1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

2. The Regular Session will now convene. Reading of  
3. the Journal. Senator Shapiro.

4. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

5. ...Mr. President, I move that we postpone the  
6. reading and approval of the Journals of Tuesday, November  
7. 6th and Wednesday, November 7th 1973 of the Regular Session  
8. until the printed Journal arrives.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

10. Senator Shapiro moves that we postpone the reading  
11. of the Journal of November 6th, November 7th until the  
12. printed copy arrives. All those in favor signify by  
13. saying aye. Opposed? Motion carries. Resolutions.

14. SECRETARY:

15. Senate Resolution 282 by Senator Harris. Congratulatory.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

17. Senator Harris.

18. SENATOR HARRIS:

19. This is a congratulatory resolution for Al Slicer who  
20. for so many years served as - and still is serving through  
21. this month he is retiring as of the 30th of November - from  
22. his position of Chairmanship of the State Board of Vocational  
23. Education. A real dedicated longtime career employee I  
24. would invite all Senators to join as cosponsors and move to  
25. suspend the rules for the immediate consideration of the adoption  
26. of the resolution.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

28. Senator Harris moves the suspension of the rules and  
29. consideration of the adoption of the resolution. All in favor  
30. of suspending the rules signify by saying aye. Opposed? So  
31. ordered. Now Senator Harris moves the adoption of the resolution.  
32. All those in favor signify by saying aye. Opposed. The  
33. resolution is adopted.

2. Senate Resolution 283 by Senator Harber Hall. It's  
3. congratulatory.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

5. Senator Hall.

6. SENATOR HARBER HALL:

7. Mr. President, likewise, this is a congratulatory  
8. resolution commemorating the retirement of Tom Blanco  
9. longtime purchasing agent for the State of Illinois  
10. a very valuable employee who we mentioned last week and  
11. I would move for suspension of the rules, consideration  
12. and adoption of this resolution. And also I'd like to  
13. invite all members of the Senate to join me in this  
14. resolution.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

16. Is there leave to have all Senators shown as sponsors?  
17. Leave is granted. Senator Harber Hall moves the suspension  
18. of the rules for consideration and adoption of the resolution.  
19. All those in favor signify by saying aye. Opposed. The  
20. rules have been suspended. Now Senator Hall moves the  
21. adoption of the resolution. All those in favor signify by  
22. saying aye. Opposed. The resolution is adopted.

23. SECRETARY:

24. Senate Resolution 284, Senator Regner. Commendatory  
25. ...Congratulatory.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

27. Senator Regner.

28. SENATOR REGNER:

29. Yes Mr. President, members of the Senate, this is  
30. a resolution commending St. Paul's Lutheran Church of  
31. Mt. Prospect on their 60th anniversary of their founding.  
32. And I move to suspend the rules for the immediate consider-  
33. ation of this resolution.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

2. Senator Regner moves the suspension of the rules  
3. for consideration and adoption of the resolution. All  
4. those in favor of the suspension of the rules signify  
5. by saying aye. Opposed. The rules have been suspended.  
6. Now Senator Regner moves the adoption of the resolution.  
7. All those in favor signify by saying aye. Opposed. The  
8. resolution is adopted.

9. SECRETARY:

10. Senate Resolution 285 by Senators Mitchler and Bell.  
11. It's congratulatory.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

13. Senator Mitchler.

14. SENATOR MITCHLER:

15. Yes Mr. President, members of the Senate, this is  
16. a congratulatory resolution for the Joliet Council of the  
17. Knights of Columbus on the occasion of their 75th anniversary.  
18. I would ask for suspension of the rules, immediate adoption  
19. of this resolution.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

21. Senator there's a question from somebody over here,  
22. I don't...I just heard it. They wanted to know if this is  
23. your 285th resolution...or the resolution number.

