who are extremely important, and I thank the Senator for her work as a social worker, we need to make sure that they're qualified to -- to do this, because it's important work, it's lifesaving work sometimes, and it's really important to the families of this State. So to take away this test, which is the only way to independently verify whether a person is qualified to do this, is a mistake. Again, I appreciate what the Senator is trying to address, but we need to do this in a very responsible way. Again, the model that we're using here, this 3000 additional hours, they're already getting 3000 hours. So, if you're doing it the wrong way, it's not going to be a helpful 3000 hours. And no other state is doing it this way and our State is -- has received national headlines lately for issues with our social workers. So, there's a problem, certainly, we need to ensure to fill these positions but we need to have an independent way to verify that these folks are qualified to do this important work. Unfortunately, this strips away the qualification, and for that reason, I thank the Senator not only for her work, but her passion on this topic, but for that reason, I urge a No vote. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Villa, to close. Sorry, Senator Hastings, what purpose do you rise? Senator Villa, to close.

SENATOR VILLA:

The Social Work Code of Ethics, requires us, as social workers, to act. And that we can only live out our values if we are truly willing to address the difficult and very real inequities within our profession. Illinois is home to many prominent social

workers, including the mother of social work, Jane Addams. Many more include Ida B. Wells and Sir George Williams. Those who worked to set the foundation for the social work we see today. We have seen the disparities, we have the data, and as legislators it is incumbent that we act. I urge and Aye vote.

Well, this is -- this is that law. And I know there was some discussion about whether the Attorney General's Office could handle this. I talked to the Attorney General yesterday, on this bill. He's going to work with us to make sure that we can get this done and I'd be happy to answer any questions and I'd ask for an Aye vote.

Thank you, Madam President. HB 2217, as amended, aims at reducing the threat rate on poses to renters of property. The amendment creates a time frame for when a tenant may terminate a lease under the Act due to high concentrations of radon gas in a dwelling unit. Furthermore, HB 2217 requires disclosures and providing tenants with various documents to ensure they know the risks of radon and the legal recourse they have if dangerous levels are found. The bill allows a tenant to divide the cost of mitigation into equal parts, which may be deducted from their monthly rent, but only allows such mitigation measures to be taken with the expressed consent of the landlord. Likewise, if the installation was done without consent or improperly, the landlord may withhold a portion of a security deposit if one was used as payment for any corrective measures that needed to be taken. Lastly, the bill prohibits home rule units to act contrary to the Act, and I urge an Aye vote.

it. However, there is still an opponent, which is the Small Landlords Association. We talk in this Chamber about the lack of housing across the State of Illinois, and many small landlords provide that housing. It's vital to Illinois, COVID pandemic was especially hard on small landlords. They weren't able to evict. Many tenants thought that they would be erased from paying rent because of COVID, and that was not true. They were just abated from being evicted. So, because the small landlords are still opposed, I think that should give us reason to wait for this bill to move forward. We need housing and we need small landlords, and this is a mandate on them that they're not willing to take on, and I would like to support them, and I would urge a No vote. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any further discussion, Senator Syverson?

SENATOR SYVERSON:

Thank you. A question of the sponsor.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

SENATOR TRACY:

Thank you. Senator, in the language of the bill, line 6, it would be Section 5. It states in their finding period, the General Assembly finds that radon is the leading cause of death in private homes. What -- where is that information coming from that this is the leading cause of death in homes?

Okay. Thank you. So that -- that portion of the text that section 5 is no longer in the in the final amendment?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is this? Oh, there we go. Yes, that is correct.

Senator Syverson.

SENATOR SYVERSON:

Okay. Thank you. When we saw that on there, because when we looked at the National Safety Council and the National Institute of Health, EPA and the Center of Disease it listed that, it -- it showed that it wasn't remotely close to the leading cause of death. So, I'm not sure where that came from. But I appreciate the fact that at least we took that that language out of the that part of it out of the bill. So, thank you. Thank you, Madam President.

SENATOR CURRAN:

Thank you, Madam President. To the bill.

