1. Mr. President, and members of the Senate, this Resolution
2. has to do with our distinguished and respective colleague, and
3. member of the fourth estate, Marion "Hap" Lynes, and he's re-
4. tired from active reporting on February 2, 1973. As all of us
5. know, that "Hap" has twenty-eight years; has been a tireless ob-
6. server and reporter on the Missouri and Illinois politics, and,
7. so, he has written and spoken for this Body for seventeen years,
8. with unflinching objectivity, fairness and wit which has earned
9. him election to the President of the Illinois Legislative Cor-

24. SENATOR MOORE:

25. Thank you, Mr. President. ... The bill that was just
26. read, .. Mr. President, is the reapportionment bill that re-
27. apportiones the State into 59 districts as we presently have
28. them. Any member on either side of the aisle that would like
29. to be a co-sponsor, I have no objection to and if they do they
30. can put their name on the bill at the Secretary's desk. Thank

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Executive. Is there any other business to come before
22. the Senate? Senator ParTEE.

23. SENATOR PARTEE:

24. I just wanted to raise a question so that the member-
25. ship could cogitate the problem prior to the time we finalize
26. our rules for this session. I am personally opposed to the
27. use of proxies in our committees. I came to know during the
28. course of the last two years, that proxy voting in committees
29. is an abhorrent kind of thing and it is absolutely something
30. which most witnesses who come to testify here find to be dis-
31. tasteful. People come down here to testify before a commit-
32. tee after having carefully prepared their remarks, and then
33. find that persons are voting on the issue presented without

1. the benefit of having heard those remarks by and through the
2. proxy system. I don't solicit ... or desire at this morning
3. to get involved in any vote on the question. It is but one of
4. the other general rules, but I wanted to make it crystal clear
5. that I am opposed to the proxy voting in any committees and
6. the question ... I am talking about, arose this morning and
7. one of the committees where the chairman permitted the proxy
8. to be voted. So when we finalize our rules, which I would
9. hope would be within the next week, I want you to know in ad-
10. vance what my position is on proxy voting.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Any ... Senator Buzbee

13. SENATOR BUZBEE:

14. Request leave to be listed as a co-sponsor on Senate Bill
15. 149.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. So ordered. Are there any other announcements? We have
18. one additional Congratulatory Resolution. Proceed Mr. Secretary.

19. SECRETARY:

20. Senate Resolution No. 25 by Senator Mitchler. It's congrat-
21. ulatory.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Senator Mitchler.

24. SENATOR MITCHLER:

25. Yes, Mr. President, this Congratulatory Resolution for
26. Marie A. Klein, who's retiring after 37 years with the Aurora
27. Chapter of the American Red Cross and I would ask for suspen-
28. sion of the rules and immediate consideration of this Resolu-
29. tion and adoption thereof.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Is there leave? Senator Mitchler moves the adoption of
32. the Resolution. All in favor signify by saying aye. Contrary
33. nay. The Resolution is adopted. We have a death -- is there

1. any further business to come before the Senate? Senator Partee.

2. SENATOR PARTEE:

3. Mr. Chairman, I would hope that the action I am about to
4. take would not be misconstrued as anything other than what it
5. really does. I'm filing a motion to discharge two bills from
6. a committee. A committee which has not yet, mind you, voted
7. a Do Not Pass Motion on those bills. These are the two bills
8. that relate to the mass transportation problem in our State
9. which are for convenience I suppose, referred to as the CTA
10. Bills, and those bills were in the Transportation Committee
11. yesterday and a motion was made and passed, to hold the bills
12. in the committee. I do not say that the chairman or any per-
13. son in that committee has any desire to hold them for any in-
14. ordinate period of time. I'm just simply saying to the world
15. that we are filing a motion to discharge, which motion we will
16. not argue until it becomes necessary to argue it, but we want the
17. world to know and particularly those people who depend on trans-
18. portation of a mass nature throughout this State, that we are
19. concerned and that we are doing everything possible to bring
20. about a climate of travel for them and to help those agencies
21. which provide the transportation for them. So I'm filing that
22. motion on that basis.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Chew.

25. SENATOR CHEW:

26. Yes, I concur with Senator Partee's statement. I made
27. the motion to move it out of committee. I was beaten down but
28. I want the Senate to know that I'm certainly going to support his
29. motion, that he will file, on getting it on the Senate floor.
30. I think it's very vital, as we brought out yesterday, for all
31. of the members of this august Body to have an opportunity to
32. look at this bill and if there are amendments to be offered,
33. we would prefer doing it on the floor than to just bottle it up

1. in committee as what is going to happen anyway. So I'll support
2. your motion Mr. Partee. Thank you.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Senator Partee, I believe that ... your motion either
5. should express some date in the future ... the way it is ex-
6. pressed now, I believe we would have to act on it, today, but if
7. you were to express it to a time ... specific in the future then
8. you would protect....

9. SENATOR PARTEE:

10. ...All right, then...

11. PRESIDENT:

12. ...opportunity and avail yourself of keeping your motion
13. alive under the rules.

14. SENATOR PARTEE:

15. Fine. Well, then, I would have no objection to it's
16. being amended on it's face to next Wednesday.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. All right, we ... the Secretary then will provide --let's
19. add the language that consideration of your motion, which has
20. properly been put, shall be considered on the date of next Wed-
21. nesday. Is that satisfactory?

22. SENATOR PARTEE:

23. That's correct. Thank you.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Is there any further business to come before the ----
26. the introduction of bills.

27. SECRETARY:

33. SENATOR SOURS:

1. Mr. President, Senators, I just have an inquiry. Will
2. there be a Calendar next week, on our desks? Next Wednesday?

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Yes.

5. SENATOR SOURS:

6. All right, thank you.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Is there any further business to come before the Senate?
9. We have a Death Resolution. Will the members be in their
10. seats?

11. SECRETARY:

12. Senate Resolution 26, by Senators Smith, Dougherty, Kenneth
13. Hall, Welsh, Romano, Carroll, Chew, Savickas and Partee.

14. (Reads Senate Resolution 26)

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Senator Smith

17. SENATOR SMITH:

18. Mr. President and members of the Senate, permit me to say
19. that in my humble opinion, Stephen J. Lamb was perhaps one of
20. the most forthright men connected with the labor movement here
21. in the State of Illinois. Prominently connected with the union
22. workers, devoted to the cause of the laboring man, he often
23. times in his quiet, but with well-reasoned logic, came forth
24. with ideas to settle many of the problems that confronted the
25. labor movement. In spite of his usual daily routine, Stephen
26. J. Lamb never forgot the little man. I can truthfully stand
27. here and say that Christmastime, Thanksgiving, Easter, Wedding
28. Anniversaries, etc., insofar as this your humble servant is con-
29. cerned, he never forgot. He never overlooked such occasions.
30. I sometimes think, Mr. President, that the marks of a great man
31. is, not how often he talks, his references to himself, strutting,
32. etc., but how does he react to those less fortunate than himself.
33. That was the type of man that I personally knew Stephen J. Lamb

1. to have been. His voice has been silenced, the blood no
2. longer courses through his veins, the heartbeat has been stop-
3. ped, but I believe that his memory, his quiet and his effec-
4. tive way of achieving the job or the task at hand will be long
5. remembered. May I then ask for the suspension of the rules
6. and the immediate consideration and adoption of the Resolution?

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Is there leave? Senator Smith moves the adoption of the
9. Resolution. All in favor signify by arising. The Resolution
10. is adopted.

11. The Senate Pursuant to its adjournment Resolution stands
12. adjourned until 11:30 a.m., Wednesday, February 21st.
