4. of Springfield. Will our guests in the gallery please rise.  
5. Father Becker.

6. (Prayer by Reverend Robert T. Becker)

7. Reading of the Journal. Senator Soper.

8. SENATOR SOPER:

9. Mr. President, I now move that we postpone the reading  
10. and the approval of the Journals of June 12th, 13th, 17th, 18th  
11. and 19th pending the arrival of the printed Journals.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Senator Soper moves that we postpone the reading of the  
14. Journals of June 12, 13, 17, 18 and 19 pending the arrival of  
15. the printed Journal. Is there discussion? All in favor signify  
16. by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. So ordered.

18. SECRETARY:

19. The Governor has nominated and appointed the following

21. ask concurrence in and confirmation of these appointments by  
22. your honorable Body. These are the appointments to the Lottery

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Executive. Senator Ozinga.

26. SENATOR OZINGA:

27. Mr. President, it is my understanding that we are drawing  
28. neigh to the close of the session and I would ask leave at this  
29. time of the Body of the Senate to have an Executive Committee  
30. meeting next Monday at 2 p.m. or immediately after the close of  
31. the session for the purpose of hearing this message together  
32. with any other matters that might be in the Executive Committee.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Ozinga seeks unanimous consent of the Senate to  
2. call a meeting of the Committee on Executive for acting on the  
3. nominations to the Lottery Control Board and any other messages  
4. that are before the Executive Committee that have not been acted  
5. on. Is there leave? And that...that meeting would be on Monday  
6. immediately after adjournment. Leave is granted. Did you have  
7. a question on that Senator Clarke? No. Yeah. All right.  
8. Leave is granted. So ordered. Senator Clarke.

9. SENATOR CLARKE:

10. If it's proper at this time, I'd like to ask leave for  
11. suspension of the rules for a Revenue Committee meeting  
12. tomorrow morning. Friday morning.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Clarke seeks leave of the Senate to call a committee  
15. of the Committee on Revenue tomorrow morning at what time  
16. Senator Clarke?

17. SENATOR CLARKE:

18. 8:30.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. At 8:30. Tomorrow morning at 8:30 to hear the bills in  
21. the Committee on Revenue. Is there leave? Leave is granted.  
22. Messages from the House.

23. SECRETARY:

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator McBroom.

32. SENATOR McBROOM:

33. Well Mr. President and Members of the Senate, I discussed

1. this with you Mr. President and with Senator Hynes and I thought  
2. it might be appropriate if I'd make the announcement now and...  
3. and whatever the appropriate motion might be if that is necessary.  
4. The Appropriations Committee was scheduled to meet at 3 o'clock  
5. next Monday and 9 o'clock next Tuesday Mr. President. I'd like  
6. to have leave of the Body for the Appropriations Committee to  
7. meet at 3 o'clock on Monday and...and I'm not quite through Mr.  
8. President, and 3 o'clock on Tuesday. Now, does that take care  
9. of that Mr. President? Do I have leave of the Body to...

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator McBroom seeks leave of the Senate to call for a  
12. meeting of the Committee on Appropriations for Monday at  
13. 3 o'clock or immediately after adjournment, whichever is earlier  
14. and on Tuesday, next week, at 3 o'clock p.m. or immediately  
15. after adjournment, whichever is earlier. Is there leave. Leave  
16. is granted. So ordered. Senator McBroom. And incumbent in that  
17. request is to hear any bill in Senate Appropriations still  
18. before that committee. Senator McBroom.

19. SENATOR MCBROOM:

20. Yes. Yes. Mr. President, Senator Course has brought to  
21. my attention we have on the call this afternoon HB 2363. And,  
22. it is not posted...it's not posted on the blackboard outside  
23. Mr. President and what was the other...and HB 2345, Department  
24. of Revenue is posted for today and will be heard Monday. Senator  
25. Course wanted me to notify you and the members of the Body.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. All right. Now that just applies to HB 2363?

28. SENATOR MCBROOM:

29. Well, it'll be heard today but the blackboard, maybe we  
30. should tell Mr. Sweeney it's incorrectly posted Mr. President.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. All right.

33. SENATOR MCBROOM:

Do you want me to repeat that or just clear...

1. PRESIDENT:

2. You seek leave of the Senate to have heard today HB 2363.

3. SENATOR MCBROOM:

4. That's correct. It's on the call but the blackboard is  
5. wrong.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Ok. That will be changed. Leave is granted to hear HB 2363  
8. so that there is no question on that. Is there leave? Leave  
9. is granted.

10. SENATOR MCBROOM:

11. And 2, 3, 4, 5 Mr. President will not be heard today. It  
12. was never our intention to hear it today. It will be heard  
13. Monday but it's posted for today.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. All right. The bulletin board will be changed. HB 2345  
16. will be heard Monday. Are there further announcements from  
17. Chairman in regard to committee meetings that will require the  
18. waiving of the six day rule? Senator Latherow.

19. SENATOR LATHEROW:

20. Well Mr. President, I'd like also to suspend the six day  
21. rule for the hearing of all bills assigned to the Agriculture,  
22. Conservation and Ecology Committee for Monday at 9 o'clock.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Latherow seeks leave of the Senate to hear all the  
25. bills that are before the Committee on Agriculture, Conservation  
26. and Ecology for a committee meeting on Monday at 9 a.m. Is  
27. there leave? Leave is granted. Senator Knuepfer.

28. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

29. The committee gave me...the House gave me leave yesterday  
30. to waive the six day rule on three bills. Since then I've re-  
31. ceived some others and I don't know how many others are coming  
32. in but I would ask leave to waive the six day rule on all bills  
33. coming into Public Health, Welfare and Corrections for their

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Yes. Senator Knuepfer did you state when you were going  
4. to hold that meeting?

5. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

6. 8...8:30 a.m. Monday morning.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Ok. Senator Knuepfer seeks leave of the Senate to hear  
9. all bills before the Committee on Health, Education and Correc-  
10. tions...I'm sorry Health, Welfare and Corrections at a meeting  
11. 8:30 Monday morning. Is there leave? Leave is granted.

12. Senator...Senator Shapiro.

13. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

14. Mr. President, SB 1670 which is a committee sponsored bill  
15. is now in the Committee on the Assignment of Bills. I would  
16. now like to move that that committee be discharged and that  
17. SB 1670 be placed on the order of second reading. It came out  
18. of there with a unanimous roll call. It's been heard in Public

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Just for the record, you have contacted Senator Graham

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Yes. All right. Senator Shapiro moves to discharge the  
27. Committee on Assignment of Bills from further consideration of  
28. SB 1670 and have the bill advanced to the order of second  
29. reading without further reference. Is there discussion? All  
30. in favor signify by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries.  
31. So ordered. 1670. Senate bill. Second reading. Committee

17. SENATOR MITCHLER:

18. Mr. President and Members of the Senate, in the Senate  
19. Rules Committee was SB 1675 and SB 1481. The...one was for  
20. the appropriation of some money for the repair of the North  
21. Aurora Dam in the Fox River and the other one was the transfer  
22. of the ownership of the dam from the Fox River pleasure drive-  
23. way of park district and the village in North Aurora to the  
24. state of Illinois. And, this is the one that we had the meeting  
25. Monday with the Division of Waterways and the Department of  
26. Conservation and I spoke this morning to Director Eisel and this  
27. was satisfactory with him to have it discharged and I'd appre-  
28. ciate having the Rules Committee discharged and having the bill  
29. ...

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Well, Senator, the Rules Committee will meet today. I...I  
32. really would prefer to proceed without a discharge motion from  
33. the Floor as relates to Rules. The...we will be in the same

1. shape on the bill later today without a motion from the Floor  
2. to discharge. If you have no objection to proceed in that.  
3. We will...we will deal with the bill at the Rules Committee  
4. meeting that we will have today. Senator Mitchler.

6. When the Rules Committee acts on it then where will it go?  
7. I mean, I've been trying to just save time. You know I'm not...

18. PRESIDENT:  
19. The...leave certainly is granted. There will be a Democratic  
20. Caucus in Senator Partee's office immediately. I think really  
21. while the Democrats are in caucus the Republicans...well, Senator  
22. Weaver. Senator Weaver.  
23. SENATOR WEAVER:  
24. Mr. President, the Republicans will have a caucus at the  
25. same time in the President's office then.  
26. PRESIDENT:  
27. All right. Republican Caucus in the President's office  
28. immediately. The Senate will stand in recess for the respective  
29. caucuses.  
30. (Recess)  
31. (After Recess)  
32. PRESIDENT:  
33. Just for the benefit of those who may be wondering. The

1. Democrat Caucus has not ended. There...just in order to be  
2. fair to a good many who are wondering, it is apparent that  
3. some of their membership are not but until Senator Partee in-  
4. forms me otherwise, their caucus is proceeding. So, we'll  
5. just have to be at ease for a little while longer and we will  
6. eventually be advised.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

8. The Senate will come to order. The Sergeant at Arms will  
9. will invoke Rule 2. Go to the order of House bills on third  
10. reading. Senator Vadalabene are you ready for HB 23...

11. SENATOR VADALABENE:

12. Thank you Mr. President. May I have your attention please.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

14. Just a minute Senator...just a minute Senator Vadalabene.  
15. Let's take our caucuses off the floor.

26. favorable vote.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

28. Is there any discussion? The question is shall HB 2346  
29. pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay. The  
30. voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who  
31. wish? Take the record. On that question the Ayes are fifty,  
32. the Nays are one. HB 2346 having received the constitutional  
33. majority is declared passed. Senator Hickey are you ready on

6. Senator Hickey.

7. SENATOR HICKEY:

8. Mr. President and Members of the Senate, this amends the  
9. Revenue Act of 1939 and adds to property exempted from taxation  
10. that a public community college district not leased or otherwise  
11. used for profit. At the present time, such property is...is  
12. taxed and Senator Fawell had a bill in the last session that  
13. passed doing the same thing for public school districts and so  
14. we're simply asking for that privilege for community colleges.  
15. And, I would appreciate a favorable roll call.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Is there further discussion? The question is shall HB 2168  
18. pass. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed No. The  
19. voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On  
20. that question the Yeas are fifty-five, the Nays are none.

21. HB 2168 having received the constitutional majority is declared  
22. passed. Having reached the hour of 12 o'clock. On the order  
23. of special order of business. SJR 77. Senator Fred Smith.  
24. Senator Smith.

25. SENATOR SMITH:

26. Mr. President and Members of the Senate, I trust that if  
27. you have not already read this Senate joint resolution, you  
28. will pay attention as I attempt to read it. Whereas Section 3  
29. of Article 8 of the Constitution of the state of Illinois pro-  
30. vides that the General Assembly by a vote of three-fifths of  
31. the members elected to each House shall appoint an Auditor  
32. General and whereas the General Assembly has by Section 2-3 of  
33. the Illinois State Auditing Act charged the Legislative Audit

1. Commission with the responsibility of diligently searching out  
2. qualified candidates by the office and making a recommendations  
3. to the General Assembly and pursuant to the statutory mandate,  
4. the Legislative Audit Commission has conducted a diligent search  
5. by the vote of three-fourths of its membership as recommended  
6. to the General Assembly the appointment of Robert G. Cronson of  
7. Chicago, Illinois as Auditor General. Therefore be it resolved  
8. by the Senate of the 78th General Assembly of the state of Illi-  
9. nois. The House of Representatives concurring herein that pur-  
10. suant to Section 3 of Article 8 of the Constitution and upon the  
11. recommendation of the Legislative Audit Commission Robert G.  
12. Cronson of Chicago, Illinois is appointed Auditor General for  
13. the state of Illinois for the term commencing August the 1st,  
14. 1974.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Senator Smith, I would like to interupt you just momentarily.  
17. We did not resolve ourselves into a Committee of the Whole. I  
18. think for the record we should do that. Senator Clarke is recog-  
19. nized. Senator Clarke.

20. SENATOR CLARKE:

21. Mr. President, I make that motion that the Senate resolve  
22. itself into Committee of the Whole.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Clarke moves that the Senate resolve itself into  
25. a Committee of the Whole. On that question all in favor signify  
26. by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. So ordered.  
27. Senator Smith.

28. SENATOR SMITH:

29. Now Mr. President...

30. PRESIDENT:

31. For purposes of identification for the record SJR 77 is  
32. before the Committee of the Whole. Senator Smith.

33. SENATOR SMITH:

1. Now, I'm going to assume that Members of this Body are  
2. interested in this very, very, very important step that we  
3. are attempting to carry out here and now. I take it that in  
4. all things in life there must be a first. The members of  
5. the Constitutional Convention saw fit to make possible the  
6. opportunity and the chance that we have here today of electing  
7. the first Auditor General in the history of this our great  
8. state. I might state to you that your Audit Commission is  
9. comprised of twelve members. Six Democrats and six Republicans.  
10. It has been the privilege of this your humble servant to have  
11. served in that august Body since its inception. And, we have  
12. prided ourselves upon the fact that we have not approached  
13. things of the business that came before that Body in a  
14. partisan vein. If I can get their attention of those who are  
15. debating to my left. Mr. Chairman or if you will not take it  
16. from my time, I will suspend while the conversation continues.  
17. I thank you Mr. President.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Proceed Senator Smith.

20. SENATOR SMITH:

21. I think I was saying that we have never considered things  
22. from a partisan political point of view. We have tried to  
23. steer clear of politics in our dealings and in our decisions.  
24. I read the statement in the press a few days ago when we the  
25. members of this commission were unable to reach an agreement  
26. to the effect that partisan politics have entered into our  
27. discussions and into our efforts to make these proper selection  
28. of an individual, competent, capable, honest and fully equipped  
29. with knowledge, training, native and natural ability to carry  
30. out the arduous duties, sit down brother Chew, of Chairman...  
31. of Auditor General of the State of Illinois. We began our  
32. efforts somewhere, I think, in the month of April. There were  
33. some, I heard it said this afternoon, twenty-seven and I



1. looked at my notes...I will agree with twenty-seven and admit  
2. that my notes are probably wrong, that there were twenty-one  
3. candidates for this position. We listened as attentively as  
4. we knew how and each and every member of that commission had  
5. the right, the time and the opportunity to question each and  
6. every would be appointee that was brought before that Body.  
7. I talked with the Chairman of the commission earlier today and  
8. he tells me that our first vote was taken on or about April  
9. the 17th of this year just a few months back. The committee  
10. divided. I don't think it's needful and necessary to tell  
11. you what each of the then candidates received but it was an  
12. open meeting in every sense of the word. The press was present  
13. and everything was done above board. We could not agree on a  
14. nominee. About a week later, we met again and we failed again.  
15. Then it was deemed advisable to have the various candidates  
16. screened by recognized Body capable and competent to thoroughly  
17. bring to the commission any and all facts necessary facts per-  
18. taining to the three candidates that were then and there left in  
19. contention. Finally we had our final meeting. If I...my memory  
20. serves me right, there were eleven of us present and a given  
21. candidate received seven votes and another received three or  
22. four votes. We had three ballots or four that day. Finally  
23. the twelfth member came in and we took the final vote there in  
24. the presence of the press by ballot and the others from the  
25. general public. The results of our vote was Cronson nine,  
26. Thomas three. In other words, Cronson received the two-thirds  
27. vote as required by, I think I stated it right, was it two-  
28. thirds, but he received the necessary vote. He received one  
29. vote more than the necessary vote. Eight votes were needed.  
30. After the final member arrived another vote was taken which  
31. resulted in the figures nine for Cronson and three for Thomas.  
32. I merely say Mr. President what I said a moment ago, this  
33. committee is composed of six Republicans and six Democrats.

1. Cronson received nine, Thomas received three. There are those  
2. who will follow me who will tell you if necessary about the  
3. history and the ability of Mr. Cronson. I'm not going to  
4. attempt to demean as I never do any of the candidates, I say  
5. they were all good men. And, perhaps they were all capable  
6. and competent, fully qualified but we have discharged our  
7. duty. We bring to you the results of the fruits of our com-  
8. bined and individual labor and I hope that this Body will see  
9. fit, not now but later when we rise from the Committee of the  
10. Whole, to place your stamp of approval upon the weight that we  
11. not only have sought to do but what we have done. Cronson, for  
12. Auditor General. It isn't necessary that I say the position  
13. carries for a period of ten years. The salary is \$40,000 a  
14. year. The work is hard, strenuous, calls for the best that  
15. we can possibly secure and it is our combined and individual  
16. belief that we have given you the best of those who sought  
17. appointment for this particular position.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Clarke.

20. SENATOR CLARKE:

21. Mr. President and Members of the Senate, I rise with kind  
22. of a heavy heart because I don't like to oppose my good friend  
23. Fred Smith. He has been and is the only member of the Audit  
24. Commission that has been a member since its inception. But,  
25. this is one of the most, I think, important decisions that this  
26. General Assembly will make this year and this decision will  
27. stand assuming the life and good health of the candidate for  
28. ten years. And, I'd just like to review with you the history  
29. because I think that tho...the members of the constitutional  
30. convention, those that are here might know better that this  
31. post was conceived and patterned after the General Accounting  
32. Office in Washington. And the General Accounting Office and  
33. its chief is above politics and you read constantly in the

1. newspapers about that office going after the most sacred cows  
2. in our federal expenditures. The Pentagon cost over run and  
3. this type of thing and they don't account or they account to  
4. the Congress but they're not influenced by any individuals or  
5. by any pressure groups. I think that was the conception in  
6. setting up the Auditor General for the State of Illinois. And,  
7. I'd just like to point out to you that the present system  
8. evolved out of a scandal in the fifties with our State Auditor  
9. that for seventeen years we have had a program in Illinois  
10. that has done primarily by outside public accounting firms  
11. that is a model in the whole nation. Last year...just a few  
12. months ago we received from the Audit Commission a booklet  
13. from the GAO emulating the...the State of Illinois' program  
14. for consumption statewide. I take issue because of two things.  
15. I think that the charge that we wrote into the legislation  
16. last year was that the Audit Commission in the sense that this  
17. was drafted first in the Constitutional Convention would look  
18. for the most highly professional person that we could find  
19. nationwide and that it would be a person who was above politics  
20. that was in that sense that the GAO operates in Washington.  
21. Now, we had a great argument a year ago about whether or not  
22. the top official should be a certified public accountant and  
23. we demurred finally in order to get a bill passed into law but  
24. I think that the intent is very clear that the highest profes-  
25. sional person would combine that talent along with the know-  
26. ledge and backround in state government and experience in public  
27. government auditing. Secondly, I think that you all know and  
28. you've read and I'm here to state that the Audit Commission  
29. went through a series of procedures as Senator Smith outlined  
30. and aimed for bringing a resolution early in this session to  
31. this Body and they have been since early in April deferred from  
32. doing that, in my opinion, candidly because of outside influences  
33. from leaders of the Legislature excluding our President, exluding

1. Clyde Choate in the House because I've got to pay credit where  
2. it's due. I think this was improper and this is the first time  
3. in seventeen years that politics not partisan politics but  
4. politics has entered into the Audit Commission deliberations  
5. on any issue. And, I think it's obvious why because this is  
6. an issue of great import to the future of the state as well as  
7. to segments of state government. I felt this was improper and  
8. I feel I must speak to it today but most important we should  
9. have in this spot the highest professionally qualified person  
10. and I think that includes a certified public accountant as well  
11. as the other qualifications and secondly, we should have a  
12. person who is not devoid of politics. He's knowledgeable in  
13. state government but not a person who is brought into being by  
14. the very procedure that we have seen in the Audit Commission  
15. and that we are seeing possibly on the Floor today, I feel  
16. that that's unfortunate. I think it should be a matter of  
17. each individual voting their conscience and I would hope that  
18. you can do just that. I stand to urge that this resolution be  
19. defeated.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Senator Partee.

22. SENATOR PARTEE:

23. Mr. President, I have listened very carefully to the debate  
24. and I would suggest to you that the Audit Commission is a  
25. commission of some real strength and viability in this Legis-  
26. lature. They cogitated this problem for some two or three  
27. months and made a final decision. I'm given to understand that  
28. there were some twenty persons. Some from within the state of  
29. Illinois and some outside the state of Illinois who presented  
30. themselves to the commission for the purpose of being looked  
31. at for this post. And, finally they settled on three persons.  
32. Three very fine, capable and competent individuals. And, Mr.  
33. Thomas who is now the acting Director and Mr. Porter, Gerald

1. Porter, who has been active in the legislative process and  
2. Mr. Robert Cronson who has been active in the governmental  
3. process. I read the statute with reference to who should be  
4. eligible and I find Mr. Cronson absolutely eligible for this  
5. post. It's suggested that the person who is selected should  
6. be above politics. I suppose that means that he should be a  
7. neuter in terms of having any political commitment or any  
8. political thoughts. I suggest to you Mr. President and  
9. Members of the Senate that throughout the course of history,  
10. men who have served in political office have gone on to other  
11. political posts or gone on to posts that were a part of the  
12. political process. Every day men are elected from legislative  
13. bodies and are given black robes and serve as judges. They  
14. may well have been and likely so doing their service in a  
15. legislative body, some of the most fierce, rabid partisans  
16. that ever existed but once they leave that arena of partisan-  
17. ship and become a member of a another body of law they then  
18. conduct themselves in a way which is bereft of the political  
19. animals that they may well have been and go into the job ful-  
20. filling its qualifications in the way that it was intended.  
21. Mr. Cronson and all of the other candidates who were the  
22. finalists were rather indepth analysed by the Illinois Legis-  
23. lative Investigating Commission. I was privy to those investi-  
24. gations of the persons who were the finalists. I say to you  
25. there is not one iota or taint of any suggestion of any improper  
26. conduct on Mr. Cronson's part that would in any way suggest  
27. that he be not given this post. I read all of the investigations  
28. and I've never heard anyone say anything about him except that  
29. he has an interest in government and that he exhibited that  
30. interest while working in the Secretary of State's Office and  
31. other places. Some mention was made of outside interference.  
32. I perhaps should not elude to that but I would suggest to you  
33. that I have not interfered in any way in the selection of the

1. post. If someone had asked me who I thought the best candidate  
2. was I think it would be my privilege and perhaps my duty to  
3. say that I thought that Robert Cronson was the best candidate  
4. for this post. I'd...I would have said that had I been asked  
5. and I say it today. And, I certainly feel that his...the  
6. SJR 77 should be adopted.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Senator Knuepfer.

9. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

10. Back in about February of 1971, I introduced the first  
11. bill to implement the Auditor General concept in the new Con-  
12. stitution. I realized then that the qualification of certified  
13. public accountant was in for a serious problem and that bill  
14. went through '71 and '72 without any action. But I want to  
15. suggest to you that accountants and certified public accountants  
16. ought to be just as offended as if we in this Body appointed  
17. an accountant to the Supreme Court or a medical doctor to  
18. supervise the chiropractors. The profession of certified public  
19. accounting is a profession and it ought not to be conceived  
20. any more than lawyer or medical doctor or any other as a pro-  
21. fession that anyone can somehow by osmosis or any other process  
22. learn. I concur eminently with Senator Clarke and those of  
23. you who are professionals were we to suggest that a professional  
24. from a field other than yours was qualified to pass judgement  
25. on those areas in which you have spent many years studying  
26. indeed practicing as well. I think would suggest I was foolish  
27. and I suggest to you the same is true of the profession of being  
28. a certified public accountant. To suggest that any of us with  
29. a course or two in accounting or with a smattering of knowledge  
30. are going to be able to understand the complexities of the audit  
31. report, I think is foolish. Now, somehow or other we did  
32. recognize that by suggesting in the final bit of legislation  
33. that the Deputy should be a certified public accountant. I

1. suggest to you that should not have been. That may have been  
2. required but the top man as well should have been required to  
3. be a CPA. This isn't a big staff job. This is not a director  
4. of a large agency. This is a man with a very small staff who  
5. has got to be able to analyse the audits provided by other  
6. outside firms and determine to what extent reports have to be  
7. made back to this Body. I think you have neglected in making  
8. this choice and I would not know Mr. Cronson if I saw him and  
9. I have no brief for any of the other candidates but I think you  
10. have neglected the profession of accounting and suggested by  
11. this kind of a choice that anyone in fact is qualified to  
12. audit the accounts of the state of Illinois.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Harber Hall.