24. SENATOR MITCHLER:

25. No, right...right now I'm four behind Senator Partee.  
26. I'm closing the gap fast.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

28. Equal time for Senator Partee.

29. SENATOR PARTEE:

30. I hear...I hear there's a new kind of decorator, that  
31. is interior decorator, going around in America and what  
32. they're doing is making photocopies of Senator Mitchler's  
33. resolutions and papering your living room with them. He

1. has enough of them now to paper a whole room in any  
2. house.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

4. Senator...Senator Mitchler...moves the suspension of  
5. the rules for consideration of House...or Senate Resolution  
6. No. 285. All those in favor signify by saying aye. Opposed.  
7. The rules have been suspended. Now Senator Mitchler moves  
8. the adoption of Resolution...Senate Resolution 285. All  
9. those in favor signify by saying aye. Opposed? Resolution  
10. is adopted.

11. SECRETARY:

12. Senate Resolution 286 by Senators, Bell...Senator  
13. Bell and all members of the Senate.

14. (Secretary reads Senate Resolution 286)

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

16. Senator Bell.

17. SENATOR BELL:

18. Well...Mr. President, I would move for the immediate  
19. suspension of the rules, for the adoption of the resolution.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

21. Senator...Senator Bell moves the rules be suspended  
22. for the adoption of Senate Resolution 286. All those in  
23. favor of the suspension of the rules signify by saying aye.  
24. Opposed. The rules have been suspended. Now Senator Bell  
25. moves the adoption of the resolution...Senate Resolution 286.  
26. All those in favor signify by saying aye. Opposed. The  
27. Resolution is adopted.

29. Senate Resolution 287 by Senators Graham, Harris, Howard  
30. Mohr, Weaver, Merritt, Berning, Walker, Soper, Glass, Harber  
31. Hall, Clarke and Latherow.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

33. Senator Graham.

1. SENATOR GRAHAM:

2. First of all Mr. President, what was the number of  
3. that?

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

5. 287.

6. SENATOR GRAHAM:

7. Mr. President and members of the Senate, this  
8. resolution really indicates that we have an interest in  
9. doing something we can do perhaps without the introduction  
10. of it so Senator Partee if you'll pardon me for introducing  
11. the resolution and I've given it to him. What it really  
12. indicates that the Committee on Financial Institutions will  
13. send a sub-committee...construct a sub-committee that will  
14. study the problems that have confronted our state with re-  
15. gard to the 8% ceiling limit on the usury rate and reporting  
16. date back on March the 1st. I think it's something I'd like  
17. to have all the Senators join with me in sponsoring. I think  
18. it's...a considerable amount of interest in the Illinois  
19. State Senate indicating that we know there's a problem existing  
20. and are willing to attempt to do something about it. And I  
21. ask for the suspension of the rules and the immediate con-  
22. sideration.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

24. Senator Partee.

25. SENATOR PARTEE:

26. Well I wanted Senator Graham to know that we too consider  
27. this a very special subject and we have had a committee working  
28. on this problem for about 3 weeks now and they're going to be  
29. filing a written report in about a week and I'll make certain  
30. that you get a copy of it so that your committee may want to  
31. use some of the information as guidelines. I think it's an  
32. excellent idea. This is something that has to be done.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

1. ...Senator Graham.

2. SENATOR GRAHAM:

3. Senator Partee I think I did suggest that I have a  
4. great willingness to have all the Senate join me in  
5. sponsorship of this and I'm sure that the cooperation  
6. existing between these two committees may indicate that  
7. the people back home that we are aware of the problems  
8. and we're willing to cooperate in doing something about it.  
9. I move for the suspension and immediate adoption.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

11. Senator Graham also ask that all members be shown  
12. as sponsors. Is there leave for that? Leave is granted for  
13. that? Senator Graham moves for the suspension of the rules,  
14. consideration of the adoption of Senate Resolution 287. All  
15. those in favor signify by saying aye. Opposed. Rules have  
16. been suspended. Now Senator Graham moves the adoption of  
17. Senate Resolution 287. All those in favor signify by saying  
18. aye. Opposed. Resolution is adopted. Messages from the  
19. House.

26. Senator McBroom moves the adoption of the House  
27. Resolution. All those in favor signify by saying aye. Opposed.  
28. Resolution is adopted. Messages.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

33. Executive. Committee reports.

1. SECRETARY:

2. (Secretary reads Committee reports)

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

4. Senator Ozinga.

5. SENATOR OZINGA:

6. Mr. President, members of the Senate. The report  
7. which the Secretary is referring to there was contained  
8. in three different meetings of the Senate Executive  
9. Committee. Before I go into the individual nominees I  
10. would respectfully request that the Senate do resolve  
11. itself into Executive Session. And so move.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

13. Senator Ozinga moves that the Senate resolve itself  
14. into Executive Session. All those in favor signify by  
15. saying aye. Opposed?

