3. order. The prayer will be by the Reverend Jack H. Glenn, Eureka  
4. United Presbyterian Church, Eureka, Illinois.

5. REVEREND JACK GLENN:

6. (Prayer given by Reverend Jack Glenn)

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Reading of the Journal. Senator Welsh.

9. SENATOR WELSH:

10. Mr. President, I move that the reading and approval of Journals  
11. of Wednesday, March 5th, 1975, Thursday, March 6th, 1975, Tuesday,  
12. March 11th, 1975 and Wednesday, March 12th, 1975 be postponed pending  
13. arrival of the printed Journals.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. You heard the motion. All in favor say Aye. Opposed, Nay. Ayes  
16. have it. The motion carries. Committee reports.

17. SECRETARY:

18. Senator Donnewald, Chairman of Assignment of Bills, affigns...  
19. assigns the following to Committee:

18. PRESIDENT:
19. Senate Bills on 2nd reading. For what purpose does Senator
20. Vadalabene arise?
21. SENATOR VADALABENE:
22. Yes, thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate. I would
23. like to ask leave to have Senate Bill 83, which has been assigned to
24. Local Government, to have that committee discharged of that bill, and
25. at this time have Senate Bill 83 Tabled.
26. PRESIDENT:
27. Is there leave?
28. SENATOR VADALABENE:
29. Leave.
30. PRESIDENT:
31. Leave is granted. Senate Bills on 2nd reading. Senate Bill 24,
32. Senator Wooten. Read the bill.
33. SECRETARY:

1. Senate Bill 24.

2. (Secretary reads title of bill)

3. 1st reading...or 2nd reading of the bill. One committee amendment  
4. offered by Pensions, Personnel and Veterans Affairs.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Senator Shapiro, for what purpose do you arise?

7. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

8. Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, even though  
9. the Fiscal Note Act was complied within a cursory manner, it has just  
10. been brought to my attention, and I intended to get to Senator Wooten  
11. to see if he wouldn't hold the bill until we could straighten it out.  
12. The Fiscal Note did not include any administrative costs, it was not  
13. signed by the head of the agency involved, in other words, State  
14. Scholarship Commission. We understand that additional personnel  
15. have to be hired to administer this, and I'm wondering if Senator  
16. Wooten wouldn't take it out of the record till we get that straight-  
17. ened out.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Wooten.

20. SENATOR WOOTEN:

21. No. I have complied with your request for a Fiscal Note. It is...  
22. it is certainly ample, and I...I don't think we need delay any further.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Shapiro.

25. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

26. Then I must raise an objection to the Fiscal Note. The Fiscal  
27. Note is not in compliance with the law.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. May I see the Fiscal Note, please? Senator Wooten, do we have  
30. any additional copies of the Fiscal Note?

31. SENATOR WOOTEN:

32. I just sent one up there, I think. Here.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Would you have the Page run about five, ten copies of that,  
2. please?

3. SENATOR WOOTEN:

4. Okay.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Never mind. They're...they're being run already. For the benefit  
7. of the members, we are on 2nd reading. We are addressing ourselves  
8. to Senate Bill 24, Senator Wooten. Senator Shapiro requested  
9. yesterday that a Fiscal Note be filed in connection with Senate Bill  
10. 24. Senator Wooten has filed a Fiscal Note. Senator Shapiro is  
11. rising at this moment to contest the adequacy of that Fiscal Note.  
12. The Chairman recognizes Senator Shapiro.

13. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

14. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, it was just  
15. brought to my attention that the Fiscal Note introduced by Senator  
16. Wooten, in an attempt to comply with the Fiscal Note Act, does not,  
17. in fact, comply with the Fiscal Note Act. It contains personal  
18. references, in other words, words such as - I would further suggest,  
19. so on and so forth. The regulations that have been handed to me  
20. concerning Fiscal Notes state, "No opinion or comment shall be made  
21. a part of any Fiscal Note." However, any technical or mechanical  
22. defects in the measure may be noted. Furthermore, it states, "Work-  
23. ing paper shall include, when practical, a breakdown of the cost and  
24. expenditures of State funds or the expected increase or decrease in  
25. State revenues", as the case may be, resulting from enactment of the  
26. measure in question. The work sheet shall include, but not necessarily  
27. be limited to, costs of personnel, materials and supplies and capitol  
28. outlay. The Scholarship Commission has stated that this will lead  
29. to an increased cost in administration and additional personnel, which  
30. are not included in the Fiscal Note Act. Furthermore, the rules and  
31. regulations state that the Fiscal Note supplied shall be signed by the  
32. head of the agency involved which includes...which is the State  
33. Scholarship Commission that has not been complied with.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Senator Wooten.

