5. Will the Senators, who are still in their offices, kindly  
6. proceed forthwith to the Senate Chambers? We'd appreciate it.  
7. The Senate will please be in order. Our Chaplain, who Senator  
8. Davidson had provided for us today, waited until about a quarter  
9. to one. Father Becker had an anxious young couple that was wait-  
10. ing to be married, so he had a legitimate excuse for requesting  
11. us to forgive him and wish them good...God's speed. The invoca-  
12. tion today in the absence of Father Becker will be from the Sena-  
13. tor from Hoopeston, Senator Merritt. Will you please lead us in  
14. prayer, and will the guests in the gallery stand and proceed  
15. with us.

21. Mr. President, I now move that we postpone the reading

10. Thank you, Mr. President and ladies and gentlemen of the
11. Senate. Senate Bill 1382 and 1424. I've spoken with Senator
12. McBroom. What I would like to do is move without taking any
13. action on the proposed committee amendments, move them to third
14. reading with the understanding that tomorrow we will call them
15. back and go through them all. I think there are four on 1382
16. and there are 7 or 8 or 9 on 1424.
17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
18. Senator Rock, the Secretary has some problems with doing
19. it this way. Do you wish to save a legislative day? Is that
20. what you're trying to do? Senator Rock moves that the...that
21. Senate Bill 1382 be moved to third with the understanding that
22. action on the amendments will be delayed until tomorrow. Is
23. there any discussion? Senator Regner.
24. SENATOR REGNER:
25. There were several committee amendments. How can we move
26. to third reading without adopting or...or killing the committee
27. amendments? Have a vote on them one way or another, the way I
28. understand it.
29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
30. Senator, it is with the understanding that these will be
31. dealt with tomorrow. All committee amendments. Senate Bill
32. 1382 is on third reading. All in favor of deferring action on
33. the amendments until tomorrow, signify by saying Aye. Opposed

1. Nay. Motion carries. Senator Merritt.

2. SENATOR MERRITT:

3. Mr. President, do I understand that that moving to third

4. applied to both, to 1382 and 1424?

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

6. The same motion will be made on 1424.

7. SENATOR MERRITT:

8. Well, just as long as it's wi...with the under...the under-

9. standing that it will be returned to second for amendments

10. tomorrow. Is that...is that correct?

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

12. That's correct, Senator Merritt. We're just deferring

13. action on the committee amendments until tomorrow.

14. SECRETARY:

15. 1424.

16. (Secretary reads title of bill.)

17. Second reading of the bill. The Committee on Appropriations of-

18. fers Amendments numbered 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

20. Senator Rock.

21. SENATOR ROCK:

22. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I

23. would make the same motion to defer action on the proposed com-

24. mittee amendments and the other amendments that are up there.

25. This bill will probably have about fourteen amendments in total.

26. I would make the motion that we defer action on any proposed

27. amendments and move the bill to third reading with the express

28. and full understanding that it will certainly be called back be-

29. fore it's called for passage.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

31. All those in favor of Senator Rock's motion signify by

32. saying Aye. Opposed Nay. The motion carries. Senate Bill

33. 1424 is on third reading with the understanding that it will

1. be brought back tomorrow for amendments. 1644.

2. SECRETARY:

3. Senate Bill 1644.

4. (Secretary reads title of bill.)

5. Second reading of the bill. No committee amendments.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

7. Are there any amendments from the Floor? Third reading.

18. (Secretary reads title of bill.)

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

21. Senator Donnewald.

22. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

23. Yes, Mr. President and members of the Senate. This does

24. pr...this corrects an error, made by the department, and does

25. restore the mineral rights to those people that have given an

26. interest...or a fee...a simple interest for the development of

27. I-64 through that part of Clinton County. I would urge a favor-

28. able roll call.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

30. Is there any discussion? Senator Conolly.

31. SENATOR CONOLLY:

32. Mr. President, members of the Senate. I'm not objecting

33. to this bill, but I just want to go on record and draw attention

1. to the matter, to a subject with moc...most of us take for granted  
2. and that is an easement. This regards to the acquisitional land by  
3. the State, in this instance, the Department of Transportation.  
4. According to I-DOT's policy, mineral...minerals underlying the  
5. surface when...when the fee interest is acquired, unless the own-  
6. er has specifically reserved them or the same have been previous-  
7. ly severed in some manner from surface ownership. Land Acquisi-  
8. tion Manual also states, no additional payments should be made  
9. for mineral interest and if in...owner insists upon payment, the  
10. minerals are to be specifically reserved by the surface owner..  
11. If this request occurs the warranty deed is to include the fol-  
12. lowing language. Reserving, however, onto the grantor, his heirs,  
13. executors, administrators, and assignees, all the coal and other  
14. minerals, underlying the above tract with the right to mine and  
15. remove the same, but without the right to break, disturb, and  
16. subside the surface of the said tract, unquote. In this specific  
17. instance, the land was acquired by the State in 1965 and in 1967.  
18. The DOT clines...claims they made a mistake. Why in 1974 is  
19. this request being made to return the mineral rights to the pre-  
20. vious owner? On this 26 acres of land now sits an overpass and  
21. an off-on ramp for Interstate 64. This was constructed at the  
22. cost of 1 and 1/2 million dollars. The reason I make this point  
23. is that if the minerals underlying the surface of this particular  
24. 26 acres are eventually mined with modern mining techniques,  
25. there is a future danger of subsidence occurring...subsidence  
26. occurring, causing damage to this costly project. Inquiry to the  
27. DOT officials revealed that there is no ready knowledge regarding  
28. the State recovering for these possible damages. I have further  
29. advised that modern coal mining operations will, in all likelihood,  
30. permit subsidence to occur because there is relatively little  
31. shoring in evacuated areas. Subsidence is occurring more and  
32. more frequently in and along our local and State highway systems.  
33. Subsidence is costing the State substantial amount of monies for