15. SENATOR HALL:

16. Mr. President, fellow Senators, I hope you will excuse  
17. my gruff voice that I'm barely able to speak with today because  
18. of a bad cold. I have been a member of the Legislative Audit  
19. Commission since I first came to Springfield in 1967. I can  
20. think of no effort that I have been able to produce that has  
21. given me more satisfaction than serving on that esteemed Body  
22. which essentially is to insure that the fiscal matters of this  
23. state do not go awry and should they that they be corrected  
24. properly. I believe that commisiion has operated very well  
25. in behalf of the citizens of Illinois. Now then, with the new  
26. Auditor General Act wherein the Auditor General is a direct  
27. arm of the General Assembly and no longer an appointee of the  
28. Governor. We have even more responsibility to ensure that that  
29. office remains entirely free from internal input and only draws  
30. attention to the matters of fiscal spending and accountability  
31. pointing out the deficiencies whenever and wherever they are  
32. found. Now, as we addressed ourselves to the task of selecting  
33. from anywhere we could find applications including all the

1. states of the union. We were in firm agreement that we would  
2. select the best qualified, whoever he would be. I rise to  
3. oppose SJR 77 because I feel that as a commission we failed to  
4. respond to our charge of providing that information to the  
5. General Assembly per se the most qualified candidate that we  
6. could find. I agree with Senator Smith when he says in his  
7. opinion they were all qualified. That I will agree with. One  
8. step we took to determine who might be more qualified than  
9. another was to establish a blue ribbon team of independent  
10. authorities outside of state government who could review the  
11. resumes of the applicants and tell us who they thought were  
12. qualified and who were not qualified. The nominee, Robert  
13. Cronson, and I agree he is certainly qualified, but not best  
14. qualified, was selected by one of this group only as qualified.  
15. The others declared him to be unqualified for this particular  
16. position. Another applicant was declared to be qualified by  
17. every single one of this blue ribbon team. And, that is my  
18. message to my fellow Senators, I like you can agree on the  
19. principle of majority rule on any measure but I also feel  
20. obliged since you have the responsibility to vote on this from  
21. all the knowledge you can gain. The other side, the minority  
22. report so to speak, on this matter shared by only three of  
23. twelve is that your nominee is not the best qualified and that  
24. should he be rejected, your Legislative Audit Commission as  
25. charged by the statute will again attempt to search for the  
26. most qualified and the best qualified. Thank you Mr. President.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator McBroom.

29. SENATOR MCBROOM:

30. Well, thank you Mr. President and...thank you Mr. President  
31. and Members of the Senate, I want to say to you Mr. President  
32. that I think that you are aware and most of the members who  
33. know me are aware of the infinite and total respect that I have



1. for Senator Knuepfer and Senator Clarke and Senator Hall. I  
2. think that all of us are also aware who have served some time  
3. in this Body that we can respect one another but it doesn't  
4. necessarily follow that we have to agree in toto on all of our  
5. ideas or all of our bills, all of our postures on legisla-  
6. tion. Possibly some of the things that I'm going to say have  
7. ...have been eluded to, I was pleased to hear Senator Hall  
8. comment. And, he did this in the Audit Commission that he felt  
9. that all three candidates, Mr. Porter and Mr. Thomas and Mr.  
10. Cronson were qualified, that he saw nothing in their backround  
11. on the report in the investigation by the Siragusa Commission  
12. that would persuade him to vigorously oppose any one of them.  
13. He saw nothing in those reports and I believe Senator Hall I'm  
14. quoting you somewhere near accurately. I want to mention that Mr.  
15. President and then I have heard and I have read and I...I know  
16. that it hasn't been suggested by Senator Clarke. He specifically  
17. spelled out that he was not talking about the President of the  
18. Senate but I think it might for those members who have followed  
19. the work of the Audit Commission, I believe I mentioned that I  
20. was a member also. I think that those who have followed the  
21. work of the Audit Commission and those people in the Gallery  
22. who might have some interest in it would recognize that on the  
23. question of pressure being applied that my first choice and my  
24. vote on two or three or four occasions was for Mr. Porter. The  
25. same applied to Senator Vadalabene who cast two or three votes  
26. for Mr. Porter. Until it appeared to both of us that Mr. Porter  
27. was no longer in the running and that it was impossible for us  
28. and futile to sustain our support for him. So, how you deduce  
29. or conclude pressure from the posture that Senator Vadalabene  
30. took and that I took, I just don't know. I am here to say as  
31. far as all three of these men are concerned, I have a great deal  
32. of respect for their ability. I'd also like to say, we talk  
33. about a certified public accountant. I think that's fine. But,

1. I have seen and I'm not suggesting that this applies to anyone,  
2. I'm just saying that I have witnessed it in my life time. I  
3. have seen people who have unique and unusual ability in a field  
4. Mr. President. Whether it might be the field of medicine, it  
5. might be the field of law, it might be the field of accountancy  
6. but it does not again necessarily follow that they have immense  
7. managerial talent Mr. President. And, I think that Mr. Cronson  
8. has managerial talent. As Senator Knuepfer pointed out, the  
9. statute provides that the second man must be a certified public  
10. accountant. I also want to point out to you Mr. President that  
11. I have heard the expression and I guess I've read it a time or  
12. two about the term wheeler dealer. There are some offices and  
13. I think that this one uniquely fits the description that I'm  
14. going to offer. There are some offices Mr. President that I  
15. cannot possibly conceive could lend themselves to the field of  
16. politics and I don't know if an individual was the most political  
17. animal that ever came down the pike in the State of Illinois how  
18. he could possibly make the Auditor General's office a political  
19. vehicle of any kind. It just does...what I know about the office  
20. it just does not lend itself to that type of operation. I'd  
21. also like to point out that as perhaps point number two in what  
22. I'm suggesting to you Mr. President that we're talking only  
23. about twenty or twenty-five employees. Now, if that is a patronage  
24. army, it's entirely different from what I have ever known a  
25. patronage army to be. I have really never heard anyone say any-  
26. thing about Mr. Cronson except that he wasn't a certified public  
27. accountant. I think that his background in state government that  
28. he will seek out the best possible person to be his Deputy.  
29. Certainly, he'll have to be a...a certified public accountant.  
30. I...I feel no compunction about supporting Mr. Cronson. I do  
31. it with good conscience. I think that he will do a capable job  
32. as Auditor General and I think he will bring credit to the state  
33. of Illinois. And, I...I hope that he might be listening or

1. hear what I have to say because he is taking over a great  
2. responsibility. The Legislature is vesting a great deal of  
3. trust in him at this point...appointment comes to fruition  
4. today and I don't want it to see as a political army and I  
5. don't know with twenty employees how he could ever make it  
6. and I may be redundant when I say this but I don't know in  
7. this particular office Mr. President how anybody could make  
8. it a political operation and I...I'm a co-sponsor of Senator  
9. Smith's resolution and I'm...I'm happy to be a co-sponsor of  
10. it. Thank you Mr. President.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

12. President Harris.

13. SENATOR HARRIS:

14. Mr. President, Members of the Senate, just briefly I  
15. want to comment on the question that is before the Committee  
16. of the Whole that will eventually before...be before the Senate.  
17. The adoption of SJR 77 which appoints to the office of Auditor  
18. General Robert G. Cronson. The statute implementing the Con-  
19. stitution which establishes the office of Auditor General provides  
20. that if the Auditor General himself is not a certified public  
21. accountant that the Chief Deputy shall be. My first choice for  
22. Auditor General was Gerald Porter a certified public accountant.  
23. Truly a professional. I'm pleased to state to you and I think  
24. most everyone here in the Body is aware that Mr. Porter did  
25. receive votes by members of the Audit Commission who have been  
26. charged with making recommendations to the Senate and the House  
27. of Representatives for consideration by the two Bodies for the  
28. implementation of the Senate joint resolution which will, in  
29. fact, appoint the Auditor General. Jerry Porter is an outstand-  
30. ing professional in his field of public accountant...accounting.  
31. Ultimately, the Audit Commission rejected Mr. Porter. Addition-  
32. ally an outstanding professional in the field of accounting  
33. received votes by the members of the Audit Commission. Dave

1. Thomas. No one can question his personal equipment and his  
2. professional equipment. Fine. The ultimate nominee and  
3. recommendation of the Audit Commission on a nine to six vote,  
4. I'm sorry, nine to three vote is also a professional not a  
5. certified public accountant but a professional. Robert G.  
6. Cronson, a product of Dartmouth College and the University of  
7. Chicago Law School and a man experienced for years in the process  
8. of legal advice to constitutional officers in state government  
9. and with whom I've had governmental experience for more than  
10. nineteen years impresses me as a professional. The law takes  
11. recognition of the fact that the Auditor General himself need  
12. not be a certified public accountant. The safeguard in the  
13. law is that if the Auditor General is not then the Chief Deputy  
14. shall be. I have consummate respect for the members of the  
15. Legislative Audit Commission. They are twelve professionals  
16. in the business of politics which is the business and the  
17. science of government. And, those twelve members of that  
18. commission are truly leaders of this General Assembly. And,  
19. the membership of that commission after careful, thorough and  
20. dedicated evaluation of some twenty prospective nominees from  
21. that commission concluded in nominating Mr. Cronson. There's  
22. no question about the fact that all three of those who received  
23. votes by the commission are qualified. And, Mr. Cronson brings  
24. in addition to his professionalism as an outstanding lawyer, a  
25. personal skill as an outstanding administrator. I am extremely  
26. comfortable in the knowledge that if Mr. Cronson is confirmed  
27. that Illinois will have an outstandingly equipped professional  
28. to implement the charge of the law implementing the office of  
29. Auditor General and I encourage the members of this Body that  
30. when comes the time to adopt SJR 77 that you join with me and  
31. enthusiastically vote for adoption of SJR 77. Thank you Mr.  
32. President.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

1. Further discussion? Senator Smith may close. Senator  
2. Clarke.

3. SENATOR CLARKE:

4. Mr. President, if Senator Smith does not wish to close,  
5. I move that we arise...

6. PRESIDENT:

7. From the Committee of the Whole. Senator Clarke moves  
8. that the Senate arise from the Committee of the Whole. All in  
9. favor signify by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries  
10. and the Senate returns to regular session. Senator Smith is  
11. recognized on the order of resolutions for the purpose of  
12. considering SJR 77. Senator Smith.

13. SENATOR SMITH:

14. Mr. Chairman, I...Mr. President, I think this matter has  
15. been thoroughly discussed by perhaps those that saw fit to  
16. make speeches. I dare say not a mind would be changed. I  
17. merely ask Mr. President that a roll call be taken in regards  
18. to this particular resolution.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. The question is shall the Senate adopt SJR 77. And, on  
21. that question the Chair wishes to point out that under the  
22. provisions of Article 8, Section 3, paragraph A there is this  
23. statement the General Assembly by a vote of three-fifths of  
24. the members elected to each House shall appoint an Auditor  
25. General and may remove him from...and may remove him for cause  
26. by a similar vote. The adoption of SJR 77 requires a three-  
27. fifths vote. The question is does the Senate adopt SJR 77.  
28. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote No.  
29. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted  
30. who wish? Take the record. On that question the Yeas are  
31. forty-two, the Nays are ten, six Voting Present. SJR 77  
32. having received the constitutional three-fifths majority  
33. required is declared adopted. Senator Ozinga.

1. SENATOR OZINGA:

2. Mr. President, I would now move that the Senate would  
3. resolve itself into Executive Session for the purpose of  
4. receiving the Governor's report of the Committee, Executive  
5. Committee and the Governor's Message.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Senator Ozinga moves that the Senate resolve itself into  
8. Executive Session for the consideration of the recommendations  
9. of the Committee on Executive regarding the Governor's nomina-  
10. tions. All in favor signify by saying Aye. Contrary no. The  
11. motion carries. Senator Ozinga.

12. SENATOR OZINGA:

13. Now Mr. President, I would plead with the members of the  
14. Senate that we have a little bit of patience, just a little  
15. while longer as this...these messages are long. We'll have  
16. an awful lot to do and I will try to make it as brief as possible.  
17. We're going to take some eighty names that have been submitted  
18. by the Governor on various messages. I'm going to start with  
19. the Board of Education. Now, this is going to come by way of  
20. sixteen independent motions so that we'll have no problem with  
21. somebody wanting to go back and change a roll call and go  
22. through alot of extra nonsense. The first motion that I will  
23. make...

24. PRESIDENT:

25. For what purpose does Senator Graham arise? Senator Graham.

26. SENATOR GRAHAM:

27. Mr. President, we're being called upon now to vote upon  
28. a Board of Higher Education nominees in conformity with the  
29. State Constitution. And, I think your call for order is in  
30. order and I would suggest that the ladies and gentlemen pay  
31. attention to the Chairman of the Committee on Executive.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Your point is well taken. Will the members please be in

1. their seats? Senator Ozinga.

2. SENATOR OZINGA:

3. My first motion is that I would move that the Senate  
4. advise and consent to the following nominees to be members of  
5. the State Board of Education and the terms to be determined  
6. by the drawing of lots on Message of the Governor as of  
7. April 23, 1974.

8. STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

9. To be a member of the State Board of Education for a  
10. term to be determined by the drawing of lots. /

11. - Dr. Mercedier C. DeFreistas Goodwin of Chicago

12. PRESIDENT:

13. The question placed before the Senate is does the Senate  
14. advise and consent to the nomination of Dr. Mercedier DeFreistas  
15. Goodwin of Chicago to be a member of the State Board of Educa-  
16. tion. Is there further discussion? On that question those in  
17. favor of the advice and consent to that nomination will vote  
18. Aye. Those opposed will vote No. The voting is open. Have  
19. all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question the  
20. Yeas are fifty-two, the Nays are four, two Voting Present.  
21. The nomination of Dr. Goodwin is advised and consented to.

22. Senator Ozinga.

23. SENATOR OZINGA:

24. Now, Mr. President, I would move the Senate advise and  
25. consent to the nomination of:

26. STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

27. To be a member of the State Board of Education for a term  
28. to be determined by the drawing of lots.

29. - Betty Howard of Chicago

30. PRESIDENT:

31. The question is does the Senate advise and consent to the  
32. nomination of Betty Howard of Chicago to be a member of the  
33. State Board of Education. Those in...is there further discussion?

1. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote No.  
2. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record.  
3. On that question the Yeas are fifty-four, the Nays are two,  
4. one Voting Present. A majority of Senators elected concurring  
5. by record vote the Senate does advise and consent to the nomina-  
6. tion of Mrs. Howard to the State Board of Education. Senator  
7. Ozinga.

8. SENATOR OZINGA:

9. Now, Mr. President, I would move that:

10. BOARD OF EDUCATION

11. To be a member of the State Board of Education for a term  
12. to be determined by the drawing of lots.

13. - Carol N. Johnston of Des Plaines

14. PRESIDENT:

15. The question is does the Senate consent...does the Senate  
16. advise and consent to the nomination of Carol Johnston of Des  
17. Plaines to be a member of the State Board of Education. Is  
18. there discussion? Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed  
19. vote no. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take  
20. the record. On that question the Yeas are fifty-nine , the Nays

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Is there discussion? The question is does the Senate  
8. advise and consent to the nomination of Edward J. Copeland  
9. of Highland Park to be a member of the State Board of Education.  
10. On that question those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed  
11. will vote No. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish?  
12. Take the record. On that question the Yeas are fifty-two, the  
13. Nays are four, two Voting Present. A majority of Senators  
14. elected concurring by record vote the nomination of Mr.  
15. Copeland to be a member of the State Board of Education is  
16. advised and consented to. Senator Ozinga.

17. SENATOR OZINGA:

18. Now, Mr. President, I move the Senate advise and consent  
19. to the nomination of:

23. - Robert A. Jamieson of Peoria

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Is there discussion? The question is does the Senate  
26. advise and consent to the nomination of Mr. Robert A. Jamieson  
27. of Peoria to be a member of the State Board of Education.  
28. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote No.  
29. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record.  
30. On that question the Yeas are fifty-nine, the Nays are none.  
31. A majority of Senators elected concurring by record vote the  
32. Senate does advise and consent to the nomination of Mr. Robert  
33. Jamieson to be a member of the State Board of Education. Senator

1. Ozinga.

2. SENATOR OZINGA:

3. And now Mr. President, returning to the Message of  
4. April 23, 1974, I would move the Senate advise and consent  
5. to the nomination of:

6. STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

7. To be a member of the State Board of Education for a term  
8. to be determined by the drawing of lots.

9. - Henry I. Green of Champaign

10. However, on this particular roll call, on the Do Recommend  
11. motion or Do advise and consent motion of the committee, Mr.  
12. Green failed to receive a majority of the votes however, the  
13. reversal of that said roll call were the committee does not  
14. advise and consent to his appointment was made. But, because  
15. of the statute made and enacted for the confirmation of appointees,  
16. I have made the proper motion however this is one of the con-  
17. troversial nominees.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Is there discussion? Senator Partee.

20. SENATOR PARTEE:

21. Yes Mr. President, it grieves me that there is any contro-  
22. versy surrounding the nomination of Henry I. Green of Champaign.  
23. This gentleman has chosen philosophically to be a Republican.  
24. He has...Mr. President, I'd like a little order. I guess...I  
25. was directed...there's a lot of order I'm looking for, not a  
26. little cause that's what we had.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Just a minute Senator Partee. Senator Partee.

29. SENATOR PARTEE:

30. Mr. Green lives in Champaign. He's in the real estate  
31. business. He's a developer. He's a Republican. He's a Director  
32. of the Development Parkland College. He's a member of the  
33. school board in the...Citizen's Advisory Committee of the

1. Urbana School Board and he has for a long number of years  
2. given of himself to many, many public causes. He's a graduate  
3. of the Urbana High School. He has a B.S. from the University  
4. of Illinois College of Agriculture. He's attended the American  
5. Banker's Association Graduate School of Banking at the Univer-  
6. sity of Wisconsin. He's a man who is eminently qualified. It  
7. was difficult for me to understand yesterday why he was rejected  
8. as being a member of this Board. I think he has a great deal  
9. of expertise which should be brought to this Board. He's a  
10. great deal of experience in matters relating to schools, build-  
11. ing and other developments. I think, Mr. President, that  
12. something took place in his American right to make a selection  
13. in terms of who he would support and it was surfaced by virtue  
14. of a questionnaire presented to him by the Republican Committee  
15. of the...a Republican Committee which is structured to take a  
16. look at these candidates and one of the questions on that was  
17. have you made a campaign contribution of more than \$250. I  
18. think the fact developed that he did in the 1972 election make  
19. a campaign contribution and he was candid about it, of \$500 to  
20. a man by the name of Joe Pishodi who is a Democratic candidate  
21. for the State Senate in that Champaign District. I would not  
22. say that this was the reason why he was treated as he was in  
23. terms of being rejected but I can only say to you as I look at  
24. his record and his other backround the only logical conclusion  
25. to be drawn from his rejection by members on that side of the aisle  
26. is the fact that perhaps he had committed heresy in making a  
27. campaign contribution to a Democrat. I think, Mr. President,  
28. that this is a country where we have long said that people  
29. ought to be able to make decisions based on their own judgement  
30. and their own beliefs. And, I think it's a terrible thing if  
31. he is to be penalized for having made an independent, individual  
32. judgement to give a campaign contribution to the person of his  
33. choice in that particular race. I hope that I am wrong. I hope



1. that nothing so petty and picayune as that has caused him not  
2. to have received the votes in the committee. I hoped that I  
3. was wrong about that but I tried valiantly to find some other  
4. logical reason for his rejection and try as I might, I could  
5. find no other reason for his rejection. He was prepared, he  
6. was prepared for the job. He has all the necessary preparation.  
7. He was personable. He answered the questions forthrightly.  
8. I cannot understand why he was rejected. I certainly hope that  
9. we here on the Floor of the Senate correct a rather grievous  
10. error which was made yesterday in the committee. And, on that  
11. basis, I certainly would make the motion and would sustain by  
12. my vote his right to serve and that he should be advised and  
13. consented to.

14. PRESIDENT:

15.       Senator Glass.

16. SENATOR GLASS:

17.       Thank you Mr. President. I have a question for Senator  
18. Partee. Not having been at the Executive Committee hearing on  
19. these nominees, I got quite a different picture of the candi-  
20. dates qualifications than you described and specifically, it's  
21. my understanding that this gentleman was not a member of a  
22. school board. I believe in describing his qualifications, you  
23. stated that he was. I'd like the record to be set straight on  
24. that point if you would...don't mind.

25. SENATOR PARTEE:

26.       Well, let me just...

27. PRESIDENT:

28.       Senator Partee.

29. SENATOR PARTEE:

30.       Let me read from the brochure so that there will be nothing  
31. lost in translation. Let me read it. Civic activities as to...  
32. well let's just...civic activities, religion, president and  
33. board member, Salvation Army Advisory Board, County Chairman,

1. Christian Rural Overseas Program, Chairman Official Board St.  
2. Peter's United Church of Christ. Education. Chairman of the  
3. Steering Committee of Urbana School District 116 for Citizens  
4. Advisory Committee, Chairman East Central Illinois Junior  
5. College Steering Committee. Now, if I uttered something other  
6. than that then I was in error. I don't think I did say the  
7. Citizen's Advisory Committee and the Chairman of the East  
8. Central Junior College Steering Committee.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Senator Glass.

11. SENATOR GLASS:

12. Thank you Senator Partee. I understood you to say he was  
13. a member of a school board and I...that certainly was news to  
14. me if it had been true and I'm glad to hear you're clarifying  
15. the record and it now appears that he was not ever elected to  
16. a school board.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Senator Graham.

19. SENATOR GRAHAM:

20. Only briefly Mr. President and Members of the Senate,  
21. Senator Partee one a few times but...I find that your assumption  
22. with regard to the vote cast by some of the colleagues of ours  
23. in Executive Committee and the reasons for the casting of that  
24. vote was wrong. The vote was not cast because of the way a  
25. man spends his money. The vote was not cast because we are  
26. opposed to freedom of choice. The vote was cast because many  
27. members of this committee felt that the gentleman at hand had  
28. a strong...left a strong indication to us that his capabilities  
29. or desire to make up his mind firmly upon issues much less than  
30. those that will be presented to the State Board of Education were  
31. at the least fuzzy indeed. I think that some of the members of  
32. the Executive Committee who considered this also had some input  
33. with regard to a contribution of or a lack of contribution to

1. the Constitutional Convention. No, Senator Partee, our decision  
2. was not made upon the assumptions that you stated.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. All right. Is there further discussion? The question is  
5. ...oh, Senator Knuppel.

6. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

7. Mr. President and Members of this Body, it was my pleasure  
8. to serve with this man in the Constitutional Convention where  
9. he distinguished himself. And, as you know, I can be criptic  
10. of people and extremely criptic. I found no cause during nine  
11. months of very heated debate and otherwise to find fault with  
12. this man. I hear that he was fuzzy on some of his ideas and  
13. maybe wasn't as direct as a reason for not voting for him.  
14. I suggest to those people in this Body that a wise man may  
15. change his mind many times but a fool never. Now, if in fact  
16. the...his contribution, his political contribution played any  
17. role in this, I would suggest that former Governor Shapiro  
18. contributed to Attorney General Scott and in no way, in no way  
19. did that detract, in my mind, from that man's stature. Now, it  
20. seems to me, maybe his qualifications aren't the greatest but  
21. it seems to me as Senator Sours often says what about the poor  
22. stiff on the street. Sometimes I think just an ordinary citizen  
23. speaking the plain unvarnished truth can add alot to some of  
24. the cluttered minds of we so called politicians or intellectuals.  
25. This man had much to give to the Constitutional Convention and  
26. the members of that Body gathered often at night to discuss the  
27. problems of the day. Joe Pishodi was the Secretary of that  
28. Convention. It's very possible that these gentlemen who came  
29. from Champaign made a fast and lasting lifelong friendship.  
30. I have always been a Democrat but I have contributed to some  
31. Republican's campaigns in the past and I'll guarantee you that  
32. you will never find a straight ballot in my...in my box. Now,  
33. who I vote for is my business. I once wanted to be slated

1. when...when Representative Allan Dixon resigned or not...I mean  
2. Allan Lucas resigned as a House member. I wanted to be slated  
3. for that vacancy. And, one of the reports that rumors had  
4. came back to me was yes, I contributed about \$1000 a year to  
5. candidates of the Democratic Party and others but that I con-  
6. tributed to...that money to those who I wanted to contribute  
7. it to. I didn't contribute it to the Party. And, I asked the  
8. Party who brought me that story one question. Who in the hell's  
9. money was it. And, I think if he contributed to his friend under  
10. the circumstances where this friendship developed, that that was  
11. his business and ought not under...in...in light of the oppor-  
12. tunity to make that friendship ought not to be held against him.  
13. I think that...that we need some people on that Board of other  
14. persuasions than just the intellectuals.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Senator Shapiro and then Senator Chew.

17. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

18. Mr. President and ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, I  
19. think it is unusual that the questions that had been raised  
20. have come totally from the other side of the aisle and it is  
21. more important, as far as I'm concerned and many members from  
22. this side, as to what is not being said. And, that is that  
23. this man was one of the few nominees that was totally devoid  
24. of any practical experience as far as elementary and secondary  
25. education is concerned and by that I mean he was neither a  
26. classroom teacher nor served as a local school board member.  
27. Senator Knuppel raised the point about the poor stiff on the  
28. street who would have some good input and I have to agree but  
29. I also want to point out that possibly that experience and that  
30. input should start with the local school board if that person  
31. does not have the qualifications for a classroom teacher. I  
32. happen to believe that this is going to be one of the most  
33. important nominations that we are considering. This is going

1. to be a Board oriented State Board of Education. No longer  
2. will the power of elementary and secondary education and  
3. vocational education be in the hands of one individual. It  
4. will be the Board that will be dictating the educational policy  
5. of this state and I feel that the nominees to this Board should  
6. have a suitable background. This man clearly does not qualify.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Senator Chew.

9. SENATOR CHEW:

10. Mr. President, I move the previous question.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Senator Chew has moved the previous question. On that  
13. motion all in favor signify by saying Aye. Contrary no. The  
14. motion carries. The main question then is does the Senate advise  
15. and consent to the nomination of Henry Green of Champaign to be  
16. a member of the State Board of Education. Those in favor will  
17. vote Aye. Those opposed vote No. The voting is open. Have  
18. all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the  
19. Yeas are twenty-nine, the Nays are twenty-one, four Voting  
20. Present. A majority of Senators elected having refused to give  
21. their advice and consent by record vote. The Senate rejects the  
22. nomination of Henry Green of Champaign to be a member of the  
23. State Board of Education. Senator Ozinga.

24. SENATOR OZINGA:

25. Now, Mr. President, referring to the Message of the Governor  
26. as of May 1st, 1974. I move that the Senate advise and consent  
27. to the nomination of:

28. STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

29. To be a member of the State Board of Education for a term  
30. to be determined by the drawing of lots.

31. - Lawrence A. Keller of Evergreen Park

32. Here again the Committee voted in the negative as far as the  
33. Do Pass or Do consent motion was concerned with the exception

1. that there was one Republican voted in favor of his nomination  
2. being myself hopefully having a member from Evergreen Park on  
3. that State Board. However, upon a reversal of that roll call  
4. the vote was turned around on the vote that the Senate Do Not  
5. advise and consent to the nomination of Mr. Lawrence A. Keller,  
6. of Evergreen Park. However, my motion in accordance with the  
7. statute made and provided therefore stands that the Senate advise  
8. and consent.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Senator Partee.

11. SENATOR PARTEE:

12. I was delighted to hear Senator Ozinga say that he voted  
13. for this gentleman from his home town in Committee. Because  
14. I'm prepared to add to your vote Senator twenty-nine others  
15. for his confirmation. This gentleman, I think, incurred the  
16. displeasure of some Members of the other side because of a  
17. rather strong position he took on a question that was asked  
18. him which may well have been without a great deal of relevance  
19. on how he stood on the right to strike of public employees.  
20. He's a member of the United Steel Workers and he said that he  
21. did in fact, I think he said it candidly, believe in the right  
22. to strike of public employees and I think that was perhaps a  
23. death nil for him from your point of view. I would point out to  
24. you that even if he became a member of this Board, it would never  
25. be a decision within the purview of his operation as a member of  
26. the Board. It can only become a law in this state for teachers  
27. to have the right to strike if this Legislative Body says so.  
28. What he believes or what he does not believe would in no way ever  
29. have any effect on whether or not they could or could not strike  
30. legally. The decision rests and l\_y in the hands of the Legis-  
31. lature. And, no matter what he thought or what he believed, the  
32. fact is the law has to be passed by the Legislature. So, I  
33. think it's an irrelevant kind of question that eliminated him

1. from your serious consideration. I think the gentleman has  
2. showed and, incidentally, he's a gentleman who finished high  
3. school under adverse circumstances. He's not had the oppor-  
4. tunity, as many of you have had, for further training and  
5. education but as I viewed him, I saw him as a solid American  
6. citizen. Eager and willing to participate in the process of  
7. helping to make our schools what we would desire them. I would  
8. certainly hope that you would not reject him and that you would  
9. give him your advice and consent.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Fawell.

12. SENATOR FAWELL:

13. Mr. President and Members of the Senate, there...we have  
14. here, I think probably in regard to this particular nominee and  
15. perhaps too, as we refer to Domingo Tobias somewhat of identical  
16. facts that pertain to each of these nominees. I think it's  
17. important that as we look at the reaction that the Governor has  
18. understandably had which I gather is an understandable reaction  
19. whenever one's nominees are turned down by the Senate. Or there's  
20. indication that they will be turned down. His statements have  
21. indicated that they're the...the failure on the part of Republi-  
22. cans to recognize ability but also specifically if I recall the  
23. wording of his latest message to recognize independence. And,  
24. I would like to set the records straight as Mr. President we  
25. debate this particular nominee and also as we debate subsequently  
26. if that's proper at this time make some reference to Domingo  
27. Tobias. Without necessarily engaging in any personality, it's  
28. always rather difficult because I think it can be construed to  
29. be a very personal thing and not an impersonal and objective  
30. evaluation that one is making. Whenever it seems as though the  
31. Executive Committee turns down some of the Governor's nominees,  
32. it is construed by him to be a very personal and very political  
33. action on the part of the Executive Committee. I guess there's

1. none of us here who have not at times done some very political  
2. things. But, in regard to Mr. Keller and Domingo Tobias, I  
3. think it is very important and I speak here too as a member  
4. of the Ad Hoc Committee which was asked by Senator Ozinga as  
5. Chairman of the Executive Committee to sit in or as an Advisory  
6. Committee so to speak to evaluate the seventeen members or the  
7. seventeen nominees the Governor had presented as being the  
8. nominees to the State Board of Education. I think it's important  
9. to point out of course that what we are saying here is that  
10. really fourteen of these nominees are well qualified people.  
11. And, I think it's important also to recognize as those of you  
12. who sat in the Executive Committee and I sat in simply as a  
13. observer that a number of these who are being approved by a  
14. unanimous vote, in fact, are individuals who have philosophies  
15. in regard to education which are diametrically opposed to some  
16. of the members on this side of the aisle, for instance, as  
17. Mrs. Walhout who freely said that she believes in the right to  
18. strike of public school teachers. And, you'll find in general  
19. that perhaps the majority of the people in this Body don't agree  
20. with that. There have not been other words, I think Mr.  
21. President, necessarily any vindictive, personal actions that  
22. have taken place here but there has been an effort. And, I  
23. know an effort by the Ad Hoc Committee for whom I speak too,  
24. an effort to really evaluate all of the nominees who have been  
25. presented and we came up with a conclusion and we sent a letter  
26. to the Governor and advised him that there is a statement in  
27. the law which quite clearly says that not more than nine of the  
28. nominees should come from one political party. And, thus we  
29. made it our business to ask specifically of all of the nominees  
30. as to what party they were affiliated with. And we found that  
31. eleven have stated that they look upon themselves as being  
32. Democrats and even in Committee we found that all of these  
33. eleven did admit the fact that they do look upon themselves as



1. being members of the Democratic Party which is just fine  
2. ...Except the statute says not more than nine shall be  
3. affiliated with any one political party. We recognize and  
4. we did state to the Governor in this letter to which I have  
5. referred that the letter of the law, of course only requires  
6. that a person in order to be affiliated with any particular  
7. political party must have voted in the Primary, that party  
8. in 1972. And, we recognize that only eight of the eleven  
9. would therefore meet the literal test of being affiliated  
10. with the Democratic Party. We went on to point out, however,  
11. that we felt that this was a breach of the spirit of the  
12. non-political atmosphere of the initial State Board of Education  
13. which we feel is the very foundation for many years to come  
14. of some tremendously important policy questions and thus, we  
15. had suggested to the Governor that two of the eleven nominees  
16. be withdrawn. Hopefully, we had...we had assumed that the  
17. Governor would take it upon himself so that we would not have  
18. to necessarily make a choice among those eleven as to who  
19. might be withdrawn. That was not done, Mr. President, we  
20. therefore, in the Ad Hoc Committee and I think in the Executive  
21. Committee too, felt that two of these nominees ought to be  
22. withdrawn. I might say that it was nominee Bailey, nominee  
23. Tobias and nominee Witkowski who were individuals that did  
24. not vote in any Primary in 1972 and therefore were classified  
25. by the Governor as independents. The Governor in his message  
26. has said that the rec...Republicans apparently don't recognize  
27. independents but apparently he does. I say that it's offensive  
28. to all independents in the State of Illinois to have these three  
29. individuals, who are fine people, necessarily classified as  
30. speaking for independents, as independents, when every one of  
31. them, I repeat, every one in the questionnaire - in writing  
32. came back and stated that they were Democrats. In the Execu-  
33. tive Committee they said they looked upon themselves as being

1. affiliated with the Democratic Party and in a personal conver-  
2. sation I had with a very fine gentleman by the name of Domingo  
3. Tobias, he did say to me Senator, I am a Democrat. I have  
4. told the Governor's Office that I'm a Democrat. They know I  
5. am appointed in that capacity. So that the spirit, we think,  
6. of the statute has been breeched. One may not think that's  
7. reasonable but we do not believe that when the Governor says  
8. these are independents that that actually covers the practical  
9. or literal definition of that word. Thus, we had suggested,  
10. the Executive Committee has also evidently concurred that two  
11. of the nominees who are of the number of eleven Democrats  
12. ought to be withdrawn. Mr. Keller happens to be one of those.  
13. I might just add also in regard to Mr. Keller that I would  
14. question very much if he was one of the original one hundred  
15. and fifty nominees by the Blue Ribbon Party that evidently was  
16. picking out nominees. There's nothing in his backround whatso-  
17. ever that indicates any type of interest or concern in regard  
18. to public elementary and secondary education whatsoever. I  
19. might add the specific wording of the statute states that in  
20. picking out the particular members that they shall be selected  
21. as far as maybe practicable on the basis of their knowledge or  
22. interest and experience in problems of public education. So,  
23. I think...

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

25. Senator, your time is up if you'll...

26. SENATOR FAWELL:

27. ...Yes, I'll just wind up here to...I did want to bring  
28. out this point and I do want to stress that it pertains to two  
29. of the nominees and simply suggests to you that there has there-  
30. fore been, we feel, a violation of the very spirit of the  
31. statute and I also, may I just add this, there has been some  
32. rush here. I might add that as we have received criticism from  
33. the Governor on this, I do want to point out the statute states

1. that he was to submit his nominees on or before January 1st  
2. of this year. If he had done so a lot more study and indepth  
3. inquiries would have been possible. The Ad Hoc Committee also,  
4. of course, extended the invitation to the Governor's Office  
5. and to the other side of the aisle to join with us in regard  
6. to an objective evaluation and we were turned down summarily  
7. in regard to each of those invitations. I guess what I'm  
8. saying is gentlemen, there is a very sound basis, we believe,  
9. for our view that advice and consent should not be given. I'm  
10. sorry if I've gassed on further than your patience will en...  
11. allow endurance and thank you Mr. President for allowing me  
12. this time.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

14. Senator Latherow.

15. SENATOR LATHEROW:

16. Thank you Mr. President and Members of the Senate, I'd  
17. just like to make note of one thing that happened during that  
18. hearing concerning Mr. Keller. And, when I approached him  
19. with the question of what his position was concerning dual  
20. districts or unit districts in the State of Illinois and his  
21. answer to me was that he was not acquainted with those terms  
22. and I thought it was very unusual that a man could be nominated  
23. for selection on the State Board of Education that was to basic-  
24. ally govern and rule education in this state for many years who was  
25. not acquainted with the very basic school structure of the State  
26. of Illinois. I think we need something more on this Board than  
27. filling positions with people. We need, in my mind, to fill  
28. these basic positions with people who are acquainted and able  
29. to give knowledge to what happened before them.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

31. President Harris.

32. SENATOR HARRIS:

33. Mr. President, I want to make just a couple of points here.

1. I want the Members of the Senate and those guests who are  
2. listening and who have heard the debate so far to hear a reply  
3. to Senator Partee's comment that he believed that Mr. Keller  
4. did not receive the advice and consent of the Committee because  
5. of his clear statement of position favoring the right of public  
6. employees and specifically teachers having the right to strike.  
7. I want to point out that this Senate earlier this afternoon  
8. confirmed unanimously Mrs. Monroe and Dr. Walhout, both of  
9. whom acknowledged that they favored the right of teachers to  
10. strike. So, that we don't have a blind spot on that question,  
11. I want the record to clearly show that the rejection of Mr.  
12. Keller was not based on that question. Mr. Keller was rejected  
13. on the basis of his obvious lack of qualification in his  
14. responses to legitimate questions concerning the subject of  
15. general education and policies relating to education and I  
16. will be specific as to one precise question posed by, I believe,  
17. well I'm not certain which member of the Committee posed it.  
18. But, for example, Mr. Keller could not distinguish or did not  
19. understand any distinction between dual and unit districts.  
20. That kind of rudimentary understanding of the problems and  
21. the requirements of education are not possessed within the  
22. experience of this nominee. The reason that the Senate must  
23. reject two Democrat nominees is that the Governor has ignored  
24. the spirit of the law very clearly. We communicated to the  
25. Governor calling attention to the fact that eleven nominees  
26. had been nominated who are, in fact, Democrats. The law  
27. requires that there be no more than nine of any of the two  
28. major political parties. We have no choice. If the law is  
29. going to be observed then to do that work for the Governor.  
30. And, we are rejecting the two least qualified Democrats of the  
31. list of eleven and those two Democrats least qualified are  
32. Mr. Keller and Mr. Tobias. If the Governor will not meet his  
33. responsibility, the Republican members of this Senate will.

1. And I urge the Senate to reject Mr. Keller not on the basis  
2. that he favors the right of teachers to strike which he does  
3. and which is his privilege and that privilege obtains as far  
4. as Dr. Walhout and Mrs. Monroe. I want the record to be clear  
5. here today on what is being determined. The Republican members  
6. of the Senate are meeting their responsibility to see that the  
7. law is met and nothing more.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

9. Senator McCarthy.

10. SENATOR MCCARTHY:

11. Yes Mr. President and Members of the Senate, I wish to  
12. make a few remarks about this nominee, Mr. Keller, in support  
13. of his nomination to this important public Body. Mr. Keller  
14. is a man that lives in a real world. And, I think there was  
15. a spot needed and there is places that need to be occupied by  
16. people that live in the real world. He lives in the real world  
17. Mr. President because he has engaged as a member of the Collec-  
18. tive Bargaining Team for the United Steel Workers when they  
19. must take on the resources of big steel in the United States  
20. and that's the real world because he has represented hundreds  
21. of thousands of people who have children in school who are  
22. interested in the problems of education. Not only does Mr.  
23. Keller carry with him these experiences in life that are  
24. obtained in a very, very practical way but he was able to unveil  
25. Mr. President to the Executive Committee something that was new  
26. and something, I think, that was needed, personally in response  
27. to Senator Fawell who said he didn't have any expertise in the  
28. problem of education. It can be said that the issue on whether  
29. or not educators should have the right or not have the right  
30. to have compulsory arbitration, collective bargaining or ulti-  
31. mately the right to strike would ultimately be a decision made  
32. by this Legislature. However, the recommendation of this Board  
33. would carry weight with the final decisions that this Legislature

1. must make. And, Mr. Keller, Mr. President, said that he through  
2. collective bargaining now has a contract with United State Steel  
3. or Big Steel of a six year period with a no strike provision.  
4. A no strike provision which is, I think, a break through in  
5. something that we in America are looking for. And, this man  
6. who has lived in the real world, who has been a part of a  
7. negotiating team, who has come through in these turbulent  
8. economic times with a six year contract with Big Steel of no  
9. strike is a type of a man who's qualifications would fit and  
10. add to the dimensions of this Board.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Senator Sours.

13. SENATOR SOURS:

14. Mr. President, ladies and gentlemen of the Senate, this  
15. man is not being favored by this side because he is a Democrat.  
16. Now, that in itself is no venal sin but when...when there's  
17. more than the allotted number of either party, the major parties,  
18. then there's been a violation of the law which Senator Harris  
19. said we were going to oppose. It does no good to tacitly cir-  
20. cumvent the absolute requirements of this Board. For that  
21. reason, we on this side, have taken the action which has been  
22. taken. Let me advert just very briefly to the right of teachers  
23. to strike. I noticed in the Chicago Tribune that the firemen  
24. in Evanston are threatening to strike. Now, I think some day  
25. this Chamber and the other bigger Chamber, larger Chamber, is  
26. going to have to come to grips with only one principle whether,  
27. and this is not anti-union, this is pro-government. We must  
28. come to grips some day as to whether or not we will permit any,  
29. any organized group to shut down a school system or to shut  
30. down the operation of a municipality. We might just as well,  
31. gentlemen and ladies, send the mayor and the alderman and the  
32. county board, we might just as well disband this department of  
33. the State if we ever let the union bosses take over the system.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Is there further discussion? The question is does the  
3. Senate advise and consent to the nomination of Lawrence A.  
4. Keller of Evergreen Park to be a member of the State Board of  
5. Education. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will  
6. vote No. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have  
7. all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question the  
8. Yeas are twenty-nine, the Nays are twenty-four, two Voting  
9. Present. A majority if Senators elected having refused to give  
10. their advice and consent by record vote. The Senate rejects  
11. the nomination of Mr. Lawrence Keller of Evergreen Park to be  
12. a member of the State Board of Education. Senator Ozinga.

13. SENATOR OZINGA:

14. Well, I suppose I should first thank the support, ardent  
15. support that I had on that roll call from the other side of the  
16. aisle. But, I am not making any excuses for myself. I feel  
17. about the way the majority has spoken. Consequently, I will  
18. now make a motion that the Senate advise and consent to the  
19. nomination of Domingo Tobias of Chicago to be a member of the  
20. State Board of Education. Again, Mr. President, this was one  
21. of those controversial roll calls where after a consideration  
22. the...where the Do Pass or Do Consent roll call, it was reversed  
23. and they Do Not advise consent roll call was carried. There-  
24. fore I would move the Senate as required by the statute.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Senator Partee.

27. SENATOR PARTEE:

28. This relates to a man by the name of Domingo Tobias. I  
29. hope that I can clear up what has been muddled, I think, in  
30. terms of what the law is. And, I think probably the fault lay  
31. with...with us and I think we are certainly not perfect. One  
32. of the problems with the answers to the questionnaire was the  
33. way in which the questionnaire was phrased when you take it in

1. juxtaposition to the statute itself. The question asked by the  
2. Republican Task Force was about party affiliation and how one  
3. voted in the last Primary. The statute itself, I think, needs  
4. something done to it to clarify it. The statute says that no  
5. more than nine members of the State Board shall be from one  
6. political party. I don't think there's much question about  
7. what that means. But, the other part of the statute is at  
8. least ambivalent because it says this same paragraph defines  
9. party membership as having voted in the Primary of the party  
10. in the last Primary before appointment preceding the previous  
11. General Election. Now, that by analysis means not the 1974  
12. Primary but the 1972 Primary and it does not matter what a  
13. person thinks his politics are so long as the definition of  
14. party affiliation relates to the 1972 Primary. That's the  
15. definition for determining what a person is. You may remember  
16. that just before the 1972 Primary some two or three days  
17. before, in fact, the courts ruled that the twenty-one month  
18. rule where one must remain in a party without changing parties  
19. became extinct, extant. The court ruled that a person could,  
20. in fact, vote in the '72 Primary by asking for either kind of  
21. ballot. There were some Republican areas in upstate Cook  
22. County where they ran out of Democratic ballots because they  
23. weren't expecting that many and alot of people, Republican  
24. voted in the Democratic Primary and for whatever reasons they  
25. chose. So, some of the answers as given were based not on a  
26. lack of candor but on a basis of confusion. The question  
27. related to the '72 Primary. They thought it related to the  
28. '74 Primary and that perhaps is what happened to Mr. Tobias  
29. because it is a fact and I do not shrink from it. That on two  
30. seperate occasions he uttered two seperate things. But, the  
31. utterances were based on his knowledge of what he thought he  
32. was answering in terms of whether it was the '72 or '74 Primary.  
33. He came and I think he was badgered a little but that is to be



1. expected. We are not expected to have an ice cream social in  
2. the Executive Committee. And, he came and I thought he tried  
3. as best he could to answer the questions and to explain that  
4. there was this confusion. The statute itself is confusing.  
5. I think, well, I think everybody else can just have it.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Senator Netsch. Excuse me, I'm sorry. Proceed Senator  
8. Partee.

9. SENATOR PARTEE:

10. I would hope that we would be able to get someone in the  
11. nurses station who has some ability to provide better hearing  
12. for our members. I do not understand why it necessary for two  
13. members who are standing talking to talk loudly enough for you  
14. to be heard all over the place. I'm not...I'm not trying to  
15. keep anybody from talking but certainly they can keep their  
16. voices down so we can hear ourselves think. Now, Mr. President  
17. I'm only saying that I think this statute needs correction and  
18. I would invite your attention. I'll be delighted to help next  
19. year to bring it into a...a more clear pronouncement. Because  
20. it does leave something to be desired and I think the confusion  
21. with this young man stems from that. I...I just am really  
22. upset also because it seems to me that people with Spanish  
23. surnames have a very difficult time getting through the Illinois  
24. State Senate. First it was Felicita BerLanga and now it's  
25. Domingo Tobias. He was the only one of seventeen persons  
26. selected on this group who happens to be Spanish in origin.  
27. A large, large segment of our population in this state now  
28. are Spanish people and I would hope that they would not take  
29. his rejection as anything personal to Spanish speaking people.  
30. There are people who...many of whom are trying very hard to  
31. educate their families and trying to take on the American  
32. way of life. I would hope that this young man would not be  
33. rejected because it may be a clear signal to the Spanish

1. community that there's something wrong with them. And, that  
2. they're people who cannot get through the State Senate. I  
3. hope that doesn't happen and I certainly would ask that this  
4. Senate advise and consent to his nomination.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Senator Netsch.

7. SENATOR NETSCH:

8. Mr. President, Senator Partee has now expressed in part  
9. what I had intended to say but I will repeat it anyway for  
10. emphasis. It's always possible to rationalize the rejection  
11. of one of the Governor's appointees to a state board commission,  
12. or other position. But, I do find it curious that there has  
13. been a common strain of characteristic involving many of those  
14. who have indeed been rejected by this Senate in the last eighteen  
15. months and many of them have in fact carried some form of unique-  
16. ness either in terms of sex or in terms of their ethnic or  
17. language background. Mr. Tobias is the only Spanish speaking  
18. member to be appointed to this Board. I think it extremely un-  
19. fortunate that this huge segment of our population now and it is  
20. a very significant part of the population in the public school  
21. system in this state will no longer have someone who can speak  
22. for them or to them in a language that they understand. I would  
23. ask the Members on the other side of the aisle to search their  
24. souls and their conscience to make sure that this rejection does  
25. not reflect Mr. Tobias' Spanish speaking background and culture.  
26. I think that would be extremely unfortunate.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator Bell.