3. SENATOR WOOTEN:

4. I believe the operative language is when necessary. If it is  
5. the judgement of this Body that it is necessary, I will certainly  
6. comply. I do not believe, of course, I'm...the Senator and I know  
7. between us, this is a...and we have agreed it's a dilatory tactic.  
8. If you want to delay, fine. But I would not accept a single Senator's  
9. judgement, I want the judgement of the Body that this, in fact, is  
10. necessary.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Any further discussion? The Chair rules that the Fiscal Note,  
13. as proffered by Senator Wooten, is adequate. Call the amendment.  
14. Senator Wooten will explain Committee...Amendment No. 1.

15. SENATOR WOOTEN:

16. Yes, Mr. President and colleagues, the...because the bill is  
17. really in two parts, there is some question raised that there may be  
18. an interpretation that a scholarship can be granted for a period of  
19. eight years rather than four. Amendment No. 1, which was adopted by  
20. the committee, makes it clear that this limits the scholarship pro-  
21. vision to a four year period. And I would move its adoption.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Senator Sommer. Senator Wooten moves the adoption of Amendment  
24. No. 1. All in favor will say Aye. Opposed. The amendment is adopted.

25. SECRETARY:

26. Amendment No. 2 offered by Senator Sommer.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Is this a committee amendment? Well, let me...any more committee  
29. amendments? Any amendments from the Floor? Senator Sommer.

30. SENATOR SOMMER:

31. I have given a copy of this to the Clerk and Senator Rock  
32. yesterday. What this does is the...the leaders of the National  
33. Guard were before us, and they said these scholarships should go to

1. people they're trying to recruit. They're trying to get young  
2. men who are eighteen and nineteen years old into the National  
3. Guard, and they're trying to recruit them in. All this does, is it  
4. restricts the granting of these scholarships to enlisted personnel.  
5. The officers generally have...

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Just...just...just...just one minute, Senator. Members of the  
8. Senate, please take your caucuses off the Floor or at least bring  
9. your voices down another fifty decimals. Continue, Senator.

10. SENATOR SOMMER:

11. Thank you. What this amendment does, is it provides that the  
12. scholarship shall go only to enlisted personnel. The officers gen-  
13. erally are people who already have an education, particularly some  
14. of the higher ranking officers, the Guard is always top heavy with  
15. officers anyway. We don't need to give officers inducement to hang  
16. around, they got plenty of other inducements. But, you do need the  
17. inducement for the enlisted man, the nineteen year old young man who  
18. wants to go to college, under this plan, and I think we should restrict  
19. it to those people.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Senator Wooten.

22. SENATOR WOOTEN:

23. I sympathize with Senator's empathy for enlisted personnel.  
24. This is a matter of no great moment to me if it is the wish of the  
25. Body that it be passed, fine. I don't think it is necessary. But,  
26. I'm...I understand his motivation and somewhat sympathize with it.  
27. I'm certainly be glad to abide by a carefully regulated voice vote  
28. on it.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. In other words, you're positively ambivalent.

31. SENATOR WOOTEN:

32. That's right.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Thank you. Senator Sommers offers Senate Amendment No. 2 to  
2. Senate Bill 24. All in favor of the adoption of this amendment say  
3. Aye. Opposed. The Ayes have it. The amendment is adopted. Any  
4. other amendments?