1. road repair and maintenance. I just want to call this to your  
2. attention to this problem. I feel that Illinois Department of  
3. Transportation should not continue to make mistakes that may  
4. cost us more in the long run.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

6. Any further discussion? Senator Donnewald.

7. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

8. I...I think Senator Knuepfer had his...I want to respond.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

10. Excuse me, Senator Knuepfer.

11. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

12. I want to...I want a response first, and then I will...

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

14. Senator Donnewald.

15. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

16. Mr. President and members of the Senate. I...I would...

17. Senator Conolly, I couldn't quite hear you. I...I heard most

18. of what you read. What was that from again?

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

20. Senator Conolly.

21. SENATOR CONOLLY:

22. The language about the Warranty Deed is in the Rules of

23. the DOT Policy.

24. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

25. Of the what?

26. SENATOR CONOLLY:

27. The Rules and Regulations of the DOT.

28. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

29. All right...when this part...

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

31. Senator Donnewald.

32. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

33. When this particular right of way was purchased, there was

1. an agreement, in fact, by DOT to reserve unto the land owner...  
2. the dunned land owner, the right to reserve those minerals,  
3. coal and other minerals, meaning coal, oil, and gas. Now that  
4. was the agreement. They did not incorporate that within the  
5. deed. That was their error. Now, as to subsidence and the...  
6. the thing to which you refer. The coal seam...the...the produc-  
7. tive coal seam and commercial coal seam in my area, in Clinton  
8. County, is what we call the Herrin or No. 6 Coal. That parti-  
9. cular coal is overlain by what we call the Herrin Line and it is  
10. immediately over and about eight to ten feet thick. The modern  
11. mining techniques have recently, in the last fifteen to twenty  
12. years, remedied the subsidence problem. Years ago we had the  
13. subsidence problem where they kept chipping away at what we call  
14. the mine pillars. When the mine pillars were chipped away, there  
15. was no...no support left and consequently we had what we call a  
16. squeeze, which caused subsidence. Subsidences would occur on  
17. very, very shallow shaft mine areas, maybe 200, 300 feet deep.  
18. This particular seam is in excess of 350 feet deep, in this  
19. particular area, and I don't think that subsidence is a problem  
20. here. I think that the bill is meant to correct the situation  
21. that does certainly exist in this area.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

23. Senator Knuepfer. Does that answer your question?

24. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

25. That answers my question.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

27. Any further discussion? The question is shall...did you  
28. care to close, Senator Donnewald? Do you care to close? Ask  
29. for the question.

30. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

31. I believe I'll accept a roll call.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

33. Question is shall Senate Bill 1425 pass. Those in favor



1. vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have  
2. all voted who wish? On that ques...have all voted who wish?  
3. The Secretary will take the record. On that question the Ayes  
4. are 49, the Nays are one. Senate Bill 1425, having received the  
5. constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 1500.

6. SECRETARY:

7. Senate Bill 1500.

8. (Secretary reads title of bill.)

9. Third reading of the bill.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

11. Senator Netsch.

12. SENATOR NETSCH:

13. Excuse me. Thank you. You caught me in the middle of my  
14. lunch. Senate Bill 1500 was originally requested by the De-  
15. partment of Registration and Education. It was completely re-  
16. written in committee twice and, as finally rewritten, had the  
17. approval of the...I think everyone who is concerned. It deals  
18. with the issue of temporary or permit doctors in particularly  
19. the State Mental Health System. As, the bill now stands, it al-  
20. lows those who are on permit, to continue for a period of two  
21. years, so long as they pass a clinical examination in the three  
22. months prior to their July, 1975, renewal. It permits some  
23. additional temporaries to be taken on during this period, but  
24. with a maximum period of service of eighteen months unless they  
25. fully pass the qualifying medical examinations. And, it also,  
26. and this is very important, I think, requires the Department of  
27. Mental Health to come back to the General Assembly no later than  
28. April 1st of next year with a proposal for some kind of a  
29. permanent scolution to the issue of permit doctors. As I indicated  
30. as finally worked out, the Mental Health Association, the Medical  
31. Society, the Departments, and all the members of the Committee,  
32. I think were not ecstatic, but satisfied. I will be happy to  
33. answer questions.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

2. Is there any discussion? Senator Knuepfer.

3. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

4. Well, I...I think this is a very important bill, at this  
5. point. It's needed for our medical hospitals, and I would ask  
6. support on both sides for it.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

8. Any further discussion? Senator Mitchler.

9. SENATOR MITCHLER:

10. Ask the sponsor a question. Who is in support of this in  
11. ...in addition to the Department of Public Health? Any of our  
12. State Medical Society, and...