16. SENATOR OZINGA:

17. Now Mr. President I would move that we consider these  
18. nominees as a group or shall I say there are approximately  
19. 20 - 21 nominees as submitted by the Governor that were  
20. heard. There are still approximately four that have failed  
21. to appear. There was one that was not acted on too favorably  
22. but it would be my motion at this time that I...that we as  
23. Executive Committee...Executive Body consider the list which  
24. I shall read to you individually that were suggested to be  
25. confirmed. Now if I can do that first I shall contain myself  
26. with reference to the postponements and also not bring up the  
27. one that was not favorably recommended. However I...I would  
28. implore you that if there is any name of any of the individuals  
29. on the list to be confirmed that you would desire to vote in  
30. opposition to or not be voted in...in the affirmative form  
31. would you please interrupt me at the time so we can take that  
32. name out of the blanket vote. And I think that will help the  
33. Secretary along and we'll have a second roll call on those that

1. ...that we...that there are any objections to. Is that  
2. favorable? Is that agreeable?

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

4. Is that agreeable? All right, Senator.

5. SENATOR OZINGA:

6. All right. There...these appointments now are con-  
7. tained in the Governor's Messages of September the 20th  
8. and October the 19th. I shall go over them individually  
9. as were passed upon by the Senate. Now I shall reserve  
10. my remarks until after the full list has been read. But  
11. again I implore each Senator because everytime we go  
12. through this we get to the roll call and somebody will say  
13. I don't want to vote on such and such a name. Well that  
14. is almost an impossible situation so please if there's  
15. anybody that you don't want on this group roll call say  
16. so, interrupt me in the process. The first one that we  
17. will hear is Ethele Scott. Now my motion is going to be a  
18. blanket motion. I will move that the Senate advise and  
19. consent to the nomination of Ethele Scott and in each case  
20. it will be a different name to be a member of the Junior  
21. College Board and in each case it will be a different board -  
22. for a term expiring on June 30th 1979.

23. The second one is Dr. Roger D. Herrin of Harrisburg  
24. to be a member of the Illinois Health Facilities Authority  
25. for a term expiring on June 30th 1978.

26. The next one is George Z. Chrones of Northbrook to  
27. be an assistant Director of the Department of Financial  
28. Institutions for a term expiring on the third Monday in  
29. January 1974.

30. The next one is Edward M. Levin, Jr., of Chicago to be  
31. Assistant Director of the Department of Local Government  
32. Affairs for a term expiring on the third Monday in  
33. January 1975.



1. member and Chairman of the Illinois Pollution Control  
2. Board for a term expiring on July 1, 1976.

3. The next one is Russell T. Odell of Champaign,  
4. Illinois to be a member of the Illinois...Pollution  
5. Control Board for a term expiring on July 1, 1975.

6. The next one is a motion to confirm Sidney M.  
7. Marder of Peru, Illinois to be a member of the Illinois  
8. Pollution Control Board for a term expiring on July  
9. 1st 1976.

27. The next one is Mrs. Irene Mills of Decatur. A  
28. member of the Illinois Health Facilities Authority for a  
29. term expiring on June 30th 1980.

30. The next one. Nomination of Edward A. Roof of Mascoutah  
31. to be a member of the Kaskaskia Regional Port District Board  
32. for a term expiring on June 30th 1974.

33. The next one is Mr. James A. Biethman of Evansville

1. to be a member of the Kaskaskia Regional Port District  
2. Board for a term expiring on June 30th 1975.

3. And the next one is James R. McGuire of Belleville  
4. to be a member of the Kaskaskia Regional Port District  
5. Board expiring on June 30th 1974.

17. Airport Authority to...for a term expiring on the third  
18. Monday of January 1978.

19. And the next one is Robert C. Kettler of Waterloo  
20. to be a Member of the Kaskaskia Regional Port District  
21. Board for a term expiring on June the 30th 1975.