29. SENATOR BELL:

30. Well, Mr. President, Senator Partee, Senator Netsch, I  
31. find myself growing a little tired and disgruntled over the  
32. constant carping from your side of the aisle in reference to  
33. this side of the aisle having racial problems in reference to

1. appointees or ethnic problems or...or something of that sort  
2. constantly. I've heard it by the leadership of the Democrat  
3. Party today just...several times. He's mentioned it at various  
4. other times and as a member of the Spanish Speaking Commission  
5. and somewhat conversant in Spanish and having a lot of very  
6. close friends of Spanish background, I frankly resent it Sir  
7. and Ma'am. I would suggest to you Senator Partee that your  
8. great Democrat Party with a small D from Chicago has done  
9. little in the way of appointing or finding candidates from  
10. Spanish background to serve in that great municipality and  
11. I would also suggest to Senator Netsch that it's entirely  
12. possible to come up with yet another nominee of Spanish back-  
13. ground. And, so I say that it's just a cloud that's been  
14. drifted across what is really and truly the issue and that  
15. let's quit playing games. It has not taken place from this  
16. side of the aisle but rather Senator Partee, as with so many  
17. other issues that we've discussed, this Spring...it's been from  
18. your side of the aisle Sir and you've been the culprit leading  
19. the whole parade.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Senator Walker. I'm going to recite those who have sought  
22. recognition. Senator Walker, Fawell and Chew. And, following  
23. Senator Chew, Senator Soper. Senator Hickey.

24. SENATOR WALKER:

25. Thank you Mr. President.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Senator Walker.

28. SENATOR WALKER:

29. I...I thought I heard the...I thought I heard my friend  
30. the good leader from the other side of the aisle mention some-  
31. thing about the '72 election. I just happen to have a little  
32. file here I keep in my drawer that's entitled Election Reform  
33. and as I recall it, the Senator said the gentleman couldn't

1. get a ballot. I assume I'm right in that statement. But, if  
2. he couldn't...I have a couple of reasons or a couple of thoughts  
3. on it at least. Number one here is an article out of the  
4. Tribune and I wish they'd stick more to election reform than  
5. castigating friends of mine such as Bob Cronson. This is  
6. entitled City Worker Jailed for '72 Vote Fraud. The next one  
7. is Eighty-One of Cusper's Election Judges and Officials Have  
8. Been Indicted. Well, if they wouldn't use up so many of these  
9. ballots so early in the day and I'm assuming that he's referring  
10. to paper ballots. This wasn't '72 but it was six years prior  
11. thereto in '66 from my favorite paper until recently The Chicago  
12. Tribune present this card filled out to your precinct captain  
13. when you go to vote on Tuesday, November the 8th, 1966. Not to  
14. be turned in to him within one hundred feet of the polling  
15. place. To entitle you to participate in a drawing. The winner  
16. of which will receive a weekend trip for two all expenses paid  
17. to Las Vegas. Now, this has not too much to do with this  
18. appointment except the question of balance was raised here.  
19. There's a House member, Peggy Smith, she says let me mention  
20. a few instances. Rubber bands and pins were used to keep the  
21. levers from recording votes. Many of the persons in my campaign  
22. were physically threatened inside of the polling places. People  
23. openly solicited votes in the polling places. So, I say this  
24. might or may not and probably doesn't have much to do with the  
25. confirmation of this party but I thought it was a good lead in  
26. when it was mentioned that the gentleman had trouble getting a  
27. ballot...

28. PRESIDENT:

29. For what purpose does Senator Palmer arise? Senator Palmer.

30. SENATOR PALMER:

31. I'd say I agree with the Senator partially when I said...  
32. when he says it does not have much to do with the subject at  
33. hand. I would say it does not have anything to do with the

1. subject at hand and I ask the Chair to please admonish the  
2. Senator.

3. SENATOR WALKER:

4. Well, Mr. President...

5. PRESIDENT:

6. The Chair...the Chair rules that Senator Walker has been  
7. occasionally on point today but effective. Proceed Senator  
8. Walker.

9. SENATOR WALKER:

10. Thank...thank you Mr. President. I just thought it was  
11. a good tie in when the question of ballots was mentioned here.  
12. I think we're going far upfield. The farther we go the more  
13. bird seed there seems to be scattered around here and the more  
14. people that want to get into the act whether they're on the  
15. Executive Committee or not. Cec's my good friend, I hated to  
16. do this but when the question of ballots comes up, it reminds  
17. me why I have trouble getting my favorite bill through here  
18. like Vadalabene says, his biggie, why we can't permit the news  
19. media inside the polling places in the city. I've arranged  
20. fire field and I just got a message here that...the red light  
21. was on.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Senator Fawell.

24. SENATOR FAWELL:

25. I'll try to be very brief. The only point I wanted to  
26. bring out Senator Partee, I agree with you that I think the...  
27. the existing statute does need some clarification. And, what  
28. we tried to do on the task force was to ascertain as fairly as  
29. we could whether or not the three nominees who had not voted in  
30. the '72 Primary and hence under the statute were classified as  
31. not being technically a member of any political party as a  
32. practical matter what political party did they consider them-  
33. selves to be a member of and did they communicate this fact to

1. the Governor's Office? As you know, Mr. Witkowski and Dr.  
2. Bailey clearly enunciated that they were affiliated with the  
3. Democratic Party. Mr. Tobias did not submit a questionnaire  
4. until quite late but he did drop in to my office and he very  
5. clearly, very clearly said to me, Senator I look upon myself  
6. as a member of the Democratic Party. I asked him did he advise  
7. the Governor's Office of this prior to the appointment. He  
8. said yes, the Governor's Office was well aware of this and in  
9. addition he stated that they told him that he was being appointed  
10. as one of the Democratic nominees. Now, Mr. Tobias is a very  
11. fine gentleman and I think that the unfortunate circumstance  
12. here was that the Governor's Office did a rather sloppy job and  
13. certainly was not fair to this fine gentleman to put him in the  
14. place in which they have put him. The Executive Committee came  
15. to the conclusion, and I think rightly so, that two had to be  
16. withdrawn. The Governor refused to take that action so the  
17. Executive Committee had to do so. Certainly this doesn't  
18. necessarily mean that there's any affront meant to the Spanish  
19. community and I certainly have no such motivations and I don't  
20. believe there are any on this side of the aisle. I might add  
21. that Dr. Goodwin is Portuguese and speaks Spanish very fluently.  
22. I would submit to you too that the Governor can now appoint  
23. true independents because these people admittedly by their own  
24. admission said they are not independents and I think that this  
25. is something that has to be brought out. Now, he can bring in  
26. an independent Latin if he wishes. And, then I think we  
27. can be in position assuming that that person is going to be  
28. well founded as far as the credentials. We can get about certainly  
29. appointing them. Again, I stress you that fourteen of the  
30. seventeen we have found to be well qualified individuals and  
31. let's sometime accentuate the positive and recognize too that  
32. when we advise and consent, it means more than the Senate being  
33. just a rubber stamp for the Governor and more, I think also, and

1. the Governor always saying that there's only a political motiva-  
2. tion behind each event when the Senate decide that they wish  
3. to exercise their discretion and once in a while say no.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Senator McBroom and then Senator Chew.

6. SENATOR McBROOM:

7. Yes, thank you Mr. President. I...I simply want to point  
8. out to the members, I understand that Senator Knuepfer's Committee  
9. has the record of meeting until midnight. I...I don't want the  
10. Appropriations Committee to take that honor away from Senator  
11. Knuepfer. We've got an awful lot of work in it tonight Mr.  
12. President and I...I hope that we can cut the dialogue just a  
13. little bit and I know that all members of the Appropriations  
14. Committee at least share that feeling. Thank you.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Senator Chew.

17. SENATOR CHEW:

18. To the distinguished President presiding over the Senate,  
19. I respectfully remove your thoughts of what I was about to say  
20. and to fulfill your desire. I now move the previous question.

1. on that Board there would...they would be independents, they  
2. wouldn't be independent Democrats or independent Republicans or  
3. people who said they were Democrats or were Republicans and  
4. then because of the fact they didn't vote in the one primary  
5. because they didn't get there made them independents. I like  
6. to see independents on any board and I'd like to see true Republi-  
7. cans on a board and true Democrats on a board but I say this, if  
8. we'd followed the philosophy that if a person said that they  
9. were a Democrat or a Republican and you found that they didn't  
10. vote in a primary and that made them independents, I could see  
11. where you would have seventeen Democrats on that Board or  
12. seventeen Republicans all depending on who the person was that  
13. was doing the choosing. All they'd have to do is tell a person  
14. well let's get us some Democrats that didn't vote in that  
15. primary or let's get us some Republicans that didn't vote in  
16. that primary and now they're independents. Now that's enough  
17. said for that. But, if Senator Netsch or Senator Partee feel  
18. sorry or feel that there should be Spanish speaking people on  
19. that Board, I...I can recommend a couple of well qualified  
20. Spanish speaking Republicans that are real Republicans that I  
21. could...I could vouch for and if they want the names and they  
22. could use their power of persuasion with the Governor, I'd be  
23. glad to supply them a couple of names of a couple of Spanish  
24. speaking well qualified people that they would be proud to have  
25. serve on that Board. Thank you very much.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Senator Hickey.

28. SENATOR HICKEY:

29. Mr. President, I rise in support of Mr. Tobias. We've  
30. been having discussion about a difference between the letter  
31. of the law and the spirit of the law. This man is being  
32. rejected by some people because of the spirit of the law. In  
33. the letter of the law he does qualify as an independent and I'd



1. like to point this fact out to my friends on the other side of  
2. the aisle. The person that I sponsored whom you have approved,  
3. Dr. Walhout from Rockford, if you want to talk about the spirit  
4. of the law she voted Republican in the 1970 Primary and the  
5. 1974 Primary. So, perhaps she's more Republican than she is  
6. Democrat so maybe if you choose to go by the spirit of the law  
7. which you're talking about now in regard to Mr. Tobias, you'd  
8. be willing to make that trade to call Dr. Walhout a Republican  
9. since in the last three primaries she has voted more often  
10. Republican than Democratic. And then, leave Mr. Tobias in and  
11. also Dr. Walhout. Thank you.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Senator Chew moves the previous question. All in favor  
14. signify by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. The  
15. question is as put by Senator Ozinga does the Senate advise and

10. Also, Mr. Chairman I would move that the Senate advise and  
11. consent to the nomination of the following nominees to be  
12. members of:

13. BOARD OF AGRICULTURAL ADVISORS

14. To be members of the Board of Agricultural Advisors for  
15. terms expiring the third Monday in January of 1975. Namely:

16. - Kenneth Besse of Millstadt

17. - Jerry E. Corners of Centralia

18. - John Callarman of Mt. Vernon

19. - Dr. Wendell E. Keepper of Makanda

20. - Dr. James L. McBee of Normal

21. - Dale Nass of Plymouth

22. - Dr. Victor Sheldon of Sumner

23. - Russel Stauffer of Durand

24. - Harold B. Steele of Princeton

25. - Wendell Westall of Noble

26. PRESIDENT:

27. The question is does the Senate advise and consent to the  
28. nominations just made. Senator Rock.

29. SENATOR ROCK:

30. He's counting. I think we have thirty-three.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Is there discussion? The question is does the Senate  
33. advise and consent to the nominations just made. Those in

1. favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote No. The voting  
2. is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that  
3. question, the Yeas are fifty-eight, the Nays are none. A  
4. majority of Senators elected concurring by record vote. The  
5. Senate does advise and consent to the nominations just made.  
6. Senator Ozinga.

7. SENATOR OZINGA:

8. Mr. President, now I think that I would take as a matter  
9. of personal privilege. Thank each and everyone of you Members  
10. present here and I think we've established a record right here  
11. and now for confirmations by the Senate of the Governor's  
12. appointees. I want to personally thank the Executive Committee  
13. for staying with us as long as we did yesterday and especially  
14. the Secretary for getting all of this into shape today. We  
15. have now completed all of the nominees with the exception of  
16. a few that are being held up for vacancies of political appointees  
17. which will be on next Tuesday. The Governor's Office has  
18. promised to appoint together with the Lottery nominees and the  
19. Executive Committee in it of itself will meet next Monday on  
20. the adjournment of the Senate or 2 o'clock. Whichever is  
21. earlier. And, therefore Mr. Chairman, I would now move that  
22. the Senate do arise.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Ozinga moves that the Executive Session of the  
25. Senate arise. All in favor signify by saying Aye. Contrary  
26. no. The motion carries. So ordered. Senate bills...yes, we  
27. have a concurrence motion. Senator Howard Mohr. For what  
28. purpose does Senator Mitchler arise?

29. SENATOR MITCHLER:

30. Mr. President, I think it would be proper to announce that  
31. the Senate Industry and Labor Committee that was scheduled to  
32. meet at 2:15. We thought we might meet after the adjournment.  
33. We've set up to about six o'clock or so but Senator McBroom

1. has the Appropriations Committee and we're going to yield our  
2. wonderful members to you. So, we will not meet. The Senate  
3. Industry and Labor Committee meeting scheduled for today is  
4. cancelled until further notice.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Conference Committee reports. Senator Howard Mohr.

7. SECRETARY:

8. (The Committee of Conference appointed to consider the  
9. differences between the two Houses in relation to Senate  
10. Amendment to HB 2826 recommend that 1) the House concur in  
11. Senate Amendment No. 1 signed by six members of the Conference  
12. Committee)

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Mohr.

15. SENATOR MOHR:

16. Mr. President, I move the adoption of the Conference  
17. Committee report.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Mohr has moved the adoption of the Conference  
20. Committee report. Is there discussion? Senator Rock.

21. SENATOR ROCK:

22. Yes, thank you Mr. President and ladies and gentlemen of  
23. the Senate. I rise in opposition to that motion. And, I would  
24. ask the Members on this side to vote No on a motion to concur.  
25. The Democratic Members of both the House and the Senate refused  
26. to sign that Conference Committee report. We have asked that  
27. a second Conference Committee be appointed.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Is there further discussion? The question is does the  
30. Senate concur in the adoption of the Conference Committee report  
31. on HB 2826. The Conference Committee report...the Conference  
32. Committee appointed to resolve the difference between the two  
33. Houses. Senator Mohr.



1. SENATOR MOHR:

2. Mr. ...excuse me Mr. President. I think I should point out  
3. that this is the Drug Commission bill that we heard here for the  
4. couple of days and hopefully this will conclude our activities  
5. on this particular bill. It's a very important bill. We did  
6. enjoy having two Members from the other side on this bill yes-  
7. terday and hope that they would be back with us today.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. The question is does the Senate concur in the adoption of  
10. the Conference Committee report to HB 2826. Those in favor will  
11. vote Aye. Those opposed will vote No. The voting is open.  
12. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the  
13. record. On that question the Yeas are thirty-one, the Nays  
14. are twenty-two, six Voting Present. A majority of the Senators  
15. elected having concurred in the adoption of the Conference  
16. Committee report to HB 2826 it is therefore declared adopted  
17. and passed. For what purpose does Senator Donnewald arise?  
18. Senator Donnewald has requested a verification of the roll  
19. call. That is his right. You wish the...those voting in the  
20. affirmative? Yes. The Secretary will verify those voting in  
21. the affirmative.

22. SECRETARY:

23. The following voted in the Affirmative:

24. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Clarke, Conolly, Davidson, Fawell,  
25. Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Knuepfer, Latherow, McBroom, Merritt,  
26. Mitchler, Howard Mohr, Don Moore, Nimrod, Ozinga, Regner, Roe,  
27. Schaffer, Scholl, Shapiro, Sommer, Soper, Sours, Vadalabene,  
28. Walker, Weaver, Mr. President.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. The roll call has been verified. On the order of Senate  
31. bills on third reading. Senator Netsch, I think we should pro-  
32. ceed with the bills that have to be recalled in order for them  
33. to receive the processing. Do you wish to call 1357 back to

1. second reading?

2. SENATOR NETSCH:

3. Yes Mr. President, I will call it back to second reading  
4. for purposes of amendment.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. SB 1357 is ordered to second reading for purposes of an  
7. amendment.

8. SECRETARY:

9. The Committee on Appropriations offers Amendment No. 2.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator McBroom.

12. SENATOR McBROOM:

13. Move the adoption.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Senator Netsch. Senator McBroom has moved the adoption of  
16. Amendment No. 2. Senator Netsch.

17. SENATOR NETSCH:

18. Mr. President, I speak in opposition to Amendment No. 2.  
19. This amendment would cut a million, 0-8-0, four hundred. A  
20. million...almost a million, one hundred thousand dollars from  
21. the operating appropriation for the Environmental Protection  
22. Agency. Of that amount, \$705,000...\$705,100 is in personal  
23. services alone. This is going to have a devastating effect on  
24. the Environmental Agency and I think in view of the many res-  
25. ponsibilities that this Legislature has given to EPA including  
26. some new statutory ones last year that it is...doesn't make  
27. very good sense for us now to cut this much out of its appro-  
28. priation and at the same time to complain about the slowness  
29. and lack of efficiency of the work that EPA does. If we want  
30. it to perform in the way that many of you have demanded and  
31. rightfully so in terms of the processing, the permits and all  
32. of these other responsibilities, it seems to me we have got to  
33. give it the funds to be able to do this. This cut will actually

1. result in a reduction in the present number of employees in the  
2. Environmental Protection Agency. At the same time that last  
3. year...at the same time that last year we added on to the  
4. statutory responsibility of the Agency many very significant pro-  
5. grams including the MPDES. We have also insisted, and again I  
6. think rightfully so that the Agency take care of the problem of  
7. developing standards and safeguards on hazardous materials.  
8. Those are among only a few of the responsibilities that we have  
9. given EPA and at the same time we are cutting over a million  
10. dollars from its operating funds, almost all of it in personal  
11. services. This to me makes no sense at all and I would...I  
12. would wish that the Body would not adopt this amendment.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Is there further discussion? Senator McBroom.

15. SENATOR MCBROOM:

16. Senator Netsch suggested that we had delegated too many  
17. responsibilities to the Agency on that...on that point I...I  
18. agree with Senator Netsch. I think this is a very rational  
19. reasonable amendment. It devisualizes the Agency Mr. President  
20. and I...I think will have the effect of making it much more  
21. responsible than it is and I'd like to move the adoption of the  
22. amendment Mr. President.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Netsch.

25. SENATOR NETSCH:

26. Mr. President, I am not going to seek a roll call on this  
27. amendment but I want the record to show that I am voting no.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. All right. All those in favor of the adoption of the  
30. amendment signify by saying Aye. Contrary no. The record will  
31. show that Senator Netsch specifically voted no. The motion  
32. carries and Amendment No. 2 is adopted. Senator Netsch.

33. SENATOR NETSCH:

1. Mr. President, there is one more amendment that is a  
2. technical amendment. It involves a typographical error. It  
3. will be Amendment No. 4. I move its adoption.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Senator, I think we should proceed. I think there's another  
6. committee amendment before we get...no...all right.

7. SENATOR NETSCH:

8. We took care of the other two committee amendments earlier  
9. this week. Amendment No. 4.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Netsch has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 4  
12. to SB 1357. Is there discussion? All in favor of the adoption  
13. of Amendment No. 4 signify by saying Aye. Contrary no. The  
14. motion carries. Amendment No. 4 is adopted. Are there further  
15. amendments from the Floor? Third reading. SB 1382. Senator  
16. Rock do you wish it recalled to second reading?

17. SENATOR ROCK:

18. Yes, Mr. President, I would ask that leave that SB 1382  
19. be recalled for the purpose of amendments.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Is there leave? Leave is granted. SB 1382 is ordered to  
22. second reading for purposes of amendment. Senator Rock.

23. SECRETARY:

24. Appropriation Committee offers four amendments.

25. SENATOR ROCK:

26. Four or three?

27. SECRETARY:

28. Four.

29. SENATOR ROCK:

30. There are four on that.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Senator Rock moves the adoption of...to Amendment No. 1  
33. to...

1. SENATOR ROCK:

2. I...I wonder Mr. President just so that I've got my files  
3. straight. I only had three. Senator McBroom could move the  
4. adoption this seriatim, we're not going to get in a fight about  
5. this thing. All we want to do is find out what they are so I've  
6. got a complete record...

7. SENATOR McBROOM:

8. Senator Rock, Amendment No. 1 is the retirement which has  
9. \$49,000.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. All in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 signify  
12. by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. Amendment  
13. No. 1 is adopted. Senator...

14. SENATOR McBROOM:

15. Senator Rock, Amendment No. 2 reduces the bond cost, a  
16. hundred and sixteen...

17. PRESIDENT:

18. All in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 signify  
19. by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. Amendment  
20. No. 2 is adopted.

21. SENATOR ROCK:

22. No. 3, Senator Rock, is the reduction amendment. That...  
23. that is the one that reduces the total amount from six...to six  
24. seven to 4.7. Is that correct?

25. SENATOR McBROOM:

26. Yes, yes.

27. SENATOR ROCK:

28. Then I would be in opposition to that and we can...we need  
29. to have a roll call.

30. SENATOR McBROOM:

31. Well, Senator Rock, I'm asking you a question if I may  
32. sir. If...if we would move the adoption of this amendment and  
33. then what we discussed, put it back into the Amendment No. 5,

1. would that meet with your approval?  
2. SENATOR ROCK:  
3. That...that is correct.  
4. SENATOR McBROOM:  
5. I move the adoption of Amendment No. 3 Senator Harris.  
6. PRESIDENT:  
7. Senator McBroom moves the adoption of Amendment No. 3 to  
8. SB 1382. All in favor signify by saying Aye. Contrary no.  
9. The motion carries. Amendment No. 3 is adopted. Amendment No. 4.  
10. SENATOR McBROOM:  
11. Amendment No. 4 is the legal amendment Mr. President. I  
12. move the adoption.  
13. PRESIDENT:  
14. Senator McBroom moves the adoption of Amendment No. 4 to  
15. SB 1382. All in favor signify by saying Aye. Contrary no.  
16. The motion carries. Amendment No. 4 is adopted. Thirty to  
17. twenty-nine. Senator...for what purpose does Senator Davidson  
18. arise? Senator Davidson proposes Amendment No. 5. Senator  
19. Davidson.  
20. SENATOR DAVIDSON:  
21. This adds \$550,000 back into the budget and for line item  
22. people that there...they said they needed to hire.  
23. PRESIDENT:  
24. Senator Rock.  
25. SENATOR ROCK:  
26. Yes, just so there is no misunderstanding. Senator McBroom  
27. and I have reached an agreement whereby they are restoring  
28. \$550,000 of the original two million dollar cut. Now, I still  
29. think the cut in many respects is a little too deep because as  
30. you will see in the next bill, we are adding a tremendous amount  
31. of work to the Board in terms of capital improvement. It seems  
32. to me that on the one hand to increase the capital work load by  
33. 30% and at the same time cut the operating budget by 30% just

1. simply doesn't make any sense. We've agreed, again, I think we  
2. ...we are having the same problems as was happening on EPA.  
3. We're talking about two different sets of numbers and all kinds  
4. of head count and nobody seems to agree and the Agency, frankly,  
5. has not been much help. So, we'll put the five hundred and  
6. fifty back and send it over to the House. And, I would move  
7. adoption of Amendment No. 5. Senator Partee has an amendment  
8. which will be No. 6 I guess.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Senator Rock has moved the adoption of Senator Davidson's  
11. amendment number...all right. Well, Senator Rock did put the  
12. motion. Senator Davidson, then, moves to adopt Amendment No. 5  
13. to SB 1382. All in favor signify by saying Aye. Contrary no.  
14. The motion carries. Amendment No. 5 is adopted. Senator Partee.

15. SENATOR PARTEE:

16. Amendment No. 6 provide only \$114,775 for the Equal Economic  
17. Opportunity Contract Compliance Program. I'm told that it is  
18. necessary for compliance with both state and federal law that  
19. this amount of money be appropriated for that purpose. I would  
20. move its adoption.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Senator McBroom.