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

14. Senator Netsch.

15. SENATOR NETSCH:

16. I'm sorry. I did not hear the first part of your question.

17. SENATOR MITCHLER:

18. Senator Netsch, who supports Senate Bill 1500 in its amended  
19. form, in addition to the Department of Public Health? Is the  
20. Illinois State Medical Society and the Illinois Hospital  
21. Association, have they given endorsement of the amended form?

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

23. Senator Netsch.

24. SENATOR NETSCH:

25. I don't believe we heard from the Illinois Hospital Associa-  
26. tion at all. As I recall, Senator Knuepfer, they did not appear  
27. before our committee. The Medical Society did appear as the bill  
28. was originally drafted, they strongly opposed it, and we worked  
29. it out from the beginning with their knowledge and, while I don't  
30. think we ever asked them, do you now support the bill, they with-  
31. drew their opposition and also, incidentally, agreed to parti-  
32. cipate with the Department of Mental Health during the course of  
33. the coming months in working out a more permanent solution to the

1. permit doctor issue.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

3. Senator Mitchler.

4. SENATOR MITCHLER:

5. Well, another...another item. The reason I had to ask that  
6. is because in my bill book I do not have the amended version and  
7. I sent back to the bill room and it's not printed yet. Now,  
8. let's not rush these things through at the last minute here,  
9. when you have a completely rewritten bill, as you said in com-  
10. mittee, rewritten twice, and you're asking us to vote on something  
11. that I don't even have in my bill book. So, why don't we hold  
12. this up until the bill is...is printed in its amended form so  
13. that we can take action on it? Now, we're in the final hours,  
14. and I don't think this has anything to do with the appropriations  
15. or the revenue for the 8 billion dollar budget. So, this is a  
16. bill that's been hanging around for a long time. It's got a low  
17. number and I think you ought to hold it up until we can at least  
18. read what we're voting on, Senator.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

20. Senator Latherow.

21. SENATOR LATHEROW:

22. Well, Mr. President and members of the Senate. My suggestion  
23. was somewhat similar to Senator Mitchler's. I can't quite under-  
24. stand, nor vote for the bill, or know what I have. The amendment  
25. would have to change my mind, if I am able to support it. And,  
26. I don't have the amendment.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

28. Senator Knuepfer.

29. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

30. Well, I'll tell you what...what happens if the bill doesn't  
31. go through, and that is we don't have any medic...we lose about  
32. 200 medical personnel in our State institutions, and this is the  
33. device for maintaining their licensing. Senator Netsch correctly

1. correctly represented it as an agreed bill for a period of two  
2. years of time at which time all doctors who don't pass the exam  
3. are going to be phased out, but if you don't pass this bill,  
4. somebody is going to have to find some 200 doctors in our in-  
5. stitutions. It is a necessity. That's the reason it's...it's  
6. on the calendar because it is darned important to the State of  
7. Illinois that it be on this calendar.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

9. Senator Soper.

10. SENATOR SOPER:

11. Well, Mr. President and Senator Netsch. I don't have the  
12. amendment, but just from what the synopsis says, it puts me in  
13. ...thought about a couple of things with this. Now, Senator  
14. Knuepfer said that we'd lose about 200 doctors. Now, does this  
15. mean that these doctors will be licensed to practice medicine  
16. in any place in the State of Illinois?

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

18. Senator Netsch.

19. SENATOR NETSCH:

20. No, they would not be. They are not entitled to practice  
21. medicine anywhere in the State of Illinois unless they pass  
22. the same examination that is required of other candidates for  
23. that privilege. At the present time the so-called Permit Doc-  
24. tors are entitled to practice only in the State institutions.  
25. This bill would required that in order to continue even to do  
26. that for this temporary period of time, they would be required  
27. to pass a clinical examination. It is not exactly the same  
28. examination as is required of those who are thereafter entitled  
29. to practice medicine generally, but it is, we think, an improve-  
30. ment over what is required at the present time of Permit Doctors,  
31. but by no means would they be permitted to practice medicine  
32. generally.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

1. Senator Soper.

2. SENATOR SOPER:

3. Well, you see the synopsis is sort of confusing. It says,

4. permit...hospital permits to practice medicine after passage of

5. clinical examination and I...the thought came to my mind, if

6. they were allowed to practice medicine with this examination,

7. I don't know what they'd do now and why this is needed, but if

8. you say it's needed and Senator Knuepfer says it's needed, I...

