### SENATOR OZINGA:

Mr. President, this Gentleman together with one Paul Sougett were the only two people that were received by the Committee as far as nominations were concerned. Now it is a known fact that there are seven members on this board and we have received communications that the Governor had sent nominating the others to committee as well. However this gentleman and Mr...this gentleman lasted until we got to the meeting as you all know and ... and was a very presentable candidate for the office. The other gentleman, Mr. Paul Sougett who was there is also, I am told a very respectable gentleman. However, the question that is raised with reference to these appointments as you heard me say just last week, why were not the others who have been nominated to this same commission sent, to our Committee last night for hearing. Is there a reason? And from the testimony that was elicited from this person last night, I would think that the Governor better stop right now and think over the rest of his appointments, reconsider and send some real good people well qualified for this commission 'cause I am told that his commission is a well working committee down there, well

respected committee and from what appears by way of the 1. other nominees that were not sent to us it may not continue 2. to be so. And was almost stated. Gentlemen I would suggest ٦. that this; Mr. John L. Dean's confirmation be reported out favorable. Dills, I'm sorry, John L. Dills. 5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM): 6. Senator Partee. 7. Senator, I'm going to request again if it's at all

33. SENATOR OZINGA:

My motion is to move that the Senate advise and consent in the nomination of James J. Nagle of Danville to be a member of the Southern Illinois University Board of Trustees for a term expiring on the third Monday in January of 1977. Now, Mr. President I am constrained to inform you that after a lengthy discussion and much query of this gentleman the ultimate vote of the Committee did not move to concur in the confirmation of this gentleman but the consenses of the Committee was that there were twelve gentlemen that favored his...that did not favor his appointment and ten that did favor it. Therefore the Committee's real recommendation under those circumstances was that he should not be confirmed however my motion is to the contrary as per the rules of the Senate.

## PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Discussion? The Chair recognizes the Senator from Peoria. Senator Sours.

### SENATOR SOURS:

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Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate the position to which this professor has been recommended to be appointed to is that of the Board at Southern Illinois University in Carbondale. One of our leading State higher educational institutions. At the present time the professor, the...the nominee is on the faculty at a junior college in Danville. Now some of us in...in the best of faith felt first an adversion, an aversion to the appointment of a student or a faculty member of another institution to serve for example, as a member of the Board of Regents or as a member of the Board of Trustees. We felt also that it would not be in the manifest best interests of Southern Illinois University that this professor serve on the Board. I mention that

so there'll be a clear understanding of how some of us l. felt. That is one of the leading educational institutions 2. 3. in this State. And we believe it deserves superlative, personnel directing the activities of that great 4. university, hiring its faculty, taking care of faculty 5. appointments, managership and all that. I wanted the 6. Members of this Chamber to know just how we did feel 7. on that nominee. 8.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

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Senator Walker. Any further discussion? Senator Rock. SENATOR ROCK:

Yes Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of this Senate under our rules the question will be put by the presiding officer as to whether or not the Senate will advise and consent in the nomination of Mr. James Nagle to be a member of the Board of Trustees for Southern Illinois University. We sat at some length last night and discussed with Mr. Nagle his qualifications for this Board. I submit to you that he is qualified and he deserves an affirmative vote. He was accused of some things last night which I think were unfair. He was accused of holding the belief that one should be a judge of his own cause. Mr. Nagle did not in fact say that. He was accused of espousing the philosophy of civil disobedience. Mr. Nagle did not say that either. What he did say is that he could understand how some people could be civilally disobedient. I think the major underlying reason that Mr. Nagle ran into some difficulty in the Executive Committee was because since September, 1973 about a month ago, two months ago he has been a field worker for the Illinois Education Association. He admitted to the members of the Committee that he was here on that fateful day when the IEA came en masse and did have something to do, albeit a small part with the