23. SENATOR MCBROOM:

24. Senator Partee, I'd wished I had an opportunity to talk to  
25. you about this earlier. The suggestion or questions that are  
26. propounded to me quite frequently and I...I'd be happy to have  
27. you elucidate. Are...what do we need to do this for sir when  
28. we have the FEPC Commission. If you want to...

29. SENATOR PARTEE:

30. Well, the statute says that they shall because they have  
31. to look at the contracts. They give assistance to the contrac-  
32. tors in bidding so that there can be compliance and once the  
33. contracts have been bid, they give assistance to them after that

1. point. It's a statutory consideration from the federal stand-  
2. point as well as the states.

3. SENATOR McBROOM:

4. Well, I don't want...I'd like to ask you one more question  
5. Senator Partee. And, I...I don't...I think you know me well  
6. enough that my questions emanate from good faith and it's only  
7. curiosity. What...what Senator Partee about the other things  
8. that brush by me from time to time, if...if a contractor or a  
9. subcontractor honestly and sincerely cannot find individuals to  
10. fit into a particular category. Where...where do...I...I know  
11. that you don't want to see a job shut down and I don't either  
12. and we...Senator Rock was at a...a meeting in Chicago that I  
13. attended that where the contractors were agonizing over their  
14. financial situation right now. Do you want to respond to that?

15. SENATOR PARTEE:

16. Now, part of the purpose is to provide an inventory of the  
17. available people so that they will know what they're bidding  
18. on. And, the Department has to make that inventory so that  
19. they do know.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Senator Sours and then Senator Knuepfer.

22. SENATOR SOURS:

23. Mr. President, are we referring to Amendment No. 6? I  
24. move it be Tabled.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Well, Senator that motion is not debatable. I did indicate  
27. that Senator Knuepfer also wanted recognition. Would you with-  
28. hold your motion until...Senator Knuepfer.

29. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

30. Well, I...I just wanted to explain to Senator Partee. There.  
31. ...there presently is on the staff a gentleman and one clerk  
32. concerned with the Affirmative Action Program. The amendment  
33. put back...the director had asked for six additional people.



1. Now, his contracts are not multiplying six-fold in this period.  
2. We did put the money back and I had some very serious conversa-  
3. tions with the Director. We did put the money back. Some of  
4. that may be used for Affirmative Action but most of it has to  
5. be used for the planning of the School Building Commission  
6. buildings which are going to be built. So, there was some money  
7. put back for planning. There was some money put back for  
8. Affirmative Action and there was some money put back for the  
9. School Building Commission buildings. But, not in the amount  
10. that the Director requested. In addition to that, it ought to  
11. be pointed out that these people are coming on line part...not  
12. all at one time. And, he doesn't need them all at once. But,  
13. I think it's an amendment that we can live with and I think it's  
14. an amendment that the Director can live with. And, I'm certain  
15. ...I know he didn't get as much as he want and maybe as much  
16. as you want. But, it is substantially more than was proposed  
17. originally.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Sours has moved to Table Amendment No. 6. The  
20. motion is not debatable. Those in favor of the motion signify  
21. by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. Amendment No.  
22. 6 is Tabled. Are there further amendments from the...Senator  
23. Partee.

24. SENATOR PARTEE:

25. Now, in...an anticipation that that might happen, we're  
26. offering Amendment No. 7 which will permit the Board to do what  
27. they say they need to do without any additional money. The  
28. Amendment No. 7 just changes the amount of the appropriations  
29. now as they stand to allow this extra money for this purpose  
30. out of existing funds without the addition of the \$114,000.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. For what purpose does Senator Regner arise? Senator Regner.

33. SENATOR REGNER:

1. I don't believe we have copies of this amendment on our  
2. desk.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Senator Regner are you requesting that the amendment be  
5. printed.

6. SENATOR REGNER:

7. Right.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Yes. Yes. Are you joined by four additional Senators?

10. All right. Senator Regner requests that the amendment be  
11. printed. Are there further amendments. Senator Partee.

12. SENATOR PARTEE:

13. I would just inquire Senator Regner if he's going to make  
14. that same request of every bill that's to be amended here today?

15. PRESIDENT:

16. The Senator...

17. SENATOR REGNER:

18. Late hours and I don't understand what this amendment does  
19. in complete Senator Partee.

20. SENATOR PARTEE:

21. Is there any problem with what I said or did you hear what  
22. I said.

23. SENATOR REGNER:

24. Yes sir, I did but I did not see the amendment and I would  
25. like to read it.

26. SENATOR PARTEE:

27. Should I...we'll send you over a copy Senator. Here. Now,  
28. all it does is rearrange the figures within the budget, within  
29. the existing budget without, I repeat, without the addition of  
30. any additional money to provide the Board with the ability to  
31. do what they say they have to do with reference to complying  
32. with federal and state standards on the Equal Opportunity Program.  
33. There's no additional money.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Senator Knuepfer.

3. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

4. Well, I...I would make two observations. I hope that we  
5. don't make the motion to print the bill and delay the bill.  
6. The bill has been delayed for some time. I do think we ought  
7. to look at it. The question that I would ask Senator Partee,  
8. I think what you're asking is to put a substantive amendment  
9. in an appropriation bill. That process may endanger the appro-  
10. priation process and I would hope that we could resist that  
11. amendment. This is an appropriation bill not a substantive  
12. bill.

13. SENATOR PARTEE:

14. I'm sorry, I...I probably missed it. There was someone  
15. talking to me here and I just really didn't hear what you said.  
16. No, it is not substantive. No, it is not a substantive bill.  
17. It just clearly identifies how it's to be spent. Let me read  
18. Section 2 which is the controlling language. (Senator Partee  
19. reads Section 2). It does not change the total bottom line.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Senator Regner.

22. SENATOR REGNER:

23. Yes, Mr. President. What I would suggest we do. I talked  
24. to several Members on this side, as we moved the bill to 3rd  
25. reading, we'll agree to bring it back tomorrow after we have  
26. time to look at this this evening and tomorrow morning and  
27. vote on it at that time. If that's acceptable to Senator Rock  
28. and Chairman McBroom.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Senator McBroom. All right. Are there further amendments  
31. to SB 1382? With the understanding that it can be recalled at  
32. the request of Senator Regner, then, Senator...to recall to 2nd  
33. reading, SB 1382 is advanced to 3rd reading. SB 1424. Senator

1. Rock.

2. SENATOR ROCK:

3. Yes, thank you Mr. President, ladies and gentlemen of the  
4. Senate. If you'll bear with me, this may take a few minutes  
5. and we'll try to expedite it as...as reasonably as we can.  
6. This bill now has, or will shortly have, seven committee  
7. amendments which I would ask the respective sponsors of those  
8. amendments to make the appropriate motions. All are acceptable  
9. to us so we can go right through them. In addition to that,  
10. there are three amendments which will be offered by me. I  
11. understand that. There are three that will be offered by me.  
12. There's one that will be offered by Senator Merritt and Senator  
13. Dougherty and one to be offered by Senator Hickey. So, if the  
14. Members will just bear with us I think Senator McBroom and I  
15. can move this thing along and...

16. SECRETARY:

17. The Committee on Appropriations offers five amendments.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator McBroom.

20. SENATOR MCBROOM:

21. I move the adoption of Amendment No. 1 Mr. President.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Senator McBroom moves the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to  
24. SB 1424. Is there discussion? All in favor...Senator McBroom.

25. SENATOR MCBROOM:

26. Mr. President, I...I will be happy to offer explanations  
27. whenever they're requested Mr. President. I...I can't see  
28. behind me obviously and I can't see over in the left hand  
29. corner on that side so, it's not my desire to run these through.  
30. If a Member requests information, I'll be happy to try to pro-  
31. vide it to the best of my ability. That's...that's been touched  
32. on at my desk at time...from time to time Mr. President.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Is there...Senator Rock.

2. SENATOR ROCK:

3. Well, Amendment No. 1 was the one offered by the Republican  
4. Members of the Appropriation Committee. What the...pardon me,  
5. what was done was they took the bill as originally introduced  
6. plus the twenty-seven page amendment submitted by the Bureau of  
7. the Budget, put that into one single amendment along with a  
8. restructuring of their own priorities and along with an additional  
9. hundred million dollars for the School Bond Program. And, we  
10. have no objection to Amendment No. 1. I would urge its adoption.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Senator Fawell.

13. SENATOR FAWELL:

14. My question Senator Rock would be in regard to the one  
15. hundred million for the School Construction...on the School  
16. Construction Fund. This...I assume pertains to the Capital  
17. Development Board Bond authorization of the last session. I  
18. forget, I think it's 1396 is a bill that has already been  
19. passed by this Body that does appropriate one hundred million  
20. authorization of bond authority for the Capital Development  
21. Board for the second year of the Bond Program of the construc-  
22. tion of public schools. Elementary and secondary schools. I  
23. ...I'm sorry, I wasn't up to date and did not realize that  
24. this is...in this bill. Is...is this identical to what we have  
25. already passed. Does it have the General Revenue Foundation  
26. for the support of the one hundred million dollars authorization?  
27. Is it in addition to the one hundred million...does it reappro-  
28. priate the one hundred million for the previous fiscal year?  
29. I...I understand that it's...it is exactly the same. All right.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Is there further discussion? The question is on the adoption  
32. of Amendment No. 1 to SB 1424. All in favor signify by saying  
33. Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. Amendment No. 1 is

1. adopted. Senator McBroom.
2. SENATOR McBROOM:
3. Amend...Amendment No. 2, Mr. President, I'd like to move
4. the adoption of it. This is Sangamon State's Fine Arts Center.
5. It involves \$2,700,000 in round figures. I move the adoption.
6. PRESIDENT:
7. Is there further discussion? The question is on the adoption
8. of Amendment No. 2 to SB 1424. All in favor signify by saying
9. Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. Amendment No. 2 is
10. adopted. Senator McBroom.
11. SENATOR McBROOM:
12. No. 3 Mr. President is a reappropriation correction that
13. was given to us by the Bureau of the Budget. I'd like to move
14. the adoption of that Mr. President.
15. PRESIDENT:
16. The question is...is there discussion? The question is on
17. the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to SB 1424. Those in favor
18. signify by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries.
19. Amendment No. 3 is adopted. Senator McBroom.
20. SENATOR McBROOM:
21. Yes, Amendment No. 4 is \$55,000 to Jubilee State Lodge,
22. Mr. President, and I move the adoption of it.
23. PRESIDENT:
24. Is there further discussion? The question is the adoption
25. of Amendment No. 4 to SB 1424. Those in favor signify by saying
26. Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. The amendment is adopted.
27. Senator McBroom.
28. SENATOR McBROOM:
29. Amendment No. 5...Amendment No. 5, Mr. President, involves
30. four million dollars. It's for the Capital Building Complex.
31. PRESIDENT:
32. Is there discussion? The question is the adoption of
33. Amendment No. 5 to SB 1424. Those in favor signify by saying

1. Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. Amendment No. 5 is  
2. adopted.

3. SECRETARY:

4. Amendment No. 6 by Senator Rock.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Senator Rock.

7. SENATOR ROCK:

8. This, Mr. Secretary, is the \$410,000...amendment...yes.  
9. Ok. I know there probably will be some opposition, let me  
10. just briefly state what the amendment proposes. This would  
11. add the sum of \$410,000 for remodeling and renovation of  
12. office space for the Capital Development Board to consist of  
13. the development of a complete architectural space within the  
14. Springfield State Office Building. It includes ceilings,  
15. lighting, partitioning, floor covering and related mechanical  
16. and electrical work. The Board has been requested, I'm told,  
17. to move over to the State Office Building in their particular  
18. line of work with the engineers and architects that they have.  
19. This is the amount that they estimate they will need for  
20. remodeling and I would move the adoption of Amendment No. 6.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Is...Senator McBroom.

23. SENATOR McBROOM:

24. Yes, Mr. President, I would have to oppose the adoption of  
25. this amendment. We...we put a hundred thousand dollars in this  
26. particular project. Senator Rock is talking about something  
27. like four or five times that amount Mr. President and we do not  
28. think it's justified and I would hope the Members on this side  
29. of the aisle would resist Senator Rock's amendment.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. The question is on the adoption of Amendment No. 6 to  
32. SB 1424. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote  
33. no. The motion for adoption fails. Amendment No. ...

1. SECRETARY:  
2. 7 by Senator Rock.  
3. PRESIDENT:  
4. Senator Rock.  
5. SENATOR ROCK:  
6. Thank you Mr. President, Mr. Secretary this is the two and  
7. a half million dollar...yes thank you...this would add an addi-  
8. tional two and a half million dollars for court complex in  
9. Springfield. This...there was testimony before the committee.  
10. I agreed before the committee to hold it for Floor action. I  
11. understand there is little if any opposition and I would move  
12. adoption of Amendment No. 7.  
13. PRESIDENT:  
14. Senator McBroom.  
15. SENATOR McBROOM:  
16. Well, Mr. President, I'm going to support...  
17. PRESIDENT:  
18. Senator McBroom.  
19. SENATOR McBROOM:  
20. I'm going to support Senator Rock's amendment. This is  
21. another situation Mr. President and I don't want to play an  
22. old song where the Governor and Director Hovey are playing  
23. games with the budget. Judge Craven came in with this amend-  
24. ment. We were unable to find out from him whether the Governor  
25. supported it or whether the Bureau of the Budget supported it.  
26. I discussed it with Judge Craven and I have a letter in my  
27. office signed by Director Hovey saying that he does in fact  
28. support this project. I just wish that some of these things  
29. would come in at the appropriate time and we'd have fewer press  
30. releases on bare-bones budgets Mr. President. But, I support  
31. Senator Rock's amendment.  
32. PRESIDENT:  
33. Is there further discussion? The question is on the



1. adoption of Amendment No. 7 to SB 1424. Those in favor signify  
2. by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries and the amend-  
3. ment is adopted.

4. SECRETARY:

5. Amendment No. 8 by Senator Rock.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Senator Rock.

8. SENATOR ROCK:

9. Thank you Mr. President, ladies and gentlemen of the  
10. Senate, in the nature of a bare-bones budget, this amendment,  
11. Number 8 would add an additional ten million dollars. Seven  
12. million out of bond money and three million out of general  
13. revenue and it is to implement the Crafts Program announced  
14. by the Governor to improve living conditions for the mentally  
15. ill and devel...and the disabled and called for this ten million  
16. dollars. Now, again, this was offered in committee, in the  
17. Republican side and the Democratic side rightfully requested a  
18. breakout of which facilities and how much was to be spent at  
19. each facility. That is now incorporated in the amendment and  
20. I would move the adoption of Amendment No. 8.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Senator McBroom.

23. SENATOR McBROOM:

24. Well, I wish I had the speech before me that I gave just  
25. a minute ago. I know that the other fifty-eight Members don't  
26. wish I had it but this is another classic example Mr. President  
27. of Governor Walker playing games with the budget, playing games  
28. with the press. I don't know about any other Members but one...  
29. one Member of this Body is up to his ears with that kind of  
30. mickey mouse. But, we are going to support the amendment. It  
31. should have been in the budget. As I recall at the press dinner  
32. someone had a sign that identifying themselves as Director Hovey  
33. and it said two plus two equals three. But, we're going to

1. support you Senator Rock.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Is there further discussion? The question is on the  
4. adoption of Amendment No. 8 to SB 1424. Those in favor signify  
5. by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. Amendment  
6. No. 8 is adopted.

7. SECRETARY:

8. Amendment No. 9 by Senator Dougherty.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Senator Dougherty.

11. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

12. Mr. President, Members of the Senate, Senator Merritt  
13. has a similar amendment so I will propose mine Senate bill  
14. ...to SB 1424. And, it calls for an addition of four and a  
15. half million dollars to the Capital Development Fund...Funding  
16. for the purpose of construction curtailing facilities in the  
17. Chicago Regional Port District. Senator Merritt has the same  
18. amendment. I will join with him or he will join with me, it  
19. doesn't make a great deal of difference.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Senator Merritt.

22. SENATOR MERRITT:

23. Yes, I'm heartily in agreement with that. It was the unanimous  
24. vote of our commission for economic development when this  
25. property became available, lake front property, a hundred and  
26. ninety-four acres. We never thought over the years that it  
27. ever would. The Youngstown Sheet and Tube Company feel that  
28. it serves its best purpose in the public trust by doing this  
29. and I would move the adoption of the amendment.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator Knuepfer.

32. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

33. Well, irrespective of my neighbors position, there's three

1. and a half million dollars in the budget already for that...  
2. that Port Authority. There is no plan. There was no plan.  
3. The Governor does not have it in his budget: The Bureau of  
4. the Budget didn't approve it and this is a last minute attempt  
5. by someone, I don't know who except maybe well I guess Senator  
6. Dougherty's friends, to stick another little pork barrel in  
7. the budget and I think we ought to resist this.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Senator Dougherty.

10. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

11. I would like to answer Senator Knuepfer. This is a very  
12. vital project to the State of Illinois. I might remind you  
13. that this is the largest import...export state in the Union.  
14. I...we export more vegetables, more farm products than any  
15. other state. We are number three in manufactured products  
16. and this is the...this is going to make it possible for us to  
17. increase income in the State of Illinois and the people of  
18. Illinois. It's finally needed. The three and a half million  
19. dollars was appropriated, that's true. However, observations  
20. by very capable engineers have concluded it would be far better  
21. to construct this facility at the mouth of the Calumet River  
22. and not Lake Michigan where they will avoid seven miles of  
23. towing by tugs. They will expedite the moving of materials  
24. and there is need of containerizing facilities all over this  
25. world. The methods of shipping have changed down through the  
26. years Senator Knuepfer, instead of bulk cargos or less than...  
27. less than cargos...shipments...

28. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

29. Senator...

30. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

31. ...Yes sir.

32. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

33. Senator, the way you put it I don't see how an additional

1. four and a half million dollars is going to be any where near  
2. enough. If you can persuade the Governor to put it in the  
3. Capital Development Act and if it goes through that priority  
4. system, I might be willing to support it. I don't think you  
5. could even spend it this year.

6. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

7. Senator, if you'll take the time. I'll show you the  
8. operations. I have a brochure on it. It means the acquisition  
9. of a hundred and ninety-four acres of very valuable land. It  
10. would be my...my presumption, the Youngstown Steel and Tube  
11. Company are making a sacrifice in the general public's behalf  
12. to provide these facilities for us. I would move to defer the  
13. adoption of this amendment.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Senator Merritt.

16. SENATOR MERRITT:

17. I just don't want to continue to belabor this. The hour's  
18. late. Well, I would only suggest that my good seat mate,  
19. Senator Knuepfer, does not have the entire picture by any means.  
20. The Governor saw fit, as you well know, to approve the three  
21. and a half million in the last session. As we were progressing  
22. toward that end to that containerization facility, it became  
23. more and more apparent that we could acquire a twenty-five or  
24. thirty acre site at the mouth of the river on the lake front  
25. from Youngstown Sheet and Tube. The balance of the land to  
26. be sold to some other interest. That negotiation bogged down  
27. during the winter and as a result again, as I stated before,  
28. they came to the conclusion, at least the Chairman of the Board,  
29. that...Max Cohen of the Chicago Regional Port District was...  
30. negotiating with. That fine company came to the conclusion that  
31. that land that fine hundred and ninety-four acres would best  
32. serve the public, would best be served by the public trust. Now,  
33. that three and a half million together with the four and a half

1. million will accomplish it. And, another very important  
2. thing is this is not money that's being appropriated and then  
3. gone. This is a complete pay back on a fifty-fifty basis to  
4. where 50% of the net revenues go to repay this money to the  
5. State of Illinois and I certainly would appreciate a good  
6. support from both sides of the aisle on this very very important  
7. link that I would call our gateway to the world.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Senator Johns.

10. SENATOR JOHNS:

11. Mr. Chairman, Mr. President, what Tom...Senator Tom  
12. Merritt has been telling you is the absolute truth. This is  
13. an investment. It's one of the key parcels in that harbor.  
14. It's a chance of a lifetime for the State of Illinois and this  
15. region to pick up some very very important land in a harbor  
16. and it'll make Chicago and that port one of the key ports in  
17. the nation. Thank you very much.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Graham.

20. SENATOR GRAHAM:

21. I think what Senator Dougherty and Senator Johns has forgot  
22. to say that this amendment has merit.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Is there further discussion? The question is does the  
25. Senate adopt Amendment No. 9 to SB 1424. Those in favor signify  
26. by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. Amendment  
27. No. 9 is adopted.

28. SECRETARY:

29. Amendment No. 10 by Senator Hickey.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator Hickey.

32. SENATOR HICKEY:

33. Mr. President and Members of the Senate, we've been spending

1. a good deal of money in these last amendments. Now, I want to  
2. give you a chance to save some. My amendment would delete one  
3. and three quarters million dollars from the Capital Development  
4. budget. And, this isn't a matter of playing games with anybody.  
5. People even on my side of the aisle don't know about this. This  
6. is...this is my own pet project. What this million and three  
7. quarters is for is for about half of the architectural charges  
8. for a sixty million dollar hospital which is projected by the  
9. University of Illinois Medical Center in Chicago but the plans  
10. for which have not been approved by this Body. There's no  
11. question but what the present hospital is very inadequate and  
12. antiquated and it does need to be replaced. But, sixty million  
13. dollars would build a five hundred bed hospital embracing two  
14. types of referral teaching hospitals which I believe is needed.  
15. But, also an additional number of general service beds. Now,  
16. definitely the referral teaching hospital needs to be built  
17. but I contend that the general service beds do not need to  
18. be built. This is the largest Capital project facing the State  
19. of Illinois and I think it needs careful examination and con-  
20. currence by this Body before plans are begun for it. The reasons  
21. that I want to do this is because I know that that hos...that  
22. area of Chicago is now over bedded. Those of you from Chicago  
23. are well aware of that and it's been in the newspapers around  
24. the rest of the state too. The Community Health Planning Organ-  
25. ization has suggested that they cooperate with Cook County  
26. Hospital. That hasn't happened yet and it may never happen.  
27. But, I also want to point out that already the State of Illinois  
28. has spent eleven and a half million dollars on the Metro Six  
29. Hospitals for the University of Illinois so that they would have  
30. beds available for their teaching. Now, of course, I'm told  
31. that it would be just a lot nicer if the doctors didn't have to  
32. go out of a hospital and go outdoors to those other hospitals  
33. that we're already spending eleven million dollars on. But, I

1. don't believe that this state can afford to indulge them in  
2. that. Another thing is that this hospital is supposedly going  
3. to be paid by half by patient fees. I doubt if very many of  
4. you are aware that right now the University of Illinois Hospital  
5. in Chicago has a ten million dollar annual operating deficit  
6. which is picked up by the Board of Higher Education budget. I  
7. think more careful plans need to be worked out for the payment  
8. of it. This could save the State of Illinois ten, fifteen, maybe  
9. twenty million dollars. I'm going to offer a companion resolu-  
10. tion later which will ask for a committee to be set up to study  
11. the needs of this project. If you vote to keep this in the  
12. appropriation, you will be locking the State of Illinois into  
13. a sixty million dollar hospital without ever having approved  
14. it or you'll be throwing a million and three quarters down  
15. the drain once it is discovered that that is not the kind of  
16. hospital that's needed. I ask for a favorable vote on this  
17. amendment. If there's any questions...

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Weaver.

20. SENATOR WEAVER:

21. Mr. President and Members of the Senate, I move that  
22. Amendment No. 10 to House bill...SB 1424 lie upon the Table.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Would you...Senator Weaver would you...for what purpose  
25. does Senator Rock arise?

26. SENATOR ROCK:

27. Well, I'm sorry...did he move to Table it?

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Yes.

30. SENATOR ROCK:

31. Oh, I...I did not hear that. I beg your pardon. I was  
32. just rising in asking our Members to support this amendment and  
33. we would obviously then be in opposition to the motion to Table.