9. I respect your...your thoughts on this and your opinion, but if

10. this allows the doctors that practice medicine, I know what they're

11. going to do. They're going to run out of that State hospital and

12. open up a medical center and a clinic and make themselves about

13. 200,000 dollars a year shooting penicillin and so forth for 10

14. dollars a shot under Medicare. So, I...I'd like to be careful

15. with this before we do anything.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

17. Senator Graham.

18. SENATOR GRAHAM:

19. I'm a little inquisitive, Senator Netsch. I think I under-

20. stand what the problem is. First of all, I would like to ask

21. you. Are we, or are we not, in our State institutions, under-

22. staffed, in-so-far as doctors are concerned?

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

24. Senator Netsch.

25. SENATOR GRAHAM:

26. Including the Permit Doctors?

27. SENATOR NETSCH:

28. All of the information that our committee has had is that

29. we are greatly understaffed even with the Permit Doctors. With-

30. out them we are in very desperate circumstances right now.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

32. Senator Graham.

33. SENATOR GRAHAM:

1. If this bill doesn't pass then these Permit Doctors will be  
2. no longer able to serve us in the State institutions? Is that  
3. right?

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

5. Senator Netsch.

6. SENATOR NETSCH:

7. That is correct. After the date that is written into the  
8. existing law, they would be presumably simply dismissed from  
9. State service.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

11. Senator Graham.

12. SENATOR GRAHAM:

13. Having the Elg...Elgin State Hospital in my district, I be-  
14. come a little bit gun shy after some of our experiences up there.  
15. I'm wondering, if we are adopting an attitude, I hope we're not,  
16. I don't think you would, I'm sure you wouldn't, that a poor doc-  
17. tor is better than no doctor at all. These Permit Doctors, how  
18. well qualified are they? In your opinion?

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

20. Senator Netsch.

21. SENATOR GRAHAM:

22. You're not on the Medical Board, I know.

23. SENATOR NETSCH:

24. Well, I'm not sure my opinion about their capability is...  
25. is really that valuable, because I'm not a doctor myself, Sena-  
26. tor Graham. We raised this question, many of us, at some length  
27. during the committee deliberations and it was a source of con-  
28. cern. Those who have been...or able to judge their medical capa-  
29. bilities feel that many of the Permit Doctors are fully as capa-  
30. ble as our own American...speaking American trained doctors.  
31. Others feel that some of them are not as capable and I'm not sure  
32. that it's possible to strike it all one way or the other. I  
33. think it might make some difference whether you're talking about

1. those that are purely in the psychiatric area or those who are all  
2. ...who are primarily performing the medical functions in the State  
3. hospital and there is some difference, I think, in that respect  
4. also. But, I think, to try to go back and summarize, I think  
5. that the...the message that...that we got from those who have...  
6. attempted to make make that assessment, is that many of them are  
7. fully capable, some are not, but they are not able, in all cases,  
8. to pass the State examination because of language barriers which  
9. would entitle them to be full-fledged doctors, although they are  
10. required to continue working on it.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

12. Senator Graham...or Senator Ozinga.

13. SENATOR OZINGA:

14. I wonder if the Senator yield to a few questions? Number...  
15. number 1, Senator Netsch. This is an amendment to the bill, which  
16. I sponsored a couple of years ago with reference to Doctor  
17. Munose, is it not?

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

19. Senator O...Netsch.

20. SENATOR NETSCH:

21. I believe that is correct, Senator Ozinga. I was not here  
22. at that time, but it is an amendment to existing law in the...in  
23. the three respects, which I described. It...it allows an addi-  
24. tional extension of time, which the Medical Society agreed was  
25. necessary, and it requires a plan for, if you will, disposing  
26. of the issue.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

28. Senator Ozinga.

29. SENATOR OZINGA:

30. The one word is all that I'm asking. It is an amendment to  
31. the bill that we passed regarding the fuhrer that was raised with  
32. regard to Dr. Munose. The answer is yes, is it not?

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

1. Senator Netsch.

2. SENATOR NETSCH:

3. I think that is correct. I was not here at the time, Sena-  
4. tor Ozinga, but I...I believe that is correct.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

6. Senator Ozinga.

7. SENATOR OZINGA:

8. If I could just get the ear of the rest of the members.

9. This is a bill that gives an alibi to the doctor so that he now  
10. gets another pass for a couple of years. If you'll remember the  
11. newspapers were quite vehement when Doctor Munose's case came up.  
12. This is a bill that said that foreign doctors, when they were in  
13. these institutions, had to pass a test on or before the date of  
14. 1972, July 1st of 1973. Now, what are we doing? We're extend-  
15. ing the time and changing it just a little bit. We're changing  
16. it so that they now can get a permanent permit to practice with-  
17. in the hospitals of the State of Illinois. They can get a per-  
18. mit on...as long as they do it prior to February 1st of 1975.  
19. Now that's a permit that will be issued out of a clinical, a  
20. clinical examination in the general medicine fields of either  
21. neurology and psychiatry or general medicine or both. This is  
22. doing away with exactly what we tried to get at just two years  
23. ago. This gives them another pass for a couple of more years.  
24. The main thrust of this bill is these doctors could not pass  
25. the test within the time that was allotted them, and now they're  
26. looking for an alibi to extend it. That's all it is.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