5. SECRETARY:

6. Amendment No. 3 offered by Senator Shapiro.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Senator Shapiro.

9. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

10. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, as a intro-  
11. duction to the amendment which I have to propose, the bill, as it is  
12. presently constructed, allows tuition waivers for those members of  
13. the National Guard who serve one year, and then, they can get a tuition  
14. waiver equivalent to the scholarship...to the tuition charge at the  
15. university which they intend to go to. My amendment does this, I think  
16. that the proposed bill is rather restricted in that the purpose of the  
17. bill is to induce people to join the National Guard. What my amend-  
18. ment will do states simply that any person who has served at least one  
19. year in the Illinois National Guard or Illinois Naval Militia shall  
20. be paid a grant equal to the average exemption from fees, as provided  
21. in Section 10-13, for each year of service up to a maximum of four  
22. years. In other words, this amendment gives cash grants to those  
23. who join the National Guard. They can use it to go to a vocational  
24. school, or they can use it to go to a senior institution, a junior  
25. college, further their education in anyway. In others words, it  
26. removes the restrictions and really helps the National Guard attract  
27. people to join. That's the purpose of the amendment, and I would  
28. urge its adoption.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Senator Wooten.

31. SENATOR WOOTEN:

32. Could we have the equivalent of a Fiscal Note on this, Senator?  
33. How much is it going to cost?

1. PRESIDENT:  
2. Senator Shapiro.  
3. SENATOR SHAPIRO:  
4. Mr. President and Senator Wooten, I'd be very glad if you want  
5. to hold the bill, to get a Fiscal Note prepared.  
6. PRESIDENT:  
7. Senator Wooten.  
8. SENATOR WOOTEN:  
9. How does five million, four hundred thousand dollars sound?  
10. PRESIDENT:  
11. Senator Shapiro.  
12. SENATOR SHAPIRO:  
13. I'd say it's in the ball park.  
14. PRESIDENT:  
15. Senator Wooten.  
16. SENATOR WOOTEN:  
17. Well, then I would say we don't need this amendment.  
18. PRESIDENT:  
19. Any further discussion? Senator Fawell.  
20. SENATOR FAWELL:  
21. Well, I...I would rise to support the amendment because I  
22. think it's very honest approach. I don't know why a bill like  
23. this, in the thirteen years I have been here, they've always been  
24. in the Education Committee. It wasn't discussed in Education. I'm  
25. not sure why. I'm sure we're all busy and bills don't always go where  
26. I suppose all of us think they should go. I guess that's very true.  
27. But, this is a bill that, frankly, I don't...I don't like the bill  
28. as it...as it stands, but at least we're being very honest because,  
29. Senator Wooten, it seems to me it's going to cost five million, four  
30. hundred thousand dollars no matter how you slice it, and at least  
31. we're not causing our various universities and community colleges to  
32. have to underwrite this. We're...we're going to see to it that these  
33. ...these costs are still coming into the various universities and



1. community colleges. So, I...I think it's a very honest, above  
2. board approach, and it's...it's...I think speaking the truth  
3. about the bill.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Any further discussion? Senator Wooten.

6. SENATOR WOOTEN:

7. Yes, I...I suppose we really shouldn't get into the substance  
8. of the bill. So, I would simply say that the...the difference in  
9. cost is between five million, four hundred thousand dollars per  
10. year and a top of three hundred thousand dollars. The average  
11. figure that the Scholarship Commission supplied is two hundred  
12. and fifty thousand dollars. Now, that's really all we're talking  
13. about in the amendment. I think, Senator Fawell, the proper motion  
14. is to work and vote to defeat the bill, if you're against the bill.  
15. But at this stage, in simple economics, I will put my two hundred  
16. and fifty thousand against five million, four hundred, and I urge  
17. that we resist this amendment.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Bell.

20. SENATOR BELL:

21. Well, I had thought I'd try to stay out of this, but I do think  
22. something needs to be said from this side of the aisle in reference  
23. to support Senator Wooten's position, which I do support. You know,  
24. we have Legislative scholarships in each of our districts. I don't  
25. know that the...that that's bad or good, but...

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Just one...one moment, Senator. Will the members be in their  
28. seats. Continue, Senator Bell.

29. SENATOR BELL:

30. As I...as I was saying, Mr. President, I don't know really whether  
31. that's bad or good, but it's been the policy of this State, certainly  
32. the policy of this Legislature, that we do everything we can to try  
33. to see that every young person in Illinois that wants to further his

1. education can do so. Now, my learned colleague and dear friend,  
2. Senator Shapiro, you're putting a...an amendment on here, you're  
3. trying to put on an amendment that's going...that's going to gut  
4. this bill, and I happen to join with Senator Wooten and as a...  
5. I'm a cosponsor of this legislation, and there are members of this  
6. side of the aisle, if I'm the only one, that support this bill as it  
7. is, and I would urge my colleagues to reject what is obviously a  
8. dilatory tactic.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Any further discussion? Senator Shapiro may close the debate.  
11. Senator Palmer, if you'd speak just a little louder, I'd be able to  
12. hear you better. Senator Shapiro.

13. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

14. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, what this  
15. amendment does is to expand the grant so that those who wish to join  
16. the National Guard, and I'm sure it would induce more of our people to  
17. ...our young people to join the National Guard, so that they can use  
18. this grant to go to a vocational school or any type of educational  
19. institution which they choose. And furthermore, what it attempts to  
20. do is to get out of a profound argument concerning tuition waivers.  
21. This State embarked upon a program approximately six years ago to  
22. eliminate special interest tuition waivers. That's all the amendment  
23. does. I would urge a favorable roll call. I think you should...  
24. can all support this amendment because it should be in...gear yourselves  
25. to the hearts of your constituents, particularly those who do not  
26. intend to go to a institution of higher education, but would like to  
27. join the National Guard. I don't think we should discriminate against  
28. those people and just give this grant to those who want to go to a  
29. senior institution. And, Mr. President, I would appreciate a roll  
30. call, a recorded roll call on this amendment.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. For what purpose does Senator Welsh arise?

33. SENATOR WELSH:

1. A question of the sponsor of the amendment.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Will the sponsor yield?

4. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

5. Yes.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. He indicates he will.

8. SENATOR WELSH:

9. Are the officers in or out of your amendment, Dave? ...officers.

10. The...officers, are they in or out of your amendment?

11. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

12. My...my amendment makes no distinction. Very democratic.

13. SENATOR WELSH:

14. What will that do to Senator Sommer's amendment? Senator Sommer

15. took the officers out a little while ago.

16. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

17. Well, his amendment has been adopted, so I assume that it would

18. hold as far as this one is concerned. It would apply the same way.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. The question is shall Amendment No. 3 to Senate Bill 24 be

21. adopted. All in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. The

22. voting is open. Have all voted who wished? Take the record. On

23. this question, the Ayes are 22, the Nays are 27, 1 Voting Present.

24. The amendment fails. Any further amendments?

25. SECRETARY:

26. Amendment No. 4 offered by Senator Buzbee.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator Buzbee.

29. SENATOR BUZBEE:

30. Yes, Mr. President, what this amendment does to this bill is...

31. was stated on this Floor yesterday...

32. PRESIDENT:

33. For what purpose does Senator Rock arise?

1. SENATOR ROCK:  
2. Mr. President, I don't have a copy of this amendment.  
3. PRESIDENT:  
4. Senator Buzbee.  
5. SENATOR BUZBEE:  
6. Mr. President, I'll be glad to furnish Senator Rock with  
7. a copy of the amendment.  
8. PRESIDENT:  
9. Senator Bell wants a copy, also.  
10. SENATOR BUZBEE:  
11. Mr. President, I wonder if since we don't always have to furnish  
12. copies of amendments, if it would be...be permissible to take the  
13. bill out of the record till I get copies made for everybody, and  
14. bring it back for Amendment No. 4 then?  
15. PRESIDENT:  
16. Senator Rock.  
17. SENATOR ROCK:  
18. Point of order. It's permissible to take the amendment out  
19. of the record. The bill is before us.  
20. PRESIDENT:  
21. That is correct. Senator Buzbee.  
22. SENATOR BUZBEE:  
23. Well, then, Mr. President, what is the Chair's pleasure? Am  
24. I going to be a...have an opportunity to...am I going have an oppor-  
25. tunity to present this amendment?  
26. PRESIDENT:  
27. The... the sponsor stands beside you. Let's hear from him.  
28. SENATOR BUZBEE:  
29. Mr. President...  
30. PRESIDENT:  
31. Senator Wooten. Senator Wooten.  
32. SENATOR WOOTEN:  
33. I am not highly inamorata of these amendments which I thought

1. Senator Buzbee was offering in jest. To my dismay, I find out  
2. he's deadly serious, and I will not...

3. PRESIDENT:

4. I have the feeling...

5. SENATOR WOOTEN:

6. I am not inclined to give him any assistance in adopting  
7. these amendments.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Senator Buzbee.