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2<sup>nd</sup> reading  
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1. PRESIDENT:

2. Senator Weaver has moved to Table Senator Hickey's amend-  
3. ment which is Amendment No. 10 to SB 1424. All those in favor  
4. signify...the motion is to Table. Those in favor signify by  
5. saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion...roll call has been re-  
6. quested. The question is shall the Senate Table Amendment No. 10  
7. to SB 1424. Those in favor of the motion to Table will vote  
8. Aye. Those opposed will vote no. The voting is open. Have all  
9. voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who  
10. wish? Take the record. On that question the Yeas are thirty,  
11. the Nays are twenty-eight and Amendment No. 10 is Tabled. Are  
12. there further amendments from the Floor? Third reading.  
13. Senator Nimrod, did you wish to call SB 1452? SB 1452 is ordered  
14. back to 2nd reading for purposes of amendment.

15. SENATOR NIMROD:

16. Mr. President and fellow Senators, this bill is amended to  
17. not only include the 100% tax on the RTA but what it basically  
18. does in addition to what the parking and the bonding which are  
19. similar in Eminent Domain which are similar to what we have  
20. discussed. It adds one new thing and that is a...a council.  
21. An advisory council to the RTA Board. It does not change the  
22. membership of the Board in any way and I would happy to answer  
23. any questions on this particular amendment. It calls for a  
24. twenty-six member board, a thirteen coming from the city of  
25. Chicago, eight from the suburbs and five from the collar  
26. counties. And, this board does serve without any pay.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator Partee.

29. SENATOR PARTEE:

30. Well, I just saw this amendment about ten minutes ago and  
31. it's a...well, I guess it's thirty pages or so. Twenty-two  
32. pages and there are alot of changes in it and alot of the  
33. changes are embractive of subject matters that we've already



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1. covered by the Conolly bills. Now, I know and recognize the  
2. pride of authorship in this area which some of our Members have  
3. but this, I think, is and would just really screw up the whole  
4. thing as to where we are on those changes that are...that are  
5. demanded and those that we've supported. I can't support this  
6. amendment because it does several things in access of what has  
7. been stated. There are about seven or eight changes and addresses  
8. itself to various of those changes and if you vote on this amend-  
9. ment...for this amendment now, you really don't know what you're  
10. voting on because I'm not...I'm sure that most of you have not  
11. seen it and there are several of the changes in there that  
12. relate to things that Senator Conolly had already debated, that  
13. we've already made settlements on and that is...have already  
14. had the abrogation of this Body. I think it would be very much  
15. a mistake to pass this.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator Conolly, did you wish recognition?

18. SENATOR CONOLLY:

19. Mr. President, I have not seen this amendment. It comes  
20. to a complete surprise to me and I certainly would not recommend  
21. to my colleagues on this side of the aisle to support this  
22. without a thorough study. This was not discussed in committee  
23. and therefore I would move that the amendment lie upon the  
24. Table.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Well, there are two other Members Senator Conolly who have  
27. sought recognition in addition to Senator Nimrod. Would you  
28. hold your motion?

29. SENATOR CONOLLY:

30. I'll hold my motion.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. All right. Senator Glass...Senator Glass.

33. SENATOR GLASS:

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1. Well thank you Mr. President. I would just like to say that  
2. insofar as Senator Nimrod's explanation, I would hope the  
3. Membership would support an advisory council to the RTA. I  
4. think this is not what many of us hope for in the way of repre-  
5. sentation of all the areas in the six county RTA area but it is  
6. certainly better than no voice and no representation at all.  
7. So, I would hope that Senator Nimrod would at least offer that  
8. portion of the amendment and I would think that there should not  
9. be serious opposition to it. And, I would ask Senator Nimrod  
10. if...if he would do that. If it'd be possible to hold the bill  
11. so at least that portion could be offered.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Is there...are there further...all right. Senator Nimrod  
14. then. Senator Regner, did you wish recognition. No. All right.  
15. Senator Nimrod.

16. SENATOR NIMROD:

17. Mr. President, Senator Partee and Senator Conolly, this is  
18. no different than what we've been asking before. I certainly  
19. would be happy to bring this bill back as we did with your bills  
20. from third reading after you've had the chance to go over this  
21. and if you have some reason that you want to amend, I'd be  
22. happy to do it. But, I think we all understand what the...what  
23. the time schedule is, allow this amendment to go on, read your  
24. copies and you want it back tomorrow, I'll be glad to call it  
25. back for any changes you want to make. Just let me review  
26. quickly what it does. It's exactly the same purchasing part  
27. that was on Senator Conolly's bill. And, it provides for the  
28. prompt bonding. It takes care of the parking which is what we've  
29. agreed to do. It has a 100% tax in it and calls for the twenty-  
30. six member council. It also provides, Senator Partee, for the  
31. Eminent Domain for which you were so strongly supporting. So,  
32. I think that I don't believe, Senator Partee, that you indicated  
33. that there had been a compromise or some basic agreements as to

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1. what would or would not go out because it seems that this  
2. 100% receives no support from your side of the aisle. I do  
3. think that this is a worthwhile cause. I think it's one  
4. chance for us to put on this advisory council and take a look  
5. at these amendments. Anybody would like them. I'd be happy  
6. to bring it back tomorrow but I do ask you for the saving of  
7. time to at least move this...accept this amendment and then  
8. I'll be happy to bring it back for you tomorrow. And, it's no  
9. more than what has been done for anyone else today.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Is there further discussion? Senator Conolly, do you...  
12. you have withdrawn your motion. All right. Senator Rock.

13. SENATOR ROCK:

14. Well, I will then put that motion. I would move that this  
15. amendment lie upon the Table.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator Rock has moved to Table Amendment No. 2 to SB 1452.  
18. The motion is not debatable. Those in favor of the motion  
19. signify by saying Aye. Those opposed no. The motion to Table  
20. ...the motion to Table fails. All right. There's been a  
21. request for a roll call. The question before the Senate is to  
22. Table Amendment No. 2 to SB 1452. Those in favor of the motion  
23. will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote No. The voting is open.  
24. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question  
25. the Yeas are thirty-three, the Nays are twenty-five and the  
26. motion to Table prevails. Are there further amendments from  
27. the Floor. Third reading. Senator Hynes. SB 1289. For what  
28. purpose does Senator McBroom arise?

29. SENATOR MCBROOM:

30. Mr. President and Members of the Senate, after discussion  
31. with some of the Members and considerable discussion with you  
32. Mr. President, the Appropriations Committee is going to meet  
33. tomorrow morning at 8 o'clock in Room M-3. And, Senator Hynes

1. if you'd like to walk across and thank Senator Mohr after a  
2. while that might be the better part of wisdom. It...well now,  
3. Senator Mohr I'm told there's a meeting in M-3 tomorrow morning  
4. at 8 o'clock. Well, at any rate, at any rate, Senator Hynes,  
5. we'll announce the room in just a second but the Appropriations  
6. Committee is cancelled for this evening. We'll meet at 8 o'clock  
7. tomorrow morning. Senator Mohr, what are...well, that's...why  
8. don't you go with Senator Hynes and we'll come back on the  
9. room announcement in just a minute Mr. President.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Hynes. SB 1289.

12. SENATOR HYNES:

13. Mr. President, SB 1289 which has been patiently waiting  
14. on the Calendar for its...its turn makes two changes in the  
15. Public Community College Act. First, it adds an additional  
16. condition under which a...an incentive grant for a new campus  
17. can be obtained. Under the prior law, it was necessary to the  
18. new campus increase the district by 20% in both population and  
19. area. This would add the alternative if there was a 20% increase  
20. in head count. The second change, is the amendment Senator  
21. Merritt offered just yesterday to take care of the local situa-  
22. tion in Paris and to permit the option of a district that is  
23. wholly surrounded by unincorporated territory to annex to one  
24. of two districts. And, I would ask for a favorable roll call.  
25. I know of no objection to the bill.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Senator Hynes, does this bill have merit?

28. SENATOR HYNES:

29. Substantial merit.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator Soper.

32. SENATOR SOPER:

33. Would the sponsor answer a question? Senator Hynes will

1. this qualify community colleges to put in a physical education  
2. flat like a gymnasium and so forth?

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Senator Hynes.

5. SENATOR HYNES:

6. No, it will not. It has nothing...nothing to do with  
7. physical education.

8. SENATOR SOPER:

9. Well, what extension are you talking about then?

10. SENATOR HYNES:

11. Well, there...there is an existing program in the state  
12. which...and it is presently budgeted to provide incentive  
13. grants to junior colleges that create new campuses which in-  
14. crease their area and population. This would provide a grant  
15. that specifically, in connection with the Skill Center in  
16. Chicago, which will increase the head count by over 20%. It  
17. will allow them to qualify for one of those grants. It involves  
18. \$100,000.

19. SENATOR SOPER:

20. Now, Senator, does that community college have a...have a  
21. physical education plan?

22. SENATOR HYNES:

23. Well...there...there are many...many of them do have  
24. physical education.

25. SENATOR SOPER:

26. Well, the reason I'm asking this is because of the fact  
27. that sometime ago all...all junior colleges that had a building  
28. program were allowed to receive the matching funds or the three  
29. ...75% of the funds and they included the...the physical educa-  
30. tion facilities in this grant. And, when we...when we applied  
31. for a grant, we had this...we had this, I can't hear myself  
32. talk around here. We had this concern and we were...we were  
33. told that we could receive this money and then...then all of a

1. sudden they cut the money off for a physical education plan.  
2. Now, if we expand our facilities, I'd like to...I'd like to  
3. know whether we could use that money for a physical education  
4. plan.

5. SENATOR HYNES:

6. Mr. President, I, frankly, I'm unable to directly respond  
7. to the question because I...I don't completely understand it.  
8. This...this has nothing to do with physical education at all.  
9. There is a program, an existing program in the state which will  
10. give a grant to a district that creates a new campus approved  
11. by the Junior College Board. And, it's...in a...in the form  
12. of an incentive.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Soper.

15. SENATOR SOPER:

16. We...we have received a grant. But, I'm just trying to  
17. find out with our expansion program if we can receive the money  
18. for the physical education fund. I think you've answered the  
19. question. This is a special project for something that you're  
20. interested in. It wouldn't do any good for us I suppose. So,  
21. I thank you very much.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Senator Merritt.

24. SENATOR MERRITT:

25. I would just...Mr. President and Members of the Senate, just  
26. briefly, rise in support of this bill As Amended. It certainly  
27. takes care of a very very serious situation in our district  
28. that have...that isn't resolved by July 1, they will not get  
29. assigned to that territory and I would urge the Members of my  
30. side of the aisle as well as the other to give this bill strong  
31. support.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Senator Shapiro.

1. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

2. Mr. President and ladies and gentlemen of the House, the  
3. present Junior College Act now provides that when a junior  
4. college district increases its square mile area 25% or the  
5. total population of the district, I think 20 or 25%, it is  
6. eligible for \$100,000 planning money to help create a new  
7. campus. Since our larger municipalities and specifically the  
8. city of Chicago is one entire junior college district now.  
9. It can never qualify for the \$100,000 planning money until...  
10. it will never increase 25% in population or 25% area. This  
11. rectifies that situation, allows the community college district  
12. of the city of Chicago to qualify for the \$100,000 planning  
13. money for their new proposed campus by amending the Act which  
14. now states if they have an increase of 20,000 in junior college  
15. head count. I urge approval of the bill.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Is there further discussion? The question is shall SB 1289  
18. As Amended pass. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed  
19. will vote no. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish?  
20. Take the record. On that question the Yeas are fifty-one, the  
21. Nays are four, two Voting Present. SB 1289 having received a  
22. constitutional majority is declared passed. SB 1459. Senator  
23. Rock.

24. SENATOR ROCK:

25. Thank you Mr. President and ladies and gentlemen of the  
26. Senate. This was the bill, you will recall, that was in front  
27. of the Senate Executive Committee. What it does it makes a  
28. major change by adding from the three items to the categories  
29. exempt from the requirements that title to improvements be in  
30. the state. Any project undertaken in compliance with the Capital  
31. Development Board Act. There was a prohibition many many years  
32. ago on a statute called an act to punish fraud and extravagance  
33. and expenditure of monies appropriated for public improvements.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Senator Rock, I'm sorry. We've been trying to do some  
3. work here and I believe we did not read Senator Hynes bill a  
4. third time into the record. So, I...I just want to give...  
5. change the reading on the board. I think in...

6. SECRETARY:

7. SB 1289.

8. (Secretary reads title of bill)

9. 3rd reading of the bill.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Hynes. Is there further discussion? The question  
12. is shall SB 1289 pass. For what purpose does Senator Glass  
13. arise?

14. SENATOR GLASS:

15. Well, Mr. President, this is the same bill we just voted  
16. on, is that right?

17. PRESIDENT:

18. That's correct and it was not read a third time and I want  
19. to make sure that the record is clear. The bill has now been  
20. read a third time and we will take a roll call on the bill  
21. following the fact that the bill has been read a third time.

22. SENATOR GLASS:

23. I...I had hoped to offer an amendment to this bill on  
24. junior college...it may be too late to do that. The...apparently  
25. the House is...is holding up the other junior college bill that  
26. was passed over here and I...it maybe too late to do that, if  
27. that's the case. I'd like to...I'd like to ask leave of the  
28. sponsor however to have that opportunity.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Senator Hynes.

31. SENATOR HYNES:

32. Well, Senator, I don't know...I don't know what your  
33. amendment is unless... unless it's the...the bill that we passed



1. very early in the session but it may well be that if that  
2. amendment is added they might hold up this bill as well. But,  
3. I would be happy to discuss it with you however with one week  
4. left in the session, it seems to me, if this bill does not get  
5. over to the House immediately there's no chance of it getting  
6. out. And, we can talk about possibly putting an amendment on  
7. over there.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Senator Glass.

10. SENATOR GLASS:

11. Well, on that we can talk about putting an amendment on  
12. over there then I'll accede your wishes. But, I'm informed  
13. that the House has been holding up a bill that we did pass  
14. earlier, SB 1399 for quite a while now and I...I'd just like  
15. to be able to have that opportunity.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator Hynes. The question is...the question is shall  
18. SB 1289 pass. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed  
19. vote No. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take  
20. the record. On that question the Yeas are forty-nine, the  
21. Nays are four, two Voting Present. And, SB 1289 having received  
22. a constitutional majority is declared passed. Senator Rock.  
23. SB 1459.

24. SECRETARY:

25. SB 1459.

26. (Secretary reads title of bill)

27. 3rd reading of the bill.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Senator Rock.

30. SENATOR ROCK:

31. Thank you Mr. President. This bill, the purpose of it is  
32. to exempt the Capital Bond Development Board from the purview  
33. of the Act which punishes this Act which punishes officers for

1. failing to obtain title to property upon which public improve-  
2. ments are to be made. This amendment will exempt the Capital  
3. Bond Board from the Act only in cases where they're making public  
4. improvements on behalf of units of local government, school  
5. districts. The amendment that was offered by the Attorney  
6. General was accepted by us. I think at this point it is an  
7. agreed bill and I would urge a favorable roll call.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Senator Sours.

10. SENATOR SOURS:

11. I just have one question Mr. President and Senators. Who  
12. wants the bill Senator?

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Rock.

15. SENATOR ROCK:

16. The bill was proposed Senator from the Capital Development  
17. Board itself. They are currently, as you well know, engaged  
18. in improvements to public property or...or school district  
19. property to which the state itself does not yet have title.  
20. Under the technical terms of this Act they are in violation  
21. of this particular statute. This amendment would exempt them.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Senator Sours.

24. SENATOR SOURS:

25. Is there any definition of the...of the word extravagance  
26. in here. I have the bill in front of me.

27. SENATOR ROCK:

28. Senator...Senator we talked...there is not sir. We talked  
29. about this in Appropriations. This particular statute was  
30. approved in 1877 and I would guess at this point pursuant to  
31. case law, although I have not looked, that the word extravagance  
32. is kind of a word of art and is one left for the construction  
33. of the court.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Senator Sours.

3. SENATOR SOURS:

4. Except on Page 2, line 2 it says this section shall not  
5. apply to any otherwise lawful expenditures for A and then here's  
6. B for any project undertaken in compliance with the Capital  
7. Development Board Act. Why is that? Why shouldn't the statute  
8. apply? Why shouldn't it be just as honorable and just as  
9. economical now as a hundred years ago?

10. PRESIDENT:

11. For what purpose...yes. Senator Knuepfer's request for  
12. order is most appropriate. Now, will the Members please be in  
13. their seats. Will the members of the staff who are engaged in  
14. social conversation take themselves off the Floor. If they  
15. want to be here for support that's fine. If they're socializing  
16. please leave the Floor. Will the Senators please be in their  
17. seats. Senator Sours.

18. SENATOR SOURS:

19. Senator Rock, another question. Now, is there an amendment  
20. to this that we do not have in our books? I have the Act in  
21. front of me, the proposed Act and it says that this section on  
22. Page 2 shall not apply to B - any project undertaken in com-  
23. pliance with the Capital Development Board Act. Well, why  
24. shouldn't it be under this too? If we're going to honest and  
25. if we're going to be frugal a hundred years ago where has that  
26. change in the...in the hundred years since then? And, do we  
27. have a copy of the amendment?

28. SENATOR ROCK:

29. Yes, in answer to both your questions. Yes, the amendment  
30. was put on, I think, three or four days ago at that time I  
31. passed a copy to every Member on his desk. The amendment was  
32. offered by...to me by the Office of the Attorney General. Now,  
33. all it does is add one sentence. It says any project undertaken

1. in compliance with the Capital Board Act and these are the  
2. words that the Attorney General felt we should have, for the  
3. use of a Body corporate in politic unit of local government  
4. or school district. Now, the fact is Senator as was brought  
5. out in the committee and you were there and I think asked some  
6. of these same questions. That the Bond Board at this date and  
7. time makes public improvements on behalf of units of local  
8. government. In those instances, they do not have, in fact,  
9. title to the property. They are in full compliance with the  
10. ...the strictures, the circumscriptions of the Capital Develop-  
11. ment Board Act. But, technically they do not have title to the  
12. property. Title to the property is in the local school board.  
13. And, they are therefore in technical violation of this Act to  
14. prevent extravagance. The Board is doing this right now. They  
15. wish not to be in violation of this 1877 statute.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator Sours.

18. SENATOR SOURS:

19. Well, then I ask what's wrong with the 1877 statute because  
20. this exempts from the operation of that Act any project, any  
21. project undertaken in compliance with the Capital Development  
22. Board Act. Now, that's one...that's Section B. And...and  
23. why shouldn't this Act apply to...is there anything sacrosanct  
24. to about the Capital Development Board? I don't know why we  
25. should even pass this bill. If we're going to exempt from the  
26. purview of what started out probably as a...as a bill to encourage  
27. honesty and lack of improvidence, we'll call it extravagance.  
28. Why should we exempt them now? It's our money or rather it'll  
29. be the debt of our decedents, our children and grandchildren  
30. if they ever do pay it in script or otherwise.

31. SENATOR ROCK:

32. Well Senator, I can understand your concern as I did in  
33. the committee and I explained then and I hope I'm...or at least

1. I'm attempting to explain now. That we have in fact passed  
2. the Capital Development Board Act. We have, in fact, established  
3. the Capital Development Board and we have given them the  
4. authority. Part of the authority we have been giving them is  
5. the authority to expend public money in conjunction with or in  
6. favor of local school districts and units of local government  
7. and they expend that money on property that the state does not  
8. have title to. The local school districts have title to it.  
9. Now, they feel, and I think rightfully so, that when they do this  
10. on behalf of a local school district they are in contravention  
11. of this 1877 statute. They do not want...wish to be in contra-  
12. vention of this statute hence they have asked for an exemption.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Sours.

15. SENATOR SOURS:

16. The predecessor of the Capital Development Board was just  
17. as improvident as the Capital Development Board. Now, it seems  
18. to me, you see we...the Legislature loses control once the  
19. Capital Board gets moving into these things and pretty soon  
20. we'll have no control over this and especially if we get into  
21. a diarrhea of spending on public schools and when it says that this  
22. act shall not apply to any project undertaken in compliance  
23. with the Capital Development Act. I don't think this is a  
24. good bill. I don't want to sound too much like Senator Horsley  
25. either but I'm worried about my children and my grandchildren  
26. paying the bill.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator Rock.

29. SENATOR ROCK:

30. I just...very briefly attempt to answer that Senator. I  
31. can understand your concern but the amendment that the Attorney  
32. General's Office wanted was put on and what that says is not  
33. any project of the Capital Bond Board but any project of that

1. Board that is limited to the use of a Body corporate or politic  
2. unit of local government or school district. There is a  
3. specific problem. We passed a school bond construction bill  
4. that Senator Fawell had. We have a hundred million dollars  
5. worth of projects going on and in fact the state does not have  
6. title to that property. Now, in order for the state to spend  
7. money on that according to this 1877 Act, they should have title  
8. to it. The fact is the local school district has title to the  
9. property. So, by spending that money, they're in contravention  
10. of this statute. We have mandated that they spend the money  
11. and now they want an exemption from the statute and I think it's  
12. a reasonable one.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

14. Senator Sours.

15. SENATOR SOURS:

16. I sure don't want to be a spoiler Mr. President and  
17. Senators but this bill looks to me as if it might have a  
18. chronic case of leprosy.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

20. Senator Fawell.

21. SENATOR FAWELL:

22. Well, the very good point I think that Senator Rock does  
23. make is if this Act were enforced then all of your local  
24. school districts and your junior college districts would all  
25. have to convey title to any of their real estate upon which  
26. CDB approved construction was involved over to the Capital  
27. Development Board. Let me tell you this that the Capital  
28. Development Board has already alienated enough districts by  
29. demanding a complete authority in regard to how to bill, when  
30. to bill and many other matters and if the local districts felt  
31. they had to give titles to their...their local school buildings  
32. and junior college buildings over to the CDB, I think we would  
33. have a real problem back in our home districts. I...I can

1. understand that back in 1877 we'd had no comprehension that  
2. the state through bonding authority would be constructing  
3. facilities for the local school districts and junior college  
4. districts. So, in that regard I can certainly see that this  
5. is...this is absolutely necessary for our...for at least that  
6. type of construction. I can see one point that Senator Sours  
7. makes when CDB is constructing facilities for the state, then  
8. I would think that...and also in regard to leasing construction  
9. of buildings on leased premises. I can see some credence in  
10. what Senator Sours has said that in those areas I'm not sure  
11. why we would not want to continue to require that the CDB  
12. obtain title if it's a state building and the state would  
13. normally have title. But, I certainly would not want to see  
14. the local school districts and the junior college districts  
15. having to cough up and give title to all their buildings back  
16. to the state. This would be pure revolution back in our home  
17. districts, I'm sure.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Rock.

20. SENATOR ROCK:

21. Yes, thank you Mr. President. In answer to corroborate  
22. what Senator Fawell said. He is perfectly correct with regards  
23. specifically to the schools. There are some thirty-five projects  
24. now under way. There are another twenty on the drawing boards.  
25. The Board tells me that next year there'll be another fifty-five  
26. or so schools. The state does not, in fact, have title to this  
27. property. And, frankly the Board doesn't want title to it.  
28. But, what they want is an exemption from this so they're not  
29. violating an old state law. And, the point about the leased  
30. property Senator Fawell to the Board has explained and did ex-  
31. plain in committee that it would be cheaper in the long run for  
32. them to spend the money and make improvements on leased property  
33. than it would be to have the landlord do it and attempt to

1. amortize that over the life of the rental because as you know  
2. the life of the rental is but two years. That's all we can  
3. have a lease for and to make any kind of major improvement and  
4. attempt to amortize it over two years, the rent goes crazy.  
5. They feel and, I think rightfully so, that they should...should  
6. be in a position to spend their own money for remodeling and  
7. rehabilitation of leased premises and thereby effect a savings  
8. to the state.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Senator Knuepfer. All right. The question...is there  
11. further discussion? The question is shall SB 1459 pass. Those  
12. in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote no. The voting  
13. is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. Senator  
14. Rock moves to postpone consideration of SB 1459. Senator Netsch.  
15. SB 1500. Do you wish to call that? Well, we're on third  
16. reading. Let's...we'll...we'll get to your other bill. For  
17. what purpose does Senator Partee arise?