28. Senator Sours.

29. SENATOR SOURS:

30. Mr. Pres....Mr. President and Senators. I have a couple  
31. of questions I'd like to ask the Senate sponsor, if I may,  
32. please.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):



1. Senator Netsch.

2. SENATOR SOURS:

3. How does this, Senator Netsch, jibe with the Department of  
4. Registration and Education or...do they favor it?

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

6. Senator Netsch.

7. SENATOR NETSCH:

8. The bill was introduced at their request. They preferred  
9. it in its original form, but those of us on the committee would  
10. not accept the bill in its original form and so we amended it.  
11. They are still willing to accept it, although it's...it is not  
12. as permanent a solution as they wanted. I think I...if I might  
13. just take this opportunity, I think what I had better do is to...  
14. if I could have...Mr. President, if I might have attention for  
15. just a minute. It's quite clear to me that...that some of the  
16. members have not seen the amended version of the bill. Senator  
17. Ozinga, for example, what he was reading is not the way the  
18. amen...the bill now reads. I think what I had better do is to  
19. hold the bill for one day and give everyone a chance to see the  
20. amendment, and I think that will answer a great many of the  
21. questions.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

23. Senator Netsch wishes to take 1500 out of the record.

24. Senator Soper. House Bills on Third Reading. Senator Dougherty.  
25. House Bill 2353. Are you ready?

26. SECRETARY:

27. House Bill 2353.

28. (Secretary reads title of bill.)

29. Third reading of the bill.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

31. Senator Dougherty...Senator Dougherty.

32. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

33. I would like to hold this for a moment.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):  
2. All right, Sir. Take it out of the record. Senator Sha-  
3. piro. 2298. We'll move to the order of Senate Bills on Third  
4. Reading. Senator Soper on 1426.  
5. SECRETARY:  
6. Senatè Bill 1426.  
7. (Secretary reads title of bill.)  
8. Third reading of the bill.  
9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):  
10. Senator Soper.  
11. SENATOR SOPER:  
12. Mr. President, the bill does exactly what the synopsis  
13. says. There's no...no explanation. The Gerald Shea from the  
14. House was the co-...co-...well, we were co-...co-presidents,  
15. we're co-chairmen of this committee, and we'd like to continue  
16. this Commission. Ask for your favorable vote.  
17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):  
18. Is there any discussion? The question is shall Senate Bill  
19. 1426 pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay.  
20. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record.  
21. On that question the Ayes are 52 and the Nays are none. Senate  
22. Bill 1426, having received the constitutional majority, is de-  
23. clared passed. ...bills on...Mr. Secretary. Appointment of  
24. Conference Committee.  
25. SECRETARY:  
26. (Secretary reads appointments to Conference  
27. Committee.)  
28. I do hereby appoint the following to serve as mem-  
29. bers of the Conference Committee on House Bill 2826:  
30. Senators Howard Mohr, Knuepfer, Davidson, Rock and  
31. Nudelman.  
32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):  
33. House Bills on Third Reading. Senator Bruce asks leave to

1. bring House Bill 2264 back to the order of second reading for the  
2. purpose of an amendment. 226...2264. Is there leave? Leave is  
3. granted.

4. SECRETARY:

5. Amendment No. 4. Senator Latherow.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

7. Senator Latherow.

8. SENATOR LATHEROW:

9. Mr. President and members of the Senate. This is the non-  
10. academic increase of 3% for people at the universities and  
11. there's an increase in the budget of about 1.7 million. I move  
12. the adoption.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

14. Senator Latherow moves the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to  
15. House Bill 2264. Senator Bruce.

16. SENATOR BRUCE:

17. For the reasons set forth on the University of Illinois and  
18. all the other systems, I would oppose this amendment.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

20. Any further discussion? All in favor of the adoption of  
21. Amendment No. 4 to House Bill 2264, signify by saying Aye. Opposed  
22. Nay. Amendment's adopted. Did you request for a roll call, Sena-  
23. tor Netsch? Third reading.

24. SECRETARY:

25. House Bill 2298.

26. (Secretary reads title of bill.)