article in the voice of education in Illinois, the IEA 1. Advocate. And there were pictures of some of the members 2. of this Chamber and that magazine I suppose was distributed, 3. I received one in the mail, I'm sure we all did. The fact 4. of the matter is Mr. Nagle is not in a policy making 5. position with the IEA. And then there was another thing. 6. He had in his resume that he was affiliated with or a 7. member of, I forget the exact wording, the American 8 Civil Liberties Union. And I asked him if in fact he 9. had any position with that organization whereby he could 10. set policy. He said no, he had no position. What he did 11. do and what he did admit to was that he and his wife 12. contributed \$25.00 to the American Civil Liberties Union, 13. for a family membership. That was the sum total of his 14. experience with and affiliation with the American Civil 15. Liberties Union. I submit to you Gentlemen, my wife and 16. .I have a membership with WTTW, Channel 11 in our City. 17. I do not have anything to do with their editorial policy, 18. if they have one. I do not have anything to do with their 19. programming policy. I think we have here a case what 20 Senator Partee so eloquently described last night as 21. guilt by association. I asked this young man very directly, 22. did he know that this Board was composed of seven people, 23. and that although he did share or did have some views 24. which other members of the Board might not share and 25. the big view that he does have and that everybody takes 26. issue with is that he believes that teachers in our State 27. have the right to collectively bargain. Ladies and 28. Gentlemen of the Senate there are some of us sitting 29. here who also believe that. When I asked him directly 30. would you abide by the majority vote of that Board, 31.

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and he said just as directly and succinctly yes he would.

I think for us to reject this nomination on the basis

of what he may or may not have had to do with that ı. particular publication amounts in my judgment to censorship, 2. censorship of the worst kind. One of the Senate members з. said that the particular piece of literature which was distributed in his community was an affront to him. And 5. I do not quarrel with that, any more than I would quarrel 6. with any piece of literature that is fairly promulgated 7. and fairly distributed. I think that we owe it to our-8. selves as responsible Members of this Senate to advise 9. and consent in the nomination of Mr. Nagle to be a member 10. of the Board of Trustees.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Further discussion? Senator Walker, you seeking recognition?

### SENATOR WALKER:

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Thank you Mr. President, Members of the Senate. I wasn't the Senator who was affronted by the literature circulated in the district. And as Senator Rock said the right to disseminate this information is all right provided that they stick to the facts. In this particular instance they did not stick to the facts nor did they stick to the facts in another instances or two. I'm now referring to the news letter printed and sent out by the IEA. Just happens that Mr. Nagle and I have different ideas as I know a number of you do here and he'd prefer to call it collective bargaining. I'd prefer to call it the right to strike. If I recall correctly Senator Rock we also went into the question of municipal employees, police, firemen. 'Again, as I told Mr. Nagle yesterday nothing personal, but he was just a little too far out in left-field for an old man like myself. Phil you may belong to the group that contributes to WTTW but you know as well as I do that

their aims are somewhat higher in my estimation than those of the ACLU. You're putting a 28 year old kid if I may use that expression on a governing board here. I didn't feel that he had the qualifications to derve there. I think anyone that's connected and as I told him yesterday with a militant group such as came down here to Springfield when we were on 3rd readings and some of you will recall they were out here in the halls demanding that we come out and discuss legislation with them. I told them at that time that I thought their timing was poor. In conclusion I can only say this that I think the Governor's timing was wrong on this appointment and I hope that some of you especially some of you conservative Democrats who are friends of mine will so agree. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Any further discussion? Senator Partee.

## SENATOR PARTEE:

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I hadn't planned to say anything but Senator when you mentioned militant groups it just reminded me that one day down here last year we had a bill called, SB 3636...

HB 3636 that me dear friend Senator Harris was espousing.