22. Now Mr. Chairman that constitutes the group of personalities  
23. that were heard by the Executive Committee for which the  
24. Committee is prepared to recommend to this able Body that the  
25. Senate do advise and consent to the nominations as afore-  
26. mentioned as such stated, this whole list, as for...as and  
27. for the terms as was stated. Now there are a few that are  
28. still to come. There is another nomination. So rather than  
29. to get tangled up into that at this time I would move you that  
30. a roll call be had on all of the nominees mentioned.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

32. Senator Rock.

33. SENATOR ROCK:

1. Just an inquiry of the Secretary...when you met...  
2. read Mr. Chrones who was a nominee for the Department  
3. of Financial Institutions, would you check that Message  
4. and see what the term of office is please?

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

6. January '74...

7. SECRETARY:

8. Term expiring on third...January '74.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

10. Senator Rock.

11. SENATOR ROCK:

12. I...I think that is a clerical error and I just...  
13. for the purpose of the record I'd like to get that  
14. straightened out.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

16. Senator Harris.

17. SENATOR HARRIS:

18. No, I think it is correct. You'll recall at the time  
19. the Department of Financial Institutions was first enacted  
20. it was put off the schedule of the others and the present  
21. Director holds until now. Now I would assume that Mr.  
22. Chrones would be...renominated for Assistant Director by  
23. Message of the first of the year and that the present  
24. Director probably would be substituted for some other nominee  
25. of the Governor's...for the term that begins in January of  
26. '74. That...that is an anomaly as compared to the other  
27. departments in the Civil Administrative Code but I'm that  
28. that term is correct.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

30. Senator Ozinga.

31. SENATOR OZINGA:

32. Senator Rock that is the exact wording that is in the  
33. Governor's Message. I've got the Governor's Message right  
here, so...

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

2. All right, the question is shall the Senate advise  
3. and consent to the nominations of the Governor just made  
4. by Senator Ozinga and on that question the Secretary will  
5. call the roll.

6. SECRETARY:

7. Bartulis, Bell, Berning, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,  
8. Chew, Clarke, Conolly, Course, Daley, Davidson, Donnewald,  
9. Dougherty, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth  
10. Hall, Hynes, Johns, Keegan, Knuepfer, Knuppel, Kosinski,  
11. Latherow, McBroom, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

18. Graham, aye. Scholl, aye. Knuppel, aye. The  
19. result of the vote of the Senate on...on the question is  
20. 46 yeas, no nays. The majority of the Senators elected  
21. concurring by record vote the Senate does advise and  
22. consent to the Governor's nominations as specified by  
23. Senator Ozinga. Senator Ozinga, you have others?

24. SENATOR OZINGA:

25. Now, Mr. President, members of the Senate. The  
26. Executive Committee will meet again next Wednesday at 2:15 p.m.  
27. I assume it will be at the regular time however we do not have  
28. a Message from the Governor to supplant the ones that have been  
29. carried over but I'm assuming that we will meet. There is one  
30. more nomination which I have agreed to hold. However this is  
31. the nomination of Miss Felicitas Berlanga. Now this is a  
32. nomination that the Committee did not vote a favorable recom-  
33. mendation and as you will see by the vote that was just cast

1. when these nominees are brought to the Floor of the Senate  
2. the recommendation of the Committees...of the Committee is  
3. usually pretty well followed. Now speaking for myself -  
4. in talking personally - I would...I have taken a lot of heat  
5. from the news media, from different people, my territory,  
6. my district on the basis that I might be prejudiced to some  
7. of the features of some of the appointees such as race, such  
8. as ethnic background, such as sex, such as different things  
9. that I might be biased to. Now I would challenge the media  
10. at this time to check each and every appointment of the  
11. Governor during this past year. We had a man that travelled  
12. the State of Illinois that said he was going to make his  
13. appointments well qualified and with people that would operate  
14. to the nth degree of efficiency. Ladies and Gentlemen, I ask  
15. you, look, look, look at the qualifications of some of these  
16. people. They are absolutely negative. We as a Committee have  
17. bowed to the wishes of the Governor because he asked for them.  
18. They don't represent the kind of people that you want to have  
19. representing you. People that would be handling \$72,000,000  
20. worth of advise and counselling that haven't one ounce of  
21. abilities when it comes to having active participation in  
22. such affairs. I challenge the media to check these things,  
23. look at my records, look at the kind of government that you  
24. are now facing with some of these appointments. It is ridiculous  
25. and if you will just go in and follow up. I am going to  
26. move that we hold this one appointment which I am forced to  
27. move next week for having the consent of the Senate's  
28. approval. I'm going to move that we hold the report on  
29. Felicitas Berlanga until the next report of the Senate  
30. Executive Committee.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