Senator, I recall a time, a couple of years ago, where Senator Plummer, on his first bill, managed to secure President Cullerton as -- as his first chief co-sponsor and we were all impressed. But I -- I think as I stand here today and I look at that board, I am more impressed with the work you've done on this bill. I will be voting in favor. Thank you, Senator.

Senator Joyce, what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR JOYCE:

To the bill, Madam President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

To the bill.

SENATOR JOYCE:

So, I rise in support of this legislation. I want to thank Senator Ellman for bringing this forward. A few years back, my sister-in-law had succumbed to lung cancer and, you know, she had never smoked a day in her life. We found out that her house was heavy in radon. This is a measure that saves lives and I applaud the sponsor for and -- and the Realtors and the advocates for working together to get the Realtors to neutral. It's unfortunate that we still have some opposition, but this is a measure that will save lives, and ultimately, I think - I applaud the sponsor for bringing forward and I ask for support.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Ellman, to close.

SENATOR ELLMAN:

Thank you, Madam President. And I'd like to comment, too, on my co-sponsor. Thank you, for your leadership in this measure, as

House Bill 2856, an Act concerning health. 3rd Reading of the bill.

Senator Glowiak Hilton, please present your bill.

SENATOR GLOWIAK HILTON:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 2856 removes the option to include a deceased military members veteran status from the Vital Records Act. Rep. Swanson had a constituent whose spouse died from a heart attack, due in part from exposure to Agent Orange and because of the way the statute is currently written, she was not eligible for the survivor benefits and other rights because there was no place, on the form, to explain that an Agent Orange was a contributing factor to his death. So, these changes will

make it possible to explain contributing factors so that surviving spouses do not experience this issue.

Is there any discussion? Senator Wilcox. Senator Harriss, E. Harriss.

SENATOR E. HARRISS:

Sure, to the bill. I'd like to thank the sponsor for bringing this forward. I think it's an excellent bill that will help our military families and would encourage everyone to get on board with a Yes vote.

House Bill 3779, an Act concerning criminal law. 3rd Reading of the bill.

SENATOR VENTURA:

Is there an amendment I'd like to adopt?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

It was adopted, Senator, please proceed with your bill.

SENATOR VENTURA:

Thank you, Mr. President. Mrs. President. Madam President. Senate Bill{sic} (House Bill) 17 -- 3779, as amended, is a page and line amendment. This is a very simple bill. It allows the - to end the sentence whoever is eligible for home confinement or other confinement outside of the Department of Corrections facility for that Department of Corrections to provide a three-day notice to the State's Attorney or Sheriff and using electronic notification as opposed to the 15-day mail notification. And I asked for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any question, Senator McClure?

SENATOR MCCLURE:

Question -- questions for the sponsor.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

She indicates that she'll yield.

So, this really applies to people that have been sentenced to the Department of Corrections, but they've been in the county jail for longer or as long as their sentence is. And have the Sheriffs taken a position on this legislation? SENATOR VENTURA:

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 3892, an Act concerning State government. 3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Turner. Please explain your bill.

SENATOR D. TURNER:

Thank you, Madam President. House Bill 3892 allows the Illinois Housing Development Authority to develop a program that provides incentives for affordable housing projects incorporate urban and suburban gardening. The bill requires IHDA to consult with the University of Illinois on the program to work with the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity to facilitate the distribution of produce from the garden and requires the Affordable Housing facility provide all necessary tools for the garden. The purpose of this bill is to incentivize gardening products for human consumption in areas that may lack fresh produce and in populations that may not be able to afford fresh produce. Community gardens specifically -- Thank you. Community gardens specifically can save a household between \$75 and \$380 in food costs. And finally, gardening can also reduce stress and help physical and mental health. And I just want to repeat that the bill does not require IHDA to create a gardening incentive program. It merely allows them to do so.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Is there any discussion? Senator Turner, to close.

SENATOR D. TURNER:

I would just ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Plummer, do you have a question? SENATOR PLUMMER:

Yes, Madam President. A question of the sponsor.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

She indicates she'll yield.