10. SENATOR BUZBEE:

11. Mr. President, the other day, I was presenting a bill on this  
12. Floor and a fellow Senator stood up and had some objection to the  
13. bill and granted...and asked if I would grant the courtesy of holding  
14. the bill for a day until he had some time to work out those objections.  
15. I said at that time that I would be...extend that courtesy to any  
16. Senator on this Floor at any time I was asked to do so, and I would  
17. like to see the same courtesy extended to me by my seatmate.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Wooten.

20. SENATOR WOOTEN:

21. Absolutely in this form. Since the few people in the Body who  
22. are really opposed to the bill have already delayed one day, and I've  
23. graciously assented to that. I will be very happy to advance this  
24. to 3rd and call it back to 2nd to give you an opportunity to...for  
25. any flights of fancy that anyone wants to attempt to attach to the  
26. bill. But, I do want to move it to 3rd, and I will give you that  
27. guarantee I'll call it back to 2nd.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Under those conditions, Senator Buzbee, will you withdraw your  
30. amendments? He'll move...he'll move it to 3rd reading, if there are  
31. no other amendments, and bring it back tomorrow for you.

32. SENATOR BUZBEE:

33. Mr. President, I appreciate the courtesy extended to me by my

1. colleague, and we will fly, as he said, in our flights of fancy  
2. next week, then.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Are there any further amendments? 3rd reading. Senator  
5. Graham.

6. SENATOR GRAHAM:

7. I didn't extract this agreement from the sponsor prior to this  
8. moment. I have in mind an amendment. Would you be willing to bring  
9. it back at 3rd reading, if I get one prepared?

10. PRESIDENT:

11. I think he's indicated...

12. SENATOR GRAHAM:

13. ... from 3rd to 2nd reading. Yes. All right. Thank you.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Senator Vadalabene. Just a minute, Senator Vadalabene. At the  
16. back rail, please. Keep your voices lowered, please. Senator  
17. Vadalabene.

18. SENATOR VADALABENE:

19. Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I  
20. stand on a point of personal privilege.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. State your point, Senator.

23. SENATOR VADALABENE:

24. We have in the group of...behind me in the Gallery, a group of  
25. women from the Madison County Farm Bureau who represent Senator  
26. Donnewald's district and Senator Demuzio's district and my district,  
27. and I would like for them to stand and be recognized.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Would the ladies stand and be recognized by the Senate and  
30. gentlemen? Senate...Senate Bill 27, Senator Rock. Senate Bill  
31. 57, Senator Johns. 58, Senator Johns. You don't care to move it?  
32. We don't want to know why. You don't care to move it? Right? Thank  
33. you. Senate Bills on 3rd reading. Senate Bill 48, Senator Nudelman.

1. Senate Bill 119, Senator Palmer. Senate Bill 164, Senator Berning.
2. Read the bill.
3. SECRETARY:
4. Senate Bill 164.
5. (Secretary reads title of bill)
6. 3rd reading of the bill.
7. PRESIDENT:
8. Senator Berning.
9. SENATOR BERNING:
10. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. Senate
11. Bill 164 seeks to strike language which has been the source of
12. considerable distress to the Pension Laws Commission. The Court of
13. Claims is actually a creature of the Legislature, and is in no way
14. a...an integral part of the Judicial system. It's not a court of
15. record. There have been numerous requests directed to the Pension
16. Laws Commission asking that the Court of Claims members become inte-
17. gral parts of the Judicial Retirement System. Each time these requests
18. have been denied. The Pension Laws Commission is of the opinion
19. that this is an unjustified request. Senate Bill 164 has been approved
20. by the Pension Laws Commission, and I, therefore, Mr. President,
21. ask for a favorable roll call.
22. PRESIDENT:
23. Any further discussion? The question is shall Senate Bill 164
24. pass. All in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. The
25. voting is open. Have all voted who wished? Take the record. Senator
26. Berning.
27. SENATOR BERNING:
28. May I postpone consideration?
29. PRESIDENT:
30. The bill is on postponed consideration. Senate Bill 165,
31. Senator Philip. House Bills on...House Bills on 2nd reading.
32. 371, Senator Weaver. Read the bill.
33. SECRETARY:

1. House Bill 371.  
2. (Secretary reads title of bill)