27. Third reading of the bill.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

29. Senator Shapiro.

30. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

31. Mr. President and ladies and gentlemen of the Senate. House  
32. Bill 2298 is the appropriation bill for the ordinary and contin-  
33. gent expenses of the Board of Regents and I would urge a favor-

1. able roll call.
2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
3. Is there any discussion? The question is shall House Bill
4. 2298 pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay.
5. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record.
6. On that question the Ayes are 53 and the Nays are none. House
7. Bill 2298, having received the constitutional majority, is de-
8. clared passed. Senator Bruce, do you wish to move on 2264?
9. 2286, first.
10. SECRETARY:
11. House Bill 2286.
12. (Secretary reads title of bill.)
13. Third reading of the bill.
14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
15. Senator Bruce.
16. SENATOR BRUCE:
17. Yes, Mr. President and members of the Senate. This is the
18. annual appropriation to the Junior Colleges throughout the State
19. of Illinois. The flat grant is raised from 18.50 to 19.20. The
20. Occupational Technical Course is raised from a rate of 5 to 5.80.
21. There's other changes throughout the bill, basically giving more
22. money to Junior Colleges throughout the State of Illinois. I
23. would ask for a favorable roll call.
24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
25. Is there any discussion? The question is shall House Bill
26. 2286 pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay.
27. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record.
28. On that question the Ayes are 53 and the Nays are none. House
29. Bill 2286, having received the constitutional majority, is de-
30. clared passed. House Bill 2264.
31. SECRETARY:
32. House Bill 2264.
33. (Secretary reads title of bill.)

1. Third reading of the bill.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

3. Senator Bruce.

4. SENATOR BRUCE:

5. Mr. President and members of the Senate. This is the annual

6. appropriation for the Board of Governors. It has the pay plan

7. amendment increase that meets with the approval of some and dis-

8. approval of others. I would ask for a favorable roll call.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

10. Is there any discussion? The question is shall House Bill

11. 228...64 pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote

12. Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the

13. record. On that question the Ayes are 57, the Nays are none.

14. House Bill 2264, having received the constitutional majority, is

15. declared passed. Senator Glass, 2786.

16. SECRETARY:

17. House Bill 2786.

18. (Secretary reads title of bill.)

19. Third reading of the bill.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

21. Senator Glass.

22. SENATOR GLASS:

23. Thank you, Mr. President. This bill appropriates 10,500

24. dollars to pay the expenses of the National Conference of Com-

25. missioners on Uniform State Laws for the period July 1, '72,

26. through June 30th, '73. This had not been paid because of an

27. inadvertent failure to submit a required voucher for the appro-

28. priation lapsed. And then the appropriation was properly...the

29. con... (machine failure)...properly payable and so I would now

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

32. Is there any discussion? The question is shall House Bill

1. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record.
2. On that question the Ayes are 51, the Nays are two. House Bill
3. 2786, having received the constitutional majority, is declared
4. passed. ...Bill 2357.
5. SECRETARY:
6. House Bill 2357.
7. (Secretary reads title of bill.)
8. Third reading of the bill.
9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
10. Senator Vadalabene.
11. SENATOR VADALABENE:
12. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. House
13. Bill 2357, as amended, appropriates the...is the ordinary and
14. contingent expenses of Southern Illinois University, and I would
15. appreciate a favorable vote.
16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
17. Is there any discussion? The question is shall House Bill
18. 2357 pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay.
19. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record.
20. On that question the Ayes are 56 and the Nays are none. House
21. Bill 2357, having received the constitutional majority, is de-
22. clared passed. Senator Hynes on the Floor? On the order of
23. House Bills on Second Reading. Senator Hickey, do you wish to
24. move 2168?
25. SECRETARY:
26. House Bill 2168.
27. (Secretary reads title of bill.)
28. Second reading of the bill. No committee amendments.
29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
30. Are there any amendments from the Floor? Third reading.
31. 2346.
32. SECRETARY:
33. ...2346.

1. (Secretary reads title of bill.)  
2. Second reading of the bill. The Committee on Appropriations of-  
3. fers two amendments.  
4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):  
5. Senator McBroom, do you move the adoption of Amendment No. 1  
6. to House Bill 2346? Senator McBroom moves the adoption. All in  
7. favor signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. Amendment No. 1 is  
8. adopted. Senator McBroom moves the adoption of Amendment No. 2.  
9. Is there any discussion? No. 2 changes the section number only.  
10. Is there any discussion? Senator Wooten.  
11. SENATOR WOOTEN:  
12. What is Amendment No. 2 about?  
13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):  
14. It changes the section number, Senator Wooten. Any further  
15. discussion? Senator Partee.  
16. SENATOR PARTEE:  
17. Amendment No. 1...would you give us an explanation of both  
18. of them? We didn't hear it. You know, incidentally, Mr. Presi-  
19. dent, I've been in bars and lounges that are a lot quieter than  
20. this with people imbibing.  
21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):  
22. Senator McBroom, would you explain Amendment No. 1 and 2  
23. to House Bill 2346? The Arts Council?  
24. SENATOR MCBROOM:  
25. Well, No. 1 is the retirement amendment, Mr. President.  
26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):  
27. That amendment has been adopted.  
28. SENATOR MCBROOM:  
29. All right. Number 2 takes 100,000 dollars out for the  
30. Chicago Symphony, Mr. President, and 30,000 dollars for  
31. self evaluation, whatever that might mean.  
32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):  
33. Senator Vadalabene.