SENATOR PLUMMER:

Thank you. So, I -- Senator Turner, thank you for -- for bringing this. I spent some time reading this and I'm frankly trying to understand what we're trying to accomplish here. Can you walk me through from a funding standpoint where this funding would go? Who would financially benefit, I guess, from this program? I'm not speaking to the actual urban or suburban farming portion. I mean, the actual funding for the program.

SENATOR D. TURNER:

Question, could you be a little bit more specific? SENATOR PLUMMER:

Sure. Thank you. So -- so, this just seems like something only government could create. It says that the Illinois Housing Development Authority may develop a program that incentivizes for the development of affordable housing projects that incorporate these gardening programs. However, it says that the developers have to provide the land, the buildings, and the tools and the resources to farm. And I don't think developers are really farmers. But then it says that the University of Illinois shall be consulted. So now we got IHDA involved, now we got the University of Illinois involved regarding best practices in urban gardening and farming, it goes into those details. And then, we got to get DCEO involved because in DCEO has to help create a distribution network. I don't think DCEO creates distribution networks to link

these gardens with businesses to facilitate the sale. I -- I'm sure the intent is good here, but we're spending a whole lot of money and we're -- we're getting all these various agencies and units of government involved, and then we've got the developers doing the farming. I'm trying to understand where the moneys going? SENATOR D. TURNER:

I think that you're making this into a much bigger issue than it really is. These -- these types of projects happen all the time. I know I was on the Springfield City Council and in Springfield when we had affordable housing projects that had vacant land that was attached to it, they were used to create urban gardens and that would be basically what would happen in these situations.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Plummer.

SENATOR PLUMMER:

To the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

To the bill.

SENATOR PLUMMER:

So, the sponsor just highlighted my -- my point here. This -- this type of farming and gardening goes on all the time. You provide an example here, in Sangamon County, of that taking place where you had affordable housing that had vacant ground and that was utilized for this purpose. That is not what this bill does. What this bill does is it financially incentivizes developers to start farming and then it's got the University of Illinois, IHDA, DCEO and all these other State organizations that have plenty of other good things to be doing looped into this program. And it's

-- it's never going to result in anything because ultimately it depends on the developers who want to get out of these affordable housing projects, when -- when -- when they can to provide everything necessary to continue farming in perpetuity. When those developers don't do that, this whole thing collapses. So, I'm -- I'm sure the intent is good. But this is bureaucracy, on top of bureaucracy, on top of bureaucracy and it will harm our ability in areas of affordable housing to actually accomplish what you're trying to accomplish because of all the red tape and all the government involvement. I'm all for urban and suburban farming, but we've got to do it in a way that we can actually end up getting vegetables and fruit at the end of the day. And this bill makes sure that that will never happen. I urge a No vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Are there any further questions? Hearing none, Senator -- Senator Castro.

SENATOR CASTRO:

To the bill, Madam President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

To the bill.

SENATOR CASTRO:

Well, I understand that the previous speaker is a little confused about what the bill does. As I've talked about and I serving on the Illinois Housing Development Authority prior to my arrival to the General Assembly. I recognize the value in creating these urban gardens, actually in Elgin, one of the homes that received Illinois Housing Development Tax Credit created an urban garden and a senior building. Which helped not only the seniors eat healthy meals, but also was used as a project to keep them

active. This is a very important issue, and I recognize if someone wants to mock it thinking it's bureaucracy. Actually, there's a real problem with food deserts in our State. Maybe he's not concerned about it, but in the end, this is a good bill. I ask all my colleagues to support it. Thank you.

Senator Turner, to close.

SENATOR D. TURNER:

Thank you, Madam President. And thank you, Senator Castro, for your comments. And you're absolutely right, this is a very good bill that provides a lot of benefit to communities as well as those individuals who are living in those affordable housing projects. It provides them with fresh fruits and vegetables. It also takes some areas that may be blighted and put something active there that really changes the nature of those neighborhoods, and it also provides for socialization for people who are living in those areas. So, there's a lot of benefit and I urge an Aye vote. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

The question is, shall House Bill 3892 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 42 Ayes, 11 Nays. House Bill 3892, (having) received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. On page 10, House Bill 2531, N. Harris. Mr. Secretary, read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 2531, an Act concerning transportation. 3rd Reading of the bill.