32. Is there leave? Leave is granted. It will be held until  
33. the next report of the Executive Committee. Senator Ozinga.

1. SENATOR OZINGA:

2. I would now move you that the Senate Executive  
3. Committee that the Senate do arise from its Executive  
4. Session.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

6. Senator Ozinga moves that the Senate do arise  
7. from Executive Session. All those in favor signify by  
8. saying aye. Opposed. So ordered. We'll go to con-  
9. currence in House action on total vetoes if you want to  
10. call that one Senator Bruce. HB 920.

11. SENATOR BRUCE:

12. Yes Mr...yes Mr. President, members of the Body  
13. I explained this bill briefly yesterday. ...HB 920  
14. provides the method for computing average final com-  
15. pensation for per diem employees. It passed this  
16. Body 36 to nothing and was vetoed by the Governor upon  
17. recommendation of the Pension Laws Commission. At the  
18. time that bill passed both the House and the Senate the  
19. Pension Laws Commission had approved it. In the inter-  
20. vening time there was a change of feeling and a mistake  
21. within the Commission and they sent down the wrong memo.  
22. The Governor's vetoed the bill and since that time I have  
23. available to you a letter dated October 26, 1973 from the  
24. Illinois Public Employees Pension Laws Commission signed by their  
25. actuary that they now find the bill conforms to their  
26. regular procedure and they do approve the legislation.  
27. Because of the mistake in the memo the Governor vetoed.  
28. He has changed his views, has no problem of the override.  
29. I understand that the Pension Laws Commission met on  
30. Wednesday night and reaffirmed their approval of HB 920.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

32. Senator Shapiro.

33. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

1. ...Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate  
2. just to reaffirm what Senator Bruce has stated the Pensions  
3. Commission did approve this measure at their meeting Tuesday  
4. night. I would urge a favorable vote on the override.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

6. Any further discussion? The question is shall HB 920  
7. pass the veto of the Governor to the contrary notwith-  
8. standing. And on that question the Secretary will call the  
9. roll.

10. SECRETARY:

21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR MOHR):

22. McBroom, aye. Hynes, aye. Netsch, aye. On that  
23. question the yeas are 44 the nays are none. HB 920 having  
24. received the required three-fifth's vote is declared passed  
25. the veto of the Governor to the contrary notwithstanding.  
26. HB 1533, Senator Wooten is not present. HB 1564, Senator  
27. Smith? HB 1564.

28. SENATOR SMITH:

29. ...Mr. President and members of the Senate, may I call  
30. the attention of the Senators on the other side of the Senate  
31. that this is a veto that was asked for, requested, by Mr.  
32. Lindberg our State Comptroller. His Excellency in obedience  
33. to the expressed desire of Mr. Lindberg has stricken lines 28

1. 29, 30, 31, and 32 of this bill and has inserted in lieu  
2. thereof certain language more in keeping the wishes and  
3. desire of our State Comptroller. This bill still allows  
4. that the monthly reports of Mr. Lindberg be the monthly  
5. reports be issued in the same way and in the same manner  
6. as they are now being issued and according to his statement  
7. it will result in considerable savings to his office that  
8. will be occasioned by reason of the fact that the office  
9. will no longer be required to publish the massive printout  
10. on a routine basis. The bill still requires that the  
11. accounting system in the Department be kept detailed which  
12. was the primary reason or purpose for the introduction of  
13. the legislation. I handled the legislation when it was  
14. before the Senate. The fact that it's in keeping with the  
15. wishes of Mr. Lindberg, it satisfies him, I move that we  
16. concur with His Excellency's amendatory veto.