1. SENATOR VADALABENE:

2. Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate. So that  
3. all the members can be informed about the Illinois Art Council  
4. appropriation, the 100,000 dollars that was taken out of the  
5. Illinois Arts Council bill was restored yes...last night in the  
6. Appropriations Committee, and it was put in the...the Business  
7. and Economic Development appropriation, so that that money was  
8. not lost to send the Chicago Symphony to Europe.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

10. Senator Partee.

11. SENATOR PARTEE:

12. Well, I understand that the money was restored to the  
13. Business and Economic Development Commission. I just would  
14. have this question, so that in the future I can understand  
15. these things. What was the rationale for not putting it back  
16. in the Illinois Arts Council and putting it in BED? That's  
17. all I'd like to know.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

19. Senator Vadalabene.

20. SENATOR VADALABENE:

21. I really don't know what the rationale was in...in...in  
22. making the changes, but Senator Partee, I can tell you this.  
23. As late as a half hour ago Bruce Sagon said to me personally,  
24. that's...he's glad, that's where it ought to belong anyway.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

26. Senator Partee.

27. SENATOR PARTEE:

28. I don't doubt that, but I...I still don't know why, and  
29. that's what I'm trying to find out. If nobody knows why,  
30. let's forget about it, but I would like to know why, if any-  
31. body knows.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

33. Senator Hynes, do you wa...care to answer?



1. SENATOR HYNES:

2. Senator, the principle reason is 30 votes as opposed to 29.  
3. But beyond...beyond that Senator Hall does have a very lucid  
4. explanation, I think, of...of the rationale behind this.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

6. Senator Harber Hall.

7. SENATOR HALL:

8. Senator, I think I can mumble through this. Well, we...we  
9. felt that the Illinois Arts Council is funded for the purpose  
10. of small contributions to relatively unknown artists to promote  
11. them and promote the interest in art throughout the State.  
12. This well-known and renown, actually nation...nationally and  
13. perhaps internationally, symphony is...it comes under a little  
14. different situation. I was persuaded by friends in Chicago that  
15. this trip to Europe would benefit business in it...from Illinois  
16. where we want to do business in Europe, the appearance of the  
17. symphony in Europe would assist us. Therefore, we changed the  
18. appropriation to Business and Economic Development last night.  
19. I...I think it's a very good move and it gets away from undoubt-  
20. edly a new precedent of sending Illinois Art outside of the State,  
21. using taxpayer money to promote Art outside of the State, and it  
22. keeps it in the realm of a...a real economic benefit and not just  
23. an artistic benefit.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

25. Is there any further discussion on Amendment No. 2? All in  
26. favor signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. Amendment No. 2 is  
27. adopted. Any amendments from the Floor? Third reading. House  
28. Bill 2415, Senator Hynes. 2426, Senator Hickey. 2778, Sena-  
29. tor Dougherty.

30. SECRETARY:

31. House Bill 2778.

32. (Secretary reads title of bill.)

33. Second reading of the bill. No committee amendments.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

2. Any amendments from the Floor? Third reading. Senator  
3. Knuepfer.

4. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

5. If we're in Limbo, I got a couple of motions.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

7. We are on the order of motions then. Senator Knuepfer.

8. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

9. Then I would move to suspend the 6-day rule on House...on  
10. Senate Bill 1625. It will...the hearing on 1625 will continue  
11. Tuesday morning. I would, as well, move to suspend the 6-day  
12. rule on Senate Bills 1636, 1668, and 2201. These are all of

20. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

21. Go ahead.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

23. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senator Conolly.

24. SENATOR CONOLLY:

25. Mr. President, I rise to make an announcement that the  
26. Senate Transportation Committee will meet tomorrow morning at  
27. 9 a.m. in Room M-1 to discuss those bills that have recently  
28. been referred to this Committee by the Rules Committee. We...  
29. it will...all those bills will be heard tomorrow morning, 9  
30. o'clock. I assume it will be the last meeting of the Committee  
31. this session.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

33. Senator Conolly, do you need to identify any bills to have

1. ...heard...

2. SENATOR CONOLLY:

3. ...on the list right now. The people...the people who've  
4. been asking me for...for to be heard know which bills they are.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

6. Senatör...Senator Regner was first.

7. SENATOR REGNER:

8. Yes, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I've cleared  
9. this with the President, the Minority Leader, and the Chairman  
10. of the Executive Committee, and I'd like to move that the Senate  
11. Executive Committee be discharged, regarding Senate Bill 1669,  
12. and that bill be placed on the order of second reading.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

14. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senator Fawell.