18. SENATOR PARTEE:

19. I just thought that if you're looking for something to do  
20. I have a motion. Or you want to wait...

21. PRESIDENT:

22. We are on the order of 3rd reading. There are several  
23. bills. We'll...let's complete this.

24. SENATOR PARTEE:

25. All right. Fine. Very good.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. SB 1500. Do you wish it called Senator Netsch?

28. SENATOR NETSCH:

29. Ok. Roll it.

30. SECRETARY:

31. SB 1500.

32. (Secretary reads title of bill)

33. 3rd reading of the bill.



1. PRESIDENT:

2. Senator Netsch.

3. SENATOR NETSCH:

4. We had considerable discussion on the bill yesterday. I  
5. distributed copies. I hope those copies answered the questions.  
6. The bill is not the same as the original one and it was agreed  
7. upon by everyone involved in the process.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Is there further discussion? Senator Ozinga.

10. SENATOR OZINGA:

11. Sorry to belabor you just a little bit farther but this  
12. is about the lousiest bill that has come before the Senate.  
13. This is the same thing as nothing more than an alibi for these  
14. foreign doctors to delay being a doctor without having to take  
15. a test or an examination to practice medicine in our state in-  
16. stitutions. There's no reason under the sun why these guys  
17. can't take this examination and take it on time. These people  
18. were warned and cautioned and pleaded with 1970, 71, 72, and  
19. finally given an extra two years so that it came up to...the  
20. July 1st of '74 to take their examinations. Many of them took  
21. them and failed miserably. Now, this is the last stand to  
22. extend it again for another two years because they cannot pass  
23. it. They have failed it again. I would implore everybody just  
24. to vote no on this bill. It's nothing more than a reason to  
25. extend. Now, if they start talking about losing a couple of  
26. hundred doctors, the institutions have been cut down by over  
27. ten thousand in the last couple of years. These people, if  
28. they're not good qualified doctors then they shouldn't even be  
29. in our institutions. If we can't have good doctors that can  
30. pass examination, then let's not have any at all.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Senator Knuepfer.

33. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

1. Senator Ozinga that isn't quite the way this thing lines  
2. up. Let...let me explain the situation if I can and if I can  
3. get some attention here. Many of these foreign doctors are  
4. lacking in one specific element and these...that is the basic  
5. sciences are not generally taught in the foreign medical schools.  
6. The years of chemistry, physics and other sciences that an  
7. American doctor has to take and has to take an examination on  
8. are not generally taught in our...in the foreign medical schools.  
9. I would submit to you that very few American doctors could pass  
10. this exam five years after they got out of medical school. What  
11. we are faced with is a exodus from this state of the some two  
12. hundred doctors that we have under this limited license. Now,  
13. let me tell you just what this bill does. It mandates them to  
14. take an exam. It would however be a special exam. They would  
15. not be allowed to practice in any...as a general practitioner  
16. except in a special institution. The Department of Registration  
17. and Education would develop special examinations in their own  
18. fields of expertise. And, that is all they could practice in  
19. and it would only be in state institutions. I submit to you  
20. that this would qualify them and in fact this...if they do not  
21. take the exam by July 1, '75 and pass it, they are out of  
22. business. We need these doctors. They are performing satis-  
23. factorily. They have not had the basic sciences as I suggested  
24. and that's why they can't pass the exam. I think it's absolutely  
25. imperative that this Body give consideration to these doctors.  
26. If the Amer...Illinois State Medical Society or anybody else  
27. can provide doctors that are hundred...100% licensable under  
28. other Illinois standards, I'm certain Director Levitt would be  
29. happy to have them. In view of that, these gentlemen have been  
30. practicing in the field, they are qualified. There will be an  
31. exam to...to make certain that they are qualified and I would  
32. urge your support.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Wooten.

2. SENATOR WOOTEN:

3. Mr. President and colleagues, just briefly, the Illinois  
4. State Medical Society has not taken a position on this bill  
5. because it recognizes that no definitive position can be taken  
6. at this point. I did take the trouble to check with a member  
7. of the ISMS Board of Governor's in our area and he said without  
8. hesitation support the bill. It is absolutely needed. If for  
9. nothing else, it's a stop gap measure and all of us must  
10. address ourselves to a permanent solution of the problem. So,  
11. I urge support of this measure.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Senator Soper.

14. SENATOR SOPER:

15. Mr. President, Members of the Senate, Senator Knuepfer  
16. with a solid K, you would...you wouldn't hesitate to go one  
17. of the hospitals and submit yourself to their examinations or  
18. under the...under this proposition.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Senator Knuepfer.

21. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

22. Well, Senator, I think I would have the decision as to  
23. whether to have a doctor that had foreign medical training or  
24. no doctor at all. And, under those conditions, I wouldn't  
25. hesitate one bit.

26. SENATOR SOPER:

27. Well, I...I'm not...I'm not against this thing. I...I  
28. think it's necessary that we should have some people in there  
29. and we should have some direction from someone who knows some-  
30. thing about it. And, if...if the Director who's handling the  
31. doctors in these hospitals, if he thinks that this thing's all  
32. right and this is the only way we can do, I think we're at an  
33. impasse unless we do it. And, I respect your opinion. I...I

1. don't agree with Senator Netsch very often and I don't think  
2. I've agreed with Senator Wooten too many times but I would  
3. say this that I'm going to support this if you say it's all  
4. right and I...if you go to the hospital, I'll...I'll go along  
5. with you. I'll bring my own doctor though.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Senator Mitchler.

8. SENATOR MITCHLER:

9. I discussed this with the Illinois State Medical Society  
10. and as Senator Wooten said they have no position on this.  
11. However, I would say if I talked to the physicians in my district,  
12. I believe they would have opposition to this. And, I believe  
13. that, Senator Knuepfer, you explained the bill very well. The  
14. fact is that we have, and I don't hold against them that they're  
15. foreign born or where they got their training, but they are un-  
16. qualified as physicians to practice medicine in all its branches.  
17. And, they're using these people to practice in our state  
18. hospitals. And, it's like alot of other things. They...these  
19. ...these same people could not practice in a general hospital  
20. or a...another type of hospital. But, for some reason or another  
21. the State of Illinois is willing to accept them in state hos-  
22. pitals where the people there are getting second class treat-  
23. ment. Second class treatment because they don't have physicians  
24. qualified to practice medicine in all of its branches. Now,  
25. how can the State of Illinois go out and set standards for regular  
26. hospitals and go through all of this if they don't talk and  
27. practice what they preach. Now, this will go on and on and on.  
28. Now, it all started with the emergency care hospital facilities.  
29. It started down in East St. Louis and it was Senator Simon who  
30. asked for the foreign born to be practicing in the emergency  
31. room only. Because most of the doctors live down in Belleville  
32. and they were out of reach when they had an emergency. And, they  
33. could hire these foreign born doctors and have them stay in the

1. hospital and be available. And, we went into that, now you've  
2. got them into the hospitals and you'll find that they found a  
3. place, they've found a home in Illinois where they can practice.  
4. Now, when you call a doctor a doctor he's got to be a doctor  
5. to practice medicine in all of its branches and be qualified.  
6. Now, that's what we're giving and if you're prolong this you're  
7. going. As soon as you cut their water off and send them and  
8. make them take the proper examination then you'd be better off.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Senator Davidson.

11. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

12. I had not planned to speak on this bill but Senator Mitchler  
13. is slightly in error about a few things about what doctors are  
14. and physicians are in the State of Illinois. The fact that  
15. people are not licensed to practice medicine in all its branches  
16. did not make you a second class doctor because I happen to hold  
17. one of those license. The Medical Practice Act is divided in  
18. two divisions on how to practice to treat human ailments in  
19. this state. One is to practice licensed medicine in all its  
20. branches. The other to treat human ailments without the use  
21. of medicine, drugs or operative surgery which applies to osteo-  
22. paths and people such as myself. Now, any person has the right  
23. to be called a doctor is he's earned the title of any degree of  
24. doctor by supreme court ruling as well as the definition out of  
25. Webster's Dictionary. It doesn't just apply to a doctor of  
26. medicine. For that part in the record that he understands that  
27. other people have a right for the title of doctor or physician.  
28. We clear that record. I advise all of you to vote for this or  
29. you're going to have a mental health institution who has no one  
30. there to treat the person. Now, Senator Knuepfer had just got  
31. down a few years...a few years earlier, there isn't any person  
32. probably practicing today after two years out of college could  
33. pass the basic science exam because most of us take t the end of

1. our sophomore year when the basic science subjects are given  
2. either in college of medicine or college of chiropractcosmopathy.  
3. This is good legislation. They have till '75 to qualify. If  
4. they don't, they're out. This gives us a way of giving the  
5. people in an institution some care with some people who have  
6. training to know what it's all about rather than none.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Senator Bell.

9. SENATOR BELL:

10. Well, ...

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Just a minute Senator Bell. Now, we've still got alot of  
13. work to do. You're getting noisy. No, but we will get our  
14. work done if we pay attention and give the Members the oppor-  
15. tunity to be heard who want to be heard. Senator Bell. Senator  
16. Bell.

17. SENATOR BELL:

18. Mr. President, I...I recognize the fact certainly that the  
19. Members of the Senate want to get on but I am a member of the  
20. Public Health Committee. I have had the privilege of sitting  
21. and hearing the testimony as to the need of this bill. And,  
22. I believe I'm right when I say that the vote out of committee  
23. was unanimous after hearing of the problem and the rationale as  
24. to the decision of the committee was...was in my mind the only  
25. way that it could go. And, I'd like to assure Senator Mitchler  
26. that the committee was entirely cognizant of the point that he  
27. was making. The Illinois Medical Society did have a representa-  
28. tive there and that this is kind of a stop gap situation and I  
29. don't think he really needs to have any fears.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator Weaver.

32. SENATOR WEAVER:

33. Mr. President, I...I want just one question of Senator

1. Netsch. I know that Dr. Davidson, Senator Davidson, can sign  
2. death certificates. I just wondered whether these doctors we're  
3. eluding to in this bill can sign death certificates.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Senator Netsch.

6. SENATOR NETSCH:

7. To the best of my knowledge, yes. But, I am...I'm not  
8. positive of that Senator Weaver.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Is there further discussion? The question is shall SB 1500  
11. pass. On that question those in favor will vote Aye. Those  
12. opposed will vote No. The voting is open. Have all voted who  
13. wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that  
14. question the Yeas are forty-nine, the Nays are four, two Voting  
15. Present. SB 1500 having received a constitutional majority is  
16. declared passed. Senator Nimrod. On...Senator Rock. 1644.  
17. SB 1644 on third reading.

18. SECRETARY:

19. SB 1644.

20. (Secretary reads title of bill)

21. 3rd reading of the bill.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Senator Rock.

24. SENATOR ROCK:

25. Thank you Mr. President, ladies and gentlemen of the Senate.  
26. This is an amendment to the Public Utilities Act and it authorizes  
27. the Illinois Commerce Commission to allow as operating expenses  
28. for rate making purposes. Donations made by Public Utilities  
29. for certain specified purposes and I would like to read those  
30. purposes. Donations made by a public utility for the public  
31. welfare or for charitable, scientific, religious or educational  
32. purposes provided that such donations are reasonable in amount.  
33. Some time ago the Illinois Supreme Court had ruled that these

1. kinds of donations were not to be taken into account as ordinary  
2. business expenses for the purpose of rate making. There was  
3. a great hue and cry all four major metropolitan newspapers in  
4. my city or the city I represent, came out in favor of allowing  
5. public utilities to continue contributing to charities. There  
6. are such funds as the United Fund, the Crusade of Mercy that  
7. would be virtually out of business without the donations made  
8. by public utilities. A similar bill, a little broader in scope,  
9. has passed the House and is now over here. We have been asked  
10. by the House to try to get this one over there and I would move  
11. for a favorable roll call.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Senator Course.

14. SENATOR COURSE:

15. Will the sponsor yield to a question please?

16. PRESIDENT:

17. He indicates that he will yield.

18. SENATOR COURSE:

19. Senator Rock, what percentage of their income are they  
20. allowed to deduct as charitable contributions?

21. SENATOR ROCK:

22. Well, I...frankly Senator Course, I do not know. It says  
23. here that provided that such donations are reasonable in amount.  
24. Now, I would assume that the Commerce Commission in its rate  
25. making process has that authority to determine what is or is  
26. not reasonable.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator Course.

29. SENATOR COURSE:

30. Well, would it be reasonable to say that it's about 15% that  
31. IRS allows?

32. SENATOR ROCK:

33. Well, I...I...that...that is as reasonable as I...I think



1. so. Yes. And, let me just quote from the Chicago Tribune  
2. editorial on October 10, 1973. It says corporations contribute  
3. about one billion dollars a year or five percent of the estimate  
4. ...estimated total private giving for this corporate charitable  
5. contribution.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Senator Course.

8. SENATOR COURSE:

9. Well, I'm going to oppose this bill. I...I don't think  
10. this is a good bill because eventually the people are going to  
11. wind up paying for these contributions that the...the utilities  
12. are getting credit for.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Howard Mohr.

15. SENATOR MOHR:

16. Well, I would just suggest to Senator Rock if he's trying  
17. to sway votes on this side of the aisle quoting the Chicago  
18. Tribune. I don't think you should do that Senator.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Senator Wooten. Senator Rock.

21. SENATOR ROCK:

22. I...I don't mean to forclose. I just again came across  
23. this. A recent survey again, I'll quote from the Sun Times  
24. this time, ok. Found that corporations give about 1% of net  
25. income before taxes and to directly respond to Senator Course.  
26. Opponents of the contributions argue that customers should not  
27. be forced to contribute to charities selected by the utilities.  
28. In the case of Edison, this amounts to about one penny per month  
29. for a residential customer. A case of the telephone company it  
30. is about two pennies per month.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Senator Wooten.

33. SENATOR WOOTEN:

1. Would the sponsor yield for a question?  
2. PRESIDENT:  
3. He indicates that he will yield. Proceed.  
4. SENATOR WOOTEN:  
5. Senator Rock, I'm troubled by the word educational. Would  
6. that include paid advertisements to educate the public as to  
7. how valuable it is to have the utility free of government  
8. regulation and so on?  
9. SENATOR ROCK:  
10. No sir.  
11. SENATOR WOOTEN:  
12. To what would it apply then?  
13. SENATOR ROCK:  
14. It would apply to colleges and universities.  
15. SENATOR WOOTEN:  
16. And is the...is that provision exempted then? It could  
17. not be so construed under the language of this bill?  
18. SENATOR ROCK:  
19. That is my understanding. Yes sir.  
20. PRESIDENT:  
21. Senator McCarthy.  
22. SENATOR McCARTHY:  
23. Well, yes Mr. President. I haven't had explained to me  
24. where this is an appropriation bill, where it relates to state  
25. revenue and...I think that...  
26. PRESIDENT:  
27. Just a minute Senator McCarthy. Now, there is just too  
28. much noise. Senator McCarthy is the only Senator that should  
29. be audibly speaking to the Senate. Senator McCarthy.  
30. SENATOR McCARTHY:  
31. Thank you Mr. President. As I indicated, I see nothing in  
32. this bill that qualifies it for the general rule governing the  
33. scope of the conduct of our session. That is that it's an

1. appropriation bill or one that is related to revenue. It strikes  
2. me that this is one good reason why this bill should not pass  
3. at the present time. If it's a worthwhile bill and there seems  
4. to be some debate on that, it would be just as well that it be  
5. passed in next year when the Senate reconvenes. I think, perhaps,  
6. aside from that that it does fall without a scope of the  
7. rules, it does meet some objections that have heretofore been  
8. surfaced and comes at a wrong time. It was only yesterday that  
9. the Illinois Commerce Commission granted rate increases to the  
10. Illinois Power Company and also to another company whose name  
11. has escaped me. And, certainly when they...now after the tax...  
12. after the home owner, the ultimate consumer of electrical and  
13. utility services are...yesterday raised in their rates that they  
14. must pay to come along and give and formalize additional ex-  
15. penditures as enumerated here seems to me to be the unwise  
16. action. I am personally going to vote No and would urge others  
17. to do so.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Netsch.

20. SENATOR NETSCH:

21. Mr. President, I would rise in opposition that...to the  
22. bill and rather than belabor the point make one fairly simple  
23. brief point. The objection is not to the utilities being per-  
24. mitted to make these kinds of contributions. That is permitted  
25. and it would continue to be permitted. The only question really  
26. is whether that is going to be taken into account in their rate  
27. base. And, it seems to me that the consumers of this state  
28. should not be asked to make those payments over which they have  
29. no control and into which they have no voice. The contributions  
30. can continue but they should be taken out of the profits of the  
31. utilities because they are made solely by their judgement. I  
32. think it is not right to charge it to the rate base and ultimately  
33. to all of us. And, I think the bill should be defeated.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Senator Partee.

3. SENATOR PARTEE:

4. Well Mr. President, I would just point out that sometimes  
5. we come so personally influent we forget about the sufferings  
6. of people who are not so influent. I have some copies in my  
7. hand from all four of the Chicago newspapers, the dailies. I'm  
8. just going to read a word or two from some of them. The Chicago  
9. today says practically speaking, we do not think anyone would  
10. choose to destroy an immensely important civic activity for the  
11. sake of a legal argument. The question of the greatest good  
12. for the greatest number arises here. Then, there's from the  
13. Chicago Sun Times, they point out that a recent survey by the  
14. Conference Board, a business research group, found that corpora-  
15. tions give about 1% of net income before taxes. They argued  
16. that business interests cannot exist independent of their surround-  
17. ings. Without corporate help, many welfare agencies would die  
18. and urban conditions would worsen. The Crusade of Mercy whose  
19. campaign begins today has been called the lubrication that keeps  
20. cities from running too hot. And, there's the one from the  
21. paper that Senator Mohr was disenchanted with a moment. We'll  
22. just pass it but it's for it. And, then the Chicago Daily News,  
23. in...on October the 6th and 7th said such gifts are regarded by  
24. virtually all companies as a normal indeed inescapable function  
25. of decent corporate citizenship and treated as a cost of doing  
26. business. They are in no sense a whim or a mere jesture by  
27. management. The charity job must be done and in the broad  
28. scheme of things it falls upon all segments of the business  
29. community to help do it. And, it thinks we should not turn a  
30. blind eye to the facts of contemporary civic light. Now, I had  
31. some other clippings here from the Towanda Republican from the  
32. Lincoln Times from the Eisenhower Register but I won't bother to  
33. read all of those to you but I would just say to you that it's strange

1. that we are here asking for recognition for corporations because  
2. they are doing a job. Now, normally you'd think of us as not  
3. being interested in corporations but...let me suggest to you.  
4. There are alot of corporations doing business that don't do any-  
5. thing like their responsibility to their communities. And, when  
6. you have corporations who have that kind of judgement and fore-  
7. sight to put the lubrication in the oil to keep...keep things  
8. from simmering and to keep things from getting too hot. I  
9. think we have to be supportive of that concept. And, I certainly  
10. would urge support...support of this bill.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Senator Fawell.

13. SENATOR FAWELL:

14. I have not had a great deal of knowledge on this bill until  
15. just several days ago. And, I have a fact sheet before me. Let  
16. me read these two paragraphs. SB 1644 would overturn in Octo-  
17. ber 1st, 1973, Illinois Supreme Court decision, prohibiting  
18. public utility companies from using their operating expenses  
19. rather than their profits to pay for lobbying, club and asso-  
20. ciation expenses for staff and charitable contributions. Only  
21. two states still allow public utilities to pass on the costs of  
22. clubs and association dues and no other state allows lobbying  
23. costs to be passed onto the consumer. We have no argument with  
24. the public utilities desire to be a good corporate citizen by  
25. making charitable contributions. We disagree with the practice  
26. of forcing the consumer to pay dollar for dollar for these con-  
27. tributions rather than taking them out of profits as corporations  
28. must do. For three years we have fought Illinois Bell Tele-  
29. phone's attempts to include these lobbying, club and charitable  
30. costs in their requests for rate increases. The Illinois  
31. Supreme Court ruled in our favor and we ask you not to overturn  
32. that supreme court decision. We ask you to oppose these bills.  
33. I gather from what I've been told, lobbying is no longer included.

1. Is that correct?

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Senator Rock.

4. SENATOR ROCK:

5. Just on a point really of personal privilege, the bills  
6. remains as it was introduced. It appertains only...only to  
7. charitable contributions. It talks not at all about lobbying  
8. expenses or social club dues.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Senator Sours.

11. SENATOR SOURS:

12. Mr. President and Senators, for the edification of the  
13. lawyers and the non-lawyers, about a hundred years ago a United  
14. States Supreme Court decision Munn' against Illinois decided  
15. that there would be certain businesses affected by the public  
16. interest. And, after that in the next ten years, there were  
17. granted to certain corporations monopolies. They call them  
18. utilities today. Now, I'm harkening back to the year of 1945  
19. or '44 when all the members of my family were in military and  
20. naval service and my mother died and I had to hire a lawyer to  
21. conclude her estate and the...she owed \$4.25. That was the  
22. extent of her debt to society when she passed away. That was  
23. a telephone bill. That was 1944. That's thirty years ago and  
24. our telephone bills are now only slightly more than double.  
25. Whereas the craftsman, whoever he is, whatever craft he has,  
26. is now enjoying probably eight times what he enjoyed then.  
27. Whereas the professional person has only one concern and that  
28. is whether the Internal Revenue Service will impoverish him  
29. on April 15th every year. Now, when I look at the miniscule  
30. objection of the learned Senator from Decatur, Senator we're  
31. talking about pennies and nickels while we're squandering  
32. dollars and when I see those ten dollar gold pieces on those  
33. crocodile tears talking about principle. I'm just an object

1. of sheer wonderment and I wonder at Senator Partee who has a  
2. corporation bill for a change. Perhaps his first entrance into  
3. corporate sponsorship of legislation. These are delightful  
4. years believe me. Now, this...there's nothing wrong with this  
5. bill. Some years ago I filed a bill to permit utilities  
6. meaning electric companies, gas companies, telephones to con-  
7. tribute to private colleges. I was dissuaded because I heard  
8. the old argument well that is involuntarily compelling a user  
9. to involuntarily contribute to a college not of his choice.  
10. Now, we're talking about nothing here and I'm...and I...I mean  
11. that. We're talking about this...if...if it ever were the case  
12. is the de minimis rule where the courts aren't interested in  
13. trifles. We're talking about nothing, next to nothing. Now,  
14. you say to me well, look you've been talking about principle  
15. here for fourteen years and I have. But, I have seen principles  
16. so twisted and contorted and distorted and changed that I have  
17. no reluctance at all to suggest that this is a good bill and  
18. that Bell Telephone Company which now only charges slightly more  
19. than twice what it charged thirty years ago. When everything  
20. else is rampant. I say to you this is not bad legislation. I  
21. just...I like to watch the sweet sixteen on the television. The  
22. Illinois Bell Telephone Company puts that on too. What's wrong  
23. with that. That probably costs every viewer as much as one  
24. tenth of one penny. While he's sitting next to his six pack,  
25. that cost him two dollars. Thank you very much.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Senator Glass.

28. SENATOR GLASS:

29. Just a couple of questions for Senator Rock. Senator Rock  
30. these contributions would still be deductible for federal income  
31. tax purposes wouldn't they?

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Senator Rock.

1. Yes, thank you Mr. President. I move for the adoption  
2. of Amendment No. 5.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Is there discussion? All in favor of the adoption of  
5. Amendment No. 5 signify by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion  
6. carries. Amendment No. 5 is adopted. Senator Vadalabene.

7. SENATOR VADALABENE:

8. Thank you Mr. President. I move for adoption Number 6.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Is there discussion? The question is on the adoption of  
11. Amendment No. 6. All in favor signify by saying Aye. Contrary  
12. no. The motion carries. Amendment No. 6 is adopted. Senator  
13. Vadalabene.