And they had groups down here like coming out of your ears, there were nurses, there were teachers, there were insurance people. And if you think they weren't militant on that subject you just didn't talk to any of them. I thought they were going to chase me in the Chambers at one point out there. But that's the American system, groups are...Constitution even says that people have the right even suggests to people that they go to the seat of their government to express their grievances. So we call them militant if they're on the other side, we call them our dear friends if they're on our side. They're

just people expressing their views. But on thing happened l. 2. in the Senate Executive Committee last night that made me proud to be a member of the Senate. There was a member 3. 4. from your side of the aisle who voted for Mr. Nagle last 5. night and he said that he had been personally affronted 6. by an article that appeared in the IEA magazine, but that 7. he had the biggness of spirit, he didn't have malevolence 8. in his heart, he did...he was not a malcontent. He said I'm bigger than that and I'm going to vote for you although 9. 10. I feel you wronged me. I thought that was a very, very decent kind of man who would make that kind of a state-11. ment. And the Gentleman comes of course from the district 12. 13. where this...Mr. Nagle comes from and I'm sure he meant that and I'm sure he's going to vote for Mr. Nagle today. 14.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

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Any further discussion? If not the question before the Senate if it will be in order... The question before the Senate is does the Senate advise and consent to the Governor's nomination of Mr. James Nagle to become a member of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

The vote of the Senate on this question is twentynine yeas, eleven nays. A majority of the Senators elected
having refused to give their advise and consent by record
vote the Senate does reject the Governor's nomination of
James F. Nagle. Senator Ozinga.

### SENATOR OZINGA:

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Now Mr. President we have one more coming from the Governor's Message of September the 20th. This was one that was heard sometime ago which I personally held off for a few weeks and then last week they...everybody wondered why but I held it off at the request of the Democratic side of the aisle due to the absentees at that time and with due respect to them and they now have a full 29 quota. I now bring you up the Message of September 29th which was the vote or the nomination of the Governor of Miss Felicitas Berlanga of Normal, Illinois to be a member of the Board of Governor's of the State Colleges and Universities for a term expiring on the third Monday of January, 1975. Now, Mr. President again I am constrained to...make that motion although the consensus of the opinion of the Committee at that time was to the contrary. The vote at that time was that she should not be confirmed with a vote of 12...affirmative votes and 9 affirmative votes. Now this is the appointment of this little lady that comes from...the southeast side of Chicago but is a student

at the University at Normal and who after a lengthy ı. 2. discussion and...conversation showed that she had absolutely no qualifications. The mere fact that she 3, 4. has been appointed to this Committee might have been 5. well, except for the fact that this again is one of those matters that comes up when the appointments are 6. 7. done piecemeal. There...this is a nine member board, 8. four of which were appointed. Three previously heard 9. on new appointments and this was the fourth with one 10. yet to come. The qualifications of this girl are such 11. that they go back the present time she is an assistant aide at the...as counsel at ISU in Normal. From '72... 12. 13. August '72 to '73 she was an assistant student's 14. admissions counselor. Then from '72 before that she 15. was a guide for new students. Then before that she 16. was a clerk typist in a Chicago bank. Then before that she was a dietary assistant at Little Company of 17. Mary Hospital in Evergreen Park. She comes from comes 18. 19. from a rather large family and has no executive exper-20. ience, administrative experience that I could classify 21. as having the qualifications to handle a 72 billion 22. dollar budget by way of advise and counseling. She is at the Normal University which is under the Board of 23. Regents and I understand that she is being promulgated 24. here, promoted for this job by the President of that 25. University which is under the Board of Regents. Now 26. to me why, I raise the question, why is such a per-27. sonality that interested in getting a student of a 28. different University under a different board on an 29. opposite or another board, is there some reason behind 30. this that we don't see through, that we don't really 31. realize. Is there some hidden reason for this thing? 32. This is a very nice little girl. She's...she's honest 33.

and when I asked her point blank aren't you scared ı. of the handling of this position. She readily admitted 2. it, however she was willing to try. And the mere fact З. 4. that she is one of eight doesn't set to well because 5. there are three more on here that are not of the best 6. qualifications and as you have seen the qualifications 7. if you check their standards could be swayed by five 8. to four votes for good common sense. Therefore, speaking 9. as to what I saw, I think she's well qualified when it comes to looks, to behavior and things like that but when 10. 11. it comes to experience or ability to handle an advisory 12. job in this capacity, I can't see it. So my motion stands that we do recommend, even my thinking to the contrary, 13. 14. notwithstanding.