30. Are there further motions before we leave that order? Sena-  
31. tor Nimrod.

32. SENATOR NIMROD:

33. Mr. President. I rise on a point of per...personal pri-

1. college. I'm pleased to tell you that with...from my district  
2. today there is a group that has journeyed here and is making  
3. a tour of the area and they are in the balcony behind us on the  
4. other side of the aisle, and before I ask them to rise and be  
5. recognized, I would like to say that Senator Bell's brother,  
6. Dr. Theodore Bell from the University of Hawaii and his son,  
7. Douglas Bell, is along with him also, a brother of our Senator  
8. Bell. And, I would also ask this group from the 4th District,  
9. who is taking the tour today, to stand up, including my wife

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

18. Is there leave? Leave is granted.

19. SENATOR REGNER:

20. Yesterday we adopted Amendment 2, but there was a technical  
21. error in Amendment 1, and I do have another amendment from the  
22. Reference Bureau with the right section numbers in it. I would  
23. now like to move to reconsider the vote by which Senate Amend-

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

26. All in favor signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. Motion

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

32. All in favor of Senator Regner's motion signify by saying  
33. Aye. Opposed Nay. Amendment 1 is Tabled. Senator Regner.

24. and a Mr. Hugh Hough, who were given the Pulitzer Prize for

9. The motion carries and House Joint Resolution 108 is adopted.  
10. Senator Daley, House Joint Resolution 109.

11. SENATOR DALEY:

12. Mr. President...Mr. President and fellow Senators. House  
13. Joint Resolution 109...109 is asking that the week of July 28th  
14. to August 3, 1974, be reserved as the official week for United  
15. Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America, AF of L, CIO.  
16. They're holding their 32nd National Convention in the City of  
17. Chicago in the State of Illinois. I would ask the...for the  
18. suspension of the rules for the immediate consideration and  
19. adoption of this resolution.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Is there further discussion? Senator Daley has asked for  
22. leave for all Senators to serve as co-sponsors. Is there leave?  
23. Leave is granted. So ordered. Senator Daley moves to suspend  
24. for immediate consideration. All in favor signify by saying  
25. Aye. Contrary No. The motion carries. On the motion to adopt.  
26. All in favor signify by saying Aye. Contrary No. The motion  
27. carries, and House Joint Resolution 109 is adopted. May I have  
28. the attention of the Senate, please. We are pleased to have as  
29. our guest on the Podium, Miss Illinois, who is Miss Meternick  
30. from Carthage, Illinois. She shares the Podium here with the  
31. President and her Senator, Senator Latherow. I'm sure you all

33. MISS ILLINOIS (MISS METERNICK):

1. Thank you. I'm very grateful to the...the Senate for hav-

3. almost at the end of my reign. I'll be dethroned in about a  
4. month, and after that, the day after I'm dethroned, I'm deported,  
5. I'm going on a USO Tour, as a representative of the United States,

26. Excellent suggestion. On the order of the Secretary's  
27. Desk. Senator Bell, do you want to proceed? On the order of  
28. Consideration Postponed, do any of the Senators wish any matters  
29. called on that order of business? I just want to call attention,  
30. the fact, we are still in session. There are a tremendous num-  
31. ber of people not entitled to the Floor. I would admonish the

10. SENATOR ROE:

11. We're not attempting to foreclose anyone, but I'm not go-

12. ing to make an agreement, when I haven't been shown any proposed

13. amendments to call the bill back.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

15. Senator Knuppel.

16. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

17. I don't believe that was the question, and it's this type

18. of high-handed action that will get at the poor...

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

20. Restate your question, Senator.

21. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

22. Well, I don't get...care. Now if you want me to spout off,

23. I don't need the microphone, I'll say something that you don't

24. want to hear.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

26. No, we're...we're aware of that, Senator. If you want to

27. restate your...

28. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

29. Well, I don't care what you say, Mohr...

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

31. I care what you say. You're out of order. Senator Dougherty.

32. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

33. Mr. President and members of the Senate. I would like to

1. move that the Committee on Local Government be discharged from  
2. any further consideration of House Bills...

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

4. Senator, I thought you were talking on this subject. Just  
5. one moment. Further amendments? Third reading. Senator  
6. Dougherty.

7. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

8. Mr. President, I would like to move that the Committee on  
9. Local Government be furth...discharged from any further hear-  
10. ings on House Bills 2278 and 2279, and they be advanced to the  
11. order of second reading.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

13. Is there leave? 2279, Senator?

14. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

18. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

19. They're companion bills.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

21. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Second reading. Senator  
22. Graham. Senator O...Partee.

23. SENATOR PARTEE:

24. Mr. President, House Bill 2666 is a bill which now resides  
25. in the Committee on Assignment of Bills. I have discussed with  
26. the Chairman of that committee, Senator Graham, and with the  
27. Chairman of Revenue, the committee to which it would normally be  
28. assigned, the motion I am about to make. The motion has the ap-  
29. probation of both and it is a bill, which was passed in the last  
30. session of the Legislature by both Houses, and over in the...  
31. vetoed by the Governor. Subsequent to the Veto, we overrode the