Senator Harris, please explain your bill.

SENATOR N. HARRIS:

Thank you, Madam President and Members of the Senate. House Bill 2531 requires IDOT to establish and commence the prequalification process to enter into a public private agreement within 6 months of the effective date, which is January 1, of 2024. And the statue also requires the Department to add in the global freight cargo transfer development, as stated in the goals of the airport. This is a measure that's been going on for around 30 years to get to this point to create economic development, jobs and infrastructure to the Southland of Chicago. It's something that studies have been done from the FAA -- from the FAA, IDOT and many others to show that Illinois can handle a third airport which would be predominantly cargo, and I seek its favorable support.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Thank you. Is there any discussion, Senator Hastings.

SENATRO HASTINGS:

To the bill, Madam President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

To the bill.

SENATRO HASTINGS:

Madam President, Members of the Senate to -- to the bill. I just want to make sure that I caveat Senator Harris's statement just in terms of timing. As a member of the suburban delegation, the South Suburban Airport discussion has been going on since as far back as 1967. We can go all the way back to Richard J. Daley, the former Mayor of Chicago, who proposed Peotone as an alternative site to the Chicago airports. Studies have been conducted from

1967 to 1970, 1985 to 1987. There was an establishment of an Illinois Airport System Plan Policy Commission in '86, there was an environmental assessment in 1998, which was a Tier 1 and Tier 2 or in 2002, we -- we approved an FAA approved study which stated that it was environmentally feasible location. We've invested 75 million dollars in the purchase of property. We invested 162 million dollars for road infrastructure improvement, to make this a reality, and most recently in 2014, we purchased another piece of land which makes this an economically viable site for a cargo airport. Give the south suburbs an opportunity to succeed. Give the opportunity to south suburbs who have had probably one of the most growing economic environments in the last 30 years. Give us a chance to succeed. We have warehouses going up. We have commercial businesses going up. We have residential homes going, -- going up. Give us an opportunity to succeed. This airport, whether it's cargo, whether it's whatever it may be in the future. This is the future of the City of Chicago and the definitely the future of the south suburbs. And I strongly urge an Aye vote. Thank you, Madam President, for the time.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Thank you. Further questions, Senator Belt.

SENATOR BELT:

Thank you, Madam President. I have a question to the speaker. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

He indicates he'll yield.

SENATOR BELT:

Leader Harris, I have MidAmerica airport in my district, would the onboarding of this project impact my airport?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

SENATOR N. HARRIS:

No. But to answer it more directly, Senator Belt, the way the formula is for airports and the way that monies are calculated is they get funding from the State -- from the federal government funds that states based on the number of flights in and out of airports. And if no flights are let out, then no money is calculated. If the airport gets up and running and people decide that they want to invest and build an airport here, the federal government will reassess that formula and send more money to accommodate the new usage.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Belt.

SENATOR BELT:

Thank you, Madam President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Ventura.

SENATOR VENTURA:

To the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

To the bill.

SENATOR VENTURA:

I rise in opposition of this bill. I have been contacted by Openlands, Sierra Club, as well as, some of the airports. Including legislative updates from the Will County Board and the Will County Farm Bureau, all asking to oppose this bill. There are no major airfreight carriers on record supporting the need for the Peotone Airport. A 10,000-foot runway and corresponding infrastructure could cost \$2 million. The local government is asking for us to

not approve this, as it will cause more transportation issues, in our area, impacting our environment, as well, as our labor. And, I ask for a No vote.

Senator Harris.

SENATOR N. HARRIS:

Thank you, Madam President. For far too long, the Southland has been deemed a place where there is no economic opportunity, no development, and no care from the State of Illinois. This is an opportunity for IDOT and the State of Illinois to say the Southland is open for business. I say let's land the plane and pass this measure to see if there is an opportunity for the Southland to grow. This is the Southland Renaissance and I approve this message. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Further questions, Senator Stadelman.