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### SENATOR PARTEE:

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2. Well, Mr. President, Members of the Senate, let me first say to Senator Ozinga that he is right and I appreciate ₹. 4. the fact that he held reporting this in until this time 5. because if it had been reported in at another time we 6. didn't have our troops here and I want you to know I 7. personally appreciate your courtesy in holding it. Now 8. let me just say that in considering this nomination I am 9. one who has not at all times said that everybody nominated 10. should be approved. But when I think of this nomination 11. I have to tell you that it goes pretty deep with me in 12. terms of a recognition of what this country's about. This country that we call America that we say we're 13. 14. proud of, we wear its flags on our lapel, we fly their 15. flags on our automobiles, on our lawns and take a 16. great deal of pride in the fact that America has been 17. referred to as a great melting pot, and all of the 18. advancements made in this country both in the fields of 19. business and finance and in our cultural attainments, 20. have in the main come because we are what has been 21. described as a melting pot. People from all over this world, Germany and Italy and England and France and 22. 23. Ireland and Africa and all of the rest of the world 24. has made its contributions to the American culture. And here we find in this late date in time the rejection 25. of a person in the main because she's young. The fact 26. of the matter is she is but 21 years of age and she is 27. a young person but I would remind you that Goethe 28. once said that the destiny of any nation at any given 29. time depends upon the opinion of its young men and 30. women under five and twenty. Macdonald once said that 31. when we are out of sympathy with the young, then I think 32. our work in this world is over. I suggest to you that

although she is young, she is a part of that American 1. melting pot being of Spanish descent and a person who 2. is deserving of participation in our American way of 3. life. Now she's in school. That has to be a penalty 4 it seems to me for her to be denied. She's 21 years of age and more than anyone else on the board talks 6 each day with students. People who are in the schools and 7. who of course communicate to her their wishes and their 8. desires. We talk about the amount of money that's 9. involved in the operation of this board. Of course 10. it's millions of dollars but you're not electing her 11. the president of the board. You're not making her a 12. person solely and especially responsible for the 13. expenditure of a hundred million dollars. There are nine 14. people on the board. That's one more than eight and 15. one less than ten, nine people on this board. She is 16. but one-ninth of the total composition of the board. 17. And no matter what her notions, no matter what her 18. ideas, her notions and ideas could not preponderate 19. the wishes and desires of a majority of that board. 20. I asked her specifically this question - you have ideas, 21. you have notions, you want to make input do you to 22. the board? She said, of course. I'd like to give my 23. experiences when questions arise. I said, would you 24. nonetheless after having made an offer of your own views 25. and notions would you nonetheless follow the majority 26. rule of that board. She looked at me as though I was 27. asking something just sort of out of space. She said 28. of course I would. She would certainly abide by 29. the wishes of a majority of the people on that board. 30. We hear a lot of talk about spending millions of dollars 31. for our youth. We have youth centers and all kinds of 32. things for youth. It seems to me that our role in life

ought to be to encourage youth and not to discourage 1. them but to encourage them rather than to discourage 2. them. I would also say to you that Oscar Wilde back 3. in 1893 from a play called A Woman of No Importance 4. wrote this line and I think it's very prophetic. 5. 6. The youth of America is their oldest tradition. Ιt has been going on now for three hundred years. Mencken 7. once said that youth though it may lack knowledge is 8. certainly not devoid of intelligence. It sees through 9. shams with sharp and terrible eyes and if you want 10. to know who's a phony watch your children when people 11. come over to visit. They can tell very quickly who's 12. for real and who isn't for real. The Senator said 13. she's a nice little girl, she's honest and she's 14. intelligent. That's true. She carries a B average 15. at her school. She's a person capable of understanding 16. what goes on on the board and making a contribution to 17. that board. She's not going to override the wishes and .18. desires of the majority of that board but we ought to 19. 20. have youth on our boards. We ought to have participation 21. at a level where they know what's going on and who...and 22. are willing to tell us what ... what's on the minds of their contemporaries. I think to say to this young 23. Spanish woman that she at the age of 21 having made 24. the kind of accomplishments that are possible within 25. that age span of life that she cannot participate as 26. a member, a single member of a nine member board, I 27. think is disastrous. I think it says that we are 28. living and going backward, that we have no concern 29. for our progeny, that we have no concern for our future, 30. and that we are not concerned with making our institutions 31.