14. SENATOR VADALABENE:

15. Thank you Mr. President. I move for the adoption of  
16. Amendment No. 7.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Senator Vadalabene moves the adoption of Amendment No. 7.  
19. Is there discussion? The question is on the adoption of 7 all  
20. in favor signify by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries.  
21. Amendment No. 7 is adopted. Are there amendments from the Floor?  
22. Senator Vadalabene.

23. SENATOR VADALABENE:

24. Yes, as a matter of observation Mr. President, I might, I  
25. may...I would like to inform you that in the Committee of Appro-  
26. priations one of the amendments was a statue to be installed  
27. in the state capital of Lottie Holman. And, it was also  
28. brought out in this committee that Lottie Holman was friend of  
29. Benjamin Stevens. Thank you.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Is...is...are there further amendments from the...are there  
32. amendments from the Floor? Third reading. Senator...Senator  
33. Donnewald do you wish to advance 2348? Senator Donnewald.

1. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

2. Yes, please. I understand that there are a series of  
3. five amendments. Of course, we do object to several of them  
4. but we can proceed.

5. SECRETARY:

6. HB 2348.

7. (Secretary reads title of bill)

8. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Appropriations offers  
9. six amendments.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Donnewald. Do you wish Senator McBroom to... yes.

12. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

13. Let him roll.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. All right. Senator McBroom moves the adoption of Amend-  
16. ment No. 1. Is there discussion? All in favor signify by  
17. saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. Amendment No. 1  
18. is adopted. Senator McBroom.

19. SENATOR McBROOM:

20. Yes, Mr. President. I move for the adoption of Amendment  
21. No. 2.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Is there discussion? All in favor of the adoption of  
24. Amendment No. 2 signify by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion  
25. carries. Amendment No. 2 is adopted. Senator McBroom.

26. SENATOR McBROOM:

27. I move for the adoption of Amendment No. 3 Mr. President.  
28. This has to do with the tree nursery that's badly needed.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Is there discussion? All in favor of the adoption of  
31. Amendment No. 3 signify by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion  
32. carries. Amendment No. 3 is adopted. Senator McBroom.

33. SENATOR McBROOM:

1. Yes, I move for the adoption of Amendment No. 4 Mr. Presi-  
2. dent. This has to do with a prairie that's also desperately  
3. needed. I move the adoption.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Is there further discussion? The question is on the adoption  
6. of Amendment No. 4. All those in favor signify by saying Aye.  
7. Contrary no. The motion carries. Amendment No. 4 is adopted.  
8. Senator McBroom.

9. SENATOR McBROOM:

10. Amendment No. 5's the legal amendment. I move the adoption  
11. Mr. President.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Is there further discussion? All in favor signify by  
14. saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. Amendment No. 6  
15. is adopted. 5...Amendment No. 5 is adopted. Senator McBroom.

16. SENATOR McBROOM:

17. Yes, I move for the adoption of Amendment No. 6 Mr. Presi-  
18. dent. This is for a lake that's badly needed near Olney, Illi-  
19. nois. I move the adoption.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Senator Bruce moves the adoption of Amendment No. 6. All  
22. those in favor signify by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion  
23. carries. Amendment No. 6 is adopted. Are there amendments from  
24. the Floor? Senator Bartulis.

25. SENATOR BARTULIS:

26. Thank you Mr. President and Members of the Senate, Amend-  
27. ment No. 7 is...takes five hundred thousand of the game and  
28. fish funds out of the personal services would be four hundred  
29. and fifty thousand out of retirement, thirty-five thousand  
30. social security and fifteen thousand line items in the Division  
31. of Law Enforcement. And, replaces this fish and game fund money  
32. with general revenue funds. There are no changes in the total  
33. appropriation in the Division of Law Enforcement. This amendment



1. also adds five hundred thousand to the fish and game funds  
2. to wildlife resources which with the provision that these funds  
3. may be used for breeding of wildlife and restoration of habitan  
4. I move for immediate adoption.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Is there discussion? Senator Donnewald.

7. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

8. Senator, where...where is this going to be expended?

9. SENATOR BARTULIS:

10. Statewide.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Is there further discussion? Senator Partee.

13. SENATOR PARTEE:

14. Well, that's just...I think <sup>2</sup>unkindly. There's an awful  
15. lot of money involved here to come out of general revenue funds.  
16. You know the money is not in general revenue funds. It's a  
17. sycophantic approach to persons who are interested in hunting  
18. and fishing. It's nice. It's wonderful to tell them you'd  
19. like to do this but the money simply isn't there. And, I ask  
20. everybody on this side of the aisle as well as we like to fish  
21. and hunt and be the recipients of game and fish and that sort  
22. of thing. It just isn't in the cards. The money isn't there  
23. and this amendment should be defeated.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Is there further discussion? The question is on the adoption  
26. of Amendment No. 7. All in favor signify by saying Aye. Con-  
27. trary no. Now, I'm going to...I'm going to call for a...the  
28. quickest way...it was just practically balanced and I...on a  
29. voice vote, I'm not going to rule. The question is and I'm  
30. going to call for a roll call, those in favor of the adoption  
31. of Amendment No. 7 vote Aye. Those opposed vote No. The voting  
32. is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish?  
33. Take the record. On that question the Yeas are thirty-four,

1. the Nays are twenty-three. And, Amendment No. 7 to SB...I'm  
2. sorry HB 2348 is adopted. Are there further amendments from  
3. the Floor? Third reading. Senator Saperstein, do you wish  
4. to advance? Yes, 2349.  
5. SECRETARY:  
6. HB 2349.  
7. (Secretary reads title of bill)  
8. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Appropriations  
9. offers one amendment.  
10. PRESIDENT:  
11. Senator Saperstein.  
12. SENATOR SAPERSTEIN:  
13. I move the adoption.  
14. PRESIDENT:  
15. Senator Saperstein moves for the adoption of Amendment  
16. No. 1 to HB 2349. Is there discussion? All in favor signify  
17. by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. Amendment  
18. No. 1 is adopted.  
19. SECRETARY:  
20. Amendment No. 2 by Senator Hynes.  
21. PRESIDENT:  
22. Senator Hynes.  
23. SENATOR HYNES:  
24. Amendment No. 2 would remove paragraphs 3 and 4 of the  
25. bill which in effect make a contingent appropriation. The  
26. bill in it's...in the form it would be after the amendments  
27. is adequate to cover the anticipated federal funds the depart-  
28. ment would receive. And, I move the adoption of the amendment.  
29. PRESIDENT:  
30. Senator McBroom. Is there further discussion? The question  
31. is on the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to HB 2349. All in favor  
32. signify by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries.  
33. Amendment No. 2 is adopted. Are there amendments from the Floor?

1. Senator McBroom.

2. SENATOR McBROOM:

3. Yes Mr. President, this is probably not the right time  
4. but I've been asked, Senator Latherow and I've got the room  
5. situation straightened out. The Appropriations Committee will  
6. meet in M-3 at 8 o'clock tomorrow morning. I talked to Senator  
7. Hynes and I...I hope the Republican and Democrat Members under-  
8. stand that that does not mean 8:30 or quarter till nine. M-3  
9. at 8 o'clock. Maybe Senator Latherow would want to announce  
10. his room since he and I have had our meeting.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Well, let's proceed. Are there amendments from the Floor  
13. on 2349? Third reading. Senator Latherow. I don't want these  
14. announcements to indicate that we are about to adjourn. We  
15. still have a great deal of work to do. I...I think it would  
16. be appropriate to have these announcements come at the end of  
17. our work.

18. SENATOR LATHEROW:

19. I'll be glad to hold mine or be glad to have you read...  
20. adjourn. Either one Senator.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. All right.

23. SENATOR LATHEROW:

24. Agriculture, Conservation and Ecology on the energy bill  
25. 1653, 54, 59, 60, 61, 62, 64, 65, 66 and 67 will be here on the  
26. Floor tomorrow morning at 9 a.m.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator Palmer, do you wish to advance 2355? Senator  
29. Nudelman, 2358? Advance.

30. SECRETARY:

31. HB 2358.

32. (Secretary reads title of bill)

33. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Appropriations offers

1. three amendments.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Senator McBroom.

4. SENATOR MCBROOM:

5. The first amendment is the retirement. I move the adoption.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Senator McBroom moves the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to  
8. HB 2358. All in favor signify...is there discussion? All in  
9. favor signify by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries.  
10. Amendment No. 1 is adopted. Senator McBroom. We're getting a  
11. little noisy again. Now, we're just...we're getting some work  
12. done here now hang in there. Proceed Senator McBroom.

13. SENATOR MCBROOM:

14. Yes, I move the adoption of Amendment No. 2 Mr. President.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Senator...Senator Nudelman.

17. SENATOR NUDELMAN:

18. How much is that Senator McBroom?

19. SENATOR MCBROOM:

20. \$250,000 Senator Nudelman.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Senator McBroom moves the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to  
23. HB 2358. Is there discussion? All in favor signify by saying  
24. Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. Amendment No. 2 is  
25. adopted. Senator McBroom.

26. SENATOR MCBROOM:

27. Mr. ...Mr. President...

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Yes, Senator McBroom.

30. SENATOR MCBROOM:

31. As you suggested, we're moving pretty fast. I did want to  
32. move the adoption of Amendment No. 2. I incorrectly identified  
33. it to you Senator Nudelman. I...my notes were askew here. It

1. doesn't...Amendment No. 2 does not do what I told you. Amend-  
2. ment No. 2 is the legal amendment to the Department of Insurance.  
3. I'm sorry Senator Nudelman. It is not a money reduction but I  
4. do move the adoption and hope you concur.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Well now, Amendment No. 2 has been adopted.

7. SENATOR MCBROOM:

8. I just wanted to correct what I told Senator Nudelman Mr.  
9. President.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Now, is there...Senator Nudelman.

12. SENATOR NUDELMAN:

13. We are in opposition to that amendment of course.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Are you requesting a roll call Senator Nudelman? All right.

16. Ok. On the question of Amendment No. 3, is there discussion?

17. Senator Nudelman.

18. SENATOR NUDELMAN:

19. It was my understanding Mr. President with Senator Regner  
20. that Amendment No. 3 would be withdrawn. It's a minor thing  
21. and I understand we...just going to Table the amendment on...

22. PRESIDENT:

23. All right. Senator McBroom moves to Table Amendment No. 3.

24. All in favor signify by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion  
25. carries and Amendment No. 3 is Tabled. Are there amendments  
26. from the Floor? Third reading. Senator Bruce, do you wish to  
27. advance? Senator Bruce.

28. SENATOR BRUCE:

29. Yes Mr. President, there's some confusion between the  
30. House sponsor and the department. Senator Johns was first  
31. shown as sponsor and I request to be shown as sponsor. Now,  
32. I would like unanimous consent of the Body to have Senator  
33. Johns shown as the principal sponsor on this bill. He got the

1. unique privilege of waiting nearly four hours in Appropriations  
2. Committee and I think that anyone waits that long ought to be  
3. the principal sponsor of any piece of legislation.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Is there leave for Senator Johns to be shown as the prin-  
6. cipal sponsor of HB 2368? Leave is granted. So ordered.  
7. Senator Johns, do you wish to advance 2367?

8. SENATOR JOHNS:

9. Yes.

10. SECRETARY:

11. HB 2367.

12. (Secretary reads title of bill)

13. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Appropriations  
14. offers seven amendments.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Senator Johns.

17. SENATOR JOHNS:

18. Mr. President, naturally I would resist all of these  
19. amendments but I know the numbers have a...

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Do you wish to yield to Senator McBroom Senator Johns?

22. SENATOR JOHNS:

23. Yes, I did.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Senator McBroom.

26. SENATOR MCBROOM:

27. The first amendment Mr. President is the retirement amend-  
28. ment. I move the adoption.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Is there discussion? All in favor of the adoption of  
31. Amendment No. 1 to HB 2367 signify by saying Aye. Contrary no.  
32. The motion carries. Amendment No. 1 is adopted. Senator  
33. McBroom.

1. SENATOR MCBROOM:

2. Yes, Amendment No. 8, Mr. President, is the reduction of  
3. ...wait a minute, pardon me. Number 2, I'm sorry, is the reduc-  
4. tion amounts to about \$44,000 Mr. President. I move the adoption  
5. of that but Senator Johns or Senator Merritt, I understand, will  
6. move for the adoption of Amendment No. 8 which will put back in  
7. one of the two people that have been removed. Therefore, I move  
8. for...Senator Hall, I guess, I'm sorry. Ever who it is. I move  
9. for the adoption of Amendment No. 2.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Is there further discussion? On the question of the adoption  
12. of Amendment No. 2 to HB 2367. All those in favor signify by  
13. saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. Amendment No. 2  
14. is adopted. Senator McBroom.

15. SENATOR MCBROOM:

16. Yes, Amendment No. 3, Mr. President, reduces the appropria-  
17. tion by a hundred and fourteen thousand dollars which reduces  
18. statewide...the statewide promotion in which the committee deemed  
19. was a proliferation of brochures. I think we're up to our ears  
20. in brochures and pamphlets in the Capital Complex and I move  
21. the adoption of it Mr. President.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Senator McBroom moves the adoption of Amendment No. 3 to  
24. HB 2367. Is there discussion? All in favor signify by saying  
25. Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. Amendment No. 3 is  
26. adopted. Senator McBroom. Senator Knuepfer.

27. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

28. Amendment No. 4 removes \$50,000 for a new program in  
29. advertising media and I would move the adoption of Amendment  
30. No. 4.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Is there further discussion? The question is on the adoption  
33. of Amendment No. 4 to HB 2367. All those in favor signify by

1. saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. Amendment No. 4  
2. is adopted. Senator Johns.

3. SENATOR JOHNS:

4. Mr. President, I'd like to have a roll call on that parti-  
5. cular amendment, number 4.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. On Amendment No. 4 a roll call has been requested. Senator  
8. Hynes.

9. SENATOR HYNES:

10. Mr. President, I'm...it came on us so quickly. This amend-  
11. ment totally removes the tourism promotional funding. It takes  
12. the final \$50,000. I think it's a highly undesirable amendment.  
13. Even more so perhaps than some of the others we're going to see  
14. but this one I think ought to be resisted.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. All right. Senator Davidson.

17. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

18. Inquiry. In...this the amendment that only...the \$50,000  
19. is still on. It's not...this is not Senator Berning's amendment  
20. that wiped it down to zero is it?

21. SENATOR HYNES:

22. Yes it is.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator...Senator Knuepfer, do you wish to respond? It's  
25. your amendment.

26. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

27. I'd be happy to. There...there is still money in there for  
28. tourism but this wipes out the new program for advertising on  
29. the air.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Is there further discussion? A roll call has been requested.

32. Those in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 will vote Aye.

33. Those opposed will vote No. The voting is open. Have all voted



1. who wish? Take the record. On that question the Yeas are  
2. twenty-nine, the Nays are twenty-nine. Amendment No. 4 fails.  
3. A request for verification has been asked. Do you wish the  
4. negative roll call verified. All right. Will the Members  
5. please be in their seats. Will the Members please be in their  
6. seats. The Secretary will read those who voted in the negative.

7. SECRETARY:

8. The following voted in the negative:

9. Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll, Chew, Course, Daley, Donnewald...

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Is Senator Chew on the Floor? Remove Senator Chew's name  
12. from the roll call. Proceed.

13. SECRETARY:

14. ...Dougherty, Kenneth Hall, Hickey, Hynes, Johns, Kosinski,  
15. McCarthy, Merritt...

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Is Senator McCarthy on the Floor? Yes, he's in the Chamber.  
18. Is Senator Kosinski on the Floor? Remove Senator Kosinski's  
19. name from the roll call.

20. SECRETARY:

21. ...Netsch, Newhouse, Nudelman, Palmer, Partee, Rock,  
22. Romano...

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Is Senator Romano on the roll...on the Floor? Is Senator  
25. Romano in the Chamber. Remove Senator Romano's name from the  
26. roll call.

27. SECRETARY:

28. ...Saperstein, Savickas, Smith...

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Is Senator Smith in the Chamber? Remove Senator Smith's  
31. name from the roll call.

32. SECRETARY:

33. ...Swinarski, Vadalabene, Welsh, Wooten.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Is Senator Welsh in the Chamber? Remove Senator Welsh's  
3. name from the roll call. On that question...on that question  
4. the Yeas are twenty-nine, the Nays are twenty-five. And, Amend-  
5. ment No. 4 is adopted. I'm sorry, 24. We've removed five.  
6. The results of the verification demonstrate that the Yeas are  
7. twenty-nine, the Nays are twenty-four. And, Amendment No. 4  
8. is adopted. Senator McBroom. Amendment No. 5.

9. SENATOR MCBROOM:

10. Yes, Mr. President. Amendment No. 5 adds \$16,000. It's  
11. for the Great Lakes Council. I move the adoption of it Mr.  
12. President.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Is there discussion? The question is the adoption of Amend-  
15. ment No. 5 to HB 2367. All those in favor signify by saying  
16. Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. Amendment No. 5 is  
17. adopted. Senator McBroom.

18. SENATOR MCBROOM:

19. I move the adoption of Amendment No. 6 Mr. President. I  
20. don't believe there's any controversy.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Is there further discussion? The question is on the adoption  
23. of Amendment No. 6 to HB 2367. All in favor signify by saying  
24. Aye. Senator Hall. For what purpose do you arise?

25. SENATOR HALL:

26. I'd just like to explain to the Membership this is the  
27. hundred thousand for the Chicago Symphony.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. All in favor signify by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion  
30. carries. Amendment No. 6 is adopted. Senator McBroom. Oh,  
31. Senator Knuepfer, I'm sorry. Senator Knuepfer.

32. SENATOR KNUEPFER:

33. Now, Amendment No. 7 takes out one of those programs foisted

1. upon us by the federal government. It's one of these programs  
2. that the federal government gave us and then suddently dumped  
3. in our lap and said this is yours. This amendment removes the  
4. Office of Science and Technology. It ought to be deleted.  
5. There's no earthly reason for its existence in this budget and  
6. I would be hopeful that this Body would eliminate it.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Is there further discussion? Senator Merritt.

9. SENATOR MERRITT:

10. Yes Mr. President and Members of the Senate, I'm certainly  
11. going to oppose this amendment vigorously. I don't believe  
12. that Senator Knuepfer has been as bad to me as he has all day  
13. today. Mr. President...Mr. President, it's not just exactly  
14. quite the way Senator Knuepfer represented it. It started out  
15. to be a program in 1972, I believe. Funded at that time with  
16. the federal government supposedly was some state participation  
17. which never came about. They continued the program through '73  
18. on the same basis. This year when our commission for Economic  
19. Development met found out it was not included in the budget this  
20. time. We, I think, unanimously to a person agreed that it should  
21. be put back in on the basis that it would be monitored by our  
22. commission on every quarterly basis each three months for a  
23. record of the cases as to what was being done. There's no  
24. question but about to date a hundred and forty small businesses  
25. have been greatly assisted by this program. We've had it docu-  
26. mented. We had witnesses in before our commission where  
27. businesses would have failed. They were on the verge of bank-  
28. ruptcy. With this help, they are still small but ongoing concerns  
29. making a profit today and we can document that. And, when you  
30. can say that you can add at least two hundred new jobs in Illi-  
31. nois from small companies ranging from thirty, forty, and  
32. fifty employees that would've gone down the drain otherwise and  
33. I think the program's worthwhile. I'm certainly not going to

1. make a motion that that amendment lie on the Table because we  
2. had enough confusion with that the other day. I would just  
3. be hopeful that people that really believe in this system would  
4. ...would vote along with me in opposing this...this amendment.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Is there...

7. SENATOR MERRITT:

8. You might be interested in knowing although there was  
9. opposition and I don't deny it by the State Chamber. I believe  
10. maybe the Manufacturer's Association by the same token the Board  
11. of Directors of the Chicago Association of Commerce endorse it  
12. tremendously. And, if we're ever going to keep people on the  
13. payrolls in Illinois, this is one of the better programs. I  
14. think it needs to be monitored this next year. It's only for  
15. a one year period that this appropriation is and I hope others  
16. might join you. I know that Senator Partee has some in his  
17. particular district that have been helped tremendously by this.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Is there further discussion? Senator Hynes.

20. SENATOR HYNES:

21. Well Mr. President, I would simply say that I think the  
22. amendment has merit. The Department opposes it. It was not in  
23. the original bill and the Appropriations Committee adopted the  
24. amendment by a vote of eighteen to one. I think that that deci-  
25. sion ought to be upheld here on the Floor.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Is there further discussion? Senator Partee.

28. SENATOR PARTEE:

29. I just wanted to say that all of things that Senator  
30. Merritt said are absolutely certain and this amendment should  
31. certainly be taken into consideration on that basis.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Is there further...Senator McBroom.

1. SENATOR McBROOM:

2. I just want to say very quickly that I support in total  
3. Senator Knuepfer's position and if you'd like a replay of my  
4. record, this is another one of the Governor's games. It wasn't  
5. in the original budget Mr. President.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Is there further...a roll call has been requested. The  
8. question is on the adoption of Amendment No. 7 to HB 2367.  
9. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote No.  
10. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record.  
11. On that question the Yeas are twenty-seven, the Nays are  
12. nineteen, two Voting Present. Amendment No. 7 is adopted.  
13. Senator McBroom. Senator Hall, for what purpose do you arise?

14. SENATOR HALL:

15. I would like to propose Amendment No. 8, 2367.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator Hall is recognized for consideration of Amendment  
18. No. 8.

19. SENATOR HALL:

20. Originally we had planned to remove one executive from  
21. the Department of Tourism. \$16,850 we agreed in committee to  
22. put that back in and this amendment does that. I move adoption.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Is there further discussion? The question is on the adoption  
25. of Amendment No. 8 to HB 2367. All in favor signify by saying  
26. Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. Amendment No. 8 is  
27. adopted. Are there further amendments from the Floor?

28. SECRETARY:

29. Amendment No. 9 by Senator Merritt.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator Merritt.

32. SENATOR MERRITT:

33. Yes Mr. President, maybe I've got a hold of a noncontroversial

1. one this time. At least we have agreement by the department  
2. on it. It would raise the \$0,000 for the Federal Foreign Trade  
3. Zone Feasibility Study to \$115,000 which takes care of \$75,000  
4. that hopefully is going to be funded with the federal government.  
5. If that funding comes through yet this year, then this...that

19. know if Senator Merritt wants a roll call on this but I arise  
20. to resist the amendment Mr. President.

22. Is there further discussion? The question is on the

24. Aye. That will signify by saying Aye. Those opposed vote no.

22. HB 2608.
23. (Secretary reads title of bill)
24. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Appropriations offers
25. two amendments.

27. Senator McBroom.
28. SENATOR MCBROOM:
29. Amendment No. 1's retirement. I move the adoption.

31. Senator McBroom has some amendments. There's three amend-  
32. ments.  
33. SENATOR McBROOM:



1. Amendment No. 1's retirement. I move the adoption Mr.  
2. President.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Senator McBroom moves the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to  
5. HB 2405. Is there discussion? All in favor signify by saying  
6. Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. Amendment No. 1 is  
7. adopted. Senator McBroom.

8. SENATOR MCBROOM:

9. Yes. Amendment No. 2 is the Attorney General amendment.  
10. Senator Partee expressed some interest in this. If he'd care  
11. to move the adoption of it, I'd be glad to have him do that.  
12. If he doesn't, I'll move the adoption of it.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Palmer.

15. SENATOR PALMER:

16. I'd like the record to show that the Senate sponsor is  
17. opposed to the adoption of this amendment and urges the gentle-  
18. men on the...this side to oppose it and not vote for it.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Senator McBroom moves the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to  
21. HB 2405. Is there further discussion? All in favor signify  
22. by saying Aye. Contrary no. The motion carries. Amendment  
23. No. 2 is adopted. Senator McBroom.

24. SENATOR MCBROOM:

25. Yes, Amendment No. 3, is that what you called Mr. President?

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Amendment No. 3, yes.

28. SENATOR MCBROOM:

29. Yes, this is a transfer of \$30,000. I move the adoption  
30. of it Mr. President.