SENATOR STADELMAN:

Thank you, Madam.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Please proceed, Senator Stadelman.

SENATOR STADELMAN:

I guess, I get too close? I certainly understand the sponsors motivation and appreciates his efforts on this issue. He's looking at an opportunity for his district, but I guess I would have to respectfully disagree that this has no impact on the rest of the State and that the other airports across the State. So far, the State of Illinois has spent, as was mentioned, hundreds of millions of dollars a lot of land acquisition, road improvements, and there's been no interest from airlines. In fact, IDOT has held 2 similar requests for information back in 2014 and 2017, and they

-- they produced no results. In the meantime, that's money that could have been used invested in airports in East Saint Louis, Peoria, Bloomington, Champagne, Springfield, DuPage County and the Rockford Airport. This legislation talks specifically about trying to attract cargo service. But O'Hare, Midway, and Rockford already provide that service in northern Illinois. In fact, O'Hare has undergone a major expansion, of its capacity cargo service. Rockford is one of the fastest growing cargo airports in the country, it's the 14th busiest airport when it comes to cargo service. It has plenty of room to expand. It could use additional State dollars to continue this growth along with the other airports. The City of Chicago opposes this legislation, the Illinois Chamber of Commerce opposes this bill, and groups that are concerned about the environmental impact have been fighting this project for decades. Let's invest in airports that we already have. Thank you, Madam President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Holmes, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR HOLMES:

Thank you, Madam President. To the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

To the bill.

SENATOR HOLMES:

I was running for office, in 2006, for the Senate, and at that point, my district, had a very large portion of Will County. One of the first things, that I was hearing about, as I was representing Will County or about to represent Will County, was how important the Peotone Airport was. And I have seen legislators for the past 16 years, 17 years, trying to get this airport and

make this a viable bill. However, the one thing I have to say to is let's take a look at what Will County has done in those years. Will County has become a major, major transportation hub, and I think the airport only enhances that. I would ask everybody to support this airport. Thank you.

SENATOR JOYCE:

Thank you, Madam President. To the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

To the bill.

SENATOR JOYCE:

I want to echo what my south suburban colleagues have said on the South Suburban Airport. This has been a generational discussion. I talked to members of the community in the Southland, I also talked to the Will County Farm Bureau, who opposes this. This is a piece of legislation that requests people to put their money where their mouth is and come forward. That's what this bill does. The Southland deserves to have that conversation. If no one comes forward, so be it. But I'll bet they come. And -- and I urge and Aye vote. I urge on us to support one of our most challenged areas in the State of Illinois and support the Southland. Thank you, Madam President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HUNTER)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

Thank you, Madam President. I just want to say, I rise in support, of helping Senator Harris, land this plane.

And I just know that every Member of the south suburban area that represents have all been on one accord with the need for this third airport. So, I rise in support of Senator Harris. I support what it is you're trying to bring to your area. I hope that it brings a lot of good paying jobs. I hope it creates an opportunity to expand in ways to help you guys receive everything that you need out in the Southland. And I'm hoping that we could use this measure here to get real serious about transportation needs and -- and the environment needs and jobs and economics and all of that is one big comprehensive package. But until we do so, it will be a delight to finally see this become a reality for the Southland Hub. I --I encourage Members to vote Aye.

Some of the things I would like to just tighten up, so to speak, as it relates to the environmental issues. There have been numerous studies from the EPA that has already approved the site and determined that there are no significant environmental issues dealing with the site. That is a fact.

Secondly, the South Suburban Airport would be a carbon neutral airport, the first of its kind here in the United States. And because of its location, the many distribution and logistics centers that's in the south suburban region would greatly benefit due to reduced truck trafficking, which will help -- which will help our roads that we travel on each and every day. For the last 30 years, there's been doubters about what can and cannot happen in the south suburban region. For those reasons, the FAA, the EPA and IDOT have all concluded that Illinois can handle a third airport. Today, is now the day, if you believe in economic development, if you believe in the revitalization of the Southland, and if you believe in giving Illinois an opportunity to create more jobs for the working-class people of Illinois, let's land the plane and vote Aye.