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be stagnated by backward notions and ideas like denying
 this young Spanish woman a spot on a nine-member board.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Any further discussion? Senator Soper.

SENATOR SOPER:

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Mr...Mr. President, Senator Partee you know and I know that she's going to be confirmed. And that's a very nice speech you made, very nice talk. I think she's a nice young lady and I voted for her in the Executive Committee and I think that... I think she'll do a good She'll get training on the job. And I think if the Governor wants her, fine whether she's Spanish or German and I...you failed to mention all the good ... all the good refugees or the...or the imigrants that came to this Country and never said anything about the Czecks And...I'm very...I'm appalled, cause we have some of the most conservative people and...we mind our own business and we have no credit accounts, cash on the line we pay the bills and... I don't want to foreclose anybody else but I think we ought to get on with this with all the speeches where if you want to get the Latin American vote or whatever you're looking for it's fine with me. But the Lady's going to be confirmed so I don't think we need any more speeches.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Johns. senator Johns is the last Senator listed on my list and I have recognized him.

SENATOR JOHNS:

Thank you Mr. President. Whether it be true or not remains to be seen but I'm asking the question to myself and to this Senate that out of the boards that total seven and nine each can youth be represented? These people are educated people working the in system. They

could be sounding boards long sought by their colleagues of the same age, for an outlet for expression of their ideas and their hopes and yes, their frustrations to be boards long neglectful of youth. Revolt is often out of frustration, from failure to be heard. Failure to hear is suppression. Suppression creates a failure to believe in and supportive of our institutions. Has the Republican Party turned its back on the young people? Training on the job can be training for future responsibilities, for these people to step in to those that step out. Thank you very much.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

For what purpose does Senator Sours rise?
SENATOR SOURS:

I oppose this appointment and I'd like about two minutes to tell you why. Well, that's not been voted on.

PRESIDING OFFICER(SENATOR GRAHAM):

Senator Sours. I'm going to watch my watch, two minutes.
SENATOR SOURS:

Just so we know what we're doing Gentlemen, the nominee is nominated to serve as one, on a board of nine members to manage, operate, control and maintain the system of State colleges and universities including Eastern Illinois, Western Illinois, Chicago State, Northeastern Illinois, Governor's State. We're talking probably around 130 or 40 million dollars. Now, who is the applicant? Not who is the applicant but who? She says presently I am a junior, a third year student at Illinois State University, Normal, Illinois. If that's what this Chamber wants, good luck.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR GRAHAM):

If no further questions, the previous question has been moved. Senator Walker, let's be on with it.

SENATOR WALKE

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Thank you Mr. President, I'll take less than two minutes, I've got my official list here and I'll add myself to it today because it's the second time I've been up. I would like to call attention to an article in the Kankakee paper here that says...

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I would like to call attention to an article in the Kankaee paper here that says forgive. . . it's a couple, three weeks old, forgive our cynicism but we predict that this young lady will become the first Illinois college student with an important State job. Like to tie it in with the WBBM editorial here. It's high time for the Governor began working with Legislature instead of trying to exploit it for his own political ambitions. Now in a fast conclusion, reminds me of my first Speaker in the House Warren Wood who had an expression that went like this - he'd rather be right than to be popular. I think a lot of you are going to vote here today to be popular in your districts rather than to be right with your constituents. I have no hesitancy in going back to the 10th District and say that I opposed this nomination. Not because she's Spanish speaking, not because she's a member of the so-called minority group but because she absolutely does not have the qualifications. A 21 year old student, I don't care if there's 15 members of the Board. Handling 72 million dollars, she's just not qualified. I'm not biased and I'm not prejudiced. And I'll explain that to the people in my 10th District, and I'm sure that they will agree with the voting position
